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Construction requires staff changes

Temporary reassignments in the Clarkston school district will aid in monitoring district construction associated with the \$5.2 million bond issue, approved by voters in June.

"Because of current and (possible) future projects in the district, you need a person on staff as an owner's representative," said Superintendent Gary Haner.

Conrad Bruce, director of personnel services, expressed an interest in the position, Haner said, and has a background in vocational education.

When Bruce was assigned the task of monitoring

the construction, Dr. Robert Burek, Clarkston High School principal assumed some of the duties of the personnel director. In turn, Sandra Srabian, CHS guidance counselor, is serving as a half-time principal at the high school.

Social studies teacher Larry Mahrle, has been assigned the other half of Srabian's counseling duties, and a half-time teacher, Dan Wellenborg, was hired to

Whooo could have known?

While a tree trimming firm was doing maintenance work on a large tree in front of the Church Street home of Doug and Judy Roeser, they surprised a sleepy screech owl as they removed a hollow limb.

After the limb fell some 10 or 12 feet to the ground, the rudely awakened owl, a nocturnal bird who was apparently asleep in what used to be his lofty home, peeked out.

The trimmer knocked on the door to tell the homeowners about the owl's plight. Doug, who is on the village council and is in charge of beautification in Clarkston, was not at home, but Judy was. She went out to investigate.

"The poor little thing was just blinking and looking like, 'what happened to me?'" Judy said.

She was afraid the owl might be injured, so after the trimmer extricated it from the limb, she put it in box and called the Michigan Humane Society. They instructed her to bring it in to their wildlife division.

According to Mary Miceli, a veterinary technician in the Humane Society clinic, they kept the owl for observation for a couple of days to make sure it was all right. But there were no apparent injuries; it was merely stunned.

The owl was released in Lapeer County last Wednesday evening, Miceli said, and should be able to adapt. There is even the possibility that it may fly back to Clarkston. If it does, hopefully it will not choose another tree that is being beautified.

Wet fall creates road problems

With the wet fall season, gravel roads in Independence and Springfield townships have had a tough time holding up.

The Oakland County Road Commission (OCRC) citizen services department has been deluged with hundreds of telephone calls from all over the county asking why the road commission maintenance department's graders haven't been seen on gravel roads lately.

Of the 2,383 miles which constitute the Oakland County road system, more than 970 are gravel roads. This is roughly equivalent to a gravel road from Adrian to Ironwood, with a side road from Ironwood to Charlevoix tacked on.

"This past summer was the hottest summer in 50 years, ... and this fall has been the wettest fall I can remember," said John L. Grubba, OCRC managing director. "If folks think it's been difficult working in their yards and gardens this fall because of the rain and wet earth, imagine trying to grade nearly 1,000 miles of mud."

The road commission had tried to take advantage whatever dry weather Oakland County has had, said Grubba. Employees have worked overtime and on weekends when possible.

Wet earth and gravel will not compact properly, and the extreme weight of the road grading machines tends to compound the problem on the soggy roadway, said Grubba.

but they weren't approved either.

The Independence Township commission voted 4-1 to table the plans until after the commission members can walk the site and other questions can be answered.

Voting yes to table were Chairperson Brent Bair, Joseph Figa, Jo Fussman and Steven Secatch. Richard Oppmann voted no, and Dr. Bruce Mercado and Daniel Travis were absent.

The planning commission denied the first set of plans in October, objecting to the high tech architectural style of the A & P store and to bulldozing the 25.26-acre site, which would destroy mature oak trees on the property.

Last week, commission members said the new A & P design was better, but they were still concerned with the intense development of the site.

Architect Howard Nudell said the development still required the loss of a lot of trees, but that the developers would plant a lot of new trees along Dixie Highway and White Lake Road.

"That was a conscious decision. We knew we were taking away, and we want to give back," Nudell said.

"There's quite a lot of thought put into this," he said. "We've come up with a traditional look that we think will fit in very nicely with the Clarkston Community."

The plans include a pedestrian walkway to the adjacent North Crest Condominiums, a berm in the greenbelt along Dixie Highway, and cluster plantings that Planning Consultant Richard Carlisle called an "innovative concept."

"What is proposed for A & P is much more appropriate for the balance of the shopping center and in our opinion for the balance of the community," said Carlisle. "There has been a lot of improvement on the site."

Fussman objected to the density of development.

"The parcel is developed as tightly as it can possibly be. ... There's not room for anything natural there. I'm still unhappy with the total concept, which is removing the total vegetation on 25 acres. It's just a very conventional site plan. I don't think it's up to the

standards we deserve."

Oppmann expressed approval: "I think it's a dramatic improvement. It harmonizes with the entire center."

Other concerns were over the layout of the parking lot and the number of buildings on the site.

After the plans were tabled, Nudell refused comment.

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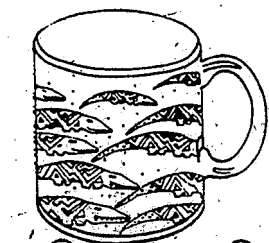
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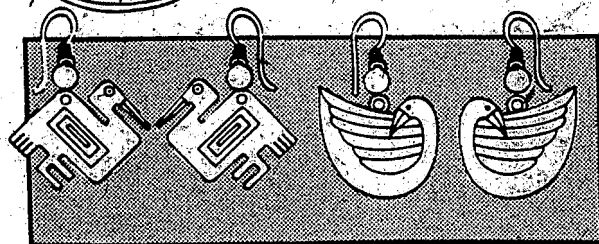
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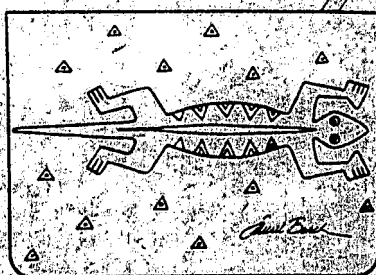
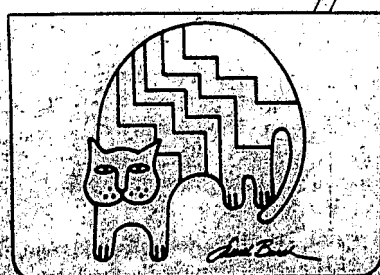
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And to help society accept them

Autistic program aims to help children cope

In the new wing at Clarkston Elementary School, teacher Lisa Daiek and paraprofessional Linda Betz work with three youngsters, ages three to five, stringing dyed pasta on yarn for the Christmas tree.

Across the way in another classroom, teacher Maureen Ziegler and paraprofessional Linda Smith work with five older children, ages seven to nine, also making Christmas decorations. These children are further along than the younger ones. There is more interaction as they cut and paste paper chains for the tree.

Back in the younger classroom, 3-year-old John Nolan looks at the bead, then at the teacher, then back to the brightly colored bead clutched in his hand and poised over the blue yarn before him. He is a dark-eyed, handsome little boy, quieter than some who have his handicap.

The children in these two classrooms are autistic, which means they have a life-long developmental disability that affects their ability to communicate and socialize.

"It's probably going to be life long, so you're working with the whole family, trying to prepare kids for adult life."

It is a neurological disease, one not easily diagnosed or even understood.

These teachers and aids understand. They tenderly work with their young charges in this special wing at Clarkston Elementary, which is funded by Oakland County Intermediate Schools.

The program for the autistically impaired began in the Clarkston school district at North Sashabaw Eleme-

tary last school year but moved to the new wing this fall after it was completed at county expense.

Also funded by the county are the two special education teachers, Daiek and Ziegler, and support staff: school psychologist Laurie Rightler, school social worker Sharon Steinhilper, speech therapist Elizabeth Talbot, and three paraprofessionals, Smith, Betz and Sandy Knake. Some of the staff work part-time for the district as well.

The Clarkston district is responsible for eventually taking on the junior high and high school autistic program for Oakland County, according to Special Service Director Robert Brumback, with a target of 1992. For now, older children in Oakland County go to Birmingham or Lamphere school districts.

Autistic children are a challenge for special education teachers at any level. They may have slow development or lack physical, social and learning skills. They have abnormal responses to sensations such as sight, hearing, touch, pain, balance, smell or taste.

In addition, they may have delayed, highly unusual, or even totally absent speech and language skills, or use words without attaching the typical meaning to them. They may have very different ways of relating to people.

While there is a wide range of abilities among autistic people, they have some or all of these disabilities.

The children are frequently "beautiful children," the teachers agree. It is their behavior which tells you there is something special about them.

