32 cut from Clarkston school staff

At a special meeting of the Clarkston school board on April 24, 30 teachers and two administrators were laid off for the 1989-90 school year.

A quiet school board voted unanimously on two separate motions for the administrative and teaching staff reductions. But if voters approve a reversal of the Headlee rollback in the June 12 election, some of the staff would be recalled.

According to the Headlee Amendment, the millage rate is automatically rolled back whenever assessed property values increase at a higher rate than the rate of inflation. Voters can overturn the automatic rollback.

"It's always regrettable that you have to pink slip staff because it does have a direct effect on the education of our children," said school board President Janet Thomas later.

The cuts were due to the overall financial posture of the district, program cuts possible for the 1989-90 school year, anticipated reductions in state aid school funding, the expected return from leave of higher seniority teachers, the expected decline in enrollment at the Oakland Technical Center-Northwest Campus, and anticipated loss of revenue from the Headlee rollback.

The administrative contracts not to be renewed are for Sharon O'Leary Johnson, alternative education principal at the Clarkston Learning Center, and Susan Maciak, communications coordinator for the district.

Ten teachers were laid off from the elementary schools: Durelle Pitser, Jodee Cobeil-Blaszkowski, Shannon Ford, Lauri Gregory, Staci Elliott, Deborah Bowser, Mary Schulte, Kathleen Blahunka, Michele Gallagher Shaltz and Natalie Potvin.

At the middle school-high school level, another 16 staff positions were cut: Daniel Willenborg, Ilona Rosehart, Nancy Frumkin, Daniel Blanchard, Kristine Nemesi, Gayle Conwell, Claudia Keglovitz, Bryan Dowd, Joan Hessell, Eric Stromberg, Charles Carmody, David Johnson, Debra Wilson, Robert Devereaux, Sandra Srabian and Cheryl Mix.

At the Oakland Technical Center, Barbara Mack was laid off, and in special education three people were laid off: Maureen Moss, Pamela Neville and Sharon Steinhelper.

Of the 30 teaching positions, all but three were newly hired in the 1988-89 school year. (See LAYOFFS; next page)

Bad checks bouncing through Independence stores

Business owners, beware — a rash of bad checks has been reported to police in recent weeks.

"There seems to be an influx, an increase in Independence Township," said Detective Sgt. Thomas Quisenberry at the Oakland County Sheriff's Department (OCSD).

Most of the checks have been returned because an account is closed.

"It's a scam," Quisenberry said. "The account is closed, and they have 20 checks left over, and they try to dump them around town.

'We've recovered a couple lately from Wonder Drugs and A & P (on M-15, Independence Township), Quisenberry added. "(But) they're not the only ones."

The best way to avoid being stuck with a bad check is to demand good identification.

'In businesses or stores that accept checks, often the owner isn't the clerk in the transaction," Quisenberry

Jan Modesitt, head of the math department at Clarkston High School, told the board she was concerned about the teacher layoffs, especially the math teachers.

"It is most important that we have a qualified" teaching staff," she said.

Board Secretary Mary Jane Chaustowich reiterated a concern she voiced a week earlier when the board approved \$1.6 million in recommended program cuts that would be made in the fall if Headlee is not reversed.

"I find it difficult to discuss hiring an administrator (in view of all the cuts) for the current vacancy at the high school (an assistant principal position)," she said. "I feel it should be filled from within."

"A clerk should get I.D., preferably a picture driver's license, and make sure it matches the person writing the check.

Some checks have a name, address, phone number and maybe a driver's license number, but you don't know who is cashing it," he added.

Quisenberry suggested obtaining a second piece of identification or "anything to help track that person

The chances of finding a bad check writer are good as long as there's some identification, he added.

Anyone convicted in an account closed situation face a two-year high misdemeanor; the penalty for nonsufficient funds varies on the amount of the check and when the check was written.

Quisenberry said the latest influx of bad checks could result from a higher number being reported.

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Recycling may grow with state grant

If the Village of Holly gets the Michigan Clean City Grant it has applied for, drop-off centers for recycling newspaper and glass could be added in Springfield, Groveland, Rose and Holly townships.

Currently, the only drop-off for Holly's recycling effort, which is open to any area resident, is at 201 Elm St. in the Village of Holly. Drop-off centers might also be expanded to include collection of plastic, aluminum, tin, grass clippings, cardboard and computer paper, according to Holly Village officials.

