Fire demolishes Overpine Road home

Three firefighters suffered minor injuries in a fire that demolished an Independence Township home Monday, March 16.

None of the occupants of the house was home at the

At 6:17 p.m. Monday, the township fire department

received a call about a fire at Gordon and Lori Edens' home on Overpine, near Reese and Holcomb roads.

It took firefighters 45 minutes to an hour to extinguish the blaze, said Chief Gar Wilson, who added that the fire presented a few challenges.

At one point, the living room floor collapsed, barely missing firefighters who were battling the blaze from a basement doorway. The collapse encouraged hidden embers to erupt in flames.

The fire probably was caused by an overheated clothes dryer, said Wilson.

'My recommendation is not for anyone to put a load in and go to sleep or leave the house," said Wilson, explaining that dryers sometimes overheat.

From the evidence left from the fire, Wilson pieced (See DRYER, next page)

Morning fire totals Springfield trailer

An early morning fire destroyed a mobile home and sent a Springfield Township man to the hospital Monday, March 16.

According to Springfield Fire Chief Marlan Hillman, the blaze started around 6:30 a.m. in Chateau Estates mobile home park. Hillman said home owner Donald Hickey and his wife were awakened by their young daughter, who'd heard the smoke detector sounding next to her room.

By that time, however, the fire had encompassed

the front portion of the trailer, causing Hickey to break his bedroom window for a means of escape. While exiting, Hickey cut himself on shards of broken glass.

He was taken to Pontiac Osteopathic Hospital for treatment. As of Tuesday afternoon, he was reported in stable condition.

Hillman said the fire started in a living room couch. He said it's possible a cigarette could have ignited the blaze, but the case is still is under investi-

together the probable sequence of events.

Gordon Edens started the dryer at 3:45 p.m. and left to pick up his sons and then drop them off at his wife's place of employment, said Wilson.

Meanwhile, the fire began.

Since the clothes inside of the dryer were completely burned, the fire probably began inside, he said. That melted the plastic portion of the door, causing the door to spring open. Next, the clothing nearby ignited, spreading to other areas of the basement, including a storage room, Wilson surmised.

The fire couldn't vent, so it simply burned until the

8 Eston Road acres rezoned

An 8-acre parcel on Eston Road has been given final approval to rezone from rural residential to suburban farm residential.

On March 3, the Independence Township Board voted 6-0 in to approve the second reading and adoption of the change to the zoning ordinance. Supervisor Frank Ronk was absent from the meeting.

Property owners Scott and Sandra Clark of Eston Road petitioned for the change, so they can eventually split the property and create three new building sites next to their home. The location, north of Clarkston Road, would then consist of four parcels.

Under rural residential, one must provide 200 feet of lot width and a minimum of three acres. Under suburban farm residential, the lot width remains the same; however, 1 1/2-acre-minimum lot size is required.

The board's vote echoed the recommendation of the Independence Township Planning Commission, which saw no conflict between the request and the township's master plan.

Group pushes for disability reforms in area

A group of concerned area residents have pooled their efforts, so they can improve the quality of life for Clarkston's disabled citizens.

The group consists of parents, special education instructors, and people associated with disability-oriented organizations.

Linc Smith, a special education teacher at Clarkston High School, is the catalyst behind the new group's formation.

He said his decision to organize was based on his own experiences at CHS.

"The idea came about from the integration of more folks with disabilities into the high school setting," he said. "It allowed me to see the scope of the situation.

"This realization also made me ask, 'What happens after high school?" Smith added. "The schools have done

an excellent job of placing these kids into a classroom setting, but they'll have needs later in life. It's incumbent that the community take it one step further."

With this in mind, Smith's assemblage has linked forces with the "What's Next?" group, a small association of parents who are concerned with the welfare of their disabled youngsters. Together, they re-examining the needs of developmentally disabled people. Falling into this category are people with mental retardation, autism, muscular dystrophy, epilepsy and cerebral palsy.

This awareness group has already met with some of Clarkston's community leaders. On Feb. 11, nearly 30 people attended an informational meeting where they discussed a variety of topics and concerns.

These concerns included: transportation, employment, housing accommodations, and access to leisure, recreational and spiritual pursuits.

