City sued for \$1 million

An Independence Township man is asking for \$1 million in damages stemming from an alleged illegal arrest by two Clarkston police officers

According to a lawsuit filed in Oakland County Circuit Court on June 18, David William Vernon was driving his car north on Dixie Highway in early morning May 28. He was followed by Officer Ann Marie Gasiorek and Sgt. Mark Warner in a marked Clarkston police car.

When Vernon turned onto eastbound Maybee Road, the officers turned on their lights and pulled the man over. Maybee Road is in Independence Township, out of the City of Clarkston jurisdiction.

The lawsuit charges that the Clarkston Police did not contact the Oakland County Sheriff's Department during this incident and instead arrested Vernon and took him to jail for operating his vehicle while under the influence of

liquor and refusal to take a breath test. The suit states that because of the arrest, Vernon suffered mental and physical distress, embarrassment and monetary loss.

Vernon was held in jail about 18 hours, and the charges against him were dropped June 17.

The lawsuit states that Vernon was deprived of his constitutional rights, including freedom from a deprivation of liberty without due process of law; freedom from false arrest; freedom from false imprisonment; and freedom from illegal search and seizure.

Count three of the lawsuit consists of assault and battery, alleging that at one point during the arrest, Warner placed his nose in Vernon's mouth and stated he could smell he had been drinking.

Conspiracy is also mentioned in the suit. Vernon alleged that the officers concealed and kept secret among themselves and did not tell the officers at the Oakland County jail that his arrest was an improper and illegal

arrest made outside their jurisdiction.
The City of Clarkston was named in count five of the suit. The count states the city "permitted, encouraged, tolerated and ratified a pattern and practice of unjustified and illegal conduct of its officers" The suit asserts that

among other things, the city has failed to train its officers; failed to train the supervisory officer; and failed to discipline or take action against the officers, despite having knowledge of the illegal arrest.

The suit also states that the "newly formed City of Clarkston Police Department has maintained or established no system of review and has failed to more closely supervise or retrain officers who are in need of it."

For his mental anguish, pain and suffering Vernon wants to be awarded \$1 million plus costs, interest and attorney fees.

According to Chief DeVore of the Clarkston Police Department, the two officers arrested Vernon under state

law. DeVore said the officers were flagged down by a citizen, and Vernon's car was pointed out to them.

DeVore also stated the OCSO was called to the scene, and it was decided that the Clarkston officers would make the arrest.

Although the arrest occurred out of their jurisdiction, since it was made under state law, DeVore maintains the arrest was legal.

"The officer did what he had to do," he said.

The mayor of Clarkston could not be reached for comment on the suit.

No court date has been set.

Pepsi scare over; stores see no change

The Pepsi Co. took out full-page ads in national papers Monday to tell us something we already knew — the scare is over.

Across the country, people alleged they had found syringes in Diet Pepsi cans. These claims have been declared hoaxes, and the parties responsible have been arrested.

However, even at the height of the scare, area stores reported very little — if any — change in the buying habits of Pepsi drinkers.

Both Food Town and J&J Food Store on Sashabaw Road, Independence Township, reported that the effects on their sales of Pepsi were barely noticeable.

Glen McMillan, owner of Glen's IGA on M-24 in Oxford, said, "I sell Pepsi probably three-to-one over Coke. Pepsi's definitely got the share of the market here. We haven't even had one conversation in the store about (the tampering scare)."

Local, regional and national A&P store officials said they could not comment on the issue.

Rick Onon, manager of the Kroger's store in Independence Township, said his store's sales of Pepsi products were down slightly for a few days but went back to normal quickly.

"I think customers (have) a lot of confidence in Pepsi," he said.

Uh-Huh.

City adopts tough truck law

Trucks can no longer roam the streets of Clarkston at will.

On June 15, the Clarkston City Council voted 5-0 to approve Ordinance 80-6, which limits truck traffic on city streets. Council members James Schultz and Douglas Roeser were absent.

The ordinance states that no one can drive, move or permit a truck to be on any street or highway of Clarkston, except those streets that are designated as a truck route. At this time, no street is designated as a truck route.

