

# Growth up in Independence

394 permits issued in 1990, only 215 in first half of 1989

Progress is alive and well in Independence Town-

According to a report conducted by the building department, the township has granted 179 more building permits for the first six months of 1990 than allowed in the first half of 1989.

Building department records show that 394 permits,

of all varieties, were approved during the first half of this year compared to 215 in the first half of 1989.

Township building Director Beverly McElmeel attributed the escalating number of total permits to the rise in apartment and condominium developments in the area. She pointed to Hidden Lake and Clarkston Bluffs as

# Two grocery stores to open by fall, one next spring

Three new grocery stores will be opening in Independence Township, and all will offer more than grocer-

Two of the three stores are to open in the fall, and one of those two has already changed hands.

Ed Boutrous, developer of Clarkston Oaks on Dixie Highway across from Maybee Road, said the lease with Great Scott was canceled July 16, and a lease with Kroger was signed at the same time.

"We want to open as soon as possible," Boutrous said, adding that early November was the target opening

"This store will have all the new bells and whistles," Bourrous added.

The store is to include a pharmacy and a floral shop,

Dave Prueter, KMA Realestate manager for Michigan Division of Kroger, said Great Scott was having financial problems and is in the process of selling stores to Kroger.

"Great Scott was not able to finance that store," Prueter said. "We were fortunate to get them to cancel the lease and for us to sign the lease."

Prueter said Kroger officials are finalizing the store's interior plans, which include a larger deli plus bakery and cheese departments.

The other store set for a fall opening is the new A&P off Dixie Highway and White Lake Road in the new White Lake Commons center, where the historic Boothby

Kathy Woods, employee of current A&P at the M-15-Dixie Highway intersection, said the new store should open Aug. 13 and will remain an A&P despite A & P's recent purchase of Farmer Jack.

"It's beautiful," Woods said about the new store. "It's three times the size of this one."

The store, too, is to contain a floral shop and larger, more specialized, departments.

Woods said the store is open for construction workers and A&P staff but is not yet open for business:

A third grocery store is to open in spring 1991. March or April is the proposed opening date for a new Food Town, said Ed Adler, vice president of Food Town supermarkets.

Food Town is to move from its current location at the northwest corner of Sashabaw and Maybee roads to Independence Towne Square, a shopping center in the works at the southwest corner of Sashabaw and Waldon roads.

"We're hoping that we can open it by the first of March 1991, by the absolute latest," Adler said.

Construction on the site was begun last week, Adler added.

Arkan Jonna, president of Jonna properties and developer of Independence Towne Square, said earth moving has been underway for a few weeks.

Jonna said workers spent weeks making a nursery to hold existing trees for later transplanting, but it didn't

"That was a couple of weeks and time for nothing. We tried to save the trees," Jonna said.

Jonna added that he sees no problems ahead.

"Everything is a go," he said. Adler said Food Town needs the new building to

expand its departments. "The building will be more efficiently laid out,"

The new Food Town will hold larger bakery and deli departments. Plus, a larger selection of products will be displayed, Adler said.

the main contributors to this categorical boom. Only four permits were granted for apartment and condo projects in the first half of 1989, compared to 121 for 1990.

However, the total number of permits granted for single-family homes dropped from 94 in the first six months of 1989 to 84 in the first half of 1990.

According to McElmeel, April and May are traditionally the busiest times of the year for construction. She cites these months as being popular because they occur around the time of the "spring thaw." October has also proven to be big for construction because most developers want to beat the winter frost.

McElmeel believes the township's desirability lies in its location and diversity.

"Independence Township offers the best of both worlds," McElmeel said. "It has a distinct rural character complemented by a good school system. Our location is also attractive because we lie in between Flint and Detroit

with the malls only a half an hour away.

"Independence is still in its infancy in terms of development," she added. "And I feel our officials have got a good grasp on the progress at hand."

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# Costs of library operation for voters to decide

Library Director James Hibler gave the Independence Township Board an overview of what the township can expect in the upcoming library expansion.

On July 17, Hibler supplied the board with a view of the future. He presented a scale model of the proposed 20,000-square-foot building and an oral report of what it will entail. Construction is to begin at the end of this year, with a target completition date of fall 1991.

The expansion of the 4,000-square-foot Clarkston Road building is to be paid for with a \$2 million bond issue approved by voters Nov. 8, 1988. The Clarkston Community Historical Society is also contributing about \$50,000 to furnish the local history room.

Voters will also be asked to approve three-fourths mill for operating expenses of the expansion. That request will appear on the Aug. 7 primary ballot and will cover utilities, maintenance, staffing, services and materials.

Three-fourths mill is 75 cents for every \$1,000 assessed property valuation. For example, the owner of a \$100,000 home assessed at half its market value (\$50,000) would pay \$37.50 per year for library operating expenses. The current library is operated with money from the



township's general fund.

According to Hibler, the expanded library will be composed of different sections to suit the needs of its patrons. Though the building will be free of internal barriers, sections such as a children's collection, adult collection, and a reference area will be accessible to all who frequent the library.

The library will also be equipped with six enclosed rooms ranging from local history to audio visual. The largest of the rooms will be a 175-person meeting room open to all community organizations.



In terms of personnel, the library is currently operating with seven full-time members and six part-time assistants. Hibler foresees a day when the library will be functioning with nearly 25 full-time staff members.

"We want this library to be ready to accommodate the needs of our entire community in the future," Hibler said about the upcoming improvements.

In terms of books, Hibler said the expansion will make way for nearly triple the number of volumes in the current 27,000-volume library. About 50,000 more books will be added over a 20-year period.

