Enrollment goes higher

Clarkston schools enrollment figures are up slightly from last year, but the figures are still changing, according to William Neff, director of administrative services.

"We could lose 30, maybe 50 as we get into the week (due to students originally signed up but not entering school for one reason or another), and we could gain a few new enrollments," Neff said. "At this point, we're 83 students above fourth Friday figures of last year."

The increase continues a trend begun in 1986 after 13 years of declining enrollment. In 1986, there was an increase of 66 pupils and in 1987, an increase of 97 pupils in grades K-12.

Enrollment this year is down slightly at the senior high and up at the elementary level.

Total enrollment for the district, still a tentative figure, is 5,887 students. There are 2,611 in elementary (K-5) and 3,276 in secondary (6-12).

Tentative figures for the individual buildings are as

Andersonville Elementary, 383; Bailey Lake Elementary, 607; Clarkston Elementary, 553; North Sashabaw, 452; Pine Knob Elementary, 616; Clarkston Junior High, 752; Sashabaw Junior High, 990; Clarkston High

Neff stressed that the figures are still estimates and noted that by Sept. 1, 50 student schedules were still not picked up at Sashabaw Junior High.

Three businesses call it quits

Two businesses left the Village of Clarkston, and another business vacated Ritter's Country Square in Independence Township in the past few weeks.

But already, some plans are in the works for filling the vacancies.

About three weeks ago, Ritter's Market, which sold produce, dairy products and meats, closed, and the new occupants are enthused about the Dixie Highway loca-

Jim Vermiglio and his partner, Matt Sassin, are remodeling Ritter's Market and plan to open another produce market with the same name by Oct. 1.

"I love the Clarkston area," said Vermiglio, a Birmingham resident. "I love the closeness of the community. It's growing. It's fantastic. In fact, I'm probably going to move out here."

With 42 years of experience in produce and foods between them, Vermiglio and Sassin expect the Independence Township area to be good for their produce and delicatessen business, Vermiglio said.

"The potential is unlimited," he said. "It's kind of a

Another food business -- 20 Depot Street restaurant -- left Clarkston Aug. 22.

It's too early to tell what business will replace the restaurant in the Clarkston Mills, but owner Ed Adler is making plans, said Phil Abraham, controller.

Several restaurants have operated in the building just west of Main Street, Clarkston, between Washington and Depot streets, but none has survived. Part of the problem with the location is that it's difficult to find, said Abraham.

"Depot Street is a one-way. No one knew where it was." he said, adding he didn't know if another restaurant

Also in the village, T-Shirts and Neat Stuff is going out of business after nine and one-half years of operation

Owner Carol Eberhardt said she plans to continue with wholesale operations from an office above The Clarkston Cafe on Main Street.

'It's going to be a challenge for me," she said. "It's going to be a new experience. I'm excited about the change. It's a positive move."

The move was necessary because the retail trade was practically dead in Clarkston, she said.

The day before school started, Kathy Pfeifer hummed a few strains of "Tomorrow," the famous tune from the musical "Annie."

The next day, while her four daughters were at school, she constructed a sign that read, "RAISE THE FLAG! All my kids are finally in school all day! HOO-RAY!" She erected the sign, along with a flag (a diaper on a broomstick) in the front yard of her Springfield Township home on Ellis Road.

"I've told them for six years I was going to tie a white sheet on a broomstick and hang it out front when they were all in school," she said with a chuckle.

This year, her youngest, 6-year-old Kristy, began first grade at Andersonville Elementary School. Her oldest, 15-year-old Angie, is a junior at Clarkston High School.

She and her husband, Tony, have two more daugh-

ters, 12-year-old Jenny, who attends Clarkston Junior High, and 8-year-old Elizabeth, an Andersonville Elementary pupil.

"They pushed me this year," Kathy said. "They teased me about (the flag) and said, You'll never do it, Mom."

"The retail district is in such bad shape," said Eberhardt. "I was here in the heyday when we had 35 shops. I know the difference. Gone are the days when people came to town to shop. ... For the last year and a half, I've been really discouraged about the amount of retail traffic."

