
Designed by Smith, Hinchman & Grylls Associates Inc. of Detroit, the drawing shows a 120,000-square-foot, two-story, contemporary hospital built into hill.

According to Jack Cruikshank, director of development and public relations, few trees on the wooded site will be removed. The hospital is designed so no roads can be seen from the windows.

The following services are to be offered: Inpatient and outpatient surgical services; radiology; laboratory; pharmacy; physical medicinerehabilitation; outpatient walk-in service; 24-hour emergency care; and community health programs.

It's expected to employ 200 people.

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# Kennel owners, township sued for \$300,000

David Endreszel's three-year lawsuit succeeded in closing down neighboring J&J Kennels on Pine Knob Road.

Now he's suing Independence Township and the



kennel owners, Jack and Jody Nelson, and is seeking a combined \$300,000 in damages.

In his suit Endreszel charges deprivation of his rights, lack of due process, and the township's failure to enforce its ordinance.

"I guess I've been successful all along the way with this. It's taken a lot of time, and a lot of expense. The wheels of justice move slowly," he said. "I'm trying to be optimistic. Going to trial will be cumbersome."

William Vanderkloot, the Nelsons' attorney, says his clients have been "horribly wronged."

"I'm going to raise some defenses and, if the judge agrees, would allow them to continue to operate," he said. "It's important for the Nelsons to do this because they've invested a lot of money based on the township requiring them to do things a certain way."

Township attorney Richard Campbell says Independence is "in a good position." "I don't think the township is guilty of any wrongdoing. I think a mistake was made, but I don't think it can be charged to the township," Campbell said. "The ZBA is like a court. It acts on what's brought before it—and isn't a fact-finding body."

The new suit stems from one filed three years ago, where Endreszel charged the Nelsons with operating a business he says lost its non-conforming status when the kennel closed for a year prior to the Nelsons' purchase in 1976.

In addition, he said two outbuildings were erected on site without permits and without required setbacks.

The township zoning board has repeatedly refused to outlaw the licensed kennel.

The Nelsons have disagreed it's non-conforming, pointing to the buildings which remained on site those years.

Last summer the court ordered the kennel closed by July 15.

Firefighter Neil Ashley's injuries are more serious than first thought, and he'll be off work six weeks, according to Independence Township Fire Chief Frank Ronk.

Ashley, a veteran firefighter of 13 years, fell through the floor of a burning barn on Maybee Road 10 days ago.

It was the department's first serious fire-related injury in four years, Ronk said.

"He tore tendons, muscle and cartilage, and we're not exactly sure how serious it is," Ronk said. "(Three firefighters) were fishing out hot spots and Ashley's leg went through. But that's not the leg that's hurt—it was the leg that caught his weight.

"He's an excellent firefighter and an excellent driver engineer."

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The blaze resulted in damages between \$20,000

and \$30,000 including the barn and its contents, Ronk said.

He called it "a suspicious fire" and said it is under investigation by county fire investigators and the township fire department.

An amendment to the zoning ordinance that restricts the number of cars in a automobile service shop lot, and mandates they be behind a solid wall, has at least two Independence Township businessmen concerned.

The law takes effect 30 days after publication, and will affect / future businesses, or established businesses that seek zoning changes or site plan approval for remodeling.

"That's hogwash. They didn't talk to me about it," said Steve Voss, owner of Precision Auto Repair on Dixié Highway.

"How can they make this law that affects me, and not let me know?"

Voss said he has between 20 and 30 cars in his lot

at one time for two service bays.

NY AVEL NO.

The new law limits service shops to a car in each bay, and two outside for each bay.

"I turn out about 150 cars a month. That's more than six a day. There ain't no way I'm going to limit that. I mean, I've got to make a living," he said.

Voss leases the building, as does Derek Hyten, owner of Sashabaw Autobody on Sashabaw Road.

"I usually have five cars sitting outside waiting, and I could live with that," Hyten said. "But I don't know about a wall. I'd have to talk to the landlord."

Following the planning commission's recommendation, the board voted 6-1 at the Nov. 1 meeting to adopt the zoning amendment.

