



## *Clarkston in formula once again*

State aid legislation expected to be signed by Gov. Blanchard this week could result in another "in formula" year for Clarkston.

The legislation transfers about \$50 million in state money usually granted to richer districts and redistributes it to poor districts.

The move ensures \$90 per local mill of a district's operating millage — plus up to \$335 per pupil. One mill is \$1 for every \$1,000 assessed property valuation.

In Clarkston's case, that means an additional \$153.63 per student, or another \$85,000 to \$90,000, according to administration officials.

The legislation almost ensures that Clarkston will remain in formula for another year.

"I'd say there's a 99.9 percent chance that the district will stay in formula," said Business Services Director Steve Lenar.

"In formula" refers to the formula the state uses to (See CLARKSTON, next page)

All the profits from the about 20-piece band go to charities.

Popcorn, at 50 cents, and pretzels, at 25 cents, are to be sold by the Clarkston Area Optimists this Friday. The Optimists will also sell pop and orange drink for 50 cents a cup.

Officials from the Independence Township Library plan to take advantage of the town gathering and display a model of the upcoming library expansion from 4,000 square feet to about 20,000 square feet. A request for 3/4 mill for operations of the expanded library is on the Aug. 7 ballot. Three-fourths mill is 75 cents for every \$1,000 assessed property valuation. The last concert in the park features the Tailgate Ramblers Friday, July 27.

## Clarkston likely to stay in formula another year

(CLARKSTON, from previous page) determine contributions to local districts.

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The state determines what districts should spend per student — this year the figure is set at \$3,829. If a district is able to raise that amount or more through property taxes, the district is out-of-formula. If it cannot collect enough money on its own, it's considered in-formula.

In Clarkston, only \$3,676.07 per pupil is expected to be collected in local property taxes, so it's in-formula. Therefore, the state would contribute the additional \$153 per pupil.

Administration officials were not predicting -this type of revenue from the state and had earlier predicted the district would move out of formula.

At one point, in an effort to ensure that the district would be out-of-formula, the district was considering transferring fiscal management of community education to another district, according to Lenar.

The district was planning a consortium with South Lyon for operation of community ed. South Lyon, an informula district, would operate the program and would receive state funds for Clarkston's estimated 200 community education students. Clarkston, in turn, would access the community ed.

program, but its student enrollment would not figure in

the district's state aid formula. Given the new state aid legislation, changing fiscal management of community ed. would still result in Clark-

ston staying in-formula.

For that reason, Lenar predicts the administration will keep community ed. under the Clarkston umbrella.

Though becoming an out-of-formula district is considered desirous, staying in-formula isn't all bad, Lenar says.

When a district has just gone out-of-formula, they're not exactly "wealthy" yet, Lenar explained.

In addition, under the new legislation, the state can now keep money it used to donate to other programs


within districts, such as transportation, special education or gifted and talented programs.

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By cutting funds for those programs from outformula districts, the state has enough money to give more to in-formula districts.

Though the governor had not signed the legislation package by July 16, he is expected to do so, according to Lenar.

"It's an election year," Lenar said, simply.



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

## Legion Post's plan to sell 34 acres upsets residents

A warranty deed incorporated 36 years ago has put a residential association and Chief Pontiac American Legion Post 377 at odds over the Legion's attempt to sell 34 acres of heavily wooded property.

The Legion post is looking to sell 34 of 82 acres it owns east of Mary Sue Street near Lake Oakland in Independence Township. The Merrie Oaks Gardens Association is opposing such a transaction because association members want the land in question to remain undeveloped.

Legion Treasurer Charlie Yates said his organization intends to sell the property to Jim Long Real Estate once Independence Township approves of a land split.

The Merrie Oaks Gardens Association, made up of homes around the property in question, points to a warranty deed issued in 1954 that calls for the land remain in the post's possession eternally. The document indicates that an area resident, Mary E. McMahan, sold numerous acreage in that area to the Chief Pontiac Post Memorial Home for \$1.

In the deed, the word "forever" is written twice and in capital letters. However, due to its confusing legal



style, it is uncertain what the "forevers" pertain to in terms of legality.

