Change of guard in top board post

After 10 years of service, Janet Thomas has been replaced as Clarkston Board of Education president. The board unanimously approved John Needham as president of the board, effective immediately. The move was initiated by Thomas, who quickly

nominated Needham for the position when it came time for election of officers July 9. The board is required to re-elect officers at the start of each school year.

The motion to nominate Needham as president was seconded by Thomas Howard and was quickly approved by other board members.

As Thomas and Needham picked up their belongings to switch seats, Needham quipped, "Things move

pretty fast around here, don't they?"

Halfway through the meeting, Needham commended Thomas for her dedicated service to the district.

"I think we owe a debt of gratitude to the Janet Thomas," Needham said. "Twelve years at the helm. ... I know I've grown immensely (under her influence)."

Needham thanked Thomas for her guidance and support and commended her for her incredible knowledge of school issues.

After the meeting, Thomas said though her experience as president had been "very nice," she felt that she had to step aside.

"I worked with a lot of good supportive members and a lot of administrators," Thomas said. "I've repre-

sented the district ... and in that respect, (the presidency) has been very important to me.

CJH principal named head of personnel services

The search for a director of personnel services for Clarkston schools ended with the hiring of a familiar face.

Duane Lewis, principal of Clarkston Junior High School, was unanimously approved for the slot by the board of education July 9.

Superintendent Gary Haner told members that after

posting the position internally and with placement bureaus at major Michigan universities, he was happy to recommend Lewis for the job.

"He has served in personnel in an ongoing capacity at the building level and has participated in two negotiations for the district," Haner said, adding that Lewis had attended negotiating workshops.

Candidates were interviewed for the position by a committee of three administrators, including a representative from the school board, Haner explained.

When the field had been narrowed, Lewis and a candidate outside the district remained for consideration.

Lewis, who has worked with the Clarkston district for 18 years, replaces Conrad Bruce, who retired last

month.

When asked to comment, Lewis said he appreciated the confidence and support of the board and would do his best to meet its expectations.

The board also voted to approve Vince Licata to replace Lewis as principal of Clarkston Junior High.

Licata, currently assistant principal of Sashabaw Junior High, started his career at CJH as a teacher.

Although the CJH principal position had not been posted, Haner told the board that "Licata's level of preparedness was so significant" that he felt very com-

Sashabaw bridge widening could begin by winter

A \$2 million construction project to widen the viaduct on Sashabaw Road, over I-75, could begin as early as October, according to personnel at the Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT).

Art Bekmanis, a design engineer at MDOT, said design plans have been submitted to MDOT's in-house review department for the re-construction of the overpass.

He said the plans were turned in for review and "letting" in mid-June. Letting is the process of seeking contractual bids for a construction assignment.

According to Bekmanis, once the plans have been approved by the in-house review department, they are forwarded to the Federal Highway Administration for final approval. From there, the project is "shopped around" to construction companies in order to secure the most appropriate bid.

Bekmanis said the letting process should begin in September, with the awarding of the bid coming nearly one month later. Construction could begin soon after in order to get a head start on winter.

Construction will include adding one lane to the overpass as well as a westside "loop ramp" extending

from Sashabaw Road onto southbound I-75. An acceleration lane will also be created to handle the heavy traffic flow at Sashabaw Road and I-75.

Phil Christy, MDOT engineer in charge of the bridge's roadways, said the acceleration lane will help facilitate the traffic generated by the Pine Knob Music Theater.

Bekmanis said the plans were designed with a pe-

destrian walk-way alongside the bridge. Last month, the Independence Township Board allocated \$26,000 from its safety path millage revenue to help in the construction process. MDOT will pay for the remaining cost of the walk-way.

Despite the fact that the bridge is being widened, officials at the Road Commission for Oakland County said the widening of Sashabaw Road is still a long time off.

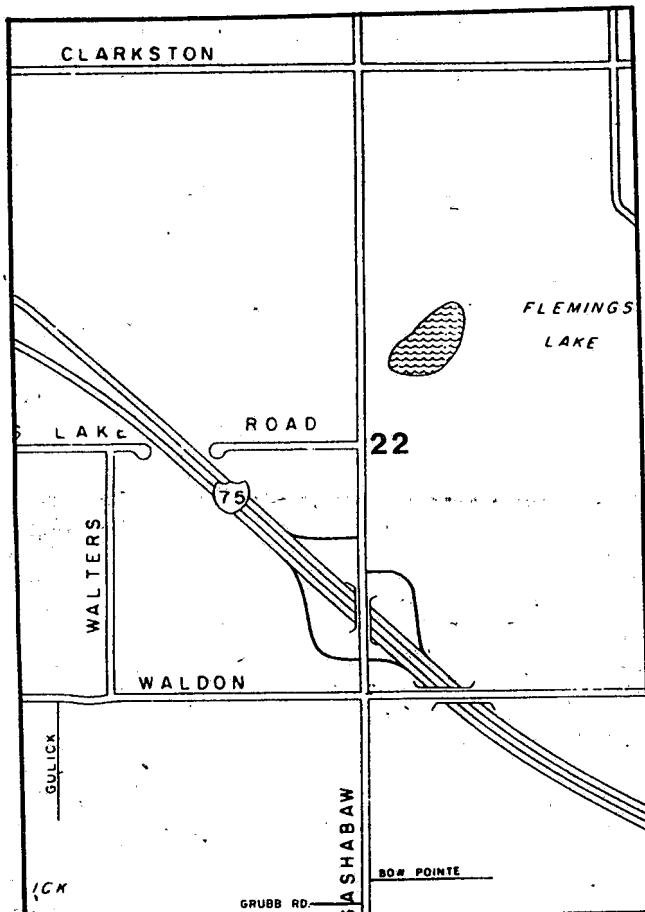
"We'd like to widen the roadways between Maybee Road and I-75 on Sashabaw Road, but no monies," said Brent Bair, deputy managing director with the Road Commission.

"We'd really like to widen the road, and it's master-planned for widening, but I can't see it happening within the next three years."

Bair added, however, that the roadway at the intersection of Maybee and Sashabaw roads will be widened within the next two years.

Township officials are excited about the imminent widening of the overpass.

"We (township officials) think it's terrific," said township Clerk Joan McCrary. "We've been asking for this project for nearly five years, and with the inclusion of the safety path it's doubly-wonderful."

Still no go for Goyettes

Funeral home ordinance change sent to planners

The Clarkston Village Hall was filled to capacity July 9 when more than 50 people gathered in support of Norma and Harold Goyette.

The Goyettes want to change the village's zoning ordinance to allow an expansion of their funeral home on Main Street.

After the Clarkston Village Council denied a rezoning request April 9, the funeral home owners returned July 9 to request that the zoning ordinance be amended to permit funeral homes as a special condition in a residential district.

If approved, the Goyettes plan to add about 15,500 square feet in parking lot and 15 feet to the funeral home. The business is in an area zoned for residential use.

After about an hour-long discussion, the council took no action because the planning commission had not

yet heard the issue. Before the council considers zoning matters, the planning commission must make a recommendation to the council.

The Goyettes' attorney, Gerald Fisher, presented a proposal for the expansion using the City and Village Zoning Enabling Act as the basis.

Fisher, who serves as the consulting attorney for Independence Township, said the expansion is possible under the Zoning Enabling Act, which allows the village to adopt land development regulations.

According to the act, a village could allow expansion of a use if it existed before a zoning ordinance, while at the same time prohibiting newer property uses from expanding under the same circumstances.

Fisher said the expansion of the 50-year-old funeral home could be adequately controlled by the village and by the current owners. Plus, if the property is sold, the use can be controlled.

President Sharron Catallo said none of this addressed the parking problem.

"This is making a parking lot out of a residential lot," Catallo said.

Trustee Eric Haven said he wanted to hear what the audience had to say.

One resident set the mood for tempers to flare by accusing the council of "wheeling and dealing."

"Not on this council!" Catallo snapped back.

Another resident said the Village of Clarkston was no longer a friendly village.

Clarkston pediatrician James O'Neill added some humor before he spoke in favor of the funeral home expansion. He said anyone who was immortal in the group could leave because they didn't need the Goyettes' services.

O'Neill said the council needed to address the prob-

Some restrictions in ordinance proposal

If an amendment to the Village of Clarkston Zoning Ordinance is approved, a Main Street funeral home in a residential district could be expanded.

A rezoning for the Goyette Funeral Home was denied April 9 by the village, so the owners returned July 9 with an attorney and a request to change the ordinance to allow special conditions. The council referred the issue to the village planning commission.

According to attorney Gerald Fisher, who represents Harold and Norma Goyette, the proposed ordinance change would allow village funeral homes in existence for 50 years or more as a special use in residentially zoned areas.

Plus, under the Zoning Enabling Act, the village could deny similar approval of newer funeral homes plus restrict the expansion to 25 percent of the pre-existing building and restrict any removal of the pre-existing building to 10 percent.

According to Fisher, the ordinance could be adopted to include such specifics as:

■ The funeral home must have been in operation on

the property for at least 50 years.

■ The property frontage of the funeral home must have direct access to a state highway or a former state highway.

■ In addition to off-street parking, drives and aisles must provide an adequate area for vehicles involved in funeral processions.

■ Additions to buildings will not create a non-conforming situation because of the expansion.

■ Loading and unloading areas used by ambulances, hearses or other service vehicles will not be viewed by the residential area. Fencing or landscaping will be required to screen the residential area.

■ A caretaker's residence may be provided within the mortuary facility.

■ All site improvements, including parking, landscaping, loading, signage, screening and lighting, will be determined by the Zoning Board of Appeals. Site improvements will be reviewed and established to avoid any negative impact upon surrounding properties and help maintain the historic character of the village.

■ Improvements to the property will meet the requirements of the existing ordinance.

"Harold Goyette lets people die with dignity before being rushed to the morgue," O'Neill said.

The council listened to some of the arguments for the funeral home expansion, but a zoning ordinance adopted in 1973 prohibits it from allowing the expansion.

Trustee Douglas Roeser said, "This has all the potential to be a very major change, and we are trying to be very careful."

Catallo said it would be easier to tell someone new to the Clarkston area who was asking for a zoning change that it would not be possible to change the ordinances, but the Goyettes have been in business for over 30 years. Norma Goyette has also served as the elected village clerk for 10 years.

"I know this creates hard feelings because we have an oath to uphold," Catallo said.

One resident spoke against the proposed expansion and parking lot.

Shirley Bickford, who lives next to the Goyette Funeral Home on Main Street, said she did not agree with the plan to expand because of the amount of asphalt that would be put down.

One resident suggested that if the council wanted residents to approve cityhood, the council members should serve the businesses that have served the community.

The village is in the process of becoming a city, but a few more steps are necessary before cityhood takes effect.

Candidate forum set

The race is heating up for the 61st District Michigan House of Representatives seat.

But area residents will have a chance to see the candidates up close in a Candidate Forum sponsored by the Clarkston and Rochester Leagues of Women Voters.

The forum takes place 7:30-9 p.m. Monday, July 23, at the Independence Township Annex, 90 N. Main St., Clarkston.

Three area reporters, including one from The Clarkston News, are to ask questions of the candidates, and the forum is to be cablecast at a later date on Independence-Clarkston Channel 65.

The district covers such areas as Independence, Springfield, Orion, Oxford, Oakland and Addison townships as well as the villages of Clarkston, Lake Orion and Oxford.

Candidates for the seat, which represents Independence and Springfield townships, are republicans Tom Green, Fred Hall, Thomas Middleton and Cathy Pisano and democrat Fred Miller.

"We all need to bend the rules," responded Norma Goyette, who sat in the audience instead of at the council table for the meeting.

Thomas Gruich, attorney for the Village of Clarkston, said the Goyettes may not always own the business.

"The council is trying to foretell the future, and others may not be as committed to the village as you are," Gruich said to the audience.

"These ordinances were made by humans and can be changed by humans," said Iva Caverly of Waldon Road, Independence Township.

Caverly said that it would be possible to go to the state board of appeals if the Goyettes were denied their expansion proposal.

"The problem is (if the funeral home is allowed to expand), everything that is non-conforming can expand," Catallo said.

Roeser said the council has spent many hours on the Goyette project.

"The planners designated this as residential," Gruich said.

Gruich gave legal advice to the audience in an attempt to have them understand the council's problem.

"The constitutional constraint is just one of the districtwide regulations," he said. "Everyone lives under the same set of rules."