Last winter was difficult on all retail businesses in Clarkston, Eberhardt said, adding those with back-up enterprises, such as wholesale, found the year much

However, Eberhardt geared her shop to teens, who "are the one segment of this town that doesn't drive away," she said, and even that strategy didn't work.

In addition to a lack of retail trade, Eberhardt said, the rent was high, the building needed repairs and she had lost \$5,000 since March just trying to stay in business.

"It was not an easy decision, quite frankly," she said. "I've made friends from people shopping in this store. ... Part of me feels very bad, because I feel like I'm leaving the ship to sink by itself. ... I'm going to miss it."

A village resident, Eberhardt expressed concern about the long-term condition of the village. Retail business owners sweep sidewalks, plant flowers and organize downtown activities to attract people to the village.

"When there are no more retail people, it's not going to happen," she said.

One tradition -- the spring midnight madness sale no longer exists.

'To come out on the street after a long winter and see everybody -- it's really sad for this community to lose that. That's what small town is," she said. "This town is made up of people, not buildings. ... The buildings have become more important, and the community aspect has gone out of it."

Area residents, the Clarkston Village Council and business owners would have to join forces to change the trend, but it's not happening, she said.

"People in this town are not up in arms and demanding change," she said, adding that business owners are talking about selling out before the village goes down

"People think that might never happen, but it's a distinct possibility. ... There's a breaking point for everybody. People sometimes get lulled into complacency. When people finally wake up, it might be too late," she said. "It's very frightening."



The exact cause of a suspicious house fire Sept. 2 on Reese Road probably will never be known for sure, but

Junior highs now house grade 6

When school began last week, it provided a major change for some of the Clarkston school district's sixthgraders.

Last year, sixth-graders from Pine Knob, Clarkston and North Sashabaw elementaries were housed in the junior high schools. This year, sixth-graders from Andersonville and Bailey Lake elementaries are also attending the junior highs.

With all sixth-graders in the district's two junior high schools, the first step into the middle school concept

Both Dave Reschke and I are strong proponents of the middle school concept," said Duane Lewis, prin-

cipal at Clarkston Junior High. Reschke is principal at Sashabaw Junior High.

When discussions began about moving the sixth grades from the elementary schools, Lewis and Reschke agreed with the plan, but only if the district would go to the middle school concept and not move the sixthgraders in as a separate entity.

The next step in the middle school concept will be to try to free up staff in the seventh grade to train in the same middle school concepts currently used by the sixth grade teachers, according to Reschke.

Special sign marks town bank branch

A new National Bank of Detroit sign erected last week at the branch office in Clarkston was custom designed for the village.

"We wanted it to tie into the historic motif of the village," said Andrew Creamer, first vice president of NBD. He described the design as a "Victorian look."

The Clarkston branch, formerly Pontiac State Bank, was merged with NBD on April 1. Pontiac State Bank was acquired by NBD Bank Corp. in 1984, but remained a separate subsidiary until this year:

The sign was designed by the NBD Design and Construction Group, manufactured by The Woodshop in Boyne City and exected by Beacon Sign Co. of Detroit. The total cost of the project was estimated at \$7,500. Clarkston Junior High."

But room is a problem. You need to be able to have small class sizes for discussion, and to do that in all four grades would be a problem," he said.

The long-range plan is for the ninth-graders to be at the high school, Lewis said, but a lot depends on the facilities plan and whether a new high school is built.

"As we plan right now, we are looking at a sixth, seventh and eighth grade concept," Lewis said. "We see the team teaching approach in the seventh and eighth grades (as well as the sixth)."

The team teaching approach in the sixth grade is called interdisciplinary team teaching. Students are taught science, social studies and language arts by different teachers, but the teachers get together as a team, planning common units to reinforce each other's classes.

It is an attempt to blend some of the concepts of elementary school with some of those from junior high, Lewis said. Other sixth grade classes, such as math and reading, are taught more like junior high.