Association members believe that the document was drawn up with the intent and purpose of saving the land from development. To the association, the word "forever" was instituted as a safety factor to keep the land in the Legion's possession eternally, free from developmental progress.

Association President Caroline Carson said she's been investigating deeds around this time period as well as the deed's author.



Carson added that the document will need an attorney's decipherization before the true intent is known for its issuance. She added that her association has been unable to get in contact with post officials to discuss the matter.

Yates shuns the validity of a warranty deed and the association's belief in it.

"They're' (the association) crazy," Yates said. "We paid cold, hard cash for that property in 1954."

When asked how much the Legion paid for the land 36 years ago, Yates answered, "a lot more than a dollar."

He also said the Legion has no intention of ever speaking to the Merrie Oaks Gardens Association about

the property. Association member Bill Sawyer said his organization's concerns lies with the environment and the detrimental damage that development could have on the area. "We all realize that progress will continue to occur

in the township, but it's a pity that it should be this land," Sawyer said. "The development of 34 acres could literally destroy tens of thousands of trees."

Sawyer said the area in question is inhabited by several animal and plant species uncommon to this part of the state. He cited species such as the Box Turtle, Red Squirrels, Jack and White Pine trees, and the Scarlett Tangiers, a rare bird.

"We have no animosity toward the Legion," Sawyer added. "We're just looking to preserve the area."

## New business OK'd for industrial park

Valentine Industrial Park on Andersonville Road continues to expand with new businesses.

Davisburg Sand and Gravel will occupy lots 16 and 17 at the industrial park after receiving unanimous site plan approval from the Springfield Township Board July

The business was originally approved to have a stockade, or wooden-type fence, but the board voted unanimously to approve the site plan with chain-link fencing after some discussion.

Supervisor Collin Walls was in the minority after voicing concern that the chain-link fence would not provide enough screening of the trucks that will be parked outside of the 9,000-square-foot building, he said.

Grant Ward of Grant Ward Surveyors in Springfield said that the trees in the area providing screening are of the Locust and Poplar variety growing to 25 feet in height. "They will provide good screening," Ward said.

The owner doesn't want the maintenance and upkeep a stockade fence would require, Ward said.

Springfield gives \$500 to Holly recycling effort

The Springfield Township Board voted unanimously to give the Village of Holly \$500 to help with costs of the village's recycling effort.

Holly President Ardath Regan appeared before the Springfield Township Board July 12 to ask for financial support of Holly's recycling center.

"We don't expect you to be Santa Claus, but you can't expect the Village of Holly taxpayer to be either," Regan said.

In a letter to Supervisor Collin Walls, Regan said about 70 percent of the people using the recycling center come from Holly Township, Springfield Township, Groveland Township and Rose Township.

One of the largest costs of the recycling center is the transportation of newspaper to a reprocessing center.


Roll-off containers are increasing in costs. A roll-off container that costs \$150 per 40 cubic yard at the beginning of 1990 now costs \$200.

"We are asking for some money," Regan said. "We are bound by labor costs, and they are not static."



## Bricklayers shatter world record with 1,870 bricks

Some Oakland County men might make it into the Guinness Book of World Records, and they won't have to run through a brick wall to do it.

Instead, they recently laid the most amount of bricks in one hour while building an addition to the Clarkston Golf Course clubhouse.

On July 10 between 2:05 p.m. and 3:05 p.m., the bricklayers laid 1,870 bricks, shattering the old record of 1,420 in Chicago earlier this year.

If the record still stands by January, it will be printed in the Guinness book. Until that time, other bricklayers may try to break the record. But if that happens, the Oakland County men say they'll be up to the task.

"I'm going to lay 2,500 bricks some day," said an optimistic Roy Rouse, a Clarkston resident who owns Design Masonry, doubling as a laborer and co-sponsor on the project.

Other sponsors were Paul and Jean Frechette (owners of the Clarkston Golf Course), Midwest General Contracting and U.S. Bricklayers of America.


As according to the rules, five workers were allowed

to lay the bricks while three others helped transport the bricks, mix the mortar, etc.

Along with Roy Rouse, other men who worked on the wall were George Davis, Randy Jones and Jim Barnowski of Lake Orion, Randy Rouse of Utica, and Bruce Marsh, John Grossman and Irvin Lane of Pontiac.

