CHS bans smoking

Student smoking has been banned at Clarkston High School.

Dr. Robert Burek, principal at CHS, presented a report at the board of education meeting Monday night on the decision to add the smoking ban to the student conduct code.

Burek cited three reasons for the decision: health, image and that it is easier to enforce a complete ban rather than a partial one.

Since the early 1970s, smoking by 18-year-olds has been allowed at the high school in a designated area, most recently an outdoor courtyard.

The result has been smoking by all ages and "a

2 lose by 1 vote

Think your one vote doesn't count?

Don't suggest that possibility to Timothy Warner or Tamara Ellsworth. They lost positions as Independence Township precinct delegates by a frustrating one vote each.

Yet, this year's primary experience has reinforced their beliefs in the American electoral system.

Warner, of precinct three, accepts his defeat good-naturedly.

"I think I did real well, considering the fact that Tom (Ritter) has a long-term name in this town. Some people who were supposed to vote for me got too busy," he says. "Actually, it was the absentee ballots that made the difference."

According to Warner, he was ahead in the race by five votes.

When Ritter received nine absentee votes to his three, the race went to Ritter.

"I used to practice what I preach. Now, I try to preach what I practice," he adds. "I'm going to start preaching how important their vote is. There's too few making the decisions for too many."

Ellsworth, of precinct five agrees wholeheartedly, saying that Americans are losing some rights because they fail to exercise one—the vote.

"With the critical times that we're in today, I certainly feel people should get out and vote," she says, adding somewhat forlornly, "I evidently should have done some campaigning."

Lucas wins here, too

Voters in Independence Township joined forces with the rest of Michigan in selecting William Lucas to be the Republican gubernatorial candidate last week.

Lucas, currently the Wayne County Executive, claimed 704 township votes in the Aug. 5 primary.

His votes put him ahead of three other Republican candidates. Dan Murphy received 506 votes; Dick Chrysler, 542 votes; and Colleen Engler, 84 votes.

Gov. James Blanchard received 409 Independence votes over Henry Wilson's 21 to win the Democratic primary in Independence.

Lucas, who switched to the Republican party last year, and Blanchard will compete for the governor's position in a general election in November.

While township voters kept pace with most other Oakland County voters in how they cast their ballots, there were some differences.

Countywide, Jessica Cooper received the most votes for a position as an Oakland County Circuit Court Judge.

She ranked fourth among Independence voters who cast 450 ballots for William E. Ziem, 437 for Joan E. Young, 421 for Lawrence Ternan, 298 for Cooper and 173 for Martin Krohner.

Ternan received the second highest number of votes across the county and he and Cooper will face off for the judge's position in November.

•Candidates for Michigan State House of Representatives: Democrat Greg Young, 296; and Republican Mar Dunaskiss, 1,439.

•Candidates for Oakland County Commissioner: Democrat Francine Rosenberg-Ballard, 297; and Republican Richard D. Kuhn, 1,389.

Springfield chooses Hines, Oaks—and Lucas

Out of a group of seven Republicans, Ruth Ann Hazen Hines and Charles Oaks emerged victorious in the Springfield Township Board race in the Aug. 5 primary.

No Democrats ran for the two board spots and Hines and Oaks will win in the November election unless a write-in candidate gets strong support.

In the primary, Hines gathered 249 votes and Oaks received 241 votes. They were followed by Gary Dovere, 143; Joe Gorka, 117; James Baner, 107; Marc Cooper, 101; and Dale Elkins, 71.

The new board members will serve two-year terms. The positions were added when Springfield went to a charter township government, which requires seven board members.

Two Parks Commission positions will also be filled in the November election. Republican Betty Hull received 391 votes in the primary, compared to 88 for Roger Bower and 79 for Linda Kolasz, both Democrats.

A 1-mill renewal for the fire department was also

approved by a 481-115 count.

The turnout for the primary was low. Of approximately 5,500 voters in the township, 864 came out.

"I assumed more people would turn out because of the local candidates," said township Supervisor Collin Walls. "It's so unique to have seven people running for two spots. I thought that would generate a little more interest."

Oaks, who owns a gas station in Davisburg, said any one of the candidates could have won.

"They were all fairly good candidates, the other five," he said. "I think any of us would have done a fairly good job."

"I'm not going to change the whole township," he said. "I'm still just one vote in seven."

"I didn't think I'd get the most votes," said Hines, who had been recording secretary for the township for eight years.

"My name's kind of well-known, I thought I had a chance," she said. "I know them (the board) all. I think we'll work well together."

Hull got more votes than any local individual, but she attributed that to the heavy competition for governor on the Republican side and the fact that voters cannot switch parties in the primary.

Springfield Township voted very similarly to the rest of the state, favoring Republican candidates.

For governor, William Lucas was the top vote-getter in the township, winning over Dick Chrysler by a slightly smaller margin than across the state.

Oakland County Executive Dan Murphy fared better in the township than statewide. He got 20 percent of the township vote, compared to 11 percent in the state.

Republican Hugh Brotherton received a lot of support in Springfield for his 17th District Senate bid. He got 41 percent of the township vote to 44 percent for Richard Fessler. Statewide, Fessler won a spot on the November ballot with twice as many votes as Brotherton.

Oakland County Circuit Judge candidate William Ziem was first in the township by a slight margin over Jessica Cooper. Cooper easily won in the county and Lawrence Ternan was runner-up.

In the 6th District Congressional race, Republican Jim Dunn easily carried the township, as he did the state. Republicans Mat Dunaskiss, for a 61st District House of Representatives seat, and Richard Kuhn, for a Oakland County Commission spot, also had similar victory margins in the township and the state.

Path on agenda

A public hearing regarding the wetlands ordinance for property near the proposed Clarkston Road safety path will be conducted by the Department of Natural Resources on Wednesday, Aug. 13.

The hearing is to begin at 7 p.m. in the Independence Township Hall annex on Main Street, Clarkston.

The township board has approved the construction of the safety path, which has been hotly contested by some residents and encouraged by others.

The public is welcome to attend and voice concerns or ask questions.

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Traffic concerns surface

DDA wins first OK; village people protest

Controversy continued as the Downtown Development Authority (DDA) for Independence Township received its first official OK last week.

At a special meeting Aug. 7, the township board voted 6-0 to approve the DDA in a first reading. A second reading, required by the township's charter status, is scheduled Aug. 26.

At the meeting, the proposed ordinance was hotly contested by residents of the Village of Clarkston.

Their comments came after the board had significantly amended the boundaries to appease residents of the township who complained at a July 15 public hearing.

In response to those complaints, the amended proposal eliminates residential property along Maybee near Dixie and along Deer Lake Road, and property at White Lake Road (commonly known as parcel 30) proposed for a Pontiac Osteopathic Hospital annex.

The board chose to keep a right-of-way portion of parcel 30 along Dixie within the DDA boundaries so sewers could be run along its length in the future.

Also included in the amendment was language that would mandate a vote of the township board and residents of the district before a permitted 2-mill tax increase could be levied.

As most recently proposed, the DDA would run from the southern-most boundary on Dixie to Deer Lake Road and not to Foster Road as previously planned.

As the meeting got under way, Clerk Richard Holman explained that in a DDA tax assessments are captured and returned to the district for improvements.

The amount returned is based on the difference between initial state equalized valuations of businesses, which are frozen, and subsequent valuations made after the values rise.

Of 15 people in attendance, several village residents, including council President Sharron Catallo, expressed concerns that the DDA would encourage more commercial development along Dixie and M-15 and create further traffic problems for the already-burdened village.

Village residents Ted Thomson and William Basinger suggested to the board that a DDA be con-

sidered for the business district of Sashabaw Road as an alternative.

Catallo supported their recommendation. "We're going to have another traffic problem all over again," she said, adding, "Strip malls. We're going to have strip malls as far as the eye can see."

Trustee Dale Stuart disagreed and said not much vacant property is left along Dixie.

Village resident Jennifer Radcliff responded to Stuart by saying that some developers would be willing to demolish existing structures for the creation of strip malls and echoed Catallo's concerns about traffic.

"We are bracketed and feel (the ramifications) of two major roads," she said, referring to traffic entering the village from White Lake Road and M-15. "It's going to drive the village to its knees."

In response, members of the board explained that the DDA is being proposed as a mechanism to bring improvements, especially water improvements, to Dixie Highway.

"We looked at the DDA as primarily a financing (method) for us," said Holman, who estimated that the district could realize an increase of \$500,000 in assessed valuations in 1987.

"Water, drainage and sewers were our primary concerns," said Supervisor Frank Ronk, adding that the board would like to implement the DDA in conjunction with upcoming improvements to M-15 and Dixie proposed by the Michigan Department of Transportation.

Voting to pass the ordinance during its first reading were Ronk, Holman, Treasurer John Lutz and trustees Carol Balzarini, Daniel Travis and Stuart. Trustee William Vandermark was absent.