Another important component of the middle school concept is teacher advisory groups, a block of time when teachers act more like counselors and students can deal with affective issues, Lewis said.

It's a problem solving, getting to know you' type of thing where they learn socializing skills," added Res-

Sixth-graders are also exposed to exploratory time. They have one hour with a choice of dand or a foreign language (French or German), and alternate this with music instruction.

"We look at this age level as a time for exposure," Lewis said. "High School is when they choose what they like (in classes).

Also available to the pupils is remedial math for those who need a little extra help, and Gifted and Talented Education (GATE) for those who were in the Clarkston Academically Talented (CAT) program.

There are more students in the junior highs this year, and the addition of more sixth-graders has made the schools younger, Lewis said, but the ninth-graders have accepted them well. There is some attempt to put sixth and seventh grades in one area, and eighth and ninth

Both junior high principals expressed enthusiasm for the middle school concept and the way it is progressing so far.

"It's an absolutely maryelous program," Reschke said. "It's grown and exceeded my expectations. I see it as an administrator, and as the father of a sixth-grader at

Mason, assistant fire chief in Independence Township.

"It's either trespassers or mice with matches," said Mason, and the house was uninsured.

It had been posted unsafe by township zoning enforcement officer Don Phillips, but Phillips said neighbors still complained of teens partying in the house on

On previous visits, Phillips had noted signs of satan worshiping in the house: an upside down cross; 666, the mark of the beast; a pentagram; chicken feathers; and one line from a satanic bible painted on the wall.

"I think it was just kids," said Phillips, adding that the teens may have been copying scenes from a movie or something. "That's how it starts, anyway."

Neighboring residents will probably be glad to be rid of the eyesore, he said.

That house was totally unsafe," he said. "Nobody wants kids to get hurt."

The owner, an Arizona resident, had planned to donate the house to the fire department for training purposes, but the paperwork wasn't finished, Phillips said.

The 1:03 a.m. fire had nearly demolished the house the time firefighters arrived, said Mason.

"It was totally down when we got there," he said, adding no one was injured in the blaze.

Firefighters concentrated on saving the surrounding pine trees and the nearby barn and cleared the scene around 3:45 a.m., leaving only a pile of rubble in the

Over the years, the fire department had responded to several calls at the house, and firefighters suspected teens each time, said Mason.

Officials in the-fire department weren't worried about the devil worshiping signs, he said.

"It's mostly just kids, just experimental," he said. Sgt. Thomas Quisenberry of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department (OCSD) concurred with Mason and said residents don't have to worry.

'Kids in Clarkston aren't that far gone yet," he said, adding no real evidence had been found linking the house with devil worshiping activities, such as the suspected happenings in Commerce Township. _(See_FIRE+ next-page)

Festival dates coming right up

As familiar as autumn's turning leaves and children returning to school is the Clarkston Community Historical Society's annual Crafts and Cider Festival.

In its 14th year, the festival will take place in downtown Clarkston's Depot Park with the park's trees and winding stream for a backdrop as approximately 60 crafters display their wares.

This year, the festival will take place on two days instead of three, but the hours will be longer. It is scheduled for Saturday and Sunday, Sept. 17 and 18, from 10 a.m. until 6 p.m. each day.

We have a lot of new crafters this year including jewelers, a quilter and a basket maker," says Lisa Briggs, secretary of the historical society and publicity chairman for the festival. "We also have a lot of popular repeaters."

Society volunteers will again b free sidewalk architectural tours of the Village of Clarkston in the afternoons. Interested persons may gather at a table set up near the historical society's main tent in the park. While waiting for the tour to begin, participants will be invited to view cable programs produced by society members.

The society will once again sell cider and donuts to raise funds for their various projects. And they will have the second in a series of four artist-designed mugs for sale.

Last year, the first of the series was designed by artist Sally Kubani. This year, the second has been designed by artist Robert Hubbach. The society plans to continue creating mugs for another two years to complete a set of four, Briggs said.

There will also be a raffle, with prizes that include an overnight stay at the National House in Marshall, Mich., a piece of crystal donated by a local gallery, and gift certificates for meals at local restaurants.

