On July 6, the school board considered a motion to institute a pay-to-participate policy in grades 7-9, with the suggested figures of \$200 for ninth-graders and \$125 for seventh- and eighth-graders per student, per sport. The motion failed 2-5. Voting no were Janet Thomas, Sheila Hughes, Kurt Karlstrom, Karen Foyteck and Joseph Helpern. Voting yes were Thomas Howard and Paul Van Klaveren.

# Principal digs in for Clarkston High's first day

Even though most students won't be starting school until Monday, Aug. 31, Jim Goebel, new principal at Clarkston High School, has already begun.

On July 1, he began his career at Clarkston High School and has already become involved with school activities, which has "never been a problem," he says.

He attended prom and graduation festivities this spring, worked with staff during an in-service day, and spent two days with a school improvement team.

Some of his other "extra-curricular activities" include sitting in on an Athletic Boosters Club meeting and rolling up his sleeves to help paint the new team building near the track and football field.

Adjusting to the change from Spring Lake High School in northern Michigan to the more populated Clarkston has been a welcome change for Goebel, he says. However, he won't be able to start shopping for a Clarkston-area home until he can sell his Spring Lake residence.

If he's unable to sell his home by the start of the school year, he'll stay at his mother-in-law's house in Redford Township and make the 28-mile commute.

When he moves, Goebel will bring his wife "Virg" and two school-age children with him — Matthew, an 11th-grader, and high school freshman Danelle. He also has two grown daughters; Julie, 23, and Emily, who attends Michigan State University, East Lansing.

The 49-year-old Goebel has been involved in education since 1965. Originally from Farmington, Goebel possesses a master of arts degree in educational leader-

ship from Eastern Michigan University, Ypsilanti. He also owns two bachelor of arts degrees from the University of Detroit in economics and business.

During his 27 years in education, he has served as a high school instructor in Redford Township, assistant principal at Bishop Foley and Marlette high schools and a principal at Marlette and Spring Lake high schools.

Goebel says he's impressed with the students he has

other facility-based aspect poses a pressing question. In fall 1993, Clarkston's freshmen will move to the high school, but where will they go?

Goebel says he and others have studied the building and figure they'll be able to create another five classrooms by dividing existing rooms and shifting uses. But another 11-12 classrooms still are needed.

While no decisions have been on how to cope with the space problems, ideas include building another high school; adding onto the present Clarkston High School; splitting classes by sending 900 of the estimated 1,800 students to a new high school; or having split-session classes — one session in morning, another in the afternoon.

Putting aside some of the bigger issues, Goebel talks about his short-term goals.

He hopes to "come to grips" on the unresolved teachers' contracts and hopes that he will receive that cooperation from those who don't have contracts, he says.

One of his main focuses will be to educate the public

and to find out what the kids' needs are. To achieve this, he plans to visit classrooms, ask questions, and most importantly, listen.

As far as his students are concerned, he hopes that he can improve their educational development, build up their team skills, and as a confessed "cheerleader," encourage every student to at least be involved in one extracurricular activity.

The most important thing for students to build while attending Clarkston is their communication skills, he says.

Although to "contribute to the pride" of Clarkston is Goebel's goal, it seems he already is one his way to reaching it.

"I am blessed to be in a position where I can make a difference," Goebel says. "That is the other half of my paycheck."

# Witnesses tell of drug, money deliveries for Family

Day two of the preliminary exam for "The Family" was more subdued than day one as friends and members testified that the five youths charged with conspiring to sell LSD did in fact organize themselves into a LSD selling operation.

According to witnesses, Stanley (Kelly) Watkins, 18, Jason Smith, 18, and Bryce Kidder, 17, all of the Clarkston area; Philip Laycock, 18, of Lansing; and Mark Bierman, 20, of Troy; were all involved in some way in the buying and selling of LSD.

Watkins, according to police officials, allegedly organized a group of teens to sell LSD in Clarkston and the surrounding areas.

The preliminary exam is to continue for the five men at 1 p.m. Tuesday, Sept. 1, in 52nd District Court, Independence Township, in front of Judge Gerald McNally. In McNally's court last week, Holly Goodrich, 17,

of Clarkston and a former member of The Family testified that she voluntarily talked to Oakland County Sheriff's Detective Doug Edgar in April 1992.