Town mailboxes will return with new hue of blue

Clarkston's mail collection boxes will soon be shiny blue. But first, they'll disappear for a couple of days this week.

They disappeared for a day last week, too. They were quickly returned when Clarkston Postmaster William O. Kinsley II decided the boxes needed sand-blasting before repainting.

"They're about 20 years old, and with Dennis Kacy repainting his building and the village looking so nice, we wanted to repaint our boxes," Kinsley said.

"We want our boxes to be a pleasant part of the community, to be deserving to be in the community... to look good," he added.

Kinsley received about 10 telephone calls when the downtown Clarkston boxes disappeared last week, and he wants people to know why they'll be gone this week.

All eight boxes within the Clarkston mailing-address area will be pulled and painted at the same time—probably on Thursday. When they are returned within two days, the boxes will also sport new decals, Kinsley said.

The collection boxes are located at the following sites: three at the post office on M-15, two on Main Street in front of Kacy's building in the Village of Clarkston, one at the A & P grocery store at M-15 and Dixie Highway, one at the new courthouse on Lorac Drive off M-15 and one at Bavaria Apartments off Dixie Highway in Springfield Township.

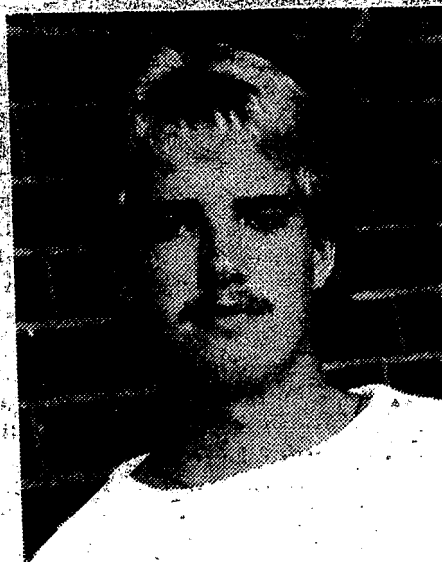

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Chrysler's campaign manager speaks out

The Dick Chrysler Campaign for Governor certainly received its share of attention in the media. As general chairman of the campaign, Tom Ritter of Independence Township was right in the middle of it.

"It was very challenging and very exciting," said Ritter. "It sure as h--- wasn't dull or boring."

Chrysler lost out in his bid for the Republican gubernatorial nomination to William Lucas in the Aug. 5 primary.

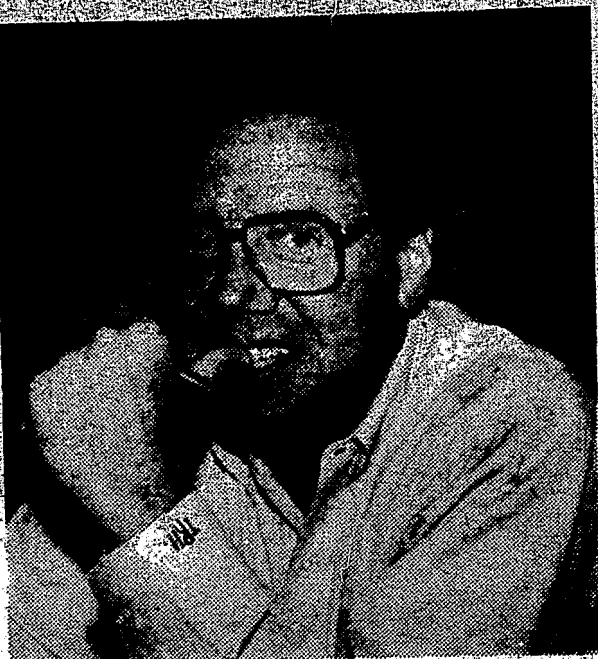
Ritter believes a Detroit News article accusing Chrysler of business improprieties days before the primary was the difference in the outcome.

"If we had not had to take a hit from the News, he would have been the nominee," said Ritter. "That was a mortal blow."

"I don't have any resentment whatsoever," he said. "But the News had the story several weeks before they ran it; number one, and number two, I think the story was geared to be printed four or five days before the election."

There was a difference of opinion among Chrysler advisers about how he should handle the story. He never did actually respond to it, said Ritter.

"I advised him to respond to it immediately and be forthright and positive and move on with the campaign," Ritter said. "He's always been of the opinion

that a response to a negative thing helps people to remember what the negative was."

Ritter, of course, is no stranger to political campaigns and he said that each one is different because of the personalities involved.

He worked on the Ford for President campaign in 1976, was co-chairman for the Headlee Amendment in 1978, was the statewide coordinator for volunteers for Reagan and Bush in 1980, worked full time for Richard Headlee's gubernatorial run in 1982 and ran himself for a congressional seat in '84.

For Chrysler, he was involved in the planning stages of his campaign as early as July 1985. During

the course of the year, he oversaw all major operations for Chrysler, such as the media, scheduling, finances and research.

"It's an opportunity to work with people of diverse backgrounds and skills," said Ritter, who is presently an assistant vice president of industry relations for Alexander Hamilton Life Insurance.

"It was very interesting and educational. Politics are nothing more than the act of dealing with people."

"I learned about people and how to work with them and deal with them," he said. "Of course, I've been doing that all my life. But when you get 40 people together to run a statewide election, you become emotionally involved. It's like a very large family."

Ritter has no immediate political plans, but the latest campaign reaffirmed some thoughts about politics.

"I often think of the definition of democracy as 'you don't have to agree, you just have to participate,'" he said. "For Americans, who live in a free society, it's almost a responsibility and a duty to be involved in the political process and I wish more people would be part of the process."

Two township roads to get improvements

Sections of two roads will be improved in Independence Township, probably in 1988, said Oakland County spokesperson, Dennis Pajot.

Bridge replacement on Andersonville Road at Van Norman Lake is projected to cost \$500,000.

Safety improvements on Sashabaw Road between Sally and Oak Hill Roads is estimated at \$249,000.

The preliminary engineering costs, including right of way access, are \$50,000 and \$49,000 respectively.

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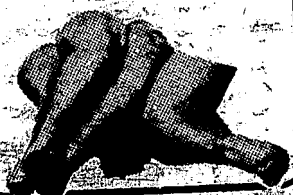
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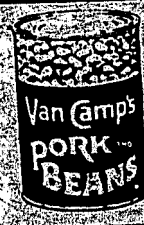
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Race is over; Oakland still has best man

Jim's Jottings

For the annual employee picnic this year, son Jim and son-in-law Bob offered to cook a pig. Bob had a little experience in college, Jim had none.

But, I've learned, if they offer to help, take it. The Finck's market butcher in Davison said to figure a pound a person and add 30. We expected 93 and Jim bought a 160 pound hog.

Then he contacted Robert Slack of Lapeer and rented "Porky's Little Hot House." That's a 275 gal. fuel oil tank, cut in half, hinged and a grill put in the middle. . . drip pan added, no additional cost.

The rig was mounted on a trailer with fold out sides for shelter and air flow.

"Put in 20 pounds of charcoal every 4 hours and it should be done in 12-14 hours. It'll cook at about 210 degrees," Slack said.

What about the flare up for dripping grease, I'd heard so much about? "Nothing to worry about the first 4 hours," he said, "nothing to worry about the second four hours." After that I didn't care. It would be the kids' concern.

We planned to eat at 4 p.m., which put the fire starting time at 1 or 2 a.m., right? Wrong! Seems you have to put the pig over the fire before it gets too warm after coming out of a 42 degree cooler.

That meant we had to put the beast on at 8 p.m. That also meant the pig was done at 9 a.m., and all we had to do was keep it hot for 7 more hours.

Well, I made the fire and the boys took care of the 11 p.m. and 3 a.m. charcoaling. I put the coal on at 7 a.m. without checking for doneness, then spent an hour trying to cool it down. The thermometer was going past 'pork, well done.'

Nobody, of course, wants pork that's not well done, so when served all was fine. No matter if it was rib, shoulder or hind quarter, all was the same delicious flavor.

Caterer Slack said he always serves his pork with barbecue sauce, and we did the same, which is all the more reason for a like-taste.

The carving was messy, what with all the fat, and the clean-up horrible, but the intended result was outstanding.

