Insurance .costs soar

Skyrocketing liquor liability insurance rates, up as much as 300 to 800 percent, are forcing some businesses to go without coverage.

The increases are due to a higher number of lawsuits and the low rates previously available, said

Last year, the American Legion post paid \$500 and had \$300,000 worth of liability. This year the coverage dropped to \$100,000 and the price tag was \$3,600.


Three Independence Township establishments contacted by The Clarkston News are in the midst trying to cope with the change.

The general membership of the American Legion Campbell-Richmond Post 63 voted to drop coverage, but other factors forced a change in the decision, said Treasurer Denny Warden.

Last year, the post located on M-15 paid \$500 and had \$300,000 worth of liability. This year the coverage dropped to \$100,000 and the price tag was \$3,600.

'It's almost too much for us to handle," Warden said. "We voted to drop it but if we don't keep it, the officers would be liable. We'd never be able to keep any officers.

So many places have been hit (by lawsuits) that the cost has gone out of sight. A lot of places have totally dropped their coverage." Chris Nicholas of Alexander's on Dixie Highway said they've called their insurance agent to find out what is going on. 'I'm up in the air," Nicholas said. "Some lawsuits could knock out a business. The money that people are asking for is something else. No place is worth that much. Some are taking chances by not having liability until they get hit." The Pine Knob Beer and Wine Shoppe on Maybee Road has dropped all liquor liability, at least for now. Part-owner Mike Bahri said last year they had \$1 million in coverage for about \$400. This time around, the cost was closer to \$2,000 and the coverage was probably less that \$500,000, he said.

Businesses face court action

The owners of two area bar/restaurants, the Clarkston Cafe and the Club Players of Waterford Township, have recently been on the receiving end of lawsuits stemming from the Michigan Dram Snop Act.

if the head-of-the-house spent all his money at his establishment.

"I don't believe the act to be fair or reasonable," Campbell said, calling the modern interpretation of the act a "perversion."

"I don't think that bar owners have any control over what they're being made liable for. The problem with the Dram Shop Act is you can't tell when somebody's intoxicated. You don't give them a questionnaire.'

"I'm not sure exactly how much, but probably just enough to keep us in the ball game," Bahri said. [Continued on Page 2]

Under the act, licensed bar and restaurant owners can be sued for selling liquor to visibly intoxicated patrons who are later hurt, or hurt someone else, in an accident, said attorney Richard Campbell.

Campbell, former attorney for Independence Township, is the sole stock owner of The Club Players.

Managed by his brother, Tom, the Club Players was sued by a widow and her two children for serving drinks to her husband who was subsequently killed in a car accident.

The suit resulted in an annuity settlement of an estimated \$5 million, Campbell said, adding that the money is to be paid in installments over the lifetime of the survivors.

Campbell said he is opposed to the years-old act, which he said stems from an English tradition in which a bar owner would buy a family groceries

Many variables, such as the partaking of liquor or drugs while driving, must also be considered, Campbell said. "Those are all things that happen.'

The owners of the Clarkston Cafe are being sued for selling liquor to a patron who subsequently was involved in a Brandon Township auto accident in which three teenagers were killed.

Leon McNew, a co-owner of the cafe, declined comment on the issue pending the outcome of the trial, which is currently in Oakland County Circuit Court.

The case is scheduled to go before the jury Wednesday, he said.

"It's very bad. We just can't afford it.

"Everybody is in the same boat. They're dropping their coverage down. We'll get it again, you can't go without it. You have to have something to survive. I can see if you make a mistake you should have to pay for it, but not go broke."

Only recently have the coverage costs gone up, Kammer said.

"It's a mess right now," he said. "Insurance companies have had to raise the prices of all the coverages to cover costs."

Kammer, a former tavern owner, said many bars are going without any coverage at all.

"They (bar owners) have it the most severe," he said. "People go there to drink. At a party store or restaurant, it isn't so bad."

Kammer mentioned the Dram Shop Act, a law that enables people to file lawsuits against tavern owners and holders of liquor licenses if someone served alcoholic beverages is later involved in an accident.