Treasurer Frederick Ritter dissented.

"I don't disagree with the need for standards, but I think what's been proposed is arbitrary," he said.



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# Locricchio denied greenhouse; says he'll sue

Joseph Locricchio left the board of appeals meeting last week shouting, "The greenhouse is staying. It's not coming down. I'll see you in court!"

Locricchio, co-owner of the Pine Knob Investment Co., was denied a variance Nov. 2 that would legalize a 2,400-square-foot, vinyl-walled greenhouse on residential property on Allen Road.

The greenhouse is an addition to a 12,000-square-foot, 11-year-old nonconforming barn.

The zoning board of appeals turned down the request in a 3-2 vote, saying it would increase the size of a nonconforming use which is limited to 1,500 feet by ordinance.

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'The major problem I have is the 12,000-squarefoot (barn)," said zoning board member Larence Kozma. "He can put the greenhouse in the barn. He hasn't been able to show hardship or practical difficulty, which is what we have to have to grant a variance, and if we approve it we're throwing to the wind the 1,500-square-foot limitation.

"We'd be allowing him to increase the limits of the ordinance tenfold.'

Via letter Locricchio was ordered to stop work on the greenhouse and he did, said building Director Kenneth Delbridge.

Delbridge recommended the variance be granted, pointing to the zoning board's approval two years ago of a 15,000-square-foot barn two miles north of Locricchio's site.

"No court would uphold the board after finding out about that bigger barn," Delbridge said. "Once one goes in, the courts OK all others." Construction of the greenhouse began months ago and is complete, Locricchio said.

Locricchio added that he was responsible for the work and "associated" with Louis Fedele who's subleasing the 15.5-acre farm from Locricchio's brother Anthony, who is renting from the owner. Locricchio indicated future plans to move into the farm.

A handful of neighbors opposed addition of the greenhouse, challenged its size and said they feared establishment of a commercial business. Locricchio repeatedly denied those charges.

By law, he can erect the greenhouse inside the barn without a variance, can farm the acreage and sell the produce at a roadside stand, Delbridge said.

"I'm not going to sell tomatoes," Locricchio said. "There will be no commerce that happens on that property. I think you're familiar with what I do at Pine Knob. I build with craftsmen. I've left nothing but credible marks.'

Bruce Shull presented the board with a 20-signature petition asking the variance be denied. "Construction has not ceased," Shull said. "If we

have to live by the rules, so does everyone else. I want to know what his next phase will be. Right now he has

16 fig trees there. If you believe that's all he's going to have then I have a bridge in Brooklyn I want to sell you."

"Don't you call me a liar," Locricchio challenged. "And you can go to hell with your Brooklyn Bridge.'

Shull expressed concern the greenhouse would go commercial, which would require a rezoning.

"I'm concerned about the quality of life," he said.

Neighbor Alfred Smorto said he had no problem with the greenhouse.

"Whether or not he gets the variance is between you and him," he told the zoning board of appeals. "I just don't want it to become a business. He says it won't, so I have no problem with that.'

James Waller, another neighbor, objected to the plastic sheeting on the greenhouse.

"I think it looks terrible. It doesn't look like a finished structure, and if allowed to stand would be an eyesore to the neighborhood," he said.

Locricchio offered to install frosted glass panels, and plant a row of pine trees to block the view.

Nonpermanent, the vinyl-sheeted greenhouse rests on a concrete pad with an earth and mulch floor, has no electricity or plumbing, and already houses 16 "family heirloom" fig trees, brought in for the winter for spring transplanting, Locricchio said.

The greenhouse has one convecting wall that heats 275 gallons of water stored in barrels from rain runoff.

The matter was discussed for about one hour before the zoning board of appeals voted to deny the variance for the greenhouse.

Kozma, Robert Newlin and Lew Hewko voted "no." Roy Haeusler and Chairman John Dunlop voted "yes."

# Road work lists

Springfield and Independence townships could be in for some road work with the approval of the Oakland County Board of Road Commissioners.

