The operating budget pays for such things as teacher salaries, textbook purchases and supplies.

# eputies pull woman, 62, from burning building

In his report, Deputy Christopher Yuchasz said he saw heavy black smoke billowing out of the front of the building and flames in the back. Deputy David Row told Yuchasz that an older woman was still in the building.

Row, an arson investigator for the OCSD, was just getting off duty at Pine Knob Music Theater when he heard the fire call and responded to the scene.

Row and Yuchasz entered the burning building and

found the woman. Deputy Daniel Toth, who was outside looking for Gibbs through windows, spotted her next to a sofa and yelled to Row and Yuchasz where to find her.

'As Row moved through the door, a ball of flame and smoke burst into the room, knocking me back far enough I could no longer see Row," said Yuchasz in his report. "I then lay flat and grabbed Row's foot and began to crawl back toward the door. Deputy Toth met me at the door, and when we pulled Row out the door, we then

realized he was pulling Gibbs with him," wrote Yuchasz. By this time, the fire department had arrived, and

they took over. Gibbs and Row were given oxygen and were transported to the hospital. Row was treated for smoke inhalation and was later released.

According to fire department Engineer Bob Pursley, the accidental fire began in trash cans behind the homes, possibly from still burning cigarettes. It took about one hour to clear the scene. Pursley said the cause of the fire is still under investigation. The damage estimate was not available at press time.

### Craig, McGregor oust school board incumbents BY CURT MCALLISTER

A pair of "Bills" bucked the odds Monday night by wrestling school board seats away from two incumbents.

Bill Craig and Bill McGregor earned the four-year positions by garnering 2,014 and 1,666 votes, respectively. The duo ousted incumbents Karen Foyteck and Paul Van Klaveren, who is vice president of the Clarkston Board of Education.

Foyteck received 1,163 votes, while Van Klaveren earned 872.

Another newcomer, Lee Rogers, collected the thirdhighest vote total with 1,200.

Both Craig and McGregor praised their family and friends for assisting in their campaigns. With victory in hand, the men pledged to increase interaction between the board and the public.

"My first objective is to try get the community more involved," said Craig, 39. "It's the only way to be successful. We probably won't always agree on matters, but at least we'll be working toward the same goal --- bettering our schools."

McGregor, 35, agreed, saying communication and planning are vital to the board's success.

"As I said during my campaign, the board is going to have to put together a variety of long-term plans addressing the district's many concerns," he said. "In turn, we'll have to let the public know what's going on and how much we intend to spend."

McGregor is a senior director of accounting at Henry Ford Health Systems. Craig is general manager of education accounts for Michigan Bell Communications (Ameritech).

The pair will be sworn into office on July 12.

School board member Janet Thomas welcomed the pair aboard, and thanked Foyteck and Van Klaveren for their dedication to Clarkston schools.

"The district owes Paul and Karen a debt of gratitude for their four years of service to this board," Thomas said. "They are consistently, good board members who've served this district well. I can only hope that the two newcomers will take their jobs as seriously as the two incumbents."



# Brush up on burning laws in your community


Watch what, where and when you burn in Independence and Springfield Townships and in the City of Clarkston.

With warm weather, residents do more yard work but they should first check the open burning ordinances in their community before burning debris.

Although the city has contracted Independence Township for fire services, those services do not include enforcing burning ordinances.

"If there's a complaint in the city, we don't handle it," said Independence Township Fire Chief Gar Wilson.

A resident with a burning complaint or questions should call the city office at 625-1559.



Ordinance 107 from the City of the Village of Clarkston states that the burning of leaves in the Village of Clarkston is prohibited. The burning of twigs and branches are allowed within city limits. Verbal permission is required before any burning takes place.

Springfield Township operates under a state ordinance, according to Chief Marlan Hillman. Burners in the township need a permit for open burning, and burning in containers is not allowed. Hillman said there are no specific "burning" days, but burning must take place during daylight, and black smoke is not allowed. Black smoke is caused by burning tires or items with chemicals such as paint or varnish.

Burning problems in Springfield are investigated by the Oakland County Sheriff's Department.