The entire hour of work on the wall was videotaped for verification. The tape will be sent to Guinness.

If the local bricklayers make the record book, their feat will be available in print January of 1992. Guinness publishes its famous book every five years.

I, too, oppose the expansion as detrimental to residential values and the historic district.

As it was, supporters' statements, cited by The Clarkston News, have no bearing on the purpose of the zoning ordinance which designates the area as residential.

Of two supporters: neither of whom lives in the village, one noted the Goyettes' thoughtful treatment of death. This is not in question. The other stated that ordinances made by humans can be changed by humans — and invitation to spot zoning, or no zoning at all.

It was also noted that "we all need to bend the rules." The fact is the rules have been bent considerably. The purpose of the ordinance was to ensure the preservation and advancement of residential values. Fencing to screen a business activity, a brightly lighted parking area and the noise and fumes of incoming and outgoing traffic do no do this.

Further, granting an exception to the ordinance now would open the door to other businesses, specifically the gas station across the street.

As enacted in 1973, the zoning ordinance accepted the continuance of then existing businesses. It did not, however, allow them to expand physically. It did provide time, in this case 17 years, to plan expansion by an orderly move to a designated commercial area. The Goyettes chose to stay at their present location, and by doing so elected to continue with the existing space and structure. Jerry Wilford

The small-store owner has some advantages with individual attention (dealing direct where the buck stops), knowing customers names, having product knowledge rather than self-serve, no-helpin-sight, giant stores and perhaps being able to 'deal.' When K mart came to Lake Orion, the term used today for such an invasion would have applied. They're called "Killer Stores."

The scenario of today's Killer Stores is a little

Back to Michigan. Whether it be the discount malls in Birch Run or the one planned in Aubum Hills, or Walmart, or Meijer there is nothing but trouble for the small retailer. Neil Coulter says if he had to do it over again, he'd go into auctioneering full time, which he's doing part time now.

So what's to happen to the small-town, downtown stores? I was on the Oxford Planning Commission for 10 years in 1960-70. Profession planners told us then, and it's true today, town storefronts would be specialty stores or service and office spaces.

And, that 20-ft speciality storefront owner/ operator better work hard, have a great personality, know business, hate sleep, not want to die rich, be alert to trends and products and have a very loving family which also has all the above.

Owning your own store is still an American dream for many and some will make it, but 80 percent don't. The Killer Stores are one reason.


The Independence Township Library is currently undergoing an exciting expansion process that is being financed through the voter's support of the bond issue request on the ballot of November 1988.



2. Students are not property educated for today's job market or college admission.

3. Educators say they do not have adequate funds to properly educate the students.

Solutions:

1. Tax payers agree to change the state constitution to increase the sales tax from four percent to five percent.

2. Taxpayers agree to change the state constitution to allow another income bracket. All AGI up to \$30,000 be taxed at the current rate of 4.6 percent. All AGI over \$30,000 be taxes at the rate of 4.8 percent.

3. Property taxes be capped at 30 percent of market value with increases limited to the rate of inflation.

4. Results of the above changes would be deposited in the Education Fund. A mandatory 32 percent of state revenue would go to the Education Fund. *Considerations:* 

1. School district boundaries would be redrawn. There would be a total of 12 to 15 school districts in the state. The superintendent and board would be held accountable for the education of the students and the administration of the funds for their district. Failure would result in immediate release with no severance pay, regardless of contract.

2. Budgets would be established, limiting the percent of total revenue that could be spent on administration, including all fringe benefits, and instruction, including all fringe benefits.

3. All districts' must offer quality instruction in computers, science and foreign language starting in elementary education.

4. No state funds may be spent on debt payments or capital improvements.

5. Taxpayers would be charged with their full support of the educational system. They must assist students with homework. They must teach and assist students in the proper use of libraries and other instructional aids. Failure would result in no recourse if a student is not promoted or is expelled for failure to complete an assignment.

6. Establish CORE, Coalition Of Responsible Education. CORE would be the citizens watchdog to see that the programs were properly carried out.