With \$18.8 million to spend countywide, the county's targeted several areas of Independence Township for \$421,000 worth of road work, which includes \$315,000 in federal aid:

•Pave the approaches of Clintonville Road and South Eston Road.

•Widen and correct crown of curves at Park Drive eastward.

•Cut embankments, reconstruct and realign curves at Clintonville Road and South Eston Road and pave shoulders, upgrade guardrails and provide recovery area at curves.

In Springfield Township the OCRC's proposed \$441,000 worth of road work, which includes \$323,000 from the federal government and \$95,000 from the township itself:

•Pave one mile of Davisburg Road from Dixie Highway to Bridge Lake Road, with widenings at Dixie Highway.

Projects must be approved by Oakland County Board of Road Commissioners, which is expected to review the proposals in mid-December.

If approved, work will begin the spring of 1984.

# Tri-party paving

 Oakland County's made a priority list of tri-party road projects for 1984, and the Independence Township Board discussed it Nov. 1, agreeing to table the issue for further discussion.

The township has \$30,000 to spend in the matching funds program, with costs shared equally between itself, the Oakland County Road Commission and Oakland County Board of Commissioners.

The following projects were proposed:

•Two flashers at Bailey Lake Elementary School, \$5,553.

•Clear obstructions at Stickney and Pine Knob roads, \$25,000; at Whipple lake and Pine Knob roads, \$14,000; and Pine Knob and Clarkston roads, \$30,000; and Rattalee Lake and Ellis roads, \$14,000.

•Gravel the intersection of Allen Road at Rattalee Lake Road, \$12,000.

The school flasher proposed for Maybee Road near the Pheasant Run intersection falls 700 feet short of the state's requirement that it be near a school.

The county says it can install the flasher but not reduce the speed limit to 25 miles per hour, or place warning flashers farther west. Cost: \$2,400.

The board tabled the matter until the next meeting on Nov. 15 at 7:30 p.m. in the Independence Township Hall Annex, 90 N. Main, Clarkston.

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

God knows, the people of the Eighth District must be a bunch of dummies. They're totally incapable of deciding who should represent them in the state senate without the wise counsel of the UAW, the Michigan Education Association, their college alma maters, and the host of other political Dear Abbys who have popped up in their midst like mushrooms on the front lawn.

The Eighth District became the focal point of all this attention when a recall election was set Nov. 22 for State Senator Phil Mastin, who helped save our state from barbarism last spring by voting for a 38 percent increase in our state income taxes.

•To save air conditioning energy, keep your windows and oudside doors closed. (Come now, dear reader, and fess up—how many of you were keeping your doors and windows wide open all summer, wondering why your electric bills were so high?)

•Lowering your thermostat saves on heating costs. To feel more comfortable at the lower setting, wear warmer clothes. (Again, how many of you spent all last winter sitting around in the nude with the thermostat on 90 degrees, wondering why your last gas bill was astronomical?)

Wise men and women shudder to think of what our Water-Winter Wonderland would be like if we stopped paying people in the Energy Administration to crank out these tidbits of wisdom. I know I do.

And there's a connection here, too. People who are so dumb that they leave their doors and windows wide open while running their air conditioner obviously are too dense to make an intelligent decision as to who their state senator should be. Maybe Eighth District voters should phone their nearest special interest group and request that someone come to their home Nov. 22 and take them by the hand to the polls, just to show them which lever to pull. Goodness knows, even wellmeaning dummies might still get things messed up without that extra help. In the meantime, I wish someone would tell the people in the Eighth District who to vote for in the presidential, U.S. Senate and U.S. House vote next year. That election's still 12 months away, but there's certainly no harm in starting the education process early.

# Look into new center

You may want to ponder accepting the invitation to the open house Sunday, Nov. 13, at the Clarkston Community Learning Center.

It's planned from 1 to 4 p.m. at 5275 Maybee Rd., Independence Township.

There'll be refreshments prepared by food service students at the vocational school. There'll be entertainment by Clarkston school pupils. The building staff will be there. Tours will be conducted by students who attend classes at the center.

But beyond the fun, it's a chance to consider two things.

