



Absentee ballots available

If you can't make it to the polls for the Aug. 6 parks and recreation millage election, there's still time to fill out an absentee ballot.

The Independence Township Clerk's office is presently distributing absentee ballots to all registered voters.

At the election, voters will be asked to approve one mill for five years to pay for the maintenance of Clintonwood Park and its senior center on Clarkston Road; Sashabaw Plains Park on Maybee Road; and Deer Lake Beach on White Lake Road.

The operating millage would allow township general fun money normally set aside for the parks to be allocated toward the restoration of Baycourt Park on Andersonville Road.

If a one-mill request is approved by voters, residents would be required to pay the township \$1 for every \$1,000 in assessed property valuation each year.

That means a homeowner with a \$100,000 home assessed at half its market value (\$50,000) would pay \$50

a year to the township for parks and recreation operations.

The deadline for absentee ballots to be mailed is Saturday, Aug. 3, at 2 p.m. However, those qualified to vote absentee may vote in the clerk's office until 4 p.m. on Monday, Aug. 5.

In order to vote absentee, you must qualify under one of the following conditions:

- A person expects to be absent from the community in which he or she is registered for the entire time the polls are open on election day.

- An individual is physically unable to attend the polls without the assistance of another.

- A person cannot attend the polls because of the tenets of his religion.

- An individual has been appointed an election precinct inspector in a precinct other than where he resides.

- The individual is 60 years of age or older.

- The person cannot attend the polls because he is incarcerated in jail.

Village opposes House bill controlling wetlands

Wetlands, so far, fall under the jurisdiction of local government.

And the Clarkston Village Council wants to keep it that way.

This desire for continued local control prompted the council to vote 6-0 on a resolution opposing a Michigan House bill that would amend the existing Goemaere-Anderson Wetland Protection Act.

The resolution will be mailed to Gov. John Engler, state Rep. David Honigman (R-West Bloomfield), all state senators and some other municipal officials.

The proposed House Bill No. 6208, introduced on Nov. 8, 1990, by Rep. Michael Griffen (D-Jackson), would prohibit local units of government from passing regulatory ordinances specifically related to the protection of wetlands, giving that power solely to the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR).

Members of the council voiced their concern about the DNR's ability to regulate wetlands, citing recent budget cuts in the DNR and its heavy bureaucracy.

That concern is listed in the council's resolution (with that part of the resolution even printed in bold face type), stating, "WHEREAS, the Michigan Department of Natural Resources has recently experienced severe budget reductions and does not contain the resources necessary to assure the protection of the Village's lakes, streams, floodplains, floodways and wetlands."

The resolution states that wetlands throughout the country are "disappearing at a rapid rate as a result of development."

And it adds, "The President of the United States has pledged there shall be no net loss in the amount of wetlands, and continued and increased local control of wetland regulation will be important to ensure that the President's pledge is a reality."

The council isn't the only local government body in Michigan to be concerned about Griffen's bill. On June

12, the Wetland Review Board of the Charter Township of West Bloomfield also passed a resolution opposing the proposed amendment.

In fact, the Clarkston Village Council copied West Bloomfield's resolution nearly word-for-word.

Hunting recommendations expected soon

Orion and Independence townships are going to have to wait about two more weeks before they get to review recommendations from a Hunting Area Control Committee (HACC) on hunting conditions around Heather Lake.

According to Sgt. Larry Sargent of the Department of Natural Resources (DNR), the HACC has yet to conduct a field investigation, which is vital in the evaluation process. He said the members of the HACC haven't been able to schedule an investigation because a few of the members have been on vacation.

Sargent said, however, that the townships should be

receiving a copy of the HACC's recommendations in two to three weeks.

Once the townships receive the recommendations, it will be up to their executive boards to accept or reject the HACC's solutions.

The controversy around Heather Lake stems from the shooting of geese on the lake last fall. The property is off Clarkston Road and lies in Independence and Orion townships.

Several residents contend that the continuance of hunting endangers homeowners around the lake. Hunting advocates, on the other hand, say the abundance of geese is causing the bacteria levels in the lake to reach hazardous proportions.

A public hearing was held on the issue June 11.







THE TOWER has long been the park's predominant feature. Independence Township officials are hoping it will be the symbol of the park's re-emergence.





THIS BUILDING has been slated as the new teen center. It will provide the township's


teens with a place to hang out and engage in several indoor activities.

New standards set

Farmers and other large-parcel land owners will have a few extra steps to go through when selling off some of their property in Springfield Township.

The township board voted unanimously July 10 to approve a new ordinance that sets standards and regulations for the division of property.

The "acreage division ordinance," No. 61, sets the standards for division of acreage parcels, which is any parcel of land in Springfield Township that is not located in or part of a recorded plat (subdivision), or a condominium development approved by the township.

Applications will be reviewed and compared to maps and other information available to the township relating to topography, natural resource features, soil suitability for a septic system, soil system, soil surveys, slopes and other factors relevant to the regulations and standards found in the ordinance.

New canvasser named

Cecelia Yarber has been named the newest addition to the Independence Township Board of Canvassers.

On July 2, the township board voted 6-0 to have Yarber replace Ann Conklin, a township department head, on the board of canvassers. Trustee Mel Vaara was absent from the meeting.