The ordinance was adopted to keep heavy trucks out of the city limits and to stop trucks from using the city as a shortcut to other destinations.

A truck, for the purpose of this ordinance, is any vehicle that is defined as a truck under the Michigan Motor Vehicle Code and has five or more axles.

The prohibitions don't apply to people who drive trucks for local delivery or transport goods or services.

This ordinance further amends the city's traffic code. It takes effect 20 days after publication in The Clarkston News.

Pine Knob theater officials say noise on decline

Barely a month into the summer concert season, officials at the Pine Knob Music Theatre say that noise-related concerns have already improved over previous years.

"Prior to the season, we decided to decrease the overall sound in the amphitheater to help residents in the surrounding area," Pine Knob's Mike St. Peter told the Independence Township Board June 15.

The sound engineer said the noise from the music theater has been toned down, due to some innovative improvements. They include a "softening" of the amphitheater's roof by reinforcing it with several new battens. These overhead strips help absorb sound under the pavilion.

St. Peter said Pine Knob has also installed a computer in the lawn, which monitors sound outside the amphitheater. If the noise level gets too loud in a particular area, the computer shuts down certain sound bays around the theater to even out the quantity of sound.

"I think Pine Knob has done a lot of things with sound reduction that other amphitheaters around the

country are copying," St. Peter said. "Matter of a fact, our innovations have been written up in an acoustics magazine."

St. Peter said his crew has to continually monitor some of the heavier rock and roll bands, who have a tendency to increase their volume during a show.

"I'm finding that year after year, the visiting bands are becoming more responsible in terms of volume," he said. "Pine Knob is a major stop, and they don't want to make anyone mad, or they might not ever be invited back."

Pine Knob's attorney, Susan Greenfield, said a lot of the objectionable acts, such as the Grateful Dead, were booked at the Palace this season to avoid any problems at Pine Knob.

Clerk Joan McCrary said that things seemed to have improved at Pine Knob—the township has received only three phoned complaints so far.

Clarkston Road resident James Brennan still believes the amphitheater has a long way to go, however.

"I don't care what anyone says — the problems

haven't been solved yet," he said. "The township isn't getting that many calls because people have given up. We were told last year that the problems would be resolved. Well, they haven't."

Brennan also blasted some of the vulgarities used by a recent visiting rap group.

"This group was really cussing up a storm," he said. "We're entitled to enjoy the insides of our homes, but we can't do that when incidents like this keep occurring."

Brennan pressed the township to enact a tougher sound decibel ordinance.

A few other neighbors spoke on the traveling sound, remarking that it seemed to be getting better.

Supervisor Dale Stuart said the township would stay in touch with Pine Knob officials to make sure the concert season continues to run smoothly.

Craig and McGregor begin by introducing a resolution which will preclude the administration of our district from requiring citizens to request information from the district via the Freedom of Information Act — and, further, preclude the administration from charging labor and materials to provide such information to the citizenry.

Notwithstanding requests for materials which may require unreasonable time and materials, such a practice is nothing less than antagonistic toward and disrespectful of the citizens of our community.

'If it Fitz ...'

Letters bring back an abortion rerun

No woman gets an abortion for the fun of it.

That is usually my short-form retort to people who, after reading my antihunting opinions, demand to know how I can possibly protest the killing of animals for sport and at the same time condone the killing of unborn babies to terminate unwanted pregnancies.

Last week, for the latest example, I ridiculed those hunters who use such silly euphemisms as "dispatching" and "collecting," instead of admitting they enjoy *killing* animals. And James Jones of Grand Rapids responded:

"I'd really have more respect for any of these trusty nimrods if they were to say 'I hunt because it gives me a real kick to be able to kill things'...I agree with you that sanitizing the process of killing by employing euphemisms like 'harvesting' or 'filling the tag' is dishonest. But that is exactly the technique used by those who 'terminate' pregnancies (or other weasel-wording when referring to the killing, this time, of humans)..."

"Hiding behind such antiseptic terminology is, to my mind, fully as deceitful as that the hunting fraternity shields itself with. The soft, warm, cooing newborn nestled in her mother's arms is a 'bundle of joy.' One month earlier, before she was seen or held tenderly, she was not a 'she' at all, but a 'meaningless blob of tissue' that could be disposed of by 'medical procedure.'"