First, a program started in the midst of economic chaos has proved itself a viable part of the school district.

There was unrest when South Sashabaw Elementary School was closed due to declining enrollment. Many resented the reopening of the building a few months later as the Clarkston Community Learning Center.

From the beginning the center has been part of the Community Education Department under the direction of Kathleen O'Donnell. There was some grumbling, too, when she was hired as a new employe amid cutbacks.

We've watched with interest O'Donnell's talent in finding outstanding people to work in community education.

As a result, in addition to paying its own way and helping the district in its struggle to remain financially solvent, the program added strength.

And the building offered space for some programs that fulfill real needs in the district—an alternative high school, a program for pregnant teens and young mothers, classes for adults working to complete high school graduation, a job placement service for students. While community education goes beyond the above with enrichment classes for pupils designed to enhance education offered in school buildings, and leisure and vocational classes for adults, the learning center is a symbol of its success so far.

It also holds promise for a future goal—to serve all ages while supporting the philosophy of life-long learning.

Secondly, the transition of the building itself is worth a visit.

There have been no structural changes. The major differences involve paint and adult-sized classroom furnishings.

For those who were in the building before or those who remember attending school in one built in the mid-1940s, the transition is worth viewing.

Dignity is the word that comes to mind—it describes the physical appearance and something many of the courses offer.

If all the shopping was done, there'd be nothing left but eating Christmas cookies and sipping egg nog.





# Learning center hosts open house

There's a celebration planned at the Clarkston Community Learning Center.

The public's invited to an open house on Sunday, Nov. 13, from 1 to 4 p.m. at the center located at 5275 Maybee, Independence Township.

"It's a celebration of the renovation of the learning center, and it lies within National Education Week," says Ginny Farmer, community school coordinator.

"And with all we've heard from the Nation at Risk report, we feel we have some programs that are exciting and we'd like to show them off to the community.

The center was formerly South Sashabaw Elementary School. It was closed in June 1982 due to declining enrollment in the Clarkston school district and reborn as the Clarkston Community Learning Center in September 1982.

During summer break this year the building was spruced up with paint, adult-sized furniture and a carpeted entry with a reception desk.

The open house is a dual celebration with the Clarkston school district's Community Education Department, which oversees the programs conducted in the center as well as vocational and recreational courses at the Northwest Oakland Vocational Education Center, after-school enrichment classes and adult



high school completion courses at Clarkston High School.

For the open house, entertainment will be provided by members of the drama class offered by the Community Education Department at Bailey Lake Elementary, the Clarkston High School Jazz Band, and the junior high school select choruses, the Encores and the Ovations.

Refreshments are being prepared by students enrolled in the food service program at the Northwest Oakland Vocational Education Center.

Students enrolled at the center will act as hosts and hostesses. and there will be displays of a few of the crafts skills offered through community education leisure time classes—herbs, stenciling and basketry.

In addition, the staff will be there and all the classrooms will be open.

Serving as chairperson of the open house is Barbara Banker, Job Club instructor and placement coordinator.

"I really think people in the community aren't too well-informed on what community education is-it's not just the K-12 program, it's something for all ages," Banker said.

"If you want to take a leisure class or if you want to graduate from high school, there's something for everyone."

The learning center houses the following programs:



•PACESETTER: Two classrooms are devoted to alternative high school for students between the ages in of 16 and 19. Enrollment is 25.

•PACE: An acronym for Parent and Center Education, the program is designed for pregnant teen-agers and young mothers who are working on their high school educations. Enrollment is 15.

•FUNSHINE CHILD CARE CENTER: The classroom houses the infants and children of the young mothers. Average attendance is 12.

•JOB CLUB: Adults who have not been employed for a certain period of time are referred by the Department of Social Services to the program that teaches job-hunting skills. Over 50 percent of the 45 students enrolled in the class that just ended found jobs during the session.

**ADULT HIGH SCHOOL COMPLETION: Fifty** people on an average each week attend classes while working to complete their goal of a high school diploma.

SPICE: An acronym for Special Program in Child Education, the preschool classes for children who may have special education needs are conducted by the Clarkston school district. "It's not our program but it is in this building and their staff and our staff work cooperatively," Farmer said.

