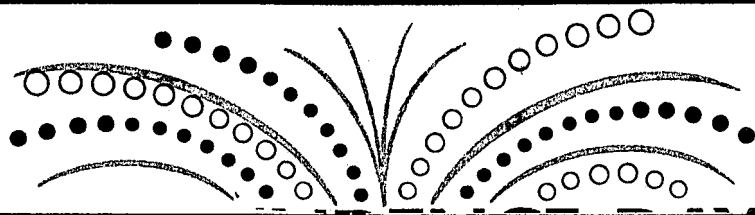

Rescue truck hits car, hurls it at building

One woman was seriously injured Friday in a crash involving a rescue truck.

Elizabeth A. Kramer, 30, of the Clarkston area was in stable condition Tuesday at Pontiac Osteopathic Hospital.

The accident occurred at 5:36 p.m. July 2 on M-15, Independence Township, according to the Oakland County Sheriff's Department report.

The police report said that Kramer was driving southbound on M-15 when she attempted to make a U-turn at the Carpet World shopping center near Dixie Highway. She turned into the path of an Independence Township Fire Department rescue vehicle, which was responding to

an accident at M-15 and Dixie Highway.

The force of the collision carried Kramer's car across the five lanes of M-15 and sent her into the Carter-Reed Realty building, wedging her car in the doorway of the structure. The building is south of True Value Hardware.

The driver of the rescue truck, Jack Bailey, 31, also of Clarkston, was treated and released from St. Joseph Mercy Hospital, Pontiac.

Investigators said alcohol was not a factor in the accident. Tickets are pending the investigation.

Chief Gar Wilson of the Independence Township Fire Department said an estimate of damage to the rescue truck was unknown Tuesday because the truck was still impounded, pending the investigation.

The amount of damage to the real estate building also was unknown at press time.

No one was seriously injured in the second accident at M-15 and Dixie Highway, but traffic was tied up at the intersection for about an hour.

A third accident at Sashabaw and Maybee Road also tied up traffic. No one was seriously injured at that accident either.

Other than Friday night, Chief Wilson said the holiday weekend was not much trouble for rescue personnel in Independence Township.

"Friday night, it was not good," said Wilson. "It was real quiet after that."

Sgt. James Heiligenthal of the OCSO said the sheriff's department had a busy weekend overall in Oakland County, with 68 accidents, 342 tickets issued, 172 verbal warnings and 32 arrests.

Lawsuit 'without merit' — attorney

An update on a \$1 million lawsuit was part of the Clarkston City Council budget meeting last week.

City residents who attended the June 30 budget hearing voiced concern over the cost of the lawsuit, should the city lose.

The suit, filed June 18 in Oakland County Circuit Court by an Independence Township man, alleges that he was illegally arrested by two Clarkston police officers, who were out of their jurisdiction.

According to city attorney Tom Ryan, the two officers were in Waterford Township about 2:30 a.m. They were getting coffee, since there was no place open in the city, he said, explaining that the city's downtown bake shop is no longer open 24 hours.

A restaurant patron warned police officers about the Independence Township man, who could be a hazard on

the road, said Ryan.

So the officers followed the man south on Dixie Highway, where he "weaved" on the road and was indeed a hazard, said Ryan.

The officers made a judgment call when they pulled the car over after it turned onto Maybee Road, said Ryan.

Ryan said the officers radioed the incident to Oakland County, and an Oakland County Sheriff's Department car came by and chose not to act in the incident. The man was arrested on charges of drunken driving and was taken to the Oakland County Jail.

The drunken driving charge was later dismissed by 52nd District Court Judge Gerald McNally in Independence Township.

Ryan told city residents that he believed the officers acted correctly.

"The lawsuit is without merit," said Ryan. "It is my belief the officers acted appropriately."

