Clarkston hires new cops

Clarkston's police department added not one but two part-time officers.

Police Chief Robert DeVore hired Terri Forgacs, 22, in December and Kelly Sexton, 29, in January. Their schedules will vary as they fill in for full-time officers.

Each will participate in road patrols, respond to calls and file accident reports.

Even though they work part time for the department, they intended to work full time making a contribution to the community.

"I would like to get involved with the schools and the kids," Forgacs said. "... to talk to them about the dangers of drugs and guns."

Sexton, a mother to Gary and Stephanie and wife of Gary, would like the community to get to know her as she gets to know them.

"I want the people to know that if anyone needs anything, I will be there," she said. "I'd rather help carry groceries than write a ticket."

Wanting to become a police officer started early for Forgacs.

"I always wanted to be in the police," she said. "After I graduated from high school, I knew what I was going to do."

Forgacs graduated from Macomb Community College in 1989 with an associate in criminal justice and graduated from the Macomb Police Academy in 1993.

She also completed her emergency medical training and recently took the state boards. She passed the practical test and now awaits the results of written test.

Sexton began by taking a few classes in criminal justice. She liked the classes so much, she took more. Once she had enough credits, she entered Wayne County Police Academy and graduated last June.

Working with Oxford's reserve police department for the last two years gave Sexton a lot of experience of working in a small town.

"The time at Oxford taught me more than in the classroom," she said. "I was able to experience the whole spectrum of police work from arrests, investigations and patrols."

And working in a small town is where she

"I grew up in a small town where everyone knows everyone and I like to stay and work in a small town," she said. "I make less money, but it doesn't matter."

School board considers leasing buses

Keeping aging school buses on the road can be costly, not only financially but in reliability and safety, school officials said.

In a report given to the Clarkston school board meeting Monday night, deputy superintendent Steve Lenar presented three cost scenarios for replacing

In years past, the district bought buses outright or borrowed to buy them. Last year budget constraints prevented the board from buying any buses.

Lenar said the school needs to lower the average age of its buses which stands now at 7.28 years old. Many of the buses have over 100,000 miles.

"We did not buy buses last last year, so we would be replacing two years of buses," Lenar said.

Board members raised questions over what method would be the best for the school.

"I'm concerned about fixing the future boards to fixed costs," Bill Craig, trustee said. "What are the long term effects and the short term effects?"

Lenar agreed if the school could afford it, owning its own buses would be the ideal situation.

"We are dealing with a cash flow problem," he said. "For the short term, leasing appears to be a good way to go."

The lease proposal would include a per bus cost estimate, and it would suggest that the school begin by leasing 15 buses the first year.

The agreement would run for five years and 90,000 miles.

"With 15 buses, the cost of maintenance would be reduced," he said. "We would feel the impact and we would reduce the age and save money."

Currently, the school owns 28 buses, 23 of which run daily and the remaining 5 are used as spares.

The 23 buses travel on the average of 2,100 miles per day for "regular education" runs, Lenar

With 181 days to the school year, the buses' total yearly mileage equals 380,000, with each bus averaging 16,526 miles.

Board members were concerned about the 90,000 mileage limit and penalties if buses were driven over that amount.

Lenar suggested the number of routes would be

Written Valentines are older than you think

The first written Valentines appeared in the early 15th century. They were handmade notes featuring original sentiments.

Those who found it difficult to express their feelings in verse finally found help in 1688 when the first Valentine writers were published.

These books featured a variety of phrases and were popular until the late 19th century when commercial Valentines came into favor. Although they replaced them in popularity, the first commercial Valentines may have been inspired by the pictorial designs on the pages of the Valentine writers.

In fact, the first fancy Valentines called "cut-outs" appeared as early as 1740. They featured intricate love bird and heart designs.

Letter sheets with pictorial designs appeared in 1810 with watercolor decoration of their borders becoming increasingly elaborate until, in 1850-60, they developed into the lacy Valentines. Lace paper blanks were also purchased and the sender decorated them with ribbon, lithographed pictures and original messages.

