"Grownups will be all done with work. The world will be cleaner. Probably the world's going to change and stuff. It will look different," she said.



## Tire pile may be hazardous

Against the township zoning ordinance and against the fire code, about 600,000 tires are piled on a site off White Lake Road, Independence Township.

The vacant lot, northwest of White Lake Road behind the Depot Theatre, is zoned suburban residential, so the storage of tires is not allowed, said township building inspector Derek Place.

The fire code also prohibits it, said Gordon Mason, assistant fire chief.

"It's a fire hazard," he said. "There's so many tires there, it's totally uncontrollable."

Tires are not allowed to be burned because they produce toxic fumes, and they pollute the air, said Mason.

# Township rezones parcel despite objection

Against the owner's wishes, the Independence Township Board approved the first reading to rezone 20 acres on Sashabaw Road to research office from rural residential and commercial.

Before the vote at the Sept. 1 meeting, township planning consultant Richard Carlisle outlined the proposal.

Originally, the owner, Sharon Alexander, asked to rezone a portion of the rural residential to research office and a portion to office, and to leave the commercial portion commercial at the southeast corner of Sashabaw and Clarkston roads, said Carlisle.

The planning commission changed the rezoning request to rezone the entire 20 acres to research office, he said.

"The planning commission thought the site was not likely to be developed as single family residential because of its proximity to Pine Knob and the Pine Knob parking lot," he said.

Research office would also provide a good buffer between Pine Knob and the surrounding residential area, Carlisle said. For the research office, traffic would be mainly in the daytime, while Pine Knob traffic is in the evening.

The planning commission also liked the control a research office zoning gives them, he said. All uses in that zoning require special land use permission.

Larry Burkhart, Alexander's planning consultant, requested that the township board leave the commercial intact.

The master plan shows the property as commercial, and the owner is negotiating to develop it as commercial, he said.

Possibly, a bank or retail store will be coming to the site, he said.

"It is so crucial for us to keep that commercial zoning that we'd prefer that you reject the rezoning request," he said.

Clerk Richard Holman suggested supporting the planning commission recommendation.

When Burkhart objected, township attorney Gerald Fisher recommended that he consider applying for a planned unit development (PUD) zoning when ready to build, which would allow the planning commission to approve varied uses of the land.

The board voted 5-0 to approve the first reading of the rezoning. A second reading and

adoption are necessary before the zoning takes effect. Trustees Daniel Travi and Dale Stuart were absent.

After the meeting, Burkhart said he would be back to request a PUD when he is ready to develop the property. He added that the township voted to go against its own master plan by changing the zoning of the commercial portion.

"They're flying right in the face of their master plan," he said. "It doesn't make sense."



At the Sept. 1 meeting, the township board approved the low bid of \$43,464 from Apex Asphalt Company, Rochester Hills.



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

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



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# Disease policy on school board agenda

A preliminary enrollment report and the first reading of a policy regarding communicable diseases highlight the Monday, Sept. 14, meeting of the Clarkston Community Schools Board of Education.

The board meets at 8 p.m. at the district administration building, 6389 Clarkston Rd., Independence Township.

Superintendent Milford Mason said the enrollment report is expected to reflect a number equal to last year's enrollment.

"We are seeing some rather substantial class sizes, particularly in the high school, primarily related to the teacher layoff situation," he said.

"We'll do whatever we can by way of balancing classes, but we may not, for the moment at least, be able to do too much" to correct the problem, he added, referring to the 4.25 mill tax increase request that will appear on a special school election ballot in October.

The communicable diseases policy will undergo its first reading at the meeting. It covers the full range of contagious diseases, including AIDS, chicken pox, measles and scabies, said Mason.

"We're broadening it to take in the whole AIDS concept," Mason said, adding that, to his knowledge, there have been no cases of children with AIDS attending district schools.

The policy will outline procedures and carry on with the current practice of deciding about school attendance on a case-by-case basis, he said.

Other items on the tentative agenda include the following:

The annual district audit report by Plante and Moran. The report, complete with overhead projections, will show the financial condition of the district as of June 30.

The recall of three teachers to take the place

of two teachers who have resigned and one teacher who is ill. On the recall list are Gloria Lacey (music, Clarkston Junior High), Janice Kirchgessner (speech therapist) and Kelly Cut-

shaw (mathematics, Clarkston High School). Recognition for district employees who had perfect attendance during the 1986-87 school year.

## Smooth sailing for students

The first day of school, Sept. 2, was very smooth, said Milford Mason, superintendent of Clarkston Community Schools.

After visiting several of the buildings, Mason said he was particularly pleased with the way sixth-graders from Clarkston, Pine Knob and North Sashabaw elementary schools are reacting to their transfer to the junior high schools this year.

The youngsters are having their own lockers and to eat in a large cafeteria, Mason said.

"Both (principals) Duane Lewis and Dave Reschke have done a marvelous job in working with these transfers as well as the staff," he said. "As one of the teachers remarked to me, 'This is really exciting. I feel like I'm starting fresh again.'"

The transfer of the about 220 sixth-graders took place because the elementary schools were becoming overcrowded. Sixth-graders in Andersonville and Bailey Lake elementaries continue to attend school in those buildings.

Another change in the district this year means elementary school pupils are eating lunch in the multipurpose rooms.