The Springfield Township Board unanimously supported the effort of Holly Village at the April 13 board meeting.

In a letter from Holly Village President, Ardath Regan, other "resolutions of intent" for the recycling effort were also laid out, including mandated recycling in Holly and composting rather than burning leaves.

Officials from Holly Village will not know until fall if Holly is the recipient of a Clean City Grant.

Also at the April meeting, Springfield Township Board members voted unanimously to approve a resolution from Holly Village that urges the State of Michigan to adopt mandatory recycling legislation and municipalities to adopt ordinances supporting this.

Springfield Township Supervisor Collin Walls serves on Oakland County's landfill siting committee and

Solid Waste Board.


Before the board voted on the resolution, he said, "Quite frankly, this board will be dealing with mandatory recycling within six months in order to comply with the Oakland County plan."

Meeting dates change

Public hearing on Middle Lake canal

Plans for a canal behind Middle Lake Road in Clarkston is the subject of a public hearing at a Village of Clarkston Wetlands Review Board meeting 7 p.m. Tuesday, May 2, in the Village Hall on Depot Road.

Before construction can begin, the proposal must receive approvals from the village wetlands board, Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) and Soil Conservation District.

If approved, the south branch of the Clinton River would be turned into a canal. The channel would be six feet deep and 40 feet wide, with the spoil deposited on the banks, according to an application made to the DNR.

The channel would allow access to Middle Lake for about 12 property owners living along the proposed channel, said Gary J. Tressel, village engineer and peti-

tioner for the project.

Tressel, a resident of Middle Lake Road, said he was acting in support of his neighbors living along the proposed canal.

Some opposition has arisen from residents concerned about boats on Middle Lake, Tressel said.

The channel area was regularly cleaned out for boats about 20 years ago, according to village Manager Artemus Pappas. In recent years, however, the channel has filled with silt, Pappas said.

The proposal would require cleaning out the area.

No land would be cleared, Tressel said.

The Clarkston Village Wetlands Review Board will meet at 7 p.m. at the Village Hall on Depot Road.

Friends, family say goodbye to Davisburg attorney

Longtime Davisburg attorney E. Leonard Howarth died last Thursday, April 20, after a year-long battle with cancer, at the age of 46.

He was well known by friends as a humanitarian who would always help someone in need. When he first opened his law practice in Davisburg, one of his first fees was a bushel of wheat. He frequently used the barter system to help out a client who couldn't afford to pay money.

He was well known by many others as the eccentric attorney who showed up at the courthouse in blue jeans and a long pony tail in the early days of his practice. In later years, he wore a suit, but the eccentric side of him never changed.

His two law offices in Davisburg hinted at the man inside: one is painted red, white and blue like an American flag. The other, more conservative, sports a "Lenny the Lawyer" awning on the outside.

For many years, he was a perennial candidate. In 1976, he ran against L. Brooks Patterson for prosecuting attorney in the primary election, frequently using unorthodox campaigning. His platform was "Let's quit the

chicken —it."

Later, in 1982, he ran as a Democratic candidate for

the state Senate.

He was also a cave-exploring adventurer, a minister and a spark plug of the Davisburg Rotary Club.

Howarth graduated from the Detroit College of Law in 1969, and was a member of the State Bar of Michigan. Since 1970, he practiced throughout Michigan as well as in the federal courts and U.S. Tax Court.

On Sunday, a former classmate of Howarth's from Ferndale High School, Gov. James Blanchard, flew in to

According to Mel Vaara, assistant superintendent of Clarkston schools, the Michigan State Police first called him to arrange a landing on the Clarkston High School parking lot but decided the football field would be more satisfactory. Vaara was on hand to open the gates and greet Blanchard when he arrived Sunday afternoon.

Howarth is survived by his wife, Nancy, and two daughters, Alyce and Erin, Erin, 18, lives in Poughkeep-

sie, N.Y. and attends Vassar. Alyce, 19, lives at home and attends the University of Michigan, Flint.

The funeral service took place Monday, April 24, at Lewis E. Wint and Son Funeral Home in Clarkston.

Springfield Township Supervisor Collin Walls, who attended the funeral service, said, "(Howarth) was being honored and leaving life just like he lived it. It was not a traditional service.

"There was jazz music while we were seated," he continued. "And a guitarist sang a song about living young. It fit him."

Lakeview cemetery chapel fund planned

Citing a "considerable interest" on the part of Independence Township residents, a chapel fund may be organized at Lakeview Cemetery on White Lake Road.