In Independence Township, a four-page ordinance regulates open burning. To burn on private property, residents are required to obtain a permit. And they may burn only on the first and third Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday and Sunday of the month during daylight.

Only leaves, brush, limbs and tree cuttings are allowed to be burned in Independence. Light paper and cardboard can be burned in approved containers daily without a permit — as long as it is not a nuisance to the neighbors.

The chief recommends that everyone consult with their neighbors before they burn to become aware of health problems and to avoid confrontations.

In Independence, an approved container is one with a maximum capacity of 55 gallons with vent holes on the sides and bottom and a screen over the top.

If you're caught burning on the wrong day or burning the wrong things in Independence, you will be warned once. If a second violation occurs, you will receive a ticket. If people do not comply after they receive a ticket, they can be taken to court.

Wilson said that residents are getting used to the open burning ordinance.

"The people have adapted to getting the permits and following the rules," he said.

Peter Thomas Zuk, 26, was seriously injured when the 1991 Honda he was driving went out of control and skidded into the median.

# Smoking soon may be banned during school hours

### School board considers tobacco restrictions

Smokers beware - your days of lighting up on Clarkston schools property could be numbered, or at the very least limited.

On June 14, the Clarkston Board of Education approved the first reading of a tobacco limitation policy for all district premises. The motion passed 5-0, with Sheila Hughes and Paul Van Klaveren absent from the

#### meeting.

Approval of a second reading is necessary before this policy is officially adopted by the district.

The policy reads, "In order to protect students and employees who choose not to use tobacco from an environment noxious to them and potentially damaging to their health, the board prohibits the use of tobacco on school premises, and district vehicles, including all the building and grounds owned and operated by the board of education between the hours of 6 a.m. to 4:30 p.m."

months," she said, explaining that most community organizations conduct food drives during the winter. Also, she said, more children are at home during summer, receiving fewer meals through the schools. So parents turn to agencies such as Lighthouse North.

The only hitch in the whole plan is that tickets were printed before the food drive was organized, so many concert-goers may not know that they should bring food. Also, she said, volunteers need a large enclosed

truck to park at the gate at Pine Knob, to be used to transport the food. She noted that a business owner, for example, who donated the truck for the evening not only would be helping the hungry but also would receive a lot of free advertising, since every concert-goer would see the truck.

Kaars said Lighthouse North has had to buy food lately because donations weren't keeping up with the demand. That's why she appreciates the Van Halen food drive so much.

"It's a wonderful thing. It just dropped out of the sky for us," she said.

The "use of tobacco" includes cigars, cigarettes, pipes, chewing tobacco, snuff or any other matter or substance containing tobacco.

According to the proposed policy, a designated smoking area will be allowed on school grounds in places designated by the superintendent, between the hours of 4:30 p.m. and 6 a.m.

Bill Curtis, president of the Clarkston Education Association, said his organization opposes such a policy. He considers the time restrictions discriminatory to employees and visitors.

He said the CEA would go along with a policy that either banned tobacco altogether on school grounds or designated a smoking area for all hours.

Superintendent Gary Haner said this policy is similar to a statewide bill pending in the Michigan Legislature.

When asked how the district intended to enforce such a policy, Duane Lewis, assistant superintendent of personnel services, said "there would be a verbal warning and then a gradual progression through the disciplinary process, if warranted.'

Curtis said the policy would be hard to enforce at such large-scale activities such as sporting events, particularly football games.


He said the CEA would probably take legal action if the policy is ratified in Clarkston.

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
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


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#### Jump!





I am saying this to you as you lie asleep with one little paw crumpled under your cheek and the curls stickily wet on your plump forehead. I have stolen into your room alone. Just a few minutes ago, as I sat reading my paper in the library, a hot, stifling wave of remorse swept over me. I could not resist it. Guiltily I came to your bedside.