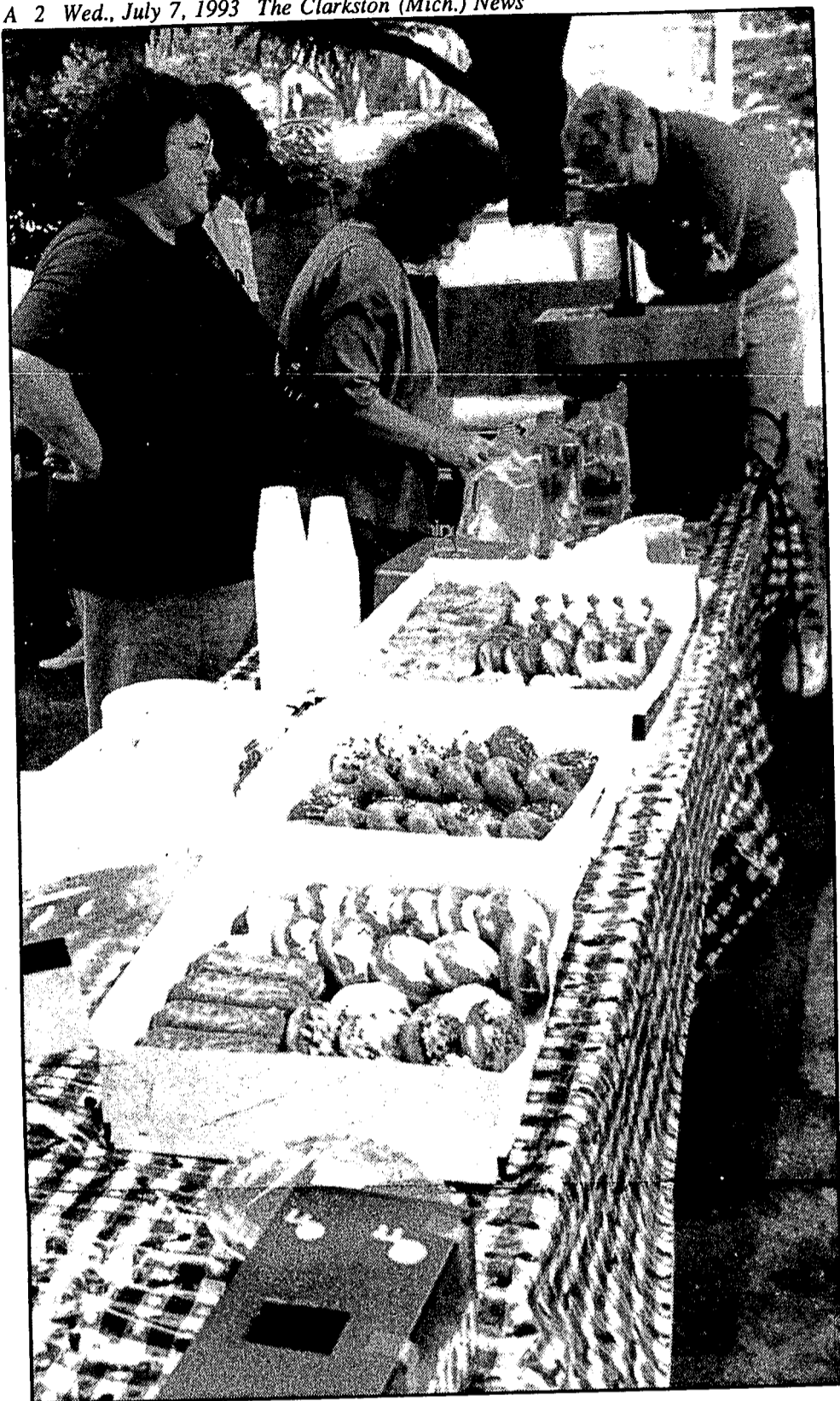

Dairy foods may protect women against one cancer

According to a study in the American Journal of Epidemiology, more frequent consumption of certain vegetables and dairy products may help protect against endometrial cancer.

A 1985-1988 study of 168 women with endometrial cancer, recruited from the University of Alabama Hospital and a large private gynecology-oncology practice in Birmingham, Ala., found that women with endometrial cancer tend to eat less skim milk, yogurt, sour cream cheese protein and yellow and green vegetables than women without this condition.

\$31.9 million school operating budget approved

With an eye on Lansing, the Clarkston Board of Education approved a \$31,898,556 operating budget for the 1993-94 school year last week.

The budget passed 6-0, with board President Joseph Helpern absent from the meeting.

Including the district's general fund budget and its budgets for building, vocational education, debt retirement and more, the board approved a \$53,326,293 budget.

According to district officials, the general fund operating budget resembles the \$28,644,077 plan approved last year.

"It isn't much different from the one we had last year," said Steve Lenar, assistant superintendent of business and operations. "It's a pretty straight-forward budget, with nearly 86 percent of its total going toward employee salaries and benefits.

"Of course, the question is 'what's Lansing going to do in regards to Social Security and retirement payments?'" he added. "Regardless, I think we're prepared for whatever the state decides to do to the schools, so we can move ahead positively."

School districts across Michigan are waiting to see if the state's lawmakers pass legislation making them pay all or a large portion of their employees' Social Security and retirement costs.

Up to this point, the state has covered 95 percent of these items' costs. If Clarkston were to pay 100 percent of both, the district would have to shell out \$3.3 million from its budget.

Lenar said that \$1.5 million has been built into the new budget for Social Security purposes. He said Clarkston's annual share from the state is around \$1.7 million, so the district has had to make up for the remaining \$200,000 out of its budget.

However, if the state decides to sever Social Security payments to the districts in any form, cuts are inevitable. Clarkston Schools have a \$1.7 million cut-package already waiting if this scenario were to ring true. It was approved by the school board in May.

Ranging from athletics to transportation to elementary physical education, these cuts touch a variety of district programs, activities and operations. At this point, a \$60,000 cut in athletics ranks atop this 60-item priority list.

Lenar warned, however, that the figures in this budget reduction package aren't set in stone because too many variables still exist. He hopes the Legislature comes

to a decision by August, so districts won't have to make cuts while school is in session, he said.

Regarding the new budget, Lenar said the district will see a few changes this year. They include the hiring of more kindergarten aides for the new Developmentally Appropriate Practices (DAP) program, which allows students to learn at their own pace. Each school also will be served by one full-time librarian, which was included in a \$16.1 million bond issue passed in February.

Lenar also anticipates a 10-cent hike in all hot lunches this year, as well as a \$5 raise in the pay-to-play sports program. This means students will have to pay \$80 per sport, compared to last year's rate of \$75.

These potential increases are due to the rising costs associated with their departments, Lenar said. Both items will be discussed at the July 12 school board meeting.