"We don't have all the answers. But we're at least learning together and going in the right direction."

There is a limit of five students per classroom, for good reason. They keep the teachers and aids very busy. Most resist change in routine, are marked by physical over-activity, can be aggressive at times, resist learning and react inappropriately to objects and events.

It is now "circle time" in the younger classroom. Betz holds one crying youngster, 3-year-old Max Hook, who attends the class half-days, as does a young girl. But there are few girls in the class--the disability is four times more common in boys.

During circle time, the children sit on the floor and take turns greeting each other and placing their own name next to their picture on the wall. There are lots of hugs and encouragement to coax the children to perform.

This is done to get them to recognize each other and themselves, Betz explains, and to learn to do a proper greeting, "because they are so into their own little worlds."

No trespassing in school swamp

A small wetlands area by the Clarkston schools administration building on Clarkston Road is off limits to hunters and trappers, and the administration wants to remind people of that fact, according to Assistant Superintendent Mel Vaara.

A concerned citizen called the school board office a week ago to say that someone was trapping on the property after men in high boots were seen in the swampy area.

"They would be trespassing," Vaara said. He plans to post "No Trespassing" signs on the property, which belongs to the Clarkston school district. And if, as the caller said, there are traps on the property, they will be removed.

"It's a nice little wetlands area," he said, complete with muskrat mounds and a variety of birds. "We don't want people in there."

Sashabaw sewer tax district meets opposition

Plaudits and protests over a special sewer tax came from about 15 people at a Nov. 29 public hearing before the Independence Township Board.

The board took no action last week and is to consider adopting the sewer special assessment district at a future meeting.

Property owners who protested were concerned with their portion of the \$390,500 cost for the Sashabaw Road sewer extension from McDonald's to Waldon Road.

Proponents of the special assessment district said the sewer would benefit their property so much that the cost of the sewer would easily be recovered.

Each parcel would be taxed according to how much it would use the sewer if the property is developed as currently zoned.

A few property owners spoke against the assessment district.

Charles Nunn, who owns property abutting I-75, said his steep grade and wetlands made most of his property unbuildable, so his assessment shouldn't be as

high.

"I'm not in the position to develop my property. I don't understand why I have to pay for someone else to develop their property," he said.

John Marshall said that wetlands also made some of his property difficult to develop and add that his assessment should be recalculated.

Irving Keene, representing Ravet and Sklar which owns property on the east side of Sashabaw Road, said the actual assessments were two or three times higher than the original estimates.

Although his clients signed a petition favoring the project, they would withdraw their names at that cost, he said.

"There is just no possibility of the market value of these parcels increasing by that amount," Keene said. Jack Kent expressed the opposite viewpoint.

"My feeling is you can pay almost any price to put this sewer in, and you're going to get your money back," he said.

"This is going to be a golden corridor. ... It's a beautiful piece of property. If it's handled properly, it will be a benefit to the entire township," he said.

Arkan Jonna, who initiated the sewer project when he decided to develop a shopping center at the southwest

corner of Sashabaw and Waldon roads, said the monetary returns on the sewer were secondary.

"Besides land values increasing, there's something more important we should look at," he said. "If you don't have sewers, ... everybody's going to develop using septic tanks. Eventually, we're going to have trouble with the main aquifer. Eventually, you're going to have contamination. That should be the main issue."

Realtor Nancy Caruso said that sewers would greatly increase the value of the property because sewers are the first thing potential developers ask about.

After the public comments, board members said they would consider the comments and make a decision at a future meeting.

"We have to move away from septic," said Clerk Richard Holman. "I don't believe there's any alternative to special assessment districts."

Treasurer John Lutz agreed. "It will be one of the highest tapped areas of the township because it is the center of the community," he said.

Of the 28 parcels that would be taxed for the sewer, the lowest charge would be \$1,112. Highest would be \$74,565, said township assessor David Kramer. The taxes could be paid in one lump sum or spread over a few years.

"Fairness is the key to the whole thing," said Kramer. "The sewer is going to benefit everyone along that corridor. Ultimately, everyone's going to tap into it."

As I now sit in Kathy's seat typing (on a wonderful, modern computer), much has changed, although some things have remained the same.

Since Kathy left the paper for an editing job with the Flint Journal, the office looks bare without her photographs. The stark walls symbolize the absence the staff feels at having lost Kathy's steady influence and firm guidance.

The staff, too, has changed since that interview. The paper grew. My position soon turned into a full-time job; Carolyn Walker left to be a full time mother; Pat Young took her position.

Instead of Dan Vandenhemel at the sports desk, Peter Auchter accepts the good-natured jokes from his exuberant coworkers. Like Dan, Pete dishes them out, as well.

Donna Fahrner still sits at the front desk, one eye on the office, one eye on the community. And Stu McTeer offers good, sound advice mixed with humor to his advertising staff.

In a way, Kathy, too, remains -- in the awards the paper has won under her tenure, in the strong values we carry as a result of her influence, in the thorough reporting techniques she bestowed upon the staff.

I considered all of this as I faced the applicants for the open reporter's job, and then I dug in, eager to begin the challenge before me.

There should have been the sound of a bugle, the crash of a cymbal, or at least a sympathetic smile from the woman who did it to me. But there was only a resigned, it's-finally-happened feeling in the pit of my mind. After many years of paying closer and closer, I finally paid \$5 for a movie ticket.

The date was Nov. 18, 1988. The location was the AMC Abby 4 theater on Fourteen Mile Road. The movie was "A Cry in the Dark". The occasion was inevitable, but no less momentous.

The first movie ticket I remember buying cost five cents. For that sum I saw two features, cartoon, serial chapter, newsreel and five minutes of coming attractions. I would often sit through the whole thing twice, and when I returned home, my father would remark on how much I'd grown since he last saw me.

The year was 1933 and the theater was the Pine Grove, a few blocks north of my home in Port Huron. Fifty-five years later, the Pine Grove marquee is still there, but it's been a long time since there was a theater behind it. The last time I drove by, it was a dry cleaners. Most U.S. cities have at least one old movie marquee hanging out over the sidewalk, advertising something other than a movie. I've seen a movie marquee on a funeral home. Those canopies must be awfully hard to take down.

The continued use of old-fashioned movie buildings for other businesses prompts an interesting question: If movies were no longer shown in today's modern multi-screen theaters, what else would they be good for? Rabbit warrens, probably, or boxes for professional basketball players' shoes.

Since I was seven years old, I've surely averaged one movie a week, maybe more. That means I've seen at least 2,800 movies, and that's not counting TV and VCR. If there's no popcorn for sale in the lobby, it's not really a movie, it's something you watch at home because you can't afford to go out for a really good time.

By the time I was a teenager, movies cost as much as 25 cents, which meant half a dollar if you had a date. The smartest thing I ever did in my life was establish a relationship with a girl who sold tickets at the Riviera, another marquee still hanging in there in Port Huron - over a bar. She let me in free, when the manager wasn't looking, and I rewarded her by flirting hopefully - but (Juu) fruitlessly - with the girl at the popcorn counter.

Obviously, the price of a movie ticket has always been an important factor in my social life. There were financially difficult times after I first became a husband and father. Today, my wife swears I used to drive to Detroit to see a movie while she and the kids waited in the car.

She exaggerates. Once I did take the two youngest children to a show while my wife and oldest daughter (adult price) seized the opportunity to stop at stop streets. But usually, for movie weekends in the big city, I rented a room at the Monterey Motel in Highland Park and left my family there watching TV while I enjoyed the fleshier delights of the Fox or Grand Circus theaters. I always liked the Monterey because its swimming pool rippled on the other side of saloon windows, like an aquarium, and I could prevent the kids from drowning without leaving my bar stool.

Thirteen years ago, when I made Detroit my permanent home, first-run movie tickets were around \$3. Just a month ago, I paid \$4.75. And then, on Nov. 18, it was \$5. For a sentimental fellow who used to pay a nickel, it wasn't so much expensive as it was epochal.

Today, before the movie begins, management asks the audience to "refrain from unnecessary talking." It has long been my opinion that the only talking necessary in a theater is, to the woman beside me: "If you wanted popcorn, you should have got your own. Get your lousy hands out of mine." Or, to the idiot behind me: "SSSHHHHHH."

But on Nov. 18 I found it necessary to say, to the woman beside me: "Next epoch you wait in the car."

Consider fuel tax

OK, OK, so the registration fee did not pass. In fact, it was voted down four to one in Oakland County.