"I hear the youngsters are enjoying it and it's working very well," Mason said.

Also new is computerized scheduling at Clarkston High School. While a few schedule changes were necessary, "it will do a pretty good job, I think," Mason said.

All in all, aside from the usual problems with children who were dropped off in the morning and couldn't find their school buses in the afternoon, the day was one to remember for its uneventfulness, said Mason.


The little kid in me wants to tear it apart, and when that fails I get the knife, and by that time all patience is gone, and I cut myself again.

**'If it Fitz . . .'**

**Profit not baby motive**

The debate continues: Do welfare mothers have babies for profit? Today's answer comes from the top state official in charge of welfare payments, C. Patrick Babcock, director of the Department of Social Services (DSS).

For years, lots of us have heard - and made - the accusation that many poor unmarried women - especially teenagers - are eager to have babies so they can collect monthly ADC (Aid to Dependent Children) payments plus other associated benefits. The more kids, the more money sucked out of abused taxpayers by a gone-wild welfare system more concerned with perpetuating its bureaucracy than with getting shiftless parasites off the public's back.

I NEVER BOUGHT such a harsh judgment. But last month I quoted it, as written by a DSS caseworker, because I figured she knew a lot more about the subject than most of us.

She said: "The issue that is always missed by concerned journalists is not state-funded abortions but state-funded baby-making. Medicaid has always paid for contraception methods that prevent conception. The poor and young girls rarely take advantage of contraception. Why? Because it is not profitable."

Subsequently, I heard from several readers who agreed, especially with the contention that teenage mothers use ADC money to leave home and get their own apartment, and then spend most of the child-support money on drugs while their children are neglected.

But I also heard from 25 more DSS employees who strongly disagreed. One of them said: "I am appalled and outraged that an employe of DSS would perpetuate the cruel and vicious myth that ADC mothers have more (or any!) children in order to get more money, and I am embarrassed to think your readers might think she speaks for me. I want to shout and holler that ADC mothers have children for the same reasons non-ADC mothers do."

NOW COMES DSS Director Babcock, who said, in part:

"While it may be true that the state acknowledges the food, shelter and clothing needs of infants and other children by allotting \$73 per month (\$2.43 per day) for each child in the family, this still does not keep most recipients loitering on the welfare rolls for long. Fifty-one percent of all ADC cases are open on our system for less than 24 months. Clearly if children are born while on the caseload, it does not deter the exit of that family from the system once their financial or emotional crises have passed . . .

"I could refute and clarify each allegation made (by the babies-for-profit caseworker) but that would distract from my real concern. I find it difficult to believe that a professional of this worker's background could in good conscience lead you or anyone in the general public to believe that an individual, welfare mother or taxpayer, would add to their family for economic reasons.

"How many taxpayers do you know who would increase the size of their family to claim the \$1,500-\$2,000 dependent deduction on their federal or state income tax return? How many would add to their own responsibilities to feed, clothe, nurture and nurse another baby for \$2.43 a day?

"... The job of this agency is to provide support, whether it be financial, social services, medical care, education and training or day care to people who have lost control over their lives. The rapid turnover in the majority of our caseload and our success at getting clients off the rolls because of our employment and training program is a credit to the taxpayers of this state . . .

"Our job is not to judge the morals or aptitude of our clients but to help each to the best of our ability to overcome their own personal trials to become self-supportive once again. In my opinion, we do that quite well. Sometimes, despite the opinions of our own workers."

End of communication from the DSS director: But undoubtedly not the end of the debate.

# Wells drilled for sewer line surprise resident

Even though Cecil Wilmot has seen a lot of change in the more than 50 years he's lived on Clarkston Road, Independence Township, he wasn't prepared for the most recent evidence of progress.

Piles of gleaming white sewer pipes and shallow wells on his property greeted him one day last week.

"I went to the mall, and I came back and this was here," he said.

"I think it's funny that they come in and mess up my property without even asking," he said.

He was surprised and a little angry, but it was nothing compared to the anger his son, Paul Wilmot, showed, he said.

Paul owns the property next to his father on Clarkston Road, near Flemings Road, and he rents out the house, said Cecil.

The machinery that left the pipes and dug the wells also created deep indentations on the front yard of Paul's rental house, said Cecil. Paul feared the septic field was ruined and demanded the company leave.

Later, Cecil shook his head about it. He thought the company would probably repair everything, but he marveled that the courtesy of letting people know you'd be disturbing their property didn't exist anymore.

"They didn't even ask for permission," he said.

Township Supervisor Frank Ronk said Paul Wilmot had called him about it. Ronk said he would send out an inspector from the building department.


The sewer, for Newport Condominiums on Clarkston Road across from Clintonwood Park, is to be constructed in the right-of-way property on the side of Clarkston Road, said Ronk.

"They might have gone over the line a little," said Ronk. "In most of these cases, that's what

happens."

If so, the company will be required to return things to normal, said Ronk.

The owner of C.D. Cole Excavating, who was contracted to construct the sewer, could not be reached for comment.

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
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# Hundreds attend meetings on work-learn camps

Concerns of nearly 600 area citizens at a Sept. 1 meeting on juvenile detention camps paralleled those discussed at an Aug. 30 meeting on the camps.

Members of Residents Against Ineffective Detention (RAID) monitored the Sunday meeting at Holly High School attended by about 250 people.

