## Independence pilot, son, survive crash

"It was a very windy, very busy day," remembers Gary Stonerock.

His wrist is in a sling; the area around his eye is a purplish color, but he is happy and alive to tell about the emergency crash landing that by all accounts should have taken his life.

Stonerock, former Independence Township supervisor, is an aerial surveyor, and he and his son Mike, 26, were finishing up the last photo assignment of the season Monday, May 1.

They left Pontiac at noon, and after about three hours they began to circle Salem.

Over the radio, they asked Detroit-Metro air-traffic controllers for permission to climb to 9,000 feet.

"The engine sputtered," Stonerock recalls. "The gas in the main tanks was running low."

"My son, Mike, said, 'Dad switch over (to the auxiliary tanks).' But the auxiliary tanks were empty."

After just a moment or two, the plane was completely without power.

Stonerock immediately declared May Day, which ironically happened to be the date on the calendar; but his plea was no joke.

Detroit Metro directed him to the Spencer airport about 10 miles away.

"It was too far away, which is too bad because Salem airport was right underneath me. It had been decommissioned; it was not a legal airport."

## Cityhood has pros and cons

Residents encouraged the Clarkston Village Council to explain the negatives of cityhood as well as the positives during a public hearing Monday, May 8.

The 11-page synopsis village residents recently received explaining the council's point of view didn't answer enough questions, said a Waldon Road resident, one of about 20 who showed up for the informational meeting.

"In every endeavor there are pluses and minuses," said Dr. Joseph Helpert of Waldon Road. "What are the minuses? Could the council address some negatives?"

How the new city, if Clarkston becomes a city, would provide fire and police protection remains an important issue for residents.

"Fire departments do cost a lot of money," said (See RESIDENTS, next page)

"I want to express my appreciation to residents, many of whom I won't have a chance to see before I go; I appreciate the opportunity to serve them," Holman said.

## 13 laid off in Clarkston schools

On the recommendation of school administrators, the Clarkston Board of Education has approved the layoff of 13 non-instructional staff members.

The unanimous vote May 8 follows a move in April to cut 30 teachers and two administrators from the school staff.

In a letter to the board, Superintendent Gary Haner said the reductions were necessary for the following reasons: the overall financial posture of the district; program cuts to be made in the 1989-1990 school year; anticipated reductions in state aid funding; and anticipated loss of revenue created by the Headlee Amendment.

The dates of the layoffs varied, but all were to take

place by June 30.

The reductions include: Secretary Kathy Garwood, Clerk Teresa Solwold, Special Education Paraprofessionals Joyce Lockwood and Linda Betz, Media Paraprofessional Karen Pidruzny, General Custodians James Farnsworth and Carl Blehm, Bus Driver Alaina Hawley, Lunch Room Supervisors Donna Jones, Linda Chew, Linda Hamilton and Joe Ann Veltigian and Mechanics Helper Jeffrey Hoffman.

If voters approve a reversal of the Headlee rollback in the June 12 election, some of the staff could be recalled, according to school board officials.

According to the Headlee Amendment, the millage rate is automatically rolled back whenever assessed property values increase at a higher rate than the rate of inflation. Voters can overturn the automatic rollback.

# Residents request more information on cityhood

Harold Goyette of Main Street. "How are you going to handle fire and police (protection)? It should be looked into further."

Also, Goyette agreed with Helpert that the village's letter showed only the positive aspects of cityhood. Since the letter came from the village it should show both sides, he said.

The synopsis condensed about 250 pages of information that the village council filed with the State Boundary

Commission. Since the packet answered questions Independence Township's board had, it's slanted toward approval of cityhood, said Trustee William Basinger.

"We had to respond to the township's negative comments," the trustee said.

Adding that the village council has nothing to hide, Basinger said copies of the township's argument against cityhood for Clarkston are available at village hall.

Residents also were concerned about taxes.

Karen Sanderson of Church Street has seen her assessments increase 106 percent in two years and wondered how cityhood would affect her.

"Cityhood cannot protect you from assessment increases," said Basinger. "But it can make it more fair."

If it became a city, Clarkston would have its own assessor and its own board of review. Currently, the township provides those services.

As soon as Basinger finished his explanation, Milford Mason stood to disagree.

"The implication is that if you become a city, assessing will be more in the village's control," Mason said. "It think that's a misnomer. I'm here to say that won't happen."

He also was curious as to the mood of the village

council concerning an election on cityhood should the boundary commission approve of it.

If 18 village residents sign a petition asking for it, an election on the issue will be scheduled.

Residents also will have a chance to vote on the issue again when a charter is drafted.

"Something this important should be decided by the voters," said Basinger. "We (the seven village council members) will sign the petition."

A decision on approval or denial of cityhood from the boundary commission remains several months away, the trustee said.

## Open door meetings

Superintendent Gary Haner has announced the first semi-annual community "Open Door" meetings for the Clarkston Community School District, set for Monday, May 15, at Clarkston Junior High School, off Waldon Road, Independence Township.

The meetings are designed to answer questions from the community about any topic of concern.

There is no agenda or presentation, and Mr. Haner says no concern is too large or small. He added that the meetings are part of a plan to expand district communication and are not intended as a presentation about the upcoming June election.

As the meetings are held at least once each semester, the location will change regularly. Each meeting will be preceded by a tour of the host building.





## CROP walk for hunger helps

CROP Walk is in its third year as a fund-raising venture for Clarkston area churches involved in walking against hunger.

The Rev. Bill Schram, pastor for Sashabaw United Presbyterian Church, is in his third year as treasurer for the Independence Township Ministerial Association.

It is his job to pay the bills for the hungry in the Clarkston area.

The funds raised by CROP are to feed the world's hungry and provide famine relief, but 25 percent of funds raised will be returned to the Clarkston community to feed those who are in need in the area.

The idea has been "something various churches could work together on," said Schram, adding that it was a way "to share common beliefs."

"CROP gives Clarkston residents an opportunity to share what they have," he said.

