

Teacher fights with teen; is suspended

By Kathy Greenfield

A physical confrontation between a student and teacher at the Northwest Oakland Vocational Education Center resulted in a five-day suspension, with pay, for the teacher and a written reprimand in his file, according to Clarkston schools' Superintendent Milford Mason.

Mason would not release the name of the teacher or of the Holly High School student. The decision was made to protect the student and teacher's rights, he said, following consultation with the school district attorney

The 17-year-old Holly High School junior's mother, Pauline Kenner, said she was surprised at the decision not to release the names.

Her son, Kevin Papuga, had been out of school with severe headaches and a temperature since the Nov. 2 incident, she said six days later.

On Monday, Kevin was back in school. Results from a CAT scan had not been received.

"He's still having headaches, but he has to go back to school. They only allow him 10 days to miss," she said. "I'm very upset over this, but I don't know

More people than in the history of Independence Township elections yoted at the polls last week, with 80 percent, or 10,370 of the 12,888 registered voters casting ballots.

It was almost 2 a.m. before workers at Independence Township Hall made final tabulations in

an election that recorded GOP landslide victories and the unseating of two-term Treasurer Frederick Ritter, a Democrat.

"It was a phenomenal turnount," Clerk Richard Holman said. "And it was interesting to note that no Republican who ran lost in Independence Township. They may have lost district-wide, Levin beat Lousma

and Carr beat Ritter, but here at home they carried the day.'

Ritter lost to Republican John Lutz, an independent businessman.

Holman beat his challenger, Democrat Floyd (Whitey) Tower, almost two to one. Tower, a former Independence Township supervisor, lost his office in the 1980 election.

Three incumbent Republican trustees were reelected, William Vandermark, Daniel Travis and Dale Stuart. Newcomer Carol Balzarini, also a Republican, joined the ranks of township govern-

She's the first woman on the board since 1978.

"I'd like to think so," said Balzarini, when asked if a woman on the board would give it new dimension. "Each individual presents a different perspective. I think there are some plusses to having a woman on the board. If I had to put it into words I'd say it's a different point of view we offer.

The supervisor race was decided in the August primary when three Republicans, Fire Chief Frank Ronk, incumbent James B. Smith and George Vitinaros battled at the polls.

Ronk won, and last week had 6,959 supporters vote in his favor, although he had no opposition on the

For the sixth time since 1976 township voters defeated a proposed .5 mill for police.

In the township's non-partisan race for 52nd District judge, 16-year veteran of the bench Gerald E. McNally beat his challenger, Larence Kôzma, an eight-year member of the Oakland County Prosecutor's Office.

Independence Township's Tom Ritter lost a heated race to Democrat incumbent Bob Carr for the U.S. Congress. The morning after the election ballotcounting was so close that Associated Press reported Ritter's victory, and later retracted if.

In the presidential race, local voters followed national trends and re-elected President Ronald Reagan to his second four-year term.

"But we know what we'll do differently 18 months from now. I have no regrets. We ran a good, stiff campaign that got very personal at times.

According to Ritter, campaign workers didn't underestimate Pontiac's Democratic stronghold.

"We got 36- to 38-percent of the vote there, just as we predicted," Ritter said. "But they had 3,800 more turnout than in '82, and that's what did it.

"We'll be ready next time."

Carr elected to second term

By Marilyn Trumper Tom Ritter's 13-month battle to unseat U.S. Congressman Bob Carr ended in defeat last week, capping one of this area's most heated races, one punctuated with mudslinging and charges of dirty

But Ritter, 41, says he'll be back in '86."

The former owner of Ritter's Farm Market in Independence Township couldn't hold onto President Ronald Reagan's Republican coattail sweep and lost to Democrat Carr, 94,673 to 106,530, in an up-anddown battle that still had supporters guessing in the early morning hours following the election.

In fact, so close was the race, Associated Press reported Ritter's victory when the candidates tied with 50 percent of the vote at 9:29 a.m. the next day after 259 of the district's 321 precincts reported.

An hour later, the wire service retracted its story blaming the mistake on a mathematical error.

Carr says the election's over.

I know someone will run against me in 1986, but I've got work to do in the interim," he said. "I was the only Democrat incumbent in the state to go up in percentages from the previous year.