International Field Studies (IFS), the firm chosen by the state to run the first of three proposed camps, conducted the Tuesday night meeting at Springfield Oaks Youth Activities Center, along with state Department of Social Services (DSS) Director Patrick Babcock and Ken Visser, special adviser for the work-and-learn camps.

"If there was one thing that came out of these meetings, it was the broad areas of concern by citizens," said Nancy Strole, spokesman for the RAID group.

Residents of North Oakland County, where the state has been looking for a camp site, asked questions about financing the Department of Social Services program, as well as the contracting procedures, legitimacy of the program, qualifications of IFS, security and police protection and education of the juveniles who would be housed in the camps.

In May, when the work-and-learn youth detention camp was proposed, information was received by Rose Township officials that DSS was looking at Camp Holly, a Girl Scout camp near Holly and Davisburg, as a primary site.

Robert Lipsitz, president of IFS, said that "the information was premature." He said they are looking at many sites for the first camp,

including Camp Holly and other sites in North Oakland County which he would not disclose.

Lipsitz said a primary site at this time is in the Saline area, south of Ann Arbor in York Township.

Chester Koop, another RAID spokesman, cited concerns about how the private contractor, IFS, was given a contract without outside bids.

State officials defended that practice, saying bids were not customary for such services. Since then, a new policy has taken effect and bids were received for the two remaining camps.

Strole said IFS has formed a private investor group, Outdoor Resources, which would purchase the camp site property and lease it to IFS.

A camp facility would hold 80-100 offenders, primarily teenage youths who are property offenders from Wayne County. The type of offenders was another concern of area citizens.

Lipsitz, who referred to them as first-time offenders, explained that it was their first adjudication.

"It's an alternative to being locked up or being sent home to the same situation," Lipsitz said. "Do you put these youths in an environment with youths who have committed violent crimes?"

But according to Strole, DSS officials admitted at the Tuesday night meeting that repeat offenders and violent and assaultive offenders could be eligible for the program.

Security was another big concern of people. The camps are described as non-fenced and without lock-ins at night.

Holly Police Chief Tom Clark said the camps would have a drastic effect on his community if located at Camp Holly, because they are a small department. He said extra personnel would cost the taxpayers money.

As far as cost is concerned, citizens object to what has been estimated from \$46,240 to \$36,000 per bed per year for the facility.

Lipsitz defended the cost, saying it is one of the least expensive residential programs. He said it would cost about \$18,000 per youth for a six-month stay at the camp, which includes the after-care the youth would receive for another six months.

Citizens have objected to the way the whole camp proposal has been handled by the state. Holly Village Council President Ardath Regan said, "We need more up-front honesty."

Strole added, "The state has lost credibility with the people, and I don't know if they can ever retrieve it."

In defending questions about his capabilities and experience in this type of program, Lipsitz said he doesn't have experience providing residential care to juvenile delinquents, but he said, "I'm not sure there's a difference between youths in camps and juveniles."

Lipsitz, who manages several recreational camps in the area including Camp Maas and Camp Tamarack in Groveland Township, added, "In comparison to camps I run on a daily basis, this is small."

"We have worked with programs with hardcore juveniles from locked up situations in a camp near Holly for two-week periods without any problems," Lipsitz added.

"The same programs have been going on for years near these communities where people are worried about quality of life. Exactly the same thing these people feel is important for them is important for these youths, too."

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
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# Waterford Road sewer concept gets OK

Because of residents' objections, the Waterford Road sewer won't cut across any private property on Waterford Road, Independence Township.

Instead, the sewer is to follow the road and will require a lift system sewer, to be maintained by the township.

At the Sept. 3 special township meeting, the board approved the idea of the sewer system, but not the special assessment district to pay for it nor the engineering details of the sewer system.

The request came at the Sept. 1 township meeting from Ronald Harmon, who owns 60 acres on Maybee Road, Independence Township, zoned for multiple residential housing.

According to township regulations, he can't develop his property without a sewer system. The township required a gravity flow sewer system, which would have crossed some private property on Waterford Road in order to connect the Dixie Highway sewer to Maybee Road.

The first developer of Harmon's property, Joseph Kosik Jr., tried for a year to negotiate with the residents to install the sewer on some of their property. Meeting no success, he dropped his plans to build condominiums and apartments on Maybee Road near Spring Lake.

Harmon said he can't use his land without a sewer, so he asked the township board to allow something besides a gravity flow sewer system.

George Anderson, director of the township department of public works, said in this case, the pump system would cost about the same as the

gravity flow system. The township would be responsible for the maintenance, he said.

The board took no action at the Sept. 1 meeting, but approved the concept of the lift system sewer at the Sept. 3 meeting.

Trustee Carol Balzarini cast the lone no vote against the idea of a lift station.

"I've spent too long listening to Mr. Anderson tell us how bad a forced main system is," she said, mentioning the costly problems of maintaining it.

Supervisor Frank Ronk said it would be a

long and expensive legal battle to condemn private property along Waterford Road to build the gravity flow system.

"Not too far down the road, we are going to have to have sewers in that district," he said, adding Harmon was willing to pay the construction costs now, but residents would have to pay in the future.

Treasurer John Lutz said residents might lose more trees by placing the sewer in the Waterford Road right-of-way, because the road embankments are high and filled with trees.

