
John Gross related the story of a teenage girl who had become involved in smoking, drinking, lying and stealing.

It was a somber moment during an otherwise upbeat presentation by Gross, a Channel 7 sport-



Park plans win board's OK

Timothy Doyle is happy about the new parks and recreation master plan for Independence Township.

"I think it's a fine plan," said the township parks and recreation director. "It really does recognize and address the needs of the township. . . . I've prepared the master plans in the past 12 or 15 years. . . With the projected growth in the area, I thought it would be best if an outside group came in and took a look.

"This is a more realistic plan," he said. "A lot of things are very attainable."

At a special meeting March 26, the Independence Township board unanimously approved the master plan prepared by the Spell Environmental Group of Lansing for a \$10,100 fee.

The plan recommends-several actions:

•Establish a parks and recreation board or commission within the next 1-2 years.

 Secure additional full-time park and recreation staff within the next five years or as demand requires, The following positions should be considered: assistant park director, additional park maintenance worker, additional park laborer, program, assistant for recreation and progam assistant for senior citizens.

•Establish a millage for parks and recreation within the next five years.

•Develop and/or update master plans for all parks within the township.

Develop a market feasibility study for Bay Court
Camp within the next one to two years.

The study should determine the feasibility and user demand of: music camps, theater, performing arts; special sports camps (soccer, Lacrosse); special youth programs; school camp programs; special retreats

•Physical site improvements and land acquisi-

The improvements should include: parking lot, [See CENTER, Page 2]

When President Reagan talks to the Soviets in Geneva this year, Congressman Bob Carr (D-East Lansing) will be watching.

Carr was appointed by House Speaker Jim Wright as one of 20 official Congressional observers to the arms control talks to be held in Switzerland. The precise date has not been set.

As an observer, Carr will be responsible for monitoring the progress of the talks between the United States and the Soviet Union.

Building use OK'd

A new business may soon open on Sashabaw Road near Flemings Lake Road.

Paul S. Holler, owner of the property and existing building, received final site plan approval from the Independence Township planning commission March 26 for the freeway service zoning.

Although he doesn't know what commercial store he will open, he does not plan to cater to the Pine Knob Music Theatre crowd—no liquor, he said.

Allowable uses for the building include: drug stores, restaurants, gift shops and retail stores for expressway travelers, not including drive-through restaurants or gas stations.

In a 4-0 vote, the planning commission approved the final site plan, subject to final engineering plans. Richard Oppmann was absent.

The building rests on a lot 232,65 feet by 279.9







Public hearing for cops' fate

The Clarkston Village Council is seeking help from Clarkston residents to decide the fate of its police contract with Independence Township.

The council members set a public hearing for Monday, April 13, at 7:30 p.m. in Clarkston Village Hall, 375 Depot.

"A public hearing would be good if enough people would show up," said Trustee Frank Millard at the March 23 meeting.

The council is considering accepting the township's request for an additional 1.5 mills to pay for the double police coverage in effect since Jan. 1. The township voters approved the millage increase last November. The township contracts with the Oakland County Sheriff's Department for coverage.

One mill is \$1 for every \$1,000 in assessed property valuation.

The village currently pays 1 mill or \$14,000 for its coverage, and the contract expires in 1988, said council President Sharron Catallo. The additional 1.5 mills for a total 2.5 mills would cost about \$35,000.

Millard listed the council's options: Pay the additional 1.5 mills; pay an additional amount, but not the entire 1.5 mills, in exchange for specific coverage such as early morning traffic control; or keep the current contract until it expires next year, and take action then.

If the village wanted to contract for its own service, \$60,000 would provide one officer 40 hours a week, said Millard, adding they're getting a good deal with current coverage.

My personal opinion is the whole shot (of 2.5 mills) is worth it," said Millard. "(Oakland County) gives excellent service, and they want to provide ser-

"We're getting seven days a week coverage, 24 hours a day for one half the cost of one man. We don't have to worry about liability or insurance," he said.

Trustee Fontie ApMadoc agreed, but other coun-

cil members did not.

"I will not blindly pay that money," said Catallo. I'd like specific coverage.'