A person on the board of canvassers tabulates vote totals in all elections.

Township Clerk Joan McCrary said Yarber is replacing Conklin so the township can have someone outside its offices help tabulate the votes. She said the change was in no way disciplinary.

Since Yarber is taking over Conklin's position, her term will expire on Dec. 31, 1993. Other members of this board include Jeanette Banks, Chris Shull and Nancy Woodruff.

Planners give OK

A 14-lot site condominium project has been given the green light from the Independence Township Planning Commission.

On July 11, the planning commission granted final site plan approval for the South Village Park development. The vote was 4-0, with Harry Mosher, Steven Secatch and Richard Oppmann absent from the meeting.

The 26-acre development will be located north of Andersonville Road, between Clement and Hillcrest roads. The property is multiply zoned with eight acres designated single-family residential and the remaining 18 acres zoned suburban residential.

A site condominium resembles a subdivision, except the homeowners own their own homes and the "building envelope." All the property between the buildings is owned by the condominium association, which is comprised of the homeowners.

Some of the wetlands on the site reportedly contain trash, which will be removed by the developer, Clarkston Land Corp.

The existing wetlands, which make up 60 percent of the western boundary, will be maintained in the future by the condominium association.

DDA expansion covers White Lake Road

The Downtown Development Authority (DDA) has officially added White Lake Road to its boundaries.

On July 16, the Independence Township Board voted 6-0 to approve the amended plan. Trustee Jean Saile was absent from the meeting.

The amendment states that the 1 1/2-mile stretch along White Lake Road from Dixie Highway to Andersonville Road be added to the DDA's jurisdiction. The area is primarily industrial in nature.

The DDA was created about five years ago to improve landscaping, lighting, water and sewer along parts of Dixie Highway and M-15.

Funding for the DDA comes from tax increment financing, which captures "excess" taxes from a base year and returns them for use within DDA boundaries.

That money — from within the DDA boundaries only — is used for improvements with the DDA only.


According to township officials, the construction of a 500,000-gallon water tower at the corner of White Lake Road and Dixie Highway will be the first phase of revitalization.

The "spheroid" shaped tower will cost \$45,000, which is to be paid from the DDA's budget. It's expected to be completed sometime next spring.



On the breeze

My first ride in a hot air balloon was highlighted by Ronda Cheever's jump from about 4,000 feet.

By the time we could reach the edge of the basket to take a look, she was already a tiny dot. Minutes seemed to pass. Suddenly, her parachute appeared, and we watched her float gently to the earth.

The sunset jump marked Ronda's 843rd skydive, and the Tecumseh resident has over 9 hours of freefall time to her credit.

I'll admit, after her jump, the rest of the balloon ride was anti-climatic, though still wonderful.

With the ascent in Capt. Stan Tokarski's blue and gold Entre Computer Center balloon on Saturday, July 20, we left behind the sweltering above-90 temperatures. The temperature cools about 3 degrees per thousand feet, said Capt. Stan.

A Kalamazoo resident, Stan — a part-owner of an Entre Computer Center — has been ballooning for three years.

It all began at age 14 when he helped tether balloons and at the end of the day got to ride, he said.

He then moved to fixed wing aircraft, building an Ultra Light in his mother's garage. Eventually, ballooning called him, he said.

"They each have their different aspects. This way, you can go low and slow like a bird," he said.

Cost is a problem, he admitted, explaining that his ballooning equipment and trailer cost more than \$35,000. Plus, the 18-20 gallons of liquid propane per flight costs about 62 cents per gallon. Then there's the insurance and the \$250-\$275 annual inspection, not to mention a truck to haul all the equipment.

And the crew! Fortunately, his wife, Sandy, and their friends Carla and Scott Richards follow him around on the ground during balloon flights — in exchange for dinner now and then.

As we rode silently with the wind, we felt no breeze — we were the breeze. Below us, Springfield Township was lost in haze. We spotted I-75 and then Dixie Highway at Davisburg Road. Eventually, we could see Independence Oaks County Park and the Brandon Township trailer park northeast of it.

We flew low and slow above the tree tops, causing dogs to bark and run crazily about. Capt. Stan explained that when he shoots propane into the balloon, a sound is emitted that is out of humans' hearing range but is very loud to dogs.

Horses, too, looked up from their grazing, as did children and adults.

Children in a backyard swimming pool squealed, "Over here, over here!" and then waved wildly.

Residents looked up from their gardening and watering and smiled and waved. Some even conversed: "How's the weather up there?" or "Hello! How are you?"

The balloon basket touched the tops of some towering oak trees, giving us an idea of what birds must see before they land. What a view!

Eventually, we spotted a large open area in which to land — turned out to be Eileen D'Anna's home on Perry Lake Road. We soon met Eileen's family as well as neighbors Will and Sheila Rymer and Nina Flanigan and Joe Cook.

Capt. Stan tethered the balloon and took them all up for short up & down rides and then shared the sparkling grape juice with the group.

"It's people like you who make ballooning possible," he said, toasting them after saying the balloonists' prayer.

After that, the crew quickly gathered the equipment, and we returned — by roads this time — to Springfield Oaks County Park.