## Board adopts utility policy

Builders in Independence Township have a new policy to follow when installing off-site utilities.

At the Sept. 1 township meeting, the board approved the policy at the request of Beverly McElmeel, director of the building and planning department.

The department unofficially uses the policy now, but it has no written policy, said township attorney Gerald Fisher.

According to the policy, building permits won't be issued until the water and sewer lines have been constructed to the property line of the project site and adequate provision is made for the use of water to extinguish fires.

Builders can, however, receive building permits before the utilities are brought to the property if the developer posts a tax bond or letter of credit to ensure the completion of the service.

The fire chief must also confirm that an unreasonable fire safety hazard wouldn't be created by constructing without water service. The developer is to follow any fire safety precautions dictated by the fire chief.

Treasurer John Lutz said the policy may be a burden to builders, but it was a good idea.

"It may be a burden to the township, but it's better than having half-finished projects without water and sewers," said Trustee Carol Balzarini. In a 5-0 vote, the board members approved the resolution to adopt the policy. Trustees Daniel Travis and Dale Stuart were absent.

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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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# Independence sues for removal of tire pile

If a fire were to start, it would be dangerous, he said.

"We've had a couple of areas in the township in the past that tires have accumulated for one reason or another. And all of a sudden, they burn," he said.

"And kids could get in there," Mason said.

The property, owned by Independence Township resident Paul Eghigian, is leased to William Smith.

On July 22, Smith received a court order from Judge David F. Breck to stop delivering tires to the property and to begin removing the tires within seven days, said township attorney Gerald Fisher. The tires were to be completely gone by Oct. 1.

"The order is being ignored," said Fisher. "Not only has he not started, but there have been many more delivered."


On Sept. 9, the township plans to ask Breck to appoint a third party to get rid of the tires and to sell enough property to pay for it, he said.

Although Eghigian is not a part of the tire situation, he is responsible for his tenants, said Fisher.

Eghigian, a Sashabaw Road resident, said his tenant won't leave. Smith has been using the property for three months, but has only paid one month's rent, said Eghigian, so he gave Smith a 30-day notice to leave, but he's still there.

"We don't want that guy there," he said.

To dump tires at a legal dump site in Oakland County costs about \$4 a tire, he said, adding not all dumps take tires.



ABOUT 600,000 TIRES were dumped on Paul Eghigian's property by the lessee of the site,

Eghigian said. The property is northwest of White Lake Road by the Depot Theatre.

A new lock and chain have been placed on the gate to the property, and only Eghigian and the fire department have a key, he said. Smith's attorney could not be reached for

comment.

According to Place, Smith had told building department officials that he was planning to recycle the tires.



# Wolves win wild one over 'Cats

The graduation of three talented receivers was supposed to leave Clarkston hurting in the pass-catching department.

But nothing could have been further from the truth Sept. 4 when the Wolves faced visiting Grand Blanc in a prep football game.

Clarkston tripped up the Bobcats, 22-21, on a four-yard run by Stacy Turner with 1:30 left in the game and the ensuing two-point conversion also run in by Turner.

The game-winning touchdown was set up by a couple of passing plays that picked up large chunks of real estate for the Wolves. After the TD, the Wolves were faced with a tough decision.

In his first game as varsity head coach, Kurt Richardson decided to go for the win without hesitation.

"We had the momentum, Grand Blanc was down," said Richardson. "I wanted to go for it and so did the team."

Clarkston began the drive on their own 22-yard line with less than three minutes left in the game. Newblatt connected with Joe Herron, who caught seven passes for 86 yards, for a 27-yard

gain to get the Wolves moving.

After an incomplete pass, Newblatt went to the air again and dumped off a screen to Keenan Powell, who then rumbled all the way down to the Grand Blanc 4-yard line. From there Turner scored.

Newblatt finished the game with 220 yards passing and he credited the statistic to the good job the receivers did hanging onto the ball.

But the key to their success was the team's attitude, Newblatt said.

"We had to keep our composure," he said. "It's the only way that we could (win the game)."

Offensively, Richardson singled out Newblatt and Herron as the best players. The fine blocking of Troy Martin and Duane Brennan on the right side of the line helped the running game considerably, he added.

The winning touchdown and conversion were run behind their blocks, said Richardson.

Mike Wells paced the swarming defense with eight tackles for the Wolves. Neville LaMotte picked off two passes for Clarkston. Newblatt recovered one fumble.

"I'm real proud of the kids," said Richardson. "They showed some character tonight."

Clarkston opened the scoring in the first quarter on a 24-yard run by Mike Gilbert. Newblatt kicked the conversion.

After a Grand Blanc punt, the Wolves took over on midfield and eventually scored on a 23-yard pass by Newblatt. He also kicked the conversion to give Clarkston a 14-0 edge before a standing room only crowd.

With just 10 seconds left in the first half, Grand Blanc got on the board on a four-yard TD catch by Jeff Arrowood. He also kicked the conversion to cut the Wolves' lead in half 14-7 heading into the intermission.

Grand Blanc then tied up the contest on its first drive of the second half. A quarterback sneak late in the third quarter put the visitors up by seven and set up the heroic finish for Clarkston.

"We made some stupid mistakes and cut our own throats," said Richardson of Grand Blanc's rally in the second half.