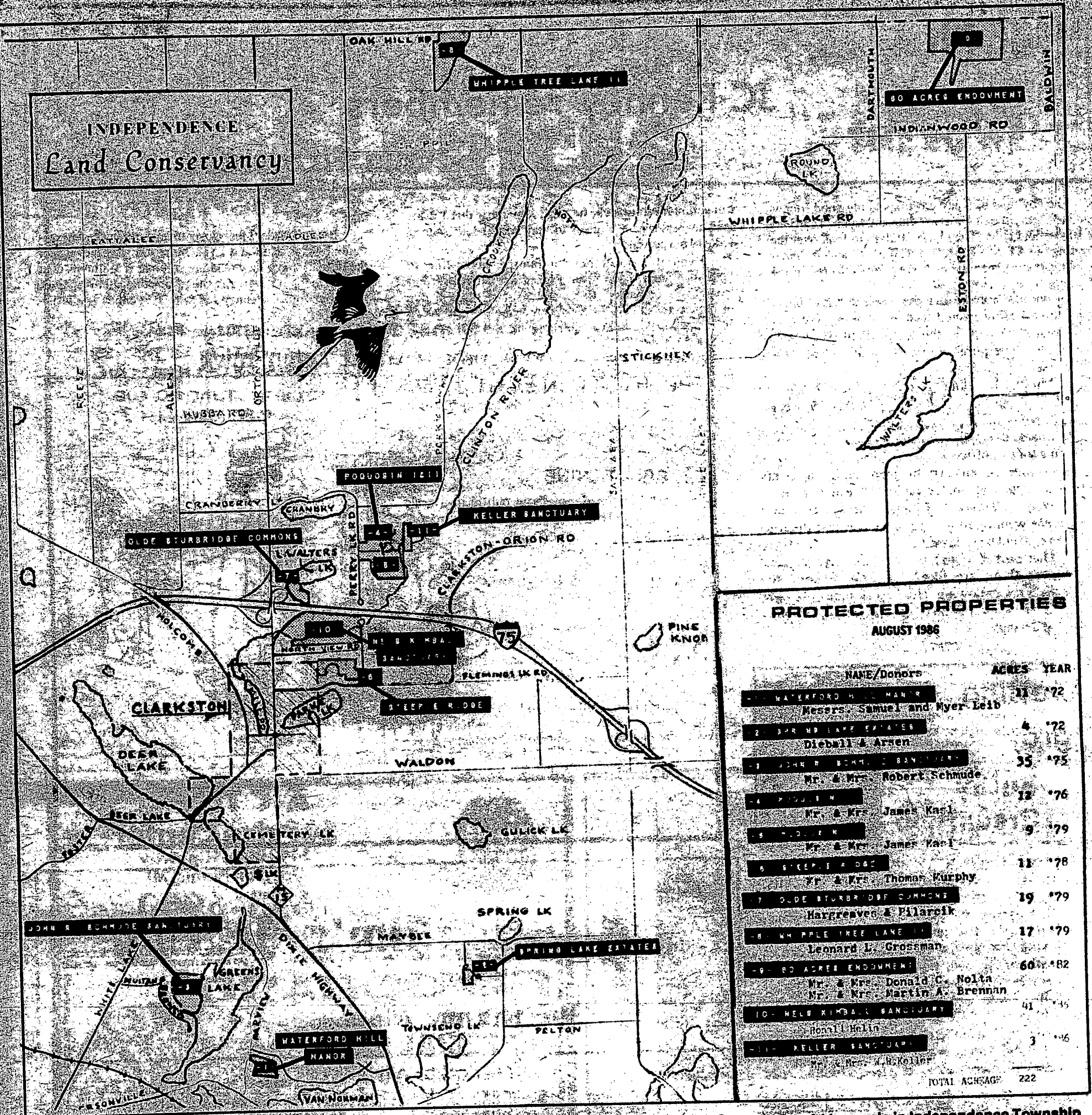
Hazel and I had a mild disagreement over whether the pig was skinned or not. Having been raised on a farm where pig scalding, scraping and butchering was practiced, I knew the pig had skin.

Having been raised on a farm and cooked tons of pork, Hazel knew the pig did not have skin.

When we decided to go for a pig roast instead of the usual hamburgers and hot dogs, one butcher said we'd be back to burgers and dogs next year.

Why 41 acres may be returned to developer

Independence Township can be proud of the map above. No other township in Michigan can boast of its own conservancy that has acquired 11 parcels of land, totaling 222 acres. The writer is not now active in the Conservancy, as I am now only a summer resident, but my successors have more than doubled our acreage since I retired. How was this possible? Some good developers, most of whom are our neighbors. The township board frequently referred developers to the Conservancy before any plans were

made—Bob Vandermark, township supervisor, in 1976 introduced Lucy Kasl to us. She wanted to develop 18 acres on Perry Lake Road and still preserve its natural beauty, and we showed her how it could be done with scenic easements. The development was named "Poquosin" (item 4 on map) and among her first customers were the Thomas Murphys. These newcomers liked Poquosin so much that they invested in 15 acres of wooded land on Perry Lake Road near the Clarkston-Orion Road and gave the Conservancy 11 acres of scenic easements. They named it "Steeple Ridge" (item 6). Last week, this paper reported how the township board was criticized for approving plans to develop

Steeple Ridge with 22 condominiums on the 4 acres remaining of the 15-acre site. The critic claimed that the use of PUD (an acronym for Planned Unit Development) "doubled the density" allowed. This is seriously incorrect. It is understood across America that if a residential developer dedicates any land as open space for nature areas, golf courses, etc., he is credited with that acreage when calculating the density allowed for his development. The original 15 acres of Steeple Ridge, zoned residential, allowed three homes per acre, a total of 45 units with adjustments. The board properly approved the plan to use one-half the original density for the

I hereby send birthday greetings to my good friends Pauline Cleminson of Grosse Pointe and Lynn Morrison of Bloomfield Hills. They have 30 days to look over the greetings — AT NO RISK TO THEM! — and are under no obligation to keep them. If they decide to return the greetings, it won't cost them a cent.

I wonder if Pauline and Lynn received a birthday letter from another good friend of mine — Fred A. Williams, president of JC Penney Life Insurance Co. If so, they'll surely understand why there is NO NEED TO SEND ANY MONEY!

Along with Pauline and Lynn, I am celebrating a birthday this week. And, for the fourth straight year, Fred A. Williams remembered to remind me that I'm old enough to die and should start worrying about how my loved ones will survive without my paycheck.

This August, I'm feeling guilty about Williams. As mentioned, he's now president of JC Penney Life Insurance. Last August, he was executive vice-president. He never forgets my birthday, but I didn't congratulate him on his promotion.

I wish I'd sent Williams a congratulations message sincerely expressing my hope that the president he replaced didn't die in office without enough insurance to provide for his widow and children.

It wouldn't be surprising if Williams didn't know if the old president were married. In his latest birthday letter (two copies received, 12 days apart), Williams said: "Mr. Fitzgerald, of course I don't know whether you're married or single, or whether or not you have children."

Several times in recent years I've told Williams I have a wife and three children. Last year I even received a letter from Williams acknowledging receipt of my marital status. But still, although he never forgets to remind me

I'm getting nearer death, he can't remember that I managed to persuade a woman to stay married to such a dodderly old person.

Even if I don't have a family, according to Williams' letter, I surely have other obligations, such as "merchants or banks" that could be paid off with life insurance after I die. Surely. There is a merchant named JC Penney to whom I owe a whopping sum at the end of almost every month.

Common courtesy, not to mention good business procedure, dictates that Williams should understand I couldn't possibly attain this incredible debit status without the enthusiastic help of my wife, the catalog queen of the world.

This year, Williams wanted to sell me a \$5,000 policy for \$23.95 a month. Last year, his offer was \$4,000 worth for \$19.70. Every year he says I should act immediately because on my birthday "you move up to a higher rate." But simple arithmetic reveals the only change is the amount of coverage offered; my rate per \$1,000 coverage would actually drop.

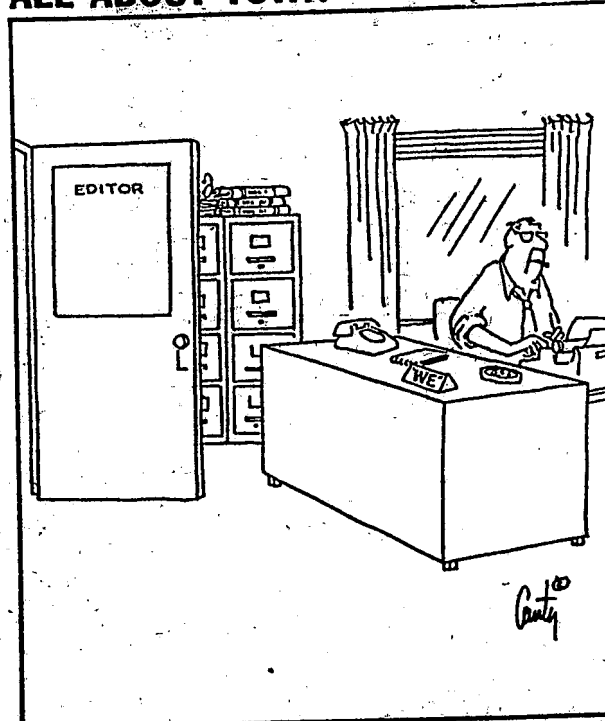
But, a year later, Williams still hasn't found time to pick up a phone and say my name and address to the human being in charge of computerized birthday greet-

I want more than 30 days at no risk to me.