George Anderson, director of the township department of public works, introduced the idea to the board

Anderson told the board that several families and funeral directors had expressed a desire to erect a chapel at the cemetery. He suggested organizing a chapel memorial fund to pay for its cost.

He predicted that the cost of the \$80,000-\$90,000 chapel could be raised over a period of five to 10 years.

According to a letter to the board from Anderson, one couple plans to donate their son's memorial fund to help pay the cost of the chapel.

The fund would be used solely for the construction of the chapel; a columbarium may also be added to house the remains of those cremated. Anderson added.

The firefighters decided not to press charges but demanded that the teens parents be notified.

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

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Open house planned for home built by students

One new home in North Pointe Subdivision, Waterford Township, has a little younger work crew than most. The home was built by high school students from Brandon, Clarkston, Holly and Waterford schools participating in the building trades program through Oakland Technical Center-Northwest Campus.

The building trades program is taught by Dick Moscovic, building trades instructor at the Tech Center. A trailer at the building site in the 120-home subdivision

offered space for classroom instruction, and the students got hands-on instruction constructing the home.

Working in two-hour shifts supervised by Moscovic, they roughed in the house, hung dry wall, insulated and did carpentry. They also worked with subcontractors provided by the sponsoring builder to pour the basement and do plumbing, electrical and heating work.

During a ceremony on April 19, a sign was erected at the site, 2472 Woodborne, saluting the North Oakland County Builders Association (NOCBA) and Mike Hofer, president of Welcome Homes, Inc.

Hofer was the host builder this year, in cooperation with NOCBA. He provided the materials, subcontractors, plans, and a site in the North Pointe Subdivision.

The building trades program which began last. Sept. 21 was offered to CHS students for the first time in five years. The new program offered through the Tech. Center was put in place after several years of planning by a committee that included, among others, Bill Neff, director of administrative services for Clarkston Schools, and Dan Manthei, principal at the Tech Center.

Twenty-four students, including four from Clarkston, are enrolled in the building trades program this year. The object of the exploratory class is for students to get a variety of experience in different building trades.

Students learn that building a house is a very technical game, Moscovic said. They learn that everything from reading blueprints to knowing codes takes technical skill.

The one-story home is scheduled for completion by the end of the school year.

The public can view the finished home during an open house planned from 1-4 p.m. on Sunday, June 4. North Pointe Subdivision is located off Clintonville

Road, 1 1/2 miles south of Maybee Road.

Roads would not improve with county takeover



A few months ago, I commented on what I thought would happen to our local road system and road maintenance services if Independence Township became a city. My conclusions?

Our taxes would go up, and we might see some improvements in road maintenance and a few more road improvement projects. Why?

Because as soon as the new city officials started receiving road related complaints about roads that used to be the responsibility of the road commission and now would be the responsibility of the city, those officials would realize that the normal road revenues (gas, tax and license plate fees) were simply not adequate and would look for other ways to generate the needed revenues to provide the services demanded by the taxpayers.

In other words, those officials would reach the same conclusion officials in every other city and village have reached in this county and would seek additional reve-

The biggest incentive for seeking funds to fix the roads would be that those officials would no longer be able to direct the complaints to the road commission. The responsibility for the roads would rest with those officials.

Well, thus far the township has not become a city, but there is still a possibility for another change in the control of the roads in our community.

For years, County Executive Daniel Murphy has not only expressed interest in taking over the road commission, but has even endorsed legislation that would permit him to do so. Of the 83 counties in Michigan, only Wayne County has abolished its road commission and put those operations under the control of the county executive,

Whether or not that change was beneficial for Wayne depends on how bad a job the road commission was doing and how much better things are today.

If you listen to the Wayne County politicians today, you get one story, if you talk to the staff, who are trying to get things done down there, the story changes consid-

So what do I think would happen if Dan Murphy were to take over the road commission?

improvement projects. Sound familiar?

The reasons are the same as before. Once Dan Murphy and the 27 county commissioners can no longer blame the road commission but must assume direct responsibility for the condition of the county roads, they, too, will learn that current funding levels are grossly inadequate and will begin looking around for other sources of revenue (other taxes!).

The county (and cities and villages) still have some authority to raise taxes to meet identified needs. The road commission has never had the power to raise taxes, regardless of the extent of the needs or how bad the situation has become.