Clarkston now must play its next three games on the road, starting with South Lyon Friday evening.



### Squash incognito

The vegetable garden is heading into autumn, but those prolific zucchini just keep on producing. They're also a good buy at the market this time of year.

Here's a casserole that features zucchini in a new and delicious way, in case you're at the point of disguising it to get your family to keep eating it.

#### SOUR CREAM AND CHEESE BAKED ZUCCHINI

- 4 medium zucchini, coarsely grated
- Salt, to taste
- 4 tablespoons butter
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 2 tablespoons milk
- 2 cups sour cream
- 2 cups grated Cheddar cheese
- Grated Parmesan cheese

Place grated zucchini in a colander and sprinkle with salt; stir. Let stand to drain for about three hours and then press out excess moisture.

In a large skillet, melt butter. Saute onion until softened. Stir in zucchini; saute for a few minutes. Stir in flour and milk. Cook 1 or 2 minutes, then remove from heat.

Stir in sour cream and Cheddar cheese. Taste for seasoning. Turn into a 2-quart baking dish. Sprinkle lightly with Parmesan cheese.

Bake uncovered at 350 degrees for 30 minutes. Serves about 6.

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

### Sol power

*'Envelope' design  
creates warmth*

Let it rain or snow. Ed and Debbie Santangelo are comfortable in their energy-efficient, passive solar home.

When the contemporary, 3,600-square-foot home in Deer Lake Farms was built by the late developer Dick Cascaddan about seven years ago, it was the first of its kind in the area.

Called an envelope home, or a home within a home, it incorporates the best of passive solar features, plus it heats water for the home with solar panels on the roof.

The Santangelos bought the home four years ago, and are pleased with the energy-saving features, which are reflected in their low utility bills.

A back-up hot water heater uses natural gas for those cloudy Michigan days when the solar panels can't keep up, and a natural gas furnace assists the energy-efficient hot water heat pump when the temperatures dip.

The home is designed so that sun comes in all the large, south-facing windows. There are no windows on the north side.

The "envelope" description derives from the double north and south walls with a 12-inch space between them. The side walls are extra thick as well.

An attractive solarium on the front of the home offers warmth for body and soul. Three skylights and a variety of green plants offer a bit of the peaceful outdoors, and sunshine pouring in warms the house in the winter.


Slats in the solarium floor and vents in the ceiling create a circular air flow in the home. In the summer, cool air is drawn up through the slats and warm air out through the vents in the ceiling. In the winter, the circulation works in reverse, drawing warm air down and into the home.

All of the large, sunny windows in the home are triple paned. Debbie hung wooden shades on most of the windows, which can be used effectively to block out or let in the sun, and are an attractive addition to the contemporary decor.

The cedar-sided home has other special features as well.

The master bedroom suite boasts a two-sided fireplace, one side facing an adjoining sitting room and one side facing the bedroom. Also adjoining the bedroom is a bath showcasing a teakwood jacuzzi and brightened by two more skylights.

## Baking soda withstands cleaning test of time

Step back in time to the home of yesteryear and you'll find very little that resembles today's modern homes and apartments.

There is one product on the shelf, however, that has withstood the test of time: baking soda.

It's no wonder. With microwave ovens and fiberglass shower stalls as the latest additions to the long list of surfaces baking soda can clean effectively, this product is surely keeping up with the times.

Because baking soda is a neutralizer, it can cut through grease and dirt around the house but the small baking soda crystals will not scratch any surface.

There are three basic formulas to use when cleaning with baking soda:

\*Make a paste by mixing three parts baking soda with one part water.

\*Make a solution by dissolving four tablespoons of baking soda in one quart of water.

\*Use baking soda dry by sprinkling it straight from the box.

Baking soda is recommended by refrigerator manufacturers as a refrigerator cleanser. A baking soda solution will clean the delicate interior without scratching the surface.

To remove stubborn stains, sprinkle baking soda on a damp sponge, scrub, rinse thoroughly and wipe dry.

Baking soda works on porous surfaces in the kitchen, too. Use it on wood cutting boards, for example, to remove strong onion and garlic odors.

Because it's gentle, baking soda is perfect for cleaning formica countertops, linoleum tile, chrome, stainless steel, porcelain enamel and fiberglass.

You can also eliminate odors in the kitchen by using baking soda.

To destroy dishwasher odors that can develop between wash loads, sprinkle baking soda along the bottom of your dishwasher. That way you can run the dishwasher only when it's full and also save on energy bills.

Speaking of odors, those that form in the refrigerator from strong foods can be difficult to control.

Place an open one pound box of baking soda

in the refrigerator to eliminate and absorb these odors.

Baking soda will also work in the freezer to eliminate odors that transfer to ice cubes and through the porous box of an ice cream carton.

When you replace the box (about every three months), pour the contents of the old one down the drain to keep it smelling fresh.

## Microwaves work best when clean

A clean microwave oven interior is more than just attractive--it also ensures the best cooking performance for the appliance.

According to Elaine Glasser, home economist for Michigan State University Cooperative Extension Service of Oakland County, infrequent cleaning may cause a number of problems.

\*Cooking time may be slowed by a build-up of food particles on the walls or floor of the oven. Food soils absorb the microwave energy that should be used by the cooking food.

\*Food particles around the door frame may keep the door from sealing properly or may even prevent the oven from starting.

