Comment on failed millage

There will be another school millage election this fall, and there will be a public hearing July 13 to find out what went wrong the first time.

The unanimous decision to go back to the voters was made by the Clarkston school board at a special meeting June 30, following defeat of the 4.25 millage in the June 8 election.

The July 13 public hearing will be at 8 p.m. at the school board office, following the board's annual organizational meeting at 7:30 p.m.

The goal of the public hearing is to allow residents to offer their opinions on why the millage failed.

The board will conduct its regular meeting following the public hearing.

A date for the new millage election has not been set.

Fire Chief Bailey dies

Although Fire Chief Dale Bailey had been ill for over a year, his death last Wednesday was difficult for his co-workers in Independence Township.

"It was inevitable, and we knew it was going to happen, but it's still comes as a shock when it finally does happen," said township Supervisor Frank Ronk.

"It hit the department hard," he said.

"He was a good employee. If I had to pick a guy I'd want to go into a smoke-filled basement with, he'd be the one I'd pick," said Ronk.

Chief since 1985, Bailey, 52, had been with the fire department 34 years. He started full time in 1973.

"He was a very dedicated and excellent employee of the township. He served the township well," said Ronk, adding Bailey always considered the safety of the firefighters.

Acting chief Gar Wilson said he had worked with Bailey since 1970.

"Just working with the man will be an everlasting memory for me," said Wilson.

"(He was a) good fire chief," he said. "He was always one of the guys. He didn't look at himself as being over and above anybody. He was one who always got in and got his hands dirty."

"He'd do anything for you. He's helped a lot of people in the area."

"He was one of the first guys to work full time."

Unusual 4th

The 4th of July weekend was the strangest July 4th weekend he has ever seen, said Acting Fire Chief Gar Wilson.

"We never ran an accident," he said, adding the last accident call to the Independence Township Fire Department was Thursday.

"I understand there were only nine traffic deaths in the state. That's usually in the high teens," he said.

"We were plenty busy enough with our activities," said Wilson, referring to the funeral for fire chief Dale Bailey and the July 4th parade, sponsored by the fire department.

"I guess someone was watching over us," he said.

We kind of grew up with him. We're going to miss him around here. There's no two ways about it."

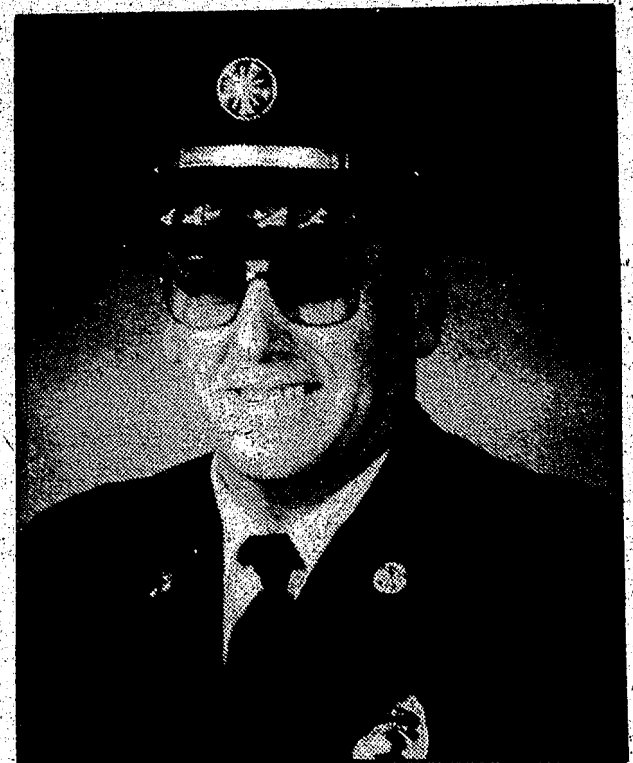
At his funeral Friday, firefighters from surrounding communities paid tribute, said Wilson. And the township's Model T fire truck was placed at the new fire station at Clarkston and Sashabaw roads in salute to him.

Before going to the cemetery, the funeral procession drove by the township's three fire stations.

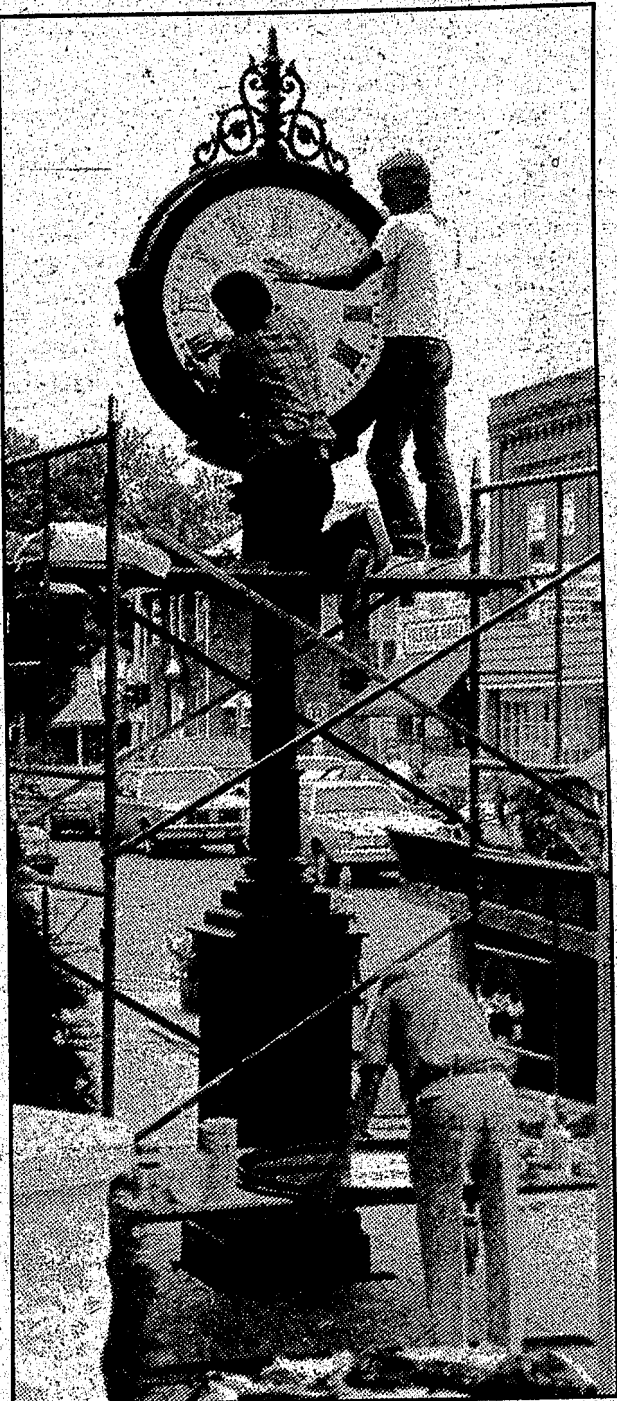
Bailey was a member of the Oakland County Arson Association, Oakland County Fire Chiefs Association, South Eastern Chiefs Association and Michigan Well Drillers Association.

He was past president of North East Oakland County Fire Fighters Association and a life member of the National Rifle Association.

"He loved fishing and hunting," said Wilson, adding that was probably his favorite pastime in the world after spending time with his wife Sandra and their children Jack and Doreen.

Tungate named SJHS assistant principal

Paul Tungate, Clarkston schools athletic director, has been named assistant principal at Sashabaw Junior High School.

The decision came following a lengthy discussion at a special Clarkston school board meeting June 30.

Due to budget cuts following the failure of the 4.25-mill increase in the June 8 election, a new administrator was not hired when Sashabaw Principal Gus Birtas retired.

Sashabaw Assistant Principal David Reschke was named principal, and the board's action June 30 was to fill the assistant principal position by reassigning current administrators in the Clarkston School system.

Board member Stephen Werner asked if the position could be left vacant temporarily, but Superintendent Milford Mason said with a projected enrollment of 853 students at Sashabaw, it would be too much for one administrator to handle. A factor in the enroll-

ment is the addition of sixth grade to the junior high schools this fall.

Options considered by the board included naming Alberta Ellis, director of curriculum services, to the assistant principal position. Another option, delivered only 15 minutes before the meeting, was offered by the Clarkston Community Education Department.

Mason read the communication, in which community education offered to pick up the cost of funding Ginny Farmer, coordinator for Clarkston Community Learning Center, as Sashabaw assistant principal for the 1987-88 school year.

Mason expressed concern about that option, because it eliminated the interview process for choosing administrators and because the money would still come out of the general fund.

No options offered drew unanimous approval from the board or from staff members in the audience.

"I believe moving Mrs. Ellis would be a giant step backwards," said Werner. "I would rather see us operate without a full-time athletic director."

Following discussion of having Ellis work part time on curriculum while working at Sashabaw, Reschke said, "I would feel less than supportive about a part-time person to help me."

"The problem is getting the positions filled in the best way possible to get the job done in a less than desirable situation," said Janet Thomas, president of the school board.

"I hope you understand the ramifications of put-

ting me in a junior high where I know nothing about the system," said Tungate before the vote.

"I don't think lack of experience would be the problem, and we know we can keep athletics afloat for the time being," Mason said.

A motion by John Needham to name Tungate to fill the position passed in a 4-3 vote. Needham, Werner, Thomas Bills and Elaine Schultz voted "yes" and Thomas, Mary Jane Chaustowich and Carolyn Place voted "no."

The final decision on who will handle athletic duties has not been determined, said district personnel director Conrad Bruce after the meeting, but assistant principals at the junior highs and high school may oversee each school's athletic program.

Gravel truck rams 3 cars

A Waterford Township woman was injured about 3 p.m. July 1 when a gravel truck ran into her car and two other cars on Dixie Highway, Independence Township.

When three cars stopped for a red light on Dixie Highway, northeast of White Lake Road, the gravel truck couldn't stop and ran into them, according to the Oakland County Sheriff's Department report.

Patricia Ratledge, 55, was in fair condition Monday at Pontiac General Hospital. Her husband, Dallas, who was driving the 1977 Dodge, suffered minor injuries. The occupants in the other cars also suffered minor injuries.

Truck driver Newton McClanahan Jr., 50, of Flint, was not injured. McClanahan was issued a ticket for speeding.

Voters to face school tax again

After deciding unanimously to take the millage increase request back to the voters, Clarkston school board members did a little soul searching at a special meeting June 30 to determine what went wrong the first time.

A standing-room-only audience also offered opinions on why the request for 4.25 new mills was soundly defeated in the June 8 election. Voters approved the 3.79-mill tax renewal on the ballot.

"Perhaps we didn't inform the public of what the real impact is," said board member Thomas Bills as he made a motion to have another millage election.

Bills was referring to budget cuts already made of \$1.02 million and another \$500,000 deemed necessary to maintain a workable budget.

The \$1.02 million in cuts include about \$674,500 which directly affect people, including teacher and staff layoffs and reductions in numerous programs. About \$346,300 in cuts affect supplies, including textbook orders.

At the special meeting, the school board faced the grim task of cutting an additional \$500,000 from the budget and chose, instead, to appeal to the voters one more time.

According to William Jackson, Clarkston schools business manager, at least 50 days are needed to prepare for another election.

Board President Janet Thomas agreed with other board members that it would be best to wait until fall to have the election, since the tax could not be levied before winter anyway.

"If we're going for another election, we'd better be ready for it," she said.

Bills suggested a committee to develop strategy and make people aware of the urgent need for the millage increase. Many concerned citizens signed a paper passed around asking for volunteers to help with the millage election effort.

Jan and Ray Eby, Independence Township residents, spoke strongly of the need for the millage.

"We need to let people know we are not OK without the increase," Jan Eby said. "I think people felt if they said yes on the one millage, they could say no on the other. We need to show people the necessity."

