# $Portables\,approved for\,Clarkston\,High$

To make room for the freshman at Clarkston High School next fall, the school district will buy four portable classrooms.

The Clarkston Board of Education approved the

purchase April 26. The vote was 6-1, with Treasurer Kurt Karlstrom voting against the motion.

The administration recommended the portables because CHS won't be able to properly facilitate the 500 new students anticipated next fall. More efficient use of existing space and the building renovations covered under the \$16.1 million bond issue will reclaim 18 rooms,

administrators say, but 22 will be needed.

These four classrooms are expected cost around \$160,000. However, it's uncertain if the board will approve four separate units or one four-section trailer. Competitive bids are expected by the May 4 board meeting.

Michael LaBay, deputy superintendent of instruction, said the portables are a "must."

"No one wants to spend this moncy," he said.
"We've walked the building numerous times, trying to find other alternatives. There's no doubt that we need these portables."

Steve Lenar, deputy superintendent of business and operations, said the money for these portables would probably come from the budget's building and site fund. This fund acts as a "rainy day" fund for maintenance improvements he said.

improvements, he said.

Lenar emphasized that the money for these portables wouldn't come from the recently passed bond issue.

Paul Van Klaveren, school board vice president, said he anticipated an increase in portables.

"Prior to the election, I considered the addition of just one portable to the high school as optimistic," he said. "I had a feeling we'd need more."

Karlstrom, who voted against the portables, said (See PORTABLES, next page)

# Three sent to hospital in bus crash

A school bus carrying 40 elementary students was involved in an accident at the corner of Dixie Highway and M-15 Tuesday afternoon.


According to Kevin Bickerstaff, director of transportation for Clarkston Schools, the bus was struck about 4:15 p.m. He said the bus was proceeding north on Dixie Highway, when a southbound car turned out in front of it attempting to make a left hand turn onto M-15.

The bus had the right of way, while the car reportedly

had a flashing red light in his left hand turn lane.

Three Pine Knob Elementary students were transported to Pontiac General Hospital after complaining of stiff necks, Bickerstaff said. The driver of the bus and the car were not hospitalized.

Bickerstaff said the bus suffered minimal damage to the front bumper and headlight. The car, however, was reportedly totalled.



# Search for fire hall re-ignites in Independence

After a five-month layoff, an Independence Township-based search committee will again take up the task of trying to find a site for a new fire station.

Members of the Independence Township Board urged the search committee to reconvene at its April 20 meeting. It's been nearly a year since fire station No. 1 in Clarkston was sold to Dick and John Morgan in down-

Next month, the township must start paying rent to the Morgans because their stay has exceeded a year. Under an agreement, the fire department will have to pay \$2,000 a month plus taxes to stay in the building.

Early last year, the township had planned to build the new station near the intersection of M-15 and Dixie Highway. However, property owner Dr. James O'Neill withdrew his offer to donate the land because of public division over construction of a new station.

"I don't like the fact that we've reverted back to portables to take care of our class needs, when we just passed a bond issue for that very reason," he said. "Our district should have seen this coming and planned for it ahead of time.

"I can think of a lot of areas in the district where we could better spend this money," Karlstrom added.

Karlstrom also faults the district's architectural consultant, Greiner, Inc., for not being able to complete scheduled renovations to CHS' media center, which would have freed up space and additional construction time in the school.

He expects the media center to be completed by the start of the 1994-95 school year, whereas it was supposed to be done by this fall.

be viable to have the township's fire department in another municipality.

Wilson added that a two-story station would be necessary for this location, considering the land's topography. He said city officials are opposed to this site because they fear such a location would force M-15 to be widened to four lanes.







# Board haggles over trash-toting Clarkstonites

The Independence Township Board has agreed to let city residents participate in the upcoming Spring Cleanup Days, but not without reservations.

On April 20, the board voted 5-2 to let Clarkstonites enjoy the same privileges as township residents regarding this annual event.

Supervisor Dale Stuart and trustees Bruce Mercado, Jeffrey McGee, Daniel Travis and Mel Vaara voted in

favor of the motion. Clerk Joan McCrary and Treasurer John Lutz voted against it.

The Clarkston City Council approved the measure unanimously April 26.

Spring Cleanup Days are slated for Saturdays, May 15 and 22, at the Independence Department of Public

Works on Flemings Lake Road.

McCrary said city residents should either be charged a non-resident fee or not participate at all. She said equal participation wouldn't be fair to township residents.

"They're no different than someone coming in from Brandon or Rochester," she said. "The people of Clarkston voted to become a city, so they should be responsible for their own services."

Travis said this event originated in the hopes of cleaning up some of the dump sites found in the rural parts of the township. He said the village doesn't appear to have a problem with abandoned junk.

