The plant boasted 12-inch leaves and came with a 12-inch root system that Lucky snipped off so the plant would fit onto his mounting glass.

It is not the biggest dandelion he has ever seen, says Lucky, explaining that he once saw a 42-incher in a small town in Indiana, where a creek made a perfect spot for the weeds.

But it is one of the largest he has seen in the Clarkston area, he says.

As he pulled away from the curb, he called out to the Clarkston Farm and Garden Club members, bent over their task, "Beautiful bloomers!"


They laughed.

All proceeds go toward the operation of the five-week Clarkston SCAMP program, which is a day camp for mentally and physically handicapped young people in northern Oakland County. Firefighters get raises

Twenty-eight on-call firefighters in Independence Township received a pay raise May 7.

The township board voted 6-0 to give the firefighters a raise for their efforts. Trustee Daniel Travis was absent from the meeting.

The pay raise would include a 50-cent-per-hour hike for alarms, and 50 cents per hour for training, That would push the alarms-per-hour rate to \$8.50, up from \$8. The training-per-hour rate will now be set at \$7, up from \$6:50.

The raises will begin in the second-quarter payroll.

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
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

Two sets of computers will be purchased for use in the Clarkston school district.

The school board approved the purchase May 13.

The first set — 12 Apple MacIntosh 2si computers — will be used in the Oakland Technical Center-Northwest computer lab.

The new systems will support more sophisticated application programs such as CAD-CAM and Desktop Publishing.

Existing Apple equipment will be distributed throughout the building.

The Apple equipment will be purchased from Olson Anderson's Computers Plus in Novi for \$44,405.

The second set — five IBM Model 55SX computers — will be purchased for reading and math support in each elementary building.

Seventy percent of the purchase will be paid for with a grant. The balance of the cost will be paid for with funds from the district's curriculum budget. The mix in funding will allow flexibility in equipment usage.

Three bids were solicited, but responses are being held because prices are dropping.

The board approved the IBM purchase as long as it does not exceed \$14,000.

Annual Crop Walk slated for June 2

The sixth annual Crop Walk has been scheduled for June 2. The Independence Township Board approved the date May 7.

The Crop Walk was created by Church World Services (CWS). The event raises money to help feed and clothe needy people in this country. CWS has been active in helping the victims of disasters, such as the survivors of Hurricane Hugo.

Last year, about 190 people participated in the Clarkston area. The Crop Walk raised nearly \$7,000 due to their efforts.

Local churches involved in this year's Crop Walk include: St. Daniel Catholic Church, Clarkston United Methodist Church and Calvary Lutheran Church.

The 6-mile walk will wind throughout Clarkston Village and Independence Township.

Springfield Township officials foresee the Shiawassee Basin Park and Preserve as offering the public the best of two worlds.

Covering nearly 390 acres, the project will include two separate sites with each one having its own distinctive uses.

The 300-acre site on Eaton Road has been slated as a nature preserve; while the remaining 90 acres near Davisburg and Ormond roads will be developed as a multipurpose, recreational park.

The Shiawassee Basin Preserve also will encompass Long Lake; which accounts for 1 1/2 miles of shoreline and 31 acres of surface water.

Springfield Township bought the 300-acre site from resident Mary Barker in 1985. The purchase was finalized in 1987 after the township received a grant from the



field Parks and Recreation Department, the entire project should cost around \$610,000 and take a decade to complete. She said the project is to be funded from several

different sources. Swindell said the township has already secured tentative approval for a \$172,000 grant from the DNR. She said the money will probably go toward constructing public access areas and parking lots, if the grant is approved by the state legislature.

Swindell said future funding will be elicited from other DNR supported grants, donations, contributions, park user fees and fund-raisers.

She said the cost will be significantly lower than most projects this size because much of the work will be done on a volunteer basis by local companies and organizations.

Swindell is proud of the project's plans and pleased

that the community had such a large hand in its development.

"While drawing up the master plan, the township tried to stress public involvement; and the community responded," she said. "We usually had between 20 and 60 people attend our public hearings because they realized that it was going to be their park."