She added that all the village needs is selective traffic enforcement and a car to answer emergency

Trustee Douglas Roeser asked where they would find the money to pay the extra 1.5 mills.

Treasurer Artemus Pappas said the budget would not allow it, and the residents would have to pay more money.

Also on the June 8 ballot, voters will be asked to approve an additional 4.25 mills in taxes and renew 3.79 mills. One mill is \$1 for each \$1,000 of assessed property valuation.

School district residents who are not registered

voters have until May 11 to register in time for the June 8 election. They may register at the Township Hall where they reside or at any Secretary of State





Improvements outlined for Springfield parks

Five-year objectives and immediate goals are outlined in the new Springfield Township Recreation Master Plan.

The new master plan was unanimously adopted on March 11 by the township board and on March 23 by the parks and recreation commission.

The update was due, according to Director of Parks and Recreation Sherry Swindell. The orginal master plan was created in 1979 and the Department of Natural Resources requests an update every five

I've worked on it (with the parks commission) for the two years I've been at Springfield Township, Swindell said. "It's gone through many suggestions and revisions from the planning commission and the township board, too.

Swindell said the most important part of the plan is the plan of action. Immediate goals include improvements at several Springfield Township parks.

Planned for Holcomb Road Park are additional picnic facilities and a small pavilion. Green Lake Parkpriorities include additional playground equipment and repairs to existing equipment.

Creation of an ice skating rink and building a gazebo are goals for Mill Pond Park in 1987-88. Installation of new picnic tables and park benches, a group grill and additional playground equipment and a survey for Mill Pond renovation are also targeted for

the community park. Karl Schultz Park, which contains the township's playing fields, will see improvements to the fields and repairs to the restrooms. Also scheduled are installation of playground equipment, a park sign, a group grill and new seeding around the building, if the budget allows.

Activities scheduled in Springfield Township this year include swim, tennis and golf lessons, summer day camp, a basketball clinic, a one-day senior citizen program and a one-day Great Escape day camp pro-

A possible snow and ice sculpting contest next winter has also been discussed.

Long-range goals of the master plan include acquiring property for adult softball fields, soccer fields and for a larger community park.

"One of the things we're looking into is changing the storage building at Mill Pond Park into a community center and senior citizen facility,"-said

Currently, the basement of the township hall is used for many activities and some senior citizens activities take place at Springfield Oaks Activities Center in the Oakland County park.

One of the highest priorities of the master plan is acquisition of land," Swindell said. "Our community park is only eight acres and the national standard for community parks is 20 to 50 acres."

Another park problem, Swindell noted, is that Karl Schultz Park does not have large enough field areas for adult regulation softball.

The Springfield Parks and Recreation Commission is comprised of Bob Clark, chairman; Betty Hull, treasurer; Linda Kolasz, secretary; Roger Bower, Charles Going, Glenn Guilds, and Swindell.

"I like it."


I was too stunned to ask if he meant he was too tired of the whole process to be discriminating anymore. Later, I decided asking, "Are you. sure?" would have been foolish.



You probably also know that personal service is the major selling point in Japan. A company there that bends over backward to serve a customer, keeps that customer through thick and thin.

That's part of the reason an American company has trouble selling to the Japanese, though the price may be lower. They don't really want to call Benton Harbor to get service on their Whirlpool.

A Washington Post article says service is viewed

by Japanese as essential for success by businesses.

Compare your treatment in American supermarkets to this: Japanese supermarkets have 2 or 3 people ringing up and bagging groceries. Some stores deliver with each bag stapled shut. Dry ice is inserted alongside frozen food to assure against spoilage.

Television shops normally send a technician to install and fine-tune a newly purchased set. The last one I bought I carried out of the store and put in the trunk of my car.

Car salesmen are known to bring new models around to customers 'homes for test drives and loaners

are available for people whose cars are in for repair.
I've never had a new model brought around to test drive, and seldom been encouraged to drive one before forking over the money.

Never, too, has a dealer offered a loaner. One salesman, George Harold, used to loan me his car. Usually, "It's do you have a ride back?"

