

Woman survives collision with train

An Independence Township woman was thrown from her vehicle and into a metal electrical box after the pickup truck she was driving collided with a train.

Kimberly L. England, 26, was driving south on White Lake Road, Independence Township, when the truck she was driving collided with the train about 1:50 p.m. Tuesday, Dec. 3.

According to Deputy Barry Dodson, an Oakland County Sheriff's accident investigator, witnesses said they saw England taking a drink from a beer bottle just before the accident occurred.

"It is believed that alcohol may be a factor in the accident," Dodson said. "It is still under investigation, but there will probably be enforcement action taken in the future. It appears she just wasn't paying attention and drove out in front of the train."

The eastbound Grand Trunk Western train slammed into England's 1987 Toyota pickup on the passenger side

and pushed the vehicle down the tracks.

Dodson said that the pickup then left the tracks and spun around, according to witnesses. As the vehicle spun around, England was thrown out through the passenger-side window and struck a metal electrical box.

On the scene, members of the emergency rescue team of the Independence Fire Department treated England

"She was outside of the pickup truck some 50 to 60 feet from the impact area when we got there," said Capt. Steve Ronk of the Independence Township Fire Department.

"She had received some head injuries," Ronk said.
"We are not sure if the injuries came from being thrown through the glass window on the passenger side or from hitting the metal box she was laying next to. We packed her up and treated her at the scene and she regained consciousness. She was able to tell us her name and where she lived."

According to Ronk, it was a good that England regained consciousness, but it did not indicate the extent

or severity of her injuries.

"It is always a good sign when someone regains consciousness. It shows the brain is improving," he said. "But you never know what has happened to brain. There could be some swelling which could cause problems later. She was extremely lucky. When a train and car get together, a person is usually a lot more busted up."

Deputy Dodson said that witnesses at the scene reported that the lights at the crossing were working and the bells were ringing. He also stated that England was not wearing a seat belt.

England was taken by Fleet Ambulance to Pontiac Osteopathic Hospital, where she was listed in stable condition on Monday, Dec. 9.

The crossing is north of Andersonville Road in the southwest corner of the township. According to investigators, the pickup truck was a total loss, while the train sustained only minor damage. Dodson didn't know Tuesday the speed of the train and truck but estimated the train speed at 45-50 mph and estimated that the truck was not traveling above the 45 mph speed limit.

School board to finalize bond issue next Monday

After countless hours of research and haggling, the Clarkston Board of Education is less than one week away from finalizing a bond issue for the April 13 election.

But the trustees still have a way to go on a couple of pending issues before the proposal is signed and sealed. Time is of the essence, however, as the Jan. 10 state election deadline draws near.

The board must vote on the proposal by next Monday's meeting, so an ad-hoc committee has time to properly draw up the bond issue.

So far, the trustees have generally agreed on the inclusion of two items on the bond issue. They are the construction of a new 70,000-square-foot elementary school and renovation work to the existing five elementary and two junior high schools.

However, the board is split on how they intend to help a soon-to-be overburdened high school.

The trustees and administration favor ultimately moving the district's ninth-graders to Clarkston High School, but they can't agree on buying five portable classrooms or building a five-room addition.

According to administrative statistics, a ninth-grade move, using portables, would cost around \$600,000. Besides the portable units, this sum would also cover the ninth-graders' curriculum conversion, a new computer room and additional staffing.

said Superintendent Gary Haner.

On the other hand, district architect Tom Chen of Greiner, Inc., said five general purpose rooms onto the school would be similar in cost. He added that a large science room option could eventually cost around \$1 million

Trustees Kurt Karlstrom, Janet Thomas and Karen Foyteck admittedly liked the idea of an additional wing to CHS. However, Haner warned that such a move could "predestine" CHS as always remaining a high school.

Board member Sheila Hughes agreed, saying the board should look to the future.

"If we put a high school addition onto the bond issue, then we'll be giving the voters the impression that Clarkston High will always remain a high school," she said. "We can't expect the kids to stay in there another three years without major renovations.