As usual, I'm reluctant to write about abortion. It isn't any of my business what women do with their bodies. That's personal, between a woman and her conscience and her doctor and anyone else she might invite to join the discussion. I see no invitation for me.

But James Jones and other readers ask good questions about the seeming inconsistency of my attitudes toward blood sports and abortion. They deserve more than the brief answer in today's opening paragraph. One more time, here it is:

Medical technology keeps shrinking the room for argument. There may come a time when science will persuade me there is no time when an embryo is less than an infant capable of survival and of feeling pain and loss. Until then, I'll be pro-choice in the first trimester.

But what about the soul? That's the question often asked by people who believe human beings have a spiritual existence born at conception, and if there is no physical birth, there will be one more unbaptized soul consigned to limbo, somewhere on the border of heaven or hell.

That's a religious belief, of course, and we're all entitled to it. But we're not entitled to insist that the government cram our religion down the gullets of nonbelievers. And organized religions that denounce abortion should concede there'd be a lot fewer abortions to denounce if they would encourage birth control instead of forbid it.

Sophisticated Catholics have no trouble ignoring their pope on artificial contraception, but many Third World nations are full of less urbane people who blindly obey church laws -- and keep having babies they can't afford. That's not a crime, as abortion once was, but it should be.

Do I worry more about a shot deer than an aborted fetus? Of course not. When the fetus has reached the point where it has even the slightest chance of survival, I'm against the abortion. As for the deer, when it must be killed to sustain human life, I understand. I don't understand people who kill animals just for the fun of it.

An unwanted pregnancy may be the result of fun, but no woman has an abortion for the fun of it. She deserves much more sympathy and understanding than she gets from people who bomb abortion clinics or try to make their religion a federal law. She deserves a choice.

I yearn for the day when birth control will completely replace abortion. I will always worry about how close early abortion comes to killing a human being.

But I'll also worry about how much of a woman is killed when the government uses her body to have a baby she doesn't want.

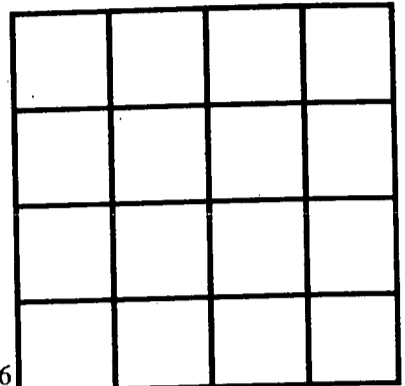

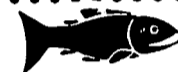

Eston Road foster care home wins first OK

Despite public opposition, the Independence Township Board is on the verge of allowing an adult foster care home to open up on Eston Road.

On June 15, the board voted 5-2 to rezone a single-family parcel at 8541 N. Eston Road to planned unit development (PUD). Clerk Joan McCrary and trustees Daniel Travis, Mel Vaara and Bruce Mercado voted in favor of the motion. Supervisor Dale Stuart and Treasurer John Lutz voted against the proposal's first-reading.

Second-reading approval and adoption is needed before the rezoning takes place. Second-reading consideration is scheduled for July 6.

If approved, "Adultcare of Independence Township" would occupy the 61-year-old, 5,180-square-foot residence presently standing on the site. Located on the shores of Walters Lake, this building was originally the Sunny Beach Club House.

As an adult foster care home, it would facilitate 20 senior citizens and up to five caregivers at a time. A PUD is a rezoning tied to a specific site plan and requires approval from the planning commission and township board.

Petitioner Janet Rikner, who operates a six-resident foster care home on Whipple Lake Road, said the facility would provide the community with another much-needed home for the elderly.

However, a majority of the 30 neighbors in atten-

dance didn't see it that way.

"I think a business in the middle of our neighborhood will have adverse effects on its desirability," said Cathy Rose of Lakeview Drive.

Frank Shank of Sunnyside agreed.