Swindell said the Shiawassee Basin Park and Preserve will provide area residents with a facility they can be proud to call their own.

"This type of development will be able to facilitate those people who enjoy nature and sports," she said. "The park will take care of our deficiencies with adult soccer and softball, while the preserve provides a nice, natural getaway.

"It should be very nice when it's finally completed," Swindell added.



Fun Daze on Saturday, May 18, was one of those fun-but-challenging photo assignments.

It was fun because photo opportunities were everywhere. People were so busy that a camera did not attract attention.

It was challenging for the same reason. So many things were happening at the same time that it was difficult to decide which to cover. As I snapped away at runners rounding a pastoral bend, other runners were finishing the one-mile run.

It was a cool morning -- good for running, I was told. Pretty good for photography, too, as long as the sun stayed behind the clouds.

I loved the contrast between the start of the onemile fun run (or walk) and the start of the 5K and 10K runs.

For the 9:30 a.m. fun run and walk, children, men, women, pets and strollers lined up in Depot Park. Balloons were visible above the smiling faces. In the front row, elementary school boys prepared as if they were going to sprint the entire distance, elbowing each other for position. Someday, they may, indeed, sprint the entire distance.

For the 10 a.m. start of the 10K and 5K runs, throngs of runners piled onto Main Street from Depot Road -- Main Street was eerily quiet with the traffic blocked.

At first, runners faced north, and I wondered if they were confused about the direction of the start or if this were merely a runner-thing, to turn their backs on the path they were about to face.

Then parks and rec. employee Ron Davis, with the help of his megaphone, straightened them out, and they faced south, with some of the runners scurrying for the front.

Like the small boys, they jostled for position. However, unlike the boys, they wore dead serious expressions. Even their shoes were serious.

Some kept loose by shaking their arms and jogging in place. From a distance, it looked like a wriggling mass had invaded Clarkston.

The tension of anticipation rose a couple of times, when the runners watched Ron with the megaphone and assumed the race was about to begin with Farewell. It's time to move on.

For four months I got to be a reporter — an honest to goodness reporter for an award-winning newspaper. The Clarkston News. And I loved it!

Little did I know when I arranged with editor Julie Campe to do a journalism internship that the job would capture my heart and mind with such intensity.

For me, the rewards were worth it all.

I learned to write in several hours what previously took me days on my home computer.

And I witnessed the dedication and talent of a staff with an average age much younger than mine. I was impressed.


I will miss my days in the newsroom. It is a happy place: I looked forward to going in to write. And being in the center of Clarkston.


Being relatively new to the Detroit area in December of 1988, I had never heard of Clarkston.

Yet, on Dec. 3 of that year, I joined The Clarkston News staff and began my job of telling people about their community.

Now, on May 21, my last day at The Clarkston News, I feel I know a great deal about the Clarkston area. To school board Trustee Paul Van Klaveren: for taking time to say a sincere hello.

To Assessor David Kramer: for friendship. To board Secretary Sue Hubbard: for being helpful.

To Attorney Gerald Fisher: for taking time from his unquestionably complex undertakings to return phone calls promptly and explain things clearly. To Mrs. Pappas at the board office: for being consistently pleasant in the midst of turnoil. To Laith and Robert at Rudy's: for friendliness. To Commissioner Brent Bair: for making planning commission meetings actually entertaining. To Deputy Clerk Kathy DeRousha: for having all the answers.



"Historically, Detroit Edison has restored 1,800 customers per hour. That had been regarded as the standard. Following the March 27 storm, customers were restored at a rate of 2,491 per hour - 40 percent better than our historical average."

So said Ronald Klinect, manager of Edison's Detroit division, in response to charges quoted here that, after storms, customers suffer without power for a needlessly long time while Edison does everything possible to avoid paying overtime and to shift the cost of protecting the public onto the public, via local tax-supported fire and police departments.

Those charges were made to me, over a period of two weeks, by 28 Edison employees, mostly linemen who, obviously, can be accused of a selfish motive - more overtime pay - although they insist their main concern is that Edison management lies to and shortchanges customers and endangers the public. These charges were strongly seconded by seven fire fighters and police officers, six Edison customers and two employees of Detroit's Department of Public Lighting.