Even though the county's budget has grown significantly in recent years due to property tax and other revenues from all the development, Mr. Murphy has indicated that he is not about to invest any additional county funds in roads unless he has control of the road commission and thus control of where the moneys are

The road commission has offered to sign a binding legal contract guaranteeing that Mr. Murphy could pick the projects, but apparently that is not good enough.

Here is something to think about. If county taxes are raised for road improvements, where do you think those improvements would occur, in Independence Township or further south in the county where the majority of the population (and voters) reside?

All 27 county commissioners would want to make sure their area got their "fair share," but there are more commissioners in the southern half of the county than the northern half.

Here is something else to think about. Why would anyone want to take over an agency that is grossly underfunded and faced with overwhelming demands due to the traffic problems related to the tremendous economic development that has occurred in the county in recent years?

It is analogous to someone running up to the captain, of the Titanic with an offer to buy the ship, AFTER the ship has struck the iceberg!

A widow or widower with an adjusted income of only \$6,700 will pay this additional sur-tax. A couple will begin paying with an income of \$11,100. To me, that is just above the national poverty level which is \$5,770 for a single person and \$7,730 for a couple.

For each \$150 tax liability on your income tax return, payable in 1990, add a 15% sur-tax (supplemental premium) with a maximum of \$800 tax for a single person or \$1,600 for a couple. The following year the tax increases 25% and by year 1993 it jumps to 28% capped at \$2.100. Wow!

According to the Institute for Research on the Economics of Taxation, 46% of senior citizens will pay this additional sur-tax (supplemental premium) and 56% will pay by year 1993.

To add an additional sur-tax for only seniors is outrageous. What happened to "Read my lips, no new taxes?"



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



Math winners named

Five Clarkston High School students were honored for their achievements in the 32nd Annual Michigan Mathematics Prize Competition.

The students are: seniors Marie Powell (who also qualified last year) and Doug Treder, juniors Brad Wilson and Matthew Cook, and sophomore Meredith Higdon.

The students were introduced to the board of education on April 10 by Jan Modesitt, chairperson of the mathematics department at CHS, and given framed certificates of achievement.

The math competition is open to students statewide on a voluntary basis. About 21,000 students elected to participate in this year's contest, including 53 from CHS, according to Modesitt.

Part I of the competition, which is co-sponsored by several Michigan corporations plus the Mathematical Association of America, consists of a 100-minute test. The top 1,000 students are invited to take Part 2, including the five students honored from CHS

The combined scores from Parts 1 and 2 determine the rank of the top 1,000 students statewide.

This is the second consecutive year that CHS has placed five finalists among the state's top 1,000 students in the competition, Modesitt said.

She offered congratulations to the five for their accomplishments in mathematics.

"You've done yourselves and your community proud," she told them after their introductions.

'It's a way to find out exactly what we have," Lewan explained, "And give us definite directions for economic growth in the township."

North Oakland Cablevision is close to the point of starting service to some of the residents of Springfield Township, according to Gary Voelker, president.

Voelker was at the April township board meeting to get approval for aerial cable rather than underground on two private township roads, Sherwood and Patrick, because conditions on those roads would make it impractical for underground.

The board gave Voelker unanimous approval.

Voelker reported to the board that the head-end site, the location they transmit and receive from, would be completed soon.

"We hope in May to turn people on;" he said. The cable service is expected to be completed by July.

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

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

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Vigil illuminates problems with child support

Independence Township resident Barbara Petroff knows first hand the frustrations of fighting for child support as she raises her 4-year-old granddaughter, Christine.

But she found a lot of support in a self-help group, ACES (Association for Children for Enforcement of Support, Inc.), a non-profit organization founded in 1984 which now has 15,000 members nationwide.

That is one of the reasons, she says the organization's candlelight vigil, "Light a Spark of Hope for Forgotten Children," is so important. It is a way to draw public attention to children living in poverty because of unpaid child support.

The third annual candlelight vigil is going on nationwide. In this area, it takes place Thursday, April 27, at 7 p.m. in the front steps of Royal Oak City Hall, 211 Williams. The local vigil is for Wayne, Oakland and Macomb counties.

Nationally, over \$18 billion is owed in child support, according to figures compiled by ACES. In Michigan, the figure is \$2.8 billion, and only 19.6 percent of that has been collected.

It costs the government millions in welfare, Petroff said, when child support is not paid.

ACES is dedicated to assisting disadvantaged children affected by parents who fail to meet legal and moral obligations. It provides educational information concerning child support and legal rights.