"I wanted out of this (The Family), so I talked to Edgar," Goodrich said. "I didn't think Kelly (Watkins) should be on the streets; he should be in jail.

Steve Hall, 17, of Clarkston testified that he "saw money and acid change hands" between Kidder and Watkins. He said that Kidder gave Watkins money and received 50 hits of acid.

"I told Bryce not to sell acid anymore or he'd go to jail. He was selling it in school," said Hall.

Tracy O'Neil, 17, of Waterford said, "We (The Family) planned to get a house and sell drugs to get it.'

O'Neil also admitted that she took Smith to a Denny's restaurant in Royal Oak to buy LSD from a man named "Willie." She identified Bierman as "Willie."

Hillary Riggert, 18, testified that she was the gobetween more than three times for The Family. She said that she would get money from Watkins, Laycock or Smith and use it to buy drugs from Bierman.

She said that at the end of February 1992 she contacted Bierman and asked to buy LSD from him. An admitted former drug user, Riggert said that Bierman didn't want to sell to her because she had been "sober" for two years. She convinced him that the drugs were for friends and proceeded to buy 60 to 200 hits of acid at a time

Riggert also testified that she personally delivered LSD to Kidder's mailbox and retrieved money from it for the purchase of the drugs.

The witness said that she participated in the buying and selling of drugs because Watkins promised to protect her from someone that she was extremely afraid of.

LSD, lysergic acid diethylamide, is an organic compound that causes psychotic symptoms similar to those of schizophrenia.

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# CHS students face LSD charges in separate case

Bryce Wayne Kidder, an alleged member of "The Family," faces a pretrial hearing on Sept. 1 in a separate drug case.

Plus, another Clarkston-area teen also will be ar-

raigned on charges that he tried to deliver LSD.

The 1 p.m. pretrial in Oakland County Circuit Court is not connected to the preliminary exam underway in 52nd District Court, Independence Township. In that case before Judge Gerald McNally, five young men are charged with conspiring to sell LSD to area high schools. Some of those suspects call themselves "The Family."

In the case in circuit court, Kidder's charges were reduced to misdemeanor counts of possessing LSD and possessing imitation LSD. A charge of possessing fake hallucinogenic mushrooms was dropped by visiting Judge Patrick Murray, 52nd District Court, Independence Township.

Kidder allegedly possessed 88 hits of acid, 43 of which were laced with LSD, said E. Reid Roe, assistant prosecutor in Oakland County.

'(The ruling) flies in the face of common sense," said Roe. "Most of it was imitation, and Kidder admitted that it was. With the amount of drugs (he had), it's obvious he planned to sell it."

Roe illustrated his belief with Kidder's alleged role in a supposed drug ring.

"His role in the conspiracy (The Family) was to distribute the drugs and return the money to Matt Krulick,

and he would return it to Kelly (Stanley Watkins). "I think he (the judge) wanted to give the kid a break," said Roe.

Shaun Hatfield, 17, of Clarkston, faces arraignment before Circuit Court Judge Gene Schnelz on Aug. 13 on charges of possessing LSD and intent to deliver imitation LSD

In April, a Clarkston High School teacher intercepted a note written by Hatfield, who allegedly offered to sell LSD to a fellow student.

Both Hatfield and Kidder are free on bond.

Comparing leaders

Supervisor Frank Ronk has three more months in office before fellow Republican Dale Stuart takes over, and area residents may want to prepare themselves for the change in leadership.

Day-to-day operations will likely be similar because department heads will remain the same. But meetings may be run differently, and decisions definitely will be made differently.

The following analysis of the leadership styles comes from observing both when they served on the township board and from the comments of those working in the township.

#### Dynamic speaker

Ronk's leadership style is of a personal nature. He prefers to get to know the people he supervises and governs and bases many decisions on the individuals involved. But that means some decisions are based on the personalities involved, which leads some to claim that he can be unfair or that he plays favorites. In the same vein, Ronk has been known to harbor grudges.