Even the Clarkston area will have residents in need of financial help for food or possibly gasoline. CROP is "more needed in Clarkston than people think," Schram said.

Most of the need is short term: illness, accident, loss of job, or divorce, he said.

Residents eligible for funds are those who are financially strapped and who live within the churches'

boundaries -- an area much like the boundaries set by the Clarkston school district.

Those determined to be eligible can redeem vouchers at designated food stores.

Schram has enjoyed being the treasurer for the past three years, he said.

"I like being part of it. The most tedious part is endorsing the checks," he said.

The amount of available money for this year depends on the amount of pledges walkers raise, and \$10,000 is the targeted amount for this year's fund drive.

Schram hopes lots will be involved.

"Get a pledge sheet and walk and be open to pledge when asked," he said. "It's a way to do something good spiritually."

## School bond to cover construction, not operation

The Clarkston Board of Education has made it official -- residents will be asked to vote on a \$68.8 million plan to build and improve district schools in the June 12 election.

Last month the board voted 6-0 to send details of the improvements to the state board of education for approval; with that accomplished, members voted unanimously May 8 to put the improvement package before the voters in the June 12 election.

The resolution generated little discussion from board members but drew response from one member of the audience who questioned the size of the bond proposal.

The \$68.8 million bond issue would be levied over 29 years and would be spent on the following improvements:

- creating a new high school,
- remodeling Clarkston High School and Sashabaw Junior High for use as middle schools,
- creating a new elementary school,
- adding to existing elementary schools,
- and creating outdoor equipment and facilities.

The above improvements include the furnishing and equipping of the facility; additional money would be needed to actually operate the improved structures.

In reading the resolution to the board, Director of Business Services William Jackson added that the improved facilities would have a usefulness of at least 40 years.

During a public comment section after the vote, one resident asked board members about the size of the bond proposal.

"Seventy-million dollars. That's an awful lot of

money for this district," said Clarkston resident Jeffrey Huber.

"Why not take it slowly; (residents) are not ready for such a huge leap," he said.

"I want to see a breakdown of where the (1988) millage money went to and where the bond money is going. Have alternatives been discussed?"

In answering, board President Janet Thomas said the board's business manager would be glad to illustrate where the millage money was spent.

She added that the bond issue has been debated for four years and would likely not satisfy everyone.

"It's been a long process to come up with what's being proposed," Thomas said. "Options have been discussed; it's been a joint study between citizens, administrators and the board."

Thomas said there was a need for every improvement included in the bond issue, and isolating one improvement would not be as cost effective as including all improvements at once.

Completing just the high school would require five mills, while the entire package require just 5 1/2 mills, according to board members.

The maximum mills which would be levied under the bond issue would be 7.68, based on conservative estimates of projected State Equalized Value (SEV) increases.

By law, the district can only levy the number of mills necessary to retire the debt, so if the SEV goes up more than conservatively projected, the levy would be reduced below the 7.68 mills.

One mill is \$1 for every \$1,000 assessed property valuation. To the owner of a \$100,000 home with an SEV of \$50,000 the cost would be approximately \$380 a year in the years when the millage was that high, but for at least half of the 29-year debt, the millage would be less than

7.68. For instance, the last year of the debt, it would be .85 mill, or about \$40 for the same homeowner.

The improvement proposals were drafted by the architectural firm Greiner, Inc., after representatives visited schools, met with staff and presented options based on North Central Accreditation standards.

## Mother's Day

Mothers around the nation should appreciate the contributions of Anna M. Jarvis. Without Jarvis' inspiration, Mother's Day, which is celebrated May 14 this year, might never have existed.

As it happened, Jarvis first arranged for a special mother's service in her Grafton, W. Va., church on May 10, 1908. The service was in honor of her late mother.

A simultaneous service was held in what had been her mother's Philadelphia church. Although never a mother herself, Jarvis believed that sons and daughters should pay tribute to their mothers at least once a year. The mother's services spread to more churches the following year.

In 1912, a Mother's Day International Association was founded to encourage greater observance of a special day. This led the Congress in 1914 to designate the second Sunday in May as Mother's Day.

In the same year, President Woodrow Wilson issued a proclamation urging people to display the American flag on that day as "a public expression of our love and reverence for the mothers of the country."

## School bond awarded to Oxford Bank

Oxford Bank was the low bidder on a \$415,000 bond for the Clarkston school district's new in-house computer system.

Bids from several banks, including National Bank of Detroit and Michigan National Bank, were received at 3:30 p.m. Monday, April 24, and the winning bid was accepted by the board of education at a special meeting that evening.

The good news from William Jackson, director of business services, was that the rate received was the lowest available in the state for school bonds on that date.

Oxford Bank's bid was at 7.0042 net interest.

"It was a good sale and an excellent rate," Jackson said.

The in-house computer system for Clarkston schools was approved earlier this spring by the board. The contract is with International Business Machines/Computer Management Technology.

When the contract was approved, Jackson estimated that the in-house system could save the district between \$175,000 and \$450,000 over the cost of using the computer services of Oakland Schools, just during the five-year payoff on the contract. Savings would increase after that time.

# Pilot runs out of gas, survives crash landing

so I progressed on."

The plane was now just gliding, dropping 600-800 feet a minute, Stonerock says.

He remembers telling his son how to prepare for the inevitable crash landing as he prepared the plane.

"You can see a grass field; it's a little country airport. As you approach, the sink rates indicate where you're going to land," Stonerock explains.

"I had put down the wheels and feathered the props when I realized I was not going to make it."

The plane was sinking so fast that it was headed for a spot about 1,500 feet short of the field, a distance of about 1/4 mile.

"I said over the radio, 'We will not make it.' That was my last transmission. After that I did it by the book."

Stonerock called upon his 30 years of flying experience and remembered to head for a small opening in the woods. He had about ten seconds before impact.

"I veered right and picked the two biggest trees I could see. I put the plane right between them."

As the plane hit the trees, the wings sheared off, and the plane split in two. It came to a stop in thick overgrowth.