"Most of our neighbors have their life savings invested in their homes," he said. "I don't think the township board should give away rezonings so lightly."

"We, the people, don't want this (foster care home)," added Tom Gregory of Lakeview Drive. "I think our wishes should be taken seriously."

The residents cited a loss of marketability of their homes and the fear of an elderly person getting hurt or killed on their lakefront properties as their top concerns.

The board suggested that the petitioner build an

enclosed fence around the property to keep residents from wandering away. Planner Dick Carlisle also emphasized that this PUD would operate for a year on probation.

If the facility were to close, he said, the property would revert to its previous zoning.

Travis and Vaara said they backed the positive recommendations of the township's planner and planning commission in this matter.

However, Lutz and Stuart said the project didn't qualify under PUD guidelines of benefiting the community. Lutz lives near the proposed foster care home.

"I think this will be a stark change to this neighborhood," Stuart said. "I think it's going to be a large intrusion in this portion of the township."

"There are locations better suited for this type of facility in Independence," he added.

Mercado agreed that the proposal is controversial, but he said its good points outweigh the negative ones.

"I understand this is a business venture, but its primary objective is for residential use," he said. "I think it's something that has tremendous merit to an area like ours."

Commissioner resigns

After eight years as chairman of the Springfield Township Planning Commission, Joe Gorka has resigned.

Gorka plans to move to the west side of the state this summer. Gorka, a self-employed consultant, does a lot of his work with clients on the west side of the state and in the Chicago area. The board voted unanimously to accept his resignation, with regrets.

Supervisor Collin Walls gave an emotional farewell to Gorka, though Gorka was not present at the meeting.

"Joe's shadow and impact on this community is evident now and will be for decades," said Walls, his voice catching with emotion.

A new chairperson is to be appointed in July, which is the designated appointment time for the township. If anyone is interesting in serving on the commission, he or she should call 625-4802.

The Independence Republicans have donated \$250 to the campaign to elect Clyde LeTarte to the Michigan State house.

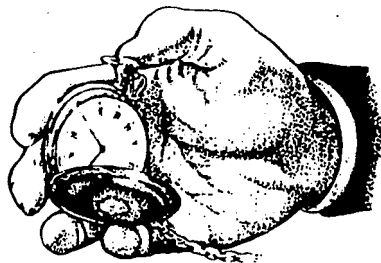

Underwood said he was initially shocked when he learned of his all-star status.