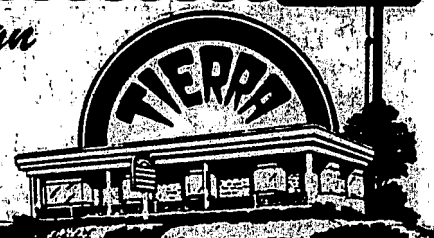
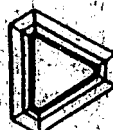

Usually, my husband, The Thinker, complains when I have to work late. But I think it's just for show.

I have this theory: I tell him I'll be home late because I have to lay out the paper. He tells me he'll miss me. Then, as soon as I leave, he probably twirls around the room, ecstatic.

"She's gone!" he probably shouts.

This, of course, means he can have our small apartment all to himself. I know what he will do, too.

First things first. He opens all the windows and turns on all the fans to make our humble abode as near to an igloo as possible. (In the summer, the air conditioner at full power is usually necessary to achieve this effect.)

Then, he probably makes a sandwich — one of his super-duper cucumber sandwiches. He eats it quickly.

Then, because he can't stand the clutter he says I leave around, he whirls through the place, picking up this and dusting off that.

Finally, he is ready. He gathers the equipment: a dictionary, notebook, mechanical pencil, two library books, and his most recent bookstore purchases (this week, I think they're: "The Myth of Sisyphus" by Albert Camus and "The Encapsulated Man" by I don't know who).

Then, he pours himself some diet Mt. Dew in an insulated glass, and he sits at the desk, ready for his journey.

Often, I catch him at this point — if I come home earlier than expected.

Usually, I burst in and immediately begin to chatter, telling him how happy I am to be home and how hungry I am and at the same time turning down fans or air conditioning and dumping the mail, newspapers, briefcase, camera and purse in the clear spaces he has created.

He smiles, but I can tell he is exasperated. He wants to return to his books. But he — with great willpower — talks to me while I eat. Eventually, he is released, and he immediately returns to the desk, which is fine because I want to read, too.

Sometimes, though, I'll need a little popcorn with my book (especially the current book Andrew the Horrible loaned me: "Spycatcher" by Peter Wright).

The Thinker hates this. He likes to eat popcorn and all; he just doesn't like the crunching noise he says I make. As soon as he hears the popcorn popper begin, he reaches in the drawer near the desk and pulls out his earplugs.

Sometimes, though, I don't get home from work until much later, when The Thinker has already finished his desk journey and is immersed in his second adventure for the evening.

If this is the case, I can usually tell by the time I reach the second floor outside our third-floor apartment.

Usually, it's Beethoven's Ninth Symphony, blaring triumphantly out of the cracks around our air conditioner and beneath the door and probably right through the walls.

The Thinker does not even notice when I open the door.

Once I surprised him, standing in the middle of the floor, earphones on (plus music blaring from the regular speakers), arms waving wildly, sweating furiously.

It was obvious that he was nearing the end of his session as conductor of some imaginary orchestra, which was joyously approaching the finale.

It's all a part of my theory. It only makes sense that he would play "Ode to Joy" every Tuesday, when I work late.

Their party was scattered. His girlfriend and he asked four different policemen for help. None would. One asked if they could identify the assailants, and when they said they couldn't because there were so many they were told they couldn't be of any help.

Derek's head and hand were bleeding. Derek's girlfriend Heather was close to being hysterical when they finally were able to get help from an ambulance.

Heather found another couple from their party and gave them the car keys, which was parked a few blocks away and told them they were being taken to Detroit Receiving Hospital.

The ambulance they were in picked up another person. Another injured person was in need of their help so the previous person was taken back out and replaced with the new victim.

At 11:30 we received a hysterical call from Heather at Detroit Receiving. She wasn't allowed to see Derek. We left home immediately and arrived at 12:30.

The emergency room was busy. The waiting room

was full. A young fellow who had been standing close by during the fireworks had been shot, and his girlfriend had had her earring, necklaces and purse taken.

Five people were brought in during the next short while with gunshot wounds; many others were cut and bleeding.

One ambulance that pulled up to the emergency doors had several bullet holes in its side. When the driver and his partner got out they said, "Detroit sure knows how to party — now they're shooting at us."

I went up to the information desk to find out about our son. We weren't allowed to see him, and we didn't get any information for about a half hour.

I told the nurse I had my insurance card and asked what I needed to fill out. She told me I needed nothing, it was taken care of. I did not understand then and still do not.

Ambulances continued to pull up with injured people from the fireworks celebration. A group of youths walked into the hospital to see a friend who was injured. One kept putting a white substance up his nose and using very obscene language at the nurses because they wouldn't let him see his "brother."

At 3 a.m., we still hadn't seen our son, though we'd been told his head had been stitched up, and they didn't have the help to clean the broken glass from his hand. Their emergency was full to capacity. We asked to have our son released, so we could take him to another facility for aid.

At 3:30, we left Detroit receiving and took Derek to the 24-hour emergency care unit in Clarkston, close to home.

His hand was cleaned and bandaged, and the dried blood was washed off him. We arrived home after 5 a.m. very thankful it hadn't been a lot worse and very angry with the lack of concern of the Detroit police.

Only two shootings were listed in the Oakland Press. Five were brought into Detroit Receiving alone.

Why didn't they take our insurance card when it would have covered our son's care costs? Why isn't the public made aware of just how violent Detroit continues to be?

Another question... don't you wish you could invent a gadget to stop car thefts that worked and cost \$20? The world cries out for such an invention, only

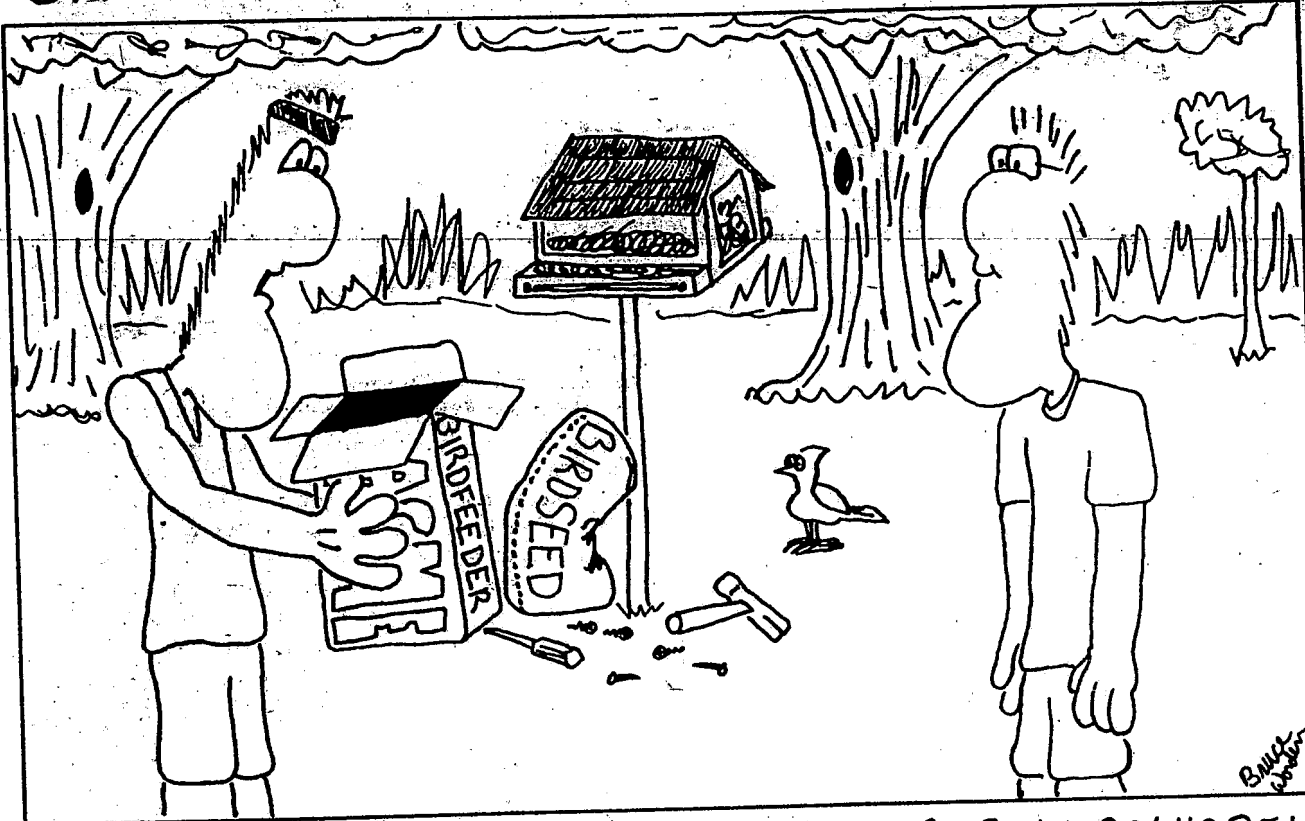
now they cost hundreds.

Back when I was young and daring (read stupid), I went skydiving.

I didn't think about it much at the time. Skydiving wasn't a lifelong dream or a mind-over-matter challenge or anything.

In fact, the first time skydiving ever crossed my mind was the night before I jumped, when a friend cajoled me into accompanying him.

Arriving at the airport the next morning, I hadn't decided whether I was going through with the stunt; I thought I might just take the class and decide.

For the next eight hours we hung suspended from rafters, jumped off footstools and watched

exciting videotapes about the thrills of leaping from a moving plane thousands of feet above the ground.

The instructors were very nonchalant about the whole thing, telling us over and over again that for every problem in skydiving there is a solution.

(If one parachute fails or rips, you cut it away and pull the reserve chute — got it?)

A big class had shown up that day, causing a long wait to get outfitted. One thing led to another and I found myself in heavy work boots, full fatigues, with a heavy reserve parachute strapped to my chest.

I still didn't think I was going to skydive, I recall. It was only when the tiny plane started to race upwards that I realized there was no turning back.

The plane was so small it would accommodate only three people and the pilot without passenger seats.

Probably the worst moment came when the pilot unlatched the huge plane door, blasting us with wind. I was numb after that.

One by one, we mechanically took our place outside the plane on a tiny ledge, waiting for the pilot to pound us on the leg — our signal to shove off.

I remember being confused by a tremendous noise, and then an immediate silence. Did the plane go dead?

I finally realized my parachute had opened and I was drifting slowly and peacefully downward.

The quiet, the view, and the sheer relief at having the jump behind me, made the next 20 minutes heavenly.

Unbeknownst to me, the man with the bullhorn on the ground was attempting to get my attention.

"Pull the right toggle," he was projecting, in a forceful, deliberate shout. "The right toggle."

He got my attention, finally, but it was too late. I had drifted irreversibly off course. I landed half a mile away, waist high in a bean field.

I trudged back, surrounded by beans, my arms around the huge crumpled parachute, and sweat pouring off of me in the 90-degree August heat.

I was smiling.

Joe Grimm, assistant to the Free Press executive editor, takes reader complaints over the phone. His desk is next to mine, and I occasionally overhear him responding to gripes about my column. Sometimes, while the reader remains on the line, Grimm relays questions to me and then relays my answers to the reader. Is that instant customer service, or what?

Another thing Grimm does is enter a transcript of his conversations into the office computer system, along with succinct comment. This allows all employees to immediately learn what's on readers' minds. Last Monday, one reader's mind was on me, and I was on hand to supply Grimm with instant answers. The following is his verbatim report:

YOU AND WHAT ARMY?

A St. Clair Shores man says that Fitzgerald's column opposing anti-flag burning amendments is a terrible disgrace to the country and to veterans. "I bet he was never in service."

"He was."

"World War II."

All of which reminds me that I was in Germany when American soldiers often used the cliché: "To the victor belongs the spoils." But maybe not for keeps.

Last week the New York Times reported out of Dallas: "A court-ordered inventory of safe deposit boxes belonging to the heirs of a U.S. Army officer has turned up other art objects apparently taken from France and Germany during the final months of World War II... The officer is believed to have stolen artworks from Quedlinburg, Germany."

Stolen? That wasn't the operative GI word in 1945. The operative word was liberated. Many a conquering soldier liberated whatever he could lift. In case of furniture, perhaps a bed, it sometimes took two soldiers to lift it. It was never called a bed, though. It was a war souvenir.

I was never comfortable with all that liberating but, as an 18-year-old, late-arriving replacement, I kept my doubts to myself. It was easy to rationalize. After all, German families were regularly ousted from their homes to make room for U.S. soldiers, and if it was OK to liberate someone's house, why not the silverware and linens inside it?