Not true, Klinect said, continuing to use the horrendous March 27 storm - 1,270 primary wires down in southeastern Michigan, nearly 242,000 customers without electricity - as an example.

"Engineers and analysts were brought in immediately.- on overtime - to analyze the storm damage with the aid of a new Outage Analysis computer system which helped them develop the strategy for restoring service based on the actual outage patterns," Klinect said. "Crews were brought in immediately to handle known hazards. By early morning Thursday, all available Detroit Edison linemen and all available local contract linemen were working on the restoration effort... The company, which paid over \$3.3 million overtime and premium pay relating to the restoration effort, did not attempt to avoid necessary overtime to restore service.

"When we determine that restoration will take longer than 24 hours, it is ineffective to have crews work 24 hours straight and then sleep during the productive daylight hours. Safety is, of course, a prime area of concern."

As for taking advantage of public services, Klinect said: "In some instances police and fire departments stand by wire-down locations as part of their commitment to protecting public safety. Detroit Edison appreciates their assistance, although we do not depend on it or request it. When we are aware that a location is being covered by police or fire personnel, that location receives top priority for dispatching a Detroit Edison crew or public safety team . . . If the area cannot be adequately secured, the teams will stand by until line crews can do the actual restoration work."

What about charges that Edison cuts corners on maintenance of power lines? "Nothing could be further from the truth," Klinect said. "... In 1991 Detroit Edison will spend \$24 million on ... removing obstacles such as trees near power lines. ... The company conducts an extensive overall system maintenance and improvement program which will total over \$100 million in 1991." There were 630 full-time Edison and contract linemen in 1985; today there are more than 740, Klinect said. It's not easy for the average citizen - or columnist - to evaluate those million-dollar figures, or to determine the validity of charges of needlessly slow, risky restoration service. That's why we have a state Public Service Commission. Last week, a lineman told me the PSC will review tapes that Edison routinely makes of damage reports phoned in by customers and dispatching of work crews. He said these tapes prove the linemen are right and, he added, the PSC denied Edison's request to edit the tapes before turning them over. Edison spokesperson Lorie Kessler said the tapes are ' one of several restoration-related items to be discussed at a meeting this week between the PSC and Klinect. She said Edison didn't ask to edit the tapes. Stay plugged in.

I've learned about its government, schools, neighborhoods and people. I've watched both struggles and victories.

Overall, working as a reporter in this community has been a beneficial experience.

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Work together for schools

I don't profess to know everything about how our school system operates or what our community does to build its future.

Most of my information, like most of you reading this, comes from The Clarkston News. I do know that some serious questions need to be asked, based on some of the facts that have been presented to this community through this media. Those questions concern leadership, pride and opportunity.

Leadership: The leadership of our school system over the past years has been in the hands of past President Janet Thomas and with other board members, most of who no longer serve.

As with most governing bodies, new administrations must live with the problems that are created by or not addressed by past administrations. This appears to be the case with the present school board, with the exception of Mrs. Thomas.

Looking at the past, the record shows:

In early May 1988, the old school board unanimously approved retaining the services of an architect, Charles Sherman, Inc. (CSI). About a week later, a letter from the school district's legal counsel was reviewed with Mrs. Thomas. The content of the letter expressed the opinion that the contract should not be signed in its present form. Even after reviewing this letter the contract was signed by Mrs. Thomas.

Just as importantly, this letter was not brought to the attention of the full school board. Payments over the next two years to CSI have been over \$600,000 and seemingly with little or nothing to show for it.

As I understand it now, the new school board is considering a proposal from Mrs. Thomas to cut some important programs to save about \$600,000. Would this have been necessary if in the first place an error in leadership had never occurred?

The condition of the facilities and the overcrowding of the school is the direct result of a lack of planning by the old school board and administration. Today, there is still no master plan by which the present administration can manage this school system.

In the last bond issue election, the board voted unanimously to support the bond. Mrs. Thomas, as well as

a few other members supported the opposition against the bond.

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. Is this the kind of leadership for the future our school system needs?