7. The top five CPA firms in the state would audit the financial records of the state annually, on a rotating basis, as a public service to the taxpayers of Michigan They would report to CORE.




A Steinway piano will be placed on a deck at the house, and the audience will be seated on the lawn.



## Planners say yes to new Clarkston Road church

A new church may be coming to the southeastern corner of Clarkston and Pine Knob roads, Independence Township.

The First Congregation Church received special land use and conceptual site plan approval from the Independence Township Planning Commission.

The planning commission voted 6-1 July 12 to grant special land use, with Bruce Mercado voting in opposition. Mercado didn't feel comfortable with approving special land use because it was uncertain how much of the 14-acre property would be covered on the township's tax roll, he said.

Voting yes were Chairperson Brent Bair, Joseph Figa, Jo Fussman, Richard Oppmann, Steve Secatch and Daniel Travis.

Special land use permission is required for churches in Independence Township.

Later in the meeting, the commission unanimously granted conceptual site plan approval, with the following conditions: possibly shifting the location of the parking lot, increasing landscaping, reviewing site drainage and including a safety path.

The church, founded in 1831, is currently located in Pontiac. The Rev. Larry Rieck said he would like to move to Independence Township because a majority of his 350plus congregation lives in the immediate area.

According to architectural plans, the church would

be 7,200 square feet and cost \$800,000 to erect. An acceleration lane will also pass in front of the building on Clarkston Road.

Two area residents voiced concerns about the proj-

"I really can't express my disappointment in what's ect going up on this property," said Jim Brennan, whose residence will be located directly across the street from the proposed church. "We were originally supposed to have a nice site condo project on this land, but now we

"It's going to be interesting to see who is the loudest ... the church or Pine Knob," he added.

Brennan also brought up the concern of his area's poor drainage and how the church could affect it.

Resident Barbara Paci of Caberfae Trail said she and her neighbors welcome the building of a church. But she was concerned about the location of the parking lot and possible teen drinking in it, due to its proximity to the Pine Knob Music Theater.

Rieck added that security gates could be implemented to discourage concert-goers from parking in the church's lot.





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





Bugs may chew on your sweet corn, make lace out of your bean leaves and drill holes in your peppers. Diseases may wilt your squash and strip the leaves from your tomatoes. The biggest problem in home gardens, however, is neither diseases nor insects — it's weeds.

"More first-time gardeners probably give up because of weeds than for any other reason," says Lee

The first year of a garden is usually the worst, he points out, because tilling the soil for the first time stirs up vast numbers of weed seeds that had been lying dormant until conditions were right for germination.

Bring them up close to the soil surface, water and fertilize them; and they're going to grow.

The first step in effective weed control is planting a garden in a weed-free area, Taylor says.

This means removing sod or killing grass the year before you convert a patch of lawn into garden, so the grass doesn't spend the summer trying to make a comeback.

It also means tilling the various portions of the garden just before you plant, so your crops have at least an even chance against weed seedlings.

An important strategy in weed control is eliminating weeds while they're small.

"You can very easily cut weed seedlings off with a hoe," Taylor points out. "As they get bigger, it requires more and more time and effort to control them."

Weeds often get out of hand because gardeners overestimate the amount of garden they can care for with the time, equipment and labor available.

"The larger your garden is, the greater the chance that the weeds will get ahead of you," Taylor says.

He is a strong advocate of mulching to control annual weeds, those that come up from seed, mature, produce seeds and die in one season.

Mulching with black plastic, straw, ground corncobs, several layers of newspaper or a number of other materials stops weed growth by cutting off sunlight to weed seedlings.

Perennial weeds — those that grow from underground parts each (year, are a tougher problem, one that you should deal with before you start your garden.

The only long-term solution to quackgrass and other problem perennials is removing or killing the underground parts, usually with herbicides.

And that's hard to do if the weeds are mixed in with your crop plants.

Gardeners often lose their enthusiasm for weed control as the season progresses and crops are harvested. Taylor urges continued vigilance, however.

"Every weed you let mature and go to seed means dozens or hundreds of weeds next year," he points out.

"Every weed you prevent from going to seed this year means fewer weeds to fight in next year's garden."