# Park to get

# nature center

### By Marilyn Trumper

Construction of a \$400,000 nature center for Independence Oaks County Park is expected to begin soon.

The Oakland County Parks and Recreation Department will pay half, while the rest will come from a \$200,000 matching grant from the federal government.

The project will open up the west end of the 830-acre, environmental-theme park on Sashabaw Road, said park Supervisor Ray Delasko.

"We're moving real fast on it because the specifics of the grant say the center must be completed by September of next year, and that's not much time," Delasko said.

"We've selected the site, done the perk tests and the planning department is working on the designs now."

The 4,000-square-foot nature center is to be built on the west side of Crooked Lake.

"Most of the park's development is on the east side, but the cross country trails are on the west side where the center will be. It looks out over a half-acre lake and an open field," Delasko said.

"It will be a good area for wildlife observation. We'll have feeders on the observation deck for deer. It will have a conference room, exhibit display area and audio-visual room for showing slides.

"This is what the park really needed," he added. "This will increase activity in our off-seasons, in the fall and spring when cross country skiing isn't going on."

The center will allow more programs and bring the public closer to the cross country ski trails, he added;


"Now the skiers have to park and walk back quite a ways to the trail area," Delasko said. "There will be a road leading back to the nature center and a lot (of space) where people can park."

The center's designed to complement existing nature interpretive programs, offer educational information to visitors and enhance the park's theme of preserving the environment. Plans include a warming area for cross country skiers.

Independence Oaks opened in 1978. Existing facilities include canoe and rowboat rentals, swimming beach, nature trails and picnic areas with covered shelters.


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# Clarkston wins, 22-20


'Sashabaw played a super game. They seemed to dominate the game," Craven said. "We came up with the big plays, they are what did it for us.'



The fourth quarter could have been the turning point in the game. Clarkston hit only 2 of 24 shots in the final quarter enabling the Cougars a chance to come back.


"We tried to give the game away," Bronson said. "You don't survive many games that way."


"That third quarter just killed us," Foster said. "The first half was back and forth. We held the lead for most of the first half."

In the middle of the Sashabaw defense, Tracy Roed of Clarkston Junior High puts up a shot. A

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


# Thrilling victory ends Clarkston's season

# Housing's up

The "first flicker of recovery in the economy in Southeast Michigan" is reflected in the increase in building permits issued during the first six months of 1983, according to SEMCOG (Southeastern Michigan Council of Governments).

SEMCOG's figures show Independence Township with building permits issued for 22 net units.

Midway through 1982 the township had issued five permits, in 1981 the figure was 27 and 31 were issued in 1980.

A similar construction pattern is reflected in Springfield Township. During the first half of 1983 there were 13 net permits, one was issued in 1982, seven in 1981 and 22 in 1980.

The Village of Clarkston issued zero permits the first six months of this year. Midway through 1982 the number was also zero, in 1981 four were issued and in 1980 there was one building permit.

SEMCOG's figures rank Independence Township 12th out of 59 Oakland County communities. Last year the township was 10th, in a three-way tie with the City of Novi and neighboring Brandon Township.

From first through 11th place are: Avon Township with 275, Novi 186, Farmington Hills 184, Pontiac 172, Troy 147, Waterford Township 106, White Lake Township 100, Bloomfield Township 68, Wixom 35, Commerce Township 32

### Nolta and Martin Brennan's gift of 60 acres to the Independence Township Land Conservancy a year ago, in exchange for approval of a private road for the proposed subdivision.

At the Oct. 18 board meeting, Karlstrom made a plea for a tax split.

The request was denied because the conservancy property does not have frontage on a private road as required in the ordinance.

The 60-acre parcel does have an easement for access, but conservancy people don't want road frontage because it lacks funding to pay for grading, snowplowing or future special assessments, according to Karlstrom.

In addition, the development has yet to receive a variance from the zoning board for five nonconforming lots.

# Developer claims 'run around'

Assessor David Sherrill removed the 60-acres from the tax roll because it was deeded to the conservancy.