Frank McGeogh, the parent of an 18-year-old boy with cerebral palsy, said the group can also educate the community about people with disabilities.

"Kids can't be pigeon-holed, in terms of a particular disability," he said. "My son, Gordy, is no different from any of our other four children, except that he has a little

March: Mental Retardation Month

March is known nationally as Mental Retardation Month.

This specific month has been selected to enable churches, hospital chaplains, and synagogue members to become more aware of the needs of person with mental retardation in their religious and secular communities.

Presently, 7.2 million Americans have mental retardation, and slightly more than 100,000 babies and young children are added to this number each year.

Oakland County has a population of about 1.3 million people. For the purpose of general information, 3 percent, or 35,000 of these people, will have some developmental disability. Furthermore, 10 percent of this population, or 3,500 individuals, will have moderate, severe or profound mental retardation.

Mental retardation is not a disease, nor should it be confused with mental illness. People with mental retardation simply mature on an intellectual and social level at a below-average rate.

Simpson, Salvino receive long prison terms

On July 24, 1991, an Independence Township father and his friend were charged with abusing his 5-year-old son.

Now, eight months later, they have been sentenced to prison.

David Lewis Simpson III, 24, the 5-year-old's father, was sentenced to 25-50 years for first-degree criminal sexual conduct and 10-15 years for child abuse. His friend, Paul Matthew Salvino, 24, was sentenced to 20-50 years for aiding Simpson in the sexual assault and 10-15 years for child abuse. The two were sentenced by Judge Robert C. Anderson in Oakland County Circuit Court.

The pair was accused of forcing Simpson's 5-yearold son to drink gin, smoke a cigarette and perform oral sex last July. A neighbor heard screams coming from the house on Circle Drive, Independence Township, that night, and called the police.

Upon arrival, deputies viewed the child being forced to smoke and partake of a soft drink containing alcohol.

A jury convicted Simpson of two counts each of first-degree criminal sexual conduct and child abuse.

Salvino was acquitted of one sexual assault charge but was found guilty of aiding Simpson in the sexual assault. A jury came to its guilty verdict on Feb. 15.

Simpson's son implicated both his father and Salvino during the trial. The boy now lives in foster care. Simpson's parental rights were taken away in an earlier probate court case.

According to Assistant Prosecutor Jean Gibson, the pair were found guilty in a fair trial.

"They are getting what they deserve," she said, "This little boy is still having nightmares about the heinous crimes which were committed against him. I would feel more comfortable if they were going to be locked up for 50 or 60 years."

Gibson said that Bloomfield Hills attorney H. Wallace Parker, who represented Simpson, and Rochester attorney Eric Wilson, who represented Salvino, said there

was no evidence during the trial that their clients were involved in any sexual assault.

"I don't know what they meant by that," Gibson said. "We had witness after witness who testified to what happen that night."

During the sentencing, Simpson accused Gibson of "prosecutorial misconduct" but gave no details of the alleged misconduct, Gibson said.

"I've done nothing wrong," Gibson said. "All I did was to present the evidence and let the jury decide what had been done. I'd do it all over again in a minute. The jury made the right decision, and now it's time for these two to pay for these terrible crimes."

Simpson and Salvino blamed the media for their conviction.

"They are looking to put blame on anyone and anything except themselves," Gibson said. "The action of these two men and their faces haunt this child today. He is terrified they will get out of jail and harm him again."

Gibson had asked the judge for a minimum sentence of 60 years for Simpson and 45 years for Salvino.

A parole board will decide how much of the term the two will serve.


"Simpson is a repeat offender," she said. "I'm hopeful he and Salvino will be behind bars for a very long time."

Rumor mill

I first learned how news tends to travel quickly and inaccurately when playing "operator" in elementary school.

At the end of second or third grade at South Sashabaw Elementary School (now Clarkston Community Education's building), the entire school participated in the game, with each class competing against each other and each member of each class involved.

It began with a simple message that the teacher told to one student. That student had to perform some feat, such as sliding down the slide once, before telling the message to another student. The second student also completed a task — maybe running around the school building once — before passing the message along to another student. And so on — until the end, when the last student had to repeat the message back to the teacher.