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## Planners grant Frank's final OK


Frank's Nursery, scheduled for White Lake Commons, received final site approval from the Independence Township Planning Commission July 12.



## Food drives help fill depleted pantry at Lighthouse

Summer usually is a difficult time for groups who try to help the needy, but a few groups are jumping in with contributions this year.

"People forget about food in the summer," said Sherry Kaars, director of the new Lighthouse North, Maybee Road, Independence Township.

Churches are real busy with summer programs. Normally they would do food drives for us," she said, mentioning that lots of food is donated near holidays.



The leagues were started about 11 years ago, and a few of the Dozers have been playing for that entire time span. Pitcher Ken Clair, 75, and second baseman Sally Miller, 69, are both 11-year veterans.

Baseball is timeless, but Miller said some things do change as the years go by.

"When you're running, the bases look a mile away," said Miller.

Other members of the current Dozer squad are

outfielder Rose Evarts, 55; shortstop Harry Fahrner, 60; catcher Carlene Constable, third baseman Jay Bailey, 64; rover Webb Gemmel, 66; outfielder Alice Gemmel, 60; outfielder Dick Balmer, 75; utility player Fred Beedle, 66; first baseman Carol Mann, 50; outfielder Les Fant, first baseman-outfielder Larry Derycke, 70.

Mann is the youngster of the team. The minimum age requirement in the league is 50.

Tom Kage is the manager, with Cindy Assemany sometimes filling in as the interim skipper. Bob Campbell is the team's scorekeeper and base coach.

The Dozers play under Amateur Softball Association co-ed rules, with a few exceptions. There are two side-by-side first bases, one for the first baseman to make a force out and another for the batter to touch. This helps avoid entanglements on close plays.

Another feature that helps avoid injuries at home plate is a hash mark exactly between third and home. If a baserunner makes it past the hash mark before the catcher has the ball, the runner is automatically safe. On the other hand, if the catcher has the ball first and then the runner goes past the hash mark, the runner is automatically out.

Eleven players are allowed on the field defensively, with a maximum of six men and five women. Teams also have a continual batting order. If there are 14 players on the team, all 14 bat.

After the games, the home team hosts the visitors for post-game snacks and chatter. The Dozers play their games on Wednesdays, with home games at Clintonwood Park.

The Dozers, who are 3-1 in the league as of July, compete against the Waterford Jets, Pontiac Grand Slammers, Clinton Raiders and the Oak Park Ramblers. There is a year-end tournament and a game pitting the league

winner against an all-star team made up of the other four teams.

The Dozers practice twice a week. Interim coach Assemany said the players run slower than their younger counterparts, and some players have some vision problems when catching long fly balls.


But the batters can still smack the ball, and it is more fun to win than lose.


Most of the players also feel like winners by just participating. Second baseman Miller said one time when she hadn't played for awhile, her blood pressure began to

## Helping others, learning top her list of priorities

Ann Williams has spent the 69 years of her life doing things her own way.

When war broke out in the early 1940s she joined the U.S. Army, working as a surgical technician to wring out used bandages.

"I couldn't do that now," she says. "I was young; the war didn't seem real."

When she wanted to pursue her education after the war, she divorced a husband who stood in her way - a step unheard of in her family and her community.

"I lost a lot (of family and friends)," she recalls. "I had to move to the other side of town. (But) my brain was just lying there dead."

Now, Ann Williams is knee-deep into another endeavor --- helping people. And, as she has throughout her lifetime, she pursues it with a vengeance.

A servant person

Tall, dark and slender, Ann strolls through her cool,

#### dark Independence Township living room displaying her treasures.

She stops at a wall displaying the symbol of her latest efforts --- a framed certificate awarded to her after she became ordained as a deacon.

Ann's interest in the church was sharpened in 1977, the year her son died.

"My whole life stopped," she says, quietly. "I became a non-person. So I went back to church."

Ann eventually became an active member of St. John Episcopal Evangelical Church in Holly.

"I realized the calling and wanted to be ordained," Ann says. "I wanted to be a priest at first, and then I realized I wanted to be a deacon."

The Episcopal Church recognizes the Diaconate as a servant ministry requiring ordination, a three-year process.