Township Clerk Joan McCrary emphasized that the expansion will not interrupt the library's normal activities. According to McCrary, the present children's area will be partitioned off so it won't be disturbed by construction.

### New board members


Two new faces characterized the Clarkston school board at its regular meeting July 9.

The salary for board members continues to be \$30 per meeting, not to exceed 52 meetings a year.

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# Board buys fire department land

A request to sell two fire department lots on Maybee Road found a quick buyer in the Independence Township Board.

On July 17, the board voted 6-0 to purchase the land from the fire department after the land is appraised. Trustee John Lutz was absent from the meeting.

Fire Chief Gar Wilson asked the board for permis-

sion to sell two lots at 5242 Maybee Road, adjacent to fire station number three. The property, 20,000 square feet per lot, had received approval from the township's split parcel committee on July 12.

Wilson told the board he would like to sell the land for about \$30,000 per lot. He said the revenue would be deposited directly into the fire department's building

Township Clerk Joan McCrary said she'd like to see the township retain the land for "open space" purposes.

"I'd hate to see us sell off all our property," McCrary said. "Let's just think about this before acting."

McCrary suggested the township take money from its funds to pay off the fire department.

"Nothing against Gar (Wilson)," McCrary added. "But this split will only account for \$50,000, and that's only a drop in the bucket for a \$2.5 million fire station."

A \$2 million bond issue for a public safety complex was defeated by twice by voters in 1989, and Wilson has since been trying to find other means of paying for a

At the meeting, Trustee Frank Millard said the property could be used as a neighborhood park, if purchased by the township.

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
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### Early morning

It was 7 a.m. — early by my standards, and I had just furnished myself with a large iced tea and a biscuit from a fast food restaurant.

So there I sat in heavy Baldwin Road traffic, waiting to make a left turn onto I-75. I discovered the fast food workers had not given me a straw.

I sighed.

Toward me roared car after car of work-bound people. All but a few vehicles carried a single occupant. Most were men; and few were women; and a very few had children with them.

A man in a blue pick-up truck with dark hair on the long side and a mustache whizzed by. He was wearing a T-shirt and was smoking, eyes half open.

Factory worker, I decided. But he must be late. I sometimes get caught in factory traffic about 3 p.m. if I'm at the wrong place at the wrong time. And many of those drivers are T-shirt clad men driving

pick-up trucks, racing to leave their workplace. I figured their shifts must begin at 7 a.m. Another pick-up truck was on the way — a red

one. I waited to see if it could be another factory

Not likely. He sported ear-length hair and wore a suit — plus he talked on a car phone.

So early? I wondered. What business was open so early? Construction, of course. That is, unless he was simply saying goodbye to his wife.

The next vehicle carried an older man with a steaming cup of coffee — not from a fast food place - in his hand. By the time he reached work, he'd be ready to go, I figured.

And following him was a woman with wet curly hair who dexterously applied mascara while driving in the bumper-to-bumper traffic. Good use of time, as long as no accidents occurred, I thought, though I would not want to be driving near her for very long.

Following her was a woman in a van, already tired-looking. Beside her a tiny outstretched hand was visible above the dashboard.

Next, a young suited man in a small car looked bright-eyed and ready for the day.

And next, another young man — also brighteyed — was actually singing.

A business-suited woman followed, not tiredlooking but not exactly bright-eyed. Perhaps she had already had her coffee before leaving the house.

After her, a man gulped down toast and then swigged (coffee?) from a plastic foam cup.

At last—a pick-up with construction supplies in the back pulled out of the restaurant further up the road, blocking enough traffic so three cars could make their left turns onto I-75. Fortunately, I drove one of them.

I merged and was immediately swallowed up by the speeding traffic — 65 mph in the slow lane.

Faster drivers this early, I noted.

And lots of trucks — including a few bright red diesel trucks without trailers, speeding along with the other traffic.

In almost no time I had reached M-15, where I lined up at the light to turn left.

A flood of southbound M-15 traffic reluctantly halted at the light.

I turned and dutiously slowed as I reached the village limits. The drivers behind me did not like this and stayed as close to my back bumper as possible.

I parked and made my way to the office: The bake shop was streaming with bustling business people and early-morning walkers. The smell of bacon from the Grill wafted onto the streets. Birds hopped out of my path.

Nothing like a morning in Clarkston.

Does the idea really work? We don't know for sure, but our new alternative committee wants to get the facts.

Consider scale. It's the hard stuff that builds up in the coffee pot, tea kettle or washing machine. Is a commercial chemical the answer?

Some people use white vinegar instead, and they say it works very well. We want to check out such alternative methods, so we're setting up a citizen's panel for the

Perhaps you'd like to become a panel member. You'll try one or two ideas as part of your regular household routine.

Select ideas from a list we'll supply. Then try them out and tell us about your results.



The same thumbs-down review was earned several years ago when the FBI taped some congressmen for the ABSCAM Film Festival.

And remember the dreadful mess the government made of John DeLorean's image? DeLorean went into the project with an international reputation for being a wealthy, super-smart chief executive, always completely in charge. He came out looking like the second lead in a 1940 stag film, sitting on a cheap hotel couch, hoping humbly for a star dope dealer to save his farm from foreclosure.

FBI videotapes are always in black and white. That makes our federal government look cheap and ridiculous. My relatives tape boring cocktail parties in full color, for Lord's sake, and no one ever wants to look at them. The Barry tapes were shown on television to intrigued viewers all over the world. Do we have to wait 30 years for Ted Turner to colorize FBI tapes before we know what shade suit the mayor of Washington, D.C., wears to trysts?