None of the classes was perfect in this message relay. In fact, all of the messages were garbled. My class, in particular, finished with an incomprehensible string of words.

Since I learned this lesson so early in life, I shouldn't have been surprised to hear from someone that my own father was retiring from practicing medicine in the Clarkston area for more than 30 years.

Of course, since I had an inside scoop, I could quickly set the record straight that Dr. Ronald LePere would remain in practice for years to come and that he was *not* retiring.

Still, I couldn't help wondering about the source of the rumor. Maybe someone confused my dad with his former partner, Dr. Alfred Hamilton, who retired for medical reasons a few years back.

Or maybe it's a different physician completely who's retiring. Or maybe they heard that my dad was re-wiring something and misheard it as "retiring."

Sometimes rumors begin merely from speculation, which is repeated as fact.

One summer while working at Bordine's Better Blooms, I saw great evidence for this.

A few of us were in the "glass house," which no longer exists. It stood at the front of the existing greenhouse in what is now parking lot. From that vantage point, we could see when an ambulance arrived at the front door, and two paramedics rushed into the garden store.

For a hot, muggy workday in early summer, this was welcome excitement for us.

I've had a couple attacks in my dentist's office. The laying back with a chain around my neck and the dentist's hands holding my head down brought more

fear than Dr. Eric Taylor's tools ever did.

He's been so understanding I wonder if he has my same fears.

The other night our granddaughter was watching the video, "The Three Little Pigs." In it two of the pigs are stuck in a hollow log. I had to leave the room.

By now you readers must know I have claustrophobia, bad, in my judgement. So, I expect sympathy, understanding and suggestions as I relate my most recent experience at a Days Inn in Orlando.

Pansy and Elizabeth Baldwin, Hazel and I got trapped in an elevator. It had no phone, but it did have a bell, which I rang a lot.

My sweater came off quickly. My door-kicking became louder and more frequent. I took the panels off the ceiling, and found no escape route.

Need public fire hall discussion

After reading Neil Wallace's letter in the March 11 Clarkston News, I became aware of the extent of the new fire hall issue.

I can see that this is not just a fire hall but a proposed public safety complex that has been twice defeated by township voters in prior elections.

Part of the plan is the proposed Business Registration Ordinance. This proposed township ordinance would require all businesses to register with the township.

An additional tax in the form of a registration fee would be imposed on all businesses in the township and would go directly to the fire department fund.

Mr. Neil Wallace described the great lengths the township is going through to build this new complex. The proposed Business Registration Ordinance is a way to get more money into the fire department fund for the construction and acquisition of the public safety complex.

Discussion with several community members shows that this appears to be only the tip of the iceberg. The question continually asked is why is there interest in this particular building and this location, when there appear to be other suitable facilities and locations available, which would also be less expensive?

The general consensus seems to be that after building a road, which will greatly enhance certain local landowners as well as aid the township in its desire to gain its twice-denied fire hall, the township may additionally acquire one of these private facilities for its new office complex.

I hope there is no foundation in these conclusions, but I am beginning to seriously wonder where the truth lies. Numerous questions deserve some open public discussion and answers.

For example, what is the true cost of this entire project? Where is the money coming from to fund this? Why choose a building site that requires construction of a road, the granting of free sewer and water taps and the

removal of existing properties from the tax roll when other sites are available? If we are going to build a new fire hall, why make it two separate buildings within a short distance from each other? If our township zoning ordinance is so sacrosanct, why are we willing to grant so many variances to this structure?

My original intent for involvement in this investigation was the proposed Business Regulation Ordinance, which I am very much against. This is another attempt at more governmental intervention into our lives and businesses, which is totally unfounded and baseless and, in addition, imposes more costs on businesses, which turn out, in my opinion, to be a hidden tax.

I know the township will hide behind the mantel of public health, safety and welfare and deem that this is a justifiable cause. However, more residential structures in this township pose significant fire and building hazards than the majority of businesses do. And if any regulation is justified, it should start with all structures.

Township officials know that they could not undertake such a regulation because voters would not put up with it.

I think all of the foregoing questions and concerns need to be answered before any more plans are made with respect to this project.