"The Diaconate is a servant ministry," Ann explains.

"I've always been a kind of servant person."

#### Lighting up the Lighthouse

Likely one of Ann's biggest projects as a "servant person" has been assisting Lighthouse North Caregivers, a facility opening on Maybee Road, Independence Township, to help needy people in North Oakland County.

Ann started at Lighthouse 10 years ago, almost against her own will.

'I wanted to be a chaplain at Pontiac General," she explains. "They told me I had to be ordained, which I knew, but I thought if I pursued it ... They told me I couldn't and suggested Lighthouse.

"I was so crushed, I said no," she recalls. "I thought it was a come down."

After praying over her decision, she decided work at Lighthouse would achieve her need to serve. She joined Lighthouse as a volunteer in 1980.

Early on, Ann brought up the idea of a local Lighthouse branch, but no action was taken. Later, at an annual

Lighthouse breakfast, she was seated next to two ladies responsible for opening the new Lighthouse North Caregivers in the Clarkston area.

When she heard the news, Ann says, she leaped up and "practically leaped down their throats, saying Don't you know that's my idea?"

Today, Ann is helping to lay the foundation for the new operation. She has worked as a primary caregiver, visiting shut-ins, transporting the needy to stores or doctors and providing respite care.

The need is a great one, Ann says.

"People up here are isolated and scattered," she says. "They're very invisible, but they have dire needs in a different way."

Ann is arranging a birthday card service for Lighthouse and regularly accommodates the transportation and visitation needs of two women, one of them blind.

The work is often draining, but Ann pushes forward.

"I'm a senior myself now, and sometimes I think 'I'm tired too,'" Ann admits. "But the greatest satisfaction comes from the worst moments.

"I feel happiness and joy when I'm serving Christ," she adds.


A thirst for knowledge

"People ask why I'm doing this," Ann adds. "I think they think I'm going for a big position, which I'm not.


"I'm serving God in the way I think he wants me to," she says.

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## Caregivers North provides link to independence

Elderly and handicapped who can't live completely alone yet don't want to go to an institution can receive a little help from a new program in the area.

Based in Independence Township, Lighthouse North Caregivers provides a bridge to independence for the elderly and handicapped of North Oakland County, said coordinator Sally Swayne.

These are people who are independent but just can't quite get to the store or shovel the sidewalk or get the lawn mowed or pay the taxes," said Swayne.

Open since March on Maybee Road, Caregivers North services range from friendly visitation and companionship to transportation and light housework, said Swayne.

Caregivers volunteers have built wheel chair ramps and fixed leaky faucets. Younger volunteers have helped compile a scrapbook for an elderly resident.

Plus, Caregivers can help out financially if a person is in a bind. For instance, occasionally, a person can't pay for a prescription, said Swayne. Caregivers can arrange to pay it that one time, or if the person meets eligibility requirements, he or she can be referred to an agency that will pay it continuously.

Along the same line, sometimes a resident will need semi-skilled nursing care - for a short time or longer term. Caregivers can point a person in the right direction for help in that area, too, said Swayne.

Caregivers volunteers may also help the family of

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the elderly or handicapped --- by providing short-term care, so the primary caregivers can get a respite.

Caregivers is beneficial to the elderly and handicapped, but the volunteers --- some senior citizens them-

selves - also benefit, said Swayne.

For instance, a child without grandparents in the area might enjoy working on a scrapbook or genealogy project.

And an avid reader may want to provide a library service of sorts - checking out books and delivering them regularly to those confined to their homes.

Or maybe a mother and daughter --- or a father and son — would like to work together on a project. A senior citizen who needs a garden planted or light chores performed would provide an ideal opportunity, said Swayne, who is brimming with ideas.

This intergenerational thing is a touch between the generations that is important not to lose," said Swayne.

We need volunteers who will just spend time," she said. "It sounds so simple, but it's someone they know


they can depend on to do these things." So far, the response from community members has been great, said Swayne, mentioning in particular businesses and churches. However, more volunteers are needed.






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

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# 83-year-old pushes volunteerism to new heights



He also dedicates 10-40 hours per week as the director of the Daytime Ministry, visiting sick members and conducting daytime worship service for seniors. Ted has held this position since 1970.