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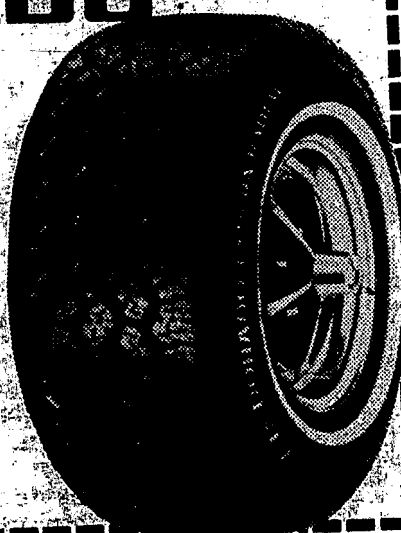

condo development.

The Conservancy's objective is to preserve our landscape by improving development. Passers-by on the Clarkston-Orion Road will have difficulty seeing Steeple Ridge, just as they have difficulty seeing Poquosin from Perry Lake.

This is the best proof that our township landscape has been preserved; that we can avoid looking like another suburb.

As reported on the same day, another good developer, Ron Helin, gave the Conservancy a parcel of land—a prize parcel: 41 acres of woodland protecting Clarkston from noise and dirt of I-75, from Perry Lake Road to the M-15 entrance ramp.

The Conservancy, with Ron Helin's approval, did me the honor of naming the woods the "Nels Kimball Sanctuary" (item 10).

Ron Helin naturally expected the township to cooperate with him in developing the remaining five acres as a shopping mall on M-15. In 1985, he received final site plan approval with variances approved by the zoning board of appeals (ZBA).

Subsequently, when working out rental plans, minor changes were required and further ZBA approval.

This time, the ZBA rejected his plans completely on the basis that a residential lot was being used for parking (even though the original plan had a similar condition).

I do not understand the ZBA's action, but if allowed to stand, the Conservancy's name is going to be mud to all developers. That is why the Conservancy is considering giving back the 41 acres, and I am in complete sympathy.

If the Conservancy does give it back, the neighborhood as well as the rest of Clarkston will lose far more than if that R1A lot were to be used for parking.

I strongly recommend a special meeting of the ZBA to reconsider its decision.

Addendum: The Conservancy hoped to include in last week's issue a remarkable story.

Lucy Kasl's development, Poquosin, adjoins the property of the W.R. Keller family. The latter so admired Poquosin that last month, they purchased three acres of Clinton River land that borders their property and Poquosin, and gave the three acres to the Conservancy (item 11).

It is the most costly gift ever received by the Conservancy from anyone not involved in development.

To the Kellers, thanks from all of us township residents, and to Lucy Kasl, now president of the Conservancy, we can say, "You can be very proud."

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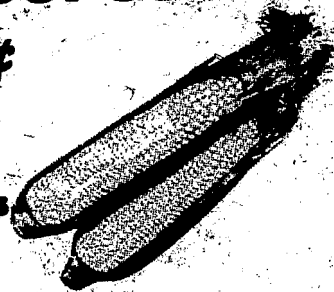
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Delegates capture county convention seats

Independence voters didn't turn out in droves for the Aug. 5 primary as anticipated, according to township Clerk Richard Holman.

Holman had expected as many as 30 percent of the township's registered voters to cast ballots in the primary, which had an unusually high number of precinct delegate candidates.

Instead, only an estimated 18 percent of the registered voters went to the polls, he said.

"All of this interest by the precinct delegates did not transfer to a high voter turnout," said Holman on Wednesday following the election. "I expected it to be in the 25- to 30-percent range. It was clearly a disappointing turnout."

Out of the 13,328 registered voters in the township, only 2,370 votes were cast.

Holman also said he has received some criticism because voters misunderstood the law regarding tabulation of delegate votes.

"There's been some confusion," he said, explaining that precincts tally their own votes, put the results into sealed envelopes and send them directly to the county to be officially counted.

Precinct delegate votes are not tabulated in the township as widely believed, he said.

Winners of the delegate primary will go to the Oakland County convention and from there representatives will be selected to attend the state convention and ultimately the national convention.

The official delegate votes as determined by the county follow. All are Republicans except Democrat Kenneth Schaffer, 4935 Clearview, who received 44 votes in precinct six. The winners' names, in boldface print, are listed first.

CHS track to be renovated

Track will be back at Clarkston High School.

On Monday night, the board of education approved spending up to \$121,212 on the track renovation. During the 1985-86 school year at CHS, no track meets were held due to its poor condition.

The cost includes a bid of \$105,402 from Athletic Track and Court Construction (ATCC) of Fenton, \$10,540 in engineering and planning fees and up to \$5,270 for possible cost overruns.

Superintendent Milford Mason presented three bids, which ranged from \$141,000 to the low bid of \$116,277 from ATCC.

Following discussions with the low bidder, cost reductions were deemed possible by having district employees perform some of the work and by eliminating a crack suppression process unnecessary because of the surface planned for the new track, he said.

Because the result was higher than the projected \$92,000 to \$95,000, Mason suggested three options to the board: rejection of all bids and the taking of new

bids next year; approval of half of the work this year and half next year; or the elimination of some of the work.

If the bid was approved, however, Mason said, "It will be done, it will be done right and you will have a first-class project."


Following brief discussion, the board voted 6-0 to approve the bid. Board member Carolyn Place was absent.

After the meeting, Mason said the bulk of the project is expected to be completed by Sept. 15.

The resurfaced track will be converted to metric and have eight lanes on the home side and six elsewhere. The project includes new long jump and pole vault runways and a high-jump pad.

The track runs around the outside of the CHS football field, which was renovated this summer at a cost of about \$126,000.

Work on the football field included stripping and improving the drainage system, installing an automatic watering system, crowning for proper drainage and planting sod.



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
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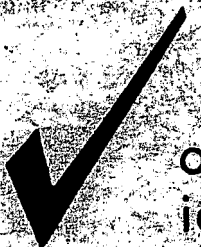
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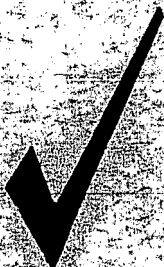
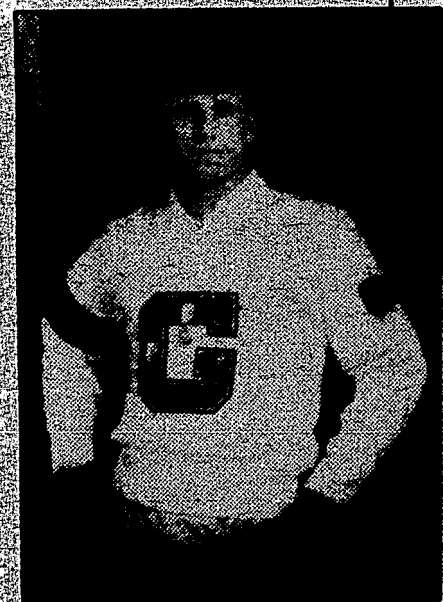
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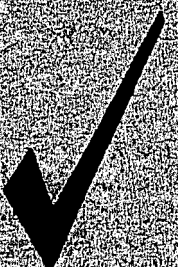
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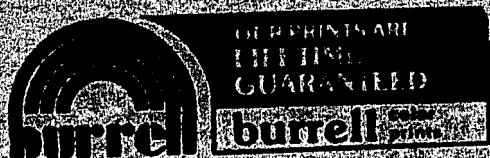
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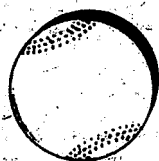

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Triathletes:

Local athletes made of iron

Imagine getting on a bike and riding for 112 miles.

Then imagine swimming across a lake for 2.4 miles.

Then picture yourself running a full-length marathon of 26 miles.

Put those three images back-to-back-to-back and you've just finished an Ironman triathlon. It's to be done in one day, not one month or one year, and preferably as fast as possible.

Scott Banks does this regularly. Why?

"It's addictive," he said.

But Banks doesn't want rehabilitation. He doesn't want to break his habit.

This spring Banks started a triathlon club out of the Kinetic Systems Bike-Shop in Clarkston. The club shares the "Flying Rhinos" nickname, which also refers to the bike racing club operating out of the shop.

The triathlon club has about 30 members of all ages, from 16 to 58, and has some top-caliber athletes.

Of course, not all of them are ready yet for the Ironman event. Some may just run the "sprint" competition: 15 miles on the bike, a half-mile swim and a three-mile run.

In an average-length race, Banks will ride 25 miles in an hour, swim a mile in about 20 minutes and run six miles in about 36 minutes. He'll run in about 14 events this year.