Status quo for crime

School doesn't have much affect on crime, said Detective Steve Parker of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department.

Crime committed by teens remains constant whether kids are in class or not, he said, adding only certain problems lessen with the school year.

"The thing about school is it tends to get them off the street in the evenings," Parker said. "They usually have homework, and you don't get the loiterers'til 11 or 12 o'clock in the evening."

Colder weather also keeps them off the streets and from loitering in front of businesses, he said.

The malicious destruction of property, however, doesn't let up just because school started. Mailboxes are still battered; buildings and cars are still scratched and spray painted.

Turfing -- spinning car wheels on healthy, green lawns -- tends to decrease, but colder weather and snow may contribute to the decrease, he said.

If officials do turn up anything, an investigation will

OCSD Detective Steve Parker said the house was mostly known for housing drinking teenagers, and some officials speculated that residents may have started the fire to rid the area of the troublesome spot.

For now, the teens are gone, he said, but "the problem is, if you get rid of one place, they're going to find another place. They've just lost their hideout is all."



Please Put Trash in



Recently we've been advertising for office help. The primary job is to take want ads over the phone. Correct spelling is important . . . just ask the people who are billed for ads with misspelled words.

We understand if people can't spell names given to cars (Peugeot), or animals (Doberman pinscher), or appliances, or streets, etc., but we don't understand when they can't spell calendar . . . which many can't.

Now when I was a boy (8th grade, Bancroft) spelling was emphasized. The only one who beat me was the teacher's pet, a gal named Doris. The bee was rigged. She got to spell 'cat', I got to spell 'Siamese'.

She got to ride home from Durand with the principal, Mr. Van Horn, and I got to hitchhike.

We are not saying spelling is not taught at all. It's taught enough that every year the Detroit News spelling contests are held in all the schools we know. We applaud the News for the program they have sponsored for many years.

What we are saying is that spelling is not pushed long enough. It's seemingly forgotten after the elementary grades.

What was really bad a few years ago was the promotion of phonetic spelling in various schools. I blame that misguided teaching effort for so many job candidates spelling one of our test words, peculiar,

pequliar'

Incidently, candidates is one of the words, and it is usually spelled correctly.

Our spelling list has eleven words. They were given to us by Jim Fitzgerald when he was editor of the Lapeer County Press, a job which he will not be able to go back to when the court rejects the JOA for the Free Press.

The words are: auction, yesterday, opinion, candidate, potential, consistent, superintendent, prerogative, insensitive, prescription, peculiar and calendar.

Nearly all the applicants get the first four words right, then 'a's' replace 'i's' among other things.

It wasn't the misspellings for our office job that prompted this Jottings. It was a weather bulletin on a Detroit television station. It was a streamer across the bottom of the screen (I can't remember the channel, and since I was only watching one I can assume they all had the same mistake).

The weather bulletin read: Extreme weather Washtnaw county.

They probably meant Washtenaw county, and perhaps the typist was in the path of the storm and didn't have his/her mind on the keyboard.

Some I've interviewed ask, "Don't you have a spell check on your computer?"

Perhaps that software is the blame for the shortage of spellers. If that's the case, teacher, spell checkers take too much time, and they still can't spell Siamese, unless they're teacher's pet.

The Roads We Travel

It takes time

. Requestration confidence of the common stips contributed · We all tend to get impatient when things don't get

done as fast as we think they should. If any level of government is involved, we tend to blame bureaucracy and bureaucratic red tape.

Road improvements sometimes take longer than we think they should, but sometimes that is simply due to all the complex steps involved in getting the project done.

The following are some typical steps involved in road construction projects.

Project Concept Determination: A construction project doesn't just occur because somebody thought it was a good idea. Often a lot of background work has gone

For example, if it is a safety project, there has already been extensive analysis of accident data and a possible field review of the location.