"The big problem came when the ZBA required the 60 acres be deeded to the conservancy without granting the variance. They required him to create a parcel without road frontage," Sherrill said.

Board members couldn't agree.

"I don't think we should amend the ordinance to meet a particular situation," said Trustee Dale Stuart. "We're acting precipitiously."

Treasurer Frederick Ritter disagreed.

"I think we should grant the splits," he said. "I look at it as a trade-off with large lots versus higher density and 60 acres that will never be developed.

"If we can't legally give them the splits,  $\overline{I}$  would recommend they sue us and we enter into a consent judgment."

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# Signs to warn

Larger signs warning motorists not to pass on the shoulder of M-15 north of the Dixie Highway intersection are going to be installed, according to police.

Oakland County Sheriff's Department Deputy Robert Wark patrols the township as a member of the traffic division.

After observing constant shoulder passing, issuing tickets for the illegal act and seeing resulting traffic accidents, Wark contacted the Oakland County Road Commission and asked what could be done.

His concerns were passed on to the State Highway Department, Wark said, and he received a letter from them stating larger signs will be posted.

"I understand that on M-15 from Dixie up through town is really saturated. It's a congested roadway," Wark said. "People feel they are keeping traffic flowing by passing on the shoulder. They're causing...accidents.'

Wark said he does not expect the signs to end the shoulder passing, but they should help.

The solution would be to widen M-15 to at least three lanes, he said, a matter of controversy for years because local governing bodies want to protect historic Main Street in the Village of Clarkston from being widened.

The problem is the road is designed for 30 years ago," Wark said. "Something should be done.'

given up time to work on this huge undertaking. They are observing, questioning, thinking, and


evaluating every aspect of our school. Clarkston High School provides a good educa-


tional experience for our community, but I am sure we can do better. The North Central evaluation will help us to recognize changes we might make.

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

# Rehab for injured CHS player

### **By Dan Vandenhemel**

Rosalie Bohl sits in her son's wheelchair and rarely stops smiling or giving encouragement to Jim during his rehabilitation program.

"That's the way to go Jim! I'm so proud of you," she says as Jim was going through his workout.

"I know Jim is going to walk again," Mrs. Bohl says. "He's a fighter and that's his goal, to walk again. I'm so proud of him."

Jim, 16. entered the rehabilitation center in St. Joseph Mercy Hospital in Pontiac Oct. 25 following surgery Sept. 22 to remove a blood clot from his brain.

He was injured in a soccer game for Clarkston High School Sept. 22. He collided with a player from Brother Rice High School and was struck above the right ear. The other player was not injured.

Jim complained of a headache later that evening at home and said he felt dizzy. His parents took him to Crittenton Hospital in Rochester where he underwent emergency surgery to remove a blood clot.

The injury and the unconscious state he was infor almost one month caused the need for the rehabilitation.

Because he has suffered a head injury, there are added precautions.

During therapy last week, a request to be extra careful when taking photographs was given to avoid distracting Jim.

"You have to be more careful with a head injury. There are little things that happen," said Kim Goodson, a registered physical therapist working with Jim.

"If a person with a head injury is overstimulated, he could become withdrawn. I take Jim into a room to avoid any extra stimulation. He can work much better there."

Jim enters the physical therapy gym twice a day, • at 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. The first day with Goodson was Oct. 31.

An orderly helps the Clarkston High School junior into his wheelchair and takes him to the gym.

Dressed in a purple sweat suit and tennis shoes, Jim is greeted warmly by Goodson, his mother and Kathey Snooks, a hospital social worker.

"They let the patients dress the way they want instead of the hospital gowns," said Mrs. Bohl. "They tell them they're not sick; they just need to be strengthened."

"Basically we're teaching Jim to learn how to move again," Goodson said. "We start with the baby, or primitive, movements and progress from there."

To keep track of Jim's treatments, a journal is

with him most of the time. In it, doctors, the therapist, nurses and his parents can record what Jim does and what treatments and medication have been given.

"That journal is so important," Goodson said. "It helps keep the treatment consistent and it helps with his memory. We repeat things to him to help his memory to start working again."