Pride: I moved to Clarkston three years ago because my wife grew up in this area and this community had shown a lot of pride in itself. Today, I see that at least relative to the school system, this may not be necessarily true.

A rift has developed, probably due to economics of growth, in this community. This is very evident from the differences between the "blinders on, better schools at any cost" Blue Ribbon Kids Committee and the "keep your hands out of my pocket" so-called Red Ribbon Committee. And, unfortunately, school board members are being caught up in this battle.

I must say that I can see no winners in this battle, only losers. The losers will be our children and this community. I propose that the leaders of these two organizations call a truce and work together to solve the problems of this school system.

Opportunity: Change is inevitable. And it appears that the growth of this community is inevitable. But, with change comes opportunity, at least for those who will accept it. This community needs to grasp the upcoming opportunity to change the school board and elect new leadership with fresh ideas. We need to change the way the community supports the schools, not with red or blue ribbons. Why not purple? With cooperation, we can achieve the necessary results.

The opportunity and need for change is at hand now. Demand that the school board drafts and publishes its master plan to repair and rebuild the pride in our schools and our community.

Council repeats B&B reasoning

A recent letter to the editor again surfaced the issue of the Bed and Breakfast ordinance in which it was stated that the Clarkston Village Council had only two good reasons for not permitting bed and breakfasts in the Village of Clarkston.

The village council carefully considered the issue and had numerous valid reasons for not allowing bed and breakfast establishments within the village.

Enclosed is a resolution that appeared in the council minutes of April 8 but was not widely read. It is requested that The Clarkston News reprint the entire resolution, so the public may be aware of the reasons for the village council's actions.

Resolution re: proposed bed and breakfast ordinance

After extensive work by the planning commission and review of the issues by it and the Clarkston Village Council, the council decided, at its meeting on Feb. 15, not to adopt any bed and breakfast ordinance, a decision which required no formal motion since no affirmative action was taken.

However, there appears to some public misconception that the council merely tabled further consideration of the ordinance at that meeting.

The misconception may have arisen from the fact that deliberations concerning the proposed ordinance spanned numerous meetings and several months. The council's comments and action from such meetings must be viewed as a whole to fully understand the council's action.

So that the public is fully informed as to the final action of the council and the reasons for such action, the council adopts this resolution not to amend the village ordinances to allow bed and breakfasts.

The numerous reasons for not adopting any ordi-

nance change, as expressed by individual council members during the ordinance hearing at council meetings, can be summarized as follows:

1. Bed and breakfasts are typically in communities where there is a great demand for lodging such as tourist destinations, college towns, etc. Clarkston is none of these Moreover, several new hotels have been built in Auburn Hills, just 15 minutes away, and more are apparently planned for Independence Township.

2. The council is not opposed to bed and breakfasts per se, but rather is concerned about their effect on the community and the integrity of our residential zoning in particular.

3. Clarkston is unique among Michigan villages and cities in that it has maintained the long-standing relative balance between its existing commercial and residential areas, insuring a desirable quality of life for its citizens.

4. This has been possible only through the strict adherence, by council after council, to the village zoning plan which was formally adopted as an ordinance almost 20 years ago.

5. Changes in the existing zoning plan should be made only when the benefits to be derived by the village as a whole, and its citizens, outweigh any risks which amendment might pose for the continuing integrity of our zoning ordinances.

6. Accordingly, when proposals are made to amend the ordinances, the council cannot focus on who has requested the change and what their good intentions may be since, in time, they may no longer own the property. Rather it has to determine the relative long-term benefits and detriments to the community of what is being requested. Thus, the council has, on numerous occasions in the past, had to turn down requests by man well-respected village residents for zoning changes or permission to expand nonconforming uses.

7. After extensive research, the village attorney advised the council that under current case law, bed and breakfasts were considered to be a "commercial" use of property. He also advised that there is no constitutionally valid way to absolutely restrict their number if they were allowed.