"We have to remember that our long-range goal is to build a new high school within the next three years and convert the present high school into a middle school," Hughes added.

Treasurer Paul Van Klaveren said the portables option would convey a message of fiscal responsibility to the voters and aid in the passage of the bond issue. Joseph Helpern concurred.

"If we want to look frugal to the public, temporary, portable classrooms might be the answer," Helpern said.

Janet Thomas argued that the addition of portables would only be housing the ninth-graders and would not be upgrading the present conditions at the high school. Karlstrom agreed, adding that the classrooms would be unsightly and long-term.

"Portables don't do it for me because history shows that portable classrooms are not temporary in this district," he said. "With an addition, I think we'll find the ability to fill this space as time goes on."

President Thomas Howard said he didn't necessarily like the portable units either but figures they are the best option in the short run until the board can come up with some long-range facility plans. He added that the portables could eventually be sold when the district's space problems are solved.

Howard told the audience that the board is trying to put together a bond package of around \$7.8 million. This would include adjusting the cost of the package, which so far would include an estimated \$8.1 million elementary school and about \$3.8 million in renovations to the seven existing schools.

Some district personnel and parents urged the board not to be too restrictive, however.

"We appreciate the amount of time, you, the board, has taken into deliberating these issues, but please don't shortchange yourselves," said Karen Manville, a member of North Sashabaw Elementary's PTO. "I hope you can come up with a total cost package that can give you a little lee-way, in case of a mistake or underestimation.

"The needs of a lot of elementary school children are riding on this bond issue," she adde.

Not-guilty plea entered in sexual abuse charge

Paul Matthew Salvino, 23, of Independence Township was arraigned on a sexual assault charge in Oakland County Circuit Court Dec. 4.

At the arraignment last Thursday, a not-guilty plea was entered for Salvino by Judge Edward Sosnick. Salvino is charged with fondling his then-girlfriend's younger sister.

The alleged victim, who was 12 at the time, testified at an earlier hearing that Salvino forced her to fondle him during a party.

Salvino faces a Jan. 16 pretrial.

In an unrelated case, Salvino is charged with the criminal sexual abuse of his friend's 5-year-old son in incident that occurred at Salvino's step-father's house on Circle Drive, Independence Township, in July.

Police save day for Santa, town



Village ousts counsel of 14 years, hires Ryan

The Clarkston News was not informed about the special meeting, which had been posted at the village hall for the required legal 18 hours.

"I'm not satisfied with their service in court," said Catallo (Gruich did counsel the village, but it was other firm attorneys who appeared in court).

Trustee William Basinger said there had been recent changes in personnel at the firm,

Trustee Robert Whitmer said switching from a firm to one attorney (Ryan) who will handle both in- and outof-court matters has its advantages.

"A separate legal counsel is more efficient and costs less," said Whitmer.

Trustee Doug Roeser said they heard many good things about Ryan, who has been the legal counsel for the charter commission, which was set up to investigate the village's proposed change to cityhood.

We had glowing reports about Tom Ryan from the charter commission," said Roeser.

Catallo said the change was not directly made because of the recent lawsuit filed by Joan and Buck Kopietz over a proposed bed and breakfast facility or a recent court decision that gave a village resident permission to break the village's zoning ordinance.

However, Basinger said the timing of the change was important -- it should occur before the bed and breakfast lawsuit opens in court.

"I wanted to see new legal counsel on that issue," said Basinger.

I surveyed the banquet room at the El Cid restaurant in Miami.

Yes, this is the perfect setting, I thought, noting the wooden chandeliers hanging from the high ceiling. The stone walls were constructed, piece by piece, from an original stone castle in Spain, I was told.

Entire suits of armor were displayed throughout the dark building. So real were they that my 4-year-old nephew Matthew refused to touch them. He did, however, stare at them from about four feet away.

My brother, the groom, and his new wife Mayra had not yet arrived, and I eagerly anticipated the moment.

Camera ready, I was prepared for anything. Knowing my brother Ron as I have for most of his 30 years, I half expected the unpredictable, though he had matured much over the years, and I don't talk to him as often as I once did, now that he lives in Florida.