That period, 1850-60, was also considered the golden age of Valentines. England's lace paper manufacturers had developed their art to its highest point of excellence. Valentines of this period often contained hundreds of separate pieces including embossed ornaments of tinsel and colored paper as well as satin and aerophane inserts.

Kim Peters didn't want to go.

She had spent the night before nursing a sick child and all she wanted to do was go to bed.

But her husband strongly urged her to go. Even as she drove out in the swirling snow and cold and as she walked into the Clarkston Cafe at 18 S. Main Street, she wondered why she

Sitting in the corner sat the reason -- Claudia Brownlie, psychic.

The Clarkston mother of three was skeptical even if her husband had two sessions earlier with Claudia.

"My husband just flew into the house all excited," Kim Peters said. "He said I just had to go up there and see her."

For \$8, Claudia will give 12-minute "minireadings" to those who decide to sit at her table on the bar side of the Cafe.

With the Cafe's piano allowing a bit of privacy, Claudia reads and hears the "angels and guides" that surround her clients and communicates with Claudia's own "guides and angels."

"I'm clairvoyant and clairaudient -- I can see and hear," she said. "I gather information from these guides for my clients."

While she cannot give the same type of reading in a public setting as in a private one, she said she can pick up enough energy to still give a basic reading.

"I never know what will come through. I ask the guides, and through transformation I receive what can be helpful to the person," Claudia said.

Claudia said many of her clients have questions about relationships, business, children or career moves. To help her with the reading, she often asks clients for an object to better help her focus.

"It's a tool which I utilize to help me pick up information," she said. "A watch, a piece of jewelry -- something I can hold in my hand."

once Kim sat down, Claudia closed her hand around the the object Kim had given her. She closed her eyes with her head down.

Alarms fail, township sewers spill

Gray black water spilled out near the Deer Lake area because of a sewer system failure at one of Independence Township's lift stations Jan. 30.

Numerous safety malfunctions caused the M-15 lift station not to function properly and to warn department of public works officials in time to avoid the sewage back up. "Every back up system failed," Linda Richardson said, DPW assistant director. "The alarm did not go off, the compressor stopped which is also on an alarm system and it did not go off. The lift (much like the ball inside a toilet tank) did not rise and the mercury switches did not go off either."

Because of the failures, the DPW did not know until the Independence Fire Department received a call. Richardson believes that the water

ran all day Sunday.
Officials found 18 inches of water in a White
Lake Road condominium and contacted the owner, who is vacationing in Florida.

"We've had the insurance assessors out and work has begun," she said. "Dry wall will be replaced and the insulation. The floor was not covered so there was no damage there."

At this time, Richardson does not know if the township will be liable for the damage.

township will be liable for the damage. She turned in paper work, which included its schedule of regular maintenance, to their insur-

School board could lease buses

increased, which would reduce the number of miles and would therefore reduce the mileage of each

The school's chief of business operations outlined the costs of a straight cash purchase, loan purchase and lease plans which includes projected maintenance, tires and batteries, repair parts and other supplies. It also included projected revenue from the sale of the older buses.

If the board were to buy new buses, they would buy eight, at \$50,000 apiece, the first year. The straight cash plan would cost \$485,000 in the 1994-95 school year; \$255,000, 1995-96; \$312,000, 1996-97; \$267,000, 1997-98; \$324,000, 1998-99.

If it opts for a loan proposal, it could pay \$85,000, 1994-95; \$222,000, 1995-96; \$264,000, 1996-97; \$324,000, 1997-98; and \$362,000, 1998-99.

If the school were to lease, beginning with 15 buses the first year, six buses in 1996-97, and 9 buses in 1998-99, it would pay \$153,750, 1994-95; \$221,750, 1995-96; \$246,966, 1996-97; \$277,966, 1997-98; and \$283,908, 1998-99.

Whatever plan the board chooses, Lenar hopes

they approve one of his proposed formal bids at the next meeting.

"There is a six to seven month turnaround for new buses," he said. "If they approve it it March we could have them by September."

Other board news:

It unanimously denied admission for an out of district student who had been expelled. Superintendent of schools Gary Haner said that the board decided that it would not let the student in at this time.