Besides the church, Spuehler serves as an auxiliary member and service chairperson for the cardiac care unit at St. Joseph Mercy Hospital. As chairperson, Spuehler coordinates and trains volunteers who assist patients and their families.

St. Joseph Mercy Hospital thought so much of Spuehler's efforts that they nominated him for a senior citizen service award. In May, Spuehler was honored by the Detroit Metropolitan Heritage Club with a "Golden

Oldie" award for his community work. He was one of 13 recipients at the awards banquet, which recognized the accomplishments of people 80 years of age and older.

Since April, Spuehler has also been working as a peer counselor with the Independence Township-based Lighthouse North. The program offers various services to people who have difficulty of obtaining the basic necessities of life such as food, clothing and shelter.

"Lighthouse North is tremendous because they offers various services to everyone in need, despite their age," he said.


When asked how he'd like to be remembered by those he touched, Spuehler listed several traits.

If charity begins at home, it radiates from the home of Sue Howard on Ball Street in Ortonville.

Growing up in Ohio as the oldest of five children helped her accept responsibility — and that includes a responsibility to help others in need, she said.

Sue, 59, a free-lance artist, is a member of Ortonville Community Emergency Fund (OCEF) and CROP Walk for Hunger. Plus, she works with others in need.

Sue noted that some of the funds from OCEF are donated to Lighthouse North on Maybee Road in Independence Township. Lighthouse has recently begun providing various services to North Oakland County.

In January Sue plans to travel to Mexico to check the progression of the renovations following the earthquake in the mid-1980s.

"I can tell everyone where the money went," Sue said.

Sue has also cared for others: at different times she has cared for her mother and elderly friends.

"People don't realize that a card or a phone call can brighten a day," she said. "It takes so little time to do all these little things."

One person she has enjoyed helping for three years is Bill Davis, 44, of Ortonville.

Bill is a diabetic who needs someone to care for him on a regular basis, Sue said.

She met him through a friend, and when the friend

went back to work Sue took over.

Diabetes can affect many parts of the body, and Bill is no exception. He had a leg amputated and has two toes on his remaining foot. At one time, he was on kidney dialysis, but he has since had a kidney transplant.

Bill is divorced, and his family doesn't live near. So Sue helps with day-to-day things.

Once Bill had a cast on his leg for about three months, and Sue visited him each day to help wash and massage his foot because he had poor circulation, she

#### said.

Despite his disabilities, Bill remains active, which is inspirational, said Sue. He serves as a library board member in Ortonville and is responsible for handicap signs in the area, she said.

"Meeting someone like Bill is worth the effort," Sue said, mentioning that he often writes to politicians on various issues.

"He even wrote to Donald Trump and sent him his extra coupons," she said, laughing.

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# Stairs, work good for seniors; cigarettes, fat bad

Leo Wischman, 81, of Dixie Highway, Independence Township, submitted the following column because he thought it might be useful to other seniors.

After interviewing Dr. Charles Wischman and getting caught up in his enthusiasm for exercise, you feel like a traitor when you drive home instead of walking.

"You have a fantastic body, a wonderful machine if you treat it nicely. But it has got to be pushed. There is no standing still; you are either going forward or backward," he said.

Wischman, who has spent 20 years with Group Health Cooperative and is chief of staff at the organization's Olive Way clinic, said his specialty is internal medicine, "but the average age of my patients is 70, so I'm a gerontologist."

"I love working with older people. They are pioneers, they are wise, and if I can sell them (an idea or proposition), I know I'm right."

He said "walking is the best" exercise, but weightlifting is great, too. Not necessarily heavy weights. A lady should be able to do this (he flexed his arm) holding a 5pound weight, do it several times and gradually increase the number. I work with weights three times a week."

Stretching is a must, Wischman said, and doing so in a swimming pool is particularly good. He stood up, put one foot against a wall and pushed on his knee with both hands. "Do this, like you see runners do. Keep the one (the lower) leg straight.'

The stretch will prevent leg cramps. He suggested that all stretching be done easily at first. He moved into a squat position and said that also is helpful. Exercise and stretch all parts of the body, he stressed.