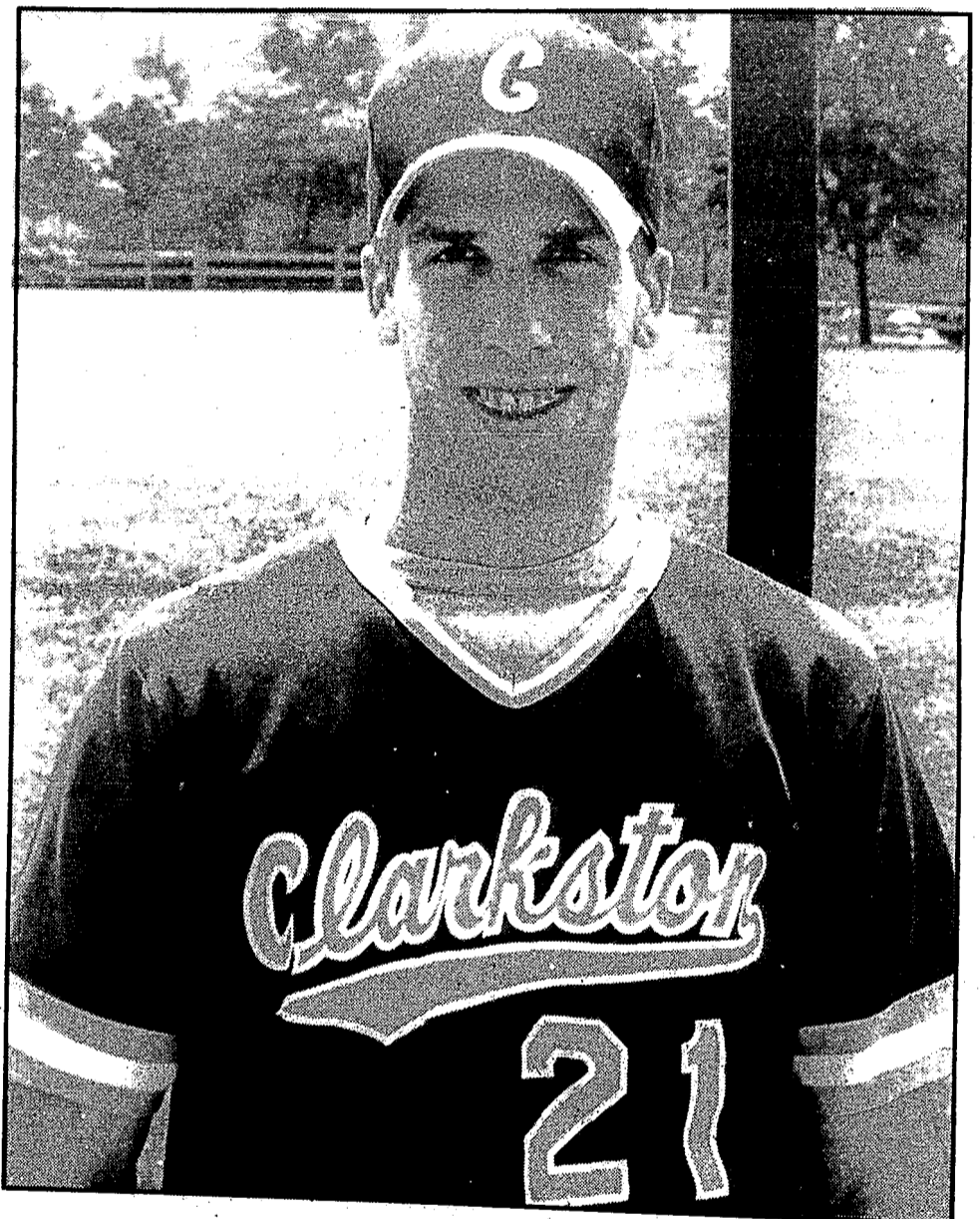
"I couldn't believe it, at first," he said. "I had no idea that I'd been nominated until one of the all-star coaches called me to see if I could play."

Merchants help marching band raise money for trip

With its London trip just six months away, the Clarkston High School Marching Band is scrambling to raise as much money as possible.

So far, a donation drive for the band has raised around \$20,000. About \$250,000 is needed to send 175 band members and chaperons to England free of charge.

The Clarkston Board of Education approved of the trip shortly after it learned that CHS had been invited to perform in the Lord Mayor of Westminster's New Year's Spectacular. The invitation is deemed an honor, considering only 25 American marching bands are invited to participate in this annual extravaganza.

The band will leave for England on Dec. 27 and return on Jan. 3. While in London, the band will play and visit a number of historic sites.

Marla McKee, a band booster and acting fund-raiser chairwoman, said her goal is to reduce the students' share as much as possible.

"Without fund-raising, each student would have to shell out \$1,240 apiece for the trip," she said. "We're looking to get it down to at least \$800 per person, where every member has a chance to raise the money on their own."

McKee said several area businesses have already offered to help out.

■ For example, The Clarkston News is allowing marching band members to sell newspaper subscriptions and to keep every dollar of it allowable by law. That means they can keep half of what The News subscriptions sell for. New subscriptions and renewals count — so area residents may want to contact a marching band member to buy a subscription or to renew.

■ And on Saturday, June 26, Kroger's is allowing band members to hold a car wash/bake sale in its lot. The supermarket has promised to donate items for both these endeavors. This fund-raiser runs from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m.

■ Burger King has also promised to donate a portion of the money it makes from a Thursdays-only coupon offer.

70 youths honored at Youth Assistance gala

Fortunately, there are people in this world who derive a great deal of satisfaction out of helping others. Many of these people find their way into professions that involve service, and sometimes sacrifice, while others

volunteer their services strictly as a gift to their community.