Japanese barbers often massage the customer's back as part of an ordinary haircut. We probably would look askance at a barber putting his hands on

Many department stores wrap everything they sell. K mart, Hudsons, etc. have plastic bags with big advertisements on the side. At Christmas time some major stores sell you a box' and charge for the wrapping.

Of course, this Japanese service isn't free. The people who bag groceries are paid. The bicyclists who deliver pizza, the person who delivers home videos. the man who delivers a rented tailcoat, the deliverer of health foods get paid.

And, that's another reason unemployment is low and why prices are high:

This has caused some department stores to eliminate the greeter at the entrance who used to bow and welcome each customer.

Still, we could do with a return of some of the services American businesses used to provide, like, more clerks to help us find shoelaces, and more smiles for obvious reasons... but don't try to massage me.

Flight doesn't pacify Tricia

For our flight to Florida, I tried hard to ensure a problem-free journey. I bought tickets two months in advance, I got our seat assignments and boarding passes several days before the departure date. There were six people in our party but we required only five seats because 14-month-old Tricia is still a lap child.

It was cozy. Northwest Airlines put 11 people in our five seats.

The problem wasn't the ordinary type of overbooking routinely handled at airline bribe counters inside the airport. That's where passengers are offered free flights for sometime later if they will give up the seats they bought for right now.

Airlines book more passengers than they have seats so they won't get stuck with an empty seat if a passenger dies of old age while looking for a parking place within 50 miles of the airport. And when not enough passengers die or are otherwise prevented from claiming their seats, it is being time.

bribe time.

FOR OUR FLIGHT, Northwest must have figured on plenty of passengers perishing previous to parking. A crudely lettered sign posted at the departure gate counter urged: "Ask about free flights!" Passengers willing to wait five hours for the next flight could fly to Ft. Myers at no charge. There were several eager takers.

We could have saved \$900. We could also have spent the afternoon chasing around the airport behind Tricia, who recently learned how to walk but doesn't yet know how to stop. She walks like the late Jimmy Cagney, with arms bent, hands flopping, knees twitching and feet

Tricia also sucks on a pacifier in a manner unlike any other child. If she'd been a breast-fed baby, her mother would have needed L-shaped breasts. The pacifier nipple points straight up into the roof of Tricia's mouth so that the shield sticks out between her lips, looking like half a yellow cookie, and the handle is pressed tightly against her chin. To believe it, you have to stare at it, and strangers often do

Also present was five-year-old Emily, who loves to yank her little sister all over the landscape because Tricia is the first mechanical doll Emily has owned that doesn't require batteries.

IN VIEW OF these circumstances, the adult members of our party voted to keep traveling before we lost our momentum, not to mention our minds. Besides, we didn't want to encourage Northwest to treat the loss of \$900 in such a cavalier manner. If that's a sensible way to run a business, why don't theaters sell more tickets than they have seats?

So we confirmed our seat assignments and boarded the plane. One advantage of flying with small children is that, out of compassion of your troubles, you're granted early-boarding privileges. One disadvantage is that this extends the amount of time a 14-month-old girl is required to sit on a lap and yelp because she wants to run down the aisle and amaze strangers with the position of her pacifier.



(Choreography) is a very creative thing, trying to create steps that the kids can do that fit the music and fit the show and will entertain people," she said. "It's hard, but I enjoy doing it. It takes time and effort, but it's creative, so it's not a chore.'

This year's production of "Hello, Dolly" is fun to

choreograph, said Albyn.

"The show itself is a very upbeat show," she said. "It has a lot of sprightly music. This particular show's highlight, from a choreographer's view, is the waiter's gallop in the second act. These boys do a good job, with it. They've really worked hard."

Albyn has choreographed 15 high school

musicals and found it difficult to choose a favorite.

"The most challenging was 'West Side Story,' she said. "And I suppose that was my favorite because it had the most dancing in it."

Albyn could choose her favorite aspect of teaching and did so without hesitation.

"The kids," she said. "You know, it's always so great when you finally get through to somebody and they understand, and their minds are opening.

'I'm going to miss (teaching), but I'm not going to pine for it," said Albyn. "I'm going to be busy doing many other things. My life has been a series of careers, and when one ends another begins.'