Siskel and Ebert might suggest that the hiddencamera genre needs murky black and white to provide a realistic atmosphere for tapes of mayors who sneak around on their wives. I might suggest that pompous critics who always pronounce "genre" correctly should be smart enough to realize that anyone who can't cheat realistically in living color has no business running for public

To me, it appears obvious that FBI videotape productions are severely underbudgeted. But why? Pratt & Whitney, the jet-engine builder that sold those \$999 pliers to the Air Force, defended the price by saying, "They're multipurpose - not only do they put the clips on but they take them off." Give me a break. Is there any tax-funded product or project more multipurpose than a videotape of an elected official breaking the law?

First, there's the entertainment purpose, especially during the summer when reruns and rejected sitcom pilots me to sleen. It is fascinating for lo his congressman take money under the same Holiday Inn table that Joe has put his feet under.

Second, there's the job purpose. Hidden cameras require holes in hotel and motel walls. Skilled American laborers must be hired to drill those holes.

Third, there's the public reassurance purpose. Ever since Richard Nixon said he wasn't a crook, many of us have had doubts about our elected officials. Wellproduced videotapes can reassure us we were right in the first place.

Those are only three reasons why the FBI videotaping budget should be greatly increased. If we can afford \$999 for one lousy pair of pliers, we can certainly afford Warner Brothers-type spending for the sophisticated camera equipment and experienced people needed to produce high-quality, full-color tapes of top government officials getting in trouble in hotel rooms

# Sashabaw safety path to cost extra

A construction estimate blunder by the Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) could raise the price of a safety path on Sashabaw Road over I-75 by nearly \$13,500.

In June, the Independence Township Board approved \$26,000 to pay for a safety path over the Sashabaw Road viaduct. The amount was based on an MDOT

However, the Independence Township Board voted 6-0 July 17 to approve an MDOT contract for \$39,500 for the safety path construction. Treasurer John Lutz was absent from the meeting. The new figure was based on an MDOT revision of cost estimates.

Upon the request of Supervisor Frank Ronk, township engineer Hubbel, Roth and Clark was asked to

investigate the escalated contract. The engineering firm learned that MDOT had originally drawn up the estimate using asphalt as their construction material. However, Independence Township constructs all its safety paths using concrete. This discrepancy caused a slight shifting

The main brunt of the adjusted estimate comes from the fill and gravel needed to build up the shoulder of the road. This aspect wasn't considered in the original esti-

Despite the blunder, the board deemed it necessary to carry on with the project.

"It's critical we go ahead with the safety path even though the numbers didn't fall our way," said Trustee Daniel Travis.

Township Clerk Joan McCrary said the township plans to negotiate with MDOT officials, prior to the contract's signing, to see if the price can be moderately

Stop by the present library if you haven't; see the need, view the future plans, talk to the librarians and vote yes on Aug. 7.



# 7-year-old 's arrest may end 14-day crime spree

The arrest of a 17-year-old Independence Township teen may have put an end to an area crime spree that saw. eight businesses fall to criminal activity within two weeks

Scott Haneckow of Allen Road was arrested by Oakland County Sheriff's Department (OCSD) officers July 12 for attempting to steal an automobile from Bowman Chevrolet, at the intersection of M-15 and Dixie

The youth allegedly was in the process of driving off the lot with a \$37,000 Chevrolet Corvette when he was spotted by a security guard.

According to OCSD Detective Dave Scott, the youth had gained entry to the dealership by breaking a side window. After locating the vehicle's keys, he drove it through the service area and out into the parking lot, via the service doors. While closing the doors, he was spotted by the lot's security guard.

### Higher noise levels OK for historic races

The Independence Township Board has granted a noise variance for the sixth annual Meadow Brook Historic Races at Waterford Hill Race track for Aug. 3-5.

Detective Scott said that Haneckow is being investigated for his alleged participation in several other area

It was also noted that the Bowman Chevrolet incident was the first crime the teen attempted at night during the

According to Detective Scott, Haneckow's escapades include a police chase that resulted in the youth literally walking away from the converging officers.

On July 7, Haneckow allegedly stole a Pontiac Trans Am from the lot at Randy Hosler-Pontiac, and a high speed chase followed. The teen abandoned the vehicle alongside Dixie and fled into a wooded area, adjacent to a residential area.

Once in the woods, Haneckow removed all his clothes, except for a pair of "summer shorts," and waited around the edge of a home. When the police and tracking dogs neared the residence, Haneckow rounded the corner and inquired about the search. The officers told the youth to return to his home because his scent was throwing off

At first the youth began to run but returned to the site the dogs. Once the police were out of sight, Haneckow

- After his arrest on July 12, the police linked Haneckow to the larceny at Clarkston Motors, During the robbery: the youth lost his class ring, and it was later discovered during the police's investigation. However, it didn't serve as enough evidence for the detectives.

That evidence was secured after Haneckow's admittance to the crime, and his finger prints were matched to those found at the crime scene.

Police records indicate that Haneckow was on probation by the juvenile court for auto larceny. However, once a person reaches age 17, he is no longer considered a juvenile. Detective Scott remarked that Haneckow recorded his first break-in and entry, at Kammer and Associates on June 29, only one day after his 17th birth-

Haneckow, held at the county jail, was arraigned on July 13 at the 52nd District Court in Independence Township and was bound over to Oakland County Circuit

He was charged with five counts of breaking and entering with intent to commit larceny, three counts of unlaw ully driving an automobile, and one count of failin, to obey an officer's signal.

Each of the breaking and entry/ larceny charges carries a maximum penalty of 10 years imprisonment. The unlawful driving of an automobile carries a five year maximum penalty, and the disobeying of an officer's signal is a misdemeanor.