"I've learned to use the legal system and not be intimidated," Petroff says.

She is organizing a Clarkston chapter of ACES, with the first meeting planned for Tuesday, May 9, at 7 p.m. in Pine Knob Elementary School, The group would meet once a month on the second Tuesday of each month.

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
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


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Reporter's Notebook

The apartments are to be located on the west side of Dixie Highway, near Lowrie Landscaping in Springfield Township.

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

The group formed a non-profit organization called the North Area Citizens Conference (NACC), elected a board of directors, and determined membership dues.

Jim Reed, who is on the board of directors, and I are representing Independence Township, but all interested parties are encouraged to become involved. As the group proceeds, I will report its progress through this column.

A little over a month ago, the NACC was contacted by a group representing residents in Holly, Brandon and Groveland, asking if they could network with the NACC, since they have similar concerns about future development in their areas. A networking system between the two groups is being worked out.

In their first meetings, the NACC developed a series of issues which they felt should be addressed by the respective townships. Some of these issues are:

- Concern about increased density of housing, more intensive road development, extension of sewer services, overdevelopment of apartments and condominiums and the location of heavy industry.

- Development of a comprehensive wetlands ordi-

nance. Development of a woodlands ordinance.

Like Independence Township, the NACC will develop a survey of public opinion on these and many other issues.

In addition to the above, the NACC developed a "wish list" of points and concerns which they plan to address in due time. Included in this list are the following items which I thought might be of interest to you:

- Try to create interaction between the planning commissions of the various townships since their decisions also affect their neighbors.

- Protection of our lakes through the adoption of ordinances against "keyholing."

- Support of existing downtown business establishments as opposed to developing "mini malls" or "strip malls" in the area.

Resolution of the problem of trash dumping along rural roads.

Liaison at the state level — especially with the legislature and the Department of Natural Resources

The next meeting of this group will be Saturday, May 6, at 1 p.m. in the Oxford Library. If you would like to become involved, please feel free to attend.

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


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

"Catastrophic" tax lives up to name

Why, oh why, did Congress in its infinite widsom ever set the scale of the Catastrophic Health Tax increase of \$22.50 per \$150 of tax liability?

Because it would make the bite look smaller, perhaps? Because few people would translate that into a 15 percent jump in tax?

While the lawmakers were being so sly, they also cunningly put the tax into effect Jan. 1, 1989, but said it wasn't necessary to figure this in estimated tax for 1989. If you don't allow for it, then you will have the whole schmeer hit you with your April 15, 1990, return.

Some have already figured that \$22.50 extra for every \$150 you pay is 15 percent.

The rate lasts only a year. Then it goes to \$37.50 per \$150 - and that's 25. percent. If the Congressment are getting howls now at 15 percent, let them wait a year until the populace understands it will be 25 percent in 1990. Let the AARP do some more back-pedaling furiously and claim this all was never their idea.

After 1990, it will go up 1 percent a year - 26 percent, 27 percent, 28 percent. Lord knows when it will stop. Just this year, a couple 65 or older (and thus eligible) will pay up to \$1,600 extra tax. By 1993, the lid will go up to \$2,100.

Golden years. Indeed they are - for the U.S. Treasury.

A while ago, I announced a prize for the first person to write and tell me a word in the English language that had the letters "UFA" in that sequence somewhere in the word.

First to reply was the sage of San Francisco, Dr. Fred Bold, with the word "tufa," which we challenged, because it wasn't the one we had in mind, and we thought he had made it up in a devious attempt to win the prize.

Dr. Bold then sent us a page from his dictionary:

tufa (toofa) n. Geol. A porous rock formed as a deposit from springs or streams.

So we packed off his valuable prize

The word we had in mind was 'manufacture," but we had to allow the entry of tufa, stupid word that it is. Sounds more like the latest oat bran cereal.

Just above tufa on the dictionary page was "tuckahoe." This is the edible sclerotium of a subterranean fungus. Class dismissed. Permanently.

This is the week for bits and pieces of information.

At an investment seminar, we learned that (with some exceptions, of course) if the surviving spouse of a decedent is not a citizen of the United States, the marital deduction is disallowed.

This was part of a federal law passed Nov. 10, 1988, and summarized on page 455 under Estate Tax 26,2056 of the Federal Register.

Better get your spouse naturalized.

Zero coupon bonds: You can overpay on the cost basis if you sell before they mature.