These are the things I am thinking, Son: I had been cross to you. I scolded you as you were dressing for school because you gave your face merely a dab with a towel. I took you to task for not cleaning your shoes. I called out angrily when I found you had thrown some of your things on the floor. At breakfast I found fault, too. You spilled things. You gulped down your food. You put your elbows on the table. You spread butter too thick on your bread. And as you started off to play and I made for my car, you turned and waved a little hand and called "Goodbye, Daddy," and I frowned and said in reply, "Hold your been doing to me? The habit of complaining, or finding fault, or reprimanding, all of these were my rewards to you for being a boy. It was not that I did not love you; it was that I expected so much of youth. I was measuring you by the yardstick of my own years.

And there was so much that was good, and fine, and true in your character. You did not deserve my treatment of you, my son. The little heart in you was as big as the dawn itself over the wide hills. All this was shown by your spontaneous impulse to rush in and kiss me goodnight. Nothing else matters tonight, Son. I have come to your bedside in the darkness, and I have knelt there, choking with emotion, and so ashamed.

It is a feeble atonement. I know you would not understand these things if I told you them during your waking hours, yet I must say what I am saying. I must burn sacrificial fires alone here in your bedroom and make free confession. And I have prayed God to strengthen me in my new resolve. Tomorrow I will be a real daddy. I will chum with you and suffer when you suffer and laugh when you laugh. I will bite my tongue when impatient words come. I will keep saying it as if it were a ritual: "Here is nothing but a boy -- a little boy." I am afraid I have visualized you as a man. Yet as I see you now, Son, crumpled and weary in your cot, I see that you are still a baby. Yesterday you were in your mother's arms, your head on her shoulder. I have asked too much -- too much. Dear boy, dear little son, a penitent kneels at your infant shrine here in the moonlight. I kiss the little fingers and the damp forehead and the yellow curl. Tears come, and heartache and remorse, and also a greater, deeper love, when I think how you ran through the library door and wanted to kiss me.

My sisters and I were lucky enough to have a good one. I'd rank him (and the girls concur) "the best." I can only hope to do as good a job as ol' Pops Rush when it comes my turn.

In some respects he was the stereotypical American father. He did all those things that dads do. He gave Mom a kiss in the morning before he went to work, he played sports, watched sports and somehow found time to interact with us kids. I know it couldn't have been easy.

In our branch of the Rush clan, Mom was the stay-cool, calm and collected one. She's the one who molded us into good, caring human beings. Dad made sure we stayed that way, but he also gave us the undeniable Irish character we possess.

During those dreaded teen years I can remember sassing back to him, "You never teach me anything." How wrong could one long-haired teenager have been?




Most of my high school friends are already parents — by the way, congratulations to James and Ann (Peterson) Jenkins on their son James Jay who was born last Sunday.

But she honestly believes her racist opinion is rational, and that's scary.

As scary as the superbly made but totally dismaying movie, "Menace II Society." It's about gangs of black boys and young men who, exactly as the homicide officer put it, place no value on human life. They recklessly endanger their own lives while shooting out other lives, and they do it without regret, without remorse, without blinking.

That's because they realize their futures are bleak at best, so what's to lose?

It's easy to intellectualize the situation, to lament the dismal sociological conditions that cause teenage boys to have no hope beyond surviving Tuesday's gun battle to fight again Wednesday. It's satisfyingly compassionate to understand the reasons and perhaps even forgive the dreadful results.

But please, even though we understand the bullets, let them whir in someone else's neighborhood, not ours.

In "Menace II Society" the bloodshed is in Los Angeles. But the movie was created by two native Detroiters, twins Albert and Allen Hughes, and they have said they based some of its bloody characters on youths they knew in Detroit.

Talk about dismaying. The afternoon I saw it, it wasn't just the movie, it was the audience. Many of them were black teenage males, and too many of them giggled, cheered and otherwise celebrated each bloody murder, especially if it was committed for revenge.

That's how commonplace, how accepted, how unavoidable violence has become for some urban dwellers. They laugh at it because they don't know what else to do.

Which brings us back to the homicide officer. She phoned to scold me for writing no arrests had been made in the murders of two young Detroit brothers. She said solid suspects had been in custody for several days, but the news media hadn't bothered to report it because shooting deaths are so hohum ordinary in Detroit they become no-news overnight.