City council adopts \$469,000 budget for 1993-94

Just a few hours before its first anniversary, the Clarkston City Council approved next year's budget. On June 30, the council voted 6-0 to approve the \$468,844 budget for July 1, 1993, through June 30, 1994. Mayor Sharron Catalo was absent. (Last year's budget was \$486,917.)

Citizens question police, other expenses

Next year's budget packed Clarkston City Hall last week, with residents commenting on police costs, a recent lawsuit and expenses in general.

After the public hearing, the council voted 6-0 to adopt a \$468,844 general fund budget (see related story). Residents, however, wanted an explanation of the larger budget items. The \$156,057 allocated for the police department covers wages, insurance, supplies, training, uniforms and squad cars, said city officials.

The start-up costs for the police department were more than the \$115,000 the council had estimated when it became a city last year, said council member William Basinger. Also, ticket revenue was lower than expected, he said.

When the city was established in 1992, Independence Township would not renew its police contract with Clarkston. So the city decided to develop its own department — with success, said Basinger.

"We are the safest community in this county," he said, explaining that Clarkston police have time to check homes while owners are on vacation, to "rattle" business doors at night, and to stop traffic to let ducks cross the road.

"We've gotten very good remarks about our police department," Basinger said to the residents.

However, the adopted budget includes \$446,580 in revenues — mainly from a city millage rate of 12.3 mills, an increase of 2.1023 mills over last year's tax rate.

Moreover, the council hasn't officially increased the millage rate, though it has held public hearings on the issue (see related story). It was scheduled to vote on the increase Wednesday, July 7.

If approved, the extra 2.1023 mills would go to the general fund. The police department would use 2 mills,

and the remaining .1023 mills would be used for leaf pickup.

If the millage increase is approved, the entire 12.3 mills of the 61.5639 mills on city tax bills will go to the city general fund. The rest of the money goes to Oakland County and Clarkston Community Schools.

One mill is \$1 for every \$1,000 in assessed property valuation. For example, the owner of a \$100,000 home assessed at half its market value (\$50,000) would pay \$640 per year in city taxes with the increase. Without the increase, the homeowner would pay \$534.89 per year in city taxes.

Following is a breakdown of some of expenses in the general fund budget, which pays for such things as police, building inspections, elections, assessing services and other expenses.

Also in the budget is \$128,355 from the reserve fund from the 1992-93 fiscal year. The new budget plans to use \$22,264 of that reserve to pay bills, leaving \$106,091 in reserve.

A reserve fund is a "rainy day" money to be used as a cushion should unexpected expenses arise.

Council member Steve Arkwright concurred. "I live on Holcomb, and I can assure you everyone I've talked to (is) in love with the police department," he said.

However, residents also questioned a \$1 million lawsuit filed against the city and two Clarkston police officers two weeks ago. If the city loses the lawsuit, where

will the money come from, they asked.

City attorney Tom Ryan said the suit was without merit. However, if the city were to lose, the city's insurance company would cover the losses, he said.

The budget also includes \$58,095 for village hall and grounds. The money covers the manager's salary, building maintenance, supplies and utilities, said Basinger.

"We've tried to be a very frugal council," he said.