Example: You buy a 10-year zero coupon bond, maturing 1999. Your cost is \$400, say. The yield is 10 percent to maturity, when the bond will be worth \$1,000.

So suppose you sell the bond in 1992 - three years after purchase.

Your cost basis is not what you paid for it, but the compounded accreted value for the time you held it - in this example, three years.

If the yield was 10 percent on the \$400 you paid for it, then the first year's accreted value would be \$40c plus 10 percent, or \$40, for a total of

The next year, though, the accreted value is \$440 plus 10 percent, or \$44, or a total of \$484.

The third year, 10 percent more, or \$48.40, making \$532.40 for your cost basis after three years.

If you had used just straight interest of \$40 a year, you might have assumed the cost basis had become 3 times \$40, or \$120, for a total of \$520.

Doesn't sound like much for just one bond. If you had 100 of them, though, it would be a \$1,240 higher cost basis and therefore \$1,240 less capital gains tax - \$1,240 times 28 percent tax equals \$347 you've saved by struggling through my figures.

Made it worthwhile to buy the paper, didn't it?

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
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

Once upon a time, there was

Once upon a time, there was an principal named Bill Potvin who knew that his pupils at Clarkston Elementary School were interested in writing, so he designed a Creative Writing Program.

As a result of a fundraiser in the 1987-88 school year, he was able to schedule a unique group of professional actors called The Storybuilders out of Ferndale to come to the school in the spring of 1989

But first, he hired a professional illustrator to come in on March 2 and meet with each grade level, fueling their interest with on-the-spot illustrations of story ideas they created.

Then, over the next month or so, teachers taught units on creative writing and worked with those students who wished to write their own story. There was no pressure for students to write, and they did not know they would be rewarded with The Storybuilders Show at the end of the project.

They simply wanted to write. And for every student who did, a special Creative Writing Certificate was awarded.

Teachers in grades 1-5 turned in the top stories from their classes, and these students received a "Principal's Blue Ribbon Award.

The top stories were given to The Storybuilders, who came to the school on April 11 and acted out three stories for the entire school, much to the surprise of the students whose stories were chosen.

First, the three actors, Mimi Spiwak, Michelle Walker and Dan Spahn, performed "The Alien and Me" written by second grader Takouhy Teberian.

To the delight of the the sea of spellbound faces before him, an alien creature with a nose on top of his head and a singing bush for a sidekick said to an Earthling girl, "Excuse me, I seem to be slightly lost...

Looking at his map, he showed her the solar system he was aiming for when his space ship developed problems and he got stuck on Earth.

Borrowing a "gas can" (a young student) he filled it at a "gas pump" (a teacher) and poured it into his ailing "space ship" (never mind that it was really a piano used by music teacher Gloria Lacy).

The alien's new friend showed him some Earthlike things, such as beaches and sand castles and television.

Before flying off in another space ship which rescued him, he thanked her with a lesson of his own: It was good, he told her, that she wanted to be friends with him because sometimes when people see someone different, they're afraid to be friends.

The next story, "A Huge Problem," was written by third grader Julie Koval.

There was a young girl named Julie who lived on a farm. Her mother, who was milking a cow, sent her on an errand to borrow flour from a friend for making cookies.

At the friend's house, Julie drank buttermilk which made her grow taller than a house.

Her mother shrieked in horror. First, she tried to help Julie return to normal size by calling in a psychiatrist after all, she thought, they are "shrinks," right?

But that didn't work, and finally, she had Julie drink another glass of buttermilk, which, alas, reversed the process; and Julie returned to her normal, childlike size. All's well that ends well.

The third and final story acted out by The Storybuilders was called "Bridget's Bridge," written by fifth grader Anne Scott.

It seemed that a cow named Bridget lived in Holland with a farmer, but she was always trying to get at the pasture across the river, where, naturally, the grass always seemed greener.


After several adventurous failed attempts to cross the river, Bridget watched as workmen built a bridge across the river. The farmer named it Bridget's Bridge, and Bridget the cow finally tried out the pastures on the other side.

The Storybuilders, masters at improv, had a capti-

vated audience for the hour-long assembly.



Many Lafayette residents prepare and serve this delicious dessert to family and friends. It is composed of 'on-hand". ingredients that were as readily available yesterday as they are today. So it is a classic.

Jean, a home economist, organized and authored the lovely "VOILA Lafayette Centennial Cookbook 1884-1984: A Century of Acadian Cooking from Open Fire to Microwave."