When this one ends, she and her husband Dick plan to move to North Carolina, where they'll both continue with one of their favorite hobbies: writing.


Albyn likes to write short stories, and Dick Albyn is just now finishing an architecture book—a collaboration with others-for the Michigan Sesquicentennial, she said.

high's "Going for the Gold" week, designed to motivate students to set goals and always try their

The week has featured several speakers who have overcome adversity in their lives, including Charles Ferry, an author of junior high novels, Kelly-Saunders, a recovering drug abuser, George Vines, who survived the World War II Holocaust and Steve Himburg, who coaches the junior high's football team from a wheelchair.

Gross has been involved in similar presentations since 1981. His own experience with his daughter was a vivid illustration of the message he tried to get across to the students.

"You can master anything if you can master yourself." he told them. "What makes the difference between a student who becomes a druggie and one who makes the National Honor Society?

"I realized there are no secrets, instead there are principles," he said. "There are three principles: number one, set goals and aim high; number two, believe in yourself; and number three, work hard and never give up.'

In keeping with the theme of the week, Gross brought along 1984 Olympic gold medalist wrestler Steve Fraser. When Fraser started wrestling in eighth grade, he had minimal talent, but he said he worked thousands of hours to attain his gold medal goal.

"I was just an average, Joe Blow person from Hazel Park, Michigan," said Fraser. "I had no special athletic ability or intelligence. I wasn't a gifted child. It took 16,000 hours of training for me to be able to compete at the world level.

"The number one thing you have to do is get the dream in your head of what you want to achieve," he

Fraser's work took him from a "terrible" sophomore year in high school to a state title as a senior and a full athletic scholarship to the University of Michigan.

However, he thought about packing it in as a freshman at Michigan because he was failing two classes and was getting beaten literally every day in practice by a wrestler named Mark Johnson. Obviously, he stuck it out.

"Here I thought I was the roughest, toughest wrestler around," he said. "You have to learn from your setbacks."

Gross also brought along a 22-year-old Cambodian refugee, Chun Siev. Siev and his family fled to the United States when he was 15, but they had to leave behind his father. Siev does not know if his father is still living.

When he came to the states, he did not know one word of English, not even "yes" or "no." But he and several brothers and sisters went on to become honor

scaster John Gross and karate performer Chun Slev spoke to students about setting goals and always striving to reach them.

students at Romeo High School.

Siev excelled away from the classroom as well, as he hoped to become a top kick-boxer. But three years ago, he lost his left eye when he got poked during a football game.

Rather than giving up athletics, Siev turned to forms karate, in which he displays various kicks and moves in short routines.

'After I lost my eye, I didn't want to just sit back and feel sorry for myself," Siev said. "I thought if I can't become a champion at kick-boxing, I want to become a champion at forms karate.

Once we got to the United States, we knew we could get to where we wanted to get to," he said.

Siev summed up the goal of the week. "All I can tell you is, work hard."



The developers, Benson/Benson/Jackson, had plans to build a subdivision, said Figa.



"We usually have six weeks (of practice) and it will affect how advanced the pitchers are for opening day," Warner said.



Burek has been to the state finals twice before as a referee, in 1974 and 1975. He didn't expect to be selected again and was surprised when he received a letter in January telling him he was among 11 picked for the finals, two for each of the four class championships plus three alternates.

A committee of state tournament managers, athletic directors and principals makes the choices. Burek did not know until 10:30 p.m. Friday that he would be handling the Class A game.

Leading up to the finals, he worked a Class A district in Owosso, a "B" regional in Flint and a "B" quarterfinal game at Crisler last Wednesday. He officiated about 20 contests during the regular season.

"I worked about one night a week. It's really fun," said Burek. "I played sports in high school, played baseball in college. I wanted to stay around the athletic scene.'

Burek has also worked at the college level and, for a while, had thoughts of becoming a Big Ten ref, but he decided that would be too time-consuming.





Anke Ossenberg is back in town for her second visit

German student pursues theology studies here

By Pat Young

Retracing her steps to Clarkston from a visit several years ago, Anke Ossenberg of West Germany chose Clarkston's Calvary Luthern Church as part of a theological experience this month.