End of free offer from McCabe Funeral Home, which I'm nobly declining, to save McCabe from the risk that my stupidity is contagious.

School district looking at leaner budget, future

The Clarkston school district will take it on the chin next year, but it's up to the state Legislature to determine how big the blow will be.

So far, this year the budget has been reduced by \$234,000. These reductions include a loss of \$194,000 from tax-base sharing and \$40,000 from a new federal insurance contribution act (FICA) cap.

Tax-base sharing means Clarkston money goes to 'poorer' districts

With tax-base sharing, "out-of-formula" school districts, such as Clarkston, are forced to share commercial- and industrial-based tax dollars with those school districts that are listed as in the state's funding formula. Presently, this money is in an escrow account because of numerous pending lawsuits against the state on this mat-

FICA cap adds to burden

With the FICA cap, Clarkston will be giving the state \$40,000 in Social Security money. In the past, the state had paid for all school employees' FICA taxes, but not any more.

Now, the state only pays up to \$50,000 per person. The remainder is picked up by the school district.

Superintendent Gary Haner believes this is another aspect of the "Robin Hood theory."

'This particular cap is aimed primarily at southeastern Michigan schools," he said. "The state is going after the richer districts to supplement the in-formula dis-

\$234,000 budget cut this year

Haner said the \$234,000 loss has already been accounted for in the existing budget. The money was taken from non-personnel areas such as supplies and perpupil allocations.

According to Steve Lenar, director of business services, the per-pupil allocations would figure to be about 4 percent less per student. He said nearly one-third of the \$234,000 has been taken from this particular area.

Haner said these specific areas were targeted be-

cause of existing contracts with school personnel and the restraints of an approved budget.

Next year could be worse

Despite these recent reductions, Haner finds his concerns directed toward the year ahead.

'Next year will be a very pivotal year for the district," he said. "We're facing substantial losses already, with possibly more on the way."

Thus far, the district has lost \$1.2 million from a statewide tax freeze, which was initiated by the Legislature last year. The present tax freeze keeps most property values the same this year, meaning the district won't see its usual 5 or 6 percent increase in the district's overall state equalized valuation (SEV).

Another big concern lies with the possibility of the state dropping its FICA support altogether. This means the district could be paying the FICA tax for all money carned by school district employees. Using this year's district statistics, this action could set Clarkston schools back nearly \$1.5 million in the coming year.

This alternative is presently under consideration by the state Legislature.

If passed, the school district would either have to cut from the upcoming budget or find some other way to subsidize this lofty annual expense.

Computing taxes

The majority of school money comes from local property taxes.

The current 20-mill rate in Clarkston Community Schools is up for renewal before voters June 8.

Twenty mills is \$20 for every \$1,000 in assessed property valuation. In Michigan, property is assessed at half its market value. So the owner of a \$100,000 home, assessed at \$50,000, would pay \$1,000 in school taxes for the year.

60 jobs may be at stake

If FICA payments are paid for at the district's expense, the administration foresees 60 jobs being affected, assuming that some less costly support staff is laid off instead of all teachers.

Last week, Haner testified before the House Appropriations Committee on this very subject. He said it appeared that state representatives were leaning toward eliminating its FICA obligations to schools but not taking all the money away too soon.

He said the Legislature is flirting with idea of having school districts paying off their FICA fees in installments.

130 new pupils expected

Another monetary concern for Clarkston in 1992-93 will be the number of estimated new students in the district. District analysts are predicting an increase of 130 new students next year.

With \$4,390 presently expended per child, the district would have to come up with an additional \$570,700 in 1992-93 to supplement them.

These three revelations have put the district in a . must-pass situation for the millage renewal in June.

At this time, the school district will be asking voters to renew a 20-mill package, which is set to expire. This one-year measure was approved June 1991.

However, Haner will be asking the board to consider adding an extra mill to the package. He said this action would keep the district from cutting any programs from the impending \$1.2 million freeze-out.

Millage options

Presently, Haner said the district is faced with three options to battle the loss of the \$1.2 million. They include:

■ Cutting \$1.2 million from the budget.

Renewing the existing 20-mill package, losing \$600,000 from the freeze.