"Until they change the law, there'll be a problem," Kammer said. "We all want drunks off the roads but some of the liquor license holders are not responsible for accidents.

"The small neighborhood bars are going bare, they simply can't afford it."



Gas and liquor sales issue still unresolved

The controversy surrounding the sale of packaged beer and wine along with gasoline at the Dandy Oil Station continues.

At the July 16 meeting of the Independence Township Board, members debated the issue with Dandy architect David Donnellon.

The board contends that Dandy owner, Dan Huffman, told the planning commission last year he had no intention of selling liquor.

Donnellon, who attended the commission meetings, says Huffman is doing what the law allows.

Gasoline and packaged liquor sales were permitted under a state law, providing separate records were maintained, when Huffman received his SDM license on January 23.

That law was changed to deny such sales in February.

"I think this matter is kind of out of proportion to the reality of the situation," Donnellon told the board. "He's (Huffman) made a valiant effort to follow all the rules and regulations. I struggle to comprehend all your efforts."

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"This was something we had not anticipated." responded Trustee Carol Balzarini, who is also a member of the planning commission. "It was represented to us that this (the sale of liquor) would not occur. We felt it was a misrepresentation on the part of Mr. Huffman."

Balzarini, whose son was seriously injured in an alcohol-related auto accident July 4, went on to appeal the issue, obviously struggling to control her emotions.

"There are a great number of alcohol-related traffic accidents," she said. "Some I know of quite well. I personally don't want it in my township. It's the whole principle of the thing."

Trustee William Vandermark concurred with Balzarini.

"For all purposes you folks lied to the planning commission," he said. "You said you didn't intend to do that (sell liquor). The fact is you didn't tell the truth. I'm sorry, but I don't believe you."

Donnellon expressed sympathy for Balzarini's situation, but went on to say that the law was on the side of Dandy Oil.

"We are getting nowhere. I just think it's so redundant every meeting," said board member Mary Jane Chaustowich, adding that the discussions at three meetings had not "increased knowledge or changed opinions" of the parents.

Mason suggested that a presentation of factual information and discussion at a work-study session would help the board take a stance.

"I question whether or not anything we're going to do (will stop the complaints), unless we hire a teacher," he said.

"And we're not going to do that," Thomas said.

"Chris was a very active member in the Oakland County Chapter of the MTA and was very highly regarded as a township official," said Clerk Richard Holman. "We wanted to encourage him to remain active."

Rose served as Independence Township clerk for seven years before leaving to take a position as town manager in Littleton, N.H., in 1983.

He is now the village manager in Lake Orion where he is also a resident.

"It certainly is a surprise," Rose said. "I'm very honored they nominated me. I enjoyed working with the township."

Path authorized

New safety path construction is planned for Pine Knob Road.

On July 16, the Independence Township board approved construction of the 1,350-foot path connecting Bailey Lake Elementary School to Clarkston Road at an estimated cost of \$43,000.

The action follows a request by the parents of pupils who must walk along the road enroute to school from Pine Knob Subdivision 2 on Clarkston Road.

The board previously considered constructing the path in segments because of a lack of money.

They have decided, instead, to borrow the necessary money from the general fund and do the entire stretch, according to Clerk Richard Holman. The general fund is to be repaid from the safety path fund when taxes are collected in December.

In 1980, township voters approved one-half mill for 10 years for the construction of safety paths. Onehalf mill is 50 cents for each \$1,000 of assessed property valuation.

New safety paths are also scheduled for construction on Sashabaw Road near Waldon, when improvements are made at the intersection this year.

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



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

. Colleges give credits at NWOVEC

College credits are available for high school students who successfully complete programs at Clarkston's Northwest Oakland Vocational Education Center.

The credits from Oakland Community College and Ferris State College range from two to 26. They do not cost the student money, because the minimal test fees are paid by NWOVEC.

To be eligible for the majority of credits, students must pass written and/or performance tests. In all cases, the credit is granted upon successful completion of advanced courses at the participating college.