Funding Identification: Everyone operates within budgets of some type. If there are no funds available in the current budget for a project, then it might be delayed and included in the next year's budget. If more than one agency is to participate, then several budgets may be

If federal funds are to be used, there is an application process that must be followed, and the project may have to compete with other projects in the county or state

for those limited federal funds. If the project loses out, it may have to be delayed until more federal funds become available.

Preliminary Engineering: This is where the surveys are made and the design work is completed. In Oakland County, this is not always as straight forward as one might expect, since some roads must be designed to wind safely around lakes and wetlands.

Alternative designs may have to be considered, and methods must be chosen for dealing with adverse soils (muck, for instance), existing traffic and other special

conditions.

Environmental Review: Depending on the size of the project and type of funding involved, documentation of the impact of the project on the environment may be required. If it is a very large federally funded project with significant impact, a full environmental impact statement máy have to be prepared with an official public hearing and federal review:

Public Hearings/Informational Meetings: Again, depending on the size and type of project, there may be either a public hearing or informational meeting to solicit comments and concerns and let the local business people and residents know what is being proposed.

Grade Inspection: If federal funds are involved, staff of the Federal Highway Administration will schedule an inspection of the site and review of the plans. They sometimes require changes to the plans, usually involving more design time and higher project costs.

Right-of-Way Acquisition: Once the design work is far enough along to indicate what additional land is required, personnel from the right-of-way division begin negotiating with the adjacent property owners for that

Independent appraisals may be required. If the property owner holds out for more money, or whatever, court action through condemnation procedures may be

Bid Letting: All projects are advertised for bids. Contractors bid on the work, and generally, the work is let to the lowest bidder.

Construction: The project could probably be built pretty fast if we could just close the road and turn the contractor loose. However, we are seldom able to do

Most of the time, the project must be built while traffic continues to move through the area (an example is the current reconstruction of I-75).

Sometimes a temporary road must be built to handle the traffic while the construction of the mail road is under way. All of this means time and additional money.

During construction, the road agency involved will be inspecting and testing materials being used. Obviously, weather can also delay progress of the construction of the project.

Keep the above in mind the next time you hear that a road is supposed to be improved, and it doesn't seem to happen quite as quickly as you expected.

So what is there to laugh about? City life has its risks

I thought about that question for a while, and came up with an answer that likens life in the big city to mountain climbing. You know you could get killed or hurt, but the adventure is worth the risk. We live here because it's here.

There is much pleasure in living in a downtown highrise. I can look out one window and see the lights of Tiger Stadium. Out another window I see freighters from Europe and Milwaukee gliding on the beautiful Detroit River. I see a couple of fine restaurants I enjoy visiting. I'm a short walk away from lots of enjoyment, in Greektown, Ford Auditorium, the RenCen and so on.

I'm lucky. I live where I do by choice; I'm not financially trapped in some scummy neighborhood where police protection is a sad joke. Downtown is full of cops, protecting the city's image as seen by tourists, making sure the riverfront is worthy of being named after the Lord

Mayor Coleman Young. A fortunate thing about living in the big city is that your tolerance for crime inflates, just like prices. No matter if you live downtown or in the neighborhoods, there is no guarantee against the rapist in the park, the burglar through your window. The bad guys are everywhere, in varied numbers, and you gradually grow to accept it.

Twelve years ago, as a newcomer to the city after a lifetime of rural living, my wife would have screamed and fled from that young man offering sex in the park. Today it is an adventure, a funny story to tell at cocktail parties. You get used to it

On a Saturday morning she took granddaughter, Emily, visiting from her small town home, shopping in colorful Eastern Market. They were in a spice store when a drunken man had to be evicted, with much pushing, shoving and cursing. Emily was frightened and wanted to get out of there immediately. Her grandma wouldn't leave until her purchases were completed.

Later, we chuckled about Emily's inexperienced reaction. Twelve years earlier, her grandma would have gone through a wall to get out of that store quickly.

On the door of the drugstore where I frequently shop there is a sign that says "No Change Without \$5 Purchase." Huh? What if I want to buy a \$2.50 item with three dollar bills? The owner said not to worry, the only purpose of the sign is to discourage thieves from asking for change just to see how much money is in the cash register. That made me laugh. It didn't make me worry about being caught inside the store during a holdup.