She also said that part of the reason the millage failed is because people were confused by the issue of a new school. Several other members of the audience agreed, saying people thought that if Clarkston could afford a new school, they didn't need the money.

But Thomas explained that the Clarkston school system could afford a new school without voter approval of specific funding for the school.

A public hearing will be held at the school board's July 13 meeting to get input from citizens on the millage election.

"I would like to see people on both sides of the issue at the meeting," said board member Stephen Werner.

"We need to have input as to why this millage failed," added board member Mary Jane Chaustowich.

Bank is back

Pontiac State Bank (PSB) reopened its doors on Main Street, Clarkston, on June 30 after the doors were closed for nearly six months following a ceiling cave-in in February.

In the interim, the bank used a temporary office at the Clarkston Mills Mall behind its Main Street location.

Customers and employees are happy to be in their old office, said Christine Downing, assistant vice-president and manager of PSB, Clarkston.

Fatigue caused the collapse of the 70-year-old building, said Downing.

"The ceiling had hung there as long as it was going to hang there," she said. "They did some structural repairs, and we did some sprucing up."

In addition to the new ceiling tiles, the bank has new carpeting, paint, curtains and a porch awning. In front of the building is a new brick walk with benches and new trees and shrubs.

"We're real excited to be back and we're pleased with the remodeling," said Downing.

Sheila Hughes, president of the Pine Knob PTO, said one reason the millage may have failed involved a "vote yes" brochure mailed to residents of the school district.

"Sixty percent of the people I called before the last election said they did not get any mailings on it, she said. "I don't know if the post office dumped the bulk mailings or what."

Contacted after the meeting, Clarkston Post Office Superintendent of Operations Kay Bliss said, "A carrier would lose his job if he didn't deliver bulk business mail."

Several people complained about not getting mailings about the millage election, Bliss said, and a school district representative visited the post office regarding the claim.

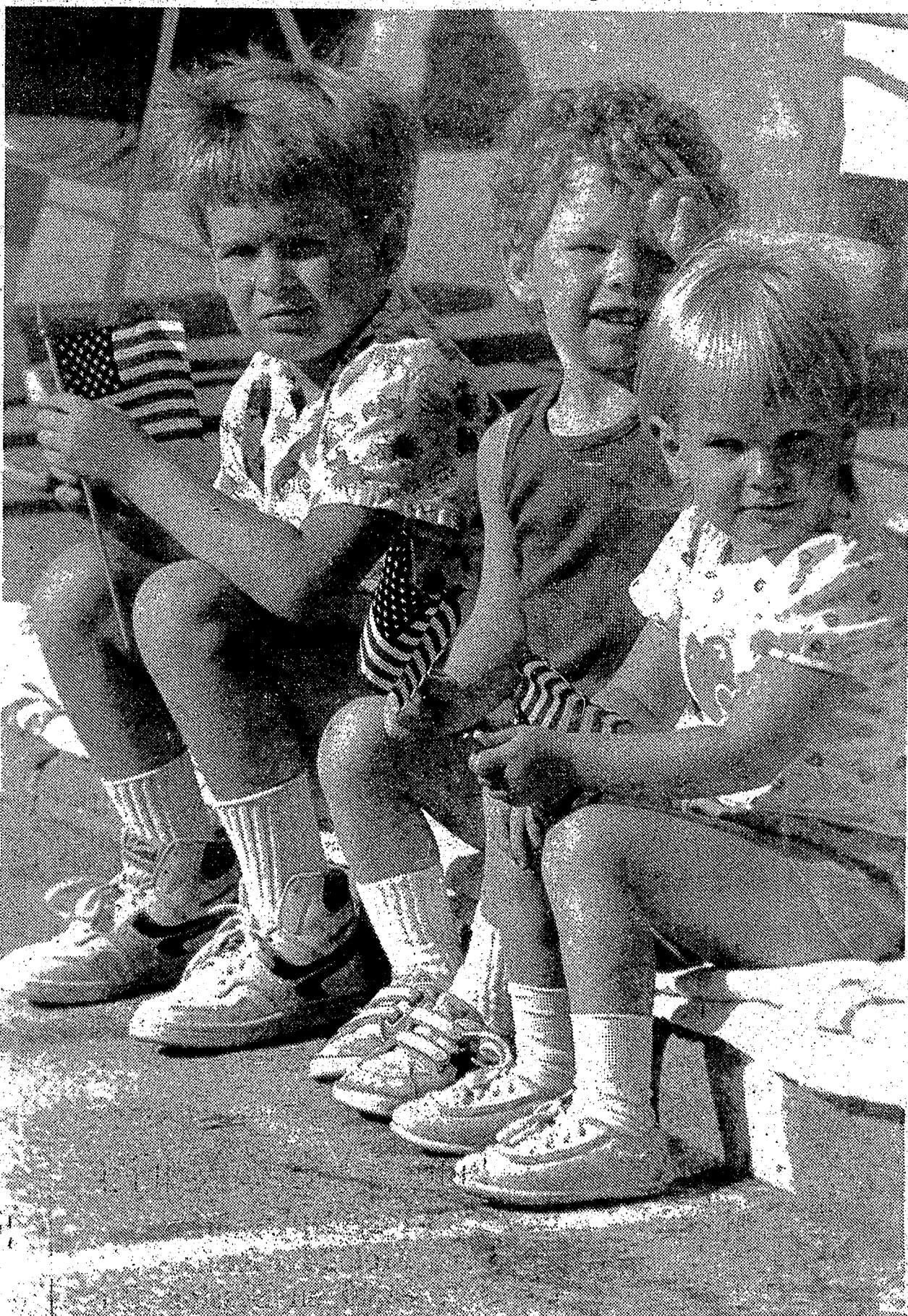
"We checked the mailing list, and found complete streets missing from the school district's list, so we gave them an updated list," Bliss said. "But the mailings they did from the old list would have been incomplete."

Clarkston schools have the second lowest operational millage levy of Oakland County's 28 public schools.

School board members expressed hope that will change on the yet-to-be-set election date this fall, and tabled further budget cuts for the time being.

Jim Butzine, Clarkston High School social worker, summed up his feelings about the upcoming millage election when he said, "We have to make sure the community feels the emotion. It's hard for a kid to learn math without a textbook."

"We have the people and the plans for a great educational system, but it all got kicked in the bottom with the millage failure," he said.

CHS drug abuse program returns—half time

The SEARCH program at Clarkston High School has at least half a chance for survival.

At a special meeting June 30, the Clarkston school board voted unanimously to keep the program going with a half-time staff member.

SEARCH, an acronym for support, education, awareness, resources for chemical-free health, was a substance abuse program run by special education teachers Linc Smith and Katie MacKay, each working

half-time in SEARCH and half-time in special education.

The program was eliminated when the school board was forced to make \$1.02 million in budget cuts following the defeat of a millage increase in the June 8 election.

But when the board axed the program as part of an across-the-board budget reduction, they agreed to reconsider the drug abuse program at a future meeting.

Citizens concerned with the loss of what has been

deemed a very successful drug abuse program were in the audience at the special school board meeting.

The Rev. Bill Schram, representing Aware and Chemical People, two community groups fighting drug abuse, read a statement supporting SEARCH and urging the board to keep the program at the high school.

"The success of a program like SEARCH depends a great deal on the trust the students have in it," he said. "Linc and Katie have developed that trust over this last year. A break in the program would undo much of that trust building."

"Financial concerns are a reality in our society and I know the program costs money," he said. "I also believe that it has a positive impact. I don't know how to measure it, but I believe it receives more quality teaching time per dollar for every discipline problem this program has helped prevent."

He also noted that Chemical People has provided not just encouragement, but financial support: \$1,100 for training Smith and MacKay, \$500 for resources for the program, one-half the cost of November training workshops on drug abuse and \$4,000 to repeat the workshops this year.

MacKay and others in the audience also spoke, urging the board to maintain the SEARCH program. Superintendent Milford Mason, saying he was sorry, urged the board not to tamper with the budget cuts at this time.

"If you reinstate this program now, you'll have other groups wanting programs reinstated at the next board meeting," he said.

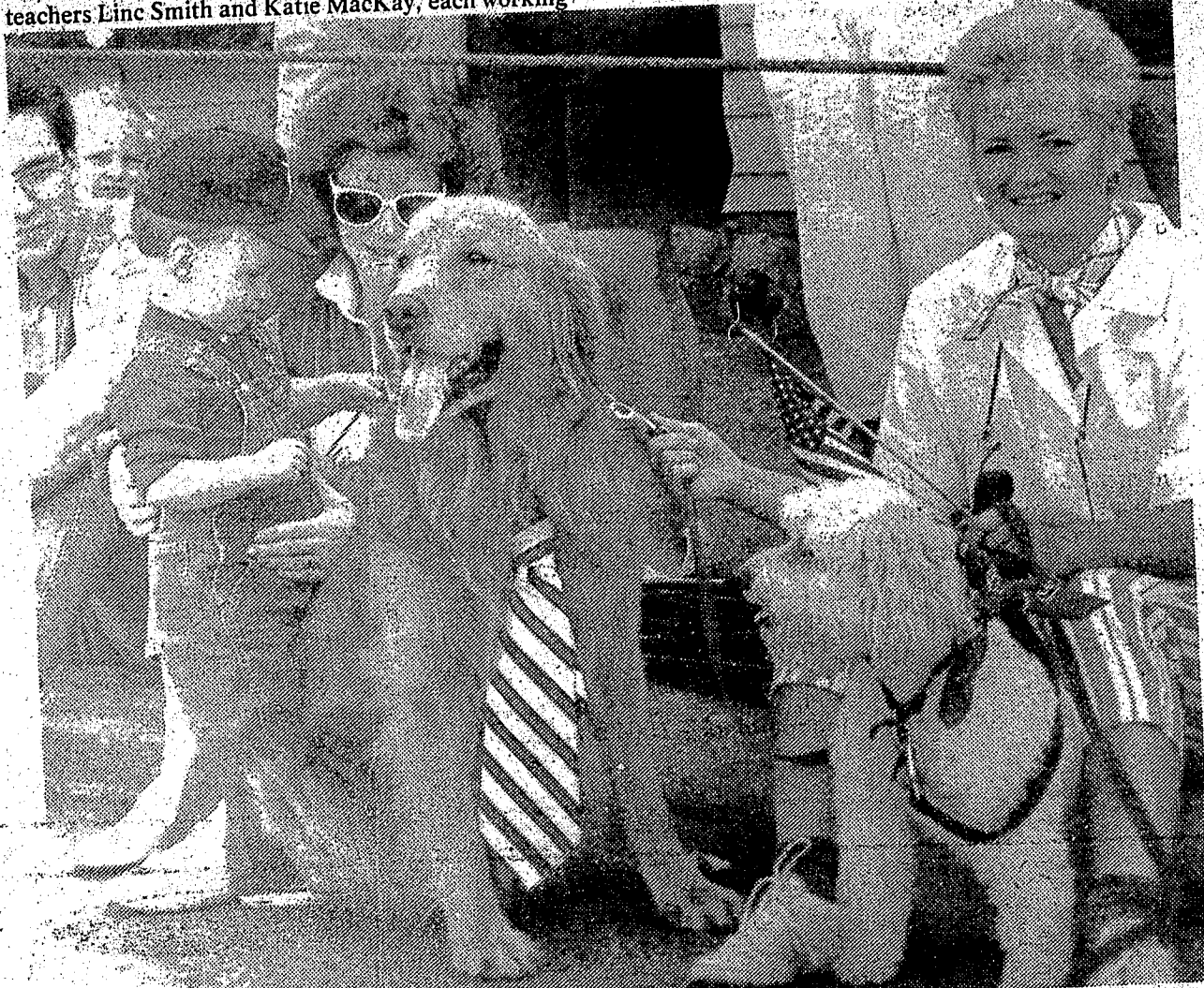
But the board voted unanimously for the half-time person, although they moved not to do anything to implement it until the July 13 meeting.