The board agreed to expel a CHS student. The student was the second to be expelled this past month over the transference of a gun on school property. The expulsion will be permanent; however, the student and parents do have the option to ask the board to review the case and ask for readmittance, according to Gary Haner, superintendent of schools. The student's name will not be used because of her age.

The board honored three school employees. Each were recognized for the extra effort and time they put into their jobs. Lisa Graziano works as a mathematics support teacher for kindergarten through fifth grades. Perry Green works as a custodian at Clarkston Elementary. Katie MacKay teaches Special Education.

Depot Park committee looking for help

While Depot Park lies under a blanket of snow, a committee is working to see it receives a face lift once winter loosens its grip.

"Our target to start building is Memorial Day," said Jeanne Selander Miller, co-chair of the Depot Park Playground Committee.

The Depot Park Playground Project has been in the works for months with many area individuals and businesses working to raise money for what many feel are needed improvements.

Through various fund raising activities, the committee raised \$6,500 of the estimated \$15,000 needed for improving much of the existing play equipment, purchasing new play equipment and resurfacing the playground area.

The committee hopes to receive a big boost toward its goal if Clarkston's application for Community Development Block Grant money is accepted by county officials.

If approved, the City Council will designate \$5,000 for resurfacing the playground area.

"We're just waiting to hear from the county," Miller said. "We could hear as early as February or as late as the first of April."

The City Council held a public hearing so residents could have their say on where to use the CDBG money. Many who attended spoke in favor of using some of the money for the park.

But the committee needs more than CDBG

As part of its fund raising campaign, committee members are pounding the pavement in search of do-

nations from area businesses.

"We're going to reach out to the businesses along Main Street to ask for donations," Miller said. "So far, we've only scratched the surface."

Residents and businesses can choose to help the committee reach its goal by contributing money or volunteering labor.

Those who donate will be recognized. A wooden structure will be built and plaques will be hung with the names of contributors and levels of contribution. Levels of contribution are as follows:

- Park Patron-donation of \$500 or more
- Park Sponsor-donation of \$150 or more
- Family Sponsor-donation of \$75 or more

Or as an alternative, businesses and individuals can purchase a specific piece of playground equipment. They too will receive recognition on the donor board.

Any of the following equipment can be bought for the amounts listed: Arch Climber, \$290; Double Slide, \$605; Arch Link Bridge, \$1,400; Toss and Score, \$550; Bubble Window, \$150; Full Size Swings, \$70 each;, Tire Swing, \$1,000, Balance Beam, \$200; Spiral Slide, \$4,400; Tube Slide, \$900; Toddler Slide and Enclosed Stairway, \$1,500; and Structure for Baby Swings, \$500.

Also donors can make contributions for wooden picnic tables, \$300 each; wooden benches, \$625 each; and wooden waste receptacles for \$200 each. Those making a \$20 or more donation will receive a "Park Pal" button.

The committee's next meeting is 7:30 p.m., Feb. 10 at City Hall and it invites all those interested in helping to attend.

Arizona attracts Californians

25 years ago Don Blain Excavating dug a lagoon on our lot. Don's retired now and living in Lake Havasu City, Arizona.

When we saw him the first of the year we asked about population growth. He said they had plenty, mostly from California. He said there are so many Californians there now, filling the lake with their boats, he hasn't launched his in three years.

He sent a copy of the Phoenix Gazette of Jan. 23, after the earthquake. The headline is "Arizona here they come. Californians by the thousands head

The story lead is not what one might expect. It's about how Stephen Bridge, director of the Riverside-based Alcor Life Extension Foundation, is moving his operation to Arizona.

The Foundation has 27 frozen human bodies. They are encased in steel canisters that resemble big Thermos bottles. Bridge hopes his "patients" wil be thawed and brought back to life sometime in the future.

He's afraid a really big quake will cause his patients to thaw too soon so he's moving to Phoenix which has one of the lowest risks of earthquakes in the U.S.

Actually, a few more people leave California for Washington State than Arizona. License registrations show in the last year 33,503 left the sun and beach for Washington and 31,884 for AZ.