He has a loyal following within the township office. For the most part, his department heads respect him and like him. However, a few township employees have strong negative views of him, usually accompanied by claims of unfairness and even underhandedness. I don't know the details, but it could be a communication problem. He may have made decisions affecting some without their knowledge, for instance.

In public, Ronk is a dynamic speaker, making jokes and using easy-to-understand language. He prefers things to run smoothly and when someone interferes with this, he can show his temper.

When running the township, Ronk uses the methods that have served him well in all of his years as public service, first as fire chief, now as supervisor. That is, he tries to move things along quickly and uses informal approaches to discuss items.

However, in trying to keep bureaucracy to a minimum in this manner, he sometimes leaves out some of the populace -- sometimes even board members -- who should have a chance to comment. His philosophy, it seems, is that if he knows how an issue will turn out, why waste the time and paperwork getting all of the extra comments and points of view, when an issue can be decided immediately?

#### **Known for fairness**

Stuart, on the other hand, is entirely different. For instance, he bases his decisions on the issues involved and carefully weighs the merits of each case, regardless of the personalities. He is known for fairness. This leads some to believe that he is cold and impersonal, that their past performances will have no bearing on his next decision.

Within the township, some department employees think he is against their department. This is because he vigorously questions all expenditures. And if the township money is tight, he will not hesitate to cut department budgets. Since assessing, water and sewer, and building and planning are the essential services a township provides, that means Stuart likely will look first at parks and recreation or the library. (Fire, police and safety paths have their own millages - money that can be used for nothing outside of each department.)

However, he questions expenditures in all ments, so if a department head can justify a cost and is prepared, Stuart will likely OK it.

Accomplishments and promises

The recent election seemed to hold a few more tales of accomplishments and promises than I remember in past elections.

I made notes of some of the incumbent vs opponent statements on all levels of government.

In Washington: Congress has done nothing since its inception except raise taxes, waste money, promote special interests and kick dogs.

by Easter. Parks will be open 24 hours a day, lighted and crime-proofed at no additional cost. Plea bargaining will only be allowed on February 29ths. To solve the waste problem, garbage will simply not be allowed or put on the endangered species list. To stop crime I'll jail everyone.

Locally: Our Master Plan has been implemented and a new one will be implemented that will satisfy absolutely everyone. Attorney fees have been contained. All students will have completed their education in Oxford by September 15. Although 11 years have passed since it was started, we are well ahead of our 20-year plan to complete Lakeville Road straightening. When elected I will see that assessments are eliminated. Property owners will be put on the honor system for tax payments. I'll vote for schools to conduct their own lottery for necessary financing. I'll permit no golf courses and demand more recreation areas. No factories will be allowed and more jobs will be required. A tree will not be allowed to die or be struck by lightning.

In public, Stuart is calm and cool, without showing much emotion. He sometimes can lapse into "legalese' but is better than most attorneys at speaking in shorter, more easy-to-understand sentences.

Though Stuart, too, is interested in running an efficient township hall, he is more likely than Ronk to involve the people in the decision-making. For instance, if an extra public hearing (not required by law) would slow a project and delay a decision but would benefit a majority of residents, Stuart would probably favor such an expensive delay as publicizing and holding an extra meeting. Too, while Stuart carefully watches spending, he favors spending if the majority of residents favor it in a certain area.

Stuart's philosophy seems to be that the abstract ideas such as people's "right to know" is paramount to good government. As parliamentarian of the board when he was trustee, he showed that the rules of open meetings and procedures were important to him and should be important to everyone.

Those wishing to be sent to Washington: I will change all things. I'll take no PAC money. My wife (husband) will take in ironing. I'll cut taxes. I'm honest. I have integrity. I'm dedicated. I won't allow kicking of dogs.

In Lansing: Things have never been better. I helped the governor sell the airplane. I cut the budget. I held taxes down. I may have taken MEA, MBA, UAW and FFA money but it didn't affect my voting. Check the record.

When I go to Lansing I'll solve the school financing debacle. I'll cut legislators' pay. I'll feed and shelter the homeless, give aid to seniors, increase welfare and hold down spending. Trust me.