Still, I wondered. Would he — in a moment of rapturous exuberance — swing from the chandeliers by the end of the evening? Or would he climb the stone walls, perhaps aided by one of his manly buddies in attendance, emitting triumphant grunts from the ceiling beams?

I took my post near the hors d'oeuvre table, and Ron and Mayra entered the room, which immediately erupted into cheers.

Slyly, I kept the wedding couple well within the range of my lens. So far, only the normal hugs and kisses and wedding cake cutting had occurred, and I took a few obligatory pictures.

I tried to imagine what might come next.

I recalled a family canoe trip about 10 years ago, when Ron had made a big splash. We had finished our river route and were waiting on shore for our shuttle back to our cars.

Ron, with a new girlfriend (not Mayra) watching, decided he would cross the bridge over the Au Sable River monkey-bar style. That is, he climbed the slope beneath the bridge and hung from a steel girder, crossing it hand over hand until he hung from the center of the bridge, where he became tired.

With his girlfriend staring silently and his brothers and sisters jeering and his parents shouting warnings that the river was very shallow and very rocky, Ron decided he had better let go rather than risk dropping at a more shallow point.

We watched, astounded, as he fell into the 4-footdeep water. (He was uninjured.)

This pattern of uncalled-for shows of strength began in childhood. There was the time he ventured outside barefoot — in the middle of February — and walked (not ran) around our house in knee-deep snow. And when ice fishing a few years later, he occasionally pulled off his boots and walked barefoot on the ice, much to the amazement of onlookers.

And in his college days at Michigan Tech., he sometimes spent entire days fishing and exploring, cooking up fresh trout at the river's edge minutes after catching it, eating worms and all ("more protein," he said).

He had original ideas for all sorts of problems. As a solution to pesky mosquitoes, for instance, he recommended spreading bacon grease over your skin (it had always worked for him, he said).

At that point in my reminiscences, Ron and Mayra were called to the dance floor for the first dance. They looked so elegant, Ron in his recently trimmed ponytail (and not smelling at all like bacon) and Mayra with fancily coifed hair.

I was pretty sure that Mayra would only laugh at whatever Ron would try, but I was getting a little impatient. Knowing Ron's timing, now was the moment for an outrageous act: All eyes were upon him.

Then I remembered: Ron had hurt his back just two days prior during a rough game of football on Thanksgiving day.

There would be no antics on this day — he had barely survived his bachelor's party the night before, he had said earlier.

I snapped a few more photos — normal shots, I might say! And then I put my camera down for the night, confident that I wouldn't miss any unforgettable moment. I joined the now-crowded dance floor, unencumbered by camera.

Perhaps back pain is the secret to maturity? I mused, as I whiffed something that smelled like men's cologne coming from my brother's direction.

Ten-year-old Emily's screams awakened me about 8 a.m. Friday. She was yelling for her mother and dad to come quick because "something terrible has happened to Adam," her 1-year-old brother.

Adam was having a seizure. His little body was stiff and quivering; his eyes were rolled back in his head, and he didn't seem to be breathing. It was terrifying.

And it was completely unexpected. Just the day before, as is my greedy column-writing custom when visiting grandchildren, I'd made a note of something Adam's pediatrician said. Based on Adam's husky frame and large head, hands and feet, the doctor predicted Adam would grow to be 6-feet-8 and 260 pounds. There never was a healthier-looking child.

Earlier that morning, when Adam crawled into bed with his parents, he felt warm. They gave him aspirin to lower his temperature and Adam eventually made his way to the family room with his grandmother and Emily. Grandma was holding him when the seizure hit.

Within a minute after Emily spread the alarm, Adam's parents had him in the car and on the way to the hospital, only a blessed two blocks away. It wasn't until Adam's mom reached the emergency entrance that she realized she was barefoot and wearing a nightgown.

I arrived minutes later. While standing useless in a hospital corridor, fretting about what was happening to Adam on the other side of an emergency room door, I recalled something I'd written a few weeks earlier. It was a response to a Newsweek article by a 72-year-old psychologist who insisted there was absolutely nothing advantageous about growing old.