One such group of volunteers in this area is the Clarkston Area Youth Assistance Committee, which was founded in 1961. This group has taken on the task of combating juvenile delinquency and neglect, and they do this in a variety of successful ways.

In the months ahead, I will be writing a great deal more about this impressive group. Today, however, I'd like to tell you about their recent youth recognition efforts.

When young people get into trouble, it usually receives a lot of press coverage and publicity. Unfortunately, when young people do something positive, no one seems to notice.

In order to recognize and give credit to those who make positive contributions to our community, the Clarkston Area Youth Assistance Committee holds a yearly banquet in their honor.

This year's banquet April 29 at the Clarkston United Methodist Church included 70 young people nominated by 21 different organizations.

Just a few of these organizations are: Children's Village, SADD, DARE (Oakland County Sheriff's Department), Horseback Riders for the Handicapped, Clarkston United Methodist Church, Lighthouse North, SCAMP, Pontiac Rescue Mission, St. Daniel Catholic Church, Autistic program at Sashabaw Junior High School.

Of the 70 young people honored, 34 are in senior high school, 33 are in junior high school and three are in elementary school.

Although it's almost impossible to single out one individual from this outstanding group, I'd like to make a special mention of 10-year-old Derek Weddle.

Believe it or not, but Derek has been involved in

community service activities for the past four years. This year he recruited his 7-year-old sister, Danielle, to help him.

Derek and Danielle personally collected over 400 pairs of mittens and hats, which were donated to Lighthouse North and Children's Village. They did this by handing out flyers at parades and soliciting donations from stores, schools and neighborhoods. Part of their strategy involved putting together posters, which they paced in each elementary school.

A similar profile could be drawn of each of the 70 young people who were honored for their efforts during the past year.

Such young people do exist. The Clarkston Area Youth Assistance people do exist. And because of all of them, Clarkston is a better place in which to live.

School board approves new employee policies

With the school year winding down, the Clarkston Board of Education approved three new policies June 14.

These new mandates involve family leave of absence, a criminal history check of prospective employees and the control of blood-borne pathogens. In each case, the board voted 5-0 to approve the second reading of each policy. Sheila Hughes and Paul Van Klaveren were absent from the meeting.

Professional and support staff are to adhere to all three policies.

Criminal history check

The history record check policy requires all applicants to submit, at no expense to the district, a set of fingerprints prepared by a state or local law enforcement agency. These criminal checks will also pertain to substitute teachers who wish to be employed by Clarkston schools.

Family leave

The family leaves of absence policy allows for 12 weeks of unpaid leave for all personnel employed for at least 12 months. This policy will be available once during any contract year for one of the following reasons: birth of a child, adoption or foster care of a child, care of a spouse or child suffering from a serious health condition, the staff member suffers from a serious illness.

A staff member can request that all accrued paid vacation leave, medical or sick leave, or personal leave be used to substitute for the family leave policy. In cases

where the district employs both the husband and wife, the total amount of family leave is 12 weeks for the couple, except when the leave is due to the serious health condition of either spouse.

Blood-borne disease

The blood-borne pathogens policy was created to protect any staff member who could be exposed to blood and other potentially infectious materials in the line of duty.

Preventative guidelines include: identifying employees whose duties put them at risk; providing Hepatitis B vaccinations at no cost to the employee; ensuring proper training against possible exposure and contamination; reporting, evaluating and following-up on all incidents of exposure; and developing an exposure control plan.

AN ORDINANCE TO FURTHER AMEND THE CITY OF THE VILLAGE OF CLARKSTON'S TRAFFIC CODE, BEING THE MARCH, 1981, EDITION OF THE UNIFORM TRAFFIC CODE FOR CITIES, VILLAGES, AND TOWNSHIPS AS PUBLISHED IN QUARTERLY SUPPLEMENT NO. 5 TO THE 1979 EDITION OF THE MICHIGAN ADMINISTRATIVE CODE, WHICH WAS ADOPTED BY THE CITY OF THE VILLAGE OF CLARKSTON. THIS NEW SECTION IS HEREBY ADDED TO THAT CODE.