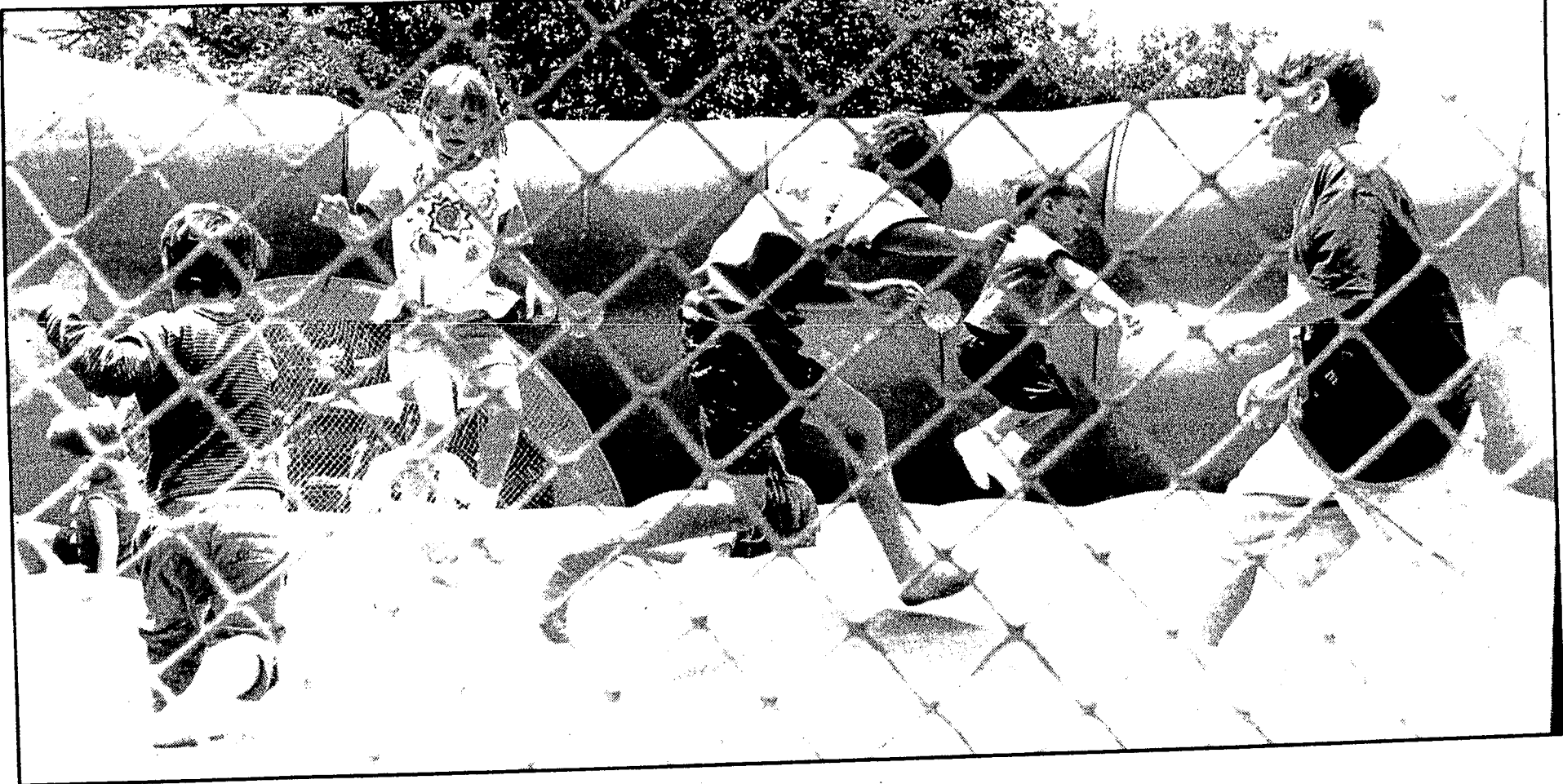

State bills endanger public's right to know about government

Two public notice bills in the Michigan Senate could change — for the worse — how residents get information about local government.

House Bills 4724 and 4725, approved in June by the state House, change the definition of "newspaper."

The new definition eliminates the requirement that a newspaper carry at least 25 percent news. In fact, the new definition doesn't require any news. That means a public notice could be published in a "shopper," that is, a packet of advertisements that comes to your home.

The bills also eliminate the requirement that a newspaper be published at least once a week to qualify as a newspaper. Again, that means a public notice could be published in that same once-a-month shopper mentioned above — or even in a church bulletin.

Proponents of the bills say local clerks would make the best choice for public notice publication. And we're sure the clerks in our local governments would, indeed, make the best choice.

But what about a decade or two from now? What

if local budgets become even tighter, and to save money, local schools, for instance, decide to publish notices in shoppers?

Not to seem distrustful of government officials, but what if a local government has a controversial issue at an upcoming meeting and would rather not have a packed house for it? What if those officials decided to publish in a shopper because they know many people won't read it?

Sure, we're lucky here. Most of our local officials today would do the right thing. They would try to get the information to readers in the most effective way possible.

But these bills would give an opportunity for less trustworthy officials to side-step residents' right to know about government happenings.

The bills now are in Senate Committee on Government Affairs. Senators Dave Honigman and Mat Dunaskiss say they'll vote against the bills if they reach the full Senate. We hope the rest of the senators have the same good judgment.

Public notices belong in newspapers where people look for news.

Citizens ask board to build loop drive at Sashabaw

Weary of drainage and dust problems, the residents

of Pine Knob Lane implored the Clarkston Board of Education to construct a loop drive at Sashabaw Junior High School.

However, the board has already instructed the dis-

trict's architectural consultant, Greiner Inc., to seek bids for construction of a wider school entrance leading out to Pine Knob Lane. These bids are to be discussed at the school board's July 12 meeting.

This improvement project is part of a \$16.1 million bond issue passed by the voters in February.

On June 28, road representative Marcia Green and a number of her neighbors told the school board that they favored the loop drive over widening the existing entrance. They cited poor drainage, dust, flooding and an overall shoddy road surface for their dislike of the chosen alternative.

"The residents of this road never had a drainage problem until the school was built," said Glen Brokenshaw of Pine Knob Lane. "Overall, the road's been atrocious since the school was built, and I think you should do something about it."

Sashabaw Junior High was built in 1969.

Green said a widened entrance would also increase traffic down her road, creating more potholes in an already rutted surface. She said the residents would accept a widened entry if the district paved Pine Knob Lane to Stevens Road or Pine Knob Lane to a point just north of the SJH entrance, with drainage to Stevens.

Green was upset that she and her neighbors weren't contacted prior to June 14 meeting, when Greiner discussed entrance options. If present, she said, the neighborhood would have denounced the widening alternative.

At that meeting, Greiner and the school board agreed that a loop drive option could create "safety concerns" in regards to busing.

School board Vice President Paul Van Klaveren told the residents that the matter is far from being finalized and that all options would be discussed again July 12.

Pamela Bianco was seeking a connection with Jonathan FIFIELD, who apparently resided in Eureka, MI, in 1850. She felt she could have been in either Clinton, Calhoun or Wayne County. Jonathan's wife was HEAMACH and possible children could be William, Inaz, and Jehial.