\*Unpleasant odors may develop when food soils remain or build up on microwave oven interior surfaces.

Follow these tips to help keep a microwave oven clean:

\*After each use, wipe the oven's interior surfaces with a paper towel, soft cloth or sponge dipped in a solution of mild detergent and warm water.

\*Remove cooked-on food by boiling one cup of water (in a bowl or 2-cup glass measure) inside the oven for several minutes. The steam condenses on the interior and makes soil easier to remove. Wipe out with a paper towel, soft cloth or sponge.

\*Clean stains from the oven floor with a paste of baking soda and water, a special ceramic glass cleaner or a mild cleanser. Don't use harsh cleans-

Baking soda can make bathroom surfaces shine.

Sprinkled on a damp sponge, baking soda will gently clean your fiberglass shower stall, shower curtain and plastic toilet seat cover as well as the sink and tub.

It is strong enough to remove soap residue and mildew, but no matter how hard you scrub, baking soda won't scratch the surface.

ers or steel wool pads. They can cause scratches or rust.

\*Remove odors caused by strong flavored foods (such as fish, cabbage or garlic), burned foods or food soil build-up by boiling a solution of 1/2 cup lemon juice and one cup water in a bowl or 4-cup measure for several minutes. Let stand for five or six minutes in the oven. Then wipe out.

These simple suggestions will help keep microwave ovens clean, odor free and operating properly.

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
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
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


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# Every fall, my lawn develops mushrooms . . .

The coming of fall doesn't even slow the torrent of gardening questions.

Michigan State University Cooperative Extension specialists answer timely queries on home vegetable gardening, landscape plants, fruit growing, flowers, lawns and related topics:

The old apple tree in my backyard has carpeted a good part of the lawn with wormy apples. Is there any way I can keep the tree but avoid the fruit mess?

Not really. Chemicals intended to reduce fruiting may have just the opposite effect if they're not applied at the right time or in the proper strength.

Usually the best solution for the problem you describe is a chainsaw. The alternative is to give the tree the high maintenance treatment it needs to produce high-quality fruit.

That means regular, frequent spraying to control diseases and insect pests.

A standard-sized apple tree like yours can be very difficult to spray adequately from the ground with backyard equipment. And missing one spray at a crucial time can undo your whole control program.

Especially on a small city or suburban lot, a fruit tree is often more mess than it's worth. Consider removing it and replacing it with a fruitless shade tree.

I saw more than the usual number of snakes around my place this summer. As the weather cooled, they disappeared. They won't follow the mice into my house, will they?

Snakes are more likely to look for a cavity under a rotting tree stump or next to a rough foundation wall where they'll spend the winter.

In view of the amount of damage only a few

mice can do, it would make more sense to worry about the mice coming in and forget about the snakes.

I put a lot of my houseplants outdoors for the summer, and they grew like weeds. Now I'm wondering if I need to repot them into larger containers. How can I tell?

Signs that houseplants may need more room include soil that dries out very quickly, roots growing out the drainage hole of the pot and poor growth.

The only way to be sure, however, is to turn the plant out of the pot when the soil is moist and look at the roots.

If the soil ball is covered with a thick, tightly matted mass of roots, it's time for a new, larger container. (If overcrowding is not the problem, repotting is not the solution. In fact, it may do more harm than good by stressing an already ailing plant.)

When should I apply a winter mulch to bulb beds, perennials and landscape plants?

Apply a winter mulch after the ground has frozen hard. Mulching then keeps the ground from alternately freezing and thawing and possi-

bly damaging plant roots or pushing bulbs right out of the ground.

Mulching too early keeps the ground warm too long and may delay plant's going dormant. This may leave them more susceptible to cold injury than plants with no "protection" at all.

Can I use leaves off my landscape trees as winter mulch?

Avoid using leaves off of rose bushes and fruit trees. Many diseases can overwinter on fallen leaves to plague you next year, so remove and destroy leaves and other plant debris from these plants.

Leaves from other deciduous plants can be used for mulch. If possible, shred or compost them before using them in bulb beds and perennials gardens.

Whole leaves often form dense mats that can smother new growth as it tries to emerge in the spring. You can use whole leaves around raspberry plants, however.

Every rainy fall my lawn develops a lot of mushrooms in the same places. Last year, with all that rain, they were the worst yet. Is there anything I can do to get rid of them?

Mushrooms are the fruiting bodies of fungi that grow on decaying wood or other organic matter.

Raking off the mushrooms will make your lawn look better temporarily and reduce the number of spores that will be liberated. But the only way to get rid of them permanently is to eliminate the underground parts of the fungus by digging up the rotting stump or whatever the fungi are growing on.

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
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# Backyard waterfall provides sounds of serenity

Sharron Richman recently had "scenic sound effects" installed in her backyard in the form of a waterfall, adding yet another touch to a setting which is already serene.

"I've put my heart and soul into my yard," she says of the flower-bedecked, two-and-a-half-acres tucked among the trees at the end of Ellis Road in Springfield Township.

After Sharron's brother, Wayne Wilson, an environmentalist and horticulturalist, created a waterfall on his Waterford Township property, she asked him to help her create one for her own yard.

Three factors made the task a little more feasible: The Richman property has a natural hill; Sharron's husband, Hank, is in the excavation business; and their teenage sons, Jeff and John, could help.

