Fleet buys Riverside

Paramed Inc., owners of Fleet and Suburban ambulance companies, bought Riverside Ambulance Friday afternoon for an undisclosed sum.

Riverside has serviced Independence and Springfield townships for at least nine years, and will continue to do so, keeping its base station in the basement of pediatrician James O'Neill's office on M-15, according to Floyd Miles Jr., an Independence Township resident and one of Paramed's three owners.

The sale makes Paramed the second largest ambulance company in the state rivaled only by Taylor Ambulance, and makes it the largest paramedic service in Michigan for Advanced Life Support, Miles said.

Before the sale Friday, Riverside fired its 40 employes and eliminated the payroll. After the sale Paramend rehired 12 paramedics, Miles said.

"We had 40 applications in here, and had an extensive screening process, our standards are pretty high, and we took the people most qualified for the job. We hired 12," he said, adding it was the amount needed to cost-effectively operate this quadrant of the county.

"This should fantastically increase the amount of service to people in the community, and lower the cost of running the system," Miles said. "Before this we had to move our cars all over to provide service at times when Riverside might not have been busy. Now we'll be covering everything."

Before the sale, Fleet covered the Rochester area westward, Suburban covered the southeast sector of the county and Riverside covered northwest, he said. "Now we're all over the county, covering everything except for Holly and Rose townships, South Lyon and Addison," Miles said.



In a 6-1 vote Feb. 7, the township board concurred with the Safety Path Committee's last three recommendations to build connecting links and approved Phase III construction.

But there's only enough funding to finance the first recommendation: the south side of Maybee Road to Winell Street, crossing Maybee to the north side to Chestnut Hill Subdivision, at a projected cost of \$75,000.

In addition, because there's not enough money to finance the full route, just 300 feet of the proposed Waldon Road to Almond Lane site will have a new safety path connecting to the existing sidewalks.

The subdivision developer is expected to continue the path in front of the new homes, according to Joseph Figa, committee chairman.



Because there's no funding, the third proposal, Sashabaw Road from Clarkston Road north to Independence Oaks County Park, has been put on the back burner.

The township has approximately \$112,000 to finance Phase III, not including engineering costs, according to Figa.

Trustee Larence Kozma disliked safety path crossings mid-street and was the lone dissenter, arguing against it for safety reasons.

He reminded the board of McDonald's restaurant statistics two years ago that showed a high number of cars daily drive Sashabaw Road near Maybee.

"You're going to have crossings no matter where you build," Figa said. "There's no way to avoid them. We put the paths where we have the least number of properties, where they'll serve the most people. Maybee will serve the most people."

Clerk Richard Holman and William Vandermark favored the Maybee Road path for the same reason.

"I'm in favor of it simply because it serves more people," Vandermark said.

After the meeting, Figa said he's pleased with progress.

"But we need more support, and the committee really needs more members," he said. With a 16-vote margin in 1979 residents approv-

With a 16-vote margin in 1979 residents approved .3 mill to finance part of a proposed 50-mile safety path network. The millage is expected to total \$1 million at the end of its 10-year collection.

Teen faces 2 manslaughter charges

A 17-year-old Independence Township girl faces two counts of manslaughter for a January traffic accident that took the lives of two Waterford Kettering High School teens.

Shirley Jo Lund of Cramlane Road, a senior at Clarkston High, was arraigned Friday in 51st District Court before Magistrate John McGrath

Lund stood mute to both charges and a plea of innocent was entered on her behalf. She's scheduled for a preliminary exam March 12 before Judge Kennth Hempstead.

Lund is free after posting a \$10,000 personal bond, according to a court spokesperson.

According to Waterford Township Police, Lund allegedly failed to stop her pickup truck at a light on M-59 and Cass Lake roads in Waterford Township and hit a car driven by Jeffrey Craig Lamson, 17.

Lamson and his passenger, John W. Wilson, 19 died from injuries sustained in the accident. According to police, Lund had been drinking.

Post office spends \$7,000 to thwart vandals

A 7-foot high metal fence-topped with an additional foot of barbed wire-now surrounds most of the Clarkston Post Office property.

The fence, that cost between \$6,000 and \$7,000, is an effort to thwart a severe vandalism problem, according to Postmaster William O. Kinsley.