8. It would be unfair, having disallowed expansions

of other non-conforming business uses in residential areas in the past, to allow bed and breakfasts which are recognized as commercial uses. Likewise, our zoning prohibits two-family dwellings in residential areas. Yet allowing bed and breakfasts in those same areas would create even more diverse traffic and house many more individuals totally unknown to their neighbors than would a twofamily home.

9. If the council were to set minimum requirements for floor space and the number of rooms for bed and breakfasts, only larger homes would immediately qualify, which is unfair. Moreover, owners of smaller homes might add on just to establish bed and breakfasts, thus possibly making the homes too costly to own and maintain in the future unless used as B&Bs.

10. Any bed and breakfast ordinance would have to include a strict licensing scheme, which could be difficult, if not impossible, to enforce and costly to village taxpayers.

11. Decisions to reside in the village should be based on a sincere desire to live in and enjoy our unique residential atmosphere. They should not be dependent on whether there is also some commercial use to which residential property can be put.

12. The proposed ordinance appeared to have no widespread support. Only a very few village residents attended meetings in support of the proposal. Further, although B&B proponents publicly asked residents to call council members and indicate their support, no calls were received by any member of the council.

13. The council said it could approve B&Bs in multiple residential and business districts since that would not endanger single-family residential zoning. In fact, the planning commission spent extensive time an effort drafting such an ordinance. However, B&B proponents indicated they didn't want any ordinance if it did not include single-family residential areas. Thus, the council determined that there was no point in adopting any ordinance.



Man charged in death of Springfield girl

A 20-year-old Pontiac man has been charged with the death of an 11-year-old Springfield Township girl who died in automobile accident March 3.

Edward M. Aldrich has been charged with negligent homicide after his truck slammed into a Dodge Caravan on Joslyn Road, Orion Township. Wendy Upton, a sixthgrader at Springfield Christian Academy, was killed in the collision.

Upton reportedly was on her way home from a roller-skating outing with a schoolmate and her family. Kristy Branson, 11, and her parents, Robert and Nanette Branson, were all seriously injured in the crash and were taken to Pontiac Osteopathic Hospital for treatment.

Aldrich and his passenger, Greg Iliades, 17, of Auburn Hills, were taken to Pontiac General Hospital and were released the same day.

Aldrich pleaded not guilty at his arraigned in 52nd District Court, Rochester Hills. He faces a preliminary examination May 22 before Robert Robert Shipper. He was released because he promised to appear in court for his hearing or forfeit \$10,000.

Negligent homicide is a misdemeanor crime and carries a maximum penalty of two years imprisonment.

Assault case dismissed

An assault case against a 22-year-old Independence man who allegedly stabbed his mother in the stomach was dismissed last week.

Charges of felonious assault against Robert J. Salvino were dropped May 16 because his mother, Maria Deneen, 46, failed to make it to the second scheduled preliminary examination. The exam was held in 52nd District Court, Independence Township, before Judge Gerald McNally.

Deneen is reportedly ailing from cancer. She presently is undergoing treated at an institution in New York.

Charges stemmed from an April 8 incident where Salvino allegedly stabbed Deneen in her Circle Drive, Independence Township, home. He fled the scene but was apprehended later that evening at a Sashabaw Road gas station.

Due to the circumstances surrounding the dismissal, assault charges could be reissued against Salvino if his mother decides to do so.



Independence noted for effective planning

Some developers have complained about Independence Township's "thorough" site plan review process but planners in the state have praised it.

Independence Township recently was recognized by a statewide planning association for the way it conducts site plan reviews.

The Michigan Society of Planning Officials (MSPO) has recognized Independence Township by using it as a case example in a recently released handbook.

The MSPO Handbook is a comprehensive guide to community planning in Michigan. Its focus is on providing practical tools and techniques to professional planners, planning commissioners and elected officials to deal with common planning and zoning problems.

Site plan review is a process whereby documents


and drawings specified in the zoning ordinance are reviewed to ensure that a development proposal complies with local, state and federal regulations.

As stated in the handbook:

"The information required for the site plan process in Independence Township is very comprehensive. In addition to an application form, the regulations set forth a long list of requirements pertaining to the actual contents of the site plans.