First, they dug out the hill with a front-end loader and then they put boulders in place with a hydraulic shovel.

"Hank brought in three loads of rock, but we ran out almost immediately and had to get more," Sharron says.

Next, the family hand-raked the area and spread out a 40-by-80-foot swimming pool liner, tucking it into the two ponds and under boulders which landscape the sides of the ponds.

They spread pea gravel and small rocks on the bottom of the ponds and built up the sides with more gravel.

Only mason sand and pea gravel were used to place the slate for the three waterfalls. There is no cement. Everything was done naturally, Sharron says.

A three-quarter horsepower submergible pump and the hoses to recycle the water are buried in the rocks and landscaping.

They filled the ponds with lake water as well as well water, in order to get natural organisms for the ponds, which Sharron also supplied with goldfish and Japanese koi, an exotic type of goldfish.

When the ponds were in place, it was time for Sharron to get busy with her favorite pastime—gardening.

She added rock gardens and shrubs, ivy and day lilies to the existing trees and lilies above and around the ponds.

Then she added aquatic vegetation to the ponds—water hyacinth, tropical water lilies, water lettuce (which looks like delicate little cabbages floating on the surface), water shamrocks and umbrella plants, to name a few.

For non-floating plants in the ponds, she sunk plastic pots in the gravel.

Sharron will have to take some of the tropical plants and fish into the house for the winter, but other plants, such as the native cattails and water iris, she can leave in the ponds.

The entire project was completed six weeks ago.

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
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


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
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# Outdoor plants can thrive if brought inside

Instead of saying goodbye to your flowering annuals when the first frost hits, try saving a few plants to grow indoors this winter.

Lee Taylor, extension horticulture specialist at Michigan State University, says coleus, geraniums, impatiens and fibrous-rooted begonias are your best bet.

The key is to provide them with enough light to keep stems from getting long and straggly and leaves from becoming sparse and small.

Winter in Michigan is not famous for sunny days, so providing enough light usually entails growing plants under fluorescent tubes.

The first step, of course, is to obtain the plants. You can do this by digging and overwintering whole plants or taking cuttings and starting new ones.

To grow new plants from cuttings, begin with three- or four-inch tip cuttings from the top of the plants.

Remove the leaves on the bottom third or half of each stem, and insert the cut end into damp perlite, vermiculite, peat or sand. You may use a rooting hormone but it's not necessary.

Place cuttings out of direct sunlight, and water as needed to keep the rooting medium moist. They should take about six weeks to develop roots 1/2 to one inch long.

Then you can transplant them into four-inch pots of houseplant potting soil and place them in a sunny window or under artificial light. Pinch plants regularly to keep them compact.

Dig whole plants for potting before frost also. Dig up as much of the root system as you can and pot each plant in a container big enough to hold all the roots comfortably.

A good potting mixture is one part soil, one part sand and one part peat. Or use a standard houseplant potting mix.

Cut back the tops of the plants in half. Water whenever the soil feels dry, and fertilize about once a month with a houseplant fertilizer, following label directions. Watch for diseases and insects.

In case of problems do develop, you may want to isolate plants brought indoors from the garden for a few weeks. Grow them in a sunny window or, for better results, under artificial light.

"Plants grown under fluorescent tubes will tend to be more compact and bushier," Taylor said. "They are also more likely to bloom during

the winter than plants grown in natural light."

Ordinary fluorescent tubes are adequate for plant growth, he said. A combination of one warm white and one cool white tube is recommended, but all cool white bulbs are OK.

To simplify the lighting, Taylor recommends putting the fixtures on a timer that turns them on and off automatically.

For best results, plants need a total of 12 to 16 hours of light a day. Fluorescent fixtures can provide all or part of that.

## Start indoor herb garden now

The end of the outdoor gardening season doesn't have to mean the end of fresh herbs.

You can have fresh herbs all winter if you pot up plants now and grow them indoors as houseplants.

Lee Taylor, extension specialist at Michigan State University, says that mint, chives, parsley, sweet marjoram and basil are the easiest to grow indoors.

Rather than digging up whole plants from the garden and potting them, he suggests starting your indoor herb garden with new plants.

From healthy plants in the garden, take four- to six-inch cuttings and root them in moist sand or vermiculite. Or divide the old plants into several smaller ones and pot in a houseplant potting mix.

Place plants in a sunny south window or under artificial light and water whenever the soil surface feels dry.

Use a houseplant fertilizer on your herbs only

if you're cutting them often, Taylor said. Too much nitrogen may cause herbs to lose their characteristic flavor and aroma.

If you can't get cuttings from your favorite herbs, you can try growing them from seed, Taylor said.

Many herbs are slow to germinate, however, and some are very susceptible to damping-off, a fungus disease of seedlings.

If you decide to start herbs from seeds, be sure to use a sterile growing medium and sanitized containers.

The easiest herbs to grow from seed are basil, borage, caraway, dill, fennel, summer savory, marjoram, winter savory and thyme.

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

ago in only five days for a cost of \$1,500. Reseeding the lawn, which was torn up by the heavy equipment, took a little longer.




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
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
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


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
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
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# Solar home is warm, inviting

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# Bats should be evicted before winter strikes



Sitting outdoors on a summer evening about sundown and watching the bats dip and swoop and flutter as they catch insects on the wing can be quite enjoyable--until you realize that the bats are coming out of your house.