The New York Times said it wasn't known how the artworks were transported from Germany to Texas. I could make a good guess: by mail. Parcel post. During the few weeks immediately before Germany's surrender, the GIs assigned to mail duty didn't much care what their buddies mailed home.

There was even a report of a dismantled Volkswagen going to Brooklyn, each part individually boxed and gift-wrapped. It was probably an apocryphal model, but maybe not. Certainly it's easy for me to believe a few liberated paintings could have been mailed from Quedlinburg to Dallas.

Forty-five years later, I remember riding a half-track through Quedlinburg, where I didn't do my job. I didn't shoot anyone.

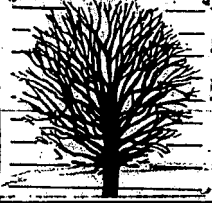

How many Giraffes are here?

The Giraffe Project was founded by Ann Medlock in 1983. She and her husband, John Graham, run it from Langley, Wash. Recently the project was named the 129th daily Point of Light by the Bush administration.

The Giraffe Project is a nonprofit organization that identifies, encourages, publicizes and generally celebrates ordinary people who "stick their necks out for the common good."

The purpose of the project is to bring about a sea of change in the way we private citizens perceive our own competence and responsibility to alter the world.

To do this, Giraffe employs a very old tactic: storytelling. The stories told in publicity releases and radio scripts, which are distributed nationally, strike a profound chord because they are the tales of heroes.

The first recording of Giraffe stories was sent to radio stations in 1984. They celebrated such people as Gene Gitelson, a Vietnam vet who left his profitable management-consulting firm to start a non-profit program designed to place long-term-unemployed fellow vets in mainstream careers.

Another was about Gail Story Sams, a waitress at a truck stop in Bumpass Cove, Tenn., who organized her neighbors to stand in the road and block trucks that were dumping toxic wastes upriver. After stopping the trucks, she began helping other mountain communities organize against toxic dumpers, in spite of threats from polluters. Before all this happened, Gail said, she had "never done nothin' but birthin' babies and watchin' television."

As the first recording was heard across the country, calls started coming back, asking for more stories. The Giraffe Project made another recording, and more requests came in.

Why were people so moved by these stories? The late Joseph Campbell, a noted authority on heroes and myths, puts it this way:

"The quintessential hero comes into a wasteland where an evil spell holds back the creative force. Nothing grows. Everybody is waiting for the one person who can break the spell. The hero is that person. He or she pays no attention to cautious folk who cite the dangers and the rules; the hero listens to and trusts and inner voice. Acting out of spontaneous compassion for those who are suffer-

ing, the hero braves all odds and breaks the spell, and life returns to the land."

In our own contemporary wasteland, many of us long for something we can't quite articulate. We need heroes for our time. At the Giraffe Project, they know they exist and they find them.

Today, stories of Giraffes are heard around the world — on U.S. and Canadian radio, the Armed Forces Radio Network, the Voice of America, and even Radio Moscow. Almost 500 Giraffes have been identified and commended; 26 foundations have given support.

Here is the story of two recent Giraffes:

Alexander and Nancy Abraham are investment bankers with Sherson Lehman Hutton. Old hands at life in New York City, they know how to make things happen in the sometimes bewildering maze of public and private bureaucracies. What was not being made to happen was the creation of good housing for the city's poor. The Abrahams decided to see what could be done.

They found a building, leveraged its purchase and furnished it, enlisting city officials, retailers and professional people to help them.

Now 31 women and their children live in safe, pretty rooms and share kitchen facilities at the Alexander Abraham Residence on West 51st Street. Social workers, teachers and doctors work with the women and see that the children are safe, healthy and thriving.

Nancy Abraham says that if 100 people would do what she and her father have done, there would be no one left in the dangerous and filthy hotels where the city houses so many of its poor.

All of the above is an excerpt from an article in the July 1990 issue of Lear's magazine. The stories show how a handful of totally dedicated individuals can change the world.

I wonder how many potential Giraffes might be living right here in Clarkston? If you might be one, but you don't have time to save the world, how about at least trying to save the Clarkston area? Give COG a call at 625-8474.

Council surveys building owners

Does your historic district building or home shake when a truck passes by? If so, the Village of Clarkston wants to hear from you.

Clarkston Village Council officials recently sent a survey to building owners in the historic district because some structural damage can be caused by trucks carrying heavy loads.

The roads included in the survey are South Holcomb, West Washington and Main Street within the historic district.

Jerry Wilford of Main Street said he compiled information for the survey after being informed that the City of Northville was able to restrict truck traffic traveling through its historic district.

The roads in Clarkston's historic district are owned by the Michigan Department of Transportation, but the City of Northville has full authority of the streets in the historic district, making it easier to restrict the trucks, Wilford said.

Truck traffic is increasing on village streets, Wilford said.

"About 10 percent of the village traffic is trucks," he said. "The state did a count about 2 1/2 years ago, and it was about seven or eight percent."

It will take about another month to complete the survey results.

Wilford said he hopes to enlist some political help to prevent the heavier trucks from using the village streets.

He prefers that the truck traffic use Dixie Highway and I-75.

"Buildings in the historic district are not replaceable," Wilford said. "You can duplicate them, but not replace them."

Patterson-Anderson drive falls short of signatures

The Patterson-Anderson petition drive fell short of the 239,657 signatures needed to place a property tax-school financing reform proposal on the ballot.

Though disappointed, organizers were pleased with the support of the people, particularly in the north Oakland County area.

The group ended up with more than 205,000 signatures Monday, July 9, the deadline to place the issue on the November ballot.

"We came close; however, we fell short, and that's the bottom line," said Nancy Strole of Springfield Township Nov. 10.

The proposal would have reduced property taxes and required the state to give more money to local school districts without raising statewide taxes.

Strole said she was "terribly disappointed" with the results, but she was encouraged by other factors.

"I'm not discouraged," she said. "I think this process showed us that there are mechanisms in place for us to make a difference to change things."

She said the Springfield, Groveland, Independence and Holly areas had been particularly supportive of the proposal.

"This area has every right to be proud of what it did," she said. "It pulled far more than its weight."

She noted that one volunteer, Barb Hansen of Springfield Township, single-handedly collected 3,000 signatures.

"That's only one person," said Strole. "There were

others who collected hundreds and hundreds of signatures."

The Springfield Township Board, of which Strole is a member, also supported the petition drive, as did the North Oakland County Board of Realtors, particularly Pat Jacobs, said Strole.

Pat Anderson, an economist for whom the proposal was named (along with former Oakland County Prosecutor L. Brooks Patterson), also complimented the workers.

"The crew we had in North Oakland County was one of our best," he said, adding that if the organization had had such workers statewide, the petition drive wouldn't have failed.

Anderson said he probably would try another petition-initiated proposal if the state legislature doesn't fix the problems.

"I've learned a great deal, and we've assembled a lot of people," he said, mentioning that the 180-day limit to collect signatures hurt the drive this year.

Next time, they'll be one step ahead because of their new network of people, he said.

He also noted the irony of the recent proposal from the state to take away money from the "wealthier" districts and giving it to the less wealthy districts, which would force most districts to raise property taxes or make severe emergency budget cuts.

"Lots of schools in Oakland County are upset because the state proposes to take away categoricals," he said.

The Patterson-Anderson proposal "would have protected them from that," he said.

School officials could learn a lesson from this and support petition drives in the future, he said.

Strole, who also said another petition drive was a possibility in the future, said the probability of a legislative solution was "grim."

"Don't expect anything from the legislature," she said. "The whole Lansing establishment ... are captives of special interest."

"In the short term, people should expect more ballots that are requesting Headlee overrides, ... millage increases, and coupled with escalating property values, that adds up to escalating taxes."

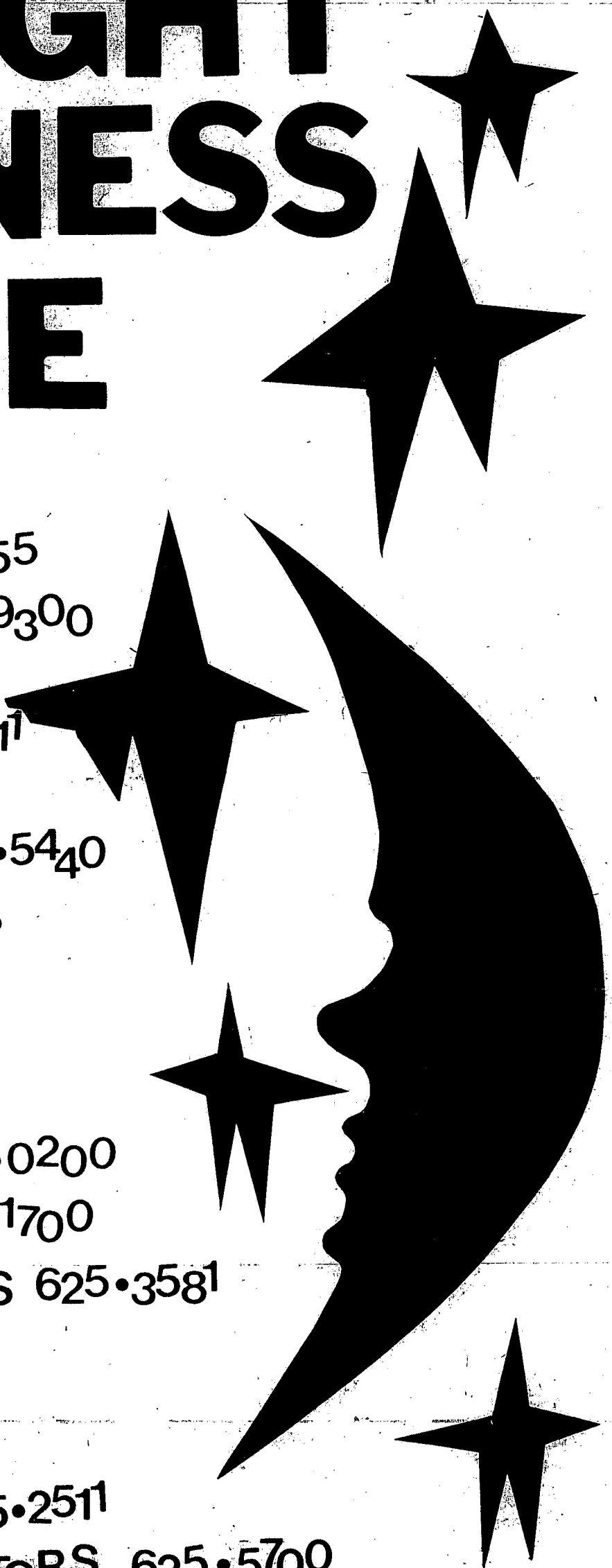

Waldon residents angry over safety path easements

A proposed safety path on Waldon Road has raised the ire of a few Independence Township residents.

According to Waldon Road resident Mary Fife, she and her neighbors received informative letters from the township nearly a week and half ago.

The letters requested an easement from each residence to build a safety path on Waldon Road to the intersection of Sashabaw Road.

The township has offered \$1 to each property owner for the right to an easement.

In Fife's case, a 17-foot easement was requested. If

carried out, she could be in jeopardy of losing a 30-foot tall blue spruce in her front yard.

Fife also relayed the story of fellow neighbor Benjamin Gee, who was given a 27-foot easement designation. Such an easement would put the walkway within a foot of his front window.

"These easements are completely asinine," Fife said.

In speaking with fellow neighbors, Fife said that most are refusing to send in their contracts, which accompanied the informative letters and would give the township easement rights.

Fife said several neighbors would like to discuss alternatives to their proposed easements with the town-

ship. The residents are also aware that the township could incorporate the "right to domain" clause if they decide to press the issue.

permission to petition the court to legally obtain ownership of an easement when proved beneficial to the area's welfare.

Neighbor Tom Borsh intends to fight for his frontage.

"I'm not going to give up all that land for a safety path," Borsh said. "I've only got 40 feet in my front yard as it is."

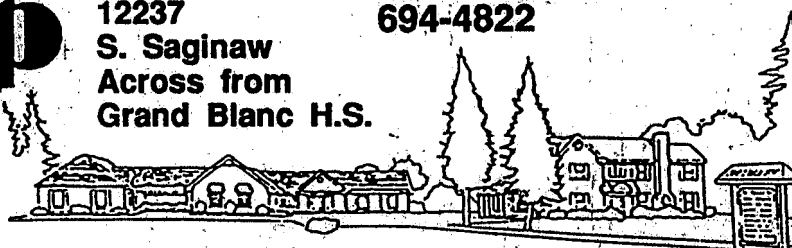

Travel teams must register by July 17

Soccer players wishing to play on the fall-spring travel teams must register before July 17.