I've "talked" to children on the phone before and it is fun — but I was awestruck by her cry. She sounded so little, so strong, and (I'm sure) perfect.

Being a '90s kind of man, Steven was in the delivery room with his wife Angela while their baby was born. Considering he almost fainted once while we were giving blood in college, I was extremely proud of his bravery and strong stomach.

(Loud hurrahs should be given to Angela who did the whole labor, but back to Steven the Courageous.)

When I asked him how it went, he told me it wasn't too bad except his hand got cramped from rubbing Angela's back throughout the labor. Usually I don't give too much sympathy to the man for his pain during this process — but I did feel a little sorry for him. Steven didn't cut the cord. He said the doctor didn't mention it, and he wasn't about to bring it up.

He told me about her feeding habits and how she lost weight in the hospital (no one can gain weight on hospital food). He told me how she sleeps and con-

### Goodbye, potholes; gravel's on the way

Truckloads of gravel should help combat muddy roads for many Springfield Township residents.

The township board voted unanimously to allocate part of its 1993 Tri-Party money to graveling parts of four roads.

# Eastern hinges hopes on newest Eagle

Following a sub-par season, the Eastern Michigan University wrestling team is attempting to bolster its program with a formidable recruiting class.

Spearheading this class is Jerry Anderson, a state champion and the most heralded grappler in the history of Clarkston High School.

The 135-pound senior signed a letter of intent with the Eagles on May 1. With this decision, EMU will pick up half his expenses through an athletic scholarship.

Anderson said he's anxious to begin his collegiate career, but he wants to establish himself academically first.

"I could probably step in as a starter next year, but I'd prefer to be redshirted," he said. "I want to make sure my grades are squared away before I get in too deep."

Along with his belongings, Anderson will be bringing some impressive credentials to Ypsilanti next fall.

During his prep career, he set 13 school records and earned all-state honors all four years. His overall record was 165-16-1, which included 17 tournament championships.


He was a four-time GOAL and district champ and a three-time regional winner. He was also a member of Clarkston's 1991 state championship team.

Anderson captured the individual 135pound championship this past season, despite missing a month with a shoulder injury. He said the torn rotator cuff has completely healed.

"It's fine now," Anderson said. "When it happened, I thought my career was over. Luckily, it healed in time for districts."

Anderson chose Eastern over suitors such as Central Michigan, Ferris State University and Lake Superior State University. He said the Eagles had always been his number one choice.

"I wanted to go there all along," Anderson said. "I liked the coach, Willie Gadson, and the way he treated people. During my first visit, he talked to me as a

person and not like a politician trying to sell something.

"He's only been there about a year, but he's very knowledgeable on the sport," he added.

Gadson had been a four-time all-American in college, with assistant coaching posts at lowa and lowa State. Last season, he coached the Eagles to a 6-8 record overall, 1-4 in the Mid-American Conference.

Anderson intends to enroll in the criminal justice program at Eastern. Besides graduating, he's set some lofty goals for himself on the mat.

"Before I graduate, I want to be an

NCAA champ and help our team be competitive with schools like Michigan and Michigan State," he said. "We've got a lot of good recruits this year, so there's something to build on."

For the fourth straight season, Clarkston High School has won the GOAL's allsports trophy for athletic dominance.

Based on the league's scoring system, CHS scored 93.5 points to outdistance Lake Orion High who finished second with 80 points. The Dragons were followed by Waterford Kettering, Waterford Mott, Brandon and Pontiac Northern.

And the Class of 1993 may not be done yet. There are a few members of the successful varsity baseball team currently fielding offers from a number of prospective colleges.

When asked if this was the Clarkston's best athletic class ever, Tungate hedged.

"I'm not sure if it's the best ever

because we've had a lot of great teams and classes over the years," he said. "I think it's safe to say that this is the best collegebound class to ever go here."

Tungate said the Class of 1993's success can be attributed to its formative training.

"This particular group of kids started honing their skills at an early age, by going to camps and joining travel teams," he said. "A number of these athletes put a lot of time and dedication into their particular sports, and it shows.