County government: All crime has been cut. Illegal drug sales have practically stopped. Roller blading is under control. Roads are near perfect. Drains are draining. The clerk is clerking, treasurer treasuring and grass is being laid, green side up.

I'll have all roads resurfaced and bridges rebuilt

I'm sure there will be more notes of accomplishment and promises made by the November election.



It appears that "change" has become the political buzz word of 1992 and Dale Stuart was able to cash in on its appeal. After November, it will be interesting to see how the incumbent-dominated board and Stuart interact. Stuart has said that he wants to step back and take a look at projects such as the DDA and the fire hall. This could tick off a few trustees who have put considerable time and effort into both. And what of Tink? What does he have planned for his last three months in office. I don't see him acting as a lame duck supervisor in his time left. Odds are, his actions will be supervised very closely by residents, to make sure he doesn't usher in any unwanted changes before his time is up.

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I once spent several days covering the Tigers' spring training in Lakeland, Fla., and exclusively reported to rapt readers that owner Ton Monaghan's calves were bigger than his players' calves.

Monaghan told me so himself, as we sat together in front-row seats, watching Detroit lose to Los Angeles. He said his calves were even bigger than those of catcher Lance Parrish.

Modestly, Monaghan pointed out that large calves aren't developed; you have to be born with them. And you don't have to be born in a barn. The calves he referred to are the backs of human legs, below the knees, not livestock.

That was the type of fascinating baseball detail you couldn't read on the sports pages in March 1984; you had to read my column. John Campbell, then the Tigers president, was a friendly neighbor of mine, and he arranged for me to share a Marchant Stadium box with Monaghan. It was Monaghan's rookie year and it is interesting eight years later, to unearth those old Lakeland columns and recall how Monaghan impressed me then.

After Kirk Gibson loudly used a four-letter word while disagreeing with an umpire, Monaghan shouted: "Watch the language." And I wrote: "I don't know if Gibson heard his boss. I don't know if Monaghan intended for Gibson to hear him. I do know Monaghan isn't reluctant to call out opinions of his players on the field, but he is such a friendly, unassuming person that I think he does it more as a fan than as the owner of the club."

There was also this description: "Monaghan doesn't look old enough to own the Tigers. Bounding around Marchant Stadium in a Mickey Mouse T-shirt, he looks like your nephew Tom who works in the engineering department at Chrysler, plays softball every weekend and is often late with the mortgage payment."

That was then. Monaghan stopped being an exuberant fan several years ago. He is selling the team he used to gush over, and he fired his former idol, Bo Schembechler, and my friend Campbell, who surely deserved better. What happened? Many people explain Monaghan's strange behavior by saying he got religion. Which seems like an unfair rap to put on God.

I've dumped on Monaghan so much the last few years, I don't feel the need to add to the avalanche of scorn he deserves for Monday's fax and phone firings. Instead, I'm thinking about a book, and wondering if Monaghan became disillusioned with big league baseball, just as I have.

The book is "The Shortstop" by Zane Grey. When I was around 10 years old, I probably read "The Shortstop" twice every week. Fifty-five years later, I still remember I loved that book because the hero was motivated solely by loyalty to his team and his town.

Such an old-fashioned attitude sounds incredible today. Modern players are corporations who locate only in

cities willing to pay them 50 years' salary for five years' work.

Well, Tink may have been hurt by myriad community topics and controversies. They include:

1.) Rising taxes. Everyone complains about them and voters may have wanted to make a statement.

2.) The new fire station controversy. Over the past six months, we've gotten calls and letters from people who are angry that the township was proceeding with this project, even though voters nixed two fire hall-related bond issues.

3.) The cityhood debate. It lasted nearly two years in the courts, costing the township and city around \$30,000 in cumulative attorneys' fees. The

But there was a time when ballplayers represented their town, not their agents, and they played just as hard to earn their neighbors' esteem as they did to earn their pay. Those were the days when the opposing team was the dratted enemy, not a prospective employer holding auditions.

I know. Baseball and other major league sports are big business today, not children's games. If team owners are stupid enough to pay players outrageous salaries, and fans are stupid enough to support home teams that change homes every season, that doesn't mean players should be stupid enough to reject riches in favor of loyalty.