Renewing the 20-mill package, adding a mill on top, and canceling out the effects of the freeze.

If the board takes the third option, Haner said ballot language would have to be approved and submitted prior to April 13 to make the deadline for the June 8 election.



Springfield Township had a sparse showing at the polls with only 15 percent of its 7,013 registered voters turning out to vote. In Independence Township, about 16 percent of the township's 17,306 registered voters traveled to the polls.

Officials at both townships expected small turnouts. Independence Township Deputy Clerk Cathy DeRousha attributed the low numbers to a lack of localization of issues and to voter disdain toward the primary's party declaration policy.

In Springfield Township, the final Republican tally included: Bush, 349; Patrick Buchanan, 151; David Duke, 25; and uncommitted, 34.

In the Democratic race, Brown collected 177 votes to Clinton's 173. Paul Tsongas finished in third place with 98 votes. The imprisoned Lyndon LaRouche Jr. collected one vote, as did Tom Harkin, who dropped from the presidential race a week ago.

Twenty-one residents cast uncommitted votes for the Democratic party.

In Independence Township, Bush took top Republican honors with 1,153 votes to Buchanan's 503. Duke garnered 28 votes, while 105 residents cast uncommitted votes.


With the Democrats, Clinton collected 422 votes, while Brown took second with 368 tallies. Tsongas garnered 245 votes, and Harkin collected six. LaRouche finished with two votes in Independence, and Bob Kerrey, who also dropped out last week, grabbed one vote.

Forty-eight citizens cast uncommitted votes for the Democratic side.

In Independence Township, four residents cast writein candidates, but only two were considered valid. The two legitimate votes were for former EDS mogul and Texas businessman Ross Perot.



Each of the three Clarkston wrestlers who qualified for the individual state finals March 13-14 placed before a sell-out crowd at the Kellogg Center in Battle

Wolf 140-pounder Jason Roughton took second in the state, 130-pounder Jerry Anderson was third and 189-pounder Brian Davis finished sixth. The top eight wrestlers in each weight division place and are honored as all-state.

Roughton, 37-3, couldn't have come any closer to winning his division. The junior lost a controversial 3-2 decision to Warren Lincoln senior Jeff Mayer in the finals on Saturday.

"I was in control for at least 20 seconds," said Roughton.

Roughton said after the match, Mayer acknowledged he, too, was surprised by the lacktof a call.

Anderson, 41-3, became the school's first three-time all-stater. And the 130pounder, who owns several school records (including a 129-14-1 career record and a 94 takedowns season record), will be back next season.

Anderson finished third this year, third last season and fifth his freshman

In spite of his accomplishments, he wasn't too happy about finishing third and not getting the chance to face eventual state champion Louie Tibai of Temperance-Bedford.

Anderson lost that chance in the second round. After pinning Willie Roberts of Muskegon at 4:21 in the opener, Anderson was edged by Ann Arbor Pioneer's Drew Pullen, 1-0.

"He rode Jerry the whole second period," said Strickler. "It wasn't the same Jerry that I've ever seen. The kid's style and Jerry's style didn't mesh."



Health-O-Rama provides low-cost health care

If you've been putting off that mammogram, pap smear, prostate check or other health appraisal, your excuses are gone.

Project Health-O-Rama — which offers low-cost health care — takes place in the Clarkston area on Tuesday, April 7, at the Episcopal Church of the Resurrection, Clarkston Road (across from the library), Independence Township.

Hours are 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the church, and the program in the Clarkston area is sponsored by the Clarkston Community Women's Club.

If you're 18 or older, you may undergo the following tests at the site: height, weight, vision, blood pressure, glaucoma, health hazard appraisal, counseling and referral.

In addition, a blood panel profile for \$11 screens for total cholesterol, hemoglobin, liver, bone and kidney function, diabetes, gout and more — a total of 21 profiles. (Don't eat four hours prior to taking this test.

Water, plain tea and black coffee are OK.) And a \$4 colorectal cancer screening kit may be taken home (and later sent back). It may detect early warning signs for ulcers, colitis, cancer and other prob-

New in 1992 is a prostate specific antigen blood test for men, which costs \$25. It screens for prostate cancer and other problems and is recommended annually for men over 40.