Storm July 7

As you know, on a quiet Sunday evening, about 8 p.m., all hell broke loose in and around Independence Township. It was a most trying time for most of the residents in this area.

Even though emotions ran high, as always, the people in this area set aside their own feelings and made it through this most uncomfortable time, which lasted from one to four days, without electricity. I would like to thank all the residents in understanding our problems as well as theirs.

As we are giving thanks, we have a couple of "big ones" that must be mentioned.

Regarding the Detroit Edison Co., I have heard a lot of negatives from the news media and from people on the street. However, Detroit Edison did a whale of a job in getting the electricity restored as quickly as possible.

They brought in crews from out of state as well as out-of-state companies. We in this area are very fortunate to have a supervisor (Mike Darby) who will work as a team with our department to speed up any repairs to be made. A very special thanks to Mike Darby and Detroit Edison Co.

I had made an assessment after taking with my people that approximately 75 percent of our township was going to be without power for three to seven days.

At this time, I contacted superintendent of Clarkston schools, Gary Haner, and his assistant, Mel Vaara, to open up Sashabaw Jr. High School as a center for bathroom facilities, including showers, and kitchen facilities for the American Red Cross to serve lunches and dinners.

We also used this facility as a pickup for dry ice and drinking water. Mr. Haner and Mr. Vaara were fully receptive in my request, not only for the use of building but also for the much appreciated help of the custodians.

I did not have time to work closely with the American Red Cross, but, as usual, when needed they moved in and did a fine job. Thank you, American Red Cross.



Now or never

Alma St. Croix to receive bone marrow transplant from 6-year-old daughter

For Alma St. Croix, it's now or never.

The former Independence Township resident and mother of three suffers from myelodysplastic syndrome, a leukemic blood disorder.

She has been awaiting a bone marrow transplant, but her condition has worsened so quickly in recent weeks that doctors have decided to attempt a transplant with her 6-year-old daughter, Krisie's, bone marrow, though it is not a perfect match.

The problem, according to Alma's mother-in-law, Tillie, who was appointed family spokesperson, is that Alma's platelets have dropped dangerously low. Without

Bone marrow testing set for Aug. 7

A bone marrow donor drive has been set for Wednesday, Aug. 7, at the Chrysler Training Center at I-696 and Van Dyke in Centerline.

My Friends Care Leukemia Fund is paying for the about \$50 blood tests, the results of which will be added to the National Bone Marrow Register, according to Tillie St. Croix of Independence Township, whose daughter-in-law, Alma, is undergoing a bone marrow transplant in August.

Including registration, the test takes about 15 minutes, said Tillie, explaining that a small amount of blood will be drawn and sent to a laboratory, where it will be tested.

"They just want people on the registry," said Tillie, explaining that these tests won't help her daughter-in-law but will help those who need bone marrow transplants in the future.

a transplant, doctors predict that Alma will have only three months to live.

So Alma, 32, a Pontiac resident, will be admitted to Harper Hospital on Aug. 5 in preparation for the operation. Her daughter will be admitted Aug. 15 to Children's Hospital. The marrow is to be harvested that day and given to Alma on Aug. 16, if everything goes well.

That's a very big "if," said Tillie.

"They were very blunt with her. They told her she could die on the table," Tillie said.

If everything runs smoothly, Alma will be in the hospital for 100 days. She can wear her own clothing and may watch television and the video cassette recorder. She may also receive mail.

"I sure would like to encourage people to send her cards," said Tillie.

However, Alma can't come in contact with live plants or any type of planter that is likely to have living organisms — such as moss or bark — on it, she said.

Assigned one nurse, Alma must remain free of disease since her body will be void of its own immune system while it's trying to accept Krisie's marrow.

Alma's health insurance company will pay much of the more than \$208,000 hospital bill that will be incurred if there are no complications. She and her husband, Jon, will be responsible for \$68,000 of that amount, as well as 100 percent of Krisie's bill.

To help defray the cost, Alma's family is raising money to be donated in Alma's name to My Friends Care Leukemia Fund. Money not used to pay Alma's medical expenses will remain with the fund to help other with cancer patients' medical expenses.

So far, the fund-raising is going well, said Tillie. A Fourth of July yard sale up north raised about \$2,015, and a yard sale this weekend in Independence Township netted \$765.

In addition, a bowlathon has been set for noon to 6 p.m. Saturday, Aug. 3, at Lakewood Lanes on West Huron near Elizabeth Lake Road in Waterford Township. The owner donated all 14 lanes for the fund-raiser, and

other businesses in the area donated all sorts of prizes, said Tillie.

Plus, Pine Knob and the Palace have allowed Alma's fund-raising group to run concession stands at the theater and stadium, allowing them to keep 10 percent after taxes.

"It has been amazing what's going on," said Tillie. "It's unbelievable. Everyone is pitching in to do what they can do ... There's a lot of good people out there."

Final plat approval will come before the board at its next scheduled meeting.

Heavy trucks to be blocked by township ordinance

The Independence Township Board hopes an overweight vehicle ordinance can clear back roads of trucking violators.

On July 16, township trustees voted 6-0 to approve the first reading of an ordinance that could help combat the problem of overloaded trucks bypassing weigh stations on I-75. Trustee Jean Saile was absent.