Goodson said in most head injuries the shortterm memory is affected but added that every head injury is different.

"Jim can remember his locker combination, his school, friends. The only trouble he has is his shortterm memory," Mrs. Bohl said.

Currently, Jim is on medication to fight an infection and it's making him sleepy.

"Once the doctors take him off of that he'll be much more responsive to the therapy," Mrs. Bohl said. "Now he gets tired but is still very responsive to questions."

Part of Jim's rehabilitation treatment is to be tilted up so his legs can get used to holding his weight and to circulate blood back up toward the heart. The ball Goodson is holding helps Jim strengthen his arms and build muscle coordination. 22 Wed., Nov. 9, 1983 The Clarkston (Mich.) News



### **ARTICLE V GENERAL PROVISIONS**

Secion 5.13 GREENBELTS. Greenbelts, where required by this Ordinance, shall be constructed in accordance with the following minimum-standards:

J)

1. General. Wherever a greenbelt or planting strip is required by this Ordinance, it shall be planted within three (3) months and completed within six (6) months from the date of issuance of a Certificate of Occupancy, unless specific time requirements are stated in the approval of the site plan. Such greenbelt is intended to provide a screen to abutting properties. Suitable materials equal in characteristics to the plant materials listed with the spacing as required shall be provided based on the need for one (1) of the following purposes:

a. Total screening - Evergreen Trees with staggered row planting.

b. Semi-screening - Evergreen Shrubs and/or **Deciduous Shrubs.** 

c. Area planting - No specific requirements on plant type.

The requirements of this Ordinance are considered to be minimum requirements and nothing herein shall preclude the owner of property from providing more extensive landscaping.

2. Landscape Plan. Landscape materials shall be depicted in the site plan submitted in connection with a proposed use or development. The proposed landscaping  ${f y}$ shall not unreasonably interfere with the solar access of and/or by adjacent properties. An increase of on-center spacing or the restriction of tall growing evergreen trees may be proposed in the landscape plan to resolve future solar infringement problems.

3. Plant materials. The following plant and landscape materials are approved for usage, subject to complaince with applicable size and spacing requirements:

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# Silk screen art on sale at church craft bazaar

Clarkston News Special Writer The geese on silk screen wall hangings by Steve

and Connie Stanford may look familiar. They come from the "Goose Crossing" sign designed by Steve for the service center drive north of the county court house.

"Someone called one of the board of commis-

sioners because they were worried about the several hundred geese that live around the county complex," he said.

As maintenance planner for the county facilities and operations division. Steve does architectural drawings and he was given the job.

The wall hangings, and their note paper, greeting cards, and pen-and-ink drawings are items Steve and

inks, Steve loads and unloads the frame and 10-month-old Sarah observes.



Connie will sell at "His Handiwork," an arts and crafts sale at the Church of the Resurrection on Friday and Saturday, Nov. 11 and 12, from 9:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m.

Silk screening has been Connie's hobby for two years.

"You must choose the image to be transferred wisely, because it's a long process and many reproductions are produced from that image," she said.

Several objects placed around the Stanfords' Drayton Plains home have served a purpose beyond decor—the black cat crouched in a corner, a vase of silk flowers, an antique car horn, all have been photographed and used as designs for silk screening.

Using the negative of a black-and-white photograph, Connie makes a reverse image which is transferred to a framed silk panel. Emulsion is applied and the image is transferred using a light process.

The emulsion hardens except over the image where it can be removed with water. creating a window for the paint to pass through.

Ink is squeegeed across the silk. allowing the color to filter through only onto the image.

"Each color is a separate step," Connie said. "Silk screening is meant for production in large quantities. The details are permanent and will always be fresh no matter how many images are made."

Connie also uses Steve's pen and ink drawings as subjects for silk screening.

Her silk screen wall hanging of Steve's goose won first place at the Oakland County Employes' Art Show this year, and Steve has taken first and second places in the show.


One of his pen-and-ink drawings won Best of Show for 1983 and he was given a one-man show at the Oakland County court house.