Stuart was in favor of equal treatment because he thought it'd be a good gesture to the fledgling city. Mercado agreed, even though he thought the move to be unjust.

"I'm going to vote yes on this because it will serve as a good gesture," he said, "but I still think it's unfair to township residents for outsiders to participate in this

# Board approves



# CHS is accredited for school year

Clarkston High School has a long tradition of accreditation, and this year won't be any different.

CHS Principal Jim Goebel announced last week that the school's North Central Association accreditation has been extended through the remainder of the 1992-93 school year. This action was taken at the NCA's annual meeting in Chicago on April 7.

"Along with hosting periodic on-site evaluations by a visiting team of educators, each NCA school is accredited on the basis of an annual report on conditions in the school and on such supplementary information as the Commission on schools requests," Goebel explained. "The continued accreditation means that the conditions for effective education exist in the school.'

The North Central Association is the largest of the country's regional accrediting agencies. It's a voluntary coalition of over 7,000 schools and over 1,000 colleges and universities in the 19-state region of the central U.S. The association works with schools to improve the quality of education through a continuous process of accreditation and evaluation.

# \$15,000 goes to library

The Indendence Township Library has been given a \$15,000 grant to help beef up its children's reference section.

Library Director Mollie Lynch said the federal grant money was made possible by the Library Services Construction Act. She said the \$15,000 will be used to buy about 790 books for the children's section.

Science and history books and biographies will be the top priority items, Lynch said. Some audio-visual equipment will also be purchased with the federal funds.

Lynch will begin ordering these materials in May, when the money is made available.



# Jim's Jottings

More on Arizona

There is no practical, back-roads way to go from Tucson, Arizona to Yuma, AZ. It's expressway or horseback once you get to the Ajo/Gila Bend road.

Between the Mexican border and I-8 and 115 miles west to east the land is all Luke Air Force Range. Fact is, a whole bunch of Arizona is devoted to the Air Force and Army.

Ex-Senator Goldwater did a good job getting money for his state in Washington for land that's absolutely useless and, except for our government, worthless. One big range has his name on it.

The only reason I wanted to go to Yuma is because I wanted to visit what is usually the hottest spot in Arizona. Also, the Gila River meets the Colorado river north of Yuma and I wanted to see the flooded, ruined lettuce crop the winter rains supposedly caused.

I did see some flooding, but no spoiled lettuce. Yuma may get hot, but it has thousands of acres of irrigated farm land. It looks prosperous.

So, up highway 95 to Quartzsite, Parker, Lake

Havasu and Bullhead City. Several miles south of Quartzsite, Hazel and I wondered to each other what all the motor and mobile homes were doing scattered around the desert. There were hundreds of them. They were in no pattern.

I thought Yuma was the land of RV's until I saw Quartzsite. We were told people can park their RV's in the desert all season for \$50.

Quartzsite is at the I-10 and US-95 junction. It's a flea market-convenience store settlement. After a hot dog in an off-track betting saloon-countrywestern dancé hall (lost \$2 on No. 6) we scooted north 35 miles to Parker for the night.

Parker is known for its dam. It's the deepest dam in the U.S. You can't tell by looking at it. The depth comes from its over-200 feet of footings below ground (water).

It's a nice, scenic area with numerous camp sites on the Colorado River where it runs through the Buckskin Mountains.

I remember reading ads in Parade magazine over 20 years ago urging us to buy lots in Lake Havasu, Arizona. I don't remember the price. However, prices didn't change much from the time chain saw maker Robert McCulloch started developing it until three years ago.

That's when Californians started fearing earthquakes and came over, causing prices to triple. McCulloch bought Britain's London Bridge in 1968 and rebuilt it at Lake Havasu, and this \$8 million investment helped him make over \$100 million on

The down side is McCulloch started it at age 60 and died at age 68. His name is very prominent there,

Sixty-two miles further north is Bullhead City, which is more often referred to as being across the river from a gamblers' haven, Laughlin, Nevada.

Few should want to live in Bullhead City, but it's growing fast. Zoning and planning for B-City is missing. It's a hodge-podge of car part-repair shops, convenience stores, gaud and clutter stretching a few miles on US-95.

No, we didn't look at housing.

Stretching the year

#### Stretching the year

The Japanese Ministry of Education had the nation in an uproar last year. It declared that public school students had to attend school three rather than four Saturdays a month, cutting Japan's school year from 240 to 228 days. Opponents took to the airwaves and editorial pages to proclaim the ruination of Japanese education.

The brouhaha in Japan no doubt seems curious to U.S. students, who attend school an average of 180 days a year. Only 11 schools in the entire country—five public and six private—are in session more than 210 days a year. On average, as a result, Japanese students attending 12 years of school received the equivalent of 16 years of schooling in America. Comparisons with other advanced nations are only slightly less troubling. "The length of the school year is the most impregnable bastion in American education," says Milton Goldberg, head of a national commission that is studying issues of time in U.S. education.