The problem, brought to the attention of the board by Special Services Director Robert Brumback following the vote, is that there is no half-time position available.

"Special ed increased to five teachers instead of four and a half, and since it is state regulated, it is hard to change that," said MacKay after the meeting. "Now, if there is a half-time SEARCH program, there is no half-time position to go with it."

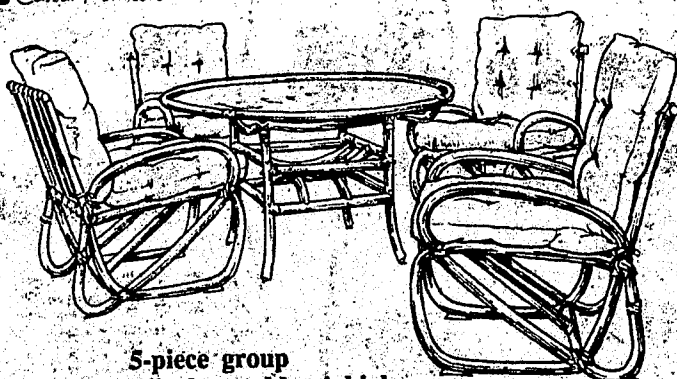
MacKay would be moved to a full-time special ed position at another school and Smith would be full time in special ed at the high school, leaving no half-time person to fill the SEARCH position.

MacKay also said, "Even with the two of us working in the SEARCH program, there was more than we could handle. A half-time position would allow for only a 'paper program'."

I feel better now, thank you very much.

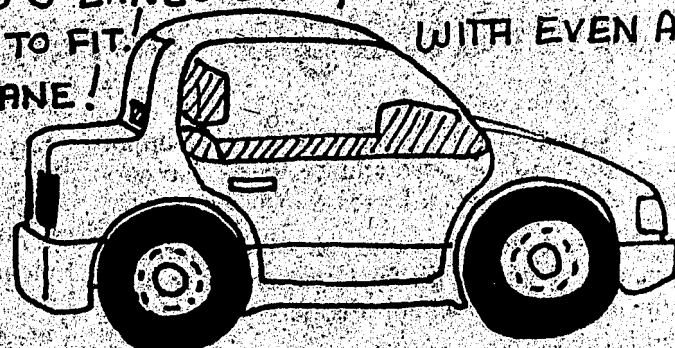

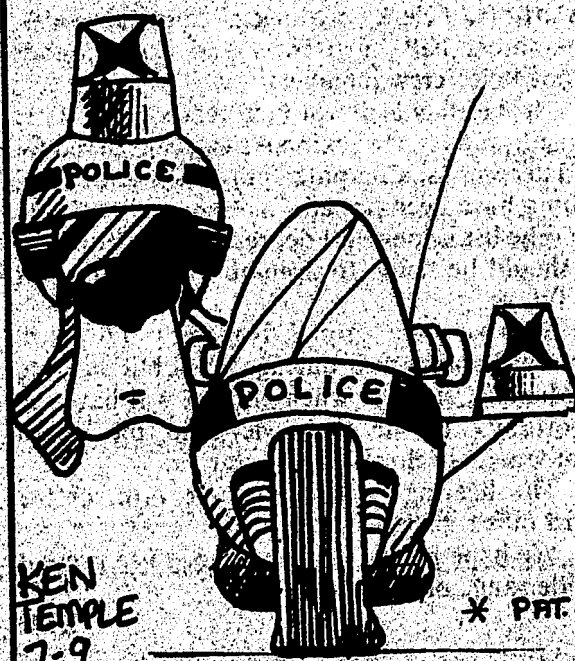

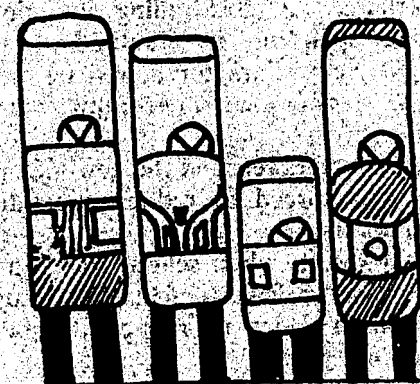

Schools need more than pride for millage defeat recovery

We're glad voters will have another opportunity to go to the polls and decide if Clarkston schools will receive an increase in revenue.

It's fine to be proud of what Clarkston schools have done with far less money per pupil than most other school districts in Oakland County.

But what happened at the polls June 8 was a fiasco. Clarkston schools don't deserve to be decimated.

Perhaps the most telling statistic involves per-pupil spending in Oakland County's 28 school districts. Clarkston now sits at number 27 with the second lowest per-pupil figure in the county.

When voters rejected the new 4.25 mills, the district was forced to reduce expenditures by \$1.02 million.

As a result, when school starts in the fall, there will be 15 fewer teachers and larger class sizes without aides to reduce the burden on teachers and pupils.

In an effort to maintain programs it took years to afford, the board opted for reductions rather than eliminations when the millage failed.

Physical education will be offered once a week rather than twice for elementary school pupils. The media centers will have one librarian covering the district's five elementary schools rather than three librarians. The gifted elemen-

tary education program now has one teacher instead of two. Music classes for elementary pupils will drop from two a week to one. Introductory foreign language classes will be removed from the elementary curriculum.

On the secondary level, the substance abuse program at the high school has been cut from two half-time teachers to one half-time teacher. There will be no library aides, and the athletic director position has been eliminated.

Also eliminated were the positions of two bus drivers, a clerk, two special education aides, two-and-one-half custodians and one grounds maintenance crew member.

Replacements of worn out textbooks will not be made and no new textbooks will be ordered for outdated series. Computer purchases and refurbishing have been halted.

The list is long and depressing. It's not what we should be doing to prepare our children for the future.

So what went wrong? Hopefully, the question will be answered during the public hearing on Monday, July 13, when citizens will have the opportunity to air their views to the board members and school administrators.

The hearing is to begin at 8 p.m. at the board office, 6389 Clarkston Rd.

We hope people will care enough to present a wide range of opinions.

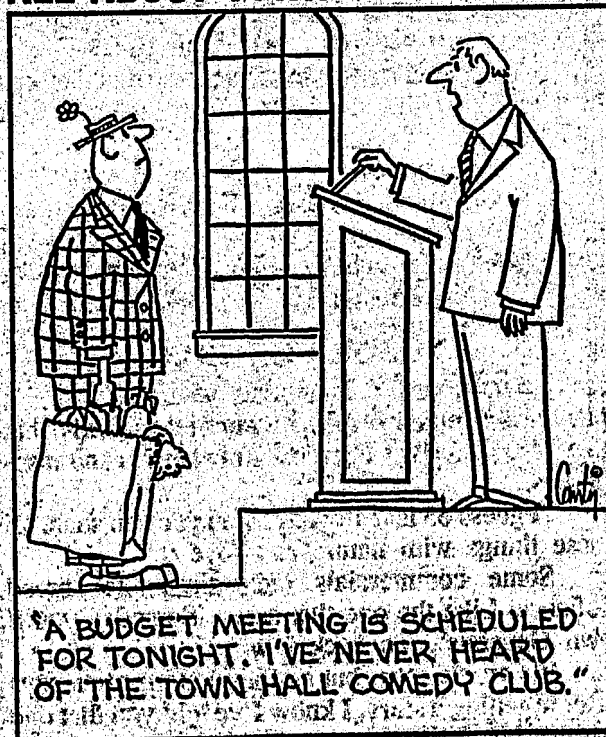

'If it Fitz

As seen walking to work

Sometimes I see something that makes me very happy, or very sad, and I wish I were a poet, so I could do a better job of telling you about it. Newspaper writing doesn't seem up to the job, but it's all I can do, so...

Begin with very happy; I see this scene often, in front of the U.S. Courthouse on West Lafayette, where my downtown walking route takes me most mornings. Two or three small clumps of people are posing for snapshots.

Usually there are a youngish couple, an older couple, and a child, maybe three or four years old, per clump. I figure they are child, parents and grandparents. I guess their picture is being taken by an aunt or uncle.

Sometimes a clump is larger - two sets of grandparents and several older children - big brothers and sisters of the small child.

Sometimes a clump is smaller - just the youngish couple and the small child. The father and mother alternate taking snapshots of each other posing with the child. I have an impulse to ask the couple if they would like to borrow a grandfather, but I never do.

USUALLY THE couples are Caucasian; average-looking Americans; dressed in clothes that are undoubtedly more used to going to church than to the federal courthouse. The children are also in their Sunday best.

And the youngest child is always Oriental, probably Vietnamese or Korean. And many times they are waving small American flags.

They are celebrating a grand occasion. Just a few minutes earlier, inside a courtroom, the child became an American citizen.

No one in the clumps can stop smiling. Neither can I, passing by. I'd like to talk to the parents and grandparents of the new citizen, but I don't want to intrude on a family moment. I'd like to tell the parents how much I admire them. I'd like to tell the child how lucky he or she is to have been adopted and brought to this country by these marvelous people.

At no small cost of money, energy and emotion, they are giving a loving home to a child of another race who really needed it. They don't want applause. They think they are the lucky ones, to have a chance to love a child who otherwise might never have been loved.

Our culture makes heroes out of athletes and actors who don't deserve the adulation. Those adoptive parents are real heroes. It makes me feel very happy to see them and their new citizen laughing, taking snapshots and waving flags in front of the U.S. Courthouse.

AS FOR WHAT makes me feel very sad: Almost every day I used to see the elderly, white-haired couple walking in the neighborhood, always holding hands. When they walked downtown to lunch, or across the street to the supermarket, or around the park for exercise, they held hands. I never saw one without the other. I used to watch them and tell myself I should hold my wife's hand more often.

Last week I saw him twice, walking to the store, walking alone. His wife died.

During the past year or so, in my neighborhood, three elderly, loving couples have been split by death. I see the surviving spouse, walking alone, and I feel very sad.

I'm not sure why I wrote all this stuff. Probably I intended to make some meaningful connection between the new citizen-child at the beginning of life, and the old man, nearing the end of life, without his wife's hand to hold. Probably I wanted to make a comy point about what's really important - what's really happy and really sad. About loving and appreciating each other while we can, and to hell with the Iran-contra affair.

A poet would have done a much better job, but newspaper writing is all I can do.

Korea revisited: Vietnam vet notes changes

Twenty years ago, it was said that one could smell Seoul, South Korea, 100 miles out to sea, according to Tom McCloskey.

Fresh from a trip to the northeast Asian nation with a group of martial arts students, the Independence Township resident said Seoul has undergone remarkable changes since he was last there.

No longer is the city suffering under the putrid smells of a undeveloped sewer system—everything has been replaced with modern equipment, he said.

"It's remarkable. Everything is spotlessly clean,"

said McCloskey, a Vietnam veteran who returned to Seoul precisely 20 years and five days after he left.

McCloskey was a staff sergeant in the Air Force and spent four years in combat.

The Seoul that McCloskey remembered was one filled with prostitutes, dirt roads and open sewers. The 1987 version of the city caught him by surprise.

"I had to remind myself that I was in the same city," said McCloskey, who works for State Farm Insurance.

McCloskey had the opportunity to return to Seoul with a few members from Joe Sanders Martial Arts School in Clarkston. Reese Vogel, 14, Mark Fry, 16, Ian McCloskey, 11, and Sanders, 47, were the

other Clarkston area residents.

They were part of a 70-person group to visit the host nation for the 1988 Summer Olympic Games.

The trip was an eye-opening experience for McCloskey in more ways than one.

He has taken economic and financial services courses at Wayne State and the University of Oklahoma in the past, which, he said, gave him perspective on South Korea's growth.

While things were not completely perfect in Seoul—the student riots for freedom disrupted the quiet setting—the city still has made great strides to improve the standard of living for its inhabitants during the past two decades, McCloskey said.