About the only thing that can be said is that it did not do as badly in Oakland as it did in some other counties where it was on the ballot.

For example, in Monroe, it went down seven to one, and in a couple of other counties, it was defeated five to one.

Here in Independence Township, only 15 percent of those who voted were for it. That was not the lowest nor the highest percentage in the county. Holly Township was the lowest at 6.7 percent, and Bloomfield Hills was the highest with 39.9 percent.

Obviously, there was not a single community where the majority of the voters were in favor of it. About the only other thing that can be said for it was that there were almost 83,000 voters out there who were willing to pay \$25 per vehicle to get the roads improved. A lot more were not willing to pay that.

So was I in favor of it? If you read my column on the topic the obvious answer is yes. Why? Because I thought it was the best way to finance road improvements? No, because at that time, it was the only option given us by the legislature, and I think the roads need help.

We can (and will now have to) seek other, better, ways of financing road improvements; but, in the meantime, the road system gets worse, and the backlog of needed improvements grows.

So where do we go from here? Well, the road agencies will push for an increase in the fuel tax that has been fixed at 15 cents a gallon since January of 1984. They've got to. They have a duty to provide "reasonably safe and convenient roads," and they need additional revenues at this point to do that.

Like it or not, you cannot continue to maintain the same level of service on a relatively fixed income. The increase in fees passed by the legislature last year helped, but it resulted in only a four percent increase in operating revenues for road agencies.

Certainly not enough to provide all the multimillion dollar major road improvements that are now demanded due to all of the development and increased traffic. It may not even cover some of the increases in normal operating costs. Within the last year, the cost of aluminum sheeting for signs went up 25 percent!

The push will be to increase the statewide fuel tax and change the formula to return more of the money to Oakland County and some other urban counties that have not been receiving back what they generate.

There may even be a renewed effort to get a local option fuel tax that would be placed on the ballot. It is interesting that our county executive, Dan Murphy, now thinks that this is the way to go. The Oakland County Road Commission went to Lansing with that proposal two years ago and was offered the registration fee as a compromise by the legislature because the legislature did not want to give the big urban counties the opportunity to raise their own gas taxes.

Why the fuel tax? Because it is the most equitable user fee we have available. Since we have no way of directly recording the miles driven and charging a service fee on that basis, the next best thing is to charge on the basis of the amount of fuel consumed.

The theory is that the more you drive and use the roads, the more you pay to maintain them. The elderly couple who drive very little pay very little, and the trucker and traveling salesperson pay a lot more.

There's going to be resistance to a fuel tax also. Many people will simply say, "No more taxes!" It will probably take a crisis.

We had one back in 1981. The fuel tax had been kept at the same level for several years, and in December of 1981, the Oakland County Road Commission was forced to lay off about 10 percent of its work force.

Snow removal and other services suffered accordingly, and the road commission has never caught up on all the road improvement needs that had to be deferred. The Michigan Department of Transportation also went through substantial reductions in staff about that time.

Here is something really scary. Congress is looking for ways to reduce the budget deficit. One alternative being seriously considered as a way of increasing revenues is an additional federal gas tax of up to 50 cents a gallon.

With that large of an increase, we would again be paying what we did a couple of years ago. It looks like an easy solution to them. Besides, look at the Europeans who pay more than \$3 a gallon due to extensive taxes on fuel. What if OPEC gets its act together and gets the price per barrel back up to where they want it?

Do you realize what that type of federal fuel tax increase would do to the chances of a local tax increase to maintain and improve roads? Think what the end result would be in terms of the condition of our roads.

Here's something to think about. If you voted against the registration fee, would you vote for a local option fuel tax of three cents a gallon? That would generate about the same amount of revenue for roads as the registration fee would have.

Site monitoring ordinance needed

White Lake Road recycling plans tabled

Citing environmental concerns and legal questions, the Independence Township Planning Commission tabled the final site plan for a controversial recycling facility on part of 32.76 acres on White Lake Road Dec. 1.

The commission is to consider the plan again in January, after an ordinance has been drafted to deal with monitoring environmentally sensitive sites, after township attorney Gerald Fisher finds out what power the Oakland County Solid Waste Board would have over the site once it's in operation, and after the recycling developer offers monitoring suggestions.

Proposed by former Waterford Township Supervisor Robert Hoffman and his brothers, James and Richard, the project received support from some commissioners who conditioned their favorable comments on solving the problems.

"Incineration is just not working the way the experts thought it would 10 years ago," said Jo Fussman. "Recycling is the wave of the future. I want this to work. We have the responsibility. ... I don't want to quit trying."

Chairperson Brent Bair agreed. "I've said all along if we can make this work I'd like to see it happen. If any planning commission can make this work, it's this one. ... (But) there are too many serious major concerns to grant final site plan approval."

The commission also questioned Hoffman about ordinance violations that occurred in November when Hoffman began to install a drainage pipe and to landscape around a pond on the site without permits from the township or Oakland County.

"I'm not impressed with the permit violations," said Bair. "Ignorance is fine for some, but not for someone who has been in public service for as long as (Hoffman) has. You shot yourself in the foot with that one."

Hoffman explained that he was mistakenly told by county employees that a permit wasn't necessary. He was landscaping in an attempt to show his good intentions, he said.

"We're doing all this because we want to be here, and we want to be a good example," Hoffman said. "We've taken every consideration here to screen that (adjacent) residential property."

Most commission members pushed for strong control of the operations on the site.

Steve Secatch said the facility would be better located on another portion of the property, so the pond wouldn't be endangered.

"Even though it's zoned heavy industrial, it doesn't mean we should be lax on this property," he said. "In fact, we should be just the opposite."

Joseph Figa also wanted more safeguards.

"The concept is basically a good concept," he said. "One of my main concerns has always been that pond. ... We have to plan for the worst and then assure that that doesn't happen. Then I think we're OK. ... What are we really in for? ... I don't like a facility that we constantly monitor and we're constantly afraid that something's going to happen."

a containment area for outdoor storage containers but cautioned that any safeguard at the site would require human control.

"With outdoor contaminants, you're relying on someone realizing a spill has occurred," he said. "It's the human element. ... The truck could tip over outside. Of course, it could tip over on any road."

Members in the audience also gave mixed support, and most were concerned over the pond on the site that feeds into Lotus, Maceday and Williams lakes in Waterford Township.

Patrick Smith of Eastlawn, Independence Township, favored the project.

"I'm in support of sorting and recycling nontoxic waste. Someone has to do it. ... It's important. This community creates garbage, and I think it should have some part in making it into a useful product."

Clarkston resident Michael Clark advised the commission to make sure its decision was defensible in Oakland County Circuit Court and added, "Recycling plants are a good idea. ... They're like group homes. Everybody says they're a good idea but not in my (See ORDINANCE, next page)



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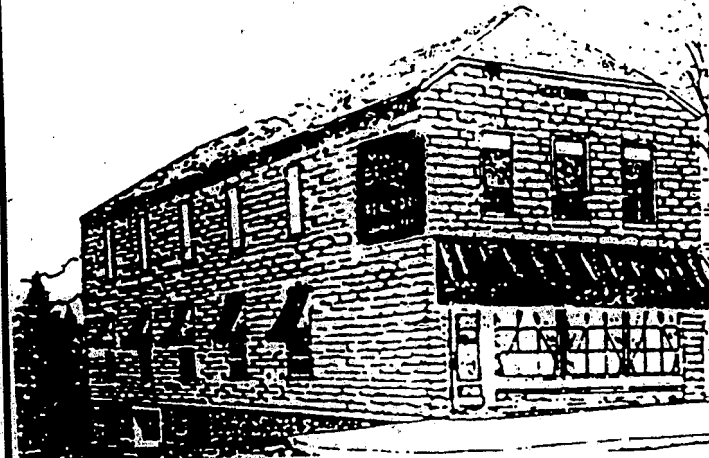
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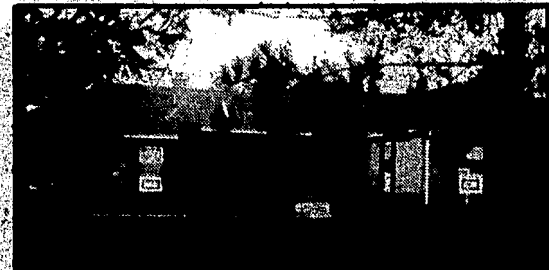

backyard.”
Carol Balzarini, former township trustee and planning commission member and current consultant to real estate developer Dan Proctor, reminded the commission that any violations of the condition of the special land use was grounds for revoking it.