California's net loss last year was 99,902. Those leaving are older and better off financially, a demographer said. That state is still attracting the people under 30.

Excuses for leaving include smoggy skies, traffic jams and sky-high prices besides quakes, fires and mudslides. Then, too, there is the economy. The Golden State's economy has gone to Arizona, also.

A California Assemblyman said, "It's a beautiful state, but the only thing that makes it beautiful (now) is the weather." In the mid-'80s it was the land of opportunity, remember?

One displaced Californian who went to Arizona is quoted as saying, "Gee, I wish I was living in Southern California by the beach, but in reality I hardly ever went to the beach."

We have a condo in Carefree, AZ. When we bought there five years ago we were 20 miles north of Scottsdale. Today the Scottsdale line touches Carefree, and it isn't because Carefree annexed.

A 1,400-unit development was started on this border three months ago. The golf course is shaped and houses are for sale now.

It's the same way all over Arizona. Prescott, about 80 miles north, has a new development with "one-third of the buyers coming from California."

Tucson, Wickenburg, wherever, is attracting California people, and Phoenix in particular is hot after industry. Thirty-four industries left California last year to relocate in AZ.

Then, there's another reason to 'come and retire to Arizona.' Homes and land cost less.

Pleased to say Tech Center still open

The Wednesday, November 3, 1993 edition of the Clarkston News carried a front page story entitled, "Will Technical Center Close?"

At that time the school reform package did not provide funding for the operation of area technical centers. The 1/2 mill which has funded area centers in Oakland County was eliminated with the passage of the school reform act which eliminated local property tax revenue as the base of financial support for public K-12 education.

During the public and legislative debate in October, November and December it became very evident that the residents of Michigan valued career technical education and did not want the funding of the area technical center delivery system eliminated.

I am very pleased that the School Aid Act for 1994-95 (House Bill 5132) as approved by the legislature December 24, 1993 has reinstated financial support for area technical centers by allowing intermediate school districts to retain operating and vocational (career technical) education mills.

This very positive outcome could not have happened without a massive state-wide effort of concerned and supportive students, parents, business people, retirees, and former students who value the services provided by career technical education.

At a local level I would like to recognize several individuals who talked to, and wrote to area state representatives and senators to ensure the continuation of the four Oakland Technical Center campuses in Oakland County. A special thank you to Therman Nichols, Kenneth Hausauer, Dr. James O'Neill, Megan O'Neill, Chuck Fortinberry, Bruce Mercado, Jim Smith, Jeff Swayne and Buck Kopietz for your concern and support.

The public outpouring of support was very heartwarming and encouraging. The OTC-NWC staff will continue their dedicated efforts to provide the most relevant and highest quality career technical education possible. The center's involvement with program level business/industry advisory commit-

School Financing Part I

Putting the Puzzle Together

Now that the Michigan Legislature has put some finishing touches on its March 15 ballot proposal, pieces of the school finance puzzle are beginning to fall into place. Steve Lenar, Deputy Superintendent of Business and Operations, has been summarizing next year's school aid bill so that the Clarkston School District can plan for 1994-95. Here's how some pieces of the puzzle go together:

Here in the Clarkston District they will be greatly reduced. Our present operating millage is 38.83 and this will be reduced to 6 if the ballot proposal passes, to 12 if it doesn't. Either way, this is a substantial drop in operating millage for Clarkston Schools (if you own additional property, such as a cottage up north, a business or rental property, the millage on your second property may be as high as 24).

Clarkston Schools will, in effect, go back into a state aid formula. Every year the district will receive a Foundation Grant awarded on the basis of our student count. The FG for 1994-95 will be about \$5,400 per pupil, with the pupil count being based on an average of two official 1994 counts.

The FG, on the surface, looks like a healthy 4% increase in revenues, but there are strings attached to this part of the puzzle. The most significant is the end of the state's retirement will become the sole responsibility of the Clarkston School District, and will total about \$2 million in additional expenses.