The board is to consider approving the second reading and adopting the ordinance on Aug. 20.

According to Sgt. Joe Quisenberry of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department, a lot of truck drivers traveling with too much weight have been avoiding the township's weigh stations, which are located on I-75. He said these trucks usually take gravel roads, causing potential traffic hazards due to the trucks' size.

The proposed ordinance calls for an Oakland County

deputy, with training in weight regulations and scales, to tour secondary roads in search of "backroad runners."

The deputy, who must be in a marked vehicle, has the option of weighing the vehicle with a portable scale or using a stationary scale at the nearest weigh station.

If a vehicle is found to be too heavy, by standards set by the Michigan Department of State Highways and Transportation, the driver will be issued an appearance ticket. The driver must also make arrangements to lighten the load before he can proceed.

All unloaded materials are the sole responsibility of the owner or driver.

If a vehicle is found to be carrying more than 1,000 pounds over its limit, the company will be fined 3 cents for each pound over the standard. For each additional 1,000 pounds the truck is overweight, the fee per pound is raised by an additional three cents.

The only exception to this rule is when the load is more than 10,000 pounds overweight. Then the owner is fined 20 cents per pound over the limit.

However, the judge at 52nd District Court, Independence Township, will have the final say in the total cost of the fine when the violating company appears in court.

Supervisor Frank Ronk said this ordinance will be

an effective way of dealing with violators.

"Once we get a few of these trucks on the side roads, it should stop," Ronk said. "Word of mouth in the trucking industry is quicker than telecommunications."

Heart attack kills teen at Pine Knob

A teen-ager from Milford suffered a heart attack and died at the Pine Knob Music Theater July 15.

Jeffrey Treadway, 19, was pronounced dead at Pontiac Osteopathic Hospital after collapsing on the ski hill.

Oakland County Sheriff's Department Sgt. Joe Quisenberry said the teen was apparently walking up the ski hill, directly behind the stage, trying to get a glimpse of the performers near the loading area.

David Lee Roth was the feature attraction that evening.

Treadway reportedly had a history of heart problems and was rushed to POH after suffering a cardiac arrest. He was pronounced dead around 10:30 p.m.

Juveniles arrested in auto crime spree

Three Waterford youths were arrested in connection with auto-break-ins committed Tuesday, July 16.

The three youths were ages 14, 15 and 16; and a warrant was also issued for a 17-year-old Waterford man in connection with the break-ins.

The three youths have been turned over to Oakland County Probate Court with charges pending. They were arrested on Church Street, Independence Township.

According to Oakland County Sheriff's Department officials, the youths were linked with at least three crimes in the Clarkston area. But police officials said that if anyone had an auto break-in around the July 16, they should contact the Independence Township substation at 625-8391.







Power company nets OK for Springfield site plan

It was close, but Consumers Power Co. squeaked by with a site plan approval from the Springfield Township Board.

That means Consumers Power can go ahead with plans to build a 12-foot by 22-foot shelter, a generator, liquid petroleum gas tank and a security fence.

The board voted 4-3 July 10 to approve the project, with a few conditions. Voting yes were: Clerk J. Calvin Walters and trustees Nancy Strole, Margaret Bloom and Dennis Vallad. Voting no were: Supervisor Collin Walls, Treasurer Lois Stiles and Trustee Charles Oaks.

According to Walls, the shelter is to be used to house Consumers Power's radio equipment.

"They need to hook into the radio tower there so they can maintain radio contact with their service people in the field," he said.

The tower, north of Rattalee Lake Road and east of Gibbs Road, is a 280-foot structure owned by Radio Towers, Inc. Consumers Power leases the land from Radio Towers, Inc. The tower is on a hill — one of the highest points in Springfield Township.

According to Joe Smyk, a representative of Consumers Power, all maintenance and problem-solving for the site will be handled by Consumers Power.

After Smyk's presentation, a few residents voiced concern about TV and radio interference — caused by the tower, they said — in addition to microwaves allegedly emitted by equipment on the tower.

But Walls explained that the residents' problems had nothing to do with the site plan for Consumers Power.

"These are problems which occur now and have

Shiawassee project nets \$129,000 grant

Families soon will be able to enjoy Shiawassee Basin park in Springfield Township.

The township board unanimously approved a state resolution July 10 that provides a \$129,000 state grant for park improvements as long as the township provides \$43,000 of that money.

The money will be set aside for engineering and construction of two ball parks and one soccer field and for two parking areas, a large one near the fields and a small one near Eaton Road.

In addition to the fields and parking areas, the 300-acre preserve will sport three trail loops — more than three miles of natural walk paths.

An entrance and picnic area with shelters and comfort stations will also be constructed.

Construction of the project could begin as early as this fall.

been occurring in the past. It is an issue to be addressed, but this site plan will not make the problems any better or any worse. They are not an issue as far as what Consumers Power has planned. The tower is owned by another party," Walls said.

Trustee Bloom asked if the site needed a backup generator.

"If there is no backup generator, and we have power outage like we now have, how are planes suppose to see the tower when it doesn't have lights?" she asked.