In the records we have for Oakland County, there are many FIFIELD marriage, death and census records, with two Jonathans listed in the 1860 census for Oakland County. In Brandon Township, we believe the progenitor, Jonathan, may have been the one who came to Oakland County as an early settler, buying land in 1832. He is shown as coming to Michigan from Clinton County, NY.

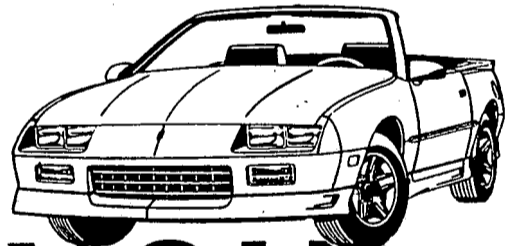

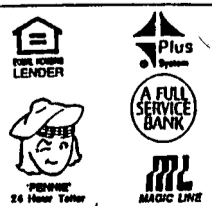

Take caution to keep foods fresh in warmer weather

With warmer weather and summer outings, extra care is needed to keep food fresh and to prevent food poisoning.

Food should be left out no longer than two hours at room temperature, according to Sylvia Treitman, home economist for the Oakland County Cooperative Extension.

"In early summer, we tend to forget the danger of leaving food out, and even grocery shopping can pose a food poisoning problem," says Treitman.

If you leave perishable groceries in the car and still have other stops to make, food spoilage can easily occur. Treitman recommends taking an ice chest along in the car for extended shopping trips.

"Remember, food does not have to look bad or even

smell bad to be spoiled," Treitman says, adding that food should go promptly into the refrigerator.

To prevent food poisoning:

- Keep everything clean: utensils, hands and work area.

- Keep hot food hot and cold food cold.

- Return food to refrigerator within two hours.

- Wash utensils after cutting raw meat and poultry before using another food.

- Wash utensils used for marinating raw meats or poultry before reusing.

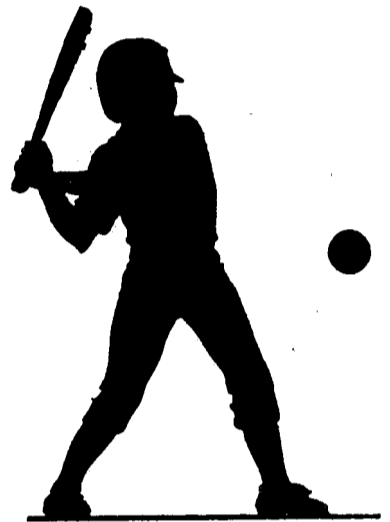

McCormick still loves camp

Hometown hero Tim McCormick concluded his ninth youth basketball camp at Clarkston High last week, only to find himself already longing for next summer.

"The camp seems to go better, smoother each year," he said. "I might add a drill here or subtract one there, but they're still fulfilling for me and the kids."

and how much fun they had in the process," the 31-year-old West Bloomfield resident added. "Hopefully, they all walk away from camp with a greater love for the game."

A 1980 alumnus of CHS, McCormick put Clarkston on the map when he starred at the University of Michigan, leading the Wolverines to the NIT title in 1984. A first-round NBA draft pick, he has played for franchises in Seattle, Philadelphia, New Jersey, Philadelphia, Atlanta and most recently New York.

Due to a knee injury, McCormick missed last season with the Knicks but kept active as a broadcaster for the Detroit

Pistons on the PASS network. McCormick has one year left on his contract with the Knicks, but he's already looking past his 10th professional season.

"I'll continue to try and rehabilitate my right knee, so I can return to the Knicks," he said. "If that doesn't work out, I'd like to continue my broadcast career, preferably with PASS."

McCormick said he started his annual summer camp to give back to his native community.

"I feel lucky to have grown up in a close-knit community like Clarkston, and I wanted to give something back, especially to the kids," he said. "I also think it's important, these days, for kids to know adults on a personal basis. Most of my assistants at the camp are college age, so the kids aren't as easily intimidated or standoffish."

"By getting to know them, they learn what it takes to make it at college and in life," McCormick added. "They give the kids someone to look up to and emulate."

McCormick also believes that professional basketball players have a responsibility as role models, despite what former teammate Charles Barkley says in a highly publicized commercial.

"Charles has a flair for saying the bizarre sometimes," McCormick said. "I sort of see what he's saying, in regards to parents taking the responsibility of raising their kids, but I think all adults should bear the burden."

McCormick said kids need to be instructed on how to be good listeners, how to be moral citizens and how to follow through on commitments. Ironically, his guest speaker, Chris Webber, broke his commitment to the team when he reneged on a promise to show up at camp.

"I feel bad that he didn't show up because it would have been nice for the kids to have met him," McCormick said. "They didn't seem to be upset over him not showing, but it was still disappointing."