CUSTARD BREAD PUDDING 8 servings, Page 196. (All recipes tested by Betty Wagner in a 650-watt microwave oven.)

3 1/2 cups stale French bread cut into cubes and toasted

2 1/4 cups warm milk

4 whole eggs

1/2 cup sugar 1 teaspoon vanilla

3 tablespoons butter or margarine

Cinnamon to sprinkle While preheating the oven to 350 degrees; place bread cubes in a 7x9-inch glass dish and toast until dry.

Remove from oven. Warm milk in a saucepan. In a 2-quart bowl or measuring cup beat eggs. Add sugar, vanilla and warm milk slowly. Mix well. Pour egg mixture over bread cubes. Dot top with butter and sprinkle cinnamon evenly over

Bake in 350 degree oven for 30 to 40 minutes or until knife comes out clean. Let sit 10 to 15 minutes before serving.

Whiskey Sauce (Recipe submitted by Ainee Billeaud Labbe)

1 cup butter or margarine, softened (2 sticks)

1 cup confectioner's sugar

1 egg yolk, beaten

4 tablespoons whiskey or sherry

In food processor or electric mixer, cream butter: Add powdered sugar and egg yolk. Blend until smooth. Add whiskey a teaspoon at a time, mixing well. Serve bread pudding hot, topped with whiskey sauce.

(Microwave directions from Jean Durkee)

Place toasted bread cubes in a 2-quart pyrex ring mold dish. (Or make one by placing a 4-ounce juice glass with open side up in the bottom of a 2-quart Pyrex round baking dish.) Place milk in 2-cup Pyrex measure in microwave on HIGH (100 percent) 2 to 3 minutes until heated through. Beat eggs. Add sugar, vanilla and warm milk slowly. Mix well and pour over bread cubes. Dotwith butter and sprinkle with cinnamon. Microwave on HIGH 7-10 minutes, rotating dish two times. Serve as above with whiskey sauce.

Well aware of today's calorie conscious person, Jean offers a low-calorie update of this recipe. Use skim milk, a sugar substitute according to package directions and a butter substitute (such as Butter Buds or Molly McButter). Then follow the same directions for cooking either conventionally or in the microwave.

"Old fashioned Cajun gumbo often serves as the main course for a meal in South Louisiana," says Jean, And a good Roux is the gumbo's secret. Here is Jean's microwave version of a rich, brown Roux. It takes less time and stirring than conventionally prepared Roux. ROUX, an equal mixture of flour and oil, is the base of stews, gumbos, etouffees and sauces often made in south Louisiana. Here is Jean's adaptation to the microwave. 2/3 cup oil

2/3 cup flour

Mix oil and flour together in a 4-cup measure. Microwave uncovered on HIGH 6 to 7 minutes. Stir at 6 minutes. Roux will be light brown at this time and will need to cook 30 seconds to 1 minute longer to reach the dark brown color so important in making Louisiana gumbos and stews. The Roux will be very hot, but usually the handle on your glass measuring cup will stay cool enough to touch.

2 cups onion, chopped 1 cup celery, chopped

1/2 cup green bell pepper, chopped

1/4 cup hot water

4 cloves garlic, minced

1/4 cup parsley, chopped

1/4 cup green onion tops; chopped

Add onion, celery and bell pepper to Roux in measuring cup. Stir and return to microwave. Saute on HIGH 3 minutes. Add garlic, parsley and green onions to Roux, stir and return to microwave. Saute on HIGH 2 minutes.

You should have about 3 3/4 cups of Roux now; if any oil has risen to the top pour it off. Slowly add enough hot tap water to bring Roux to the 4-cup mark. Stir and you will have a smooth dark Roux in only 12 minutes. Roux freezes very well and you are ready at this time to put together a delicious gumbo or stew.

ORDINANCE TO LICENSE AND REGULATE FLOATING RETAIL SALES

THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF INDEPENDENCE ORDAINS: The Charter Township of Independence Code of Ordinance shall be amended by adding the following provisions:

CHAPTER 14.5 Sec. 14.5-1 Intent, purpose and Short Title.

1. It is the intent of the Township Board to insure that persons engaged in floating retail sales shall not conduct a commercial, forprofit business for which a permanent premises, approved following submission and approval of a site plan, would normally be required in the Township. It is the further intent and purpose of this Chapter to provide an informational record with regard to the persons and entities who will be engaged in floating retail sales activities in the interest of avoiding irresponsible and/or fraudulent sales activities.