There is a strong case to be made for extending the nation's school year. In a 1991 review of 100 research projects, Herbert Walberg of the University of Illinois at Chicago found that in nine out of 10 instances student achievement rises with the amount of time in class. A 1989 study of students taking an international math test found that Japanese students had studied 98 percent of the precalculus and calculus topics on the test, while their U.S. counterparts had been taught only 50 percent. Half of the Japanese performed as well as the top 5 percent of

A longer school year also allows students to take more courses. To Greg Cash, a junior at Parry McCluer High School in Buena Vista, Va., where a 218-day school year is broken into four quarters, a longer school calendar means being able to enroll in a college-level biology

course this winter. He took a required prerequisite in chemistry during the last summer quarter, where courses run four hours in length. Though summer quarter is voluntary, 60 percent of the school's 400 students enroll.

Backsliding. Research reveals that kids lose a lot of ground educationally while letting their minds lie fallow during the summer. The New York Board of Regents has found, for example, that teachers spend on average the first month of the fall semester reteaching material forgotten over the summer. The problem is particularly acute for students from impoverished families because they often have fewer opportunities to learn during summer vacations. The New York study found that affluent students gain an average of one month of knowledge during the summer; disadvantaged students lose three to four months.

Extending the school year does not have to break the educational bank. Teacher salaries, air conditioning and transportation are the largest expenses. Charles Ballinger, executive director of the National Association for Year-Round Education, a California-based advocacy group, estimates it would cost \$880 million a day to increase the school year nationwide, or about 20 percent less than the daily costs of the regular 180-day year. However, Beacon High School, a small private school in Oakland, Calif., is open 240 days a year and charges only \$6,000 in tuition, less than the average public school spends per student. Beacon manages this by keeping a bare-bones administrative staff and paying its teachers about \$32,000 for 12 months' work, less than the typical public school teachers earns under a nine-month contract.

A decade ago, the authors of "A Nation at Risk" argued that the U.S. school year should be as long as 220 days. Their recommendation is still a solid one. Of course, lengthening the academic year in schools plagued by other problems isn't likely to yield great returns in academic achievement. The best strategy? Increase the quality and the quantity of schooling in America.







On Easter Sunday, April 11, 1993, he had a date with destiny, and it was time for him to fly off into the sunset,



Heartworm is a deadly disease transmitted to dogs via mosquito bites. It can be prevented by annual blood testing and administering preventative medicine to your pet.



When he is about 1 1/2 years old he will leave his foster family to "attend school" at Paws With A Cause headquarters in Byron Center. There Brandy will be taught more extensive basic obedience and advanced training, which will help prepare the youngster for the tasks he will perform as a Paws service dog.

Training includes pulling a wheelchair, opening and closing doors, fetching and retrieving fallen objects and many other tasks necessary to assist a physically challenged person.

Both Paws service and hearing dogs have legal public access throughout the nation. Because Brandy is being raised as a future Paws service dog, the Bonds usually have permission to bring him to public places. They have taken him to bowling alleys, the Renaissance Center in Detroit, Huckleberry Farms and shopping malls. This helps socialize the dog and makes it feel comfortable in public situations.

DJ, Sheri, Brandy and five other foster puppies and their families met recently at the Oakland Mall. It was a "work" and "play" outing. The dogs were observed by Lynn Hoekstra, Paws regional director, to see how they behaved in public. Brandy and his pals climbed stairs, rode elevators, and mingled with the shoppers. All the dogs were well behaved.

Brandy is the second foster dog that DJ and his family are raising. When it is time for him to be returned to Paws, they are getting another puppy. The new puppy will be placed in their home just before Brandy leaves. Because foster families get attached to the dogs it is sometimes hard to return them.

# Plant peas early for good yields

You can plant peas in the spring for an early summer harvest or in the summer for a fall harvest, but the best yields usually come from a spring crop — and the earlier you plant, the better.

Peas are one of the earliest spring vegetables, says Tom Stebbins, master gardener specialist at Michigan State University, East Lansing. They can go into the garden as soon as the soil is dry enough to work.

To test soil moisture, squeeze a handful of soil, Stebbins suggests. If it sticks together like a muddy ball when you open your hand, it's too wet. If it crumbles, it's ready to be worked.

Almost any well drained soil is suitable for peas, he notes, as long as it's not extremely acid. The other site requirements are full sun and plenty of water during dry weather, especially if pea pods are forming.

Early planting is recommended because peas don't produce well in hot weather, Stebbins explains. Summerplanted peas come into production after the worst of the summer's heat, but the spring crop is still usually the

better one. Sow pea seeds 1 inch deep and 2 to 3 inches apart in rows 2 feet apart. Peas do not need much nitrogen, and contact with commercial fertilizers may injure seeds, so use a low-nitrogen fertilizer such as 5-20-20 at the rate of 4 cups per 100 square feet. Mix half in the soil about 2 weeks before planting.