I can accept that and still enjoy an occasional game at Tiger Stadium. But I certainly don't care enough to get angry about who owns the team this year, or who plays first base next year. Like Monaghan, I've lost a lot of my enthusiasm for baseball.

I am mad enough, however, to kick Monaghan in the shins for firing Jim Campbell. Even if his shins are as big as his calves.

# Give city two-year trial before signing petition

Last week's Clarkston News reported on the petition drive of Middle Lake resident John Gaskell seeking to have a portion of that area secede from the newly formed City of the Village of Clarkston.

His reason for undertaking the petition effort is quoted as being, "I don't see a need for city government." Of course, this is a democracy, and we must certainly respect the right of any citizen to hold, voice and voice his opinion.

The State Boundary Commission approved a city, and village residents voted to establish a city, based on the existing village boundaries.

Mr. Gaskell's petition drive would seek to remove property from the village and change its boundaries. This would be tantamount to dissolving the city approved by the majority of the voters.

The statute under which we "incorporated" as a city requires that a two-year trial period pass before residents can file a petition calling for an election on whether to dissolve the new city. Obviously, Mr. Gaskell is unwilling to give cityhood a chance or wait and follow that procedure.

Just as the township did when it sued to stop cityhood, he plans to use legal maneuvering to thwart the will of the majority by using a statute which is totally unrelated to the "incorporation" of a new city. The legal battle brought by the township cost village residents almost \$15,000, even though we won in every court.

This new "back-door" legal effort will undoubtedly cost us thousands more since we must uphold our legal and democratically made decision to become a city within our current boundaries.

Has Mr. Gaskell fully informed his neighbors of the following facts?

• That the "detachment" statue he apparently is using for the petition drive has never been used for, nor

was it intended to be used for, taking territory from a newly incorporated city.

• That in a "detachment" election, neither his neighbors who might not want to be detached from the village nor other village residents would decide the matter in an election, since township residents can sign the petitions and all of the township's 15,000 voters could also vote on whether to detach property from our new city.

• That the Middle Lake area asked to become part of the village 30 years ago when its residents petitioned to join the village. By doing so, they agreed to assume the democratic obligation to abide by the will of the majority of village voters. They wanted to be part of the village so

that it would pave and maintain their roads, things with a township cannot do. If they leave the village, they will no longer have road maintenance or snowplowing.

For these reasons, village residents who are asked to back this petition drive should carefully consider the consequences of their actions on themselves and their neighbors. We don't need further dissension or to incur further unnecessary legal costs.

Please wait and see how cityhood goes. If, after the two-year statutory period, any residents want to petition to dissolve the city, then they may certainly do so. The matter then can properly be decided only by those affected by cityhood in the first place, village voters and taxpayers.

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Township OKs library millage language It's official — Independence Township voters will be asked to support operations at the township library next fall.

On Aug. 5, the township board unanimously approved ballot language for a Sept. 15 special election. That day, citizens will be asked to support the concept of an Act 164 Library.

This proposal asks township residents to approve one additional mill for the revamped library. This would bring the total millage rate for the library up to 1.75 mills. If passed, both the one-mill and existing 3/4-mill

packages will need to be renewed in two years.

One and three-fourths of a mill is \$1.75 for every \$1,000 assessed property valuation. That means the owner of a \$100,000 home, assessed at half its market value (\$50,000), would pay \$87.50 per year for library opera-

tions.

According to library director Mollie Lynch, money from the additional mill would be used to upgrade the library's sparse book collection.

This library proposal was approved July 21, nearly a week after the City of Clarkston and Independence Township officials failed to agree on a shared library millage. The Clarkston City Council has a contract with the library for services through Dec. 31 of this year.

If a new contract is not agreed on by the two municipalities, city residents wouldn't be allowed to check out library materials.

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# Montessori school reinstated by state

A Clarkston-based Montessori school has been given a new lease on life.

Last week, representatives with the state Department of Social Services (DSS) and the former Ivy Hall Montessori School ironed out a re-structuring agreement before an administrative law judge in Detroit.