Those travel teams are for athletes under-14, under-16 and under-19.

Games for travel teams will usually be played on weekends, with occasional weekday games. Home games will be played in Clarkston with possible away locations being Utica, Sterling Heights, Oxford and Fraser.

Younger players not playing on travel teams have until July 31 to register. Those games will be played at Bailey Lake Elementary (under-10), Clintonwood Park (under-8 and under-12) and Sashabaw Plains (under-10).

Eight games will be played in the fall

and 10 in the spring.

All players can save money if they register early by July 13 at the Independence Township Parks and Recreation Department (625-8223).

Early bird registration fees are: (under-8, under-10, under-12 for two seasons) \$40 for residents and \$45 for non-residents; (under-14 travel team for two seasons) \$45 for residents and \$50 for non-residents; (under-8, under-10, under-12 for one season) \$25 for residents and \$30 for non-residents; (under-14 travel team, under-16 travel team, under-19 travel team for one season) \$30 for residents and \$35 for non-residents.

Regular registration fees are: (under-8, under-10, under 12 for two seasons) \$50

for residents and \$55 for non-residents; (under-14 travel team for two seasons) \$55 for residents and \$60 for non-residents; (under-8, under-10, under-12 for one season) \$30 for residents and \$35 for non-residents; (under-14 travel team, under-16 travel team, under-19 travel team) \$35 for residents and \$40 for non-residents.

The fees include shirts, socks and shorts. Players must provide their own shin guards.

The season tentatively will begin Aug. 29 for under-10 and under-12 teams, Aug. 30 for under-8 teams and mid-August for the travel teams.

Coaches are still needed for some teams. Anyone interested should call the rec. department.

Q & A about BP

BP.

Baseball players aren't the only ones to come early for batting practice.

Fans arrive one or two hours early and hope to see their favorite Detroit Tiger or a well-known visiting player smack the ball into the upper deck. It's a time for some fans to bring their gloves in hope of catching one of those long drives.

The media also show up early. Baseball is probably the most accessible pro sport for reporters and photographers, who converge around the batting cages, dugout area or inside the clubhouses for a story or

a close-up photo.

Jim and Twila Christian and their children (one wearing a glove) were at Tiger Stadium Sunday, nearly two hours before game time.

The Christians just moved from Philadelphia to Troy two months ago and were in Tiger Stadium for the first time.

Jim Christian, who pointed out that the fans are much closer to the field at Tiger Stadium than at Philadelphia's stadium, said his family arrived early to watch batting practice and because of "parking and making sure we got a bag." The Tigers gave out free duffel bags as a promotion.

Tiger third baseman Tony Phillips was also at the ballpark a few hours early,

but not to pick up a duffel bag. Tony the Tiger and his teammates were taking their swings in the batting cage, hoping to get back on track after being 1-hit the night before by Kansas City pitcher Kevin Appier.

Phillips said the batting practice fans see can help a player's batting, but the extra BP some players take even before the regularly-scheduled BP is even more helpful whenever a player is in a slump.

Tiger catcher Mike Heath said a player can even go beyond batting practice to help cure a slump.

"I think more important than batting practice is watching yourself on a videotape. I think that would definitely help you find out some of the things you're doing wrong," said Heath.

Heath said BP isn't just about swinging, it's about seeing.

"If you're in there seeing the ball good, for me, I don't care about my swing, as long as I'm picking the ball up good," said Heath.

BP often looks leisurely, but once a player takes his swings, it gets more serious.

"When you step in the cage, it's pretty much business," said Phillips, who last year was a member of the World Champion Oakland A's. "Batting practice is like a carry-over to the game, so you really don't want to be lackadaisical."

Even players with the sweetest of swings know the importance of batting practice. George Brett, who batted .390 several years ago, said in BP a player should "come out and work on your fundamentals. When the game starts, you feel very good about your timing. So all you have to do is concentrate on the ball when the game starts."

Brett, without naming anyone in particular, says there are some players who are great batting practice players but don't carry that greatness over once the game begins.

Kansas City batting coach John Mayberry, the former big left-handed hitter who often found the front porch in rightfield of Tiger Stadium, said batters often suggest where they want the ball thrown to the batting practice pitcher.

"They throw location, in and out, up and down," said Mayberry. "Batters might say pitch me outside, pitch me inside, try to keep it up on me."

Tiger outfielder Larry Sheets said even though a player may practice hitting the ball to certain parts of the field, much of what happens in a game situation depends upon the guy on the mound.

"It's all dictated by how the pitcher pitches you. That's the great thing about baseball. If they pitch you inside," said the lefthanded batting Sheets, "it's very difficult to drive the ball to leftfield."

Warren Spahn, a Hall of Fame pitcher who retired in the '60s, recently said that regular pitchers on the team should pitch BP instead of special batting practice pitchers so they can get in more time.

Tiger pitching coach Billy Muffett disagrees with Spahn.

"That used to be back then, but this is a different time. They throw more on the side now," said Muffett.

Tiger reliever Mike Henneman agrees with his pitching coach.

"We get in plenty of work," said Henneman. "If you need more work, you can do it on the side."

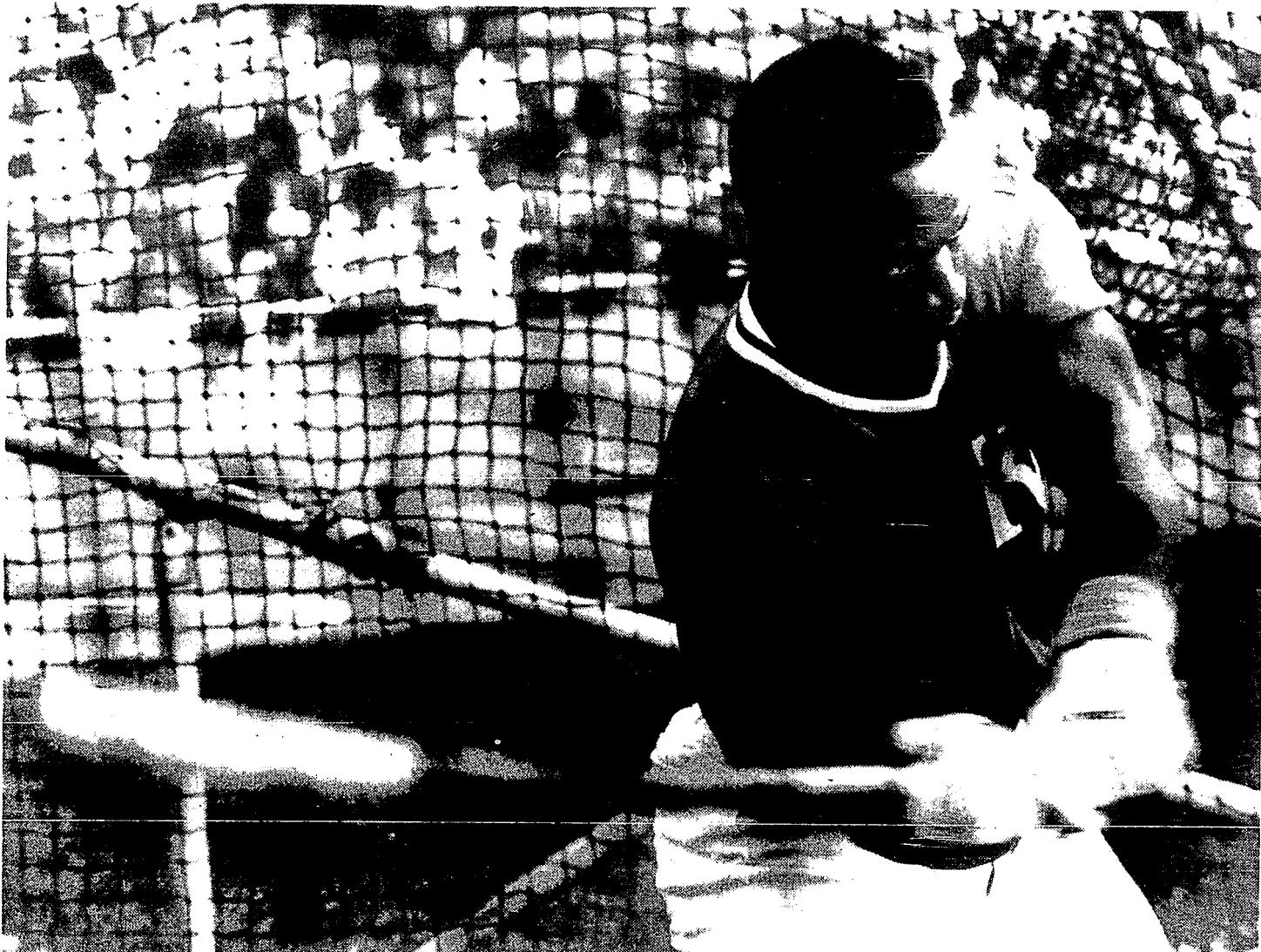
Pepper games, where a coach stands near a fence and hits short hops for players to field, are a thing of the past. Tiger Stadium has signs painted on the fences near home plate stating "No pepper games."

"They should take those things down," said Heath. "Back in the old days they let them play pepper. You know why they don't let them play pepper anymore, 'cause they're afraid someone's going to hit one in the stands and they're going to be sued."

Cecil Fielder, who says BP in Japan is quite similar to the major league version, said batting practice helps players mentally, especially after having a bad day at the plate the night before.

"It's a time to get loose and fully recover," said Fielder the day after the entire Tiger team could only manage one hit. "Yesterday ... that game's over."

In baseball, as in life, tomorrow is another day. And the day begins with BP.

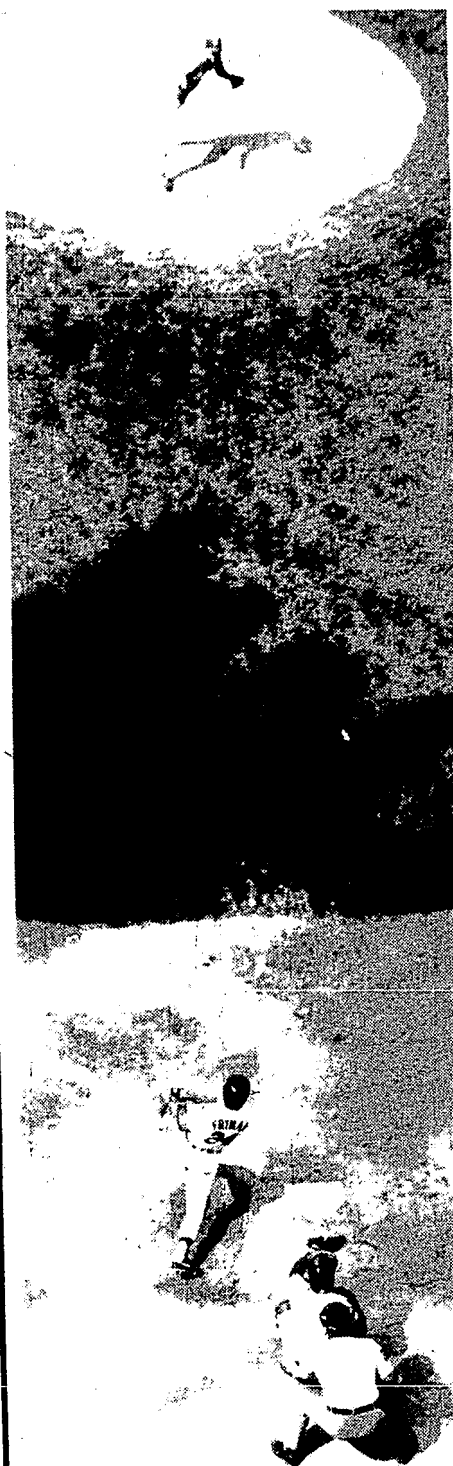

towards the outfield, several fans were trying to get his attention in hope that he would come over and sign autographs (or maybe give them a pair of his Nikes).