One of the things that led to the fence was the rural mail carriers who use their own cars have had their windshields smashed while working in the building," he said.

The windshields are just the beginning of the andalism list in the 10 months Kinsley's been postmaster.

CB's and hubcaps have been stolen from employes' cars.

A fire was set in a 25-square-foot bed of wood chips behind the building.

Gasoline has been siphoned from mail jeeps.

Windows have been broken in the rear dock area. A leather jacket and other items were taken when

Kinsley's car was broken into. One Monday last November postal employes ar-

rived at work to find all the air let out of the tires of mail delivery vehicles.

While there are no suspects in the crimes, Kinsley has an idea who the vandals are.

Kids out there with nothing better to do," he said. "We feel it's not just one person, it's a lot of people and mainly because of the lack of security that we had-the easy access from the back of the building."

Times for vandalism frequently coincide with the end of the day for high school and junior high students-between 2:30 and 3 p.m.

Mail deliverers have also had trouble with students pelting vehicles with rocks near the high school.

Kinsley said he requested assistance from the high school and the police before the decision was made to pay for the fence.

Bids were taken for the project and it was awarded to the lowest bidder, he said.

Ultimately it does cost us a lot more in operating expenses for windshields that are smashed, batteries stolen and tires that are slashed," he said. "It also hurts people of the community because sometimes it results in late deliveries.

"It's my job as postmaster to secure the building, the equipment, the vehicles. The \$6,000 is a relatively low price when we're talking about (the possibility of) the building being burned down, all the vehicles ruined so they have to be replaced, the employes' vehicles being ruined...

'Our only hesitation about installing the fence was we didn't want to create an unfriendly atmosphere," he added.


The fence installation was completed last Tuesday, and two days later about 20 people called to complain about the fence, Kinsley said.

He's requested permission from postal authories for more parking spaces in the unfenced portion in front of the building and patrons may park inside the fence when the gate is open during business hours, he said.

The vandalism is not a new problem, according to Ken Shepard, who has worked four years in maintenance at the post office.

He adds to Kinsley's vandalism list dirt in gas tanks, stereos stolen from post office employes' cars, paint sprayed on the building, beer cans left in the three-sided vestibule and tire tracks from motorcyles and cars on the lawn.

"It's a good thing we do have the fence," he said.

\$48,768 in 1984 and \$51,349 in 1985. The cost-perdeputy includes all expenses, including supervision and equipment.

"I thought it would be greater, and I thought it would be a one-year contract, not two. I'm happy with two. When the county board of commissioners proposed the increase, it was not done in an adversary relationship. There was no Republican versus Democrat or county executive versus the sheriff. There was real concern to the townships and their budgetary restraints," he said.

Currently Independence supplements its \$292,248 police bill with \$59,000 in federal revenue sharing.

Springfield's police bill is approximately \$90,000, financed soley with their 1 mill.





One thing about Ronald Reagan: He has the uncanny ability to raise the blood pressure of America's liberals. He did it again when he recently restructured the Civil Rights Commission to better reflect his conservative point of view.

The same select constraints and

The cry from the left was shrill, for Reagan was firing a broadside on that most sacred of liberal sacred cows, affirmative action and tacial quotas. From the uproar, you'd think the President has repealed the Emancipation Proclamation, rather than taken steps to curb one of the most counter-productive and indefensible bits of public policy ever to appear on the landscape of American polities.

THE REAL IRONY is that Mr. Reagan's conservatism is more in harmony with the liberal viewpoint of 20 years ago, when Congress passed the Civil Rights Act. It is the liberals who are sounding dissonant chords.

The just rallying cry of civil rights proponents in those days was the creation of a "color blind" society; one in which a person's racial or ethnic background is a matter of no account. Amen.

That was the ideal. The realty is that we have gone on to create one of the most colorconscious—indeed, color obsessed—societies in history.

Public and private sector promotions and hirings have less and less to do with qualifications, and more and more to do with satisfying some specious formula for social justice. Government forms and college applications routinely require us to check off little boxes to indicate our racial background, for the purpose of...well, for the purpose of what?

What difference should it make to our government or a publicly-supported university whether you're white, black, hispanic, oriental or native American? My temptation (successfully resisted to date), has always been to neatly print alongside racial queries; "None of your damn business."