NWOVEC Principal Daniel Manthei provides two reasons why colleges allow credit for technical skills learned at high school vocational centers.

The first is "what didn't happen 18, 19, 20, 21 years ago—the declining birthrate," he said. "Colleges and universities are starting to experience declining enrollment."

The second involves competition for students by private technical and business schools.

"The colleges are interested in recruiting quality students who have demonstrated an interest and ability in a technical area, in contrast to someone walking in off the street," he said.

Manthei is also out to fight the sometimes negative image of high school vocational centers.

The schools are sometimes viewed as place to send students not succeeding in traditional high schools, according to Manthei.


"That isn't true," he said. "We want the public to know our students are receiving recognition and advanced placement as well as traditional academic students who go onto a college or university."

The most recent advanced placement agreement involves Ferris State College and a similar agreement began three years ago with Oakland Community College.


This year, a new agreement at OCC allows up to 26 credits for electronics students, and plans are under way to include credits for students in climate control, diesel mechanics and machine shop.


Also at OCC, commerical art students from NWOVEC can achieve up to nine hours of credit.

"We have the only vocationally approved commercial art program in Oakland County, here at the center," Manthei said. Ferris State's list of advanced placement possibilities includes up to 10 credits for auto service, drafting, machine trades or truck and bus mechanics; up to nine for auto body; up to eight for industrial mechanics or welding; and three for building construction technology, heating and air conditioning, masonry, printing or refrigeration.

In addition, up to 11 credits are available for Oakland County vocational education students who complete the dental assistant program.

Students generally use the credits toward a twoyear associate's degree, which requires about 62 college credits.

A serenity not easily explained, 'overcame the onlookers. For a brief few minutes, everyone present was acutely aware of just how grand life could be when lived on the up beat.


The spirit of friendship, caring and hope was overwhelming. No one was aware of racial differences, or the effects of mental retardation and crippling diseases.





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I think most 30-year-old parents are simply too young to know better; too far removed from their own mortality to worry about anything fatal happening to their children. Grandparents have been around long enough to know no one is safe; long enough to know life is unfair, otherwise there would be some way to transplant broken bones from a granddaughter to her grandfather.

My summer plans didn't call for much more than sitting around and reading a lot, and writing a little, and watching some baseball. But Michele's summer was going to be something special. She had her first job, in an ice cream store, and she was going to earn money to spend on cool clothes. She was going to complete driver's training and, on her 16th birthday in August, take legal. left wrist was badly broken when the car knocked her loose from her bike. She will be wearing a cast for many weeks, and won't be able to do all the great things she wants to do.

Village ponders lot improvements

A lack of parking spaces in the Village of Clarkston has become a problem with a potential solution.

In what could be a two-phase project, members of the village council agreed July 23 to investigate obtaining land in an alley behind the Clarkston Cafe and adjoining shops to improve and increase parking facilities. There are currently parking spots at the site, which has a steep incline.

The council appointed members Jon Gaskell and David Raup to investigate the feasibility of obtaining the land and to propose a financing package.


gests that as many as 59 parking spaces could be built at the site for an estimated \$57,040.


In a second phase of the proposed project, an additional 25 spaces could be installed at the site of Fire Station 1 on Church Street, if it is torn down as anticipated.

If the fire station is demolished, it is not yet known whether or not the township will sell the land, he said, adding he feels a similar \$1 deal would be in order.





Because of a computer mix-up, the final times of all participants were not available at press time.


Banks turned in a fast time for the course in two






Elizabeth Muhich concentrates on the road as she peddles her way through Springfield Township.


Even the farce of a people mover has good possibilities. Mayor Coleman Young's mass transit could be attractive but not very practical.



Dear Cat Paw:

My sister drinks every weekend and whenever she can during the week. What can I do to help her stop? Confused

Dear Confused:

Your sister's excessive drinking may indicate a potential problem. You can help her by giving her support and encouragement to change.

Ignoring her problem or simply expressing sympathy won't help. You can help by clearly stating your recognition of her problem, your concern and the availability of help.

Do not try to solve her problem yourself. Seek professional help in your community. They are listed in your phone book.