Arraignment has been set for Aug. 3 before circuit court Judge Fred Mester.

The passing of an era

Many, many years ago, my parents owned a small drugstore on the University of Michigan campus. It was a typical drugstore of that era, complete with soda fountain, juke box and a small back room containing three tables with checkered tablecloths.

We featured milkshakes, served right out of the silver can in which they were mixed, phosphates (what's a phosphate?), and luncheon "specials" prepared by my mother in her oven at home. I worked there all through high school and college.

We knew most of our customers by name, and each year we'd say goodbye to those who were graduating and hello to those who were enrolling. The work was hard, and the hours long, but the relationships were rewarding, and graduates would return years later to let us know how they

After 30-some years, my parents sold the store and retired. The new owner removed the soda fountain and completely remodeled the store's interior. The old, familiar drugstore gave way to The Village Apothecary, which exists today. It now features row upon row of gleaming shelves stocked with drugs, medications and pills of every conceivable size and shape.

All of this leads me to Jim Sherman's article in last week's Clarkston News on "Killer Stores" and how they destroy the small retailer. The so-called Killer Stores he refers to are the giant malls and large chain stores that are almost impossible to compete against.

How does a small retailer, for example, compete against a store that's open 24 hours a day, offers plenty of free parking, lower prices and a wider variety of products? As Jim points out, providing individual attention, knowing customer names, and having product knowledge (as opposed to self-serve, no help in sight) goes only so far. We see the results every day — as more and more vacancy signs appear, many within the malls themselves.

As I read Jim's article, I thought about the Village of Clarkston and how it might look 20, 10 or even five years from now. Now that the Auburn Mills megamall is a reality, what will it do to our local merchants?

And, as John Gallagher recently pointed out in the Free Press, what about all the strip malls and chain stores of all types that such megamalls attract? Because this mall intends to draw customers from a 200-mile radius, entrepreneurs of every sort will be attempting to gain a foothold as close to the mall as possible.

Because of my background, I empathize with the small shopkeeper trying to make a living in a society where bigger seems to be better. I look at downtown Clarkston, and I think of the old Carlson Drug in Ann

I witnessed the passing of one era, and I fear I'm about to witness the passing of another. For myself, I'll continue to patronize our local merchants every chance I get. But I'm afraid the day is coming when downtown Clarkston will be primarily office buildings and the like. And to me, that will be tragic.

# Impulse buying important in USSR; bring own bag

Editor's note: Following is the first of four articles about the Soviet Union. The author, Don Morrow, gathered his material over eight months while visiting his wife, Robin Bisha. Bisha is a 1979 Clarkston High School graduate who spent an academic year in the Soviet Union doing research for her doctoral degree. She's studying Russian history at Indiana University, Bloomington, Ind., and is the daughter of John Bisha of Clarkston.

#### **BY DON MORROW**

November:

I arrived in Leningrad Sept. 24 on a beautiful Russian fall day to meet my wife, Robin, who is on an educational exchange in the Soviet Union. Customs was a breeze. They only questioned my blank videocassettes and my copy of "The Ryder." Robin whisked me off to a cab. The driver asked for 13 rubles but agreed to take two packs of Marlboros instead.

Robin and I are living in an 8-by-13-foot room designed for one person on the cold side of the dormitory for foreign students from capitalist countries (and the People's Republic of China). Unmarried students are usually paired up with a Soviet roommate. Married couples get their own room usually a bigger room than ours.

The showers are on the first floor, and we live on the fourth. The door is guarded by four very old people who rotate 24-hour shifts. The university housing officials refuse to move us to a bigger room even though there are some available. As long as we stay in the small room, I am not occupying a bed that could be earning hard currency for the university.

The other option they gave us was to move to the suburb of Peterhof, which is 1 1/2 hours away from the center of town where Robin does her research. We were told by the U.S. Consulate not to allow them to move us because in the winter many times the electric train doesn't

run due to snow.

Currently, the dorm is without cold water. Yes, no cold water. Here they pump the water into the buildings in separate pipes from a central water plant. The pipe carrying the cold water burst, and we have been waiting for it to be repaired. As a result, we hop from one shower to the next to use up what little cold water is left in the pipes, so we don't boil ourselves.

The American students get frustrated by the impossibility of making overseas calls from the dorm. They have to wait for their friends or parents to call, or make appointments with them to call at a certain hour.

To call the United States it is necessary to go to the post office and order a call. Currently there is a two-to three-day wait before a call will even be attempted, and of course the party you are calling may not be home. Mail can also be a problem. Some students have been here for more than five weeks and still have not received any mail.

Currently in Leningrad tea, sugar and all types of soap are rationed. We have yet to see any sugar in a store and any time there is soap on sale there are long lines, and it sells out very quickly.

Another unobtainable item is lined paper. There is talk that meat and butter and even shoes and clothes will also be rationed soon. There have been people interviewed on TV who are criticizing Gorbachev's policies and even pictures of stores with nothing to sell.

Right now there is plenty of food available, but everyone talks about shortage of everything in the middle of winter. Shopping here is very difficult. Everyone carries plastic bags at all times because you never know what may be on sale. (They do not give you bags in Soviet

Impulse buying is very important. If you don't buy something the minute you see it, you probably won't see it again for quite awhile.

To reduce shopping and cooking time, four of the American researchers and myself pool our food and share the cooking. As foreigners from a country with convertible currency, we have access to shops that operate on foreign currency only. These are the Beriozka stores which are plentifully stocked.