Weeks before the election, national headlines reported Ritter's platform to implement a-tough system of enforcing child support payments, then admitting he was behind in child support payments to his first wife.





or Following the incident, a report was made at the Oakland County Sheriff's Department, she said, but no decision had been made whether to press charges.

*Kevin is on the Holly football team and the teacher formerly lived in Fenton. Apparently there is a fierce rivalry between Holly and Fenton high schools.

"This teacher is not his teacher," she said. "Every now and then they kibitz back and forth. My son came into school. He called my son over and they started talking about the game."

According to Mrs. Kenner, the discussion became heated after the teacher began shaking his finger in her son's face and touching his nose, which had been broken early in the football season and was tender.

After her son asked the teacher to stop touching his nose several times, Kevin took the teacher's hand and put it down, she said, and the teacher then pushed Kevin against a locker and he fell, momentarily losing consciousness. The teacher then lifted him up by the neck, she said, and threw him into the hallway.

Mason's description of the incident was similar.

"It started in the hallway and went into the edge of the classroom," he said. "Apparently there had been some discussion that went on over several days over some matter, and I'm not sure what that was.

"It was just joking, and then got serious and got to the point where the student and teacher put hands on each other. The student then tried to get away, immediately did break loose and then went immediately to the office.

"We have no evidence in our hands of injury at this point," he added.

Administrators interviewed the student, his parents, the teacher and two witnesses before the penalty for the teacher was decided, Mason said.

"To me it's a serious penalty," he said. "This is the first time I've had to come to this resolvement in the nine years I've been (superintendent)."

She also said there were other such incidents on the teacher's record.

Vocational school Principal Dan Manthei confirmed that two other incidences have been noted in the teacher's file. One occurred in 1980, the other in 1983

"(The teacher) has never struck a student. He has, as is true in the most recent incident, probably grabbed students by the lapels and sat them down rather firmly," said Manthei.

"There's a lot more to this story than the accounts have told. We're dealing with one-tenth of I percent of what a teacher does," he added. "The intensity that (the teacher) shows at times is also reflected in the program involved and the placement of students."

At a time when there are fewer students enrolling in vocational classes, there's a waiting list for the class of the teacher involved because he's good, Manthei said. Students don't drop out of the class, and many are placed in jobs following completion of the course.

"I think this last incident has created a large enough impact on (the teacher) that it won't be repeated," he said.

Dixie work to start this spring





New supervisor weighs police tax dilemma

Chief Ronk says he won't dip into other township coffers to pay OCSD bill

Voters' sound defeat of proposed .5 mill for police is one of the first funding snarls the new Independence Township Board will tackle when it takes office Nov. 20:

But supervisor-to-be, now fire chief. Frank Ronk

says he won't rob Peter to pay Paul.

If dipping into revenue sharing, parks and recreation, the library or senior center will help the police fund but hurt those programs, Ronk says he'll vote to buy only what police the township can afford until the public comes through with a millage in-

"But first I think there are going to be changes when (Sheriff John) Nichols starts working with (county Chief Executive Daniel) Murphy. I'd like to see what's going to happen there first before we decide anything," he said, referring to the end of former Sheriff Johannes F. Spreen's stormy history with contracting townships.

Ronk speculates the millage failed, first, because the public never knew how the township would spend the money and, second, because it wants police funding to come from the township's \$681,238 general

fund surplus.

'In the past we've threatened the people by saying either give us this millage, or we're going to make cuts," Ronk said. "And we've always found the money from somewhere. I think that's what their message was this time. Find the money somewhere. else, which I'm not opposed to.

"But if other programs are going to be jeopardized, then I'm not in favor of it. Every program we have is too valuable to be robbed from.

Sgt. Robert Wark, a 10-year veferan of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department, says he's disgusted with the millage defeat and says Independence voters' consistent turn-down of a police tax increase forced him to move to neighboring Springfield Township, which according to him; has better police protection.

"Independence Township is so understaffed the officers only have time to write reports. They can't do investigative work," he said. "They can't do crime prevention. They're out there running their butts off."

When the township board hired a part-time deputy to work the last four months of the year, officials agreed he'd be laid-off-if the millage failed.

"Now we're going to lose the additional officers and we'll have only one officer on afternoons," Wark said. There's no way one officer can handle all those calls in the township, especially one as big as Independence.