I retorted that one good thing about being an old poop was that "I likely won't have to attend Adam's funeral . . . Many young people --children, grandchildren, great grandchildren, nieces, nephews and so on - are important to me. Someday they're all going to die, but - selfishly, cowardly - I don't want to be around when it happens."

Oh Lord. Was I going to be around when it happened to Adam? It would be such a devastating loss to all the people who love him, I was sure I couldn't handle it. I am unaccustomed to such agonized worrying. My family has been incredibly fortunate. When my kids were young, we lived near the same hospital. Several times I rushed them to emergency for stitches and such. But there was never anything close to the horrifying urgency prompted by Adam's still, stiff little body.

My doleful musing was interrupted by a baby crying lustily. It was Adam making the greatest sound I ever heard. A 105-degree temperature had triggered the seizure. "A virus" did it. A few hours later, after loudly protested shots, pricky blood tests and X-rays, Adam was back home, apparently healthy as ever. By January, his parents and grandparents may be breathing normally

That evening in my favorite newspaper I read about Tom and Michele Sherill-Mix. Nine years ago their 2-month-old son died of a liver disease in Children's Hospital of Michigan in Detroit. During his illness, they stayed at the nearby Ronald McDonald House which, at a nominal cost, provides lodging for the parents of critically ill children. Twice every year since, although they really can't afford it, the Sherrill-Mixes have driven 41/2 hours from their Alpena home to spend several days taking over for the McDonald House manager and comforting parents facing the same loss they suffered.

"Somehow you find the strength to get through it. People always say they won't. But you do, you really do, because you have to," Michele Sherrill-Mix said. That's what she and her husband tell the frightened parents, who need to hear it.

The news media regularly publicize lists of mostadmired people, usually wealthy athletes and entertainers. There's never any mention of real heroes like Tom and Michele Sherrill-Mix, They're at the top of my list. They make Michael Jordan and Madonna look like role models for dust balls.

I'd like to think that I, hit by the worst tragedy imaginable, would be just half as strong and generous. I doubt it A contract of the contract of






Oakland County Probate Court Judge Barry M. Grant rescheduled the hearing for Jan. 7.







Board to re-seek bids for police station

Puzzled by the cost difference of two bid submittals, the Independence Township Board has decided to reject all bids for renovations to the Oakland County Sheriff's Department (OCSD) substation.

On Dec. 3, the township board approved a motion to decline the offers and re-seek bids at a later date. The starting time and deadline were not disclosed at the

The bids of \$14,650 and \$30,800 were delivered to the township offices by the November deadline.

The proposed job entails building a 576-square-foot addition to the back of the existing OCSD substation on M-15, Clarkston. The project would also include installing additional lockers and remodeling the station's inte-

Township records indicate that only two builders, out of eight area companies contacted, cast bids. They were C.B. Custom Builders (\$14,650) and Dick Moscovic

Project coordinator George Anderson, director of the public works department, said the low bid was fine, but the township wants to consider others. He said the disparity between the two bids raised some questions with the board.

Anderson added, however, that the addition can't go forward until the Village of Clarkston approves the plans. Because of the substation's location within Clarkston's limits, the project falls under the village's jurisdiction.

Generous support

When they were asked, the Clarkston community came through with donations of canned goods and cashenough to fill about 400 Thanksgiving baskets for the needy.

"It was fantastic," said Sherry Kaars, director of Lighthouse North — the non-profit organization that feeds and clothes the needy in north Oakland County.

When the clothing closet opens again in January, it will accept all sorts of clothes but particularly needs children's clothing as well as boots and coats for all ages, she said.

Anyone who would like to remedy the situation may donate money to pay for the food or time to prepare or deliver the meals, she said.


"I'd like to start an ongoing fund," she said, explaining that donations year-round would help provide those special holiday meals.



Defending state champs grapple tough schedule

If you want to get caught up on wrestling the past two years, take a drive on Clarkston Road and read back-to-back signs.