These successful talks negated the possibility of the school being closed indefinitely.

The Ivy Hall Montessori School on Ortonville Road, Independence Township, was suspended by the DSS last May after program director Scott Niederluecke admitted to using drugs on the premises. Niederluecke was fired from his position soon after.

The one-year-old facility had catered to 13 preschool and kindergarten-age children.

Tom Rabette, attorney for Montessori, said the Aug. 5 negotiations resulted in the reinstatement of the school's operating privileges.

"The department (DSS) is willing to restore an operating license to the facility, assuming the facility satisfies some detailed pre-conditions," Rabette said.

Among these contingencies is the order that Niederluecke be disassociated from the school altogether, Rabette said.

Along with a new license, the school will receive a new name — Clarkston Montessori. Rabette expects the school's license and its prospective program director, Adele Kieras, to be approved by the DSS in late August. Classes are already being planned for the fall, he added.

Rabette said Montessori school officials are looking to put this bad episode behind them and concentrate on educating Clarkston's children.

"The school is going to have to put its best face forward and try to restore the community's confidence," he said. "To the best of my knowledge, some of the parents of the former students have expressed their support in the school and that's a good start."



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
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



# Lamm a lion on river



A 20-year-old Clarkston High School graduate and his 67-year-old partner used their age difference as a plus to finish 18th out of 33 teams at the Weyerhaeuser AuSable River Canoe Marathon.

Fritz Lamm, a 1990 Clarkston graduate, and Al Widing Sr. of Mio finished the Grayling to Oscoda marathon (between 120-150 miles) in 16 hours, 11 minutes and 59 seconds. They split \$600 in prize money for their efforts.

Brett Stockton of Grayling and Serge Corbin of St. Boniface, Quebec, shared the first-place prize money of \$5,000, completing the race in 14 hours, 51 minutes and 46 seconds.

The grueling race began at 9 p.m.

July 25 with a LeMans-style start, the 66 canoeists racing for three blocks down the streets of Grayling before shoving off from the shores of the AuSable River.

Canoeists paddle between 60-90 strokes per minute in the non-stop race, with much of their time spent in darkness.

Lamm, who ran varsity track and played JV football and basketball at Clarkston, certainly knows about the race being non-stop.

"If you gotta go to the bathroom, you go in the boat," said Lamm, a junior at Central Michigan University studying secondary education.

The canoeists rely on lightness as much as balance, strength and technique. The canoes weigh between 25-30 pounds and the oars are 7-14 ounces.

Liquids for replenishment are carried on board but food (mostly fruit) is strategically given to the racers by their "feeders." The feeders often wait in darkness downstream, calling out numbers or other codes to help communicate and identify a particular canoe.

Lamm and Widing's feeders were Lamm's sister, Janet Stevens, his girlfriend, Jannice LaDuke, Joe Smock and Todd Witcher.

The AuSable race is the second leg of a North American "triple crown." In the first leg at Cooperstown, N.Y., Lamm and Widing finished 35th out of 45 canoes. The last leg will be on Labor Day in Shawinigan, Quebec.

Lamm, who during the summer works with K-6 students through the Grayling


Recreation Authority, has only been canoeing for about two years. But he found quick success, finishing fifth in the amateur state championship last year with partner Eric Swander.

And then Widing found Lamm this May, asking him if he wanted to team up for the triple crown.

"I was shocked and honored at the same time. He's a legend in canoe racing," said Lamm.

Lamm said Widing is a good teacher. "I learn something new every day from him," said Lamm. "There's a lot of technique. Canoeing isn't just getting in the boat."

But if you want the express trip on the water, it's a good idea to get in a boat with Lamm or Widing.

# McGee to provide township board with new blood

Come November, the Independence Township Board will be taking on a more youthful appearance.

No. the trustees haven't found the elusive fountain of youth, but they'll soon discover a fresh, new face among them — Jeffrey McGee.

The 29-year-old Onandaga resident tallied 1,407 votes in the Aug. 4 primary election. He was one of four Republicans vying for a four-year seat on the township board. McGee took fourth in the race, behind incumbents Daniel Travis, Mel Vaara and Bruce Mercado.