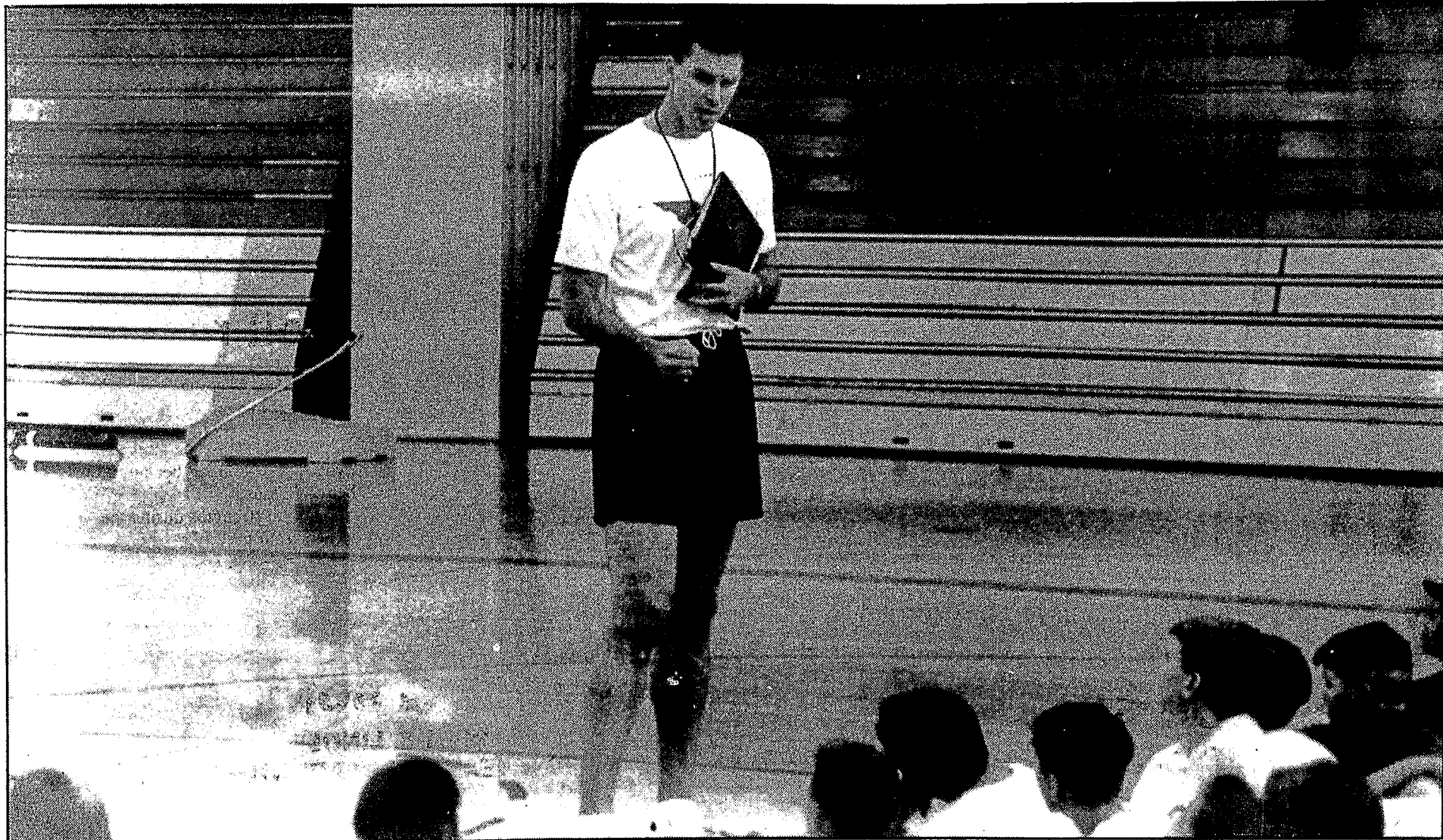
"Here, I preach to them about commitment and following through on their promises and Chris breaks his, without even a phone call beforehand," he added.

McCormick did defend Webber, however, because his scheduled appearance was one day before the NBA draft. Webber was ultimately selected the No. 1 player overall and will resume his career

with the Golden State Warriors.

With his professional career an uncertainty, McCormick said his annual camps will remain a constant.

"I don't see any reason to stop holding them," he said. "I'd like to continue them as long as possible because the kids seem to enjoy them. And I enjoy them too."

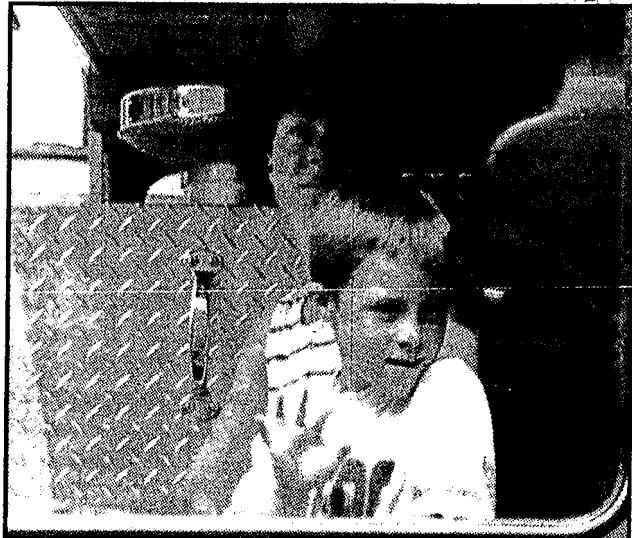

QUESTION: My uncle just died and left a large parcel of land to me. What are the tax rules if I inherit real estate from a relative.