Balzarini and Proctor voiced strong opposition to the project in the past.

After the meeting, Jim Hoffman, said he and his brothers would work to solve all of the problems.

“I think they’ve got legitimate concerns,” he said. “We’ve presented them with all the answers. Now that we’ve got more opposition in the audience, they’re going to put a few more stipulations -- which we’re willing to meet. We want this to work. It’s a good idea.”

Proctor, who plans to develop condominiums on a residentially zoned site adjacent to the Hoffman site, said after the meeting that the recycling building should be moved further away from the pond.

“My project would be dead if he did (build it),” Proctor said. “There’s a lot of pressure for the township to do something like this, but I don’t think he’s the person or that’s the place. ... The pond is there, and you can’t ignore it.”

If approved, the building would be used to sort materials in large construction bins and large department store bins. Cardboard and wooden crates would be separated from the trash and would be compacted and sent to a recycling facility somewhere else. The rest of the trash would be sent to a landfill.

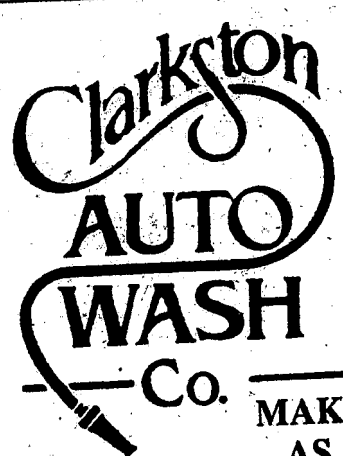
A maximum of four employees would work at sorting in the 9,800-square-foot building, and the hours of operation would be from 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Friday and 7 a.m. to 1 p.m. Saturday. The building would be closed on Sundays and holidays.

The company would not be allowed to handle sorting from other businesses -- only from its own trash pick-up business.

Edison truck to put up lighted Christmas trees in Clarkston Nov. 28.



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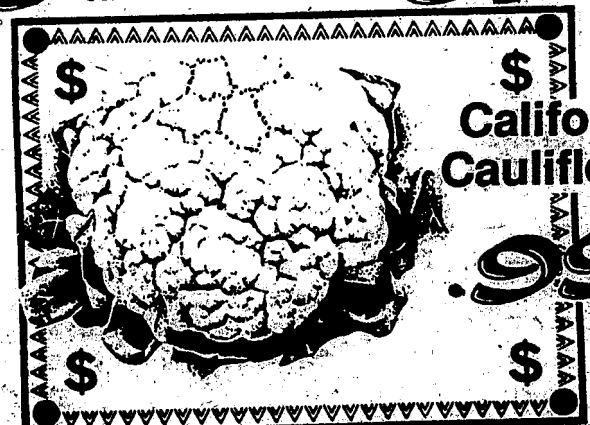
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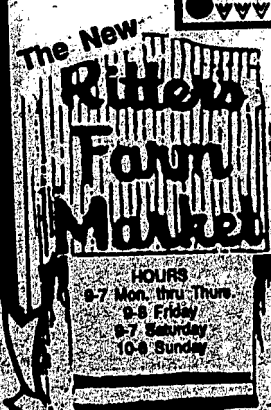

HANDBELLS will ring out during the Clarkston United Methodist Church's Christ concert Dec. 18.



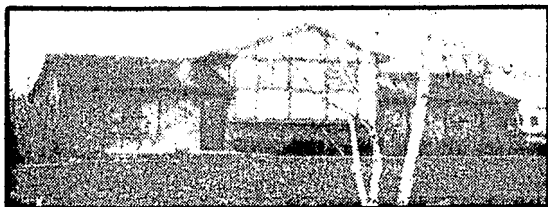
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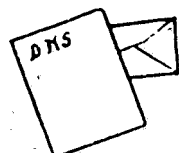
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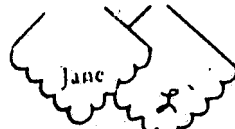
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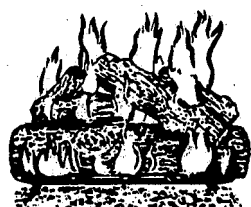
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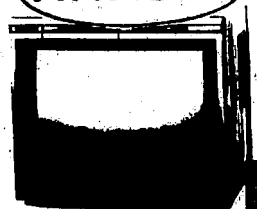
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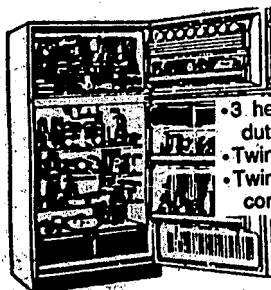
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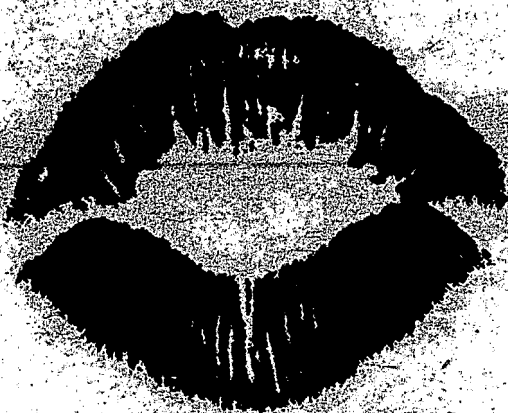
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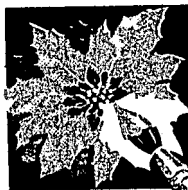
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Autistic program reaches out to those in need

Just getting them to sit in one place for a period of time is an accomplishment, she adds.

Each works at his own level, and the staff gives them as much as they can handle.

Max, tears now dried, is enthralled by a talking toy as Betz works with him.

"They don't usually play properly with toys," she explains. Max watches with childlike wonder as the string disappears back into the talking toy. He also likes to

climb on the playground-type equipment in the room.

The classroom time is very structured, Daiek explains. "We do free time with them; work on social skills, and have individual work sessions. None (of the children) are at the same level."

There may be 10 minutes of a work task, followed by a little break and then 10 more minutes of work for these young pupils.

In the classroom across the way, the older pupils have learned some communication skills.

"Most have been in the programs since they were three or four," Ziegler says. "Through school, they'll tolerate a lot more activity and sitting. Some of that is due to maturation, too."

These older pupils do pre-academics and academics. Many autistic children are intelligent and work at their own grade levels.

"You can have an IQ from 20 to above average or gifted," she says of the autistic children. "We try to keep them as near grade level as possible."

Ziegler says they also work on communications. "We have a lot of non-functional speech or no speech at all. We try to come up with a communications system that they can use."

They continue to work on social skills and self help skills for the older children, and find things for them to do in their free time.

Since they don't know how to play, she explains, they find something the child really likes to do, particularly something useful with their hands, and focus on that.

Brumback says he would put autistic children in the category of severe disorder, but stresses that there is a wide range to the disability.

"It's probably going to be life long, so you're working with the whole family, trying to prepare kids for adult life," he says.

Some communities have developed integrated work programs for handicapped people, he adds, and it has worked very well. Integration is the key word.

Even at Clarkston Elementary, pupils from the regular school population help during recess in the autistic classrooms as "peer pals." They must have parental permission, but a surprising number volunteer to work with the autistic children.

"We try to have the kids be as functional as possible," Brumback says. "For some, that means a sheltered living situation. But if there's any potential, we want to be able to develop it."

Part of making them a productive part of the community is having an understanding environment. "That's what we're trying to change," Brumback says.

When the severely handicapped weren't in the school situation, society didn't have to learn to be comfortable with them, he says. Now, these children play on the playground with others and go to lunch with them.

"But you have to have a planned integration," he says. "We can help make the child function better, so it's easier on the family, too."

It takes a real in-depth understanding, knowing all their little idiosyncrasies, he adds. "We've got some really good kids with good abilities, and we're learning to work with them. It's a new field."

Just the definition of autism has changed dramatically since the 1960's, Brumback says. These children at one time were put in mental hospitals.

There are so many levels and differences in abilities with autism, but training can make a difference in all of them.

"We don't have all the answers," Brumback says. "But we're at least learning together and going in the right direction."

take over three social studies classes that Mahrle must leave in order to assume the counseling role.

Having an owner's representative to monitor construction is a common practice, Haner said, and it was discussed even before he took over from Milford Mason as superintendent of Clarkston schools earlier this year.

"There's been no new construction for so long in Clarkston (schools) that it hasn't been an issue," Haner added.