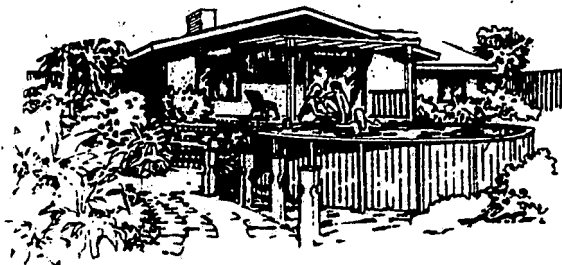

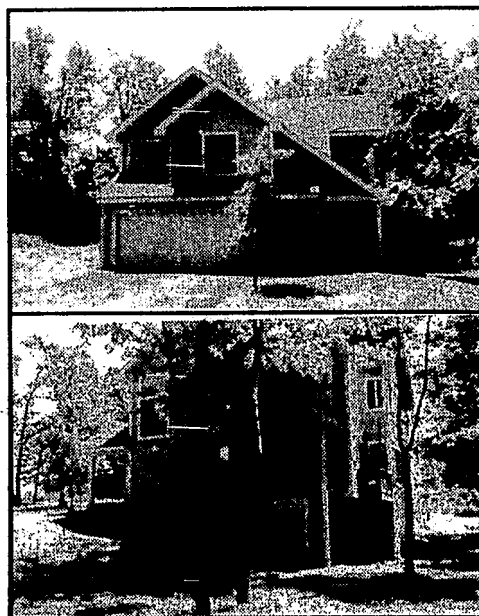

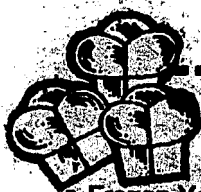

pound Greco-Roman Junior Division.

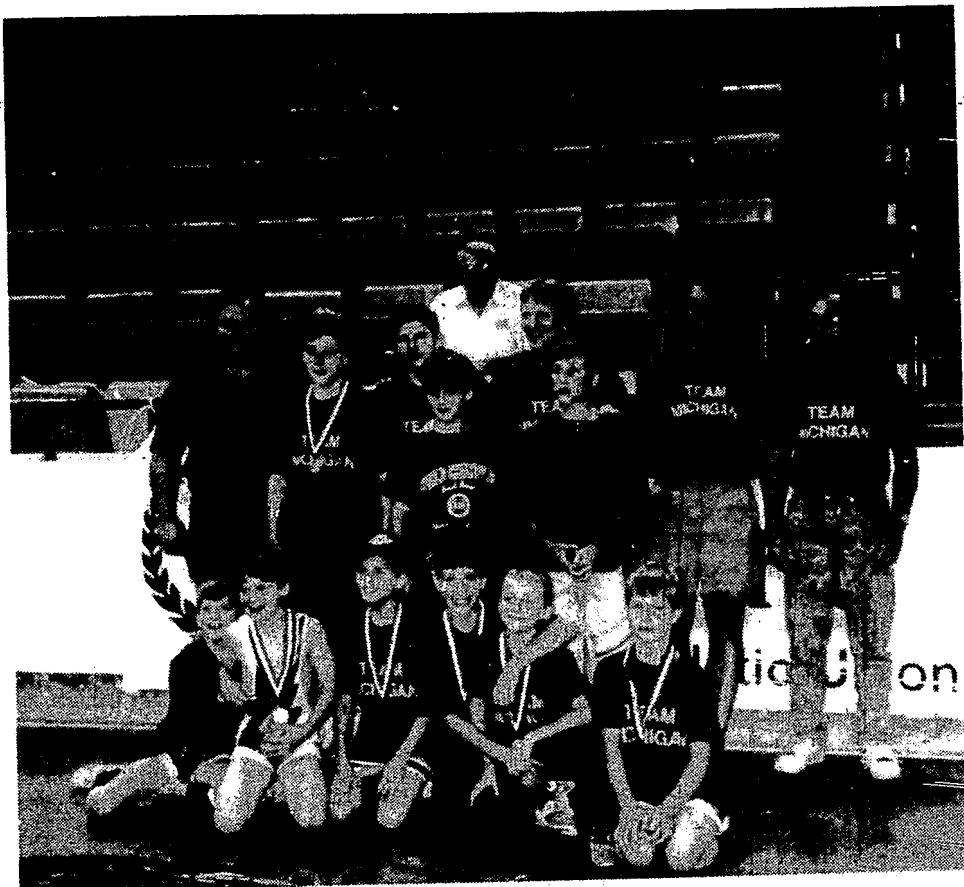
Pat Degain placed fifth in the heavy-weight Bantam Division.

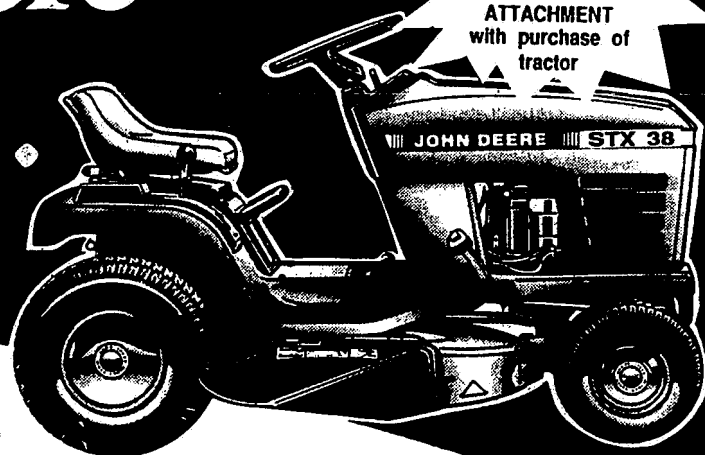

Planners recommend new sign ordinance to board

After several years of effort and research, Independence Township is getting closer to incorporating a new sign ordinance.

At the June 28 planning commission meeting,

commission members voted 4-1 recommended a adopting a proposed ordinance to the township board, which has the final say in ordinances.

Voting yes were Chairman Brent Bair, Joseph Figa, Jo Fussman, Bruce Mercado. Richard Oppmann opposed the recommendation, and board members Daniel Travis and Steve Secatch were absent from the meeting.

Penned by the planning commission, the updated ordinance covers three specific areas not entirely explained in the current ordinance.

The three areas include: regulations requiring removal of nonconforming signs following useful life, regulations addressing abandoned signs and regulations providing for a reduction of nonconformity upon a change in use or structure.

Included under the proposed ordinance, all signs will be prohibited from exceeding six feet in height. The signs must also conform with the zoning ordinance or be removed. However, if the ordinance is adopted, nonconforming signs will be given a "grace period" of 10 years before being refurbished or replaced.

All conforming signs will be granted a life expectancy of 20 years, if kept up, under the proposed ordinance.

In terms of abandonment, the ordinance would call for the removal of any sign that stands on a vacant parcel of property for more than 60 days.

According to the planning commission, "for sale" signs will also be regulated within the township. If approved, the signs would be prohibited anywhere other than the available property.

Oppmann voted against the ordinance because he preferred a five-foot height requirement. However, he said the ordinance will benefit the township.

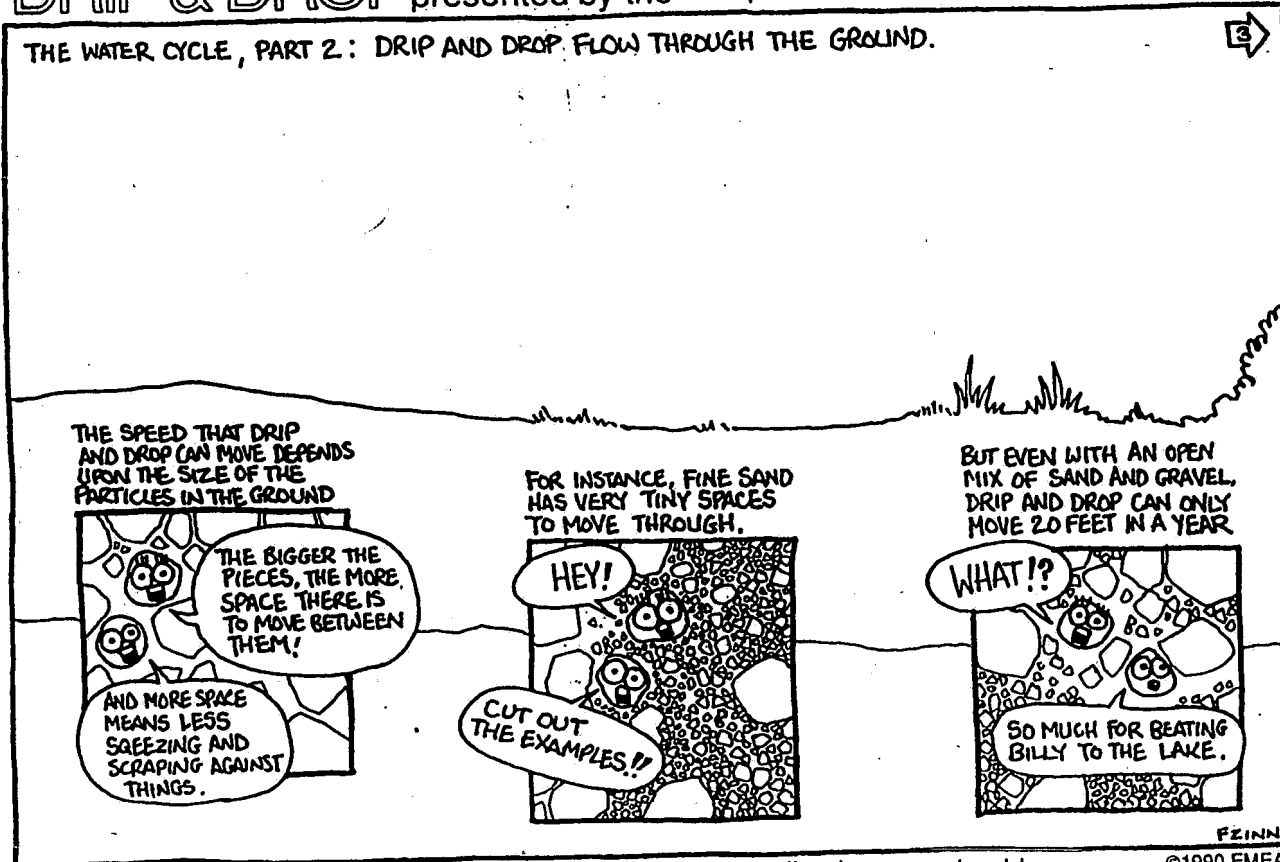
"If we're going to increase the township's character through signage, then it is a good due course," he said.

Rudy Lozano, of Evans and Associates Real Estate in Waterford Township, approved of the ordinance's basic principle of ridding the township of "eyesores."

"I think uniformity with the signs is imperative for this township," Lozano told the commission. "There are already way too many cluttered signs along the Dixie corridor. We should put a lid on this pot before it boils over."

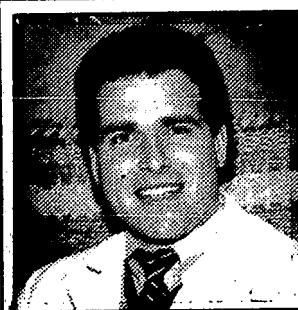

Opinion of Bill Myers

Forget economics with tour of capital

It's vacation time, and this writer thinks you need a switch from financial gobbledygook.

We'll tell you about the most unoriginal place in the country to visit - Washington, D.C.

We bet you haven't been there since your senior trip, except maybe overnight. My associate, Jennifer Birdsong (otherwise known as Jeanne Myers), and I just got back, and we had a great time.

Here's what we managed to do in a very busy six days, which started at 9 o'clock in the morning and finished in late evening.

First of all, avoid the worst crowds by arriving Sunday afternoon and leaving Saturday morning.

•House and Senate sessions. Get tickets from your congressman or senator at his office. The sessions don't usually amount to much, because all the work is done in the committee rooms, but you might hit a lively one. Anyhow, it will give you a chance to sit down. Find out from the hotel or by a phone call if there will be a session. Usually they don't convene until afternoon.

•The White House. Ask your congressman for special passes, and if a time is allotted, get them as early in the day as possible. Groups of about 40 are whisked through some of the main-floor rooms. If you have a really good V.I.P. connection, there are private evening tours, two or three people at a time, and you get much further behind the scenes.

The Supreme Court. Again, ask your congressman for a ticket for a "Congressional Tour." It will be a small group and you'll see much more. The school classes and general public get a very superficial visit. We thought the reception rooms at the court were beautiful, indeed, and the whole place most impressive.