"Mass signings like the ones we've had this year are good for the school and the community," Tungate added. "It also tends to bring scouts back to your school, which could benefit other athletes in the future."







# Gravel, intersection improvements on road list

Road construction is planned in Clarkston and Independence and Springfield townships this summer.

The Road Commission for Oakland County plans \$23 million in road construction this year.

Brent Bair, managing director of the Road Commission, said the construction will benefit area residents.

We know the construction is a pain to motorists when it's being done," he said. "But when the construction is finished, motorists will have a safer and smoother ride to their destination."

Projects that affect the Clarkston-Davisburg areas follow.

#### Clarkston

The intersection of Clarkston Road at M-15 is to be widened in August. The \$80,000 cost is to be paid for with Tri-party and federal money. Tri-party money is made up of equal portions from the municipality, Michigan Department of Transportation and Road Commission for Oakland County.

#### **Independence** Township

Sashabaw Road is to be resurfaced in September from Pelton Road through Maybee Road. The \$83,500 comes from the "Build Michigan" fund.

■ The intersection of Sashabaw at Maybee Road is to be widened also in September. The \$525,000 cost

### Thou shalt not trespass in Springfield Township


#### Hunters, hikers and hooligans, beware.

Trespassers in Springfield Township now may be fined up to \$500 or spend up to 90 days in jail, according to Ordinance No. 60.

The board voted unanimously to approve the second reading and adoption of the "Springfield Township Trespass Ordinance" on June 10. It takes effect upon publication

The ordinance states, "A person shall not enter in or remain upon the lands of another, except where permitted by state law, without having in their possession the written consent of the owner, his lessee or agent."

The violation of the ordinance is considered a misdemeanor.

New subdivision street construction includes Pine Knob Country No. 2, one-half mile north of Clarkston Road, west of Pine Knob Road; Spring Lake North, between Waldon and Maybee roads (south of Gulick Lake and north of Spring Lake); Cranberry Hill Court, north of Cranberry Lake Road, west of Fawn Valley Drive, south of Park Valley Drive; Deerwood V, north of Cranberry Lake Road, east of Ortonville Road, west of Perry Lake Road; Indianwood Court, between Dartmouth Road and Baldwin Road, just north of Indianwood Road; Lake Waldon Estates, west of Sashabaw Road, south of Waldon and north of Maybee Road; Canterbury, west of Ortonville Road between Hubbard and Rattalee Lake Road; Lake Forest, south of Andersonville Road, north of Lotus Lake, east of Nelsey Road; and Stone Valley, north of Stickney Road, between Sashabaw and Pine Knob roads.

The grant is part of \$5 million in federal grants the


USDA has awarded to districts in 35 states to start new breakfast programs in the 1993-94 school year.

# Bob Jones: 'I've witnessed everything'

Former bank president, Rotary charter member, city council member recalls life in the Village of Clarkston's earlier days

When Bob Jones moved to Clarkston, the price of a new Ford was \$550, gas was 21 cents a gallon, Shirley Temple had yet to be discovered, and George Bush was 4 years old.



Jones, who turns 80 this year, has lived in Clarkston since 1928. He is as much a part of the city and its history as the Mill Pond, town hall, the Clark house and the old Baptist Church. Jones' life tells like a novel.

"I've witnessed everything," he admits.

He was born in Yale, where his father owned a grocery store, on Christmas Eve 1913. When he was 5, a friend of his father's from the Spanish American War was given the contract to build homes in Pontiac for General Motors Corp. The only problem: the friend wasn't a builder, so he talked the elder Jones into moving his family to Pontiac to help in the construction.

His father retired after building 3,800 homes and decided it would be a good idea to get his sons out of the city and onto the farm, so they moved to Lapeer. Jones' father was later shot twice while witnessing a bank robbery and couldn't work the farm, so the family moved to Robertson Court, Clarkston, when Jones was 15.

He completed 10th and 11th grades in what is now the township hall at 90 N. Main St. He was part of the first graduating class in the "new" high school, which now serves as Clarkston Junior High. His graduating class Reflections

Clarkston State Bank, which included a stint as president.