THE CITY OF THE VILLAGE OF CLARKSTON ORDAINS: That Section R.28.1461 (A); Section 5.61 (A), be added to read as follows:

Section 1.01. a truck, for purposes of this section, shall be any vehicle which is defined as a "truck" under Section 257.75 of the Michigan Motor Vehicle Code and having 5 or more axles.

Section 2.01. No person shall drive, move, or cause or permit to be driven or moved any truck upon any street or highway of this City, except such streets or highways as may be designated as truck routes.

Section 3.01. The prohibitions of this section shall not apply to persons who shall drive or move trucks to and from locations of the City for local delivery or transport of goods or services.

Section 4.01. A person who violates this section shall be responsible for a civil infraction. This prohibition shall not be enforced until notice thereof is given by posting of appropriate official signs.

Section 5.01. Repealer. All other ordinance and/or resolutions inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance are, to the extent of such inconsistency, hereby repealed.

Section 6.01. Severability. Should any section, clause or paragraph of this Ordinance be declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, the same will not affect the validity of the Ordinance as a whole or part thereof other than the part declared to be invalid.

Section 7.01. Effective Date. This Ordinance is hereby declared duly adopted by the City of the Village of Clarkston, County of Oakland, State of Michigan, at a meeting of said Council duly called and held on the 16th day of June, 1993. The provisions of this Ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days after publication of this Ordinance in the Clarkston News, a newspaper with general circulation and published within the City limits of the City of the Village of Clarkston.

Minutes of Regular Meeting

June 15, 1993

Meeting called to order by Mayor Catalo at 7:05 p.m.
Roll: Present: Basinger, Catalo, Sanderson, Secatch. Absent: Roeser, Schultz.

Minutes of the meeting of May 24, 1993, were accepted as presented.

The agenda was approved as presented with the removal of Old Business, Tree Memorials.

Bills in the amount of \$36,919.81 were approved for payment.

A Public Hearing regarding the 1994 City Budget was opened at 7:12 p.m. Trustees Basinger, Secatch, and Arkwright presented budget information and comparisons to the residents present. A major portion of the discussion that followed was in regard to the police budget. The recent survey on police services was discussed. Secatch presented comparisons of budgets of Oakland County's smallest communities.

Discussions included questions on present coverage as opposed to Oakland County Sheriff coverage in conjunction with the Township's coverage. Some citizens asked whether it was feasible to revert back to coverage under the Township contract with Oakland County; other residents felt we should continue the present police program. Several residents praised the present traffic control and coverage that was not available under the previous county contract. Some residents were concerned with costs and whether or not they would escalate as time goes on.

Several residents stated that it was the Council's responsibility to set the tax rate, and that if the residents found this action unsatisfactory, the election process would be used to change Council members.

The budget hearing was closed at 9:25 p.m.

Ordinance 80-6, an ordinance to further amend the City of the Village of Clarkston's Traffic Code, was adopted. (This ordinance deals with truck traffic on City streets.)

A permit will be issued to Michigan Bell for work on Miller Road, and a clause be included that all costs for inspections and engineering reviews by the City be reimbursed by Michigan Bell. Further, that all property be returned to its proper condition.

Credits from SMART in the amount of \$771 be equally divided between SCAMP and the Independence Township Senior Citizens Transportation funds.

A letter be sent to the Michigan Historic Network System stating that for budgetary purposes the City will not be participating in that program this year.

Approval of the D.A.V. Forget-me-not drive in the City of the Village of Clarkston on August 12, 13, and 14, was granted.

Major Catalo reported that she would make arrangements for the noon fire whistle to be continued.

Trustee Secatch was given responsibility of supervising the DPW and reporting to the Council. A letter to that effect is to be sent by the City Manager and to all DPW employees.

A similar letter will be written to the Police Chief notifying him of Trustee Arkwright's previous appointment as liaison with the Police Department for the Council.

The second regular meeting in June be adjourned from June 28, 1993, to June 30, 1993, to comply with the City of the Village of Clarkston budget process and delays caused by waiting for the outcome of the vote on Proposal A.

The council felt that a tax increase was necessary, but the exact amount was in question. The 12.3 rate was agreed on; however, there was discussion on a higher amount; namely, 12.5 mills.