•The memorials - Jefferson, Lincoln Memorial, the Vietnam Wall with names of the fallen, the Iwo Jima monument. Take cabs from one to the next and see them at your own speed.

•The National Cathedral, now essentially finished, is near Georgetown. To us it was more impressive than most of the Old World cathedrals.

•The FBI Building. Conducted tours, and pretty boring.

•The Ford Theater, where Lincoln was shot. Some mementos in the basement and a short lecture by a National Park Service representative. We went back in the evening for a stage show and had a doubly enjoyable evening, watching a good show in a most historic theater, beautifully restored.

•Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts. Something always is going on there - ice shows, drama, musicals, ballet, concerts and opera. Easy and quick to get there by cab - and unlike New York, lots of taxis after the show.

•Bureau of Engraving & Printing. You'll need a ticket from your congressman for this. Tours start at 8 a.m. - about the only place in Washington that opens early. It's fun to see the presses turn out millions of dollars while you watch. Not high on our list, though, of places to see.

•Washington Monument. Looks better from a distance, and a crowd's always waiting to go up the elevator.

•The art galleries of the Smithsonian. You'll be hard to please if you don't find one of them you like. Next time, I'm going to pretend a gimpy leg and ask for a wheelchair. As it was, I nearly did need one before I got out.

•National Air and Space Museum. What a dandy! More people go through this than any other museum in the world, and everybody likes it. Everything from the Wright brothers' first plane to Lindbergh's "Spirit of St. Louis" to the capsule in which John Glenn orbited the Earth. The place is remarkably uncrowded because so many of the exhibits are suspended from the ceiling.

•Mount Vernon. When you're thoroughly beat by the end of the week, book an afternoon cruise down the Potomac to this famous house. It's a pretty trip, and you'll like going through the home.

Tips: Leave your car at the hotel and take cabs. They charge by zones and aren't expensive. Typical trip is \$3.35. Lord knows where you'd park if you tried to take your own car.

We stayed downtown at the old Willard Hotel, now handsomely redone in its original glory, with some embellishments of the modern age such as telephones in the bathrooms and a speaker for the TV. A bouquet of orchids awaited, along with an iced bottle of Chardonnay from the Vallejo Vineyards of California.

Pretty heady livin' for this country boy.

air balloon owned by Jeff Hellier of Brass Forging Co., Ferndale. Howard is employed as an electrical supervisor at Brass Forging.

It's the Brass Forging balloon, Ocean Fantasy, that will fly over the fields in Springfield Township.

Howard attended ground school and is licensed like an airplane pilot to fly the balloon.

Flying balloons requires concentration, Howard said.

"The hardest part of this is knowing when to fly and

when not to fly," Howard said. "The second hardest part is finding a place to land."

Safety is always foremost in Howard's mind when he is flying.

"I'm very cautious about what I fly in," Howard said.

As the pilot in command, he said it's not worth the risk to fly in poor weather because there's always another day to fly.

But even though he's cautious about flying conditions, it's the enjoyment of being up in a balloon that keeps his spirit soaring.

"I love my sport," Howard said.

Howard and Michelle consider ballooning a family sport.

Their sons, Shawn, 7, and Derek, 5, join their parents in the activity.

"Every time I fly my family is with me," Howard said.

The family travels throughout the United States and Canada to balloon festivals. There is only one exception, when Howard flies his balloon in February in Toledo, Ohio, he goes alone because of the cold weather, he said.

Howard takes time from his job to make other children happy also. He has visited some elementary schools in the Clarkston area to give a short demonstra-

tion on ballooning.

The balloon will be inflated for the demonstration, but it never leaves the ground giving the students an opportunity to walk around the balloon basket and ask questions. He also gives them a slide presentation.

"There is nothing more enjoyable than taking time off from work to do this (demonstrate to children)," Howard said.

The Steeles are donating a balloon ride to be raffled off at the Springfield Hot Air Balloon Festival.

"We try to help out where we can," Michelle said.

The cost of a balloon ride on the Ocean Fantasy is \$150 for one person, \$250 for two, \$325 for three and \$400 for four.

The balloon ride is between 40 minutes and one hour, and after landing passengers are given a certificate of ascension from the Ocean Fantasy, a pin that is a facsimile of the balloon, a choice of wine or sparkling grape juice to use during a toast, a souvenir champagne glass and an 8-inch by 10-inch photograph of the Ocean Fantasy.

Wherever the balloon lands, the landowner receives a certificate.

Pop the corks

Four cases of alcohol-free champagne have been commissioned in honor of the Fifth Annual Springfield Oaks Balloon Festival.

The bottles bear labels printed by the St. Julian Wine Co. and contain fruit juice.

The dark green labels feature a large balloon surrounded by clouds. They read: 5th Annual Springfield Oaks Balloon Festival, and the dates of the event: July 14 and 15, 1990. A logo for Oakland County Parks is also included in the design.

The contents of the bottle is 100 percent pure juice with no sugar added.

The sweet-tasting, carbonated beverage tastes just like biting into a grape, according to St. Julian Manager John Menzor.

The four cases of sparkling, alcohol-free champagne will be uncorked during the event and offered to participants.

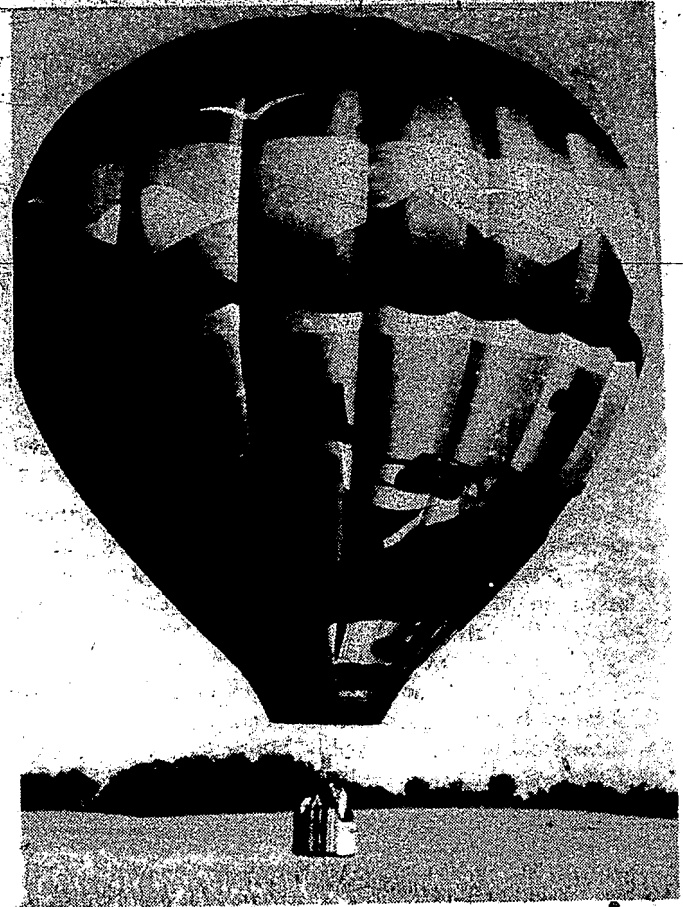

Take health precautions in hot, humid weather

When enjoying the festivities at the balloon festival this weekend, be alert to heat stress.

Temperatures above 90 degrees coupled with high humidity can be dangerous, especially to the elderly, says Sue Wells, area manager for Consumers Power Co., in a press release about heat stress.

"We want to warn people that excessive heat can place a strain on the heart and can even cause death," she says.

Even without a heat wave, if you feel hot and uncomfortable, you should take steps to avoid heat stress.

Signs include: dizziness, rapid heartbeat, diarrhea, nausea, throbbing headache, dry skin (no sweating), chest pain, great weakness, mental changes, breathing problems, vomiting and cramps. If you experience some of these early warning signs, seek medical help.

The best way to avoid heat stress is to keep cool. Spend as much time as you can in cooler surroundings such as your basement, an air-conditioned mall, movie theater, library or other public building.

If you have air conditioning, it can provide lifesav-

ing relief from heat stress, especially if you have heart disease. Even a fan, which draws cool air into your home at night and keeps the air circulating during the day, can help you keep cooler.

■ A cool bath or shower can provide some relief from the heat.

■ Your chances of getting sick in hot weather are increased by a weak or damaged heart, hypertension, problems with circulation, diabetes, a previous stroke, being overweight, infection or fever, alcoholic beverages and skin diseases or sunburn.

■ During hot weather, wear lightweight, light-colored, loose-fitting clothing. Wear something on your head when outdoors.

■ Don't wait until you're thirsty to drink. In hot weather your body needs more water, so drink often and in reasonable amounts. Avoid too much coffee or tea; water and fruit beverages are better.

■ Watch what you eat. Hot foods and heavy meals just add heat to your body. Don't take salt tablets or otherwise increase your potassium intake without your

doctor's permission.

■ Most of all, slow down and take it easy. Here in Michigan, the weather will get cooler sooner rather later, so you can put off that chore or golf game until temperatures drop.

Signs of heat stress

If you experience any of the following signs, seek medical attention:

Dizziness
Rapid heartbeat
Diarrhea
Nausea
Throbbing headache
Dry skin (no sweating)
Chest pain
Great weakness
Mental changes
Breathing problems
Vomiting and cramps

The Garden Patch

Natural controls keep the lid on pest populations

The next time you're tempted to complain about the number of flies hanging around your backdoor on a rainy summer day, consider this: if one pair of houseflies and all their offspring bred freely for five months and none died except from old age, you would have at the end of that time 191,010,000,000,000,000 flies.

That's enough flies to cover all the earth's continents to a depth of 47 feet.

Or look at the aphids on your rose bushes. If you begin with a single female aphid, in six months and 12 generations, you would have literally tons and tons of aphids.

Your backyard aphid problem doesn't look so bad now, does it?

The fact that we aren't buried in flies or aphids or beetles or any of thousands of other types of insects is a tribute to the natural controls that keep the lid on pest population explosions.

Michigan State University entomologist Gary Dunn explains that predators, parasites and pathogens — disease-causing organisms such as fungi and bacteria — help prevent these insects from reaching their maximum reproductive potential.

Other factors are food supply, shelter and space,

water and environment — light, temperature, humidity, etc.

"It's hard to say exactly what causes an insect outbreak," Dunn observes, "because so many things are involved."

"Probably no outbreak has a single cause, just as no one control over an insect population is totally responsible for keeping numbers down."

Unfortunately for gardeners, natural controls are rarely if ever 100 percent effective. And local pest populations may have to reach outbreak proportions before natural controls kick in.

On the other hand, natural controls are safe for non-target organisms and the environment, and they're economical.

"Most crop plants can tolerate low numbers of certain pests without suffering significant damage," Dunn points out. "If natural controls are keeping pest populations at tolerable levels, no other control measures are necessary."

When other controls are needed, pesticides are only one of the options available. Mechanical controls — hand picking using barriers around plants and trapping; cultural controls — controlling pests by rotating crops,

cultivating, removing crop residues and fallen fruits, etc.; and use of biological control agents — diseases of pests formulated as insecticides and natural enemies — may give satisfactory control without resorting to chemical pesticides.

When pesticides are necessary, choosing and using them carefully can preserve beneficial insects and natural enemies that prey on pest populations.

For instance, spraying cucumber and squash plants after sundown to control cucumber beetles will minimize the effect on honey bees visiting the cucurbit flowers.

Adding to the number of garden predators by releasing ladybird beetles or praying mantids, for instance, may not give the wished-for results.

"These insects are just as likely to leave the area as hang around," Dunn says.

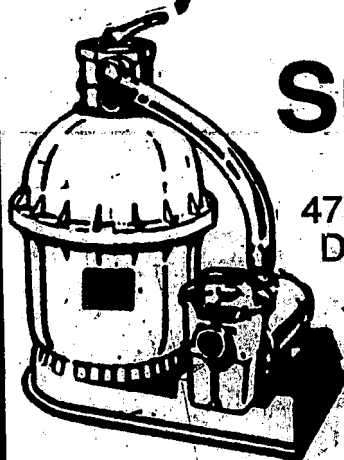
Putting up birdhouses and birdbaths and providing habitat for toads and snakes will encourage these insect eaters to frequent your yard and garden.

Of course, they will eat some beneficial insects as well as those you consider pests.

But, combined with other non-chemical control measures, they can help keep pest populations at tolerable levels.