ANSWER: The general rule is that a person inheriting property receives it at its fair market value on the date of the decedent's death. All untaxed capital gains are forgotten. Suppose the land you mention is worth \$100,000 and your uncle paid only \$10,000 for it years ago. That potential capital gain is forgotten upon death. If you sell the inherited property for \$100,000, you owe no tax on the profit since your basis is the \$100,000 fair market value on the day the decedent died.

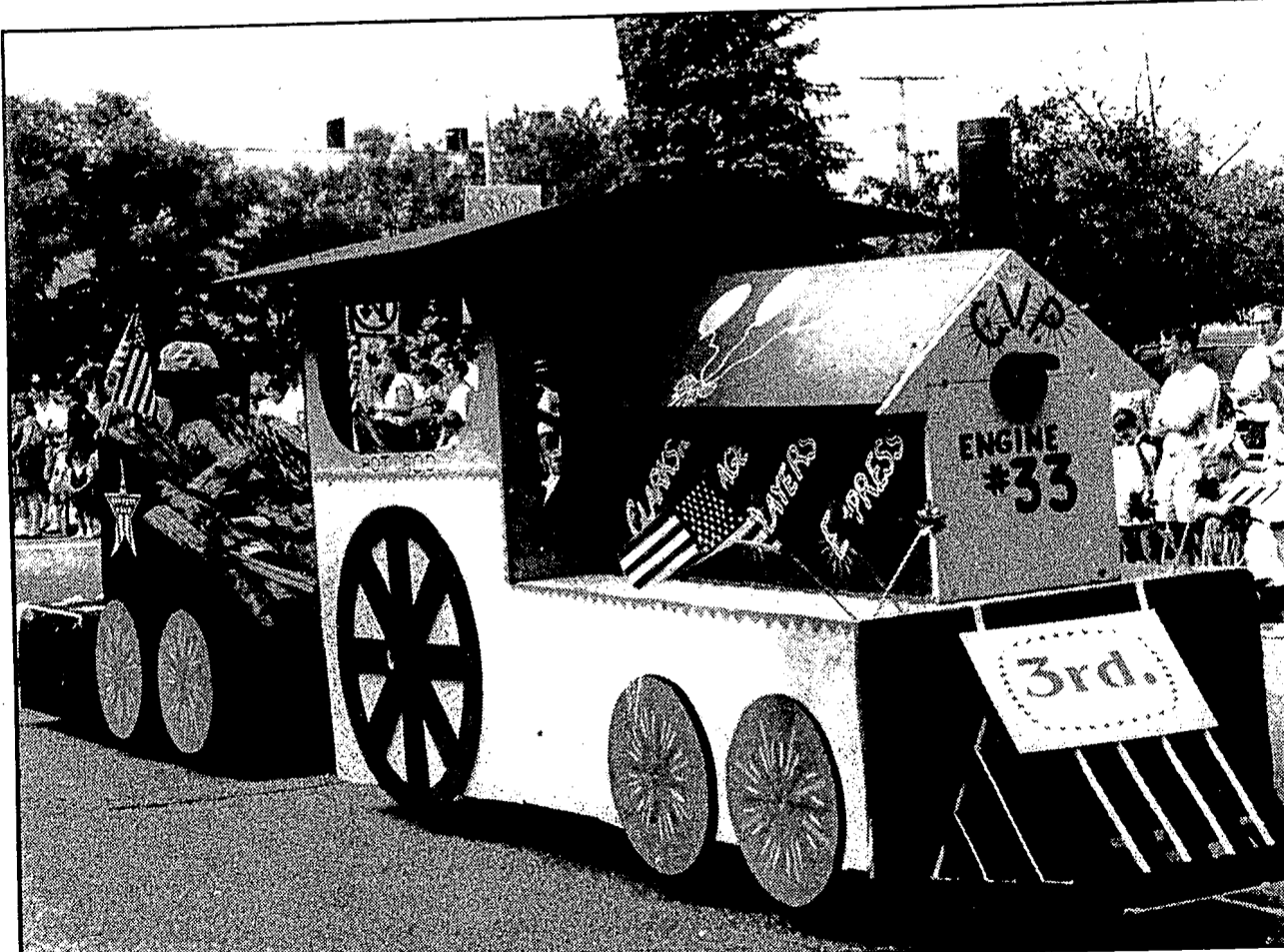
The Judges' Award went to Stonehaus Court Estates (a new residential development in Springfield Township).