Wischman is not very fond of the average American diet. He said this country has a surplus of corn with which to feed cattle, and we produce steaks marbled with fat.

Instead of eating that, people should eat lots of roughage lightly cooked in vegetable oil.

He said Africans eat very little meat but consume considerable roughage, "and they have three or four bowel movements a day, which is good, but no hemorrhoids or colon cancer. Move them into the big cities, and they begin to die with the same problems we have."

Wischman said he eats fish "about seven days a week" and drinks lots of water. "Cigarettes are death, and fat is death."

I told him that, like many people our age, my wife, Harriette, and I are tired of stairs and are moving into a smaller home all on one floor. I asked what he would suggest. He laughed and said, "Find some stairs to climb. Get a broom and sweep the streets --- that's what older people in Europe do. Find some people who need help and help them.'

He added that he urges older people to join groups that exercise together, and he would like to see them do more weightlifting. He is trying to persuade some of the downtown health clubs to let seniors use their facilities during off hours.


Wischman, in his early 50s, was born in Detroit, where his father, at age 80, still works in construction. The physician was reared on a farm and later was a carpenter before entering medicine. He is a graduate of the University of Michigan Medical School. He thinks education should never end, and said he would like to learn welding and take some courses in repairing small engines. He thinks closing some of Seattle's high schools was a mistake and that they could be used for educating older people.

Wischman said he recently injured his right shoulder in a skiing accident, but because he is in excellent physical shape he is rapidly recovering the movements of his arm. He said older people should get into better Wed physical condition because if they are hurt in a fall or an automobile accident, they will recover faster.

Preisman suggests. "There are a variety of investment possibilities, with





# Local comedy trio performs to worldwide audience

The Quiddlers appear onstage in coal miner costumes — tiny jeans, plaid shirts, work boots and lighted hats.

The faces belong to Gary Lewis of Clarkston, Rick Altman of Troy and Paul Ebejer of West Bloomfield. The bodies, comically created to look like squashed midgets, wordlessly perform in skits now known to audiences worldwide.

The acts are short — about five minutes — and are completely choreographed. For all their seeming simplicity, however, the acts have created a sudden sensation.

Throughout the past year, the three young performers and their tiny characters have been invited to perform in Tokyo, Rome and Paris.

The Quiddlers have appeared on Puttin' on the Hits, a syndicated television program filmed in Los Angeles, and on the Muscular Dystrophy Telethon, seen worldwide from Las Vegas.

The trio was recently selected to perform in The Montreal Comedy Festival held this July, and, next fall, may appear in National Basketball Association game half-times.

The three performers, all graduates of Oakland University, Rochester, say the recognition was hard to believe, at first. right," recalls Ebejer. "It took us over five years to figure it out — the industry needs acts like that, about three minutes long."

The young comedians began their careers in 1985, at a cable television station where Lewis was employed.

"The cable show needed material, and Paul brought his costumes out," Lewis explains. The costumes had been created by Ebejer when he was in high school.


"We brought them out of the closet and onto videotape," Lewis adds.

different television formats across the world. "Europe has a different type of audience," Ebejer says. "They still like to see variety-type shows."

The international exposure poses a different challenge to the performers, however, as they attempt to make an act understood in a variety of cultures.

Food stylists use kale for garnish; many people don't know how to cook it or have even tried it, but people in the South love it. The latest news is that kale is loaded with usable calcium.

According to a study reported in the July 1990 issue of "Tuffs University Diet and Nutrition Letter," women who ate cooked kale "absorbed as much calcium as they did when they were given milk, and some absorbed even more."

Spinach also contains a good amount of calcium, but

the calcium in it is not efficiently absorbed by our bodies. The theory is that the oxalates in spinach bind with the calcium; kale contains to oxalates to interfere with absorption.

Ten percent of the recommended dietary allowance for calcium is contained in one cup of chopped cooked kale. This s great news for people who don't like dairy products or who suffer from lactase deficiency. Broccoli, collards, mustard and turnip greens also contain significant amounts of calcium and no oxalates to inhibit absorption. A casserole containing a medley of these vegetables would be a healthy addition to any meal.

During my childhood, our family often ate kale. I