For women, a mammogram is available for \$50 if not covered by your insurer, Medicaid or Medicare. The mammogram screens for early detection of breast cancer. Appointments and doctor's prescriptions may be necessary. Call (313) 424-8600 for sites offering this test and for more information.

A pap test, which may detect cervical cancer, is available by calling (313) 424-8600. There may be a fee. (Don't douche 24 hours prior to taking this test.)

Also available at some sites are such tests as as oral cancer/dental screening, pulmonary function, nutrition and medication counseling, skin cancer, body composition, podiatry, sickle cell anemia, EKG, cancer risk assessment, vision counseling, breast exam, and prostate and testicular examination.

For more information, call the project hotline at (313) 424-8600 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. weekdays or call (313) 544-3597 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. weekdays.

According to organizers, Project Health-O-Rama is especially helpful to those who have lost health benefits due to lay-offs, unemployment or underemployment. The project also provides follow-up for people whose results suggest further medical attention.



Singer witnesses breakup of U.S.S.R.

An Independence Township woman will forever remember her trip to the former Soviet Union as a long series of "firsts."

Rosemary Purcell traveled to Europe last September as a member of the 130-voice Spirit of America Choir. The group toured numerous Soviet cities with gospel singer Larnelle Harris, a five-time Grammy award winner.

Incidentally, the group visited Russia just a few days after the attempted coup. Purcell said she was urged to stay home by friends and relatives, but she was determined to go. As far as she knows, not a single person backed out of the trip.

The group's first stop was in Tallinn, the new capital of Estonia. Just days before, Estonia was officially recog-

nized as a sovereign state by the United Nations.

Upon their arrival, Purcell and the choir were the first Americans officially allowed into the new country.

That evening, they performed before a packed crowd in an 800-year-old cathedral. She said this performance set the tone for the remainder of their tour.

"It was very emotional," she said. "After our performance, you could tell the people were hungry for more. They were very receptive even though we sung primarily in English."

The second leg of the journey brought the choir to Leningrad. However, by the time they left, it was known


as St. Petersburg.

Here, they were bused to prisons, schools and orphanages to perform.

"It was really great to sing and touch these kids," she said, smiling. "We definitely made a connection, even though we spoke different languages."

That night, the choir performed in a sold-out concert hall. Purcell said the power of their performance was enough to move even a staunch, military presence to tears.

"A few Russian soldiers were stationed in the rear of the hall and they stood very aloof and appeared austere," she said. "By the end of the performance, however, they had tears in their eyes and they were hugging us, like the rest of the crowd."

Purcell said a member of the choir presented a Russian language Bible to a pair of newlyweds, who shared the same hall that evening. This Bible was one of thousands the entourage passed out while in the Soviet Union. The book dispersal was part of a year-long national project, which saw 4 million Bibles passed out in the U.S.S.R.

Purcell said the Bibles were accepted enthusiastically.

"The reaction was unbelievable once they found out that the Bibles were free," she said. "Everyone wanted their own Bible. They're seen as a status symbol because only 450,000 had been printed between 1917 and 1986.

"They're considered quite a scarcity in a country of 266 million people," she added.

However, the Bible distribution had its scary moments as well. While awaiting a Finland-bound train at the Kiev-Siberia Train Station, the group decided to unload the last of its remaining 1,500 Bibles.

Purcell said near pandemonium broke out.

"Large crowds started forming around some of our members and it was beginning to get a little scary. Luckily, they created a system where things went a little smoother," she said. "In less than an hour, all our Bibles were gone.

"A visitor commented that the swarm of people would be reminiscent of someone passing out \$1,000 bills in the south Bronx or free college scholarships anywhere else," Purcell added.

Purcell said the highlight of their trip was a threehour concert they performed in the Palace of Congresses Hall, Red Square, Moscow. However, the concert was nearly canceled.

That same day, just hours before, Soviet President Gorbachev was dissolving the country. Permission to perform wasn't verified until later that afternoon, with nearly 500 VIPs invited to the "Festival of Praise." With a seating capacity of 6,500, an estimated 2,000 people were turned away prior to the show.

Purcell said word of mouth and newly found independence spurred the people to investigate the palace, which had been off limits to civilians for decades.