Things like a good public transportation system and hardly any street crime place Seoul a step above American cities like Detroit, he said.

When comparing the two cities, McCloskey said they have practically swapped positions during the past 20 years.

Seoul has been on an upswing with its urban renewal program that has made the city a remarkable place to visit, he said.

"It was an extremely modern city and that was fascinating to me," said McCloskey.

While on the eight-day excursion, McCloskey went on a tour of a steel plant and discovered something unusual.

Some of the Coca-Cola cans the South Koreans use are still made out of steel as they were in the states many years ago. Others are made out of aluminum.

Because the city looked so different, it caused McCloskey to wonder how the government was able to rebuild the city without a lot of capital funds.

He finally figured out that the incredible change was made possible with help from the United States, McCloskey said.

Since America handles the military protection for the nation, the government can funnel all of its money into urban renewal, and the result has made Seoul a new city, said McCloskey.

"The change is hard to believe," he said. "It's just incredible."

Springfield drops new anti-blight ordinance

Ordinance 54—a new anti-blight ordinance in the works for Springfield Township—died an agonizing death during a special meeting June 30 at the Springfield Oaks Activities Center.

Under pressure from a very anti, anti-blight ordinance crowd of citizens, the Springfield Township Board voted 6-0 to kill the ordinance, which never made it to second reading. Trustee William Whitley was not present at the meeting.

"We killed the ordinance in the form it was before us," said Supervisor Colin Walls, explaining that it does not mean there is no anti-blight ordinance in Springfield Township.

The anti-blight ordinance currently on the books needs clarification, Walls said. "It has problems."

"We started out to come up with something clearer (with the new ordinance)," said Walls. "But we didn't intend to create a furor."

A group of citizens at the meeting who felt the township needed something better in the form of an anti-blight ordinance volunteered to look at the current ordinance and make suggestions to modify it, according to Walls.

The new ordinance met resistance when it came up for first reading at the April township board meeting and it was referred to the township attorney to completely redraft.

The ordinance had gone through many revisions, with the involvement of the planning commission, township board, current and previous ordinance officers, township attorney, planner and several members of the public.

Citizens had a problem with the definition of blight and with interpretation of the ordinance, Walls said, and the issue of farm equipment was one area of concern among citizens.

"It was the feeling of the people that the new ordinance required buildings to store everything in, but that wasn't really in there," he said.

"Basically, the ordinance said if a vehicle is licensable, it needed to be licensed and operable, and if it wasn't, then it should be in a building or screened," he said.

Snowmobiles and boats are licensable. Farm implements are not, so they would not be required to be in a building, Walls said.

"There are advantages to living in this rural setting," said Barbara Burge, a Springfield Township resident whose husband attended the special meeting. "Many people don't want the kind of rules and regulations that more populated areas have."

The special meeting was called because "it very quickly became apparent that the interest was greater than anticipated and we wanted to get a handle on it as quickly as possible," Walls said.

"We tried to point out last Tuesday night that we as a township board didn't like it (the language of the new ordinance) as better than the public did," he said. "Even though we needed some reasonable, clearer definition, there were some (at the meeting) who wouldn't accept anything."

Dan DeLongchamp is happy when he's working.

A 14-year member of the Independence Township Fire Department, Dan also works part time for Fleet Ambulance. His field suits him perfectly, he said.

"It's a good job to be in," he said. "I like it very much."

The ability to help people is one aspect of his job he finds especially rewarding.

"It's always people who are in an emergency situation," he said. "It's a good feeling knowing you can help them."

Born and raised in Clarkston, Dan now lives in Sylvan Lake with his wife Michele and his stepdaughter Nicole, 6.

"We're kind of the Three Musketeers," he said. "We do everything together."

"I enjoy life," he said. "From the medical point of view, you've got to enjoy life because it's so quick. I've seen a lot of people who have retired a week before they died."

So Dan chose a job that would make him happy.

"An ounce of laughter is worth a pound of cure, and it's true. If you can have a good attitude, you'll have a good life," Dan said.

But fighting fires and tending emergencies are often sobering work.

"Every run is different. It's a challenge," he said. "I was 18 years old when I lost my first CPR patient. . . . It was a strange feeling. All of a sudden they're gone. . . . It brings you closer to God. I'm not really religious, but when your time comes, you're gone."

"It brought me closer to my parents," he said, adding his parents now divide their time between Florida and Michigan.

"The only bad thing is on house fires," said

Dan. "You've never been in the house before, so you don't know the layout. They're full of smoke, and you're wearing an air mask, and you can't see your way around."

"You don't think about how can you handle it. You just get there and do it."

Dan tries to leave work thoughts at work and to enjoy his time at home with his family, he said.

Postmaster in Philadelphia

Clarkston's postmaster William O. Kinsley II was one of about 25 people selected from across the nation to participate in a postal services national headquarters project in Philadelphia, Pa.

The three-month project designed to streamline mail sorting began at the end of April.

"It was nice," he said about the opportunity. "It's a good feeling after working in the post office 20 years to get that recognition."

While Kinsley is on leave until July 31, Anita Riggens is the officer in charge of the Clarkston Post Office. She is a retail service officer from the Royal Oak office.

The new sorting system breaks down mail by route using an electronic machine. Under the current system, mail is delivered from Royal Oak to the Clarkston post office where it is sorted into routes beginning at about 3:30 a.m. The mail carriers then break down their routes by street addresses.

Under the new system, about 40 percent of the mail would arrive from Royal Oak sorted by route.

"It's not going to take away jobs or eliminate people. It's just going to handle the growth," Kinsley said.

The United States Postal Service predicts an increase from the present 153 billion pieces of mail nationwide annually to 226 billion pieces by the mid-1990s, he said.

The Clarkston post office handles mail with Clarkston and some Waterford addresses. The local growth rate of 12 percent more mail annually is higher than the national average of 5 percent.

Kinsley's work in Philadelphia involves observing carriers and clerks and working out problems that may occur with the sorting system.

"It's been well-received by the employees in Philadelphia," he said. "It makes their job easier and keeps the post office more efficient in the future by keeping operating costs down."

The postal service has been funded entirely by its stamp revenue since 1971 and continues to be the least expensive for consumers in the industrialized world, Kinsley said.

"It's amazing to get a bird's-eye view of all the ideas, plans and development in the future to service customers, improve services and compete with some of the other mail services," he said. "It's nice to know these people are on our side."

CHS grad in international meet

Budapest next hurdle for Farough

If it weren't for the persistence of a former coach, Jennifer Farough might have ended up just an average college track athlete.

But as it turned out, Sashabaw girls track coach Chris Krueger's decision to turn Farough into a hurdler made her a champion.

Farough, who graduated from Clarkston High School in 1986, captured the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Conference hurdles championship in her freshman year at Hillsdale College.

She finished second in her district as well, before falling down in the nationals.

Now, Farough is headed for the biggest challenge of her athletic career. She was invited to participate in a Eastern Bloc track meet in Budapest, Hungary, this week.

Student athletes were chosen for the United States team by a panel of coaches, based on present and past performances. Farough was one of 56 selected to compete from Michigan.

The United States, along with 10 Eastern Bloc nations, will send their best athletes to the event, and it will give Farough an excellent opportunity to evaluate her skill level.

"I've wanted to go to the Olympics since I was in the seventh grade and this (meet) will tell me if it's something worth pursuing," said Farough, a biology major at Hillsdale.

The Clarkston Boosters Club helped raise the money to send Farough to the international meet. The club also provided her with sweat shirts and pants with Clarkston emblems so she can trade with her competitors at the meet.

"If you ever see a Russian wearing a Clarkston sweat shirt, you'll know Jennifer was there," joked Dwight Spiker, president of the Boosters Club.

The international track meet begins Saturday and Farough will compete in the 100-meter and 400-meter hurdles. That's about all she knows about her trip. She won't find out the details until she arrives in Hungary.

Farough became interested in track during the seventh grade—especially the running events. Only through Krueger's persistence did she switch to the hurdles. It's a move she hasn't regretted.

"If I would have stayed a sprinter, I probably couldn't be doing as well as I am now," said Farough. Now, I'm glad he (Krueger) made me do it."

She was Oakland County champion three years running as a hurdler for the Wolves. On top of that, Farough participated on the ski team and was a member of the National Honor Society for two years.

During her three years in a Clarkston uniform, Farough worked hard to become an award-winning hurdler and her efforts didn't go unnoticed by her high school coach.

"She has accomplished a lot on her own," said Gordie Richardson, coach of the girls track team at CHS.

Farough attended track camps during the off-season to improve her skills, said Richardson.

After graduation from Clarkston High School, Farough moved out to Arizona with her parents.

When it came time to pick a college, the University of Michigan and Hillsdale were her top two choices.

The reason behind her decision to return to Michigan was simple—she likes the weather.

More specifically, she likes seeing the seasons change; something one doesn't experience too often in the desert heat of Arizona. That's the main reason she plans to make Michigan her permanent home some day, she said.

As if on cue, the threatening clouds above cut loose with a torrential burst and quickly drenched everything in sight, as Farough headed for cover.

"You gotta love this," she said with a smile.

DeRoseau said the uniforms were bought from money the members raised through charity events in the village.

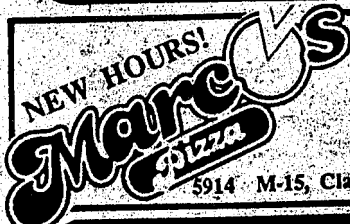


HIGH FIVE: Sue Cohoon practices spiking the ball during a volleyball camp at the high school last week. Forty-eight students participated.

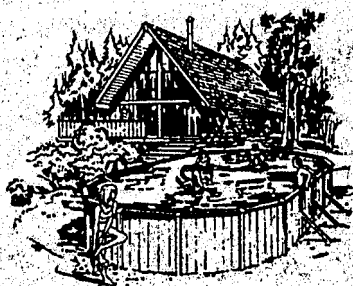

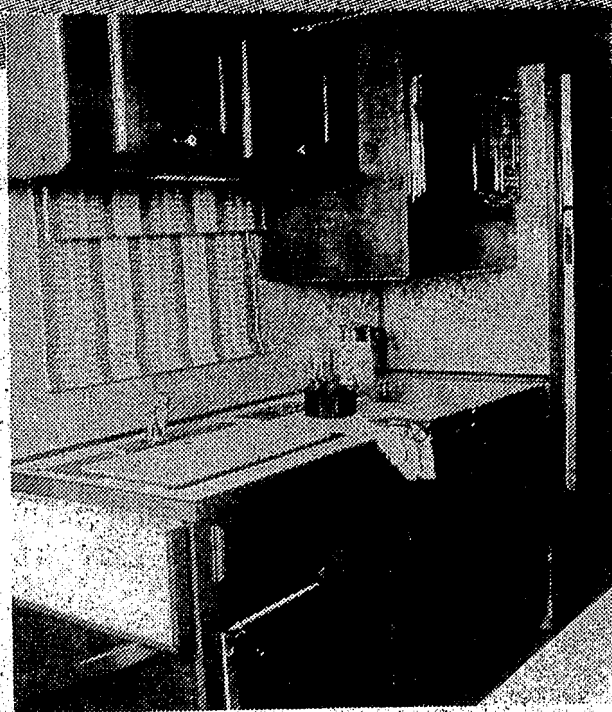

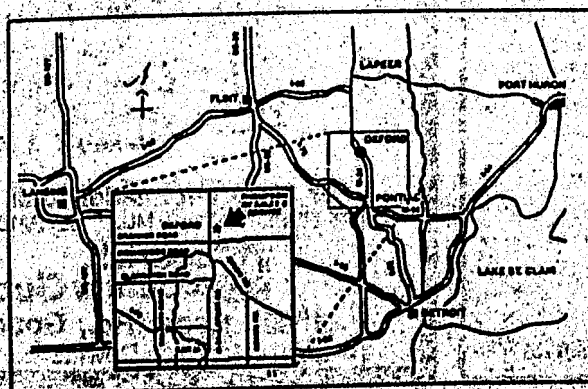

Who's in charge?