SAW FACTS

The most common all-purpose saw for the homeowner is the crosscut saw. It comes in either 8 points, for rough cuts, or 10-11 points for finish cuts. The term "points" refers to the number of teeth per inch. Measure and mark wood to be cut carefully. Start the saw cut on the pull stroke by guiding it with the outside of your thumb. Cut at a 45° angle to the surface of the wood.

A handsaw cuts on the downstroke only: put pressure on the down stroke, cut on the waste side of the mark. Saw gently at the end of the cut and hold the piece being cut off to prevent splitting of wood.

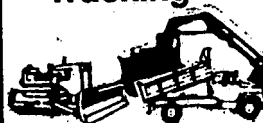

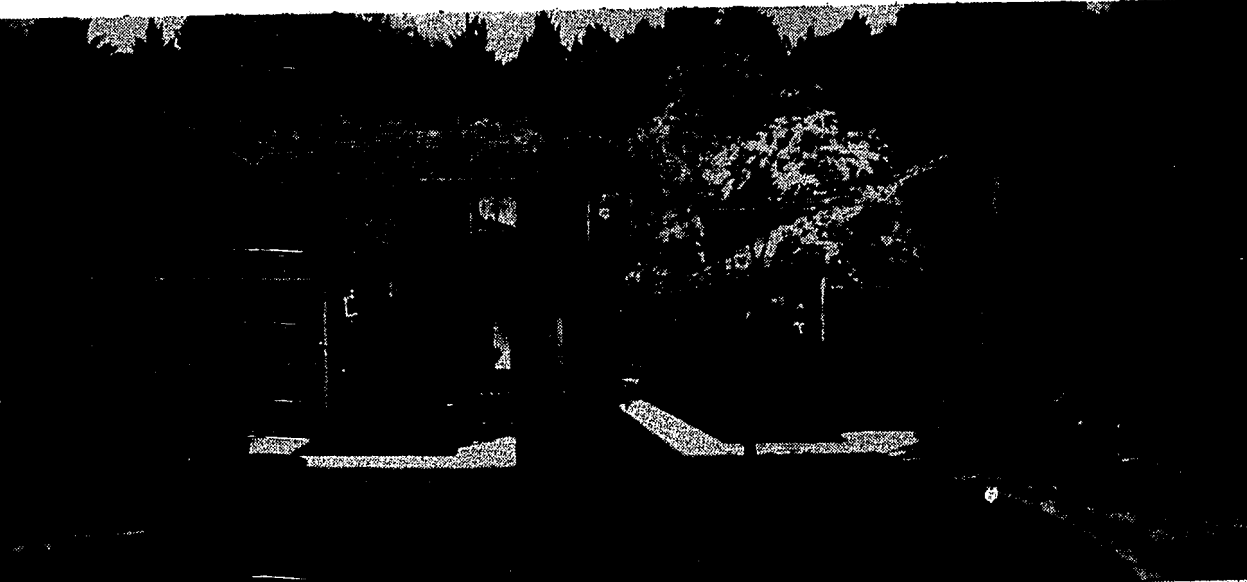

Michigan wines are becoming more popular, for drinking and for cooking.

To perk up the flavor of your next meal, try substituting a small amount of Michigan wine for a portion of the liquid.

During cooking, the alcohol will evaporate leaving only the subtle flavors of the wine.

One-dish meals, like Three Star Goulash, or Coq au Vin, will get you out of the kitchen in a hurry; or for company, try Grilled Lake Michigan Whitefish.

The following recipes are provided by the Michigan Department of Agriculture.

COQ AU VIN

Good Harbor Vineyards, Lake Leelanau

3 cups Good Harbor Foch, or Michigan dry red wine

6 bacon strips

4 tablespoons chopped onion

1 broiler/fryer chicken, cut into serving parts

10 small onions

1 cup sliced carrots

1 minced clove garlic

3 tablespoons garlic

1 pound fresh, sliced mushrooms

4 sprigs parsley

1 bay leaf

1/4 teaspoon dried thyme leaves

3 sprigs celery leaves

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. In a skillet brown bacon and chopped onion, then remove from pan.

Add chicken pieces and brown slowly in bacon grease. Remove chicken and add onions, carrots and garlic. Cook three to four minutes until tender.

Saute mushrooms in butter.

Make an herb packet of celery leaves, bay leaf, thyme and parsley by placing herbs in a tea ball.

Arrange chicken, vegetables, mushrooms and the herbs in a heavy 2-quart casserole.

Add wine to skillet, and heat while stirring to loosen any crusty pieces remaining in skillet. Pour hot mixture into casserole.

Cover and bake for 2 1/2 hours. Remove tea ball with herbs before serving.

Serve with Good Harbor Trillium, Calypso, Birch White or Riesling.

THREE-STAR GOULASH

L. Mawby Vineyards, Suttons Bay

Serves two

2 pounds ground veal

4 tablespoons butter

1 cup L. Mawby Turkey Red (or M. Foch) wine

4 stalks celery, diced

1/2 green pepper, diced

6 medium onions, chopped

12 whole cloves garlic

2 tablespoons dried basil flakes

2 tablespoons herbal salt

2 tablespoons onion powder

1 tablespoon fennel seed

2 quarts tomato puree

1 tablespoon dried parsley flakes

3 tablespoons chili powder

1 tablespoon cumin powder

2 to 3 cups elbow pasta

Fry veal in butter. Add wine, celery, green pepper, onion and garlic. Add parsley, basil, salt, onion powder and fennel seed. Simmer until liquid is absorbed.

Add puree, parsley, basil, salt, chili powder and cumin powder. Bring to a bubbling simmer. Add pasta and simmer for 20 minutes.

Serve with L. Mawby Turkey Red.

CARLSON'S GRILLED LAKE MICHIGAN WHITE-FISH

2 whitefish fillets, 1/2 to 3/4 pound each

1 large tomato

1 medium onion

1 green pepper

6 to 8 fresh mushrooms

1/4 cup Good Harbor Birch White Wine

1/2 fresh lemon

2 tablespoons butter

14-inch square of aluminum foil

Salt and pepper

Other seasonings, if desired

Slice tomato, green pepper, onion, lemon, butter and mushrooms approximately 1/4-inch-thick.

Place one fillet, skin down, on bottom of aluminum foil.

Turn up the edges to form a pan. Arrange sliced ingredients, covering the fillet. Add wine, salt and pepper.

Beware of caller posing as insurance employee

Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Michigan (BCBSM) is advising subscribers and physicians to beware of telephone callers who pose as a BCBSM employee and ask for personal information that can be used in fraudulent schemes.

The caller asks subscribers to provide social security, checking account and driver's license numbers over the telephone and says they are needed for the subscriber or physician to receive a refund.

Anyone receiving such a call should get the name and number of the caller, hang up and then contact BCBSM, said Greg Anderson, director of the BCBSM anti-fraud unit.

Personal information should rarely be given over the telephone because that information can be used in credit card fraud or other unlawful activities, he said.

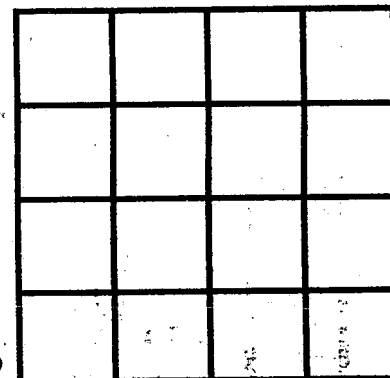

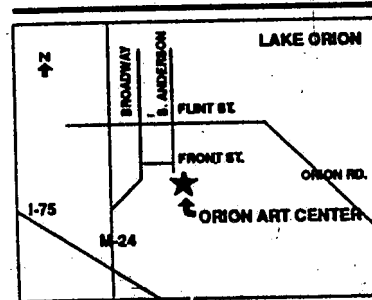

Get the 'berry' best from strawberries

Michigan's scrumptious crop of home-grown strawberries has already arrived.

"Since they are very perishable, immediate proper refrigeration is needed to keep them from deteriorating," says Sylvia Treitman, home economist of the Oakland County Cooperative Extension Service.

If you are adventurous and decide to go to a "pick your own" strawberry patch, come prepared with some flat pans to transport them home in the car or better yet a large cooler. A very hot day could destroy those ripe, juicy berries if you have a long trip home.

If your enthusiasm has resulted in more berries than you can consume, then Treitman suggests freezing some or making up some delicious homemade jam. Strawberries can be frozen for later use in freezer jam. Here are a few simple tips to care for your berries to help them last as long as possible:

■ Store *unwashed* berries in their original basket (if it has holes) or transfer to a tray lined with paper towel

(arrange berries one layer deep) then cover lightly with paper; place in refrigerator immediately.

■ Wash *just* before using and leave caps on.

■ Do not select pale berries; they don't ripen after picking.

■ To freeze, choose ripe, firm fruit and either freeze in sugar or unsweetened.

■ Check refrigerator occasionally for very ripe fruit and use it up first. The over-ripe fruit may encourage the spoilage of the rest of the fruit in the same container.

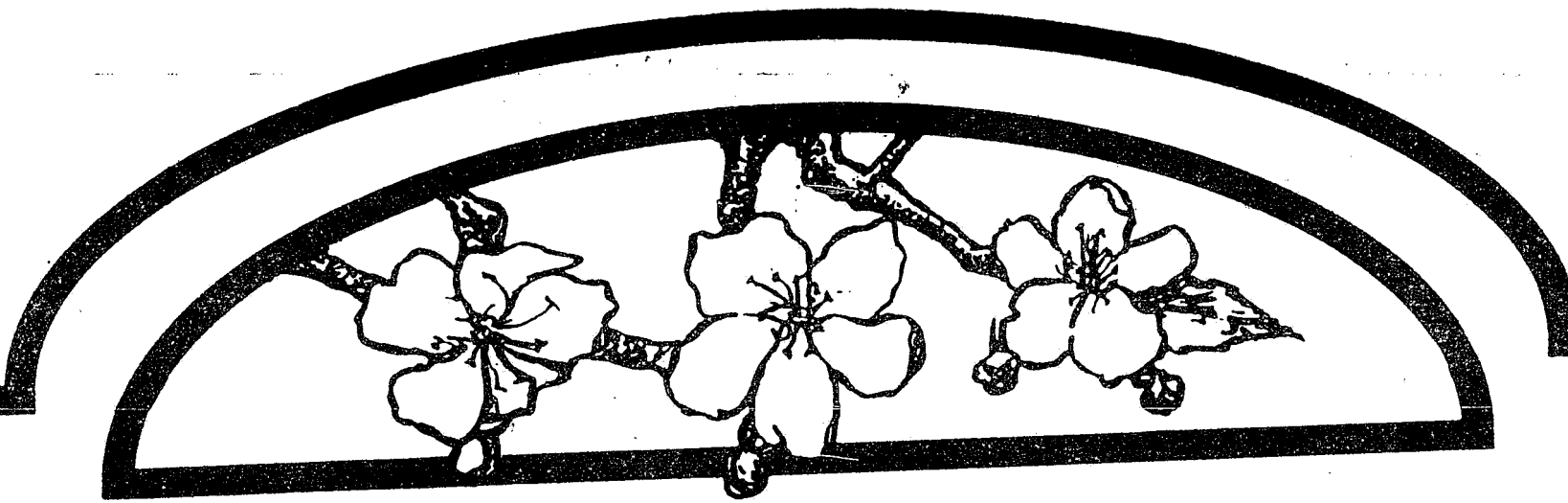

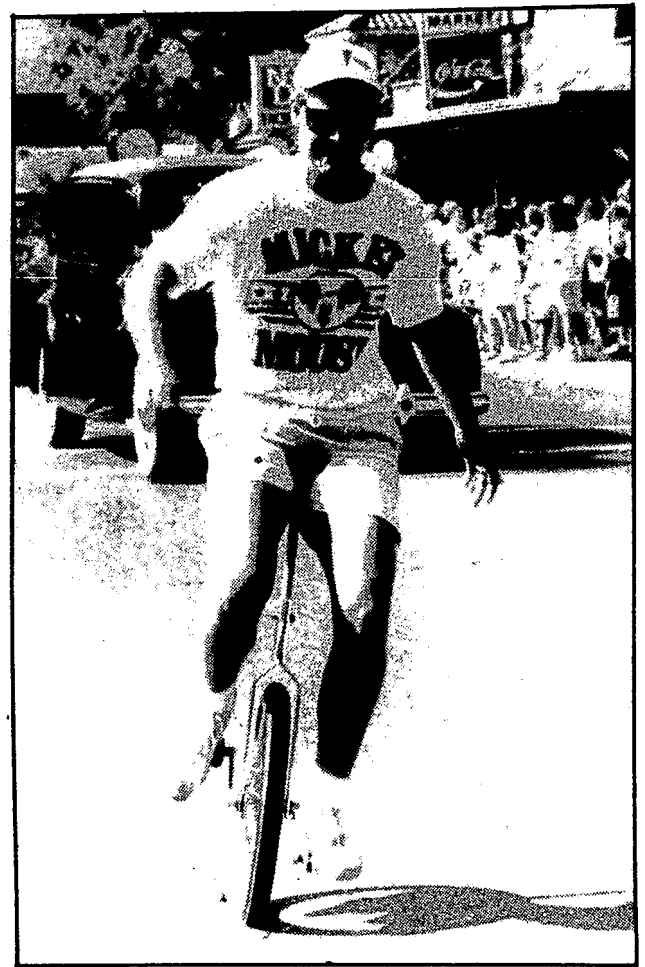

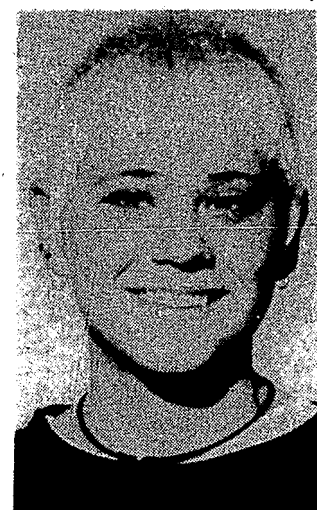

Paramus residents spread neighborliness to birds

Two Paramus Road neighbors combined efforts and saved the lives of two baby sparrows last week.