When the bank was taken over in 1965 by Pontiac State Bank, he remained manager for three years and then worked at the main office until he had a heart attack in 1972 and guit working.



odist Church for 20 years; he sold War Bonds during World War II; he is an original member of the Clarkston Rotary Club, a past master of the Lodge, a former Cub and Scout Master; he is past general manager of Lakeview Cemetery before it became a township cemetery; and he was on the Clarkston Village Council for nine years during the 1950s.





### Warm weather increases twister threat

The approaching warm weather brings the threat of tornadoes to Michigan residents. However, twisters don't need to be killers.

In 1992, 21 tornadoes were reported in the state, and no one was killed by them. Those tornadoes caused \$6 million worth of damage.

According to a spokesman from the National Weather Service, residents can minimize their chances of being injured or killed by being prepared.

"Every household, school and business should have a plan just in case a tornado strikes in the area," said Bill Babcock, warning and preparedness meteorologist.

Here are some safety tips for tornado season.

#### Preparing for a tornado

Have emergency supplies on hand during tornado season.

■ Keep a battery-operated radio, a flashlight and a supply of fresh batteries in a convenient place.

Know the location of designated shelter areas in public facilities. Most schools, public buildings and shopping centers have such areas.

Make an inventory of household furnishings and other possessions. Supplement the written inventory with photographs of each room. Keep inventories and records in a safe deposit box or some other safe place away from

In mobile homes or vehicles, leave them and go to the nearest shelter. If there isn't shelter close by, lie in the nearest ditch and shield head with arms.

#### After a tornado

■ Inspects your property, including motor vehicles, for damage. Check for electrical problems and gas leaks and report them to the power company at once. If you have damage, contact your insurance company.

■ Secure your property from further damage or theft.

■ Stay out of damaged buildings until you are sure they are safe and will not collapse.

■ Use only approved or chlorinated supplies of drinking water.

Check food supplies. Some food may contain particles of glass or debris.

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
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# Making bows, shooting arrows

# He teaches Native American children skills to make their ancestors proud

While searching for an elder with knowledge of primitive archery, Tom Roberts stumbled into preserving Native American culture.

Roberts, 30, teaches Native American children to make arrows as their ancestors did. The Clarkston Road, Independence Township, resident is part of the organization, "Linking Lifetimes."

When a group of people is assimilated into a larger group, they lose some of their individuality, he said. Sometimes, after a few generations, the children know very little about their heritage or ethnic traditions. Linking Lifetimes, a mentoring program, tries to instill ethnic knowledge and pride in children.

Nine groups in the country match African-American, Hispanic and Native American youngsters with adults of the same background who are at least 50 years old. Programs for first-time offenders in the court system and young unwed pregnant girls also are offered.

Linking Lifetimes "tries to get youth someone to be

with and to keep them on the right track," said program director Marie Verheyen.

The adult and child do something together twice a week, and the adult teaches the children about their shared heritage, helps them in their school work or may even give them a job around their home. Once a month, all the kids and adults get together for a group activity. This is where Roberts' knowledge comes in handy.

He makes his own bows and arrows and teaches Native American children about his craft.

"Marie was the one who brought it up. It wasn't something that I actively pursued, it was something that was brought to me," said Roberts.

Professionally, Roberts is a draftsman for an engineering company. Making the bows and arrows is his after-work interest.

"I went to the library and read everything they had on (making them)," said Roberts.

He makes the bow and arrows as Native Americans once did. The wood for the bows is split out of trees in the winter and then cured for a year. Afterward he carves a bow.

"One thing that impressed me with the Indian culture is they never wasted anything."

"It's not something you can do in 10 minutos. It takes a long time," explained Roberts.

He also makes his own hide glue in the fall, which is not a task for the faint of stomach.

Hide glue is made from the hooves, claws and hide of a deer. The parts are boiled for two days, and the proteins make a natural glue. With the glue he pastes dried deer tendons on the back of the bow, which makes it less likely to break. The only thing he throws away from the deer is the bone.

"One thing that impressed me with the Indian cul-