The announcement of the loss of Paul Tungate as the full-time athletic director of Clarkston schools makes me wonder what will happen to the Wolves in the future.

When residents rejected the recent millage increase, it placed the school system in a financial bind. Staff numbers were reduced, so people were shifted around.

To fill a void, Tungate was moved out of his position as athletic director and handed the post of assistant principal at Sashabaw Junior High during a June 30 school board meeting.

This is a nearsighted decision, one that should be reversed immediately by the school board.

Athletics without a director would be like letting a child get dressed for school without supervision. It's possible, but the results won't always be coordinated.

We need to keep a strong athletic program here to help our student body develop completely. Having a full-time athletic director is a big part of that.

Sports play an important part of a teenager's development for many reasons.

If students aren't competing, they are attending games to socialize and relax. It's a positive way to release the energy they build up.

Athletes build a strong and lasting bond of friendship through sports, as anyone who has ever participated in a sport knows.

But there is a lot of work to do behind the scenes before any of these events start. That's where the athletic director fits in.

An athletic director's duties include scheduling games for the high school and two junior highs (about 625 games), arranging transportation (500-600 bus trips a year), hiring coaches (55 are on staff) and evaluating their performance at the end of each year. Tungate also was in charge of hiring officials for all the games.

At the high school level, about 30 percent of the students participate in sports. When spectators are included, more than 50 percent of the students are involved in athletics.

As athletic director, Tungate oversaw approximately 478 students at the high school level and another 598 at the two junior high schools this past year.

Sporting events occurred on 79 nights and 12 Saturdays throughout the year.

Not having a full-time athletic director on staff will cause lots of confusion since the people taking over will be inexperienced. The same type of problem has caused the decline of the Pontiac school system's sports program.

Who knows what kind of adverse affect that could have on Clarkston's future star athletes?

Former students like pro-basketball player Tim McCormick and past and present pro-baseball players Tim Birtsas and Dan Fife are examples of what Clarkston area kids can accomplish with the proper guidance.

The area has no shortage of kids wanting to participate in sports. For example, 156 turned out for a basketball camp and another 48 showed up for a volleyball camp during the past few weeks.

Eliminating a full-time athletic director from the program will not help students at all.

Once things start getting disorganized, people will get frustrated and begin to lose interest in the sports program.

Just setting up transportation might become a major headache with teams traveling across the county at the same time for various events. Some buses might be late, some might not show and so on. After a while students might say, "Why go through the hassle?"

From there, it's all downhill.

There still is time to rectify the situation.

Money shortages or not, the Wolves deserve a full-time athletic director. But the only way they will get one is if the millage passes.

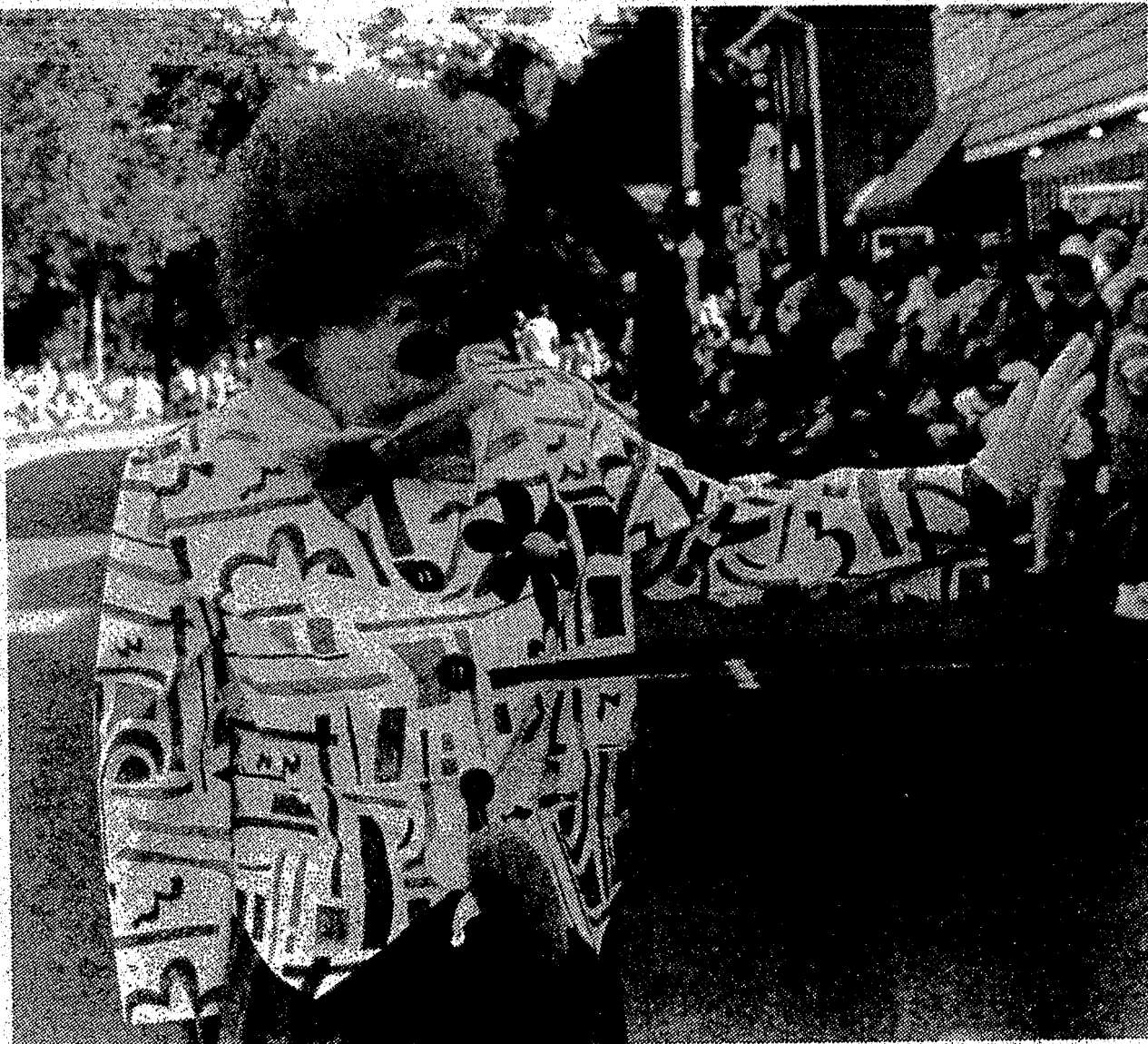

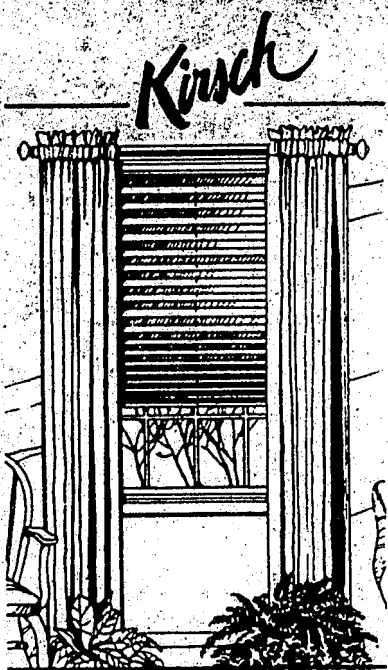
A 24-year-old Fenton woman was injured Wednesday when she lost control of her car on Maybee Road, Independence Township.

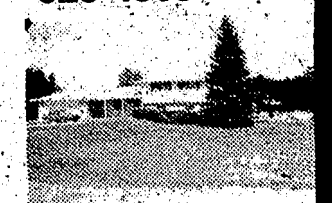

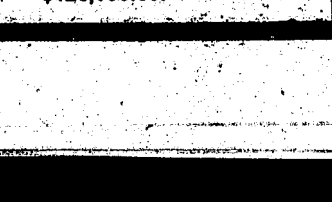

Growing pains:

Planners share philosophy on Independence's growth

While the planning commission members have different backgrounds and different ideas, they all agree that growth in Independence Township is inevitable and they hope to ensure quality development.

"There's probably not a whole lot we can do about the growth," said Chairperson Joseph Figa, a commission member for over two years.

"We can control the type of development that takes place to ensure that it fits in with the philosophy of the community," he said, adding development should match the quality and meet the needs of the community.

"I always consider progress not just a lot of development but . . . the quality of life for everybody," he said.

The members of the commission have expertise in different areas and are doing a good job, he said.

"We have a nice cross-section of the community here," said Figa.

A landscape architect, Figa is chief of design and development for the Oakland County Parks and Recreation Department.

Carol Balzarini, commission member and township board member since 1983, takes the growth in stride.

"I don't think we want to stop it," she said. "It's a little overwhelming. When the economy is down, you tend to forget about it."

It seemed sudden, but it should have been expected, Balzarini said, adding there's not only one way to control it.

"There are so many factors," she said. "I'm hoping our zoning ordinance is tough enough to control it, and I'm hoping the way property is zoned . . . and as tough as we have a reputation of being will control it."

Commission member Brent Bair, director of planning and development at Oakland County Road Commission and member of the township zoning board of appeals, said growth is predicted in many ways.

Over a year ago, the planning commission and township Economic Development Corporation started a study of potential growth areas, he said.

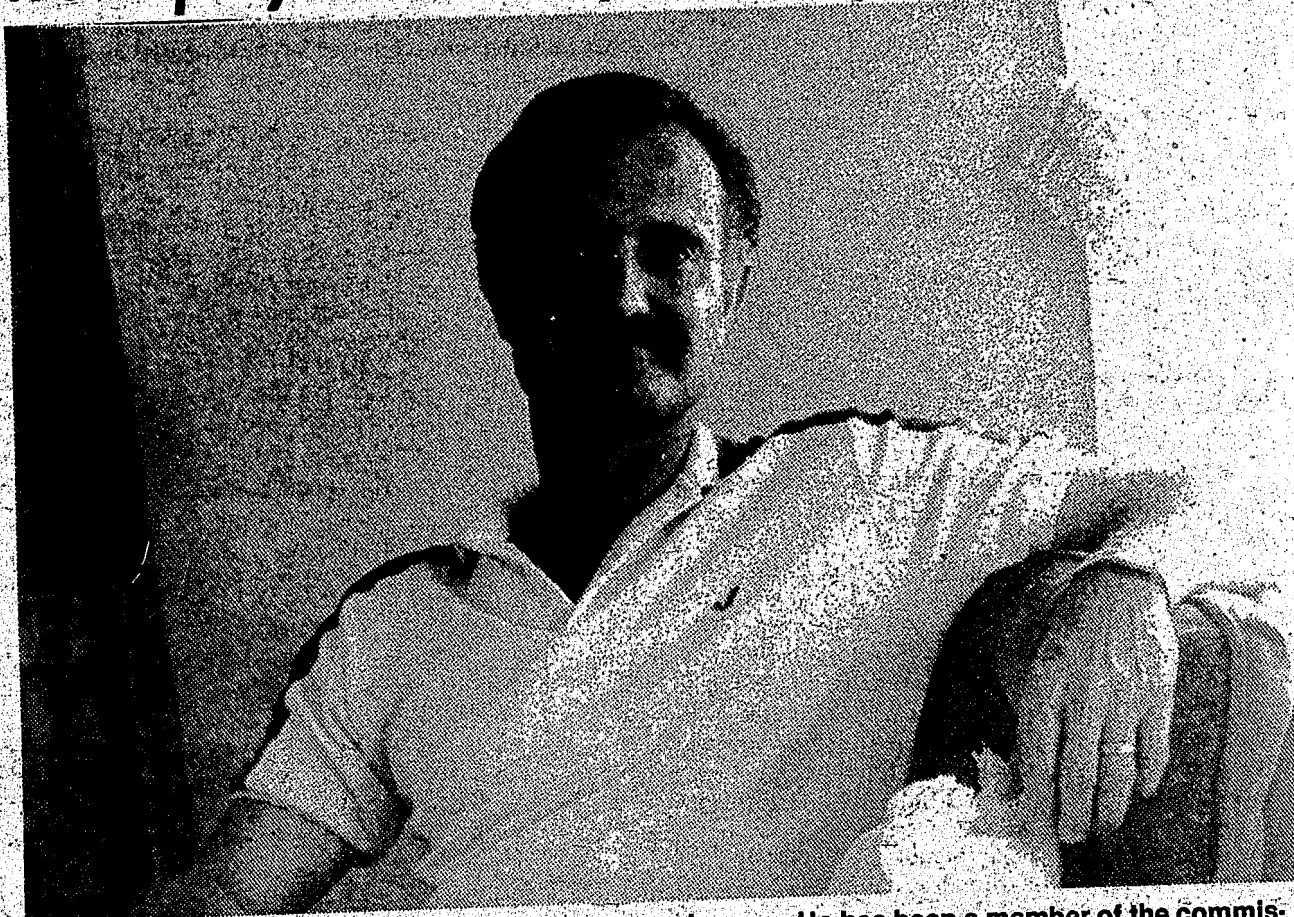
With the help of township planner Richard Carlisle, they consulted the county road commission, Detroit Edison, Michigan Bell and Consumers Power.