Wark criticizes the electorate.

'For the price of a 12-pack of beer and a carton of cigarettes, they could have had more police protection for a whole year." he said. "I don't understand it. The citizens of Independence Township are getting what they want.

Wark says he'd favor dipping into the general fund or eliminating services at the senior center, parks and recreation and the library, if that's what it takes

to get more police.

'It's nice to have a big library and a good senior citizens' program, but not while the rest of the citizens are being ripped-off," he said. "Somebody has got to step in and say we're suffering. And that should be the township board's responsibility."

In last week's general election, voters defeated a proposed .5 mill for police, 3,935 to 3,288. It was the sixth time since 1976 voters said "no" to an increase in taxes for police protection.

The .5 mill for 15 years would have generated an additional \$130,000-a-year the first year and cost the average taxpayer with an \$80,000 home \$20 more a year, (One mill is \$1 for each \$1,000 of assessed property valuation.)

Currently the township levies 1 mill for police, which generates \$261,000 to pay its \$350,000 bill. That buys seven deputies, the seventh working only four of the 12 months, their cars, uniforms, equipment and salaries.

The \$131,000 difference is made up from the Village of Clarkston's police contracting fee, \$24,000 in federal revenue sharing and earned interest on investments.

Voting pride

Independence Township voters have reason or pride.

With an 80-percent voter turnout on election day, Nov. 6, they topped their surrounding communities and the state and county averages.

To our south, 65 percent of Waterford's registered voters cast ballots. To our north, the figure was 58 percent for Brandon and 70 percent for Oxford. To the east, Lake Orion tallied 68 percent; and to the west, Springfield's voter turnout was 68 percent.

The Oakland County average was 67 percent, the state 65 percent.

We gave our vote of confidence to President Ronald Reagan with 7,7560 votes to his challenger Walter Mondale's 2,268.

Some of our votes were overcome by other voters. We supported Republican Tom Ritter for United States Congress, but he lost in the 6th District to incumbent Democrat Bob Carr; we said "yes" to Proposal C, 4,703 to 3,991; but voters across Michigan defeated the tax-cut proposition.


We also defeated the local request for a .5-mill increase for police protection. Combined with the Proposal C support, we're sending a signal to our township government that we're looking for proof that tax increases are needed—and that we're serious about keeping taxes down.

Also working and watching the progress was Russ Inman, who designed the addition and led the lengthy process through the red tape of township approvals, building permits and inspections.

"I'm just thrilled to death," he said. "h, wish they'd done this 10 years ago."

The Players have put on shows at the former train station for about 25 years. During performances and practices, they've had to use outdoor, temporary portable toilets.

Sewick lists the fund raisers the Players conducted over the past eight or nine years: coffee and flag sales at parades, goat votes that resulted in a live goat presented to the "winner" of the drawings, sales of stationery and toilet paper, and the big auction in April that doubled the building fund and allowed the project to move forward.

"I think the community has always been good to us," she said.







It's made me a well-rounded journalist.


And that helped land the job in Mt. Pleasant. Four years ago editor Kathy Greenfield gambled and hired a college senior who needed to fill an internship requirement.

The job served as my internship, and my bread-


and-butter.

Reins pulled on rumors

Planning commission resents secret meeting charges

Virginia Walters, secretary of the nine-member Clarkston Village Planning Commission, resents a comment by developer Frank Walker alleging the commission met secretly to discuss his proposed \$2.2 million condominiums, then publicly denied his plan.

And she challenges his report that the commission "did nothing" in its second review of the plan.

Walker, who made the comments Oct. 30 before Othe village council, has since retracted his statements publicly before the planning commission.

"We didn't 'opt to do nothing' as was reported in the paper," Walters said. "We said we'd review it when we reviewed the zoning ordinance, and we will.

In fact, we've not so much as discussed the plan with other members when we met on the street. That would be illegal."

According to Walters, morale on the commission Cis low with one member resigning because of the workload, and she herself considering it.

'When it came out in the papers that we were

holding private meetings, it didn't help. It added fuel to the fire." she said.

Asked by the village council to review Walker's proposal a second time, from a Planned Unit Development (PUD) concept instead of a rezoning, the commission Nov. 5 voted to ask the more experienced Independence Township Planning Commission for help. The township commission, last summer, drafted its own 12-page PUD law.