Besides large increases in retirement cost, the

school district will now pay all employee social security costs, another expense which the state used

Cuts in Federal programs are also expected, especially in the funds for Chapter I (support for remedial reading and math in elementary schools). These cuts are based on the percentage of families in the district who qualify for such programs. Clarkston's changing demographics mean fewer federal dollars for this program. This relatively small dollar amount will have some impact on our current staffing levels in this program.

We also expect cutbacks in other state programs. For example, we already know that the legislature cut overall dollars for Gifted programs by 50%. Although we don't know the amount of Gifted funds to expect, we have to figure on a 50% reduction. This will also impact the level at which we can run our programs.

The big picture? It's a little early to see the whole shape of the puzzle. What we DO know is that next year's revenues will exceed projected expenditures by a slim margin. This slim margin must be divvied up among the ongoing needs of Clarkston Schools... staffing for student growth... purchasing busses... running and maintaining a new elementary schools... continuing our DAP program in Grade I... and necessity of negotiating a new teacher contract.

Stay tuned?

Christina Moore, 33, of Sashabaw Road, Independence Township, was arraigned Feb. 3 in 52nd District Court on attempted murder charges — a felony punishable with up to life in prison.

According to Det. Charles Young of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department, Moore and her husband began arguing Feb. 1 when he got home from work. He told her he was leaving the home, but before he could go she stabbed him in the back with a butcher's knife.

The man suffered a punctured lung and is expected to recover.

Young said there had been no violence between the two before. The couple had already filed for divorce.

Moore's preliminary exam is Feb. 10 at 1:30 p.m. in front of Judge Gerald McNally. She is in the Oakland County Jail unable to post at \$60,000 cash bond







Dew said that his songs simply come into his mind — at any time.


"I really feel like God says, ' John, here's a





When looking for vital records you may need some A 14 Wed., Feb. 9, 1994 The Clarkston (MI) News

Vital records are just that . . . vital. We need access to them.

In this age of bureaucratic documentation, everyone has need of copies of records of birth, death, marriage or divorce. An application for benefits from the Veterans Administration or Social Security, a passport or marriage license requires not only the information in the records but usually copies of the records themselves.

All these records are stored permanently by municipalities, counties, states and the Federal government. We all know this, but where each document is kept is frequently unknown.

The Consumer Education Research Center, a national non-profit consumer group, found there was little uniformity on where the records were available and the costs. In some states, birth records are kept by the city and in others by the county or state. To further complicate matters, often older records are held in different places than current ones. In addition, the addresses where the records are kept are changed

The consumer group found many people had difficulty in locating the records they needed. Often, calls just to find out where to write, what information was required and how much money to send. For that reason CERC has published a book entitled Where to Write for Vital Records, which contains a state-bystate listing of the addresses and telephone numbers of the archive where each record can be found, the cost of a copy of the document and sample form letters containing all the information needed to get these and other vital documents.

CERC has just released an updated edition. For those needing information from foreign countries,



the book contains a list of government offices where you can get help in locating vital records kept in almost every country. Even U.S. citizens born overseas, on a ship or aircraft can locate the place where their records are kept.

The organization found that many people have used previous editions to locate their family trees or roots. For those, the book includes information on the Family History Library of the Mormon Church. This library contains over 200,000 volumes of family history records and a list of almost a quarter-million people who are willing to share information

to help you find your family roots.

Robert L. Berko, executive director of CERC says that originally the book was published to satisfy the needs of persons applying for various benefits but many others have found it useful. He has received letters from libraries, coroners, law enforcement, social agencies, credit grantors, collection agencies, stock ownership tracers, lawyers, persons searching for missing heirs and even those interested in searching their family roots. All these and others have found use for a book that helps them locate and prove the status of individuals.

Many times documents can be used to prove things other than what they record. For instance, one woman wrote to the group telling them that a birth certficiate for her child proved her residence at that time in the United States and helped her become eligible for legal residence and citizenship.





A bird in the hand is worth

Fine art of bird raising

The sound of music fills her home.

But the music doesn't come from the usual sources — radio, television or CD players — the songs come from the many birds she houses in cages in the corner of her living room.