IT IS THIS obsession with race that permits to pass without challenge or rebuke Jesse Jackson's recent vow that, if he is nominated, he will select a woman as his vice-presidential running mate.

Mind you, it doesn't matter if there are better qualified men available. Mr. Jackson is saying he has already made up his mind to select a woman, simply because she's a woman. I would call that a "judgement or opinion formed beforehand or without knowledge or examination of the facts...a preconceived preference or idea, bias."

That's my dictionary's definition of "prejudice."

The irony is that Americal liberals have become the chief, practitioners of what they originally set out to destroy 20 years ago.

Proposed sales tax law unfait

A year or so ago the "sales tax on the difference" law was passed giving a break to new car buyers. The state legislature finally realized; thanks to the depressed auto economy, that it was wrong to pay a tax on

a car upon which you had already paid tax. Before the law, if you paid \$10,000, for a new car you were taxed \$400.

With the law, if you paid \$10,000 for a new car and were given \$3,000 in trade, you paid the sales tax only on the difference, \$280.

That's fine for new car dealers . . . and buyers of new cars, but now the wholesale buyers and used car dealers want the same break as their brethren. This, too, is right.

Out of committee and before the State


Senate is Bill 613, which would allow both type of dealers to tax the difference. However, would also put a cap of \$30 million on the amount taxpayers could save in buying cars.

Ritter solo on Republican bill

The 6th Congressional District stretches from Pontiac to Lansing and includes Waterford and Independence townships.

While none attended other meetings on the proposal, they remain concerned.

"I'm upset about it," said Jerry Harrison of Northview Drive. "I don't think we need a store there and that's all there is to it. Our street is out of the way and we don't need people knowing we're here and ripping us off.

"It's going to increase the traffic on our street-and then what are they going to do? Put another stoplight at M-15?

Helin contends it's because his plan is a good one.

"It's a good idea and the township knows it," he said. "I've encountered very little opposition there."

Helin, an Independence Township resident, says he'll go before the planning commission for site plan approval this month.

No date has been set.

tough to play well when you haven't played anybody tough since Brighton (Jan. 30). No one person played badly—we all took turns."







In the meantime, Clarkston is scheduled to race in the regional competition at Pine Knob Feb. 16. The state finals are set for Feb. 27.





Russel argued for approval that night.

To ensure there would be no conflict of interest I'm representing Mr. Campbell tonight," he said. "Perhaps in my effort to ensure no partiality, I've swung the pendulum too far. Dick Campbell is not the petitioner here-the owners are.'

Contacted after the meeting, Campbell said a two-week delay wouldn't hamper the purchase.





Townships given extra cops

Spreen institutes northeast quadrant A-Team

By Marilyn Trumper Responding to the townships' cries for more police, the Oakland County Sheriff's Department has assigned a sergeant and three deputies to extra duty in Independence and Springfield.

The move is independent of the shared deputy both townships agreed to hire in December.

Sheriff Johannes Spreen said he wants similar teams in the county's four quadrants, but until they're established the pilot Independence/Springfield team will work anywhere it's needed in the county.

Similar to their A-Team counterpart in Avon Township, the four-man team expects to zero in on crime prevention in the schools, talk to neighborhood watch programs and "proactively" patrol, according to its supervisor Sgt. Robert Smith.

Although Smith said the program is "...here to stay;" Springfield Township Supervisor Collin Walls warns against getting comfortable with it.

"It's not my understanding this is permanent. After all, one of those deputies is in the marine division. He'll be back out doing marine work when the weather breaks, like normal," Walls said.

Independence Township Supervisor James B. Smith likes the plan.

"I think it's a fine idea and hope it can be effective," he said. "But more directly we've had no official communication from the sheriff and Sgt. Smith, so it's hard to react to it as something we recognize is in place.

Defining proactive patrol, Sgt. Smith anticipates feeding department computers with the number of breaking and enterings in the townships, at what times and where. Finding patterns, they plan to saturate the area with cars to discourage would-be thieves.

"That's proactive as opposed to reactive. Doing something to prevent the crime," he said. "People hear the words 'crime prevention' and get the oldfashioned picture of a guy talking to a group of people about locks.

"That's part of it, but certainly not all of it. That's just scratching the surface.

It's better to prevent an arrest than to make one. Don't let the crime happen in the first place," he

A liaison officer in the schools could have prevented a much-publicized donnybrook last month between rival high schools at a fast-food restaurant in Troy, he said.