2. This ordinance shall be known and may be cited as the Ordinance to License and Regulate Floating Retail Sales, and shall be referred to hereinafter as "This Chapter".

Sec. 14.5-2. Definitions.

For purpose of construing this Chapter, the following defini-

tions shall apply: 1. "Charitable Group" and/or "Nonprofit Group" shall mean a group, entity, association or individual which is, or is part of, a bona fide, religious, charitable or nonprofit activity of a type that would

not be required to pay real property taxes on property if the activity were conducted at a specified premises.

2. "Floating Retail Sales" and/or "Floating Sales" shall mean the sale of the public of products or services from a location which is not a permanent location for which a Certificate of Occupancy has been issued for such use under applicable codes and ordinances. A floating sale shall not mean a sale made at a private resi-

customer at a 117 3. "Public Place" shall mean any public right-of-way, publicly owned property, and/or any outdoor place to which the general

4. "Sale" shall mean a retail transaction in which goods or services are offered or sold to the public, in person and in a public place, in exchange for money or other property or the promise to pay money or other property.

Sec. 14.5-3 Regulations. 1. There shall be no floating retail sale conducted in the Charter Township of Independence unless and until a license for such activity is applied for and issued pursuant to this Chapter.

2. A license under this chapter shall be issuable only to a charitable or nonprofit group.

3. Floating sales shall be conducted between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, and during daylight hours on Saturday and Sunday.

4. No floating sales activities shall be conducted with the improved portion of a public street, road or highway, nor within ten feet of same, without the expressed, advanced authorization from the Township Board. Such authorization may be granted to floating sales activities which have been conducted in such right-ofway areas by the group making application at least once in each of the passed five years.

5. Each person engaged in floating sales will have identification on his or her person.

6. Floating sales by any individual or group may be conducted not more often than three days in any six month period.

7. At each location where floating sales are conducted, there must be a copy of the license issued under this ordinance for displayupon request of a police officer and/or other township ordinance enforcement official.

8. If floating sales activity is to be conducted on private property, such activity must be a permitted use on such property in accordance with the codes and ordinances of the Township.

9. If a promotional or advertising sign is to be utilized, such sign may not be larger than one square foot.

10. Floating sales activity shall not be conducted in a location which is within a residential zoning classification under the zoning

Sec. 14.5-4-Licensor.

1. Application procedure. A person seeking a license under this ordinance shall, at least 14 days prior to issuance of a license, submit all of the following:

a. If a floating sales activity is to be conducted on private property, there must be a written authorization signed by the occupant of the property, specifying the days, dates and hours for which the authorization has been granted.

b. If floating sales activity is to be conducted on a public sidewalk or right-of-way, and/or a shopping center or mall, there. must be a written authorization signed by the occupant of any residence and/or business establishment within 25 feet of the location at which such floating sale activity is proposed, specifying the days, dates and hours for which the authorization has been

c. Proof that the person or group or entity is a charitable and/or nonprofit group, including, but not limited to:
i. The name, address and phone number of the principal

office of the group of entity.

ii. The officers and/or principals.

iii. The intended use of sale proceeds.

iv. Any and all written promotional materials utilized in connection with the floating sales activity.

_d. A description of each and every good or service to be

e. The name and address of each person to be engaged in floating sales. f. The days, dates and hours floating sales are proposed to

be conducted. g. The location where floating sales are proposed to be conducted.

2. The supervisor may permit an application to be presented less than 14 days in advance upon good cause shown for the inability to comply with such advance notice requirement, and if

there is time to scrutinize the application materials. 3. The township clerk shall review the application and issue a license if all requirements for licensure are met, as provided in this chapter. If, upon review, the clerk determines that an application does not comply with this chapter, the clerk shall inform the applic-

ant of the reason or reasons for the denial of licensure. 4. The license issued under this chapter shall contain the following information:

a. The name of the charitable or nonprofit group. b. The address and phone number of the principal office of

c. The days, dates and time the floating sales activity may be conducted.

d. The location at which the floating sale activity may be conducted, including as specifically as possible the boundaries of such activity.

e. A description of each and every good or service authorized to be sold. f. The name and address of each person to be engaged in

floating sales.

EFFECTIVE DATE

This ordinance shall be effective immediately upon publication following adoption.

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