The rescue began July 4 when the birds fell from their nest in Judy Nichols' backyard birdhouse in Independence Township. The aging birdhouse was missing part of its floor.

Judy's son, Andy, 16, and his friend, Phil Guthrie, 15, spotted the birds and alerted Andy's mother, who quickly consulted her next-door neighbor, Marsha Karstensen.

Marsha had cared for one baby bird last year, so she was experienced in the matter. Plus, her son, Nick, who's nearly 10 years old, is kind of an expert when it comes to birds. He builds birdhouses and likes watching the avian creatures.

The Karstensen's agreed to care for the birds until they could find help.

"It's the maternal instinct," said Judy, laughing, referring to her neighbor's willingness to help.

As they learned last year, they kept the birds warm and fed them tiny bits of hamburger every hour (except at night). They did not give them water.

Last year, they called a nearby nature center, which provided the names of a few people who were licensed to care for birds. Fortunately, Marsha still had the phone numbers.

A call to a Union Lake resident was futile — the caregiver had already taken in 90-some birds this summer and had her hands full.

So Marsha called Peggy Dorrin of Madison Heights, who said she'd meet Marsha at the Oakland Mall to pick up the birds.

The Karstensen's were glad to give up their charges.

"When they say eat like a bird, they don't," said Marsha, shaking her head during one feeding session. The fledglings chirped as loud as full-grown birds and made the Karstensen kitchen sound like an aviary.

Bird-lover Peggy was happy to take over.

"They're doing OK," she said July 9. "One was a runt, and the other was a little bit bigger."

The larger bird already has 90 percent of its feathers, but the smaller one is still bare in spots, said Peggy.

"I think the runt has a bad leg, but that's OK as long as his wings are good," she said.

Since they're so young, Peggy will have to keep them with her at all times — even on an upcoming day trip to Grosse Ile. That way, she can still feed them every hour.

She uses minah bird food softened with water and

feeds them with sticks.

"They open their mouths for you," she said.

When they're older, she uses bits of fruit and worms or seeds, depending on the type of bird.

"They love grapes. Grapes satisfy all of them. I don't know why," she said.

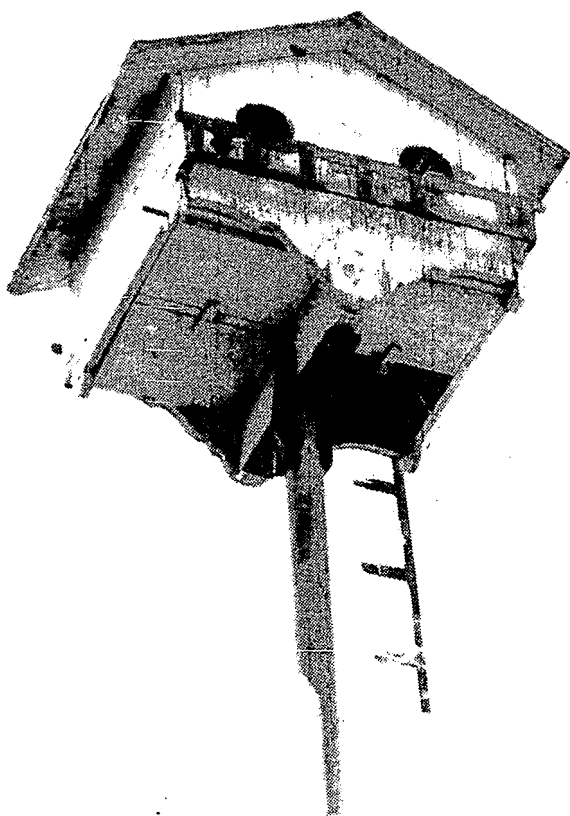

To anyone who saves a baby bird, Peggy recommends calling a nature center to find a caregiver licensed by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR). In the meantime, don't give baby birds water, she said.

"It's very important. They can drown," she said, explaining that the birds get enough moisture from the food.

Eventually, when the birds can feed on their own, (See RESCUERS, page 9C)

"In a week or two, when they look like they're doing well, I (will) open the door, and off they (will) go," she said, adding that sometimes a bird will return to her backyard.

Marsha became licensed to care for baby birds and baby squirrels after serving as a volunteer at Belle Isle, she said, adding that the Belle Isle program was recently cut due to lack of funds.

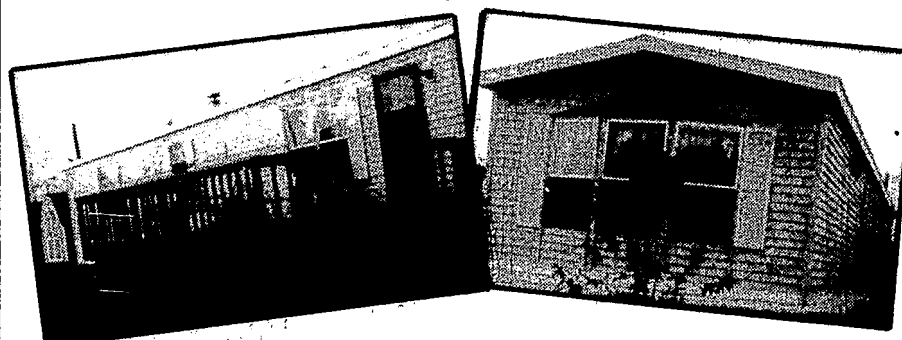

Rules help ensure boater safety

With increased use of inboard motor-driven water sleds on Michigan waters, Department of Natural Resources (DNR) marine officers urge users of these small-sized craft to observe all safe boating rules while operating on the state's waterways.

While motorized water sleds are involved in less than two percent of Michigan boating accidents, complaints of reckless or careless operation of these craft,

such as driving too fast or too close to swimmers and boaters, are numerous, according to the department.

"These are powerboats, not toys," says DNR Marine Safety Officer Jim Martindale. "And as such (they) must be registered, operated and equipped like any other Class A (under 16 feet) inboard motorboat; this includes compliance with all safe boating rules."

There are more than 14,000 motorized water sleds, classified and registered as "personal watercraft," in Michigan, according to state records.

Important rules for water sled users to observe include not operating these craft at night, keeping life jacket(s) aboard and operating at a safe speed and distance from boats, swimmers and shore, added Martindale.

In addition, Michigan law mandates that children under age 12 cannot operate these watercraft without adult supervision.

Youngsters between the ages of 12 and 16 must complete a Michigan-certified marine safety course to operate inboard water sleds without supervision.

DNR marine safety specialists offer the following basic safety tips for personal watercraft users:

- Wear a life jacket.
- Look around and behind you before turning your sled.
- Keep a safe distance from shore, swimmers, and other boaters.
- Don't operate a personal watercraft at night without running lights.
- Don't jump wakes close to the vessel producing the wake.
- Stay clear of boats towing a skier.
- Children should not ride personal watercraft.
- Know the marine rules of the road.
- Never operate any boat under the influence of alcohol or drugs.
- Obey all restricted speed zones.

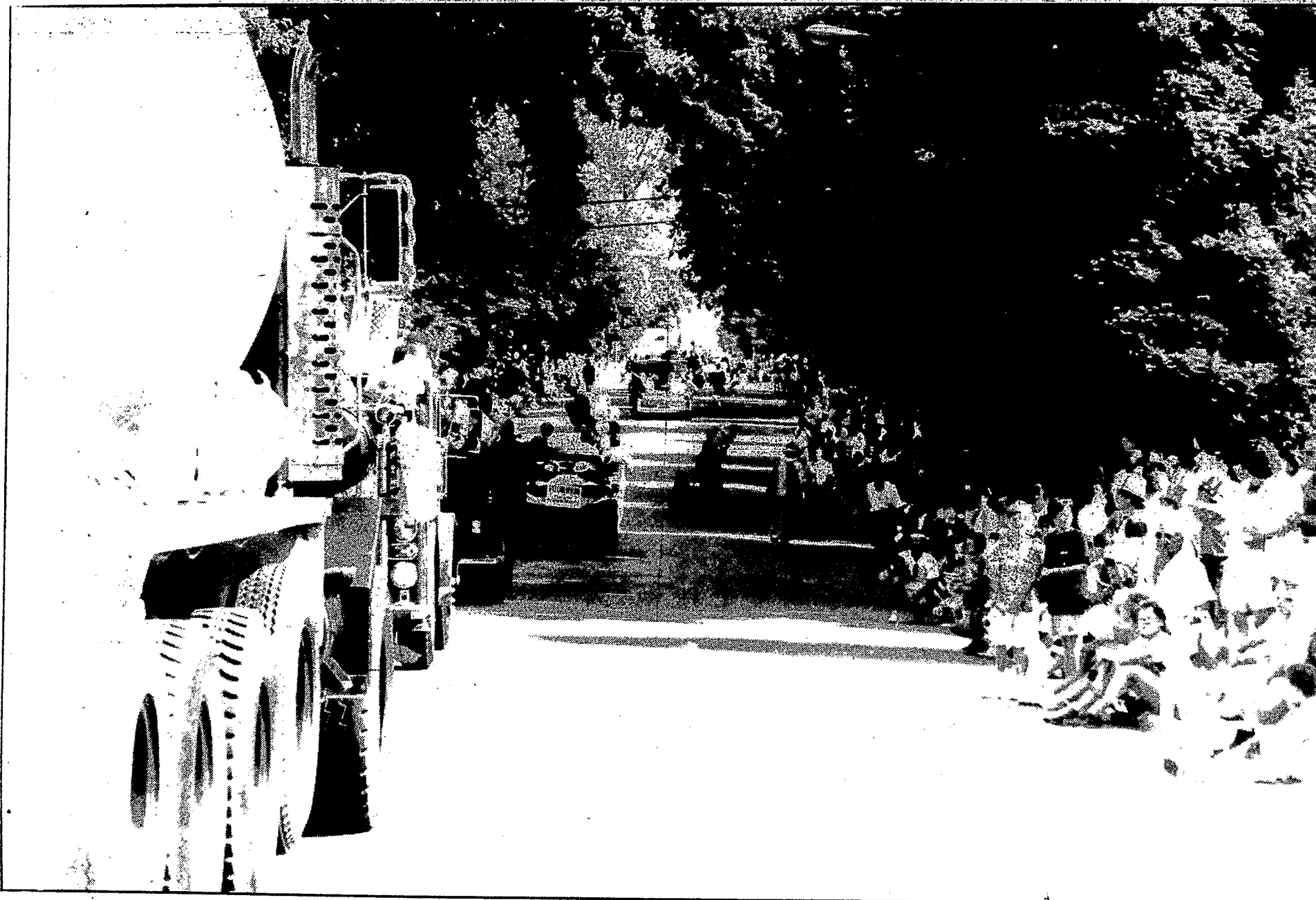