Soviet citizens, who are not allowed to have hard

currency, are unable to shop in these stores. There are also fast food stands, which only accept hard currency, springing up all around the city. Unlike the Beriozka stores, which are fairly discrete, these stands proudly advertise what soviets cannot buy.

Getting around the city can also be a challenge. Riding the bus is much different here than in Bloomington. When you get on the bus you have to have a ticket that is verified by punching a hole in it through a machine mounted on the wall.

They have what would amount to plain clothes

policemen who occasionally check the tickets. Passengers pass their money forward to buy tickets (or we occasionally buy them from the bakery up the street).

The tickets and the change are then passed back. If someone forgets who the change belongs to, they hold the money in the air, wave it around and ask whose it is. Robin received a three-ruble fine for not having her ticket verified. Another time she accidentally hit a babushka (an old woman) in the foot with her bag. The babushka yelled at her, showed her the right way to hold her bag and then to drive the point home bashed Robin with her own bag.

As I close, I have just returned from a walk along the beach by the Baltic Sea. I strolled through a park admiring the beautiful colors of the changing leaves. Come things in October are the same no matter where you happen to be.



# Builder recognized by vocational education field

Personal and financial commitment were the special qualities possessed by the winner of the 1990 Michigan Council on Vocational Education Business and Industry Recognition award.

Mike Hofer, president of Welcome Homes, Clarkston, was recently named the recipient of the 1990 award from a field of 12 nominees and will accept his award in Lansing at a conference scheduled later this year.

Hofer supplied funding for the shortfall, materials, land and the on-site supervision.

Hofer said Welcome Homes will sponsor the program next year, but from that point the school system will

Hofer, an East Detroit High School graduate and previously a carpenter contractor, is presently working within the Building Trades Advisory Committee of the Oakland Technical Center Northwest. He is also active in the North Oakland County Builders Association, the Builders Association of Southeast Michigan, the Michigan Association of Home Builders and the National Association of Home Builders.

Hofer said he spends about a month a year on construction-associated business.

Feltes had plenty of witnesses while

she struggled for the ball. She attended the night game with a group of 18 people from the Independence Township Senior Citizens Center.

"Marie (Alldredge) pushed a guy off the seats," said Feltes about her comrade in arms. "Cindy (Assemany), who drove one of the two vans to the game, also helped."

She said some of the young fans around her were on her side.

"Two young fellows sitting in back of us were as happy as a lark that I got it,"

After Feltes put the ball in her purse, she headed home in one of the vans as she and her friends "talked about it halfway home"

Feltes' husband, Ray, was listening to the game but admitted to falling asleep in the eighth inning.

When she came home, she woke her husband to tell him that she caught the ball.

"I believed it," said Ray Feltes. "But I didn't think she'd go through that much bother to get a ball."

Feltes has written a letter to Trammell thanking him for hitting the homer. She said she would give the ball to the

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# Dogs find flyball as a catchy new sport

Man's best friend may be a dog, and a dog's best sport may be flyball.

Flyball is a dog relay race which originated in California in 1985 and has become a sport in the Midwest.

One of those dogs competing is Brandy, owned by Barbara and John Peters of Snowapple Drive in Independence Township.

The Peters and Brandy belong to a Flyball Club called the Paw Busters, which is headquartered in Lansing.

The Paw Busters will next compete in Flint Aug. 18 and 19 at the Genesee County Fairgrounds.

In addition, people attending the Detroit Lions exhibition football game Aug. 24 at the Pontiac Silverdome will also get a chance to see the Paw Busters in action.

Flyball, which has been televised on

ESPN, is a relay race with two teams of four dogs competing against each other. One at a time, dogs from each team are released by their owners, jump four hurdles which are spaced 10 feet apart, and then press a pedal on the flyball box another 15 feet away, which releases a tennis ball.

The dog must catch the ball in its mouth, turn around, jump the four hurdles again and run back to its owner, who then releases the next dog on that team. The team whose four dogs complete the run the fastest wins the heat.

Championship teams like the Paw Busters can finish the course in 20 seconds. The speed of the dogs is estimated between 40-45 miles per hour.

Barbara Peters said it takes most dogs about six months to learn the skills needed in flyball. But some dogs may catch on in just a few weeks while others may take a whole year.


The Paw Busters compete in three different categories: championship, inter-

mediate and novice. Any breed of dog can compete, but it helps if the dog has been through obedience training and can follow commands because the races are all run off-leash.

Hurdles measure between eight and 16 inches in height. The larger the dog, the higher the hurdles. However, if a team consists of one small dog and three larger dogs, then all four dogs would jump over 8-inch hurdles.

The Paw Busters practice once a week for competitions that take place throughout North America. The group has recently traveled to Chicago, Cleveland, Saginaw, Flint, Detroit and Toronto. In addition to flyball, some of the Paw Busters compete in a steeplechase event, which is a type of obstacle course for a dog.

The North American Flyball Association has approximately 75 teams and 552 dogs registered.


BRANDY, owned by Barbara and John Peters of Independence Township, jumps over some hurdles during practice on Sunday.

Several players were carded and then ejected during the game for fighting, with the Venom playing with only seven players at the end of the match and the CBers down to 10.

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
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# Clarkston grad helps SVSU in nationals

Along with a plaque, Hess received a championship ring along with players during halftime ceremonies at a Saginaw Valley basketball game.





## Common sense steps make boating safer

Staying alert, using personal flotation devices and minding a watercraft's capabilities can head off most boating accidents, AAA Michigan reports.

Michigan leads the nation with registered boats, topping 800,000. State boating accidents claimed 32 lives, and another 238 victims were injured in 1988, the latest statistics available.