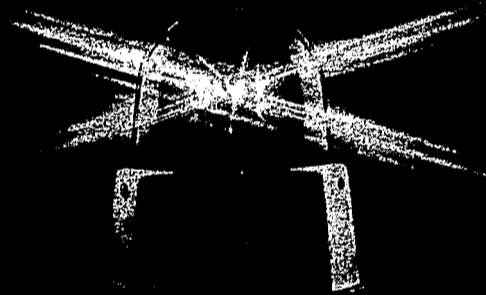

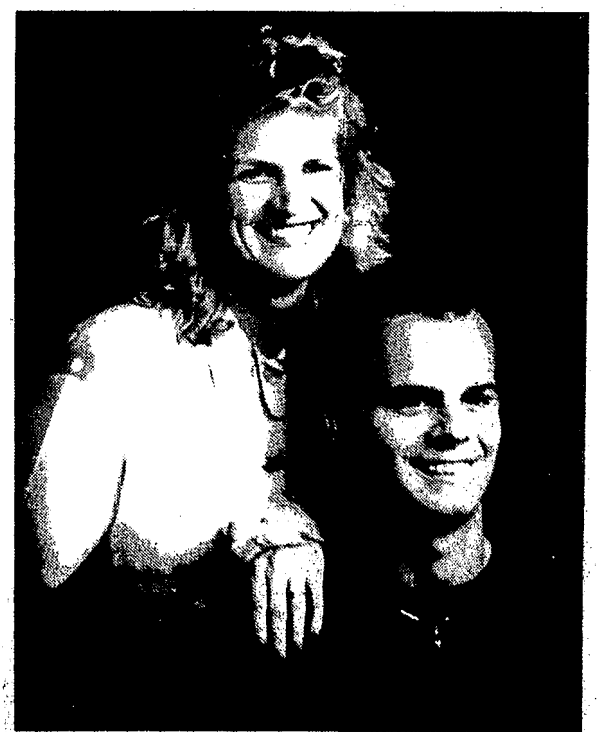

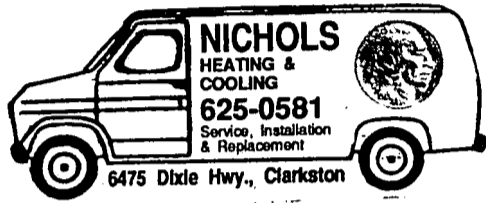
Sidewalk Funfest this weekend

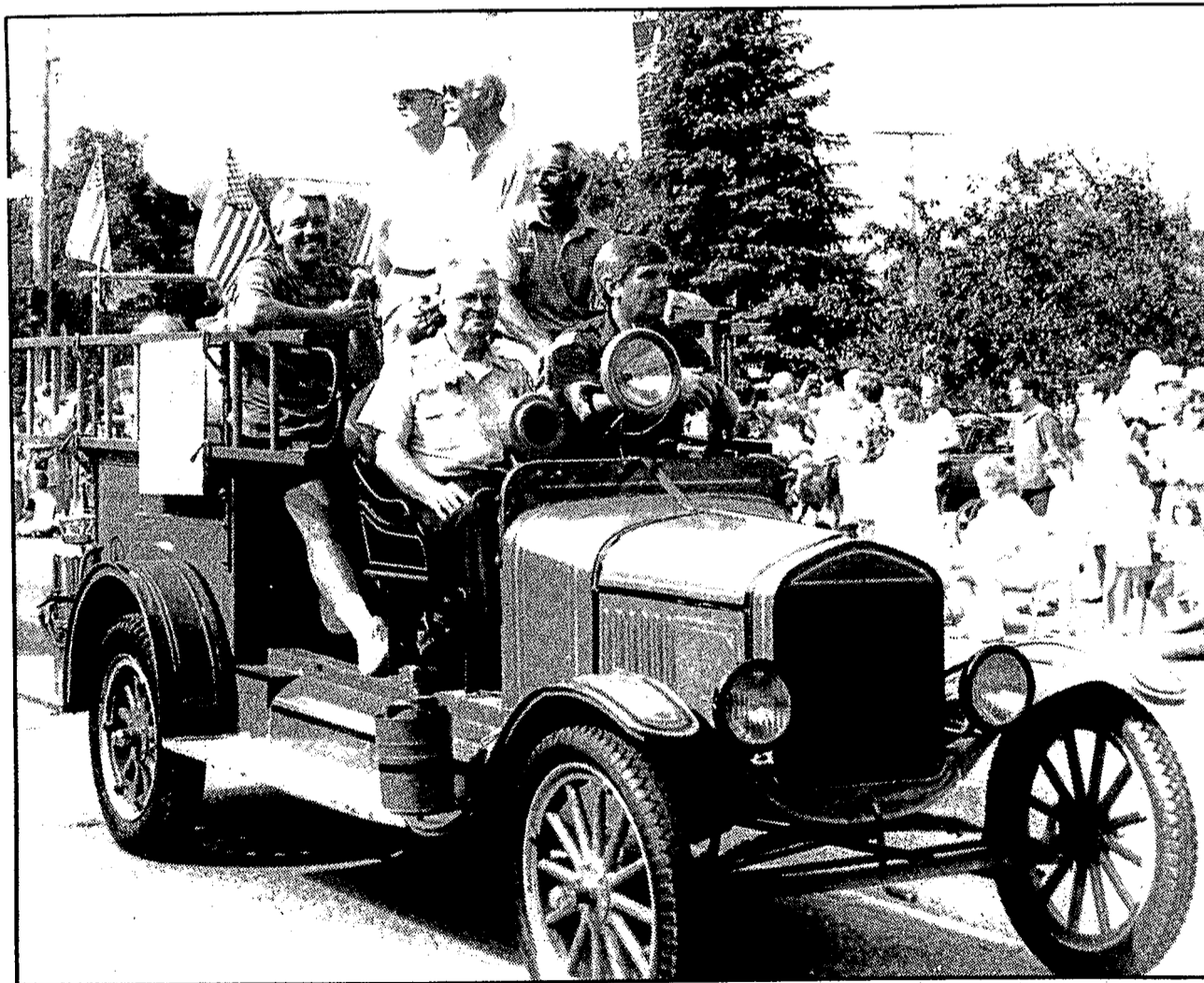