Late summer and early fall (from Aug. 15 until the onset of regular frosts) is the time to evict them, or you may have them under your roof all winter.

"It's not always easy to get rid of bats in your home," says Glenn Dudderar, extension wildlife specialist at Michigan State University. "But it gets impossible in the winter.

"If you allow the bats to go into hibernation in your attic, that's where they'll be until spring," he says. "There's no way to rouse them once they've entered their dormant state."

While the weather's still warm and bats are still active, there's a chance.

The first step is to find out where they're entering your home. This may mean standing on a different side of the house around sunset on several consecutive nights until you spot the bats leaving.

Dudderar advises going outside a short while before sundown so your eyes have a chance to adjust to the waning light. This will improve your chances of spotting the small, dark shapes as they emerge.

Once you've found the bats' entryway, you need to close it while they're outside flying.

Wait an hour or two after sunset to make sure they're all out, then close up openings under eaves, around chimneys or near windows with window screen or hardware cloth, caulk, fiberglass insulation or some other material.

Unless the bats have an alternative entrance, this will keep them from returning to their roost

and force them to find another.

"Most people who find out they have bats in their homes want to get rid of them simply because they think bats are creepy," Dudderar says.

"Bats also make a smelly mess with their droppings, and they may carry rabies and the organisms that cause several other diseases," he says. "Though the chance of encountering a rabid bat is quite small, it does exist and is reason enough not to tolerate bats as houseguests."

Mothballs, bright lights, noisemakers and other materials and gadgets promoted for repelling bats from attics range in effectiveness from adequate, if used properly, to worthless.

Mothballs, for instance, must be used in very large quantities--five pounds per 2,000 cubic feet--in enclosed areas where bats are roosting.

## Will mums bloom next year? Maybe

Then you can resod or reseed that portion of the lawn.

**Can a potted mum be planted outdoors now? Will it bloom again next year?**

You can plant it outdoors, but don't count on its surviving the winter. Many of the mum varieties grown for use as flowering pot plants are not winter hardy in Michigan.

**Could a mouse be digging in my houseplant pots? I've spotted something twice that certainly looks like a mouse, but I haven't managed to catch it yet. It's uprooting plants and throwing dirt all over.**

The animal in the pots is probably a shrew

If you do succeed in driving the bats out, you must still close up the openings that let them in or more bats are likely to enter after the mothball smell has dissipated.

Poisons are available to kill the bats, but that leaves you with dead bats to remove to avoid a smelly mess. If some of them crawl or fall into places where you can't reach them, you could be smelling them for quite a while.

Killing the bats really doesn't solve the bat problem, however, because it does nothing to prevent more bats from moving in later.

"Bats are actually beneficial animals because they consume large numbers of some of your least favorite night-flying insects," Dudderar said. "For that reason, and for the sake of efficiency, it makes more sense to shut them out."

rather than a mouse. Shrews dig through the soil in search of worms, grubs and other small prey.

If you moved a large plant back indoors in the fall and it had a shrew in it, it would be making just the kind of mess you describe.

Try catching it with an ordinary wooden mousetrap baited with peanut butter.

If you do catch it, notice its tiny eyes, short tail, lack of external ears, pointed nose and soft, gray fur. Its droppings, too, are distinctive: about 1/2 inch long, crescent-shaped and black.


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## Alternatives to window replacement

If you are thinking of replacing old storm windows to save energy, you may wish to consider a less expensive alternative first, says Elaine Glasser, home economist for the Michigan State University Cooperative Extension Service of Oakland County.

Energy-efficient windows must have double panes and triple panes may be worth considering for unprotected north and west sides of the house.

Whether you will save money by replacing windows will depend on the quality of the new windows, the size of the window and the fuel you use.

A typical replacement window may cost about \$125 plus installation. Non-standard sizes may cost considerably more.

Because they are so inexpensive, they may take years to pay for themselves in energy savings.

In fact, Glasser said, the energy you save may never pay back your initial investment.

Alternatives to replacing windows would include caulking, weatherstripping and tightening old wood-framed windows. Glasser suggests using plastic over the windows, lined draperies or some form of window quilts instead of replacing windows.

If your present windows are in bad shape, however, then replacement windows are a good choice.

Shop around before you purchase the windows. Poor quality metal windows may not save as much energy as some of the alternatives.

## Tips for preserving garden produce

A sure sign of summer is the availability of fresh fruits and vegetables. With that comes the season for home preserving.

As long as standard canning procedures are followed, tomatoes are safe to can by the boiling water bath method, says Linda Cornell, Oakland County Home Economist.

Tomatoes for canning should be firm, ripe and fully colored. Tomatoes that are overripe, have soft spots or decay, or picked from dead vines should not be used when canning.

The U.S.D.A. recommends acidification of all home canned tomato products.

Adding two tablespoons of lemon juice per quart or one tablespoon of lemon juice per pint will assure proper acidity of the tomato product.

Although canning is the preferred method for preserving tomatoes, they may also be frozen. Frozen tomatoes are great for soups and sauces.

Prepare the tomatoes in the same method as you would for canning them. Cook covered gently in their own juices until tender (10-20 minutes). Cool the contents; pack seal and freeze.

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
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


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