"Capsizing and falling overboard are the leading causes of boating fatalities," said Robert V. Cullen, AAA Michigan Community Safety Services manager. "Many accidents can be prevented with common sense."

Staying alert is essential to safe boating, he said. But several hours in the sun, glare, waves and wind can double an individual's reaction time. Alcohol also slows a boater's response, impairing vision and balance.

'The best way to stay alert is to avoid alcohol and take a break every couple of hours," Cullen said. "Return to shore for a swim, picnic or walk."

Personal Flotation Devices (PFD) also save lives. Michigan law requires one PFD for each person on board. But life preservers were not worn in more than 60 percent of state boat accidents in 1988.

Observing the boat's load limit and handling capabilities also lessens risks.

"Too many passengers, too much gear or too big a motor can capsize or sink even the most seaworthy craft,' Cullen said.

Other points to remember:

- Fire extinguishers are required on motorboats with enclosed engines and recommended for all watercraft.
- Check the weather forecast before leaving home and monitor a marine radio frequency for warnings while
  - Carry basic tools and a first aid kit.
- Give a trip plan with destination and expected return time to someone reliable and notify that person of any changes.
  - Follow safety procedures when fueling.





# 'Recreational double' trailers legal in Michigan

In Michigan, which has the highest number of boat registrations in the country, it is now legal to tow both a camping-type trailer and a boat trailer behind a pickup truck, a combination known as a recreational double.

The camping trailer must be hitched to the pickup truck with a "fifth wheel" (not a ball-hitched) coupling.

University of Michigan transportation researchers conducted a study from which the Michigan legislature formulated the new law, enacted in May.

The researchers found the doubles as stable as single trailer combinations if their total length, including the truck, does not exceed 59 feet and they are driven no faster than 55 miles per hour.

### \$1,000 donated to home chore program

The Independence Township Board approved a \$1,000 donation to the Oakland Livingston Human Service Agency (OLHSA) July 10.

"As with any other vehicle, increasing speed causes a towed trailer to oscillate more rapidly," MacAdam said, noting that the speed and length constraints adopted for recreational doubles in Michigan are selected to keep these tendencies under control.

Under the new law, motorists pulling a double are required to pass a written and driving test to obtain an endorsement. Drivers must be at least 17 to obtain an endorsement.

Indiana. Ohio and the Province of Ontario permit recreational doubles, either by law or lack of law.

"In the past, depending on where you were driving in Michigan, you may or may not have been stopped for towing a double," Ervin said. "One sheriff would ticket; another would look the other way."

Officials in the recreation industry have protested the length limit as too short, pointing out that a limit of 62-65 feet is common in many western states.

The 10 most popular recreational trailers range in length from 17 to 33 feet, while an average boat trailer selected for the U-M study was 23 feet long.

It is estimated that 50 percent of Michigan's 8,195 registered "fifth wheel" campers will meet length restriction when coupled with an average boat trailer.

Ervin and MacAdam used computer simulation to evaluate common driving maneuvers that might lead to loss of control.

Specifically they examined the amount of oscillation or side-to-side movement of the trailers caused by right or left turns or lane changes.

Ervin noted that the most significant factor affecting safety is the length of the camper.

Because the camper is typically built with a long overhang behind its axles, the vehicle combination is less stable with a long camper than with a short one.

The Michigan Office of Highway Safety Planning will conduct a study for the state legislature over the next two years to determine the impact of the new law on recreational activity and accident rates.

# Clark Road farm offers haven to visiting children

The front gate at the Dennis Farm on Clark Road, Springfield Township, is a friendly greeting to visitors.

And once inside, Bertha Dennis' easy laughter and her husband, Frank's, gentle manner provide an even stronger welcome.

The Dennises have lived on the farm for about 20 years and have chickens, sheep, horses, dogs and cats. Plus, they have lots of visiting children — some handicapped horseback riders, others 4-H members from the area.

The children often show the Dennis animals in 4-H fairs — an activity the Dennises encourage.

Bertha and Frank enjoy sharing their farm life with children who don't have space for such animals.

They know the benefits children derive from farm life — the couple grew up on neighboring farms in Maryland on the Eastern seashore.

Bertha said she grew up riding horses on her parents'

"I worked on my horse six days a week, and on Sunday I played," Bertha said, as she watched a few 4-H members who had come to ride horses.

Bertha helps the 4-H'ers with riding lessons all week

long in the summer.

In spring and fall handicapped people take lessons from riding instructor Julie Bates, using the Dennises' three horses.


The handicapped people ride more for therapy,

"It's fascinating to watch them grow from week to week," said Frank, explaining that horseback riding often helps them gain confidence.

Riders come in groups or individually to learn at the Dennis farm, Frank said.

"We almost pioneered handicapped riding," he said.
The Dennises first began teaching handicapped riders in 1978, and the farm was one of the first in Michigan and Oakland County to offer the activity for the handicapped.

Frank — a retired insurance agent, a retired Methodist minister and a retired social worker — remains active.



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


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# He likes goats, rabbits, guinea pigs - and cooking

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
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

## Keeping shady lawns healthy requires extra care

The same big shade trees that cool your home in summer also make it more difficult to maintain a vigorous, healthy lawn.

Trees and shrubs compete with lawn grasses for sunlight, water and soil nutrients, explains Mike McElroy, Extension turfgrass management specialist at Michigan State University, East Lansing.

"The grass usually comes out on the short end of this competition," McElroy observes. "If you follow certain management practices, however, you can develop and maintain a healthy lawn even in the shade."