McGee would fill the vacated seat of Trustee Jean Saile, if he garners enough support in November's general election. Since no Democrats are on the ballot, McGee

and the three incumbents will probably be overwhelmingly elected.

A mortgage banker with Watson Group Financial, Waterford, McGee longs to be more involved in commu-nity affairs.

"I've been involved in the community through the Walters Lake Board and the Independence Republican Club," he said," and I saw the township board as an avenue to getting more involved in local government." A newcomer to the political scene, McGee has

aspirations of better informing his constituents. As a trustee, my primary focus will be the disclo-

sure of information and letting the public in on decisions," he said. "This way, I think I have a real good opportunity of helping the community.

'I'm also looking forward to working with Dale Stuart, who impressed me with his wide margin of victory in the supervisor race," McGee added.

A native of Rochester Hills, McGee and his wife Dody have lived in the township for the past three years. He owns a bachelor's degree in finance from Western Michigan University, Kalamazoo, and is a licensed builder and real estate broker.

McGee said he was lured to the area because of its quaint surroundings.

'Growing up in Rochester Hills, I saw it grow and grow until it took me nearly a half an hour just to get to I-75," he said. "The bedroom community aspect of the Clarkston area is what brought me here.'

Once on board, McGee hopes to tackle a couple of hot issues: the proposed public safety complex and better relations with the City of Clarkston.

"I think the township does need a new fire hall, but I haven't been convinced that the location presently in the works is the answer," he said. "I think the township should weigh all its options carefully before making a commitment."

McGee was equally as passionate about the state of relations between the township and the fledgling city.

"I think the current state of affairs has gotten totally out of hand," he said. "We really need to work together and not divide this community any further.

'I don't know why it's become such an antagonistic environment when both sides can benefit from an amiable relationship," McGee added.

McGee doesn't foresee his age as a detriment, considering he's young enough to be the offspring of half his fellow board members.

"I see my age as an advantage. You need a diversi-

fied group in order to understand everyone's point of view," he said. "I'll try to make a contribution as a member of the younger generation, while relying on the more experienced board members for points of protocol and historical aspects."

For now, McGee said he doesn't have any aspirations of climbing the township's political ladder.

'I don't have any long-range plans for higher office," he said, "but I do intend to be at the forefront of things and make a difference as a trustee.'

Lake Road near Teggerdine Road in White Lake Township should bring southeast Michigan immediate warning of impending severe weather.

The station is designed to issue short-fuse warnings. Those warnings include tornadoes, high winds, and severe thunder and rain storms.

Dean Gulezian, National Weather Service (NWS) area manager and head meteorologist for the Ann Arbor weather station, said the new station helps to modernize and restructure the NWS.

Right now, 10 weather stations provide information on Michigan weather, but by the late 1990s, the number will have dropped to four modern stations, said Gulezian.


The \$1.4 million project was completed by Excell Corp. of Pontiac and will be the home of state-of-the-art weather equipment including the doppler radar, according to Gulezian. The White Lake Road station is the first doppler radar in the state — only three operate in the entire country.

Doppler radar picks up wind velocity in the air, and if a circulation of winds exist that may become a tornado, the NWS will know about it and warn the community before the tornado becomes a reality, said Gulezian.

Another useful feature of the new radar is that it will show gust fronts in front of a rain storm, he said, adding that older radars don't pick the winds up and sometimes the most damage is done before the rain comes.

The Ann Arbor station is to be moved to the White Lake Road location in November 1992. The radar is to be delivered in April 1993 and should be operating within six weeks after delivery. The station is scheduled to be fully operational by the mid to late 1990s.





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


# 9th-grade move to high school under scrutiny



# Docks unfair to most in association, one says

Wetlands are not the only issue in a controversy over new docks on Woodhull Lake, according to one area resident.

Dave Preston of Ennismore, Independence Township, said about 400-500 people in the area surrounding the lake disapprove of a plan to build a 40-slip marina on Woodhull Lake in Waterford and Independence townships

They have filed a lawsuit in Oakland County Circuit Court to stop construction and to overturn the Department of Natural Resources' approval for three new boat docks and accompanying finger piers.