A few days ago a 14-year-old boy boarded the Mack bus at Cadillac Square and, a few blocks later, was shot dead by a fellow passenger. I often board the Mack bus at Cadillac Square. My wife and I wondered, with a laugh, how many times I've sat next to some young punk carry-

That's life in the big city, accepting risk to gain adventure, just like mountain climbing. We enjoy the excitement and laugh at the danger of falling off the mountain. We laugh nervously.

We laugh to keep from crying. M"

School bond awarded to NBD

National Bank of Detroit was the winning bidder on a \$3.69 million Clarkston school bond, with an interest rate of 7.2967 percent.

NBD was the lowest of six bids, which ranged up to 7.514 percent, according to William Jackson, director of business services for Clarkston schools.

The Clarkston Board of Education accepted the NBD bid during a special meeting Aug. 30. The board also authorized establishing an account for the money at Oxford Bank, because the bond money-must be accounted for separately.

NBD was appointed as the registrar and paying agent for the bond issue.

A \$5.2 million bond issue for school repairs was approved by voters in June. Although the school district has the authority to issue the entire amount, a split was to their advantage, Jackson said.

If they sold more than \$5 million in one year, the government could recapture some of the interest earnings, he said. So they will sell the remaining portion of the bond issue after the first of the year.

"We received an excellent rating for a school district of this size in the state of Michigan," he added.

They are only "one notch" below Birmingham for a credit rating. By comparison, he said a recent bond sale in the Anchor Bay school district was approved at 7.37

One reason for the good interest rate was that voters solidly approved the bond issue, Jackson said. Rating agencies in New York, which have a lot to do with the final rating, were surprised by the two-to-one margin of victory.

State lottery head discusses education

I don't know how many times I've been asked, "Where is all that lottery money going?" or "Why should I vote for a local millage issue when my taxes are already too high and the lottery was supposed to reduce them."

Furthermore, because lottery funding for education is so frequently misunderstood and difficult to explain, local school boards have an even tougher job convincing voters to support millage proposals.

Several things contribute to misconceptions about lottery support to schools, especially the fact that a lot of people just don't realize how much it costs to educate our young people.

According to Department of Education figures, the total cost of educating the 1.6 million children currently attending public school in Michigan is a whopping \$6.7 billion. That's billion dollars, not million.

Secondly, I suspect many assume the state provides the lion's share of funding for schools. This is simply not the case. More than half of this revenue must come from local taxpayers -- in spite of the fact that the largest share (34 percent) of the total state operating budget goes for education.

The State of Michigan's contribution to education is primarily in the form of revenue from the School Aid Fund, and that's where the lottery comes into the picture.

Since 1981, all net lottery revenues have been specifically earmarked for inclusion in that fund to help support kindergarten-12th grade public education.

Lottery money amounts to about 16 percent of revenue in the School Aid Fund annually, or \$407 million last year. The rest comes from a variety of other sources including the state's general fund.

The school aid fund is then distributed by the department of education according to terms of the state school aid formula, established each year by our elected representatives in the Michigan Legislature.

The school aid formula is the method used to determine which school districts are eligible for state aid (in-formula), and those not eligible for state aid (out-offormula) because local taxpayer support is adequate to

provide quality education with minimal state assistance.

So, school districts with a poorer local tax base receive more state aid than those in which there are adequate local resources.

Nevertheless, lottery support of education has indirectly saved taxpayers money because the state not longer has to pull a comparable amount out of the state's general fund -- made up primarily of money collected from taxpayers -- to fulfill its role in supporting education. (During the last two years, lottery funding was the equivalent of about \$250 per Michigan household.)

It's also important to note that both lottery contributions and general fund money for education have increased over the past few years.

Maybe all the confusion began back in 1972 when the lottery was first begun.

I'm sure many who voted on the referendum that permitted its establishment wanted to believe it would be a cure-all for educational funding woes. It's even possible that some proponents contributed to this misconception. But, the fact remains that the lottery is not a panacea.