"We were just sitting there. The windshield wasn't broken, and I asked Mike if he was OK, and he said yes. We thanked God. That was the first thing we did."

Stonerock explains that landing between two trees is supposed to dissipate speed and sheer off the plane's gas tanks.

The plane, lying in a tangle of trees, was predictably destroyed. The Stonerocks now speculate that the thick cord of radio cabling winding around the wreckage was what actually saved their lives.

Stonerock suffered a broken cheekbone, a chipped wrist and a fractured finger from gripping the microphone so hard. Mike suffered just scratches.

"Detroit Metro might have suspected I was under a great deal of pressure because I kept in touch," Stonerock says wryly. "But I never cursed into the mike."

He recalls never doubting he would live through the

crash and in fact remembers his last thought being that they were going to make it. Mike prayed the whole way down.

"There's just so much you can do," Stonerock says. "It's said that if you can walk away from a landing it's a good one. When I look at that plane, it looks like a bad one."

"If anything had not happened as it did, we wouldn't have been alive," he adds.

When asked how the plane could have run out of gas, Stonerock says that he's been thinking about the question for a long time.

"You get to be a creature of habit when you've been flying for 30 years," he says slowly. "There was a break in my routine."

Stonerock explains that he always "tops off his plane," or fills it up with gas after each flight, whether the tank is empty or close to full.

A few days before the crash, Stonerock had flown to Minneapolis and had noticed a few problems with his instruments, which are used to indicate direction.

He left the plane with his mechanic and on an unusually clear, sunny day asked the mechanic if the plane was ready to fly.

"I had about 2 1/2 hours of fuel in the main tank, and at no time did I or Mike or the mechanic ever notice that the auxiliaries were empty," Stonerock says.

"How does anything stupid happen?" he adds, shrugging.

"We must have circled Pontiac airport five times," he says.

"You can say if, if, if all you like."

Stonerock blames himself for the error but also finds fault with a portion of Federal Aviation Association policy.

Although a "black box" is used to determine what happened in the crash, Stonerock criticizes the lack of any device used to locate a plane once it goes down.


"It took (rescue workers) 45 minutes to find us. If we were bleeding, we would have died in that time. What if there was a fire?" Stonerock asks.

After telling the story and showing pictures of his wrecked plane, Stonerock shakes his head and declares his survival a miracle, an act of God.

He shares his favorite verse, one he has repeated several times since that day:

*In all of life, the eyes of the Lord  
run to and fro throughout the whole earth  
to show himself strong to them

Much of the anger I have felt from staff at the high school still stems way back to the death of a homegrown administrator, John Kirchgessner. His warm style and popularity with staff made it real tough to replace him.

When there is administrative talent in the district, it should be nurtured and developed. For staff who have worked many years in the system, it is one of the rewards to be earned.

The school board needs to look at the facts and together with the administration needs to unite behind a decision based on accurate information.

To those who so adamantly disagree with the decision that was made, I hope you are sure you have gathered all the information necessary to make an informed decision; that definitely means hearing all sides and being open to hearing things objectively.

An obligation of true friendship is to be able to be honest with one another. Sometimes it is easier not to be, but it is never right.

I believe there was merit in the decision made, and I hope all parties will remember that in the end we are here to serve the students. There was not merit in the way the decision has been handled; Jan deserved respect for her many years of fine work.

I ask my colleagues to end the divisive campaign that has begun. This should have been an in-house campaign with all issue and sides looked at honestly; instead it truly has turned into an out house.

## Editorial

### We approved Headlee, let's adhere to it

State law mandates school board elections the second Monday in June. This year that's June 12.

One would think state law also mandates schools to put a proposal on the ballot to override the Headlee amendment . . . not adhere to the state constitution.

We recognize that the amendment, passed in 1978, permits school boards to ask citizens to disregard Headlee. Therefore, it is legal.

However, it makes our nerves twing when school boards ask that our state constitution be altered. They are saying, "Oh, yeah, we know it's the law, but in this case the law also gives us an out, so let's go for it."

The amendment permits collection of additional taxes for all new construction and a portion of the increase in assessments. That portion is determined by the consumer price index. The index this year is 4.2 percent.

School administrators watch growth like hawks after mice. They know how much they will get from new construction, and budget it. They know, or have a very educated guess, how much assessments are going to rise. And, they pretty much know what the consumer price index is going to be. After all, it's their business (budget).

Through their contacts in Lansing and their lobbyists, school administrators also know about what to expect in state aid. With these figures budgets are made up and presented to the board and public.

That's the way it's suppose to work.

From our viewpoint all is fine until it gets to the increase in assessments, state equalized value, SEV. School administrators and boards don't seem to recognize that Headlee does not give them all the SEV. They refuse to recognize the purpose of the law, but do recognize the override clause.

So, along in April or May each year schools ask voters to give them money the constitution didn't allow them in the first place.

Administrators threaten cuts if Headlee is not overridden.

The 'cuts' should have been made when the budget was prepared.

This money, the difference between the 4.2 index figure and SEV, was not the schools to begin with. It should never appear in a budget. If boards want the override it should be to bring additional money into the district coffers.

By the way, school districts are not the only units of government affected by Headlee. All governments, townships, villages, libraries, etc. which rely on property taxes for revenue are included. How often do townships, villages and libraries ask for the rollback?

Michigan's governor and the state legislature are said to be not doing well for schools. We believe schools are not doing well by asking for money not allowed them by the intent of the amendment to our constitution. JAS

## The Roads We Travel

No good alternative      Brent Bair

There is a social phenomena that occurs these days whenever a perceived undesirable public or private project is proposed in a community or neighborhood.

Recent such projects have included prison sites, dump sites and even a recycling center. The phenomena is the reaction to these proposals, and I refer to this reaction as "NIMBY" (Not In My Back Yard!).

The expressed preference is to place the unwanted facility some place else. In other words, put it in somebody else's back yard.

This reaction also occurs with some proposed road improvement projects, and there is an interesting case study going on it Rochester Hills right now.