Not only was Purcell's group the only civilian buses ever allowed in the Kremlin, they were first gospel group to ever perform in the Palace of Congresses Hall.

With freedom in the air, Purcell said the choir put of the show of a lifetime.

"We sang various American favorites and a few of the Russian language songs we'd learned while visiting," she said. "But when we sang 'Let Freedom Ring,' we brought the house down. They felt it, despite the language barrier.

"The arms were waving and the tears we're flowing," she added. "It's as if the Cold War had never existed."

Purcell said her experiences induced her to write a book on the trip, which is entitled, "A Miracle? God's Plan." This 250-page book depicts every step of her journey, with excerpts from colleagues and acquaintances. It's presently in the hands of her publisher.

Purcell said the trip had a story-book ending, which she interpreted as a sign.

"Just as we were about to leave for Finland, we noticed a double rainbow over Moscow," she said. "It was as if God was saying, 'Job well done."

Like seed tapes? Making your own can save

Seed tapes are easy to use but two or three times more expensive than seeds in a packet. You can have the convenience without the additional cost if you make your own seed tapes.

The trade-off is the time involved and the cost of the materials: a few paper towels and a little flour paste.

Begin by cutting the paper towel into strips about 3/ 4-inch wide, says Tom Stebbins, master gardener special-

ist at Michigan State University.

Then make the flour paste to hold the seeds in place. Mix 1/2 teaspoon flour with enough water to make a paste the consistency of heavy cream.

Check the seed packet for the recommended spacing for seeds and mark the paper towel strips accordingly. Then place a drop of flour paste and a seed at each mark. You might want to use tweezers to handle the seeds.

You could paste the strips together, but long tapes become difficult to handle outdoors, so Stebbins recommends leaving them short.

Allow the paste to dry thoroughly before storing the tapes in a jar or other container that will keep them dry until you're ready to plant.

At planting time, make a furrow at the appropriate planting depth (follow the directions on the seed packet), lay the tapes in the furrow and cover with soil. The paper and paste will disintegrate when they get wet, so it doesn't matter if the seed ends up beside or under the tape in the

Vegetables well suited to seed tapes include beets, carrots, lettuce, radishes, parsnips, spinach and turnips. Flowers include cornflower, cosmos, dianthus, marigold, strawflower and zinnia.

The big advantage of seed tapes, Stebbins points out, is that they make it easy to plant seeds at the proper spacing. This not only makes planting easier but also eliminates the need for extensive thinning later.



He noted that new ideas keep an operation fresh. "People with the least amount of experience sometimes come up with the simplest solutions to some of the complex problems facing the business world today," he


Delke said that often the young mind can see through the clutter in a problem and come up with a solution.

Prevent poisoning. take precautions

Poison prevention will be taking center court March 15-21 when the country is asked to recognize the 31st anniversary of National Poison Prevention Week.

This event is intended to raise awareness of the dangers of accidental poisonings and of the measures needed to prevent them from happening.

In light of this event, the Southeastern Michigan Society of Hospital Pharmacists (SMSHP) offers the following housekeeping rules to prevent poisoning acci-

■ Keep all household chemical products and medicines out of the reach and sight of youngsters. These items should be locked up when not in use.

■ When these produces are in use, NEVER let them out of your sight. If you must leave the room for some reason, either take the product with you or store it out of the reach of children.

■ Store all medicines separately from household products and store all household chemicals away from

Keep all medicines and chemical products in their original containers.

Leave the original labels on all products and read these labels before using.

■ Always leave the light on when giving or taking medicines.

Avoid taking medicines in front of children, since youngsters tend to imitate grown-ups.

Refer to all medicines as "medicine" and not

■ Clean out the medicine cabinet periodically. Safely dispose of all unneeded medicines when the illness; for which they were prescribed has terminated. If you have questions about disposal of medicines, ask your pharmacist for help.

■ After using, always secure packaging properly. If a household chemical or medicine has been swallowed, follow the first-aid instructions on the label and then seek medical advice. This can be done by calling the local Poison Control Center, whose phone number is located on the inside cover of the telephone directory.

For quick access, place this number on or by other emergency phone numbers.