In the end, they found two growth constraints: roads and sewer capacity, Bair said.

"The bottom line: I think there will be some proposals from the planning commission for rezoning," he said.

Along the Sashabaw corridor, high tech and research office would be best for the non-residential area, he said.

"It looks like it would be an ideal place," said Bair, citing the I-75 interchange and vacant

developable land with little residential in the surroundings.

The planning commission hasn't made formal recommendations yet, but they're working on it, he said.

Richard Oppmann, a seven-month commission member, wetlands board chairman and powertrain product planner for Pontiac Motors, sees growth in the community mainly in the residential area.

"I think we're going to see a continued high rate of growth, mainly due to the development of the M-59 corridor and the I-75 corridor north," he said.

As I-75 fills in between Detroit and Flint, the township will continue to be a bedroom community in which most residents work elsewhere, he said.

Right now, it's in the transition phase from a rural to a busy community, Oppmann said.

Maintaining the best features of Independence Township is one goal of the planning commission, he

said.

"We've got to keep a very alive master plan—that document that allows you to allocate certain parts of the township to certain zonings," he said.

"If you have a plan and you stick to it, you can do a good job. We can't do haphazard or spot zoning," said Oppmann.

Jo Fussman, a commission member for one-and-a-half years, said the Auburn Hills growth is affecting the township.

To preserve the township's quality, the major commercial area should be in the southern end of the township, and the north end should remain as rural as possible, she said.

The planning commission is trying to make sure the growth is orderly and reasonable, said Fussman.

"Everybody wants to come in and shut the door after they're here, and you just can't do that," she said.

High growth expected for Sashabaw Road

The Sashabaw corridor will probably be the center of growth in Independence Township, according to Richard Carlisle, township planner.

In his six years as planner, Carlisle's duties have included assisting the community in reviewing current planning proposals and assisting with the development of long-range plans.

The Sashabaw Road area plays an important role in the township's future, said Carlisle.

"By concentrating growth in the Sashabaw area, we can keep pressure off the residential areas," he said.

With few residential zonings nearby and with access to I-75, vacant land and the potential for sewer and water, "all the elements are in place on Sashabaw Road," said Carlisle.

Office, research and light industrial are planned for Sashabaw, he said, and the remaining property in the township should retain its present residential bedroom community atmosphere.

Residents can also expect moderate growth of multiple housing in the Sashabaw area, he said.

On White Lake Road, more space is available for light industry, he said. On Dixie Highway, there's not much room for more development.

Certain measures would help the township meet

the growth and improve the township, said Carlisle.

Sashabaw Road should be improved and the utilities should be expanded, he said.

"And I think we have to spend some time restoring some existing commercial on Dixie and M-15," he said, adding White Lake Road should be upgraded. "We have to continue to press on to solve our existing problems."

Curb cuts should be consolidated, landscaping and building exteriors should be improved, parking areas should be paved and new signs should be erected, he said.

The planning commission has useful tools to guide the development, he said, mentioning the landscaping ordinance as well as the planned unit zoning—"an excellent tool for the community to control the type of growth."

The planning commission is also responsible for keeping the master plan up to date.

"The master plan is a dynamic process in the development of the township," he said. "This community is in a very good position to have high-quality development."

Commissioners support 7 members

While five members comprise the Independence Township Planning Commission, most of them think seven is the ideal number.

"It's functioning sufficiently at five, but it would be nice to have a couple of more members to get a better cross-section of the community and to spread the work out a little," said Chairperson Joseph Figa.

Nine is the maximum allowed by law; five the minimum. The planning commission operated with seven members until January, when they dropped to five due to a disagreement on appointees between township Supervisor Frank Ronk and the township board.

The supervisor recommends appointments to commission and the board votes to approve or disapprove.

"Seven is a fairly good number," said Figa. "Nine could become a little more restrictive. I work with a 10-member commission at the (Oakland County) park commission. The meetings are a little longer, but you get more innovative ideas."

Right now, the planning commission members are all busy, said Figa, adding, "They're doing an excellent job."

"It comes in spurts," he said. "When the economy is good, development is good."

In the slower times, the commission can return to other projects, he said. In past slow times, a sign ordinance and landscape ordinance were established.

But still, seven would be a better number, he said.

"It's a big responsibility for five people because what we do now affects the community for a few years.

A lot of people don't realize what we could have had," said Figa.

Jo Fussman, Brent Bair and Carol Balzarini also favored seven members.

Balzarini, also a township trustee, commented on the inability of the township board to agree upon an appointment with Ronk.

"I think what bothers me most about the stand-off is the appointments are appropriately the supervisor's. We don't have to agree, but they're his to make. I think the situation now is inappropriate," she said.

Richard Oppmann preferred five members and added the meetings were more efficiently run with five.

"I think five people do a good job on the commission. . . . You can generally cover all the viewpoints with five. . . . We have a fairly well-rounded group, too," he said.

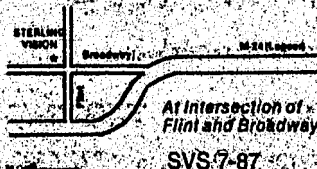

Mildred Ham has more than a casual interest in political issues, but she's not a politician.

Rather, Millie is a member of the League of Women Voters, a long-standing national organization which not only serves as a government watchdog but strives to educate citizens to be more aware of the political process.

Millie was elected vice president of the League of Women Voters of Michigan when the organization convened in Lansing for its biennial convention in June.

She has already served a two-year term as state membership director. In her new position, she will be

responsible for organizational matters: field service, voter service, development (fundraising) and membership.

As an active member of the League of Women Voters of Troy, she has served in numerous local capacities as well, including president and currently, as secretary. She also served as chairman of the local arrangements committee for League's national convention in Detroit in 1984.

"There are so many areas of the League that are interesting and challenging," Millie says of the organization she describes as "one of the most highly respected, nonpartisan advocacy organizations in the country."

There are two aspects of the League, she explains. There is citizen education, including voter service, voter guides and candidate forums, all nonpartisan.

The other aspect is support or opposition to issues after thorough study and membership agreement. They study an issue, adopt a position and will work to effect a change.

"We're a grass-roots organization of members who look at local, state and national affairs and are actively involved," she says.

Two new study areas were adopted at the state convention, the library system and prisons.

"If I had time, I would be involved in the library issue," Millie says. "Libraries are so fundamental, so

important. And the funding mechanisms vary tremendously. There is no set pattern, no equity for funding."

Millie is optimistic that, as the League spreads its membership base, more and more people will get involved. The League is open to any citizen 18 years and older, men or women, of any race and any background.

"More and more retirees are getting involved," she says. "And we are trying to make contact with more young people and college students. I feel it's a good opportunity for all people."

Millie got involved in the League of Women Voters about eight or nine years ago while living in

Ohio. She found her interests were changing. Her three children were about grown and she was past the PTA and Scouts stage.

"Some people go back to school," she says, "but I learn something new every day in the League."

The many-faceted organization has a toll-free citizen information number as a public service. People can call 1-800-292-5823 for virtually any information regarding legislation, government, voting information, etc.

Millie lives in Springfield Township with her husband, John, who manages the Oakland Mall J.C. Penney Store. She just returned from a national council of the League in Washington, D.C., where she trained in communications and lobbying and worked on League issues with other delegates from around the country.

The busy volunteer worked briefly when she was first married, for a salary, that is; and she has been working ever since, raising a family and volunteering countless hours of her time for causes she believes in. "I enjoy being a volunteer," she says, though she expresses concern that the volunteer is a diminishing resource in this country.

One of Millie's favorite volunteer jobs when she lived in Ohio was serving as a guide for Cuyahoga Valley National Park, taking school groups on tours.

In this area, she says one of her most rewarding jobs is delivering meals to homebound elderly people in the community. She is currently the only volunteer who delivers meals through the county homebound meal program, which operates out of the Independence Township Senior Citizen Center.

She is also finance director for the coalition of Detroit Metropolitan Area Leagues and participates in her church.

"You can make time for things that are important," she says.

Giving new life to an old cliché she adds, "You can make a difference!"

Clarkston branch possible

The closest League of Women Voters organization is in Troy or Rochester, but Mildred Ham, secretary of the Troy group, is excited about the prospects of a Clarkston area group.

Ham, an Independence Township resident who is also vice president of the Michigan League of Women Voters, said, "There are several people in the area who are interested in starting a League of Women Voters in Clarkston."

"People who are interested could contact me and we could have an organizational meeting," she said.

Ham can be contacted at her home, 625-5486, usually early in the day or in the evening.

The League of Women Voters, a national non-

partisan organization formed in 1920, strives to promote political responsibility through informed and active participation of citizens in government.

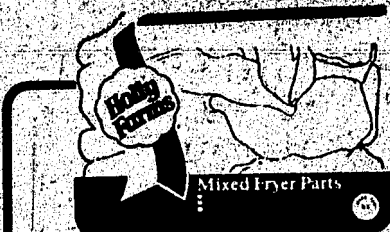
Membership is open to all citizens 18 years and older. Men have been welcome in the group since 1974.

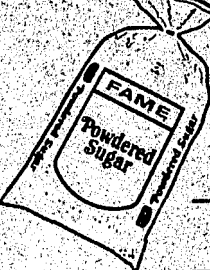

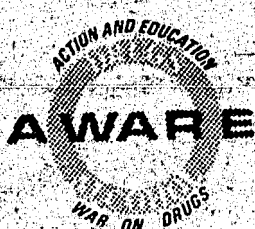

Building communication skills



Dear Friend to Friend:

We would like to share our week-long experiences at the Michigan Teenage Institute (MTI) at Michigan State University.

First, maybe we should explain what MTI is. It is a conference for teenagers (with an adult sponsor) that helps us get in touch with our feelings surrounding important issues such as motivation, communication, sexuality and drugs including alcohol.

It provides the opportunity to develop leadership skills so that when we return to school we can develop programs that can make a positive difference in the abuse of drugs among our peers.

MTI is made up of students from all over the state. We feel that we have met friends who will have an impact upon our lives.

We had mixed emotions about taking a week out of our summer to attend this conference. Arriving on Sunday, we found much confusion with all of the hundreds of new faces.

Even though there were five of us, we were separated in our dorms and in the group sessions. After a day of happy smiles and warm personalities, we felt comfortable in the new atmosphere that we were going to live in for a week.