The cost of an owner's representative is covered under administrative costs in the bond issue, so the cost of approximately \$8,291 for the half-time teacher is actually not an additional expense to the district.

The reassignments, made in October, are only for the duration of the current school year, Haner added. And the staff involved are covering most of their extra duties from their own buildings.

In a letter sent home to CHS parents explaining the changes, Burek said he was excited about the temporary changes, because it provides added help at the district level and an opportunity for individuals on the staff to get exposure and experience in new areas.

The construction associated with the bond issue approved in June includes major roof repairs to district buildings, major maintenance construction, and correction of safety code violations at some of the district buildings.

Helpful hints for tree care

Christmas trees! Whether natural or artificial, they have been a part of an American Christmas since the days of the Revolutionary War.

Picking out a natural Christmas tree is an enjoyable, ongoing tradition in many families and knowing what to look for and how to make your selection is important. The Oakland County Cooperative Extension Service (CES) offers a few tips on tree selection and care.

"First, when selecting a tree, you should make sure it's fresh," says CES director Wayne Nierman.

To detect freshness, see if the needles on the tree are pliable and well attached to the branches. A tree that is not fresh will have brittle needles, and they will fall off easily. Following are ways to check for freshness.

- Run your hand through some of the needles. If they break off and seem hard and brittle, chances are the tree is not fresh, and you should make another selection.

- Bump the base of the tree hard on the ground and check to see if a large number of needles fall off the tree. If so, look for another tree.

- Feel the bottom of the tree stump. If it is moist and sappy, it's a good sign that the tree is fresh and would make a good purchase.

- Choose a tree size that will easily fit your space. Last minute trimming can be frustrating.

- Once you have your tree for the 1988 season, maintenance and care through the holidays is the key to long lasting enjoyment. Here are a few tips.

- Before putting the tree in its stand, cut an inch or two off the trunk, squarely, at its base. This will allow the tree to take up water more readily throughout the holidays.

- Keep the tree stand full of water -- well above the tip or end of the trunk -- to prevent needles from dropping and to increase the tree's fire resistance.

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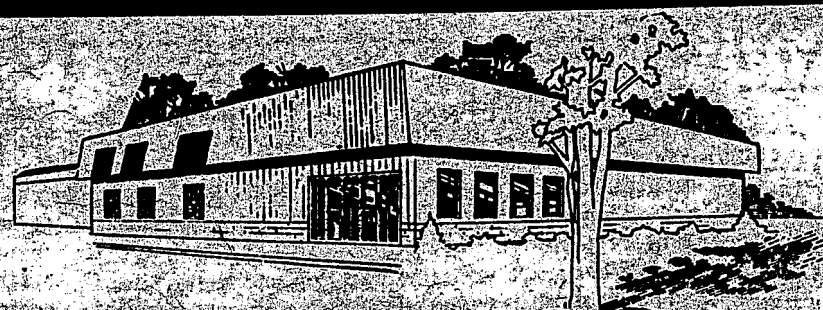
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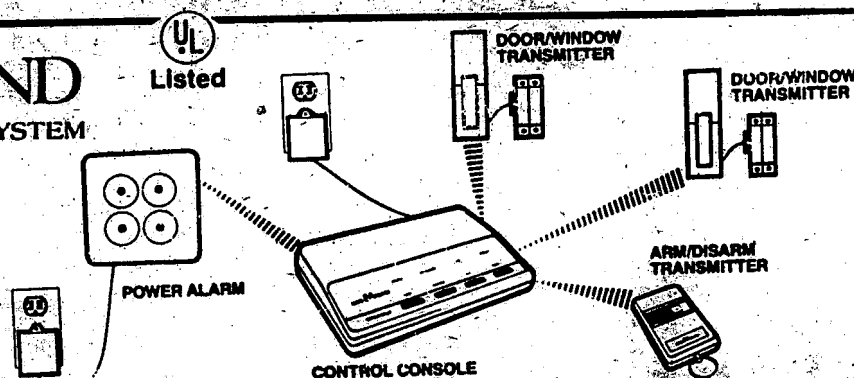
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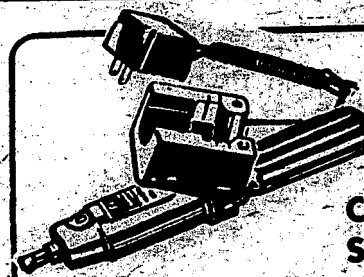
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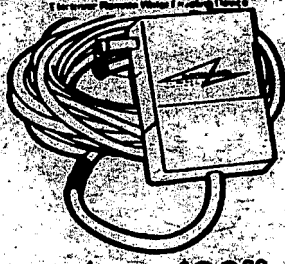


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Springfield residents like rural town character

While campaigning this fall, Trustee-elect Nancy Strole of Springfield Township handed out a survey to approximately 22 percent of the households in the township. Of those, about 10 percent completed and returned the survey to her.

What she hoped for and got, Strole said, is a sense of the residents' views and concerns on a broad range of issues.

"If I was elected, I didn't want to sit up there and vote on what I thought they wanted," Strole said. "I wanted to know what they wanted on basic issues."

She said she didn't see her role as simply doing what she wanted based on personal views but rather as a representative of the people.

Some of the results surprised her.

As a resident who was very active in fighting the youth detention camp and the prison in Springfield Township, Strole said she thought her personal views were stronger than those of other residents about the township being targeted as a "dumping ground" for controversial programs.

"Boy, was I wrong," she said.

Around 89 percent of respondents (98 of those who expressed an opinion on the survey) believe that Springfield and surrounding townships are being targeted as a dumping ground. Around 97 percent of respondents (100 percent of those with an opinion on the survey) want township board members to take a more active role in monitoring such issues.

Residents were also asked whether they viewed erosion of local control (such as state proposals and attempts to override local township authority) as a serious problem. Eighty-three percent said they did. The most frequently suggested approaches to fighting it were citizen involvement and increased lobbying in Lansing.

One of the most revealing responses on the survey, Strole added, was the fill-in-the-blank question: What do you like best about living in Springfield?

This question got one of the best response rates in the survey, with 94 percent of the respondents expressing an opinion on the question.

Eighty-nine percent used almost identical phrases: the open, semi-rural atmosphere, country setting, rural character, the freedom, the room.

"This tells me what they place the highest value on," Strole said.

In response to questions on developing the township, 97 percent of respondents wanted the township to either "do everything possible to maintain the present semi-rural character of the area," or "to follow a balanced plan of controlled growth."

Of those who answered a question on retail services, 61 percent said they were satisfied with the township's current level of retail services, while others responded, "What retail services?"

Eighty-three percent want retail complexes limited

to small neighborhood centers and 87 percent did not want to encourage development of a large mall. Some said they were already close enough to retail services available elsewhere.

The most frequently expressed need was for a grocery store.

When asked what they liked least about the township, the most frequently expressed comment was the roads. And much like they subsequently voted on the issue, residents expressed disapproval of the county's now defeated \$25 vehicle fee.

Over half the respondents said they were satisfied with the current level of police protection. Some commented that they thought the current \$260,000 annual contract was too high.

But Strole said she researched the cost-effectiveness of contracting with the Oakland County Sheriff's Department versus establishing a township-operated department, and felt that contracting with the Sheriff's Department was still the most cost-efficient way.

Asked whether they were satisfied with the current level of communications between the township government and the citizens, 49 percent yes, 51 percent said no,

with a significant number (27 percent) not responding to the question.

Residents suggested a newsletter and one suggested cable coverage of meetings as ways to increase communications.

Strole spent the better part of a week compiling and summarizing the survey. Members of the planning commission and township board, and the township planner have told her the results could prove very useful, Strole said.

"Quite a few residents expressed appreciation for the opportunity to share their views," Strole said. "But it's I who should thank them. They provided the results."

"They're interested and they have ideas," she continued. "And I think it's an asset to have this resource."

But it's a resource that the government needs to reach out and tap into, something that can be harder in a rural area, she said.

"They care very much about their community, but they're not a bunch of 'go to meeting' types," Strole said of township residents. "They moved out here for the space, and they're not demanding lots of services like people in incorporated cities."

"I wanted to do something creative, and clothing was always one of my favorite things," she says, adding that she is an "organizational type" person who loves challenges.

She worked for General Motors for 10 years before taking a "work break" when her daughter, Jaime, was born. Linda, her husband George, and Jaime, now 10 years old, live on Waterford Hill in Independence Township.