Smyk, who said Consumers Power does not control the tower but only leases it, said most towers don't have backup generators. However, the Federal Aviation Administration requires all power outages to be reported, so officials know the tower is without lighting. However, the generator to be used by Consumers Power will benefit the tower, he said.

Bloom later asked Smyk if Consumers Power would be willing to chlorinate a section of Rattalee Lake Road in front of the site plan area to help control dust on the gravel road.

Smyk said that it was probably illegal for Consumers Power to do anything to a public road but that he would check with the owners of the tower.

After the presentation and discussion, Trustee Strole made a motion to approve the site plan with a few conditions.

The conditions included: installing an alarm recycling system that would stop emitting a sound after a certain amount of time so it would not keep sounding for several days; changing the landscaping plans to show plants 8 feet apart instead of 15 feet apart; and submitting a copy of the 24-hour Consumers Power emergency phone numbers in Jackson to the Springfield Township Fire Department and the Oakland County Sheriff's Department.

After the meeting, the dissenting voters explained why they voted against the site plan.

According to Walls, the site plan was the poorest prepared he had ever seen.

"Many of the aspects of the site plan which were

asked for were not on the plan. I just didn't feel it met with township requirements," he said.

Stiles also said the plan was poorly prepared.

"I didn't feel it met the basic requirements. I feel we should treat everyone the same, and this plan had inadequacies in the landscaping and just didn't meet requirements the board expects to see from anyone else," she said.

Oaks, who voiced concerns about the exhaust system, also said the plans were poorly prepared.

"I feel they could have used someone local to prepare the plan and had it prepared correctly," he said. "They (Consumers Power) tried to sidestep the board and get approval without presenting the site plan to board. The plan didn't show where the door was going to be, what wattage of the lights were going to be. So I didn't feel the board had the needed information to go by."

Springfield asks for primary election money

The Presidential Preference Primary Election set for March 17, 1992, didn't get any support from the Springfield Township Board.

On July 10, the board unanimously approved a resolution to ask the state Legislature to eliminate the election or to pay the township in advance for its election expenses.

The township asked for \$1,000 for each of its four precincts if the Legislature wished to still hold the election. The money would be placed in escrow, with any remaining funds being returned to the state.

The Presidential Preference Primary is to be held for Republican and Democratic party presidential candidates.

The election will determine Michigan's preference for presidential candidates in each party. The election obligates Michigan delegates to support the winning candidates at each political party's national convention held in summer 1992.

Volleyball gold medalist one bad girl

Phyllis Bradford took a little time off from sports.

"I never touched my shoes for 30 years," said Bradford, who played basketball in her youth. "They were all flaking."

But five years ago at age 63, Bradford laced them up and began competing again, this time in senior sports.

And on July 2, Bradford and her Michigan Bad Girls 65-and-over volleyball teammates won the gold medal at the third U.S. National Senior Sports Classic in Syracuse, N.Y.

Bradford, who is the deputy treasurer of Springfield Township, also plays co-rec softball in Waterford and in 1988 she won the Michigan Senior Olympics free-throw championship by sinking 18 shots in two minutes.

The Michigan women's volleyball team won both games (including a 16-14 second game) against Louisiana in the finals to win the gold (some highlights of the senior sports classic will be aired Aug. 3 at noon on ESPN).

The event, formerly called the Senior Olympics, drew 5,000 competitors.

Two other Clarkston area residents, Leona Rebolt and Betty Wright, also competed.

Another Michigan athlete was Jack McCloskey, the general manager of the Detroit Pistons. He played tennis and was part of a winning 65-and-over basketball team.

"I saw Jack McCloskey," said Bradford, "and he said 'Give my regards to the Bad Girls.'"

McCloskey already knew about Bad Boys, but now he and Michigan's three

opponents in the nationals, Ohio, Pennsylvania and Louisiana know about the Bad Girls.

Michigan opened against Ohio on June 29. The Bad Girls were down 14-8 in the first game, but scored eight unanswered points for a 16-14 win. After that, Bradford said the second game "was easy."

Michigan's next opponent, Pennsylvania, had plenty of pre-game publicity, but the Bad Girls crushed the East Coast team on the court.

That pre-game publicity centered on Pennsylvania's 70-year-old triplets, who were featured on Late Night with David Letterman.

"They never returned the ball," said Bradford about the triplets.

Michigan then faced a tough Louisiana squad, dropping both games. But the Bad Girls' overall 4-2 record in games earned them a place in the finals, where they came back and won it all in a rematch against Louisiana.

"I knew we were gonna win," said Bradford, whose team was missing a few key athletes (they were competing in other sports) the first time around against Louisiana.

Bradford said every person on her team got the chance to play, which means a little time was spent on the sidelines.

She said, "It's OK to be on the bench," but added, "I like to play."

Bradford had played bounce volleyball for about five years, but then became interested in the regular-style of volleyball last fall.

"I never bumped before," said Bradford.

She was introduced to the sport by Bad Girls' teammates Ellen Jones and Virginia Yezbick, who both live in Waterford.

Since last fall, Bradford has been traveling every Sunday to either Dearborn or Warren, where the Bad Girls meet for three-hours of practice. The team, along with a few other different age division squads, is coached by Sandy Vong. Vong, who previously coached University of Michigan men's and women's teams, is currently a technical adviser for the United States Women's Volleyball Team.