When Anke completed her 13 years of preeducation in West Germany, comparable to completing high school in America, she decided to "do something different" before beginning theological studies at the University of Munster.

Through a contact of her godfather, she came to Clarkston in August 1983 to visit for several months in the Deerwood area home of Jim and Martha Matthews. At that time, she met the Rev. Robert Walters when she worshipped in Calvary Lutheran Church.

Walters, who boasts German ancestry and also speaks German, later visited Anke and her family in their hometown of Evingsen-Altena, a small town in north-central West Germany. Walters and his wife, Bey, were on a church group tour at the time.

When it came time for Anke to decide where to spend the first of two six-week practicums required for her training, she wrote to "Pastor Bob."

Walters said he was delighted to have Anke at the church. She arrived March 5 and is again staying with the Matthews family until she returns to West Germany on April 22 to continue her studies.

Anke began studying theology in October 1984 and must complete six years of study, followed by two years in practical church service, before she is ordain-

ed as a minister in West Germany.

During her first six years of study, she is required to complete two six-week practicums "experiencing" life and getting to know people who would be like her

"Normally, you'd pick a church in Germany or live with a farm family or work in a factory," Anke

says. "But I picked this church to be more open, to get new ideas."

It's many different experiences, Walters adds. "A little bit of community life."

During her visit so far, Anke has observed Walters, getting an idea what life is like as a pastor.


She has attended a church council retreat, given a children's sermon, read a lesson during the church service and accompanied Walters on hospital visits and consultations, among other activities.

She will also prepare a sermon, which she will deliver at the April 5 worship service.

"Here, you have so many churches and can choose," Anke says. "If you're in one community in West Germany, you go to that Protestant church. There are not so many different kinds of churches, just Protestant and Catholic.

"I think life in church here is livelier, more active. The members are doing more for their church because they know they have to support it."

In. West Germany, she points out, the difference is that about 8 to 10 percent of your income tax goes to

your church, if you are a member of a church.

The raven-haired, 23-year-old student speaks fluent English and fits comfortably into the church community. Sometimes wearing blue jeans, she rides a bicycle to the church, and with a warm smile, greets parishioners she has already come to know well. But family and friends await her return to Germany.

Anke's parents, Magdalene and Friedrich, own a "skittle alley," a bowling alley, in Evingsen-Altena and live in a large home attached to it. Her grandmother, Helene Schmiedel, lives in the same village.

Her sister, Annette, is a lawyer for a bank. Six years older than Anke, she is married to Frank

Her first book, "Microwave Cooking Starts Herel," is a must for a 40th birthday gift. The print is large and, therefore, easy to read without granny. glasses.

The book contains easy to prepare, tasty recipes for the everyday cook.

ROASTED STUFFED CHICKED

Prepare package stuffing mix or your favorite bread stuffing

3½ to 4 pound chicken

MICROSHAKE Natural Chicken 1. Wash and stuff chicken.

2. Place in 5-by-8-inch glass loaf pan, breast side down. Sprinkle with MICROSHAKE to enhance the browning effect. Cover loosely with plastic wrap.

3. Microwave for 8 minutes a pound at high (100

percent power). 4. Turn breast side up one-half way through cooking time and sprinkle with MICROSHAKE. Do not cover in the second half of cooking.

5. Let stand 5 to 7 minutes.

Hints: We have found that by using a loaf pan, the wings and legs are held close to the bird and there is no need to truss the legs. By covering the bird with plastic wrap during the first half of the cooking, the joint areas become completely cooked and there are no pink areas.

Pat's second book, "Pat Hutt & the Magical Clay Pot," suggests ways to get conventional results with your microwave oven by cooking in a clay pot.

The book addresses selection of a clay pot, advantages of using one, use and care and how to successfully microwave in one.