Vining peas will need some sort of support to grow on. Even dwarf or compact plants will be easier to harvest if they have some support.

Be sure pea fencing is sturdy, Stebbins notes. A flimsy fence may collapse under the weight of the vines or

blow down in a spring windstorm.

Harvest edible-podded peas when the peas are just beginning to form, and eat the whole thing, pod and all. You can wait until the peas are big enough to shell, but you lose a good part of your harvest that way, Stebbins notes. Harvest garden peas when pods are firm and well filled out but before they start to shrivel and change color. Old peas lose their sweetness and become starchy and

For top quality and best flavor, eat or freeze peas as soon as possible after harvest, Stebbins advises.

said the cooler April and May days are the ideal time to open a pool because the cooler temperatures mean fewer chemicals are needed.

And it means pool owners don't have to do a lot of cleaning to get it up and running. He said opening it now is a much better option than waiting until a very hot day when everyone wants to jump into the pool when it's not ready.

And for those who would rather only swim and not fuss with chemicals and cleaning, Gannon suggests automation.

"Pools are getting more automatic," he said. "With two parents both working, time is short. We can actually turn a pool almost totally automatic."

With automatic chlorinators, timers, filters and cleaners, a person could spend five minutes a month maximum to keep a pool in good condition.

"All you have to do is swim," Gannon said with a laugh.






If convicted, Hickman faces penalties of up to one year imprisonment and a maximum of \$100,000 in fines for each year he failed to file tax returns, in addition to whatever civil payments, penalties and interest are owed by him to the IRS.

The charges were part of an enforcement initiative targeting nonfilers. The Department of Justice and the Internal Revenue Service have made it a priority to investigate and prosecute cases against those who fail to file returns or evade taxes, said Markman.

3. For patterned carpet, consider proper matching of the design. In cut-pile carpets, make sure the pile direction is the same between the two seamed

4. Determine the position of seams and how the edges will be finished in doorways.

5. Make certain seams are strong enough to withstand stretching and traffic and yet be as inconspicuous as possible

6. Stretch carpet properly during installation to avoid wrinkles or buckles caused by traffic, humidity, and temperature.

Carpet Care and Maintenance:

With proper regular care, you can add years of life to your carpet and help to retain its original appearance. The most important thing you can do is to vacuum thoroughly and frequently, particularly in high traffic areas. Vacuuming helps remove dirt particles which abrade the carpet and dull the appearance. 




"We're just basically going to spread the word of God," Sailor said. "We will be forming a choir. We'll even be taking Bibles in the Russian language."


Sailor is excited about the trip because of the return of democracy, and therefore the right to worship, in the former Soviet Union.

The formal purpose of the trip is to support Russian Christians, build international relations, spread goodwill through music, and to witness to the unchurched.


Sailor, a senior at Clarkston High School, is busy learning about Russian culture. This will be her first big travel adventure.

QUESTION: I notice on my mortgage bill that the bank charges more than the principal and interest. It's labelled "escrow". What is it and how does it work?

ANSWER: An escrow account is money which is held by a third party to pay off a future debt. You are probably paying money into an escrow account for property taxes. In one way, the escrow account helps you out-wit human nature by a sort of forced saving.

Here's how your escrow account is set up. At the beginning of each year, your account is reviewed and your costs are estimated for the next year. The total is divided by 12 to get the monthly payment.

Area residents are invited to join the Rev. Kurt Gebhard and other area residents in a local observance of National Day of Prayer.

It takes place 12:20-12:40 p.m. Thursday, May 6, in front of the Independence Township Hall at 90 N. Main St., Clarkston. The day will mark the 41st consecutive observance of National Day of Prayer.

The first day was declared by the Continental Congress in 1775. In 1787, Ben Franklin reminded a failing and disillusioned Constitutional Convention, "In the beginning of the contest with Great Britain, when we were sensible of danger, we had daily prayers in this room for divine protection. Our prayers, sir, were heard, and they were graciously answered. ... Have we now forgotten this powerful friend? Or do we no longer need his assistance?

"I have lived a long time, and the longer I live, the more convincing proofs I see of this truth: 'That God governs the affairs of man.' And if a sparrow cannot fall to the ground without His notice, is it probably that an empire can rise without His aid?"

National days of prayer were declared from time to time until 1952, when by joint approval, the two houses of Congress called upon the president to set aside a day each year as a National Day of Prayer.

On May 5, 1988, President Ronald Reagan signed a bill changing the National Day of Prayer from a yearly observation proclaimed by each president to an actual commemorative day on the calendar — the first Thursday of each May, said Gebhard.