"Perhaps the most unique part of the Independence Township site plan review process is the process itself. The township follows a very thorough review process designed to answer as many questions up-front as possible, thereby reducing the potential for conflict later in the process.'







Board sets superintendent goals for 1991-92

A road map for the school superintendent was unanimously approved by the Clarkston Board of Education May 13.

The one-year list of goals and objectives was determined through a series of board meetings.

The document sets five key areas of emphasis for the superintendent. Within those areas, short-term responsibilities and ongoing activities are listed.

The superintendent responsibilities include the following:

Identifying and clarifying board-superintendent responsibilities

By Sept. 30, 1991, the superintendent must facilitate the board's vision statement and an evaluation of the board, and arrange the hiring of an outside consultant.

Ongoing activities in this area include coordinating board retreats and visits by the consultant and evaluating the board's evaluation process.

Development of administrative procedures manual

By Jan. 13, 1992, the superintendent must com-

plete all steps necessary to publish an administrative procedures manual.

Ongoing activities include adding new procedures and reviewing procedures on a regular basis. Developing a plan to adjust the district's budget in

response to the 1992.93 tax freeze By Aug. 31, 1991, the superintendent must iden-tify new sources of revenue through additional millage, grants, etc., and must identify budget reductions for 1991-92.

Ongoing activities include seeking revenues from alternate sources, monitoring the 1991-92 budget for further reductions, identifying further reductions for 1992-93 and identifying other alternate sources of revenue. Developing and conducting a community survey

By Oct. 14, 1991, the superintendent must work with the board and a consultant to develop a community survey, conduct the survey, analyze results and identify communication strategies using the information.

Ongoing activities include implementing a communications strategy using information from the survey, interpreting results in regard to future elections and considering timelines for future surveys.

Concluding and implementing the long-range plan By Aug. 31, 1991, the superintendent must conclude all steps to obtain approval of action plans by the board of education.

Ongoing activities include implementing and monitoring action plans, developing building improvement plans and updating all plans.







Clarkston schools try for national science gran

Clarkston school officials and a few residents have applied for the largest grant in the district's history in hopes of creating a Center for the Awareness and Promotion of Science.

The heavy, multi-page grant application was sent to the National Institute of Health (NIH) last month.

If approved, the \$718,000 grant would be used in a three-year program to encourage more Clarkston students to pursue biomedical science careers.

Central to the program is a partnership between the Henry Ford Health System, Oakland University and Clarkston Community Schools.

The program originated at the hands of President Bush and the nation's governors who declared that "by the year 2000, students in the United States will be the world leaders in science and mathematics achievement.

Building on this initiative, the NIH and the U.S. Alcohol: Drug Abuse and Mental Health Administration. announced its \$4 million Science Education Partnership Award in February.

The call for grant applications came to the attention of physicist Joseph Helpern, a Clarkston resident and a director of research in the Department of Neurology at Henry Ford Hospital.

After talking with principals within the Clarkston district, Helpern was directed to the district's curriculum director, Judith Backes, who is now project director of the proposal.

The two, with help from a variety of other professionals from the three organizations, drafted the program and completed the 51-page application.

Competition for the grant money is "very fierce," according to Helpern.

Though it is unusual for a school district to apply for a grant of this magnitude - typically a university or college might apply --- the Clarkston proposal is "very innovative," Helpern says.

The thrust of the Center for the Awareness and Promotion of Science brings working biomedical scientists into direct contact with young students on a regular basis.

Divided into three core areas, the program consists of "the scientist connection," the "research experience" and "development and dissemination."

The core activities are expected to affect about 2,600 elementary school students and 3,000 junior and senior high students.

The program could include 100 elementary teachers and 50 secondary teachers, the application explains.

An initial peer review will assign a ranking to those applying for a portion of the Science Education Partnership Award.

The grant allocations will be made in order of the ranking until the entire award has been spent.







Master pitched the final inning, giving up one hit and striking out one Dragon.


The Dragons led 2-0 after the first but Clarkston tied it in the second when Fife walked and Burke blasted a home run.





Despite winning the Whitehead Award, Nick re-


mains modest about his work. He said helping others is the reason behind his volunteerism.