"It's a new thing to start a club," said Banks, 20, and a Clarkston High graduate.

"There's only two clubs in the state," he said. "In Michigan, there's some of the toughest competition in the country, because of the swimming background. There's a lot of good swimmers from Oakland County."

Swimming, of course, is just one-third of the battle. For bike racing, Banks and his colleagues rely on coach Jeff Noftz.

Noftz is a former triathlete who has coached cycling at the Olympic Training Centers in Colorado Springs, Colo., and Marquette. He and Banks hooked up a couple years ago.

The racers work out at the Sportsmen's Club race track in Independence Township once a week and can reach a speed of 30 miles per hour around the winding course.

"It's a tough sport," said Noftz of cycling. "It's scary as s---. There's a lot of physical contact. You've gotta like speed, danger and always being on your toes."

Banks displays a number of scrapes and bruises on his legs. He is not big, standing 5-10 and weighing 135 pounds. The triathlon is not a big man's sport.

"It's the muscle fiber that's important," Banks said. "It's how fast your muscles can rebound and recover."

"I look pretty helpless. People look at me and say, 'You're a triathlete? What's the deal?' Then I get out on the track and I get the last laugh."

To stay in shape, Banks goes through 14 different workouts in a week, including three hours a day on his bike, which he says isn't enough.

He stays away from red meat and eats a lot of rice and whole grains. Noftz is a stickler for his racers staying on their diets.

Banks and several other club triathletes have qualified for the national competition in Hilton Head, S.C., Sept. 28. The others are Craig Chappell and John and Pat Gdula. They will also enter men's and women's teams made up of three people doing one leg each. The women's team includes Banks' mother, Sally.

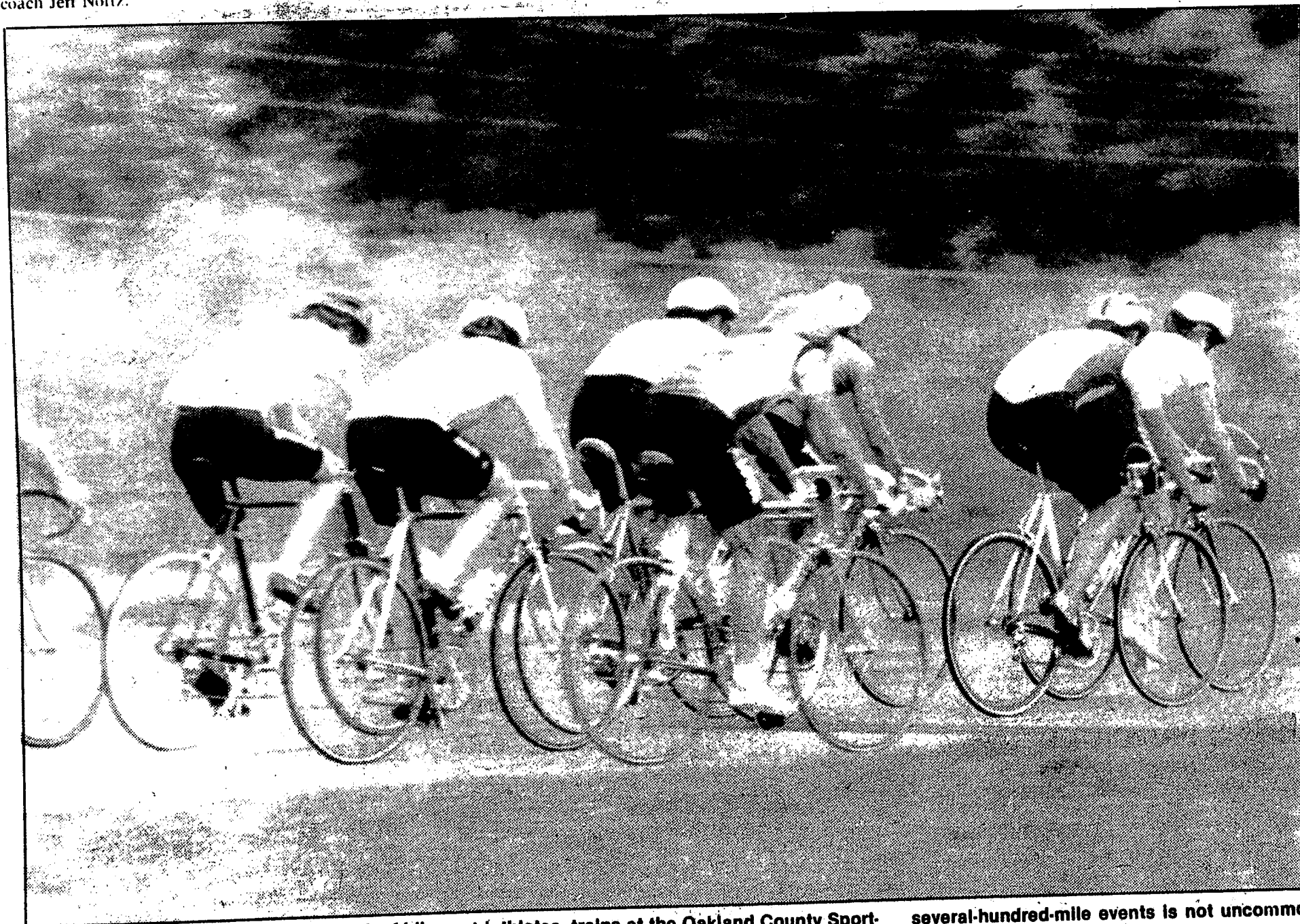
Next year, Banks hopes to turn pro. He gets plenty of help through the club he began.

"I think you have to train in a group like this to become a professional," he said. "I don't see how an individual could train by himself and become a professional."

They are available to any family with children in the Clarkston school system.

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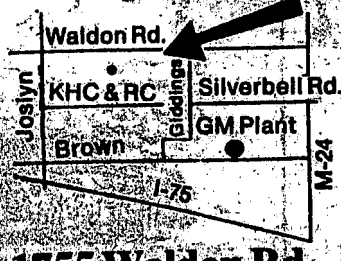
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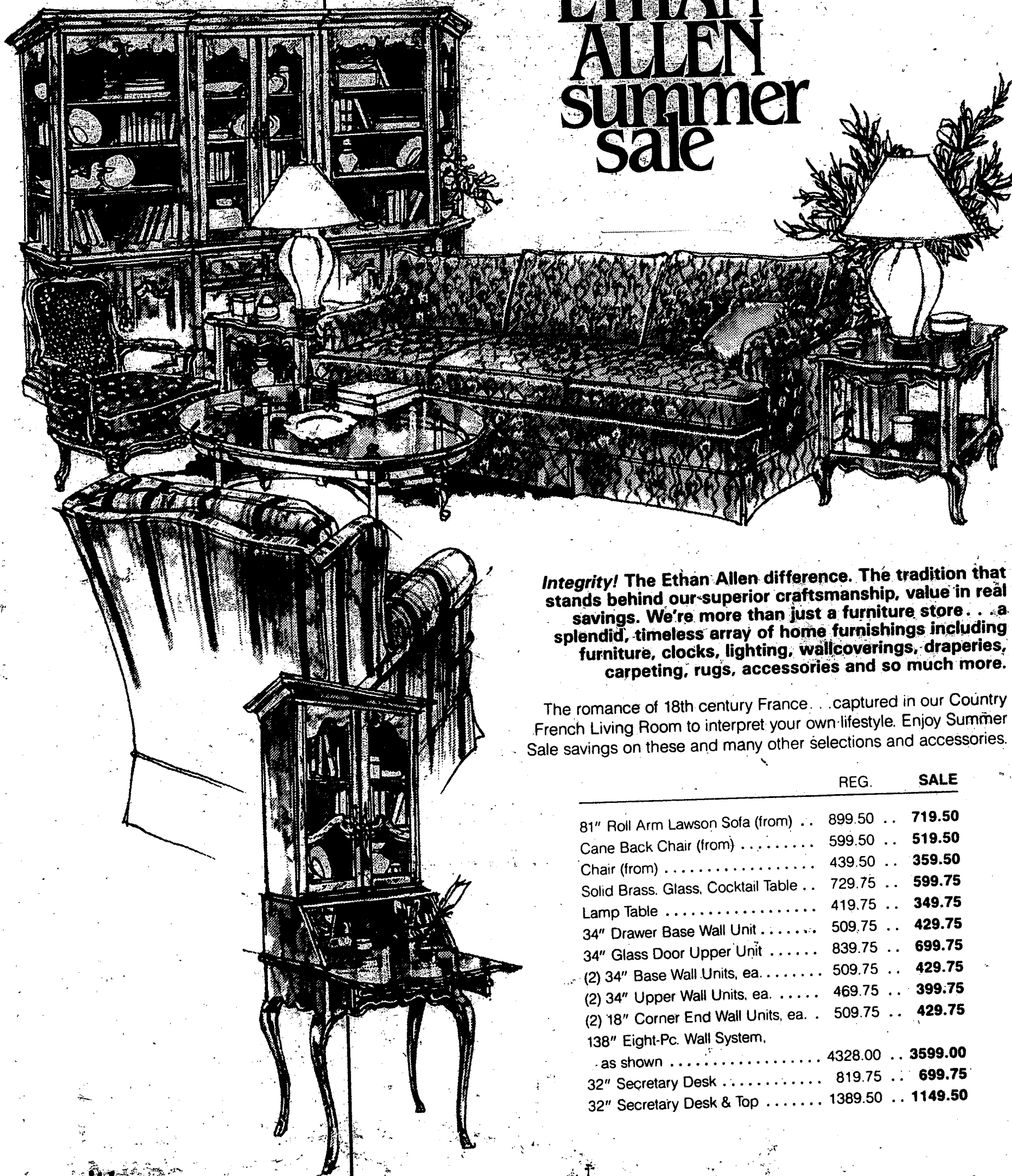