When she decided it was time to go back to work, Linda started "from scratch," she says, sending resumes out to companies that she knew did promotions. That was four years ago.

She is now busy doing promotions for businesses and malls. She contracts as a promotional person, doing gift fairs, organizing and commentating fashion shows, and doing presentations.

Her expertise has been used for everything from Mother's and Father's Day gift seminars and back-to-school fashion shows to personal wardrobing and "designer look alike" presentations.

"You can duplicate the look at half the cost," Linda explains.

She recently did a luncheon presentation on scarf tying at the Michigan Bean Company in Fenton, and commentated a fashion show for Our Lady of the Lakes that took place in the Deer Lake Racquet Club, Independence Township.

For that fashion show, she also volunteered her time to coordinate fashions from Country Cords. Another recent volunteer job she undertook was commentating a fashion show for her church, St. Stephen Lutheran Church in Drayton Plains.

This week, she is coordinating a fashion show for

patrons of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra which will take place in the Westin Hotel in Detroit. She has had promotional jobs as close as Summit Place Mall in Pontiac to as far away as the Franklin Park Mall in

"A lot goes into a show that people are not aware of," she says.

When a business contracts her services, she organizes and consolidates the fashions or merchandise for a promotion or fashion show. She is involved in everything from the public relations with the individual store to selection of merchandise and presentation of it.

In the case of a fashion show, there is adding accessories to all the outfits, she says, model fittings, technical aspects to work out, rehearsals, and other organizational tasks to pull the show together.

Linda is also involved at her daughter's school. She is president of the Waterford Village PTO. She is on the board of directors for the Clarkston Area Chamber of Commerce and will be helping with promotions there, too.

Twice a year, in the spring and fall, she takes training courses to update her career.

Sitting in the family room of her comfortable home, Linda talks casually about the job that takes her so many places. The attractive, 5-foot, 6-inch woman, with dark hair and a pretty smile looks like a model herself, but she says she doesn't actually do any modeling.

Also on the agenda is a program spotlight on SPICE, a special education program for pre-schoolers.

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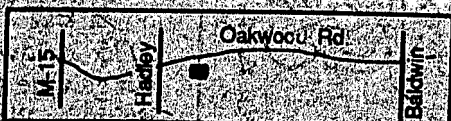

she says.

Andrews, who joined the tech center in Springfield Township three years ago, is working on an advanced degree at Michigan State University, East Lansing.

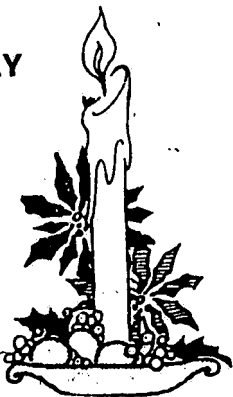

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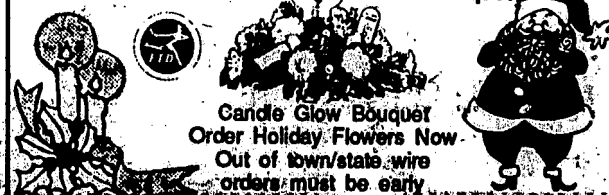
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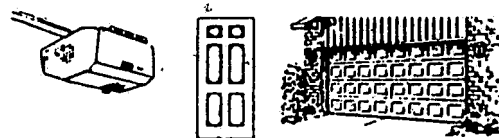
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Goodfellow Paper sale on the way

Avoid holiday stress

Breaks in the daily routine can cause holiday stress for children, says personnel at St. Joseph Mercy Hospital-Pontiac.

Cited as reasons are the unpredictable schedules and sensory overload that children experience as they look forward to visiting Santa, shopping and entertaining.

Anne DeHaan, coordinator of the Children's Learning Center at the hospital, offers the following suggestions to help make your children's Christmas a merry one:

~ Although parents may be home more often during the holidays, they are usually preoccupied; this may confuse the little ones.

~ Try not to skip naps or let bedtime be later than normal too often. (Late bedtime may not seem too bad at the time; however, wake-up time is so biologically regulated that it rarely helps compensate.)

~ Remember, in the long run, it's easier for adults to wait for a child to finish a nap than it is to deal with a tired, irritable child.

~ Offer nutritious snacks or small, balanced meals before elaborate meals or lavish treats to help assure that little tummies don't fill up on sweets.

~ Allow some routines to remain normal; a relaxed breakfast, perhaps.

~ Don't remove all familiar toys to make room for new ones. Leave some favorites. Try to open gifts slowly, helping children appreciate each one.

~ Try not to over schedule outings or visitors. You might consider having your child spend a quiet night at home with a sitter instead of another late night out.

~ Be your child's advocate among unfamiliar relatives and friends. Allow your infant, toddler or preschooler time to warm up at his own pace and encourage adults to use subtle approaches.

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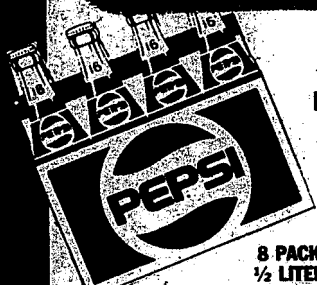
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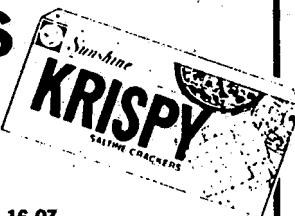


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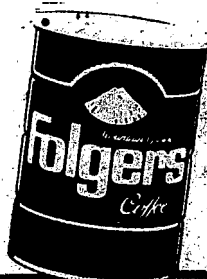

Area church welcomes new priest

As a 5th-grade student at Detroit Country Day, Charles Lynch played his one and only football game at Clarkston. Almost 40 years later, he's returned to town as the new minister at the Church of the Resurrection.

The Michigan native, who grew up in Detroit, recalled his previous journey to Clarkston after driving by the high school field after beginning his assignment in late October.

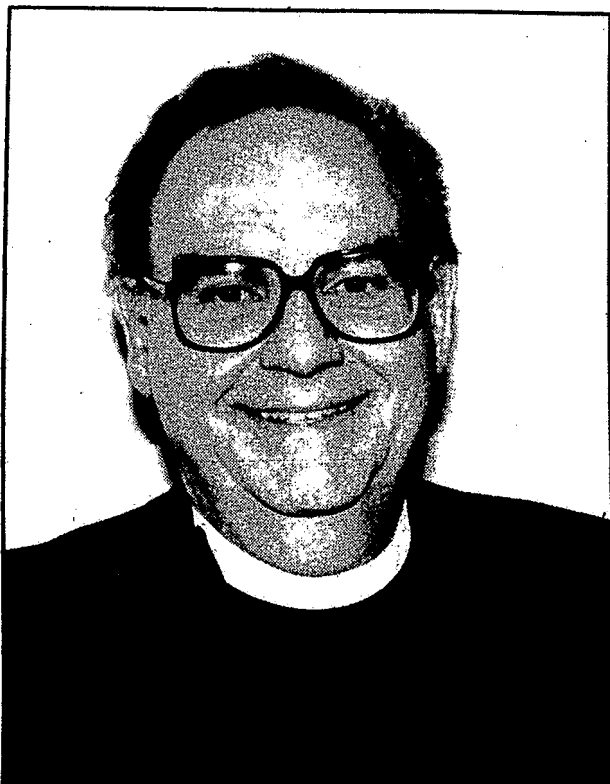
"After all these years," joked the 51-year-old Episcopal priest about his return to Clarkston. "It's fun to be back."

Lynch replaces retired Rev. Alex Stewart, who worked 30 years at the Clarkston Road, Independence Township church. Lynch admits it'll be difficult to fill the role Stewart played; instead he'll try to carve his own niche in the community when he becomes better acquainted with the area.

His career in the clergy had an unusual beginning.

A challenge from a friend helped the 1958 University of Michigan graduate decide to enter the seminary right after his college days instead of enrolling in law school as he had originally planned. As it turned out, that friend turned out to be a classmate in the Nashotah House seminary in Wisconsin.

He was ordained in 1962 and began his career as an assistant pastor on the east side of Detroit. Later, the father of two moved to the western side of Michigan to

lead churches in small towns like Greenville and Ionia. Twelve years ago, he moved to Milwaukee, Wis. to lead another church and thought his days in Michigan were over.

But, last spring he heard of an opening in Clarkston and quickly sent a resume. Although family and friends lived in Michigan he had some reservations about moving again.