When the Oakland Technology Park was first proposed and the road agencies developed projections as to which roads would eventually have to be widened to provide the capacity to meet future traffic volumes, one of the roads identified was Adams Road in western Rochester Hills.

Just as soon as a map was released showing Adams as one of the roads that might have to be widened in the future, the residents along and near Adams Road reacted.

They voiced strong opposition to any widening and suggested that a road in Auburn Hills be widened instead.

They refused to recognize that even at that time, long before any work had begun on the Tech Park, Adams Road was already carrying in excess of 16,000 vehicle trips a day and was becoming congested just from traffic coming from or going to Rochester Hills.

It should be noted that Rochester Hills was (and still is) continuing to develop with new subdivisions going in, thus continuing to generate even more cars, some of which would use Adams Road.

The whole issue of development and road widenings became so volatile that homeowner associations were activated, and a couple of city council members were even replaced by a couple of people who represented this opposition.

The city council did recognize that traffic was a problem that would have to be dealt with, so they decided to hire an outside traffic consultant to study the problem.

and make recommendations.

In order to avoid any bias on the part of the consultant, they decided not to hire locally and hired a firm out of Minneapolis, Minn.

With all of the past concerns in mind, the consultants developed a plan that included the widening of several roads, including Livernois Road but not including Adams Road.

A public hearing was held recently and who do you suppose showed up in large numbers? The residents on or near Livernois Road.

They were opposed to the widening of their road, so which road did they propose to be widened instead? You guessed it: Adams Road. NIMBY!

The road agencies involved are simply sitting back waiting to see what the community decides. The road agencies are not about to build anything the community does not want. The problem will be getting the community to decide on what it can live with.

One alternative that comes up frequently is to do nothing and just live with the congestion. Consider the impacts of this alternative.

Congestion means that drivers are going to be delayed getting to work or getting home. When they do get there, they will be a little more tired and irritated.

The cars sitting in congestion both consume more fuel and add more pollution to the atmosphere. The property values of the homes along the congested roads will suffer.

And finally, and most importantly, the number of accidents with people getting hurt and even occasionally killed will go up as frustrated drivers take chances they shouldn't. Is this really an alternative worthy of consideration?

Rochester Hills has a tough problem with no easy solutions. We, too, will be facing some tough decisions in the future. I hope we can keep NIMBY to a minimum.

# Alcohol prohibited in township parks

A cold beer may sound good to a parched softball player, but the thirst will have to be quenched outside of Independence Township parks.

As of May 1, police and township officials began strictly enforcing a "no alcohol" rule on township park property.

"It's a long-standing ordinance, but it's never been strictly enforced," said Ann Conklin, director of the township parks and recreation department.

"Unfortunately, last season, a few people abused it quite a bit," she added.

Police said no major problems have resulted from drinking in the parks, but the potential exists.

"From time to time players would have a couple of drinks and get loud," said Lt. Thomas Quisenberry of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department.

"You'd have a close game or end up with a bunch of bleacher umpires, that sort of thing," Quisenberry added.

Over the May 6-7 weekend, sheriff's deputies conducted an education week, patrolling the parks to alert patrons that the alcohol ban will be strictly enforced. No tickets were issued.

"We wanted to give people a chance to see the signs and get the word out that it will be enforced," Quisenberry said.

Parks within township boundaries include Bay Court Camp, Deer Lake Beach, Sashabaw Plains Park, Sunny Beach on Walters Lake and Clintonwood Park.

Alcohol is not a good idea at sporting events, said Conklin.

"There are a lot of kids out there in the soccer program and some others, and it's just not a good combination," she said.

Police will issue tickets to those caught violating the alcohol ban; the fine is set in an appearance before a judge. The average fine is about \$30 or \$35, Quisenberry said.



Obviously, if a developer could acquire large parcels of land in that area and get it rezoned to 15,000-square-foot lots or even 33,000-square-foot lots, it would be a gold mine.

In addition, residents should be aware that less than one percent of the township's current land use is devoted to multiple family development. This is less acreage than any of our surrounding neighbors, although not by much.

The point is that developers could cite statistics such as these to pressure the planning commission into approving more multiple family development within Independence Township.

They would also cite such areas as Rochester Hills, Farmington Hills, Bloomfield Township, etc., where the percentages are considerably larger.

In summary, the planning commission and township board are going to be subjected to a great deal of pressure from developers in the years ahead.

As residents, we have to be continually alert to what is occurring and supportive of our township officials in ensuring the protection of existing neighborhoods, environmental resources, the rural residential character of the township and the small-town character of the Village of Clarkston.

Despite opposition from the audience, commission members voted 6-0 to recommend tentative preliminary

plat approval for the project, called Woodglen #3.

The plat proposal now goes to the township board, which has the final say in plats.

A tentative preliminary plat is a plan showing lot and street arrangements; the developer must also indicate water, sewer and drainage plans.

Voting yes were Chairperson Brent Bair, Joseph Figa, Jo Fussman, Bruce Mercado, Steve Secatch and Daniel Travis. Richard Oppmann was absent.

Woodglen #3, proposed by developer Arnold B. Gee of Independence Township, is planned for a 7.6-acre-parcel split into 11 lots of 15,000 square feet each. South of Waldon Road, the property is sided by Woodglen #2 on the west and Pine Tree Valley on the east.

Some of the estimated 50 residents in attendance told planners they didn't want Almond Lane to connect the three developments.

When Woodglen #2 and Pine Tree Valley were built, stubs from Almond Lane were extended into the vacant property between the subs with the intention that one day they would connect.

"We want to keep both subs closed," said Rick Hinzpeter, representing the Pine Tree Valley Association. "We have a concern about the safety of our children in the sub. If Almond Lane is kept open, our property values will be affected."

Association members gave commissioners a design which showed Almond Lane closed into cul-de-sacs.

Richard Carlisle, township planning consultant, told the audience that the stubs were there for a reason.

"The stubs are not there by mistake," Carlisle said. "When we started the layout (of the existing subs), certain proposed streets were to be extended to adjacent unplat land. The ordinance requires road connection," he said.