Hilda Hubbard, a Springfield Township resident, raises cockatiels.

Ranging from yellow to gray, some with bright orange circles on their necks, the 10-inch birds flutter and sing from their stacked cages.

But she didn't wake up one morning and say "I'm going to raise cockatiels." Hilda started by winning a cockatiel in a raffle while attending a bird

"I thought when they called my number I won money," she said. "I had two finches that I couldn't handle, and I thought, 'What was I going to do with another bird?"

Not wanting the male to feel lonely, Hilda asked a local bird breeder to help her pick out a female to keep the male company. "Then I had this fantastic idea to have my own babies," she said.

However, that was easier said than done.

In order for the birds to mate, a nest box had to be attached to their cage before the female would lay the small grayish eggs.

Two years passed before Hilda had her first batch of baby birds.

Through observation, Hilda found that the male sits on the eggs during the days, while the female takes the night shift.

After a wait of 18 to 21 days, the eggs hatch. "The babies are about the size of the tip of my small finger," she said.

But it doesn't take them long to get big and have feathers.

"They are ugly before they feather," she said. "I

"The stuff is a brown powder that I mix with water and I heat it up - just like you do for a baby," Hilda said.

Soon, the birds are eating seed, vegetables, fruit and one of their favorites treats—com bread. Hand feeding and handling the birds are important especially if Hilda intends to sell them.

"Mine are handled ... hand handled," she said. "Many of the pet stores have them imported and they

have never been handled. With mine, you can pet

Prices vary. However, because of the handling the birds receive, she can get a higher asking price-\$75 and up—depending on color.

daily and the grandchildren are given many opportunities to hold them.

One pair she hopes mates because of their color. If they do, she could receive up to \$800 for one bird. But Hilda doesn't just raise them for the money

"They are fun to watch," she said. "And I learn something new everyday."

Not your average park design

What do a dinosaur, rocket ship and house of mirrors have in common? They could all be part of the playscape at Bay Court Park on Andersonville Road.

Children at six schools came up with these ideas and more when Don Burgerin, a designer from Leathers and Associates, visited Clarkston Jan. 25.

Burgerin, of New York, has been designing playscapes with Leathers for over 4 years.

"It's just a great job. I like kids very, very much. I certainly enjoy working with children of all ages and teaching them the valuable lesson of cooperation," he

The playscape will incorporate ideas from area children and adults and will be built this summer with volunteer labor. Between this visit and construction of the playscape numerous fundraisers will be conducted to pay for the playscape. The playscape will be built with whatever money is raised.

Burgerin said the students had a lot of good and unique ideas for the playscape.

He asked a 5th-grade class at Sashabaw Elementary to build a playscape that would be accessible to all children. Some of their ideas were a wheelchair accessible elevator, suspension bridges and a house of mirrors that was wheelchair accessible.

Burgerin said the accessible playscape is a fairly new endeavor and the mirror maze is something he's never drawn before.

Other ideas for the playscape were dinosaurs to climb on, a pirate ship, tree forts, castles and various slides. A preliminary drawing was left with the Independence Township Parks and Recreation Department and a complete schematic drawing will arrive in about two weeks.

According to Burgerin, the playscape should be no more than 10,000 square feet. The largest playscape he has worked on was in Texas and measured about an acre.

Burgerin said that one of the most unusual playscapes he has drawn had a time wall in it. People, including primitive people who may have lived in the area, explorers and famous residents, were all pictured. He said he liked the idea because children learned about their history while they played.

Burgerin has seen many playscapes designed and built and said that residents, their children and their ideas never let him down.

DON BURGERIN of New York works to incorporate children's ideas into a playscape for Bay Court Park. Burgerin was in Clarkston Jan. 25 to talk to children and their parents about their ideas for a playscape in the township park.

"It's astounding how many people have volunteered to make these kids' dreams a reality. It never ceases to amaze me how hard people will work to make their children's dreams come true," he said.





Valentines in America

Prior to 1850, the best Valentines sent in the United States were imported from England. They were popular and expensive — their arrival was advertised in local newspapers and their prices ran as high as \$50 each.