Are women drinkers different from men? Do they get drunk faster or the same?

Dear Lush:

Recent research indicates that women may become more intoxicated than men on the same amount of alcohol, even when body weights are the same.

One explanation for this is that a woman generally has less body fluid and more body fat than does a man of the same weight.

Since alcohol does not diffuse as rapidly into body fat, the concentration of alcohol in a woman's blood will be higher, even if she drinks the same amount as a man.

Also, it seems that a woman will often be more affected by alcohol right before the beginning of her menstrual cycle.



Cocaine addiction is defined by the same behavioral criteria that apply to alcohol and heroin abuse and all other forms of addiction.

•Loss of control-the inability to resist the compulsion to use cocaine. This occurs even when there is a strong desire to stop using the drug and the user is not able to resist.

•Continued use in spite of consequences—the inability or refusal to resist the compulsion to take cocaine despite damaged or lost relationships, threats of financial ruin, loss of one's job, threat of legal punishment, sickness, even the threat of death.

•High involvement with the drug-cocaine becomes the central and most important focus of the



addicted user's existence. It is his first priority, above everything including his own survival.

•Symbolic use-using cocaine, or giving it to someone else to use, can be the expression of an unspoken psychological dynamic operating between two or more people.

Hey, I been smokin' dope since sixth grade. I'm a senior now, and I feel my brain has hindered. There are times I wish I had not even started. What can I do to stop?

TOWNSHIP OF INDEPENDENCE SYNOPSIS OF ACTION TAKEN BY THE INDEPENDENCE TOWNSHIP BOARD

July 16, 1985 The meeting was called to order at 7:32 p.m. by Supervisor Ronk at the Independence Township Hall

First, you scrape

This is the year you've decided to paint the exterior of your old house.

How do you begin?

Most old house owners are do-it-yourselfers either by choice or necessity, and it is for them this advice is intended.

Lesson number one-patience!

No matter how great the temptation to get the job done, it is best not to rush out on a sunny weekend intending to paint the entire exterior, especially if there are areas of blistering, cracking or pealing paint.

While owners often blame such recurring problems on bad paint, careful examination usually reveals improper preparation or unresolved moisture problems.

It is usually best to deal with one problem, one area, one side of a building at a time. Many old house owners apply this valuable technique to all maintenance.

Such pruder ce and patience can prevent a job from becoming overwhelming.

Begin by checking some of these exterior sources of moisture problems:

1. Loose or missing roofing materials around chimneys and vent pipes.

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2. Loose or missing roofing materials.

3. Clogged or missing eaves troughs.

4. Downspout drainage which runs toward instead of away from the building.

5. Porches, stoops and patios which drain toward, instead of away from, the building. Ground level should also drain away. (In many old structures, the clapboard may stop as close as 1 inch to the ground. In such cases, the earth should be kept from touching the wood.)

6. Foundation shrubs and plantings which are dense and close to a builling may prevent ventilation and cause the wood to hold moisture.

If the moisture comes from the interior of the building-condensation from cooking, bathing, etc.-you will meed to check for proper ventilation and insulation.

In the last 10 years or so in the rush to make all houses energy efficient, many improper, unsuccessful methods have been used and some owners have compounded moisture problems, finding pealing paint a constant problem on the interior as well as the exterior.

Once the problem sources have been identified, you can begin to repair the damage.

With old structures, especially those which may be considered historic, it is always advisable to repair the original material rather than replace it.

As stated in past articles, it is the original which maintains its value. While replacement of badly damaged wood was once the only alternative, now

[Continued from Page 26] there are newy epoxy products available to repair rotted wood.

These are being used in national restoration projects and they show great promise.

The nationwide interest and activity in the field of restoration has spawned a revitalization and growth in the building materials industry.

It is difficult to peruse a building or home decorating magazine without seeing an article or an ad dealing with restoration products or methods.

A note of warning-not all products billed as such are actually preservation or restoration materials (those which would maintain the integrity and value of a historic structure.)

It is best to check with a preservation authority or a reputable preservation publication about a questionable product you are interested in using.