Planners added that creating cul-de-sacs would prevent emergency vehicles from easy access to many homes in the developments.

"There is only one way in to those developments," said Secatch. "There should be two."

Chairperson Bair added, "Several agencies have lived with the expectation that (the road) would be connected some day."

Commission members also questioned the developer about plans for water and sewer in the development.

"I don't like to see lake lots with a septic field," said Figa, who was told that the development would use both existing sewer mains and septic fields and would pursue the necessary health department approvals.

One resident asked whether the developer would take responsibility for any road damage incurred during construction.

"If you run cement mixers in through there, what will be done about the roads after construction?" asked Terry Gunter of Pinewood Drive.

Township engineers answered that more would be damaged from trucks fixing the roads than from the construction of just 11 structures.

Residents also questioned the developer's financial ability to finish the project and whether one or many builders will actually work on the development.







# Independence woman was mother to 166 children

On this Mother's Day, Dorothy Rice will likely be on the minds of more than 100 children -- not only for her recent death May 3 but for all of the love she gave the children while they were together.

Before she died of a heart attack last week, Dorothy was mother to 166 children. Three were her own; the others were put into her care at her Waldon Road, Independence Township, home during the 18 years she and

her husband, Guy, served as foster parents.

"She never wanted any praise for what she did," said Carolanne Reed, also a foster parent. "She would never allow any publicity while she was alive; she thought of it as her gift to God."

The foster care program is conducted through the Catholic Social Services agency of Oakland County.

Participating families temporarily care for children, while their birth families rehabilitate themselves. Foster parents also care for infants going into adoption.

The Rices usually cared for infants, Reed said, and often had up to four at a time under school age.

"I remember the first time I saw her," Reed recalled. "We were at a high school function, and there was a couple sitting on the floor in the front row with two babies."

"I just sat there watching them, thinking they must be grandparents," she added. "Of course, that was the Rices, and they were the foster parents."

"We would see them at meetings; they would always have at least one with them," Reed said. "They would just sit and rock and take turns with them."

Guy Rice, a retired truck driver, said his wife as a private person.

"I retired in 1976 to help her, but before that she had a good time of it," Guy recalled.

"She was kind of stubborn when she had her mind made up; otherwise she was wonderful," he said.

The Rice foster children now are "spread all over the country," with one living in Africa, he said.

"We adopted him here; he was bi-racial," Guy explained. "After a while he transferred back to Africa."

Guy said Dorothy had kept in touch with some of the 166 children through the years.

"She would send them birthday cards and all," he said.

The foster families keep the children anywhere from a week to several years, depending upon the situation of their biological families.

"We try to maintain the parent and child bond," said Rhonda Schinke, a foster care license worker. "There is usually a weekly visitation (between the child and the biological parent)."

Reed, who has cared for 85 children throughout her experience as a foster parent, said the task requires love and patience.

"You deal with a lot. The separation, difficult parents -- the court system can be very frustrating."

"I considered Dorothy a strong person," Reed said. "She was a very nice, kind person. She was always gentle with a child."

## Independence restricts street vendors

Street-side vendors are no longer welcome in Independence Township without a special license.

Township board members on May 2 authorized the second reading for an ordinance regulating floating sales, making it effective May 3.

The ordinance affects commercial vendors selling goods for profit in a business that, if in a permanent location, would require a site plan in Independence Township.

Garage sales, charitable activities, park vendors and refreshment stands are still permitted.

The ordinance was drafted at the request of a local florists, who argued that the vendors hurt their business.

"We have to pay (sales tax, property tax and personal business tax) on what they're selling off of a truck," said Theresa Petherbridge, co-owner of Waterford Hill Florist during the regular board meeting March 4.

"That hurts us," said her partner Belinda Seal.

Charitable or nonprofit groups wishing to conduct a sale must obtain a license from the township clerk at least 14 days before the sale.

If the sale is conducted on private property, the applicant must have written permission from the property owner; if the sale is on public property, the applicant must

have written permission from any business or organization within 25 feet of the proposed sale.

The applicant must also provide a written description of items sold, times and dates of the sale, and any promotional activity that will be used.

Sales are only permitted during daylight and only for five days within any six-month period.

Those conducting the sale must have identification and proof of licensure at all times during the sale.





## Opinion of Bill Myers

*Opinion is divided  
on bank fee issue*

In the Wall Street Journal, front page, Jan. 30, in Alan Murray's column, regarding the proposed tax on deposits held in savings institutions:

"Despite arguments a fee would cause depositors to withdraw their money . . . another quarter of a percentage point doesn't seem likely to cause a national bank run."

Same day, on an inside page, same section, in another article, where Alan Murray was credited as a contributor:

"So sensitive are consumers to their deposits that relatively slight turns in interest rates, let alone a proposal to charge a fee or tax on deposits, can spark a drain on deposits."

### Dinner hour is out

Solicitors from Greenpeace have permission to canvass Independence Township for two full months, as long as it's not during the dinner hour.

A written fund-raising request from Greenpeace Action was approved by township board members April 18, two weeks after it was tabled to allow for more scrutiny.

The ruling allows Greenpeace representatives to go door-to-door from May 1 to June 30, from 6:30-9 p.m. weekdays and 1-6 p.m. on weekends.

"I'm all for restricting hours away from the dinner hour," said Trustee Daniel Travis.

When asked what he felt was reasonable, Travis joked that his dinner hour was from 6-9 p.m.

"As you can see I do eat," he quipped, as fellow board members broken into laughter.

Although Travis' "dinner hour" was not used as a guideline, the board did restrict Greenpeace's original request to solicit from 5-9 p.m. on weekdays.

Ho hum.

An old favorite of mine, DeLuxe Corp. (formerly DeLuxe Check Printers) came in with another good year and a good last quarter.

After taking out non-recurring gains of \$16 million for the year 1987 and \$8.3 million in the last quarter of 1987, we have the following income comparisons:

Quarter	\$44.9 mil.	\$34.3 mil.