After an early breakfast, we attended a series of workshops beginning with "Developing Communication Skills."

This skill builder helped us develop tactful listening skills. It enabled us to make others feel comfortable in talking. It also developed the skill of being able to clarify the "real" meaning behind what we are saying.

Another component of MTI was our family groups. In these groups, we became aware of the many different feelings a family can have.

This group also provided us with the opportunity to share experiences. One of the main ideas of the group was to develop trust and take emotional risks in a caring atmosphere.

We utilized our skill building and family group skills by applying them to our team training group, made up of members from four school districts.

We exchanged ideas and developed problem solving techniques to implement in our school. Through different activities, a plan of attack was created to adjust the feelings of acquiescence toward drugs.

Besides all the work that went into MTI, we also developed lasting relationships with people from all over the state.

The MSU campus was open to us for varied recreational activities such as canoeing, yoga, belly dancing, etc. These alternatives were to instruct us about other things to do instead of abusing substances.

We also learned to have authentic highs.

In closing, we would like to thank the Clarkston Area Chemical People, our student government, Dr. Robert Burek, the school district and especially Katie MacKay for all of her support.

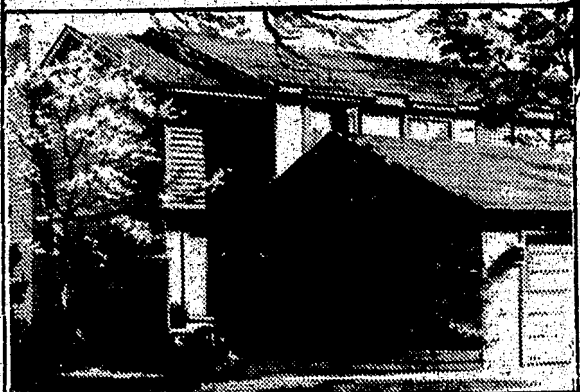

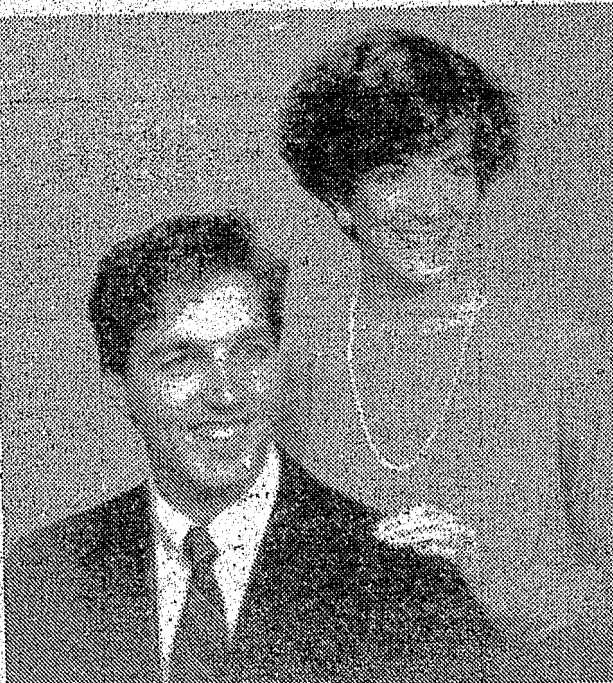

The dreaded APTES

Question: What disease guarantees by age 17 more gray hair than your grandmother, creates thoughts of long and painful suicide, and gives you a reason to either love or hate the mailman?

In a time when everybody is worried about one particular disease with an abbreviated name, I'll give you another to think about.

It is a disease almost all college-bound students face, and not by choice. This disease is contracted by coming in contact with the highly contagious SAT or equally contagious ACT viruses.

Once the victim is exposed, there is no going back. Yes, this person has a case of the APTES (Aptitude Tests).

Microwave-plus

Grill now, eat later

What better place is there to be in the summer than north Oakland County? There are many lakes and parks for summer activities.

After a day of fun in the sun, many of us enjoy a barbecue in our own back yards. Let your microwave oven assist with the cooking even though you enjoy cooking and eating outdoors.

LEMON MARINATED CHUCK

—from a Whirlpool microwave cookbook.
2½ to 3 pounds beef chuck roast, cut 1½ inch thick
1 teaspoon grated lemon peel
½ cup lemon juice
¼ cup cooking oil
2 tablespoons chopped onion
1 tablespoon sugar
1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
1 teaspoon Dijon-style mustard
1½ teaspoons salt
1/8 teaspoon pepper

Score fat edges of meat. Place in 12-by-7½-by-2 inch microwavable baking dish, trimming meat to fit dish, if necessary. Combine remaining ingredients. Pour over meat.

Cover; refrigerate 12 hours or overnight, turning meat several times. Cook meat in marinade, covered, at high for 15 to 20 minutes, turning once.

Transfer meat to barbecue grill. Save marinade. Grill over medium-hot coals about 5 minutes on each side for rare to medium-rare. Brush often with marinade.

To serve, slice thinly across grain. Makes 4-6 serving.

If the weather refuses to cooperate with your picnic plans, try the following:

RAINY DAY CHARCOAL BURGERS

—recipe courtesy of Whirlpool Corp.

2 pounds ground beef
Pepper and seasonings
Hamburger buns
Trimnings (see below)

Shape meat into eight ¾ inch patties. Grill over hot coals for 5 to 6 minutes. Turn and sprinkle with seasonings. Grill 5 to 7 minutes or until desired doneness. Chill. Wrap each patty in moisture-vaporproof wrap. Seal, label and freeze.

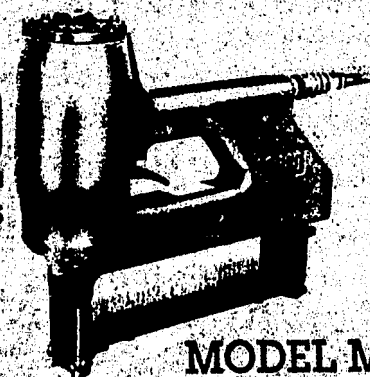

Chicken salad fit for summertime feasting

"Young at Heart" senior citizens in Springfield Township observed an oriental salad making demonstration and then had the opportunity to taste the results.

Nancy Tilley, an Independence Township resident and culinary arts graduate, gave the demonstration when the Springfield seniors met last Thursday at the Springfield Oaks Activities Center.

She demonstrated not only the salad making technique, but a way to combine it with another summer favorite—grilling.

The "Mandarin Chicken Salad," which everyone at the luncheon following the demonstration judged delicious, can be prepared with chicken grilled on the outdoor barbecue. The recipe for Tilley's salad follows this story.

Tilley was "discovered" by a Springfield Township employee when she brought her oriental salad to a Scouting pot luck dinner and was asked to present a program to the Springfield seniors.

But Tilley's cooking has been known in the Clarkston area for a long time. She had been decorating cakes for years when she decided to expand her career.

"I always promised my parents that I would go back to school," she said.

Her parents, from Flushing, her eight children, ages 15 to 31, and her husband, Bob, all participated in the celebration when Tilley graduated from Oakland Community College in June with a degree in culinary arts. She is also close to her degree in food management.

"It was a big commitment to take culinary arts classes," she said, while getting senior citizens started on stringing pea pods and boning chicken breasts. "The classes are all down in Farmington Hills, four days a week, plus support classes."

Tilley also does substitute teaching—of culinary arts classes, of course. And she just started working at a new restaurant in Bloomfield Hills, Mary Ann's Kitchen, as a bakery chef.

"It's been two years of eating my way through school to get to this point," Tilley jokes, while deftly chopping red peppers for the salad.

"This point" for Tilley is a career culminated after she raised her family and an instant demand for her cooking talents.

Looking up from her salad-making task, she

smiles and says, "I had really considered taking the summer off before going to work."

MANDARIN CHICKEN SALAD

- 2-3 halved chicken breasts, boned
- Soy sauce
- 1 head iceberg lettuce
- 1 can mandarin oranges
- 3-4 green onions, sliced
- 1 can or container sliced water chestnuts
- Pea pods
- Bean sprouts
- 3-4 slices bacon
- Won ton wrappers

Marinate chicken breasts in soy sauce for about 10 minutes. Cut up bacon and fry crisp. Drain fat. Cook or grill chicken breasts. Slice thin.

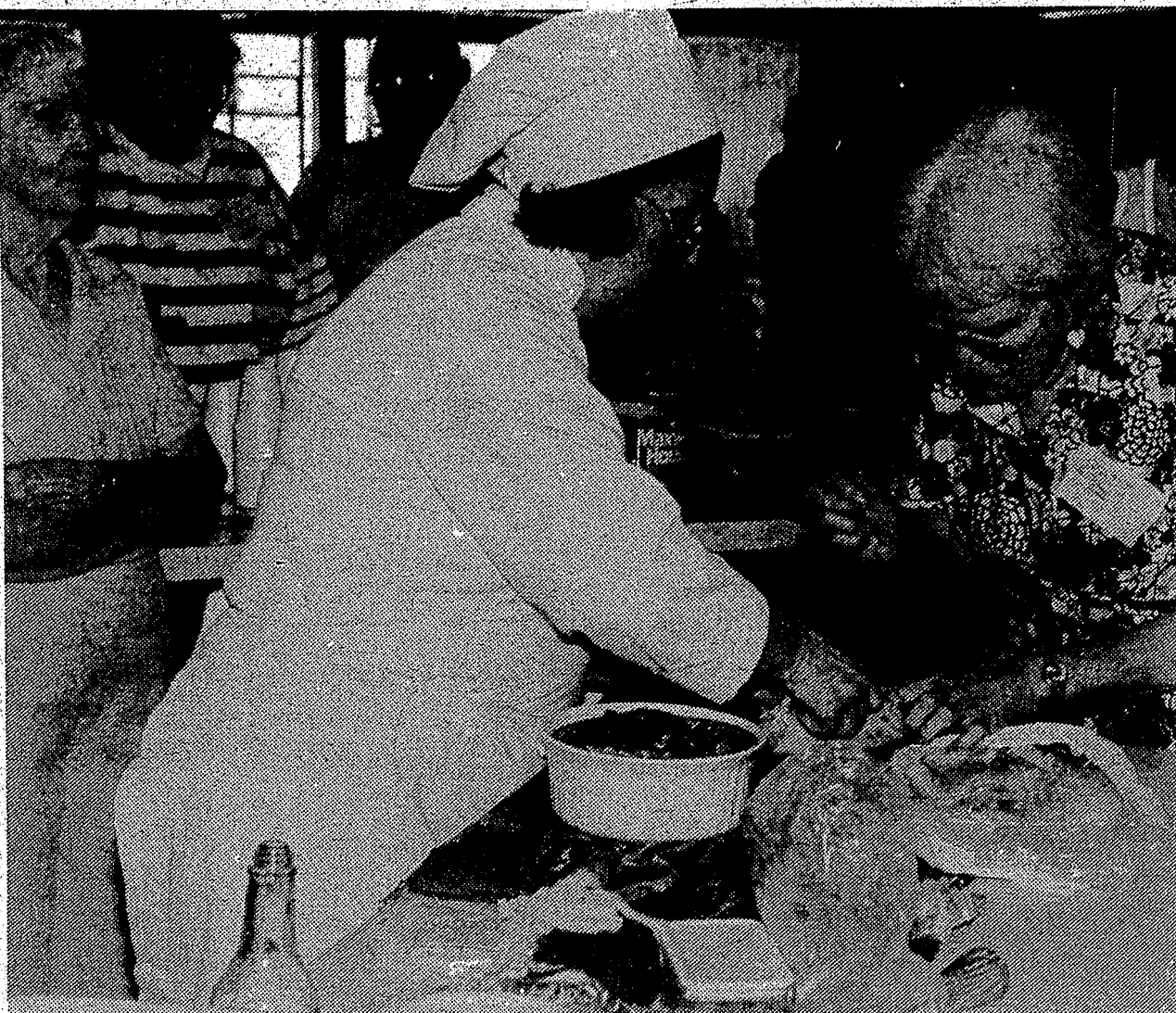
Clean lettuce and green vegetables. Cut up lettuce into bite-size pieces. Slice won ton wrappers into noodle-size pieces and deep fry.