In 1849, Esther Howland of Worcester, Mass., began making inexpensive Valentines in the English manner. She used lace paper imported from England and decorations from various areas of the United States. Orders during her first year in business exceeded \$10,000.

A vast change in Valentines took place in the 1870s with garishly colored chromolithographs edged with silk fringe. They used lace patterned paper and paste-on symbols.

German mechanical cards appeared in the 1880s three-dimensional pull-outs with a series of sets lined one behind the other. Many times a photograph of the sender

By World War I, however, they popularity of Valentines was declining - and the custom was obsolete in England where it had once been most popular.

A return to sentiment brought quality Valentines back on the market by 1930, but the day of the exquisite lace paper, delicately colored designs with original, handwritten verses, was over.

Gallant

The word "Valentine" comes from the Latin "galatin," which means lover, a gallant, according to the Detroit Historical Department.

Written Valentines date back to the early 15th century. They were handmade notes usually featuring original sentiments.





Faith, working together their secret

Little did Paul and Betty Ragatz realize when they met on a church bus as children that they would fall in love and get married.

Six days after Valentine's Day, the Ragatzes of Independence Township, will celebrate their 51st wedding anniversary.

"Probably more than anything else, our faith in God, our belief in God (has helped our relationship)," said Paul.

They met when Paul's father picked five-yearold Betty up for Sunday School at the Pontiac Free Methodist Church.

Paul said they weren't childhood sweethearts, they just knew each other. The couple didn't get romantically involved until June 1942 - and five months later they were married on Feb. 20, 1943.

Their wedding was attended by about 60 people and was at Betty's parents' home in Pontiac. Betty said her parents got married at home and she wanted have her wedding at home, too.

They were married at 8:30 p.m. because extended family members were farmers and had to finish their chores before attending the wedding.

Paul and Betty moved in with his mother and a year later their first child, Dan, was born.

Two months later, Paul joined the Marines and was shipped out for two years. He fought in Okinawa during World War II. During this time, Betty and little Dan moved in with her parents.

Both say that Paul's time in the Marines did not damage their relationship. "It actually brought us closer," said Betty.

When he returned from war the family lived in Pontiac for one more year and then moved to Illinois in 1947. Four daughters-Judy, Rosanna, Gail and Paula -- were born to the couple before they came back to Michigan.

The Ragatz family moved to Independence Township in 1956 so Paul could help his brothers run their

"I had to trust on the Lord, that he'd bring me through and not make me bitter," said Betty.

Paul and Betty and their children were charter members of the Clarkston Free Methodist Church which was established in 1961.

They, two of their daughters Judy (Peterson) of Ortonville, and Gail (Lake) of Union Lake, some grandchildren and a great-grandson still attend and are active in the church.

Although Paul credits the couple's faith in God for their succussful relationship, he also had some practical advice for married couples.

He suggested finances should be handled as one 'Don't try to have two different set ups," he said.

He also noted it's important to overlook each other's flaws because no one is perfect.

Another suggestion for success had to do with decision making. "Both people can't make decisions. Most of the time one or the other has more ability (to make good decisions). But make sure to ask each other about major decisions," he said.

When it comes to children, they say parents should treat their kids as individuals.

CPAs advise couples discuss budget

According to the Michigan Association of CPAs, couples who want a secure future must take the time to discuss important financial topics.

If you're a newlywed, the Association offers the following advice to help you and your spouse save, spend and plan for your life together.

Where to put your paycheck

If both you and your new partner work, one of the first issues you'll face is how to structure your separate paychecks into a joint financial future.

Some couples choose to pool all their resources into common checking and savings accounts. Others prefer to maintain two individual accounts with each partner responsible for certain expenses. Still others elect to set up a joint checking account for household expenses and savings while retaining their individual personal accounts.

There is no right or wrong method. The point is to organize your funds in a way that gives you the right balance of financial security, fiscal independence and joint financial planning.

It takes two to budget

A workable budget is essential to getting your new life off on the right financial foot — and both you and your spouse should participate in developing it. A budget helps you to save regularly, utilize income wisely, monitor spending and avoid misunderstandings about where your money is going.