In my memory, which some days goes back quite a ways, I recall no year the company didn't earn more than the year before. At the bank in Lapeer, we used to order their checks year after year, and always their product and service were the best around.

If you bought all of the 3,000-some stocks recommended by the top brokerage firms going back 30 months, your average stock would have gone up, including dividends, 5.8 percent. Average per year: 2.3 percent; after 28 percent tax: 1.67 percent.

In the same period, the Dow Industrial Average went up 21.5 percent and Standard & Poor's 500 gained 19 percent.

Should we conclude that we should buy an index fund that tries to match the market the market averages? Don't ask me. I don't own any stocks, except some call options on GM, done mostly for fun.

If you do want to come close to matching the averages, I think you can do it yourself without paying a mutual fund load charge. Buy a half-dozen of the Dow Jones Industrials that have low volatility. Financial analysts call this the Beta factor, which impresses their clients.

The Financial Weekly gives this number in their

stock tables. The closer it is to 1.0, the closer the stock has in the past matched the averages, going up or going down.

In the municipal bond market, there are a few issues around that bear the "AMT" designation. It means "alternative minimum tax," which penalizes big investors.

For this reason, the AMT-designated bonds (mostly housing issues) pay maybe a quarter-percent more interest. It used to be a full half-point.

Anyway, until your income from AMT bonds runs over, say, \$50,000, there's no penalty. If you like the particular bond in its own right, you might as well pick off the extra quarter percent.

Every little bit helps, as the old lady said.

#### Book Review:

*"Bringing Home the Gold."* by Joseph L. Shaefer. Published by Dow Jones-Irwin, 1818 Ridge Road, Homewood, Ill. 60430. 220 pp. \$22.95.

The author has been in the brokerage industry for 20 years and is now a senior vice-president in the Charles Schwab discount firm.

He uses the analogy of training for the Olympics to approach investing. The events, the rules, the coaches, how you play the game are all part of your training. Then comes the game itself.

It's a comprehensive book and would help anybody about to start investing. Even a weatherbeaten old pro could learn a thing or two from it. Amateurs will be impressed at the very size and diversity of the investment field.

I was disappointed to see so little space given to zero coupon bonds, a great favorite of mine. They deserved more than a paragraph.

## Cranberry Lake drain to help flooding

Water levels at Cranberry Lake on M-15, Independence Township, have risen dramatically, but the threat of flooding receded with action by the Independence Township board May 2.

Board members unanimously agreed to petition Oakland County for a new drain system in the area.

The drainage problem came to a head with a 42-lot subdivision planned near the lake -- officials from the Oakland County Drain Commission said they would deny permits for the project unless something is done.

Township engineers told board members that the drain office had received several complaints about the lake level and that the lake had risen close to Cranberry Lake Road and some existing homes in the southeast corner of the lake.

"It appears the lake is at least 1-2 feet higher than it historically had been before the natural overflow was filled," said engineer David Lakin in a letter to the board.

"We believe this situation will only worsen as the Cranberry Lake basin develops," he added.

Lakin explained that the lake level is rising because recent home construction along Perry Lake Road is blocking the lake's natural overflow into the Clinton River.

The Chapter 20 drain district would create a pipe system connecting the lake with a drainage ditch along Perry Lake Road.

The estimated \$17,000 cost of the project would be shared by the township and the county road and drain commissions. Each agency is assessed on how much it

uses the drain -- the township would pay about 88 percent of the cost.

The developer of the proposed Cranberry Pointe subdivision, Biltmore Construction, has offered to help if the township petitions for the drain, Lakin said.

Biltmore would provide the costly engineering for the project and would obtain the contractor.

Lakin told the board that the township portion of the drain may be paid for with money held by the drain office for other township projects.

Township Trustee William Vandermark questioned what would happen if the township didn't create the drain district.

"If we didn't approve this, the developer would either not develop or foot the bill himself," Vandermark speculated.

"We need to create the drain whether that development goes in or not," answered Supervisor Frank Ronk.

"(Biltmore's) contribution is more than comparable to the amount of water they'll dump in there," he added.

Township board members also questioned how the system would be constructed and whether residents could control the lake levels.

Engineers told the board that residents could appeal to the municipality to change the levels once the drain is in place.







## Beaumont Foundation picks '89 Poster Child

Brandy Ryan, 1, greets visitors to her home on Birch Road, Brandon Township, with squeals of joy. She's eager to climb on any stranger's lap and will sit contentedly.

"She's just glad she's here," said Brandy's mother, Cynthia Hubbard, and it's apparent in the first meeting with Brandy.

Born 12 weeks premature, Brandy has overcome many obstacles in her short life. Her attitude and unsinkable spirit have earned her a spot as poster child for Beaumont Foundation.

Brandy, who has a Clarkston mailing address with her family, has a special mission to perform as "miracle baby" for Beaumont's Foundation. She was chosen as Beaumont Foundation's 1989 poster child representing the best visible success for Beaumont's "miracle children" for 1989.

Miracle Children for the Children's Miracle Network Telethon will air Saturday and Sunday, June 3 and 4 on WKBD-TV Channel 50. Although a nationwide program, the money raised in Michigan will be forwarded to Beaumont Hospital, Royal Oak, for research for children with life-threatening diseases.

Brandy serves as a good example of Beaumont's work. Her determination has given her life, put her on a poster and helped her make a TV commercial for WKBD-TV.

Brandy was delivered at 28 weeks gestation because the amniotic fluid in her mother's womb was infected, endangering Brandy's life. When Brandy was born, she was completely filled with infection.

Other problems resulted. Brandy had surgery when she was two days old to close a valve to her heart. Bleeding was discovered at the base of the brain causing hydrocephalus, an accumulation of fluid within the cranium. The problem corrected itself by the time she was six months old, and doctors feel she'll recover completely, said Brandy's mother.

Hearing loss was another obstacle for Brandy. Around three months, doctors discovered she only had about 90 percent hearing. Tubes were placed in her ears at six months of age to allow for drainage, and "that made a big difference; that's when we began to see a change," said Hubbard. Brandy now has only a slight hearing loss.