A Truth-in-Taxation hearing be held for the purpose of levying 12.3 mills for the 1993 tax roll.

Meeting adjourned at 10:37 p.m.

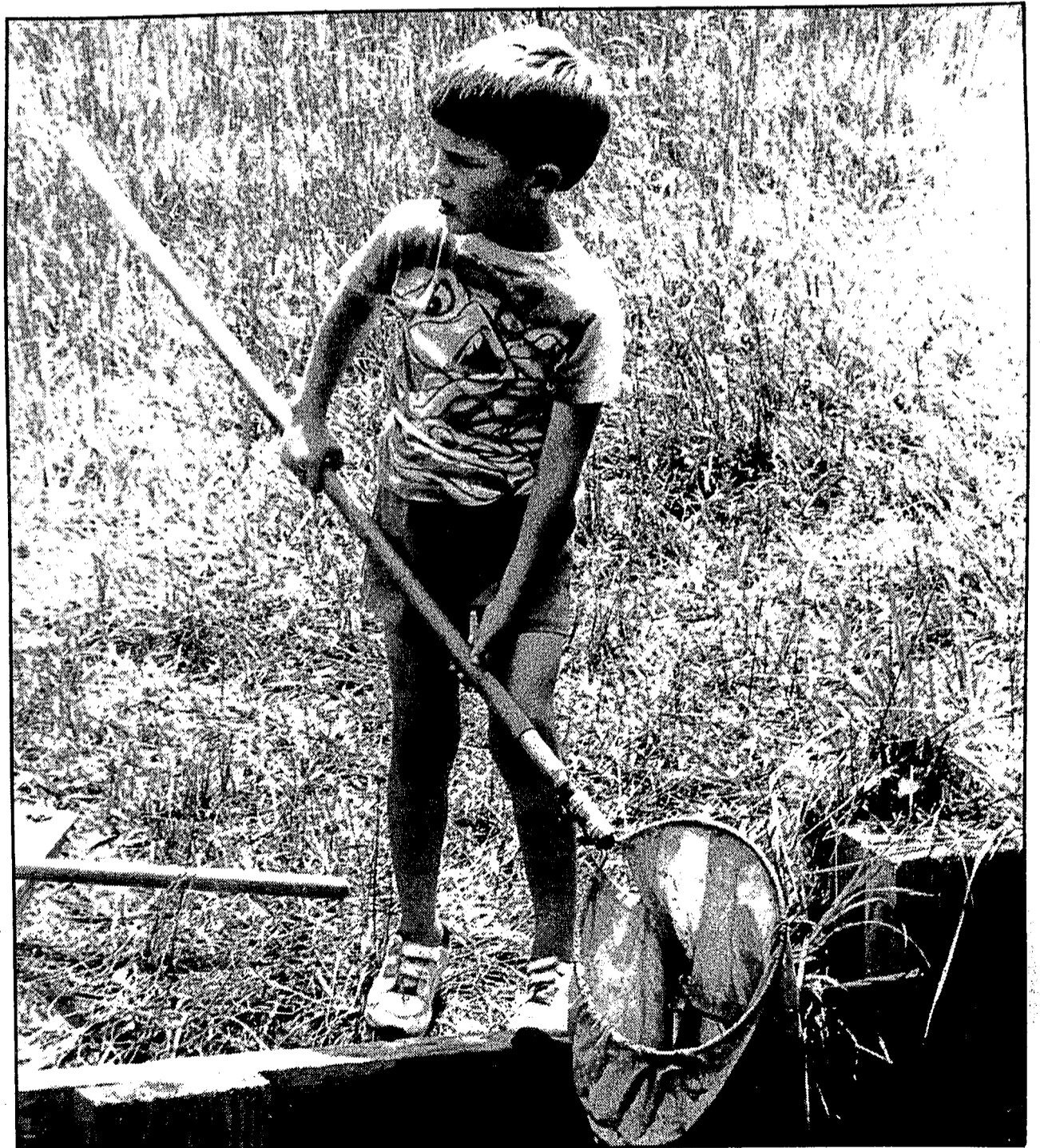