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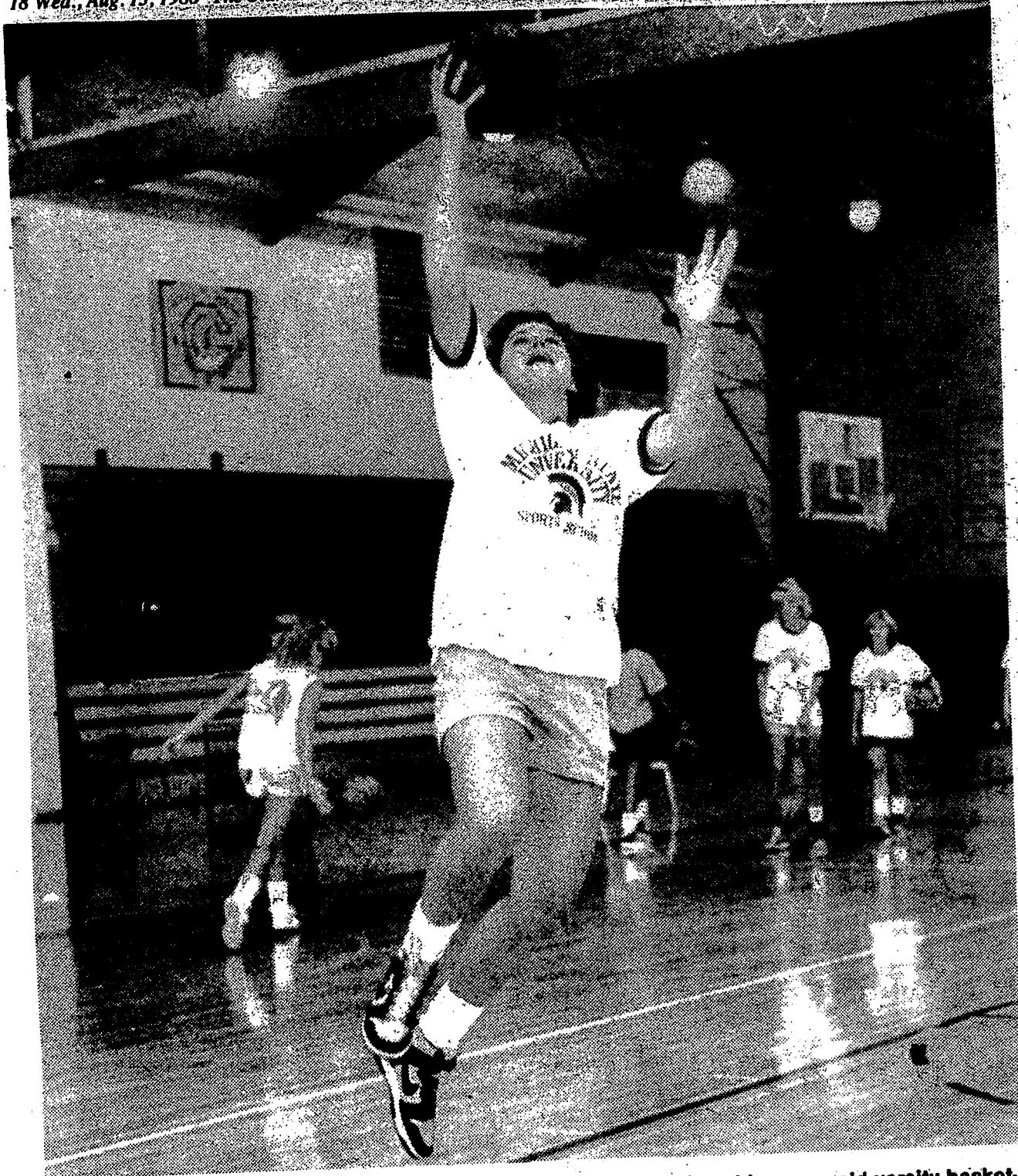

Coach cautious about Wolves as practices get under way

Varsity Coach Dave McDonald has a lot to look forward to this season. His Clarkston High School girls' basketball team has speed, and they can jump, he said.

And most importantly, they have a winning attitude.

During Monday's early morning practice, the seniors encouraged the other players with, "Make every shot count," and "Play hard, shoot like it's a game situation."

That's the attitude coaches love to see, said McDonald.

"We should be pretty fast," he said, noting that two of his players are some of the fastest in Oakland County, according to last spring's county track meet.

And they can jump. Lisa Ladd was among the best in the county in the long jump, he said, not to mention the leaps of already tall Missy Odell.

All of this seems to point to a good season, but McDonald is hesitant to predict it.

"We'll try to do better than .500 in the first part of the season. Those are non-league games. Then, hopefully, we'll be ready for the league games."

He plans to work on shooting, shooting and shooting with the team, he said. With Waterford Kettering as the prime league competition, they'll need to score to do better than last year's 13-7 season.

He's counting on veteran seniors Odell, Ladd, and Michèle Wyniemo, and junior Michelle Baker to lead the team.

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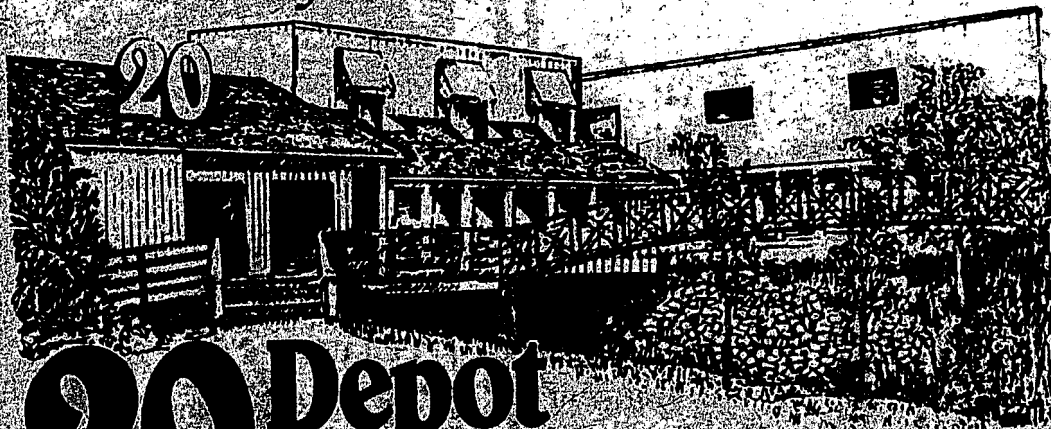

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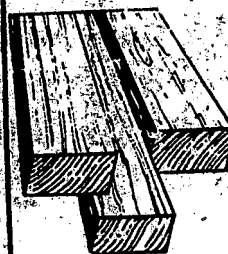


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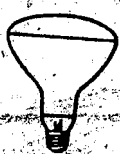
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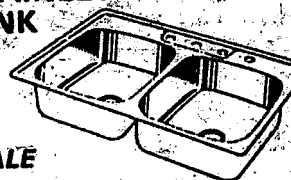


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New rule bans cigs at CHS

creeping smoking area" which "all of a sudden becomes smoking all over the place," he said.

Smoking will not be allowed by students in the building, on school property or at school-sponsored events.

Punishment for breaking the rule will follow the standard format of a three-day suspension for the first violation, five days for the second, 10 days for the third and possible suspension for the remainder of the semester for the fourth.

"We'll approach the students from an educational and philosophical posture. We want their support," Burek said. "We hope they understand; we hope they support, but be that as it may, that's going to be the posture we'll take."

Discussions with staff members and parents have indicated their support for the smoking ban, he added.

"You will have the support of the board," said Janet Thomas, school board president. "We realize it's a difficult thing to do. . . . We do think you have the support of the community."