Brandy will eventually need glasses, but that seems like a small obstacle considering the hurdles she has already crossed in her first year of life.

For now, Brandy is content to crawl around in her home with her sister, Kelly, 10, brother, Shawn, 6, mother and stepfather, Arthur Hubbard.

Brandy's medical problems were difficult to shoulder for Brandy's mom. "It hasn't been easy," she said.

"She is such a joy; I thank God I have her," she added. It does seem that miracles have originated there before.

## Clarkston cook tosses salad aside for retirement

Reberta Allen started her career much like today's concept of the lunch wagon or Meals on Wheels. Clarkston schools delivered pre-cooked lunches to the districts' students in rural areas by van.

When Reberta was hired in 1953 by Ora Wells, now deceased, she was given the title of "salad girl."

Wells was responsible for starting the hot lunch program in Clarkston schools and started cooking soup on the wood stove at Sashabaw Country School on Maybee Road, where the Independence Township Fire Station now stands.

Reberta remembers serving lunch in the building that is the current Clarkston Junior High. At that time, they served 500-600 lunches a day, she said.

Reberta became supervisor of the lunch program

after Wells retired, and by then they served 1,200 lunches a day, she said.

Once motherhood came along, Reberta left the school system, returning to work five years later but in a different field. She worked for two local physicians as a medical assistant.

In 1976, Assistant Superintendent Mel Vaara called her to take the position as a para-professional aid in the

On April 19 the Detroit Area Home Economists In Action presented a Heart Smart Luncheon for members and guests.

Ann Connally, registered dietitian, discussed the guidelines for Heart Smart and then demonstrated some delicious Heart Smart recipes.

Here is a snack idea that I adapted to microwave preparation. Use the microwave for toasting the almonds and for sauteing the onion, garlic and mushrooms. You can save a few more calories by using vegetable spray. Foods do not stick to dishes when they are cooked in the microwave.

### MUSHROOM ALMOND PATE

1/4 cup slivered almonds

1 teaspoon salad oil (optional when cooking in microwave)

1 small onion

1 clove garlic, minced

3/4 pound mushrooms, sliced

1/2 teaspoon salt (optional)

1/2 teaspoon dried thyme leaves

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Spread almonds in a shallow pan and toast in oven about 8 minutes or until lightly browned. Set aside.

Heat oil in a skillet over medium heat. Add onion,

garlic, mushrooms, salt and thyme. Cook, stirring occasionally, until onion is soft and most of pan juices have evaporated.

In a food processor or blender, whirl almonds to form a paste. With motor running, add mushroom mixture and whirl until pate is smooth.

Makes about 32 one-tablespoon servings on crackers or with vegetable sticks. Serve with low-fat and low-sodium crackers. Check labels.

For the microwave:

Place slivered almonds in a large (6-ounce) custard cup. Toast at high for 3 to 4 minutes or until almonds are brown, stirring every 2 minutes.

Treat a microwave browning dish with non-stick vegetable oil. Or for a more pronounced taste, add 1 teaspoon olive oil. Heat for 3 to 4 minutes at High. Add onion, garlic, mushrooms and thyme. Cook for 4 to 5 minutes, stirring every 2 minutes.

Proceed as with conventional recipe. Serve with low-fat and low-sodium crackers.

"I like writing fantasy because you can make up more with fantasy," she said, adding that she enjoys writing a lot.


"It's fun. You can write whatever you want," she said. "I think it would be fun to be an author because I like writing."

## WOMAN TO WOMAN

Betty Peoples is a registered nurse-practitioner in the field of family planning/ob/gyn. She is the director of the Women's Clinic at the Community Health Care Center, Oxford. She sees patients there 4 days a week.

"Our primary concern is that health care be looked at as an asset, and to make sure that asset stays at the proper priority," she says. "I can't do much about the outward appearance. But come here and you will learn that a healthy body is part of your outward appearance."

"We are very anxious that women are very comfortable with their sexuality . . . We are sensitive of women's needs regardless of age," she says. Teens need one-time-only parental consent to be treated.

"The setting is a very warm, enticing environment; it's kind of a home-like setting," she says. During special Women's Days, fresh fruit and juices are served, and departing patients receive a long-stemmed carnation. It's pampering where you might least expect to find it. Peoples calls it treating "the wholeness of the woman."

"The stress on women is tremendous these days. I really stress taking time for yourself," she says. That includes, in her book, balancing work, marriage and motherhood with taking care of yourself, whether for you that means diet, exercise, stopping smoking, lowering your cholesterol, or getting counseling.

The clinic, Peoples says, offers a full range of support services, including mammogram, x-ray, ultrasound, laboratory, counseling and various specialists.

"Once you're in here you don't have to worry about going out into the community for other services. They're all here . . . Once these (problems) are found you can go right around the corner and they're there."

foods department at the Oakland Technical Center-Northwest Campus, formerly called the Northwest Vocational Education Center.

Again, Reberta recalls numbers.

"There have been 1,276 students under me," she said.

But numbers are not what Reberta's career has been about. Rather, it's the people who have been the most important aspect of her career in foods, she said.

"Most students return (to the center), sometimes with their families," she said, adding that she's enjoyed the close atmosphere in the center.

She especially appreciated the close feeling when her husband, William Allen, died of cancer in 1985 and accredits Daniel Manthei, principal for the center, with helping her through her grief.

The close friendships will make it difficult to retire, Reberta said.

"Here there was always something, someone who needed someone to talk to, whether it was a problem at home or just life in general," she said.

Working with students gave Reberta a sense of caring. And the students appreciated Reberta's work.

One of her students, Chris McKinnon of Waterford Mott, said Reberta would be missed by all the students.

"She is the nicest lady," McKinnon said.

But Reberta already has plans for the future, including traveling to a warmer climate, hunting and fishing, visiting the Canadian Rockies and visiting her daughter, Jodi Norton, who lives in Nashville, Tenn. She doesn't have to travel far to see her son, Rod C. Allen, a Clarkston resident.