Drive east, and you'll see one sign honoring the 1990 Class A team state champion Lake Orion Dragons. Drive west and you'll see another praising the 1991 Class A team state champion Clarkston

It used to be you had to drive south, way south to Temperance-Bedford, to see such a sign. But the Mules' wrestling factory (Bedford coach William Regnier has the best record in state history at 416-48-3 in dual meets) was shut down by both the Dragons and Wolves in the last two state

(Despite this, the Mules continue to get national respect. USA Today recently selected Bedford, which returns 11 of 13 starters, as the nation's fifth-best team in a pre-season poll).

In fact, last season Clarkston had a tougher time defeating Lake Orion and Waterford Kettering in Greater Oakland Activities League regular-season action than it did against Bedford at the finals (Clarkston topped the Mules 36-27 in Battle

'Our biggest strength is our schedule," said Clarkston coach Scott Strickler, whose team was 26-0 in dual meets last

And if a tough regular season is good preparation for post-season action, the Wolves should be even more prepared this year. In addition to the tough GOAL meets and the 30-plus team Oakland County Meet (won by Clarkston for the first time last year, Clarkston will face three of the country's best teams Jan, 11 at the St. Edwards Quadrangular (located near Cleveland): Temperance-Bedford, Welsh Jesuit of Ohio (rated third by USA today) and host St. Edwards (rated 10th by USA).

Also, Goodrich will host a top-notch invitational on Dec. 28. The Wolves and runner-up Bedford, along with the defending Class B and C teams, will join host Goodrich and 11 other quality teams.

Clarkston will meet those challenges without the services of some key wrestlers who graduated, co-captains Damon Michelsen (a 52-1 wrestler who won the individual state championship at 171 and will

be wrestling at the University of North Carolina) and Joel Davis, Jason Slater, Alex Martin, Joe Webb, Tony Miller and Mike Stanton, among others.

Last year's squad was especially strong in the heavier weights but the new edition of the Wolves will be a little different.

"This team might be more balanced," said Strickler. "There will be less superstars. And it's younger. It's a very juniororiented team.'

The coach isn't too worried about the defending champs being overconfident. He said wrestling against tough competition is almost always a humbling experi-

And Strickler adds, "That feeling (winning the championship) is so inspiring, I can't think of a kid that would not want to reach that pedestal again."

Two of the key wrestlers returning are juniors Jerry Anderson and Jeff Deroseau. Anderson was 54-2 last season (a school record for victories) and placed third in the state at 125. Deroseau, 49-3. finished second in the state at 103. Anderson is expected to wrestle at 130 this season and Deroseau will move up to 112.

Much is expected out of the Wolves' three co-captains, Jason Roughton, Brian Davis and Nathan Smith. Roughton, who will be wrestling at 140, was ill at the beginning of last season because of mono but finished strong. The 29-10-1 wrestler ended up being a state qualifier and won one of the key matches in the team state finals, pinning Bedford's Dave Witfoth

Davis and Smith are both 171-pounders but one of them will be moving up to the 189 spot. Davis (6-8-1) was injured for most of last season but came back to win a 7-0 match against Bedford's Dan Meszaros in the 160-pound division at the team state

Smith had the unfortunate task last year of trying to beat out Michelsen in the 171-pound division. He'll get plenty of opportunity to show his skills this year.

Strickler said other wrestlers who will most likely start at the other weight divisions (or vie for a spot) are: 103 -Corey Grant; 119 and 125 - Sean Mick, Jeff Farrand and Jesse Laycock; 135 -Charlie Liggett; 145 - Mike Cain and Frank Lafferty; 152 - Steve Cohoon; 160 - Rick Detkowski and Mitch Peterson: 189 - Ste

Senior Nathan Pomeroy and juniors Matt Underwood and Eric Ryan round out the talented squad.

"Our strengths as a team are our attitude, willingness to work hard, willingness to do what's best for the team ... and we're Clarkston basketball," said coach Fife, whose team often goes 6-on-5 in practice. "Our games can't be harder than practice."

Maybe that's what Clarkston opponents need ... six starters.