"I was reluctant," he said. "It's hard to move, especially from state to state."

Now he's back in town and can easily visit his friends and family who reside in the Birmingham, Bloomfield Hills and Farmington areas.

He'll also continue an educational religious program named the American Pilgrimage Society he developed five years ago. Every June, he organizes a group to travel to Great Britain and see Westminster Abbey and participate in a special worship.

Although the program is designed to provide American Episcopalians with better understanding of the root of their religion, members of last year's group included many different denominations, he said.

"I felt it was important for them to have a chance to come into contact with their spiritual roots," he said.

Last Friday, a special service was conducted at the Church of the Resurrection welcoming Lynch. Such things as the keys to the building and gifts from the parishioners are presented at the service. The ceremony dates back to the Middle Ages in England, he said.

"The service is really lovely," he said.

Help available for holiday grief through new after-care program

All of the family traditions that make the holidays so special and joyous for most people -- Dad slicing the turkey, children trimming the tree -- are things that can make the holidays more painful if a loved one has died.

But a program initiated at Lewis E. Wint & Son Funeral Home can help.

Jenni McGee, resident trainee serving an internship at Wint Funeral Home, spent three days in intensive training in Louisville, Ky., this fall learning about "In Accord."

She is in charge of the new after-care program at Wint Funeral Home, and will remain so when she becomes a licensed funeral director and a permanent part of the staff in March 1989.

Accord is an association of professionals specially trained to help individuals and their families adjust to major life changes such as the loss of a family member. It was founded by two women in Kentucky who spent a great deal of time in grief-related therapy.

"Our purpose isn't to make (people) stop hurting, but to help them deal with the hurting," McGee says, "to let them know what they're feeling is normal and that others feel it, too."

The funeral home has always dealt in after care, she says. They keep in contact with people for at least a year after the funeral. But now, when they take the flowers, cards and other remembrances from friends to the family's home the day after the funeral, they also take a packet of information on Accord.

The packet of information is "personalized" to fit the situation of that particular family. It includes information on local support groups and other helpful information for the family, such as explaining feelings that are "normal." Information on Accord is also sent out to local churches.

"It's not like putting a Band-Aid on a wound," McGee says. "These things take time."

And everyone's situation is different, she adds. There is no "cookie cutter" answer on how to handle their grief.

"Mostly, just being an active listener is the best way," she says. If people need help beyond what the funeral home can offer, they refer people to a professional counselor.

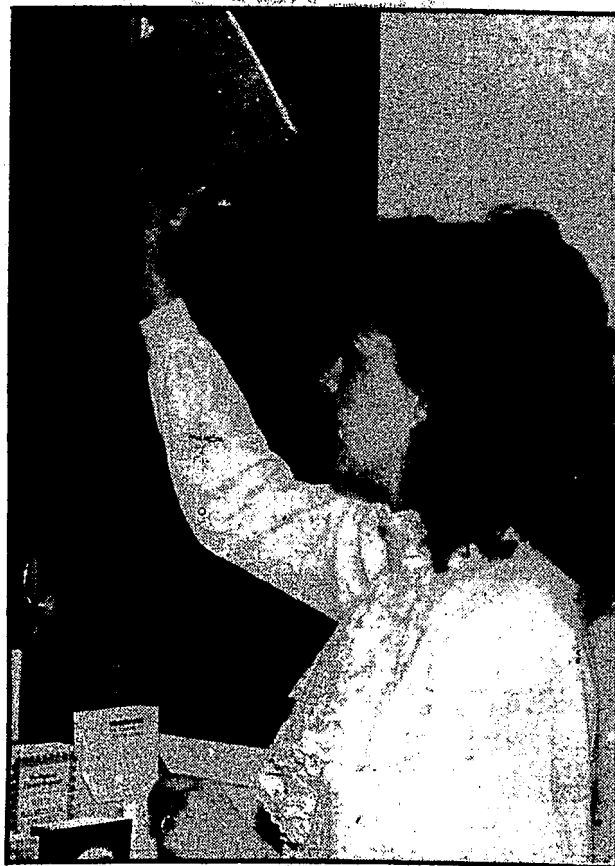
For some people the grieving period is months. For others, it is years. There are five stages of grief, and not everyone experiences every stage, McGee says. First, there is shock and denial. Then there are anger, bargaining, depression and finally, acceptance.

Wint Funeral Home is building a library of information on bereavement counseling.

It's a new field, a new resource center opening up that they are tapping into, according to William Wint.

"We want the community to know this resource is available," he says. "The more we educate ourselves, the more we can confront (death) when the situation arises."

With the new program, Wint Funeral Home has books, pamphlets and a Labelle system of 16 mm sound/



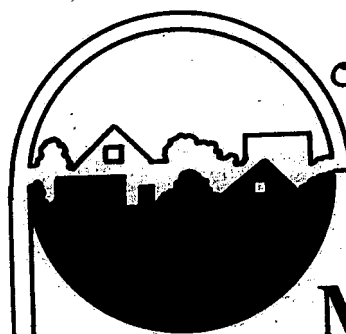
JENNI MCGEE looks at a book from the growing resource library at Lewis E. Wint & Son Funeral Home, where a new program, In Accord, is being instituted.

filmstrip cartridges dealing with many areas of grieving including aging parents, sudden infant death, suicide, understanding death, AIDS, widows and widowers, and talking with children about death. There is also information on arranging funerals.

"People are so confused when they have to deal with death and suddenly make decisions about funerals," McGee says.

The Accord program actually helps as much before the funeral as afterwards.

"Nothing would make me happier than to have someone use the library," McGee says, "to just come in to read the material before they actually need it."

McGee, at 21, hasn't had a close death in her own family yet, but she says she has seen through others what pain they go through.

"When people are informed, they can better handle it," she says.

Eventually, her dream would be to start a support group for grieving, but it is difficult to do this at a funeral home, she says, when advance planning is frequently impossible and a full-time funeral director can't spend the time needed for the project.

Lewis Wint and his late wife, Diane, started a support group called Widowed Coping Together, which was taken over by the Waterford Senior Citizens Center. The successful local support group is having a holiday drop-in session at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, Dec. 7, in the new Waterford Senior Citizen Center at 6455 Harper.

Also this holiday season, Wint Funeral Home is sending out a brochure on "Holiday Help, Coping for the Bereaved," McGee says. In it are a number of sugges-

tions, including "holiday memorials" such as toasting the missing loved one or buying a Christmas gift for the home in memory of the loved one, something with special meaning for the holidays, or toasting the future -- a new direction.

"The holidays are hardest on people who are left completely alone," McGee says. "I feel pain for people (like this) during the holidays."

Holidays are a celebration, and for people suffering a loss there are a lot of traditions broken, she says. Maybe it is a time for them to start new traditions.

One suggestion she offers for people in this situation is to make plans for the holidays. Don't just sit there alone.

"Volunteer somewhere, or visit a friend," she says. A quiet multipurpose room in Lewis E. Wint & Son

Funeral Home at 5929 S. Main, Independence Township, is now also the library. It's a place to be visited before, during and after a funeral. And Jenni McGee is there, with the In Accord program, to help people with the grieving process.

Sure, it's depressing sometimes, she says. "You see some people at their worst. I've never worked a funeral where someone didn't hug you" or, perhaps, need a hug in return.

But, she adds, "Nothing makes you happier than seeing someone a year later -- and they can smile."

Caring class helps needy

When the second-graders in Sally Seaman's class at Bailey Lake Elementary went home last week to enjoy a four-day Thanksgiving weekend, they carried the satisfaction of knowing they had brightened the holiday for less fortunate people.

After seeing an ad in the newspaper asking for donations to help feed the needy at the Pontiac Rescue Mission, Seaman said, the pupils decided to make a class project of collecting nickels, dimes and pennies to contribute.

The mission, he told the pupils, is open 365 days a year to help needy people. And today, up to 40 percent of the homeless are children.

"All of the money will be used on the people," he said, as he thanked the class for their efforts.

One pupil, Megan Cahill, summed up the children's reaction when she said, "It made me feel happy to help other people."

Can you tell me how to cope or solve problems if the other person can't or won't change? I want to be happier, and I think that if I can solve some of my problems I will be.

I know that I can't change the world or my friends, but I'm in need of help to change myself if that's what's going to make me feel happier.

I know that there are others out there who feel the same way I do. I hope you can help them, too.

Dear Unhappy:

You are right. There are many people who feel that they do not have the control to solve their own problems. But we feel you already have mastered the first step, which is to realize that you can't change other people.