Bradford's next volleyball action will be Aug. 10-11 at the state championships.

And after that, Bradford hopes to be competing at the fourth U.S. National Senior

4 ball fields coming to Clintonwood Park

If all goes well, Clintonwood Park should have four new ball fields by next spring.

On July 16, the Independence Township Board voted 6-0 to pay \$100,000 to improve facilities at the Clarkston Road park. Trustee Jean Saile was absent from the meeting.

The \$100,000 represents one-fourth of the total cost of the project. The township recently received a \$300,000 grant from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR), which required that the township pay 25 percent of the project cost.

A portion of the township's share was allocated this fiscal year, and the remainder is scheduled to be budgeted next year.

The project will include the construction of four ball fields for junior baseball and softball; the expansion of the parking lot; and the creation of a building with storage, bathroom and concession facilities.

According to Ann Conklin, director of the parks and recreation department, the township must now seek bids for construction. She estimates the project to be completed by next spring.

War not 'fun and games,' says flight nurse

Children could relate when First Lt. Therese Goebel told them she had eaten green eggs for breakfast in the Persian Gulf.

It wasn't exactly the breakfast fare of Dr. Seuss' tale, but pupils at Cedar Crest Academy laughed when they imagined the scene.

Goebel, of Pine Knob Road, Independence Township, was a member of the 45th Aeromedical Evacuation Squadron in the U.S. Air Force Reserves stationed in the United Arab Emirates (UAE) during the Persian Gulf War.

When she returned home to her 1-year-old son, Sean, and husband, Paul, she agreed to go to Show and Tell with Monica Foster, 6, a friend of the family.

So Goebel, with her combat gear and chemical warfare protection gear, spoke to Diane Graves' kindergarten class at Cedar Crest, a private school on Dixie Highway, Springfield Township.

Goebel told the class that she was stationed in UAE for three months. As a tactical (combat) flight nurse, her job was to fly into Saudi Arabia — on C-130 aircraft — to transport patients away from the combat zone.

The pupils' questions ranged from what Goebel ate



for breakfast to where she lived.


After answering, Goebel asked the children a few questions, including, "What is war?"







Coping with an economic slump means defense

In tough economic times, financial survival often depends on making the right decisions and avoiding panic responses.

For this reason, the Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants recommends that you take defensive measures before you are faced with a financial crisis.

Reduce expenses

Review your expenses to determine where you can cut back. If you have already lost a job, the cuts may have to be deep. But if you are just building a financial cushion, you may be able to make fewer sacrifices. Here are some specific suggestions on how to reduce expenses.

If you and your spouse have separate employer-provided health insurance plans, try eliminating unnecessary duplication in insurance coverage.

You can also save money by increasing the deductible amount on a homeowner's or auto insurance policy.

Next, review your monthly bills for services you do not use—including telephone calling plans or extra cable channels.

Reversing this advice, you might want to check into how certain service plans can help you trim expenses. For example, if you must make a lot of long distance calls,

your phone company may be able to suggest a more cost-effective calling plan for you.

CPAs also recommend that you defer such major capital outlays as buying a new car. However, if your job requires use of a car, consider leasing—thereby avoiding the large down payment usually required when purchasing an automobile.

Boost cash reserve

Knowing you have adequate funds to carry you through hard economic times can relieve much anxiety and stress.

Normally, financial experts recommend that your emergency fund cover three to six months of living expenses. As the average length of time it takes to find a new job grows longer, six to nine months of emergency fund would be far safer.

You may be able to build up your emergency fund by stashing raises, bonuses and tax refunds into a specially reserved account.

Reduce credit obligations

You can eliminate or reduce consumer interest (which is no longer deductible) by reducing expenditures and

paying off all balances monthly. By paying off your debts, you lower monthly payments and save on interest.

The lower your monthly payments, the less you have to worry about. The general rule is that no more than 15 to 20 percent of your take-home pay should go toward paying off debts other than your mortgage. In these uncertain times, less is better.

If you can't meet your monthly payment obligations, don't hide your financial condition from your creditors.

Explain your problem. Offer to make small token payments, and do so immediately to show good faith. If you are having trouble paying a mortgage, make formal arrangements with your lender to delay monthly payments.

Lenders may agree to partial payments and some offer forbearance agreements that allow you to pay nothing or interest only for a few months. When you resume your regular payments, you make up the difference.

Springfield Township officials are among the growing group of government representatives who are trying to look into the future.


They don't exactly have a crystal ball, but township board members approved \$609.62 July 10 to help their prediction process.





This Schwartzkopf is a she with khaki as her best color

Quack, quack, quack! General Schwartzkopf comes storming through. Well, not quite.

Actually Schwartzkopf is Brian Caudill's pet duck—one of four he raises as a 4-H project.

Caudill, 9, of Rose Township began raising ducks about two years ago.

"I needed a pet for my 4-H project, so I looked around and decided that ducks would fun," said Caudill, who will enter the fourth grade at Davisburg Elementary this fall.

According to Caudill, who is a member of the Homesteaders 4-H Club in Holly, he spends about 20 to 30 minutes a day with his ducks.

"I play with them a lot, and I also have to feed them and take care of them. Sometimes I spray them with water when it's hot," he said.