I'm not faulting the Troy police, but if an officer had been in the schools he would have picked up that that was happening. They could have put five or six cars in the area; made them real visible, and the whole thing never would have happened," Smith said. "That's proactive."

Smith cited the teen-ager repeatedly drag racing on a residential street. .

"A neighbor calls, but by the time we get out there the kid's gone. With this team we'll have someone who will have the time to maybe sit parked on that street and wait for him," he said. "And we'll have input into residential neighborhoods about what their problems are.'

The team is composed of non-contract deputies who work throughout Oakland County, in townships that do and don't specifically pay for police services, which gives Spreen the flexibility to assign them throughout the county, he said.

Springfield's Supervisor Walls said the answer to the township's crime problem doesn't lie with the police.

The answer to crime prevention lies with the people of this community," Walls said. "You could put a deputy in front of every home in this township, which is ridiculous, and still not tackle crime prevention. Nothing will happen with that until the people of the community decide to do something."





Board authorizes \$15,000 for sewer study

The Independence Township Board has agreed to pay up to \$15,000 for a sewer and water rate study by Bendzinski & Co. of Detroit.

The study will be the second one the firm has done for the township in less than a decade.

Trustee Larence Kozma wanted the work publicly bid and cast the lone "no" vote at the Feb. 7 meeting.

"I think it's bad procedure for us to take the recommendation of one person that they're the best. I'm sure there are other firms in the area that do the same thing—and letting bids would eliminate that," Kozma said. "Maybe they'll be the ones that we'll hire after all that, but I think it should be done.'

Clerk Richard Holman recommended the Detroit firm be hired to provide a formula for how much sewer millage needs to be levied in what years to meet the bond debt, and to develop a capital needs program.

In 1976 Bendzenski conducted a similar study, projecting the amount of tax to be levied based on earned interest from investments and the number of people projected to hook-up to the system. Growth wasn't as rapid as anticipated and interest rates ceilinged at 20 percent, spurring the new study, according to Treasurer Frederick Ritter.

The study has been projected for 230 man hours at \$65 an hour.

"I've called around and talked with different communities and, frankly, I want them," Holman said. "They're considered the best in the field in what they do.'

George Anderson, director of the department of public works, agreed. After the meeting he elaborated.

"Of the 15 to 20 communities I talked to, they say (Bendzinski's) outstanding." Anderson said he needs the formula.


'It would finally take all the politics out of setting the rates. We've been setting the rates by the ad valorem tax to meet the deficit, with a tax some years, and not others," he said. "Now we'd know exactly what we need.


Sewer and water rates are expected to increase in April, Anderson said.

A May deadline is set for the study's completion. The City of Detroit controls sewer rates, now \$35 a quarter. Water rates are \$4.50 per 7,500 gallons. about \$23 for the average homeowner per quarter.

For the past two years the township hasn't levied its ad valorem tax, using some of its \$1.2 million in excess sewer construction funds at the county to meet the sewer debt.

They were there from 5 p.m. to midnight filming for the about 31/2-minute "Good Afternoon, Detroit" segment.








And Hibler said he hopes to have township records on hand.


The new piece of equipment aids in information searches and, with a push of a button, makes copies for 15 cents.




Betty Mielke of Springfield Township puts the Independence Township Library's newest





DIVISION 1 GENERALLY

Sec. 7-201 Short Title. This Article shall be known and may be cited as the in dependence Township Ordinance to Provide a Complaint and Hearing Procedure for the Abatement of Violations in the Construction Maintenance and Use of Homes, Buildings and Structures and shall hereinafter be referred to as "this Article".

Sec: 7-202 Intent and Purpose. It is recognized that there are houses, buildings and other structures in the Township which, due to lack of care in construction, maintenance and/or use, or due to other causes, amount to hazards to the health, safety and welfare of the Township and its citizens. The Township Board deems it appropriate to provide a procedure under and pursuant to which reports of such houses, buildings and structures may be received and acted upon by the Township. It is the intent and purpose of this Article to establish and provide for the receipt of such reports by the Independence Township Building Department, for the in-vestigation of such reports by that Department, and, where appropriate, for the referral of such reports to the Township Board, or other appropriate persons or agencies, and for further consideration and action by the Township Board. Sec. 7-203 Codification.