Drain oranges, using juice in dressing, if desired. Toss all ingredients together and top salad with the fried won ton noodles.

DRESSING

- 2/3 cup white vinegar
- 2 teaspoons finely grated onion
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 teaspoons dry mustard
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 2 cups vegetable oil
- 3 tablespoons poppyseed or sesame seeds

Mix first five ingredients until dissolved. Whisk in oil in slow stream. Stir in seeds.

When lightning threatens

July and August are the most dangerous months to be caught outside during thunderstorms.

An average of three people are killed in Michigan by lightning each year and summer incidents are most prevalent.

"Golfers and boaters are especially vulnerable to injury because they are in open spaces and away from buildings," said Oakland County Director of EMS and Emergency Management Gail Christie.

If you are caught outside during a severe storm Christie suggests several rules to follow for safety's sake.

Don't stand under a tall, isolated tree or telephone pole. Stay away from hills and other high areas. If you can get into a trench, ravine or valley do so immediately when you see lightning.

If you are boating, start for shore the moment you see threatening clouds and stay away from your boat and the water.

Lightning is a strong electrical charge in a storm cloud waiting to happen and can strike as far as three miles from the cloud. It's attracted by metal, water or a group of people.

If you're caught in a storm, get away from tractors, golf carts and cycles. Golfers should put down golf clubs and remove metal-cleated shoes.

If you're in a group, have everyone spread out at least several yards apart. Be sure to stay away from wire fences, metal pipes and rails.

If possible get inside a house, building or non-convertible car when weather is threatening.

If you are caught in an open field or prairie and feel your hair stand on end, you are a target for lightning. Drop to the ground and place your hands on your knees. Do not lie flat on the ground.

Persons struck by lightning have received a severe electrical shock and may be burned but do not carry an electrical charge.

Someone who appears to have been killed can often be revived by prompt action and should be treated first.

"The American Red Cross says breathing may be restored with immediate mouth-to-mouth resuscitation, once every five seconds for adults and every three seconds for infants and small children until medical help arrives," Christie said.

Victims who appear only stunned or otherwise unhurt may be in shock or have received serious burns. Do not let these people walk around. Check for burns at the fingers and toes and at any jewelry or metal buckles.

If possible stay with the victims and send someone else for help.

The American Red Cross offers first aid courses for lightning victims and cardiopulmonary resuscitation. Call 334-3575 for more information.

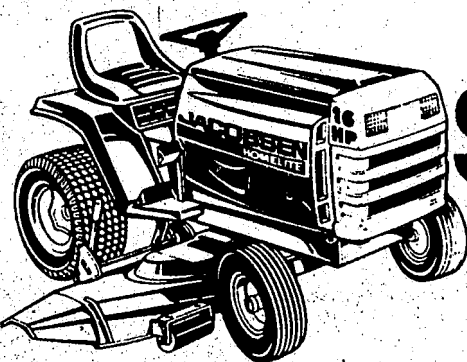

Beware of phone scam

If someone calls from Consumers Power Inc. offering a free trip to Hawaii, hang up.

The scam is designed to obtain Visa and Master Card numbers and it has nothing to do with Consumers Power, the state's largest utility, said Michael Bridges, community services administrator.

"For one thing, it's not good practice to give your Visa or Master Card over the phone to anybody," he said. "Plus, Consumers Power is not in the business to offer vacation trips."

The caller says Consumers Power Inc. is offering a free trip to Hawaii for one person if another trip is purchased at full or reduced price using a credit card.

Other scams in the past involving utility customers have included cash rebates and unneeded furnace replacements. Senior citizens are the most frequent victims.

Consumers Power does not offer cash rebates and

the firm recommends getting a second or third opinion on furnace replacements.

The following guidelines are suggested:

- Do not discuss your personal finances with strangers.
- Do not expect to get something for nothing, especially from strangers.
- Do not draw cash out of a bank at the suggestion of a stranger.
- Do not be too embarrassed to report the fact that you have been victimized or swindled.
- Report all suspicious persons and vehicles to the police.
- Do testify in court, if asked, to stop this kind of crime.
- Check with a friend or relative if you have any doubts.

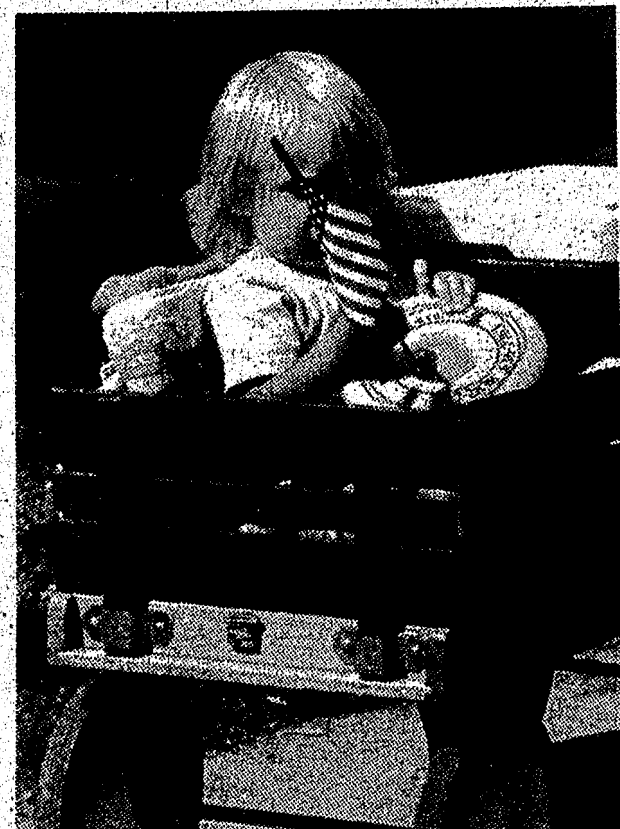

Town clock brings own history

Even though it looks like it could have been there forever, Clarkston's town clock has a past replete with a town squabble, a cross-country ride in a pickup truck and a PTL Club connection.

The story unfolded during the day-long installation July 1 in front of the Pontiac State Bank on Clarkston's Main Street.

Richard Keagle, the clock buff from Lakeland, Fla., who sold the clock to the Independence Township Sesquicentennial Council, shared the tales.

The Seth Thomas street clock came into being in 1909, was sold for \$350 and first adorned a shop front in Dubuque, Iowa.

Some five years later, the clock was sold to a jeweler in Darlington, Wis., where it sat until about a year ago.

The jeweler retired about six years ago and townspeople in Darlington wanted the clock.

"They figured the guy had enough money, he should just donate it," said Keagle, and when negotiations faltered, the man called Keagle and told him to come and get it.

When he removed the clock, he found that the residents "were a little bit upset with the town council," said Keagle, his tone of voice punctuating the understatement.

Keagle, who owns the Wabash Trading Post, a pawn shop in Lakeland, took the clock back to Florida and put an ad in a weekly antique trader publication.

Jon Abbott of Independence Township spotted the ad and suggested that the township sesquicentennial council purchase the clock to fulfill its goal of providing a town clock.

Shortly after Keagle agreed to the purchase terms, representatives of the PTL Club, made famous by Jim and Tammy Bakker, called about purchasing the clock for Heritage USA, the club's theme park.

It was too late, however, and Keagle made the cross-country trip to Clarkston with the 2,250 pound cast iron clock loaded in the back of a pickup truck. He'd never seen Clarkston before, but he was pleased with the clock's new home.

"I think it's pretty neat that they bought it," he said. "They'll have to get some antique street lights to go with it."

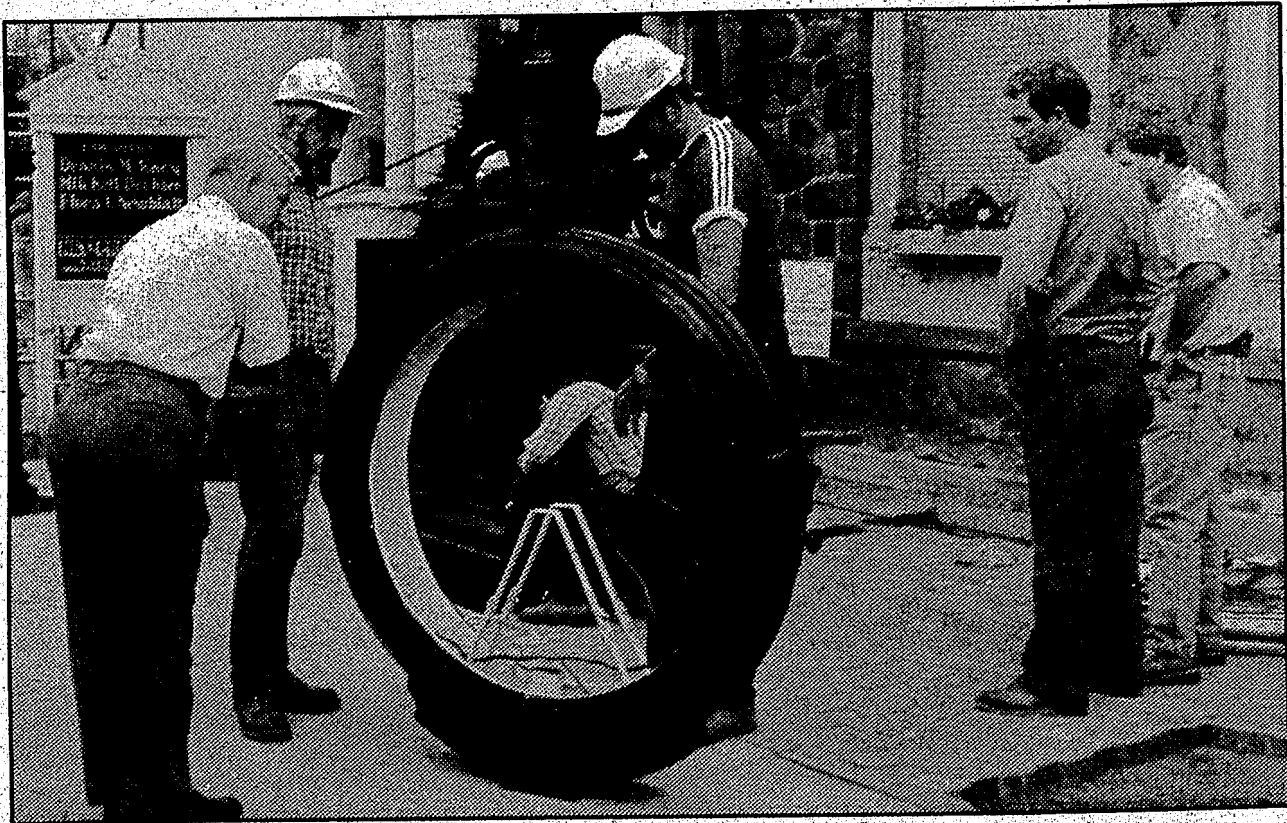
The pendulum-operated clock is driven by an 800 pound weight and it will operate for eight days between windings. Although the Seth Thomas company made about 3,500 tower and street clocks, not many are left, according to Keagle.

"I would say there can't be more than a couple hundred of these in the United States—that's just a guess but they're pretty rare," he said.

The clock sold for \$18,000 plus \$500 for installation. All during 1986, the Independence Township Sesquicentennial Council sold T-shirts, mugs and other souvenirs to raise money for the clock.

This year, private donations provided the remainder of the cash needed with a small amount left over to establish a maintenance fund, said Rita-Burdick, sesquicentennial council member.

"I think it's great, isn't it?" I'm just tickled to death," she said.