According to Jory Caudill, Brian's mother, Brian was only a beginner at last year's fair and received a participation award.

"He (Brian) learned a lot last year at the fair. The judges were very helpful. They help the kids prepare for the next time they will be showing their ducks. They showed him how to hold the duck the right way," she said.

Brian's duck-raising began on a low note when two of his three baby ducks died. Schwartzkopf was the lone survivor.

"There were three eggs. When they hatched, two of them drowned in the pool we had for them. I was really sad at the time, but I still had Schwartzkopf," Brian said.

Another learning experience for Brian was when he had to borrow a male duck to fertilize the eggs.

"We use to eat some of the eggs, but my brother Paul doesn't like them. Later we got a male duck so we could have some baby ducks," he said.

According to Jory, the Caudills have always had animals around.

"I feel it is a good learning experience for the kids," she said. "It teaches them the natural process of life. It shows them the good and bad parts of life."

Brian, who feels he will do well at this year's fair, says his ducks are very tame.

"They come right up and eat out of my hand. If I'm late with their food, they either peck on the back door or sometimes if I'm late they will peck at my feet," Brian said.

Other members of the Homesteaders 4-H Club have also been helpful in the duck-raising.

"I've learned a lot from the other members in my 4-H club. Almost everything I know about ducks has come

from advice I've gotten from the other members. Some things I've learned by doing it, but I usually ask other members of club to see what they do," Brian said.

This year will be only Brian's second shot at showing his Khaki Canvas ducks, but no matter how he places, he has learned responsibly while having a good time.

With a small start in September 1989, the Clarkston Critters have become No. 1 as of July 4, when they won first place and a \$100 in prize money for their float in Clarkston's Fourth of July parade.


"We didn't know they would get any money, but it's great to put with their fun," Nancy said.



When it comes to 4-H, a pair of Rose Township sisters have proven that they truly are Golden girls.

For the past seven years, Karen and Katy Golden have participated in many facets of the 4-H program. They are both active in their 4-H affiliated group, the Davisburg Busy Bees and Thumpers, which is operated by Mary Keen of Springfield Township.

(2) The court shall have discretionary power as to the amount of the civil fine within the schedule provided by this section and may impose the civil fine provided in MCL 257.907(3) for a civil infraction where, at the time of the violation, either the motor vehicle, motor vehicle and semi trailer, or trailer did not exceed the total weight which would be lawful for each unit by a proper distribution of the load upon the various axles supporting each unit.

Section 19-77. Marked Vehicle of Weighmaster.

A weighmaster, sheriff's deputy or police officer shall not stop a truck or vehicle in movement upon a road or highway in the township for any purpose, unless driving a duly marked vehicle, clearly showing the emblem, insignia or seal of the state, county or township.

Section 19-78. Failure to Stop on Request.

A driver or owner of a vehicle who knowingly fails to stop and submit to the weighing of the vehicle or load when requested or ordered to do so by a deputy, police officer or weighmaster of a township, is guilty of a misdemeanor.

Section 19-79. Rules Adopted.

The Motor Carrier Safety Rules, promulgated to accomplish the purpose of the Motor Carrier Safety Act, MCL 480.11 to 480.19, as amended, by authority conferred on the Department of State Police by Section 4 of MCL 480.11 to 480.19, as amended is hereby adopted by reference as in this Ordinance.

Section 19-80. References in Rules.

References in the Motor Carrier Safety Rules to "governmental units" shall mean the Charter Township of Independence.

Section 19-81. Designation of Weighmaster.

The Township Board may designate one or more agents or officials as weighmaster of the Township who, in addition to the sheriff's deputy and other police officers, shall enforce the provisions of Sections 19-74 through 19-79. Each weighmaster, when enforcing these provisions, shall drive a duly marked vehicle, clearly showing the emblem, insignia or seal of the Township and equipped with flashing, rotating or oscillating lights, which shall not be activated except in those circumstances where the warning produced by the lights is required for public safety, and with a siren which shall not be used except when the vehicle is in the immediate pursuit of an actual or suspected violator of this code. Furthermore, each weighmaster shall carry, and display on request, an identification card denoting his or her title.

Section 19-82. Issuance of Citation.

Any weighmaster of the Township, sheriff's deputy or police officer having reason to believe that a person, vehicle or load is in violation of any of the provisions of sections 19-74 through 19-79 may issue to the driver or owner of a vehicle an appearance citation, pursuant to sections 764.9(a) to 764.9(g) of the Michigan Compiled Laws, as amended, and consistent with MCL 257.741 to 257.750.

Section 2 of Ordinance.

All other provisions of the Independence Charter Township Code shall remain in effect, amended only as provided above.

Section 3 of Ordinance.

The provisions of this amendatory ordinance are hereby ordered to take immediate effect upon publication.

SYNOPSIS OF ORDINANCE

The Township Board, having determined that the intent and purpose of Article III of Chapter 8.5 of the Independence Township Code of Ordinances shall be furthered by approving the First Amended Downtown Development Plan and Tax Increment Financing Plan, as provided below, and the procedures for adopting the ordinance approving the original plan in the first instance having been complied with in connection with the adoption of this amendment.