My intent here is not to downplay the role of the Michigan Lottery. It has, and will continue to be, very important in helping provide needed revenue for our schools. But, the lottery's contribution can never be anywhere near large enough to carry that burden alone.

As citizens who understand that our hope for the future rests with the children of today, we must support our local school boards and approve millage proposals when needed.

Providing a quality education for our young people is a responsibility we all share.



He won an award for riding a human-powered vehicle the farthest distance to the meet.





"She is a lot more confident," said Taylor. "She ran well in track and is a steady performer."


Seniors Nicole Chinavare and Emily Winfield and junior Bree Michelson round out the short roster for


Another good prospect is Steve Tungate, the other 10th-grader on the team.

For two quarters, the visiting Clarkston High School team battled the Bobcats and gouged out a slim 6-3 edge at halftime. Then disaster struck.

Chris Parker did a good job the one time he was called on to punt, getting a few oohs and aahs out of the crowd after his high end-over-end kick.

Grand Blanc opened the scoring on its first possession with a 39-yard field goal by Tom Dusseau at the 8:37 mark of the first quarter.

Clarkston answered with a score of its own on the Wolves' first time on offense.

The visitors began on their own 35-yard line and slowly marched down the field behind the running of King and Kinzler and several short passes from Dane Davis. A couple of Grand Blanc penalties also helped the

King capped the scoring drive by reaching paydirt from the 4-yard line with 22 seconds left in the opening. stanza.

Grand Blanc mounted the only scoring threat in the second quarter when it drove from its own 34-yard line to the Clarkston 12 before turning the ball over on a fumble.

The Bobcats scored the winning points on a 5-yard run by David Haynie with less than six minutes to go in the third quarter. His TD capped a 70-yard march down the field. The successful point-after attempt made it 10-6 in Grand Blanc's favor.





No chalkboards are in the frozen foods section of the supermarket. Reference books are scarce in the dairy case, and no "pop quiz" lurks behind the canned goods. But the supermarket is an excellent classroom in which to teach heart health. And parents can be the teachers.

Because most moms and dads work, weekly grocery shopping is likely done after work and school hours, often with the children along for the trip.

Good eating habits begin with the types of food you choose, says Karen Jackson, R.D. a volunteer for the American Heart Association.

Children can be taught early to make good choices, Jackson said.

Studies show that American children, like adults, tend to eat more foods containing fat and cholesterol than they should. Higher levels of cholesterol, a fatty substance that becomes deposited in the arteries, greatly increase a person's risk of heart attack.

Children can learn to prefer healthful, low-fat foods over those high in fat and cholesterol that may lead to later problems with cholesterol levels, Jackson says.

Selection of the healthiest frozen, canned or packaged foods isn't hard once you and your child learn a few facts about labels and looks. There are "rules of shelf" tips which can help you and your child pass the supermarket nutrition course.

O Look for items which are low-fat, low-cholesterol and low in sodium. Prepare them at home without adding fat or salt, carrying the supermarket education into the kitchen at home.

O At the meat counter, look for meats that are lean, without much "marbling" or visible fatty streaks. At home, trim the fat and encourage your family to eat no more than six ounces of fish, poultry or lean meat a day. Beans can be substituted as a source of protein.

O In canned goods, compare labels. Your child can do this. Choose products with the lowest amounts of fat, sodium and cholesterol. The dairy case offers clearer lessons. Most products identify themselves as "low-fat" or "non-fat" or "skimmed."

The right choices at the grocery store add up to good grades for you and your child. Choosing hearthealthy foods will help you pass the course.







Clarkston couple opens TCBY franchise on Dixie

When a Clarkston couple opened a TCBY yogurt shop on Aug. 5, it was special for more than the obvious reason.

Steve Marsden celebrated his 42nd birthday the same day as the store - located in Waterfall Plaza on Dixie Highway in Waterford Township - first welcomed curious customers.