The provisions of this Article shall be incorporated into the Independence Township Code of Ordinances.

Sec. 7-210 Expressly Defined Terms. For purposes of this Article, terms defined below shall

have the following meanings;

Building Department shall mean the Independence Township Building Department.

Clerk shall mean the Independence Township Clerk. Director shall mean the Director of the Independence

Township Building Department, and the designates of such Director. Owner shall mean owner, occupant and/or person in apparent control or possession of property :

Violation shall mean a condition of allouse, building or structure which does or is likely to endanger the public

health, safety and/or welfare for any one or more of the reasons set forth in paragraphs a through h of Section

Sec. 7-211 Terms Not Expressly Defined.

Terms not expressly defined, above, shall have the meanings customarily assigned to them.

DIVISION 3. REPORTS; COMPLAINTS; SHOW CAUSE Sec. 7-215 Reports and Records.

1. The Building Department shall receive the report of any person, including the report of the Director, alleging that any house, building or structure is in a condition which does or is likely to endanger the public health, safety and/or welfare for any one or more of the following reasons:

a. Structural damage, deterioration and/or other weakness.

b. Unsanitary conditions.

c. Inadequate or improper light, air, heating, electrical and/or plumbing facilities.

d. Inadequate egress for cases of emergency.

e. Abandonment and/or attractive nuisance.

f. Fire hazard.

g. Incomplete structure:

n. Other specific danger, or safety or health hazard, existing on the property.

2: The Director shall keep a record and file of such reports; and include with the file of each report the use-type of building or structure, e.g. residential, and the nature and extent of violation.

Sec. 7-216 Investigation and Notice..... 1. The Director shall investigate each report. The extent of investigation shall be determined in the discretion of the Director: In appropriate cases, reports shall be referred to the Oakland County Health Department, State, Health Department, Township Fire Department, and/or other

a reasonable basis for the Township Board to defer in forbear from, pursuit of action to abate the violation through circuit court proceedings or other lawful means. 2. The show cause resolution shall be delivered to the owner by regular mail, or other method reasonably calculated to provide notice to the owner, as determined by

the Township Board, and may, in adition, be delivered to any other person who either requests notice of further proceedings in the matter, or, as determined in the discretion of the Director, has an interest in or can contribute relevant. information for, the Township Board deliberations.

3. The show cause hearing before the Township Board which shall be at a regular or special meeting of the Board and which may be adjourned from time to time, shall in clude the opportunity of the owner or his representative be heard relative to the allegation of violation.

4. The show cause hearing may further include, as determined by the Township Board, the opportunity of other interested persons, or other persons having relevant information, to be heard, and a presentation by the Direct tor.

5. At the conclusion of the hearing, the Township Board shall make a disposition, which may include the

tollowing a A determination that no violation exists, and that proceedings should be terminated.

b. A determination that one or more violations exist and to do one or a combination of the following:

(1) Provide the owner with a specified period of time within which to take corrective action, to be monitored by the Director.

(2) Resolve that court or other lawful action shall be taken seeking abatement of the violation forthwith.

(3) Take other lawful action found to be appropriate under the circumstances.

C. As a part of any determination which involves fur ther administration for monitoring by the Director, the Township Board may impose a reasonable administration fee payable by the owner, in an amount determined to be required to reimburse the Township for its reasonable ex penses in connection with the show cause proceeding and/or monitoring.

Sec. 7-222 Alternative Proceedings for Compliance

1. The Township may attempt to gain compliance b any lawful means. If the Director, Township Supervisor Township Board determine that no public interest shall be served and/or that proceedings under all or a portion of this Ordinance would not be likely to bring about abatement of an alleged violation, compliance with the procedures set forth in this Article shall not be required.

2. In such event, the Township Board may proceed in mediately, to conduct the show cause hearing, or the Township may immediately seek abatement of the violation by court action or other lawful means.



4. It shall be firmly attached to a permanent foundation with a minimum 42" fooling, constructed of materials required for single family dwellings pursuant to the township building code

5. It shall have no exposed wheels, towing mechanism, undercarriage or chassis.

6. All means of access fixed to the foundation of the dwelling, such as porches, ramps, and the like, shall be permanent in nature, with footings below the frost line.