The first step is to select shade-tolerant grass varie-

McElroy recommends a mixture of fine-leafed fescues and shade-tolerant Kentucky bluegrass varieties.

In very wet shaded areas, where these grasses grow

poorly, rough bluegrass (Poa trivialis) is about the only choice.

"Variety selection is important because sun-loving cultivars will be prone to disease or lack vigor in shaded areas," he notes.

Selective pruning of tree roots and branches can reduce competition for sunlight and water and nutrients.

Pruning the surface roots that extend into the lawn reduces the competition between the tree or shrub and the

lawn beneath it.

This pruning needs to be done carefully, especially on shallow-rooted trees and shrubs such as maples, beeches and evergreens, which will not tolerate extensive root

Other more deeply rooted trees will usually adjust if root pruning is done gradually. Deeper roots will supply needed water and nutrients.

Selective pruning or thinning of trees and shrubs will increase light penetration and improve air circulation.

Careful pruning that maintains the shape and beauty of the trees while it eliminates weak or diseased branches can improve the health and vigor of the woody ornamentals even as it improves growing conditions for the grass below.

"Shaded lawns need different care than sunny areas," McElroy points out. "Grass grown in shade is normally thinner than grass grown in full sun and is more easily damaged by foot traffic.

"Traffic also increases compaction of moist soil," he adds. "For these reasons, you want to route people and vehicles around shaded areas as much as possible."

Mow grass in shaded areas three to four inches high, rather than the one-and-one-half to two-and-one-half inches usually recommended for sunny areas.



Avoid removing more than one-third of the green leaf tissue at any one mowing to minimize stress on grass plants.

In autumn, remove fallen leaves promptly. Leaves left to mat on the grass will eventually smother it.

Because shaded areas tend to dry more slowly than sunny ones, watering must be done with care.

McElroy advises watering shaded areas deeply but infrequently and allowing them to dry before watering again. Apply enough to supply the trees and shrubs growing there, too.

Grass in shaded areas grows less than grass in sunny spots and so needs less fertilizer.

"Don't try to provide for the needs of the grass and the trees and shrubs with surface fertilizer applications," McElroy advises. "Apply light applications of fertilizer to meet the needs of the lawn and use deep root feeding for the trees.

Heavy fertilization of grass in shade will give succulent turf growth that's susceptible to disease and traffic

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lamage."

The best way to determine fertilizer needs is to have a soil test done, McElroy suggests. Lacking a soil test, you can usually be safe applying one pound of nitrogen per 1,000 square feet of shade-tolerant Kentucky bluegrasses in late September in southern Michigan, with a follow-up application at half that rate in mid-November.

Fine fescue in shaded areas will often thrive with no fertilizer, though newer stands or thin areas may benefit from 3/4 to one pound of nitrogen in late September.

Avoid any fertilizer to shady areas in spring or summer, McElroy says.

Sometimes the best solution to lawn problems in shade is to plant something other than grass, such as shade-tolerant ground covers. Some weed control is generally required while plants are getting established, but maintenance after that is usually low.

In high traffic areas, switching from plants to wood chips, crushed rock or other such materials may be the

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
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
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

Life insurance rates are all over the place. There are big savings to be made if you shop around.

St., San Francisco 94105. Select Quote supplied me with figures from five established companies for similar insurance. All premiums were about half that of my friend's present policy.

For example, Bankers National Life had an average annual premium of \$194. Company was started in 1927 and enjoys the top rating of A+ Excellent by A M Best & Co., insurance rating firm.

Berkshire Life, a 135-year-old Massachusettes company, also rated A+ had an average premium of \$200 for the first 10 years.

Compare these two premiums, total for 10 years -one for \$1940, the other for \$2,000--with my friend's present cost of \$3700. What an easy way to save!

Here is a set of commandments written by the greatest American of all -- Thomas Jefferson:

Never put off until tomorrow what you can do today. Never trouble another for what you can do yourself. Never spend your money before you have earned it.

Never buy what you don't want because it is cheap. Pride costs more than hunger, thirst and cold.

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When angry, count ten before you speak; if very angry, count a hundred.

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Before you do business with such a company, you should know two things. First, if you have a bad credit rating, no one can fix it overnight. Such promises simply are not true.

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

## 21-year-old faces tough challenge with leukemia

Joette Kovacik is a determined 21-year-old who has used that trait to see her through tough times. This time, though, her determination is helping her fight for her life.

Joette needs a bone marrow transplant to help combat the leukemia ravaging inside her body, and she needs financial help to see her through the costly operation. Expenses for the operation are estimated at \$165,000.

Joette says she'd welcome any help the Clarkston area community could give.

Growing up on Reese Road, Independence Township, Joette lived as normal a childhood as she could after being diagnosed with chronic myleogenous leukemia at age 7, she says.

She always seemed to catch a cold in the winter, and she missed some school because of her illness, she says.
"I was never sick until February," she remembers.

Now pain has taken over her thin body, but her outlook remains positive. Joette says the pain is only temporary until she can receive a bone marrow transplant. "I'm keeping a positive attitude," Joette says.

Others agree about Joette's upbeat attitude.

"She's like a ray of sunshine," says Betsy Travis, Joeue's former teacher.

Betsy taught Joette in the Clarkston Alternative Education Program until Joette graduated in 1987. Joette was a leader in the class, Betsy recalls.

"She was the spirit of the school," Betsy says. "They were a close-knit group, and it was because of people like Joette."

Ginny Farmer, who was an administrator for Clarkston Community Education at the time Joette attended classes, agrees with Betsy's assessment.

"She was positive with the other students," Ginny says. "Joette was always thinking of others."