Acquaintances of Steve and his wife Sharon of West Washington Street, Clarkston, opened a TCBY yogurt

franchise in Mount Morris a while back and invited the Marsdens to sample the ice-cream like dessert. After one taste, the couple knew they were onto something.

"Frozen yogurt is the coming thing," said Steve, who teaches at Waterford Mason Junior High. "Everybody is concerned with exercise and eating right."

After a month in business, he's surprised to discover the number of people who don't know anything about frozen yogurt. Many people who don't like regular yogurt believe the frozen variety tastes the same.

But whether curious or adventurous, a steady flow of customers manage to keep his employees busy

throughout the workday. In the coming months, plans include various promotions to help increase awareness.

One area of the business that needs no help is atmosphere. Customers have instantly taken to the ice-cream parlor ambiance of the shop.

"It's like an old-time romance of the old-fashioned

soda shop," he said. "Yet it's modern-day since the yogurt has the calories of ice cream."

Sixteen-year residents of Clarkston, the Marsdens have two children, 14-year-old Matt and 10-year-old Abby, and both enjoy working at the store whenever they can.

For the immediate future, he doesn't see the shop becoming his main source of income. Right now, teaching still thrills him.

"Teaching is one of the important things to me," he said. "I enjoy working with kids, this (shop) is something extra."

The main base for TCBY, The Country's Best Yogurt, is in Arkansas. About 1,100 stores have opened since the franchise was started in 1982, Steve said.

The product is 96 percent fat-free and contains only 29 calories per ounce, he added. Shakes, parfaits, sundaes and everything else normally made with ice cream at other shops are available at TCBY.

Customers can choose from six flavors on any given day. Two are vanilla and chocolate; the many others are rotated on a daily basis to ensure repeat business.

"It's fun to start recognizing faces every day and learning what they order," Steve said.

- Melon inspiration

On my way home from Lansing recently, I passed through Howell. Several roadside stands advertised Howell melons. I wondered if they tasted as delicious as controlled.

Quickly, I developed in my mind how I would serve the melon for dinner that evening. When I had left earlier in the day, the power was out at my home, but there is always the barbecue grill.

I would grill some chicken breasts, toss them with zucchini that was in the refrigerator, add melon balls, a bit of mayo and a squeeze of lemon. This would produce a hot-cold summer salad.

If I purchased some fresh ears of corn, I could cook them on the grill also. Who needs electricity anyway? It has been so unfaithful this summer!

But as I pressed the electric garage door opener and the door popped up, I knew that power had returned to my kitchen. How quickly I forgave Reddi Kilowatt!

Cooking corn and chicken on the grill in 90 degrees didn't seem as appealing as cooking both in the microwave oven in my cooler kitchen.

QUICK SUMMER SALAD

Serves 2
1 chicken breast (2 pieces), boned and skinned
Melon balls from half a (Howell) cantaloupe
1 small to medium zucchini cut into bite-size chunks
Just enough mayonnaise to blend together

Squeeze of fresh lemon
Place chicken breasts on microwavable plate.
Cover with waxed paper. Microwave at high power until just cooked, about 4-5 minutes.

Cut into pieces. Chill. When cold, combine with zucchini pieces and melon balls. Add mayonnaise (I used

reduced fat variety) and squeeze of fresh lemon. Serve on lettuce leaf.

You may add favorite spices or herbs, but we like the taste of the melon to predominate.

I've offered microwave directions for corn, but here they are again.

CORN ON THE COB

2 ears of corn with husks left on Dish pan of water

Microwavable paper towels 2 tablespoons butter or margarine

Salt (optional, but, honest, this is the only time I put a salt shaker on the table)

Soak the corn in water while making other dinner preparations. Remove ear from water, shaking off excess. Wrap in paper towel.

Place on floor of oven; microwave at high power 6 to 8 minutes for 2 ears, depending on the size. Let corn stand a few minutes while you melt the butter in the microwave oven -- high power for 15 to 20 seconds in a small Pyrex dish.

The corn husks will easily peel off when you are ready to eat.

Yes, the Howell melon was wonderful and sweet, and thank goodness the rain came before all the corn was ruined!