CLAY POT PAELLA Serves 4 to 6

12 ounces medium shrimp, uncooked 2 chicken breasts, boned

8 ounces sweet Italian sausage

6 thin slices onion

2 cups chicken broth

1 cup long grain rice, uncooked 👉

1 large tomato, skinned and cubed 1 small sweet red pepper, cut into strips

1/4 teaspoon garlic paste

1 clove garlic, crushed

½ teaspoon saffron, crushed

¼ teaspoon dried oregano, crushed

1/4 teaspoon pepper

1, Soak a clay pot in tap water for 10 to 15

2. Bone and cube chicken breast. Cut into large 1-inch chunks. Cut sausage in half and squeeze casing from middle to remove meat. Cut onion slices in half. Place chicken, sausage, onions and garlic in the base

3. Skin and cube tomato. Place in small bowl. Add pepper strips; saffron, pepper and oregano. Set

4. Microwave chicken meat mixture, uncovered, at high (100 percent power) for 51/2 minutes. Stir-

5. Add rice, tomato mixture, broth and garlic paste to clay pot. Stir.

6. Microwave, covered, at medium (50-percent power) for 30 minutes. Stir well half way through cooking time.

7. Stir from bottom to top. Add shrimp. Microwave, covered, at medium (50 percent) power for 5 minutes.

8. Let stand-covered 5 minutes.

Hints: You may add 6 mussels in shells at step $\mathcal I$ Mussels should be open after standing time. If not, return to microwave, covered, for 2 to 3 minutes or until shells open. For a colorful touch when company comes, leave the tails attached to the shrimp.

Pat's third book, "More Microwaving with Pat Hutt," contains oven wattage information, Pat's comments between sections and calories per serving for some recipes

'NO WORK' PASTRY SHELL

1 cup plus 2 tablespoons flour

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/3 cup corn oil

2 tablespoons cold water

1. In a mixing bowl, combine flour and salt. Mix

2. Add oil and water and stir well. Shape into a ball. Roll out between wax paper and transfer to a pie

3. Prick the sides and bottom of the crust with the tines of a fork.

4. Microwave for 6 or 7 minutes at medium high

*(70 percent power). Hints: If your oven does not have 70 percent power, microwave for 5 minutes at high (100 percent power), giving the dish a one-quarter turn twice,

'NO WORK' TWO CRUST PASTRY SHELL

1. Double the quantities of the single crust "No Work" pastry shell.

2. Roll the crusts between wax paper. Transfer to pie plate, bake and fill the bottom crust with fruit. Top with top crust. Brush the top crust with milk and sprinkle with sugar.

3. Microwave for 6 to 8 minutes at high (100 percent power) or until fruit is just tender.

4. Preheat conventional oven to 400 degrees. Bake microwaved pie 12 to 15 minutes to crisp the bottom crust and brown the top.

If you're in a hurry, you may substitute an already made-refrigerated pie crust and obtain wonderful results.

For a delicious apple pie, I used 4 to 5 Granny Smith apples, unpeeled, thinly sliced and tossed with cinnamon, sugar and 1 tablespoon flour. Add to prebaked bottom shell and continue according to Pat's recipe....... 1885-1882-1993


Not surprisingly, both Kathie and he read just about anything they can get their hands on including best-sellers.




Contest rules required that the speeches be 4- to 5-minutes long and that participants be under age 16 by Dec. 31.

Court clerk retires after career of 27 years

By Pat Young

Jean Davis raised only one child of her own, but she helped thousands of neglected children, from newborns to 19-year-olds, find a better life.

The Independence Township woman retired March 27 after nearly 27 years with the Oakland County courts. For 18½ of those years, she worked with children.

Davis began her career as an account clerk with Friend of the Court May 2, 1960. She transferred to probate court Sept. 1, 1968, where she worked until her retirement last Friday.

"I sort of transferred from working with the parents to working with the kids," Davis says.

At the time of her transfer, it was called juvenile court, she explains. After undergoing reorganization years back, it is now called probate court, but she worked in the juvenile division.

As a probate court account clerk, Davis was responsible for keeping all records on foster children. She kept track of where they were placed, paid foster parents and private agencies for boarding, and paid foster children's other expenses, such as clothing and medical bills.

"I think the best part of the job was dealing with the foster parents. They're our mainstay," Davis says. "It takes a very special kind of person to be a foster parent."