'When Frank (Walker) came before us first, we recommended his project be approved." Walters said.
"It comes back to us again because the council

didn't want it and we said we'd review it when we reviewed the zoning ordinance. We didn't opt to do nothing as was reported in the paper. We were told by

planning commission to review Walker's proposal again, specifically addressing condominiums in an

Walters said. "We've been open to this review."





Family angered over trap

Yellow Labrador retriever injured in trap meant for coon; recovers in office of Independence veterinarian

Honey's eyes are sad, her left paw limp.

But the 3-year-old yellow Labrador retriever owned by David and Lorna Kithil is safe. She's awaiting treatment at the office of veterinarian Bruce Harlton after spending hours with her paw in the vise-like grip of a small animal trap near her home in the Lake Maria Woods subdivision west of Dixie Highway and north of Foster Road in Independence Township.

The next day, a conservation officer from the State Department of Natural Resources removes two more traps from the area. The officer tells the Kithils the trapper was probably after foxes or racoons.

While such trapping is legal, there are rules to be followed and, in this case, they weren't.

It's a common problem, according to a DNR spokesperson. In order to trap, a person must have a trapping license and work in an open area or have permission of the property owner. The traps must carry identification and trapping must be done in season.

The first trap was found the day before the muskrat, mink and racoon season opened. There was no identification.

The story of Honey's rescue from the trap began early the morning of Friday, Nov. 9.

"We heard her crying," said Lorna Kithil. "As David was shaving, he heard her and opened the door and called her and she didn't come.

At about 7:30 a.m., Kithil began her search. She could hear honey whimpering every once in a while. It sounded like her voice was coming from a swampy area on the lake's edge.

At about 9 a.m., Lorna's friend Barb Zabel joined the search. The women set out on the lake in a row boat, shouting out the dog's name.

'Honey wouldn't bark," said Kithil. "Finally we were quiet and she'd cry.'

Sounds echo in the marshy area, and they finally found Honey in the opposite direction of where they began hunting.

The rusty trap was in a wild raspberry thicket. It was attached to a tree with a piece of new wire.

The women couldn't release the trap, so they removed it from the tree and picked up Honey with the trap still clamped on her paw.

They put her in the boat and paddled to shore. From there, Honey was placed in a small trailer behind a tractor and pulled up the hill. They transferred her to the car and took her to the vet's.

"This thing is bad news, because everyone goes back there, said Label.

"My cat could have been killed in that thing," said Kithil, "Sure, my dog got hurt, but it was illegal. They have some things down there which might hurt

Veterinarian Harlton said he treats about two pets a year after they're caught in such traps.

"I'd say it's too common," he said. "If I see one a year, it's too common."

Usually the dog has to have its leg amputated, because it cannot survive with less than three toes and the pads that cushion walking.

'Honey, I think, is going to be very, very lucky," he said. "It looks at this point she's not going to lose her toe. That trap, it comes together like a guillotine, it just crushes... What usually happens is it will begin an irreversible process whereby the blood supply is lost to the extremity past where the trap is clamped on-in very simple terms, the foot dies.

"It's the first time a dog was trapped for any length of time where I didn't have to remove some

tissue or a whole leg," he said. "A leg amputation is a horrible thing for a vet to have to do, to remove all that healthy tissue just because of toes."

Harlton said he's opposed to such traps, even for

"It's not like someone taking a rifle and shooting a deer," he said. "A trap like this doesn't kill them, it traps them.



TURKEY OKLAHOMA

1/3 pound raw turkey dark meat, ground 1/3 pound ground pork fat Salt and pepper, to taste Poultry seasoning, to taste

34 cup heavy cream

Grind turkey meat_and pork fat with salt. Keep very cold. Mix egg and heavy cream; slowly add to meat until fully absorbed. Sprinkle with seasonings and spread 1/2-inch thick onto plastic wrap, to dimensions of about 8-by-10 inches.

Spread stuffing (recipe below) on top, jelly-roll fashion. Roll. Can be refrigerated and cooked

Roast at 375 degrees for about 45 minutes, until internal temperature reaches 155 degrees. Let rest 20 minutes before carving. Serve with sauce (recipe below). Makes six servings.