THE TOWNSHIP BOARD OF THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF INDEPENDENCE, OAKLAND COUNTY, STATE OF MICHIGAN, ORDAINS:

PART I OF AMENDATORY ORDINANCE
Article III of Chapter 8.5 of the Independence Township Code of Ordinance is hereby amended by adding Sections 8.5-53 and 8.5-54 thereto so as to approve the first amended downtown development plan and tax increment financing plan. Henceforth, Section 8.5-53 and 8.5-54 shall read as follows:

Section 8.5-53. Determination of Public Purpose of Amended Plan.

Following a duly noticed public hearing on the first amended downtown development plan and tax increment financing plan (collectively, the "amended plan"), and having made the findings set forth below, the Township Board has found and determined that the amended plan constitutes and seeks to accomplish a public purpose.

Section 8.5-54. Approval of Amended Plan.

Premised upon the findings and determinations made in Section 8.5-53 above, and upon the further finding that pursuit and execution of the amended plan appears to be in the best interest of the Township.

PART II OF AMENDATORY ORDINANCE

In all other respects, Article III of Chapter 8.5 shall remain in full force and effect as previously adopted and effective.

PART III OF AMENDATORY ORDINANCE

This amendatory ordinance shall be codified so as to incorporate the final language of Sections 8.5-53 and 8.5-54, as designated above, as part of the Independence Township Code of Ordinances.

PART IV OF AMENDATORY ORDINANCE

This amendatory ordinance shall take effect immediately on the date of publication.

Master of suspense

Members of the audience are literally on the edges of their seats.

Fists are clenches, eyes opened wide, stomachs tied in knots anticipating what will happen next.

These symptoms are all associated with Alfred Hitchcock films.

Born Aug. 13, 1899, in London, England, Hitchcock perfected the art of moving his audiences to the height of anticipation.

Cliff-hangers, suspense-thrillers and murder mysteries with a splash of humor aptly describe a typical Hitchcock movie.

Known as master of thrillers, Hitchcock directed his first film in 1925 and, in 1926, directed "The Lodgers" — the first of many suspense-thrillers that became synonymous with his name.

According to many American filmmakers, Hitchcock set the standard by which all other suspense films are measured.

While "Psycho" and "The Birds" are among Hitchcock's most popular films, later in his career he successfully made the transition to television with "Alfred Hitchcock Presents."

Skydiver freefalls, parachutes from hot air balloon

Ronda Cheever loves falling. She even likes landing. But she jumps from airplanes five days a week for the falling, she said.

Last week, she relished the opportunity to try her first skydive from a hot air balloon at 4,000 feet.

As Capt. Stan Tokarski and his crew prepared the balloon for flight during the annual hot air balloon festival at Springfield Oaks County Park Saturday, July 20, Ronda jumped in with help.

The veteran of 842 skydives — tall, dark-haired and wearing a big smile — is a Tecumseh resident who teaches computer classes to eighth-graders and 12th-graders at Summerfield school in Monroe County. She began jumping five years ago at age 33.

"I used to ride my bike out and watch for two years," she said, explaining that she finally decided to sign up for lessons.

Her class was typical. With the exception of herself and one other female, it was filled with men ages 18-22 who "thought they were invincible," Ronda said.

The instructor "thought he was still in the military," she continued, explaining that he told them to practice the "football roll" to learn how to land without breaking their legs. However, she did not know what a football roll was.

Eventually, she found a different "jump master" who patiently taught her the "calf, thigh, shoulder" football roll and led her through her first successful jump.

She's been hooked ever since, jumping Mondays, Wednesdays, Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays, usually from a Cessna or Twin Otter airplane.

Later this summer she plans to jump with about 200 others from a military-type transport carrier, where the skydivers actually take a running start and jump one after another from the huge aircraft.

As a skydiver, she likes to spend as much time as possible free-falling, opening the parachute only for the last 2,500 feet of her fall to earth.

The free-fall is peaceful and quiet and beautiful, she said.

"I can't do roller coasters. Motorcycles — too close to the ground," she said, adding that in the back seat of a car she succumbs to motion sickness.

Skydiving, though, is a different story. "You don't get that heaviness in the stomach," she

She perched on the side of the basket, facing the inside. At Capt. Stan's OK, she smiled, said goodbye, and fell backward, where she dropped for about 10 seconds before opening her parachute.

With that fall, she had chalked up over 9 hours of free-fall time.

said. "It's so peaceful."

When jumping from an airplane, the thrust sends her 200 mph forward, while gravity takes her down 120 mph.

With the parachute open, divers have incredible control over speed and direction. She noted that the common "Superman" pose is incorrect.

"He can't fly like this," she said, mimicking the pose. "He would back up."

She demonstrated the proper pose — arms behind her instead of in a diving position.

That bothered her and her fellow skydivers so much that they wrote a letter to Mel Farr of "Mel Farr Superstar" automobile commercials to tell him his commercials were technically incorrect. They offered to demonstrate the correct technique.

He wrote back, telling them he's considering it for his next commercial.

However, on this day, Ronda planned to enjoy her balloon fall to the utmost. Capt. Stan took the balloon up to about 5,000 or 4,500 feet so that Ronda could jump as the balloon descended.