One of the great advantages of dealing with wooden buildings, as opposed to those constructed of masonry, is work may often be done piecemeal.

It is possible to repair or replace a single clapboard without disturbing an entire facade.

The same is true of many porch, window and doorway elements; and it is especially true of many purely decorative elements, such as brackets, finials and fretwork.

Missing wooden architectural elements may be reproduced at local millworks, purchased as a reproduction ready made through a number of sources, or purchased as reclaimed originals through architectural salvage companies.

A recent article in the National Trust's "Historic Presevation" provided a list of some companies.

Now that you've repaired the damaged wood and

taken steps to see that there will be no further damage, it's time to paint!

Well, almost.

First, you must decide how much of the old paint to remove, and how best to remove it.

The June 1976 issue of the Old House Journal has an excellent article which can help with these and all preparation decisions.

Briefly, if you must go beyond scraping and sanding a few areas, there are several methods which may be used alone or in combination to remove paint-heat, chemicals and mechanical abrasion among them.

Heat guns and plates are relatively inexpensive and cause minimal damage to wood clapboard and trim, but can present a fire hazard. Use with caution and proper safeguards.

Chemical strippers (except those with lye which leaves a residue posing a possible paint adhering problem) also leave clapboard and even the smallest, most intricate architectural details intact.

However, they are messy, hazardous, as they can burn skin and damage vegetation, and they are laborious to use.

Mechanical abrasion, whether done with water, sand or git, is the least desirable method, even though it may seem quickest and most thorough.

Abrasion, or "sandblasting" as it is commonly known, can obliterate architectural details and raise the grain and destroy the heartwood of clapboard, columns and pilasters leaving the building even more vulnerable to the elements.

Authoritative advice on restoration and preservation methods and materials and their sources may be obtained from many books in the Independence Township Library.

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

New finds at old digs More bone fragments unearthed

"I could go for a little fresh air," said Harold to Cervalces scotti. "Twelve thousand years is a long time to lie face down in one spot.'

It takes a stretch of the imagination to envision the two, a mastodon and a giant moose, respectively.

Both are extinct creatures and have been hibernating under Brandon Township soil for ages.

They surfaced in 1977, when two young boys tound a mastodon tusk and skull pieces near a freshly dug pond on the farm of K. Harold Shelton, located on Seymour Lake Road east of Sashabaw Road.

"They thought it may have been a cow horn," said Sandra Lash of the tusk find. Lash is a middle school science teacher at Roeper City and Country School in Birmingham. At the site, she assists supervisor Hezy Shoshani, a Ph.D. candidate from Wayne State University, Detroit.

With the cooperation of Shelton, researchers and students from Oakland Community College, Wayne State University and Cranbrook Institute of Science have been excavating the animals five weeks each summer for three years.

The work requires long hours of dedication and patience as the excavators labor seven days a week, all day, Lash said. They perform their tasks with shovels, brushes, toothpicks and small sticks.

Bone fragments of the animals have been found cattered over a wide area of the site and

been previously found in Michigan, although antlers and footbones have been discovered, she added.

Along with the animals' remains, the excavators have discovered arrowheads belonging to paleo-Indians of a yet to be determined era.

One of the arrowheads was found under a mastodon rib, which suggests it was older than the animal, according to Lash, who said, "We're getting very interesting material."

say they are puzzled.

The animals may have been the victims of scavengers, although there is no evidence of scratching on the bones. Lash said. They may also have rolled to their positions or have been washed there by the waves of a lake which covered the area eons ago.

The mastodon, nicknamed Harold by the students, was a teenager of about 15 when he died. Mastodons were similar to modern elephants, although they had more hair.

The natural life span of an elephant is approximately 70 years and was probably comparable for a mastodon, Lash said.

Harold most likely stood just over 5 feet tall at the shoulders.

Cervalces scotti, the giant 5-year-old moose, was larger than a modern moose.

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The discovery of his jaw and teeth, much of which are intact, is really the highlight of the find, Lash said.

No similar bones from this type of creature have