You are in control and have power over only one person -- yourself. You can certainly let others know how their behavior affects you by using "I" statements ("I feel sad when you ignore me," etc.).

When this does not lead to change in the other person, then you need to move on to step two. The second step is to let go of negative feelings, such as anger, sadness and resentment, and not dwell on these "problem" feelings.

You have a choice with this second step. You can either continue to feel bad, hanging on to negative feelings, or let them go.

This is the hangup for many of us. We keep going back hoping or trying to change others. That's when we tend to feel powerless and as if the situation is out of our control.

By dealing with your own feelings, accepting that others are imperfect and use behavior or actions which may hurt others, and by changing only what you can change, you will have gone far toward solving those problems which felt unsolvable.

Dear Friend to Friend:

Report cards just came out, and mine's the best it's ever been. My parents are really proud of me. It's cool because it seems like they are going to start letting me do a lot more.

They made a deal with me that if I got good grades for the semester, they'd buy me a car (not necessarily new).

It's so great! I'm proud of myself, and my parents are proud of me, too. I just wanted to let someone know how cool it is to get good grades.

BRAINER

Dear Brainer:

We're proud of you, too! It just proves that when you set goals and work hard you often get what you want. We're especially glad that you don't feel pressure and are proud to be smart.

Although you are going to be rewarded with a new car, we're sure that the good feeling you get with doing well is really more important than a new car.

The accomplishment and the good feelings that go with it should motivate you for the rest of the year. Keep up the good work.

Dear Friend to Friend:

My dad puts a lot of pressure on me. He never says anything nice about me. If I'm supposed to clean the house, he yells at me because I'm not done yet.

When I try to explain the situation to him, he won't listen. It's always my fault. My grades are basically good, and I'm involved in a lot of extracurricular activities just to stay out of the house.

I don't get into trouble, and I try to understand his

point of view. I know he loves me, but I really hate the way he talks to me. He never has anything nice to say.

I have tried to sit down and talk about my feelings, but he always relates it to what I do wrong. Help me cope with this!

WANT OUT

Dear Want Out:

There are probably lots of kids in your situation, so you are not alone. Don't make matters worse by blaming yourself for what is going on.

Your father sounds like the kind of man who has trouble expressing feelings (like affection) in a positive, verbal way.

That's very likely the way he was raised. It is important that you separate your feelings of self-esteem from him and your relationship with him.

Look at the positives in your life, and admire yourself for the kind of person you are and for your successes. Despite the problems with your father, you have chosen healthy ways of coping so far. That speaks well of you and your level of maturity.

Your father may never change. Therefore, your level of happiness must be based on other things in your life. If you find you can't do this yourself, you might want to consider seeing a counselor or psychotherapist.

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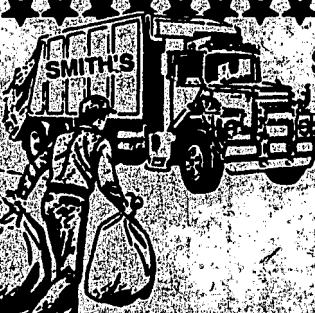
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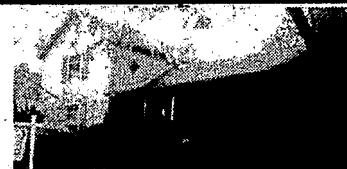

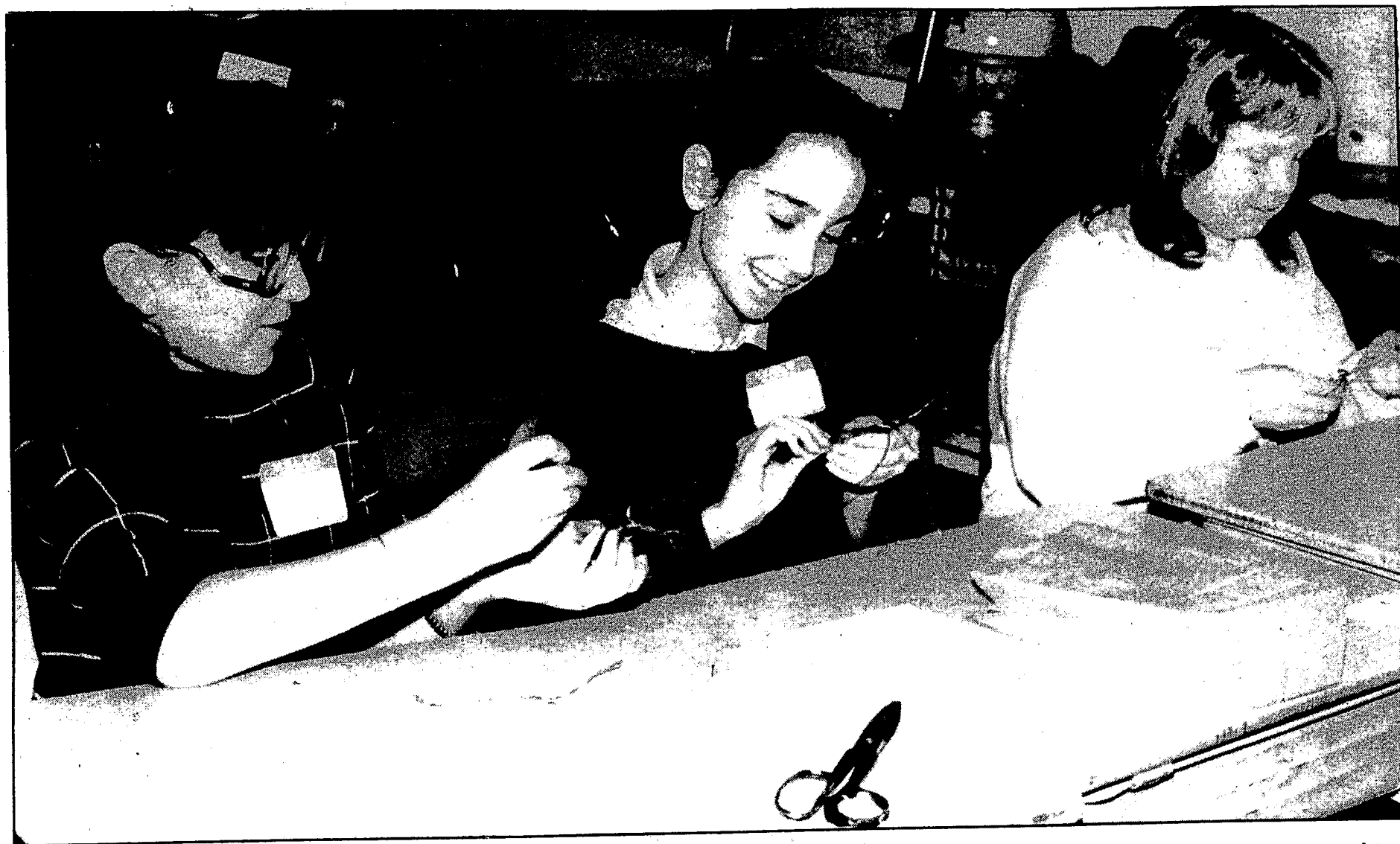

Wolves whip rival CC in opener

History didn't repeat itself Friday when Clarkston and Redford Catholic Central renewed their annual season-opening rivalry.

The Shamrocks left the Wolves in shambles on a couple of occasions during the past few seasons including an 82-50 pasting last year, but not in 1988.

Thanks to an outstanding effort from a group of young and inexperienced players, Coach Dan Fife and his crew had plenty to smile about during the long bus ride home.

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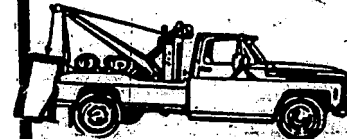
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Clarkston drops JV contest to Shamrocks

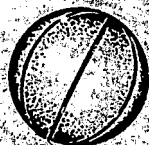

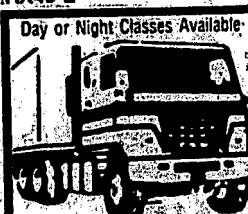

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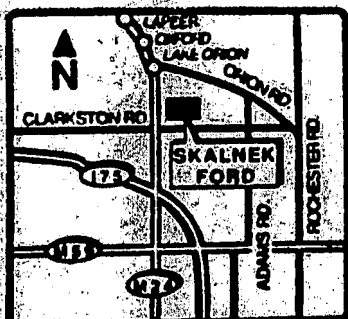