Board member Dr. Stephen Werner, however, voiced some objections. Werner, a physician, stressed that he is against smoking and suggested that smoking by teachers be banned as well.

"It's like telling the kids, 'OK, you can't do it, but we can.' I'm not sure that's the right thing to do," he said.

"I'd rather they all learn that smoking is bad. Maybe this isn't the right way to approach it," he added.

Burek responded that he understood Werner's point of view, and discussion included that there are two teachers' lounges, one where smoking is allowed and one where smoking is not.

Educational plans include an anti-smoking campaign by the American Lung Association, he said, and a peer program that would involve the younger pupils in the district.

"When a senior talks to a sixth-grader, it has tremendous impact," he said.

The discussion ended with laughter following a confession, of sorts.

"I'm not very good in my own family—my wife smokes and I don't, so I haven't been very successful there," Burek said. "I can't suspend her."



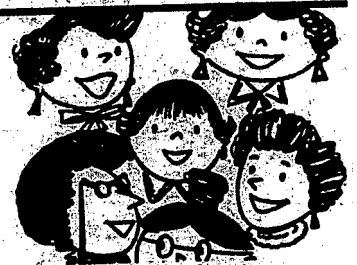

What will they recycle next?

Machinery uses original asphalt to resurface roads

This train, dubbed "Star Wars," chops up roads and puts them back down again.

And it's chugging along Independence Township and Clarkston roads at about 15 feet a minute as 5.6 miles of roadway undergo a cold in-place recycled asphalt process.

The method was used last week on the 1.8-mile stretch of Waldon Road between Main Street and Sashabaw Road. This week, 2.8 miles are being rebuilt and resurfaced on Clarkston Road between Clintonville and Flemings Lake roads, and next in line is a 1-mile stretch from Washington Street to Holcomb Street to White Lake Road, ending at Dixie Highway.

In addition to the repaving, all roads are being widened three feet on each side with the exception of Washington Street where curbs and gutters are part of the construction.

The local portion represents about 15 percent of a \$4 million, 40.6-mile project across Oakland County funded by the Oakland County Road Commission with a bond issue, according to Phil Hampton, owner of Hampton Engineering Associates of Pontiac.

The repaving process costs about \$100,000 a mile, which reflects a 40 percent savings over conventional methods, Hampton said. It is expected to last at least 10 years.

The equipment includes an oil tanker, a two-piece milling machine that chops up the road surface and adds necessary ingredients, and a paver that scoops up the road materials and puts it back down in

a flat surface. A roller follows, and a day or two later the surface is topped with asphalt.

The road recycling process goes back to the early 1970s, but recent technology has allowed the operation to take place using the train concept, said Hampton.

"This is the largest project ever let in Michigan for cold recycling of asphalt and, as far as we know, the largest let east of the Mississippi," he said.

In addition to being a cost-saver, the process allows one lane of traffic to remain open and the new surface, which hardens rapidly, can be driven over within one-half hour.

"We're very confident we'll see a great deal more of this throughout the state and the country," Hampton said.

The sharing of the "Star Wars" moniker comes from Bob Waldron, chief inspector for Hampton Engineering.

It came from the way the method looks. "If you could put them on the moon, you'd say, 'Look, here comes something!'" he said.

But his pleasure over the project also involves praise for the road commission for approving the project design and plans.

"I do all types of engineering, but I'm excited because it shows cost savings can be put into place by government. I'm a taxpayer, too," he said. "We're hoping this will help us get caught up in road improvements for northern Oakland County."

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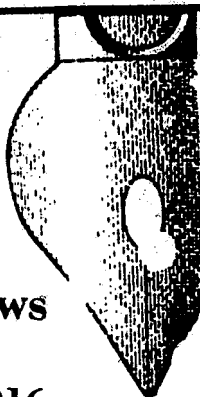
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Today, the mine is open again. The miners have gone back and reclaimed their jobs.

before the show on Sunday and he'll be up all Saturday night. But he said that a great-looking car is its own reward.

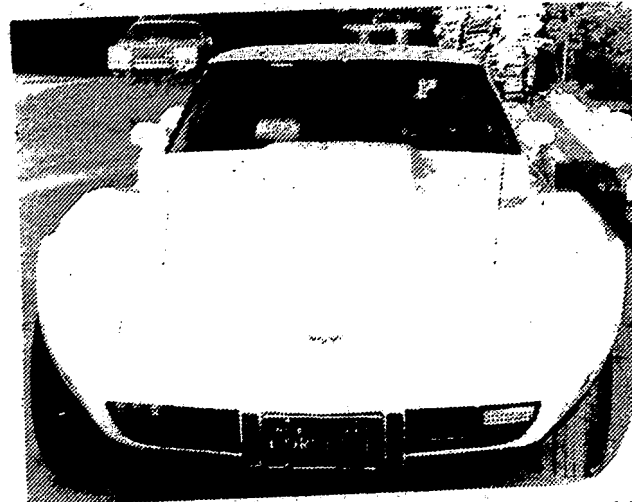
In the other classes, concourse prepared and racing prepared, the engines are also judged. Concourse prepared cars are not driven on the road, but are trailered in to be judged.

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International law is his aim

Seminar experience shapes teen's goals

Many students are preparing for the upcoming school year by buying clothes and school supplies and practicing sports or music. But Jon Midtgard is preparing for a longer term goal.

Like many other students, Midtgard likes bowling, baseball, basketball and skiing, and he likes going to movies and reading.

But he also likes reading the newspaper and a weekly news magazine. And his favorite book is the "Autobiography of Malcolm X."

Midtgard has a specific goal.

After attending a world affairs seminar in Whitewater, Wisc., the Clarkston High School senior has decided to study political science and then international law.

He was chosen by the Clarkston Rotary Club to go to the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater at the recommendation of CHS social studies teachers. During his week there, he attended lectures and discussed world affairs with students and political leaders from all over the world.

"It was quite an opportunity . . ." said Midtgard. "Hopefully, there will be more like it in college. It made me decide what to do."

He had always enjoyed world history and social studies classes, he said, but this experience helped him make up his mind.

"I realized that what I know is just the beginning," he said. "It's just an outline."

Although they covered many topics, the talk on nuclear disarmament and the arms race was his favorite, he said. Representatives from the Reagan administration talked about "star wars" and the uses and effects.

"Some kids asked them questions, and they got rattled. And when they did answer, they went around

the issue," he said.

"It's fun being with teenagers and doing these things. . . . Teenagers are sarcastic, and when you get knowledge and sarcasm together, it's pretty good."

The week also helped Midtgard sharpen his own political beliefs. Some of the things he would like to change:

"I'd like to get the Reagan administration out of office, whether it's Bush, Reagan or whoever. . . . I think the conservative movement is going out. . . . On the outside, they look very successful, but I question some of their methods. It's a very interesting subject. One thing I've learned is that there's never an easy solution."

Midtgard plans to join Amnesty International, a group that tries to free nonviolent political prisoners.

And although he's anxious to begin a career, he's aware of the problems of his chosen field.

"The image of lawyers today is gone. The market is gone, and now you have all these ambulance chasers on TV," he said.

But he's interested in international law, he said, not criminal law.

"I think the market for international law is going to increase because there are going to be more international companies," he said.

The Independence Township resident lives with his parents, Jerome and Mary, on Eastlawn. He plans to attend the University of Michigan after graduating in 1987.

"And I'd like to thank the Rotary Club for all they've done," he said.

Summertime feast

Fresh garden vegetables are sure to make tasty dishes selected from the "Incredible Edibles" cookbook published by the Clarkston Community Women's Club.

The medley of vegetables was submitted to the cookbook by Barb Richards of Clarkston, and Donna Cole of Clarkston provided the recipe for fresh tomatoes.

VEGETABLE MEDLEY

- 1 small yellow squash, thinly sliced
- 1 small zucchini, thinly sliced
- 1/4 head cauliflower, broken pieces
- 1/2 Bermuda onion, thinly sliced
- 2 medium tomatoes, quartered
- 1 cup diced tomatoes
- 1 cup fresh green beans, sliced
- 1 cup carrots, thinly sliced
- 1/2 cup chopped celery
- 1/4 cup sliced sweet red pepper
- 1/4 cup green pepper strips
- 1/2 cup peas
- 1 cup beef bouillon
- 1/2 cup olive oil
- 3 cloves garlic, crushed
- 2 tsp. salt
- 1 small bay leaf
- 1/2 teaspoon savory
- 1/4 teaspoon tarragon

Combine vegetables in 9-by-13-inch pan. Bring remaining ingredients to a boil and pour on vegetables. Cover tightly with foil. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour and 15 minutes. Stir once or twice.