Ginny says Joette had a lot of obstacles to overcome, the major one being her health.

"She's just one gusty young lady," Besty says.

Joette has never met her biological father, who lives in Kentucky, but he plans to visit her within a month,

Joette says.

Her biological father underwent the testing July 17 to discover if he's a compatible match for Joette's bone marrow transplant. Test results will not be available until

the end of July.

Her mother already has been tested and is not a positive match.

For each person tested as a possible donor, the cost

Joette says her savings are exhausted because of expenses, and many of the expenses she encounters from her disease Blue Cross will not cover. Joette receives \$184 in disability payments every other week.

"I have five weeks of disability (pay) left, and no income," Joette said.

Joette held a job at North Oakland Community
Credit Union until April when she could no longer work
because of the pain.

She's moved back in with her mother and stepfather in mid-July because she cannot care for herself.

Joette's mother works during the day, but Joette's sister-in-law, Jeanie Kovacik, stops in daily to care for Joette, bringing along her 4-month-old daughter.



LIKE MOST 21-year-olds, Joette Kovacik doesn't have a lot of financial resources, but unlike others in her age group she needs \$165,000 to help save her life. Diagnosed with leukemia at age 7, Joette now needs a bone marrow transplant.

"The baby cheers her up," Jeanie says about her daily visits to Joette.

The two girls laugh as they recall that they didn't like each other before Jeanie married Joette's stepbrother,

"She's my best friend now," Joette says.

Joette can't do much at this time, except watch television, she says, but she likes to visit with friends.

Joette will continue to need the moral support of family and friends, but she also needs financial support.

She hopes people have ideas for raising funds to help her with the financial expenses from the expected transplant. No fund-raising dates have been set yet.

"I'll take any donations or contributions and any

volunteers," Joette says.

Joette tries to call organizations to find out if she qualifies for benefits, but her strength is minimal because of her disease.

She says that she is eligible for \$291 a year from the Children's Leukemia Fund, and the Leukemia Society may give her \$700. But those two amounts are along way from her goal.

Joette says she isn't looking for one person to come forward with a large sum to help her out.

"I know if everyone just gives a little something we can make it," Joette says.

# Bone marrow transplant her best bet — if she can find a match

With a bone marrow transplant, Joette Kovacik, 21, has an 80 to 90 percent chance of surviving the leukemia from which she suffers.

The former Clarkston student and current Waterford Township resident has not yet found a bone marrow match, but she hopes for the best.

According to the the United States Department of Health and Human Service, less than two decades ago, bone marrow transplants were used as experimentation and not available to the general public. Today the procedure is recognized as an effective treatment for some types of cancers — such as leukemia.

Bone marrow produces blood cells and is a soft spongelike material in the cavities of bones.

In a bone marrow transplant, usually the best source for the transplant is a family member, either a sibling or parent.

Joette's mother is not a match, and her biological father was tested July 17—those results weren't known at press time.

The success of a transplant largely depends on how close the donor's marrow matches, and matching marrow is more complicated than matching blood types.

The statistics for finding a match from a parent or sibling are only about 30 to 40 percent. Obtaining a transplant from an unrelated donor are slim.

The National Marrow Donor Program estimates that chances of receiving a compatible bone marrow from an unrelated donor are narrow, with the odds being 1 in 10,000 to 1 in 20,000.

"The anxiety leading up to the event is often worse than the event itself," Wint said, explaining that education can ease fears and anxieties.

"An important part of my life is being there," he said. "It's a privilege to be a funeral director. I try to be the best.

"We are here to serve the living," Wint said.

Wint shows this through the community outreach program and his wide variety of services.

For instance, to help educate people, the funeral home staff conducts tours of the funeral home.

Plus, the funeral home staff can help with their lending library, brochures, magazines, audio visual tapes and monthly newspaper articles and by speaking to anyone who asks.

A growing part of the business is pre-arrangement services, said Wint, adding that Trust 100 has strength-

"Many people prefer to come in and make arrangements prior to any deaths," Wint said. "It's nice because there is no grief to deal with, and the people have time."

With pre-arrangement services, education is impor-

Often, people talk to the staff about Medicaid and nursing homes, rules and regulations of social services, sheltering assets for the surviving spouse and other general information they may want ahead of time.

Another part of the community outreach program is the Aftercare program.

Before the people leave the funeral home, they are given basic information, said Jenni McGee, funeral director and head of the Aftercare program.

For instance, McGee can provide phone numbers and contact people for support groups in Oakland, Macomb and Wayne counties.

"You can call to get information on suicide supports groups, children's deaths and more," McGee said.

'We get outside phone calls. We like that. It's nice to be seen as a resource," McGee said. "We also have a support group for newly widowed."

The support groups meets at 7 p.m. the first and third Thursdays of every month at the Independence Township Senior Center in Clinton wood Park. Usually, one meeting is a sharing meeting, and the other is for speakers such as lawyers and bankers, McGee said.

"It is a very important part of our community outreach program," Wint said.

"What's most important about the support group is they are the experts," he added.

Those who have experienced a loss can understand, where those that have not experienced a loss cannot. Wint

Another part of the Aftercare is help once the family and friends are gone. McGee sends quarterly publications on grief for about a year and a half after the death unless the person requests longer service.

"We send a special booklet for the holidays," McGee said. "It is a very important booklet because the holidays are often the hardest.

'We spend 99.9 percent of our time with the living and 100 percent of our time doing things for the living, McGee said.

Wint said not too many professions will get a thank you note when it's all over.

"We get thank you notes from families. They say they never could have gotten by without you," Wint said. "That's why we have the community outreach, for them."