Reberta has five grandchildren, and she wants to spend time with them all, no matter what the distance.

But she won't be traveling alone -- she has recently

remarried. After the death of her first husband, she joined a support group based at St. Joseph Mercy Hospital in Pontiac and met Howard Steele, whom she married on St. Patrick's Day this year.

Howard also lost his wife to cancer.

Reberta plans to continue working with the support group on a volunteer basis.

"I want to help others as we were helped," she said.

As for the center, Reberta plans "to come back and just sit down to lunch."

#### Charter Township of Independence

##### NOTICE OF APPROVED ORDINANCE

At a regular meeting held on May 2, 1989, the Township Board of the Charter Township of Independence approved a new ordinance to amend Chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances of the Charter Township of Independence.

The approved ordinance pertains to the licensing and regulation of floating retail sales within the Township.

##### SYNOPSIS OF APPROVED ORDINANCE

###### ARTICLE I. GENERALLY

Sec. 14.5-1. Intent, Purpose and Short Title.

1. It is the intent of the Township Board to insure that persons engaged in floating retail sales shall not conduct a commercial, for-profit business for which a permanent premises, approved following submission and approval of a site plan, would normally be required in the Township.

Sec. 14.5-2. Definitions.

Sec. 14.5-3. Regulations.

1. There shall be no floating retail sale conducted in the Charter Township of Independence unless and until a license for such activity is applied for and issued pursuant to this Chapter.

2. A license under this Chapter shall be issuable only to a charitable or nonprofit group.

3. Floating sales shall be conducted during daylight hours.

4. No floating sales activities shall be conducted within the improved portion of a public street, road or highway, nor within ten feet of same, without the expressed, advanced authorization from the Township Board. Such authorization may be granted to floating sales activities which have been conducted in such right-of-way areas by the group making application at least once in each of the past five years.

5. Each person engaged in floating sales shall have identification on his or her person.

6. Floating sales by any individual or group may be conducted not more often than five days in any six month period.

8. If floating sales activity is to be conducted on private property, such activity must be a permitted use on such property, in accordance with the codes and ordinances of the Township.

###### ARTICLE III. LICENSURE

Sec. 14.5-4. Licensure.

1. Application procedure.

3. The Township Clerk shall review the application and issue a license if all requirements for licensure are met, as provided in this chapter. If, upon review, the clerk determines that an application does not comply with this chapter, the clerk shall inform the applicant of the reason or reasons for denial of licensure.

4. The license issued under this chapter shall contain the following information:

- The name
- The address
- The days, dates and time the floating sales activity may be conducted.
- The location
- A description
- The name

The motion to approve the ordinance was made by Travis and seconded by Vandemark.

Vote on the motion: Ayes: Holman, Lutz, Millard, Ronk, Travis, Vaara, Vandemark. Nays: None. The motion carried. This ordinance is effective immediately upon publication.







### 'I am overweight'



**Dear Friend to Friend:**

I am in the fifth grade, and I am overweight. People look at me and call me names. Even my brother calls me names. I have tried to lose weight. I also suck my thumb.

When I try to make friends they won't take me for what I am. When I make a friend, they're too embarrassed to play with me. They say, "I am not his friend," and they call me names too.

I have tried to diet for a long time. I need advice.

**Overweight and Embarrassed**

**Dear Overweight and Embarrassed:**

It is painful to be overweight and to be teased by others. This is definitely not an easy problem to handle. We think you have a lot of courage to write us for advice.

We have a couple of suggestions that we hope will help you. The first one has to do with dealing with the problem right now. It is likely you have already been told to ignore people who tease you or call you names and we know that it is hard to do - even for teenagers.

The best way, however, to ignore others who embarrass you is to like yourself and think well of yourself. How can you do this? By knowing one or more ways in which you are special.

Learn what your special talents, skills and abilities are. If you don't think of any, ask a trusted adult or one of your parents if they can tell you what you are good at.

If you really don't think you have any, develop some. You could practice to be a good reader, speller, or math student.

Or you could practice to be better than most kids at some sport or activity; or you could learn a musical instrument, or learn more about some special topic, such as baseball cards, stamp collecting, a favorite animal.

Or you could practice just being a friendly, helpful person who is kind to others or a person who has a nice smile and a good sense of humor.

Having a special skill or talent will help you to feel good about yourself -- no matter what others say or think about you.

The second suggestion we have is that you continue to work hard at losing some weight. While people should like you for who you are, you will get to know more people if you drop a few pounds.

The best way to start doing this is not by going on a diet but by setting some realistic goals (perhaps to lose a pound a month) and by changing your eating and exercise habits.

Since you are only in the fifth grade, you should be happy to hear that you will probably grow several inches in the next two or three years that will help you look slimmer.

## Children see leader puppy in action

Dressed in an eye-catching, forest green jacket complete with plenty of colorful patches, a dog named Motion caused quite a commotion in Clarkston Elementary recently.

Owner Carol Thompson of Independence Township, brought the five-month-old black labrador retriever to school to demonstrate the abilities of seeing-eye dogs.

Whenever the kids had the chance, they eagerly swarmed around the puppy in hopes of petting or playing with him.

Thompson picked up Motion in January from the Leader Dog School for the Blind in Rochester. He will return there when he's a year old for additional training and evaluation.

While under Thompson's care, Motion will learn what it needs to know to become a competent leader dog. Walking near traffic, learning different sounds and obeying voice commands are all a part of the animal's training, Thompson told a group of second-grade students at Clarkston Elementary during her presentation May 4.

"I'll teach him to be friendly and not afraid," she said of her long walks with the dog along the roadside, in crowded areas and anywhere else it may have to go with a blind person.

Motion is the fifth leader-dog candidate to stay with the Thompsons. Three of the previous four graduated and now assist a blind person, she said.

"It's a nice program," Thompson said of the leader dog school in Rochester. "They really need the volunteer families to raise puppies."