MARINATED TOMATOES

- 6 large tomatoes
 - 1/2 cup olive oil
 - 1/4 cup wine vinegar
 - 1 clove garlic, crushed
 - 1/4 teaspoon pepper
 - 1/2 teaspoon leaf basil
 - Pinch of leaf tarragon
 - 1 tablespoon fine parsley
 - 1/4 cup thinly sliced green onions
- Dip tomatoes into boiling water long enough so skins can be peeled. Cut into thick slices. Combine all remaining ingredients except onions in a large, flat dish. Spread tomatoes in single layers. Turn once and then sprinkle with onions.

Cover tightly and refrigerate for at least one hour, turning once more before serving.

Wildlife artists are needed by the Howell Nature Center's Wildlife Rehabilitation Program to participate in an art show and sale.

Art for Wildlife is planned in Howell on Nov. 15. Artists are asked to submit two or three photographs of their work to be juried. The entry fee will be one piece of work.

Mary Kalocsay, a wildlife artist from Independence Township, was involved in the planning stages for the show.

Each year, about 400 wild birds and mammals are sheltered, fed and given medical attention at the center.

The goal is to rescue all orphaned wildlife and return them to their natural habitats once they are able to live independently. Animals with permanent handicaps are provided with life-long care.

Funding received from the Presbytery of Detroit, a church group, and the state needs to be supplemented, Kalocsay said.

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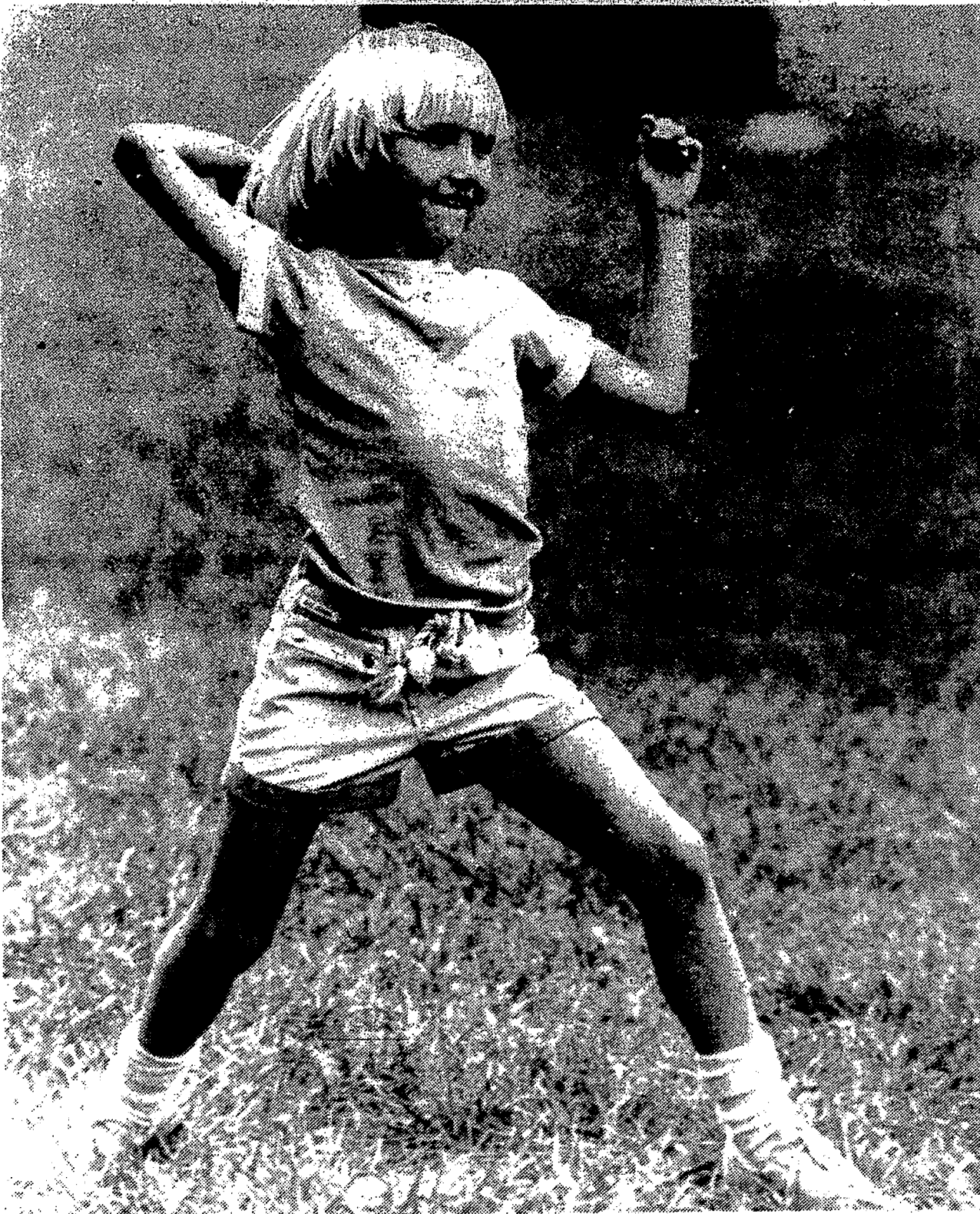

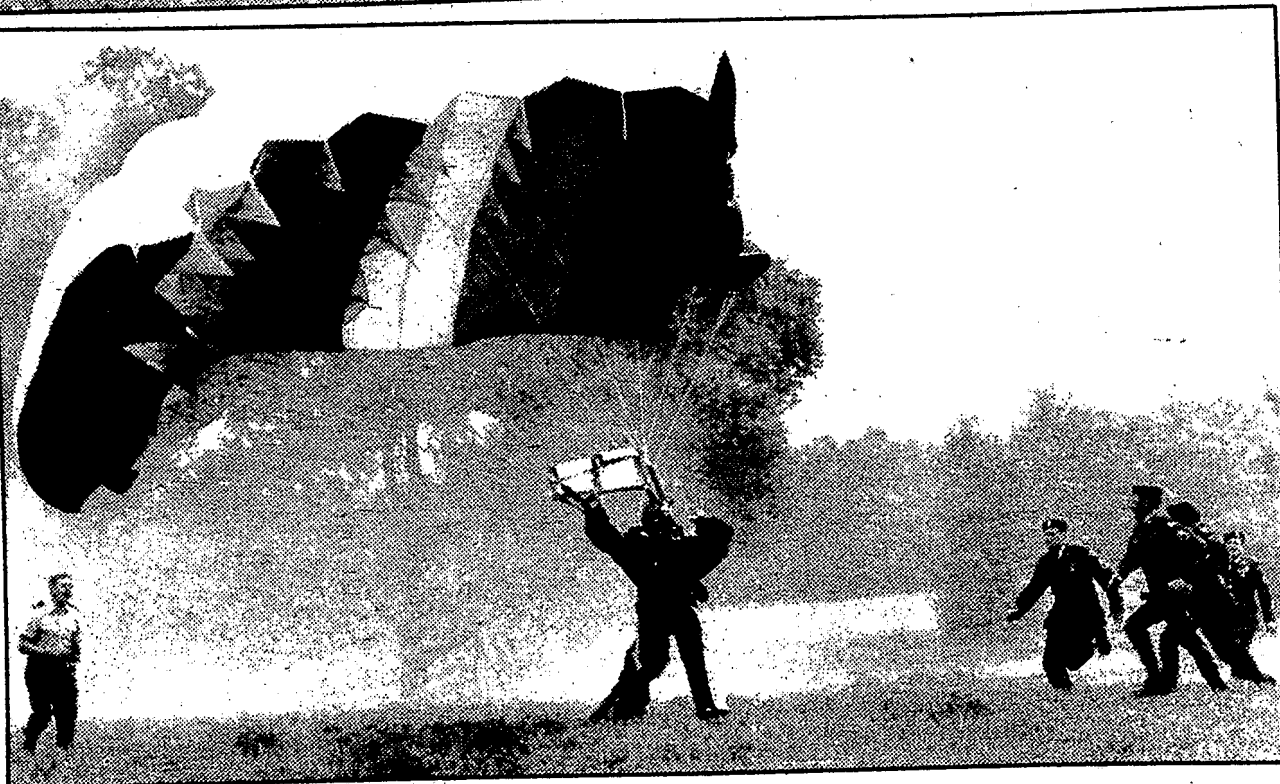

Rohroff's tribute

After the funeral for Thomas Michael Rohroff last Thursday, about 100 people gather in a field behind his parents' house to watch parachuter Ben Gibson jump in tribute to Rohroff. As he lands, the other members of the United States Army's 82nd Airborne Division present the United States flag to Rohroff's parents. Rohroff, a member of the 82nd Airborne Division for three years, drowned in Howes Lake last week during a weekend drill at the National Guard camp in Grayling. After his discharge from the Army, Rohroff joined the National Guard. The circumstances surrounding his death and the injuries of 17 others also jumping from helicopters into Howes Lake won't be known until an investigation is complete, said Maj. Michael Johnson, public affairs officer for the Department of Military Affairs.