But another protest has not been filed as a lawsuit but is just as valid, said Preston.

Lakefront owners are the only people allowed a voice in lake matters; however, lakefront docks are against the charter of the Parkwoode Shores Homeowners Association, which is composed of lakefront and off-shore residents.

Further, the so-called lakefront residents don't actually own lakefront property. The 150-foot-wide strip of land bordering the lake is actually "common property" deeded to the entire association, said Preston.

But when the docks will be built, they will be deeded to the so-called lakefront property owner.

And that's not only unfair but against the homeown-

## 5 employees recalled

ers' association's rules, said Preston.

Right now, the wetlands in the common area provide a home for such animals as ducks. Despite the DNR approval, Preston is convinced the ducks will leave if the docks are built.

One other pitfall of new docks: boat traffic will increase, he said.

"This is only an 80-acre lake," he said, explaining that the 70-boat parking spaces at the the adjacent Lake Oakland public access effectively limits boat traffic. But the extra 40 slips will mean a potential of an extra 40 boats.

DNR spokesperson Carrie Hardigan said the docks won approval after changes were made to the original plan. For instance, they will not fill in wetland areas, and the dock configuration won't encroach into open water areas of the lake but will parallel the shoreline without encroaching the shoreline.

The DNR has no jurisdiction over a property association's deed restrictions. And the limiting the number of boats on a lake is not part of the DNR's decision in granting wetland permits.

The dock proposal needs a wetland permit from Waterford Township before construction can begin.





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

- 2 tablespoons chopped scallion
- 2 tablespoons chopped green pepper 2 tablespoons sliced radishes
- 1 tablespoon milk 1/2 teaspoon salt
- Dash pepper

## Wanted: Donors, blood drives

What began as a gradual dropoff in blood collections at the end of June has escalated to an outright plunge.

The American Red Cross, Southeastern Michigan Blood Services Region, reports that bloodmobiles in the region have collected 21 percent less blood in July than in June this year.

According to Red Cross officials, supplies for certain types of blood are already dangerously low for the 59 hospitals the Red Cross supplies. The organization is importing blood to make up for the shortfalls, but supplies continue to shrink.

Projected collections during August show the problem may become even more serious.


"The projected August collections are the worst I have seen in the 13 years I have been with Red Cross,' says Jenell Joiner, associate director of the Donor Resource Development.

Principal Officer A. William Shafer, M.D., says, "To prevent an extreme shortage, we need an immediate and sustained increase in collections."

They're asking area organizations to sponsor blood drives, he said.

'On many days in August, more than half of our mobile unites are not scheduled to collect blood," says Shafer.



# Gypsy moth study continues

ue to inclement weather, a gypsy moth study in Independence Township has been set back a month.

According to resident researcher Gordon Mason, he's been instructed by the Oakland County Cooperative Extension Service not to gather data until Sept. 15. The unusual weather in July - rainy and cold - has inhibited field conditions, the cooperative extension reported.

A migratory insect, the gypsy moth has been blamed for defoliating most of central Michigan. Eating the leaves of shade trees, these bugs were responsible for defoliating about 620,000 acres of trees in Michigan in 1991, reports the state Department of Natural Resources (DNR).

In the beginning of July, Mason planted four gypsy moth "traps" at the southern and northern borders of the township. Baited with an alluring but deadly insecticide, the moths enter the trap but never exit.

He was supposed to check the traps at the end of



July and report the number of dead moths in the traps. This is one way the cooperative extension is tracking the moths' density patterns, he said.

However, Mason will have to wait another month to check on his traps.

Mason reports he's spotted only one dead moth in one of his traps so far. He expects different results in a month, though.

Still in the caterpillar period, the cold weather has apparently hindered the insects' developmental patterns, prolonging the final "moth" stage.

So far, Mason has received caterpillar infestation reports from the Cranberry Lake and Oakhill Road areas. These problems have not been too severe, he added.

Residents with gypsy moth problems are encouraged to call Mason at 625-5111. Further information on battling the moth is also available at the township offices on 90 N. Main Street, Clarkston.