To prepare a budget, start by determining you

total income from all sources. Use your most recent tax return for help in adding up your salaries, interest, dividends, bonuses and commissions. Make any necessary revisions or adjustments. Then identify all your expenses - both fixed and flexible. Fixed expenses include bills you must pay regularly like your mortgage or rent. Flexible expenses include items like clothing, food, entertainment, gifts, magazines — those items that cost you money regularly, but in varying amounts.

If your budget shows that your spending is outpacing your income, try to reduce your flexible expenses first. Be realistic. Leave some money for leisure-time activities that both you and your spouse

Once you've set up your budget, don't file it away. Spend a few hours each month reviewing your financial status. This provides for better cash management and may help you to reach your financial goals sooner.

Think taxes

Most couples will pay less tax filing jointly, but depending on your circumstances, you may find that filing separately will reduce your total tax bill. The easiest way to find out which filing status will save you tax dollars is to run the figures both ways — for filing jointly and for filing separately. Compare your tax liability for each to see which way you come out

A change in marital status can also affect your withholding tax. Compare your estimated tax bill for the year with the amount of money you're having deducted from your paycheck each pay period. If it appears that you will come up short, one or both of you should file a new W-4 form directing your employer to withhold more taxes or pay an estimated

The assurance of insurance

If you and your spouse are both working and both incomes are essential, review your life, health and disability policies to determine that you have adequate coverage. Many employers now offer flexible benefit plans that allow employees to select their benefits. Review the features and coverage from both employers' plans to determine which one offers the most generous benefits.

For all your tomorrows

If you and your spouse don't have wills, arrange to make them as soon as possible. Without a will, state laws dictate how your property will be distributed. You should also settle questions about the rights to property each of your brings into the marriage and the best way to take title of property acquired during your marriage.

History shows marriages began differently

Papyrus documents from first-century Egypt, only recently deciphered by University of Michigan researchers, suggest that Egyptian women used financial arrangements for safeguarding their marriages.

The finding provides further evidence that, when moving in with her intended husband — a common practice among middle-class Egyptian couples — a woman often made her fiance a short-term loan, designed to elicit fidelity through indebtedness.

The 22 papyrus documents chronicle the business and legal transactions of the Pausiris family, a family of weavers who lived in Oxyrhynchos, a major metropolis of central Egypt, around 70 A.D., a period of Roman rule.

Among the documents are a number of loan receipts made out to the middle son, Diokous, by Thermouthis, his wife of one year.

The U of M researchers believe the Pausiris documents confirm that the practice of marriage loans was used by lower-middle-class families that could not afford dowries secured by marriage contracts — a Roman practice — and thus most likely continued traditional Egyptian arrangements under the Roman rulers of the country.

"A woman's position in early Egypt was precarious at best, with little stability or financial security," said Professor Ludwig Koenen who was part of the translating team. "As long as her fiance or husband owed her money, she was guaranteed his support. The loan made divorce financially unattractive."

After the trial period or marriage, a woman could give her husband a larger loan, this time without an expiration date. She had the right to recall the loan and in this way practically to dissolve the marriage whenever it would please her.

In the case of Diokous and Thermouthis, the researchers found evidence of two loans - one in which Thermouthis lent Diokous 20 drachma for two month shortly before their marriage; the loan was repaid six month later. The second loan for 200 drachma was made one month after their marriage.

In this case, however, the arrangement didn't guarantee stability: a canceled loan receipt, dated little more than a year after their wedding indicates that the couple divorced and Diokous repaid his outstanding loan of 200 drachma.

"Where did he get the money? Perhaps he had a good business year, but a cynic would suspect that he

had found another lady who would give him a loan." Koenen said.

Although the marriage loan served many of the same functions as a dowry, Koenen notes that the documents contain no mention of "dowry" or "marriage."

In the loan documents between Thermouthis and Diokous, Koenen observed, "not a single word is wasted on indicating the couple's personal relations. Legally, the transaction was a loan."

However, the researchers noted that two of the documents contain stipulations about the husband's obligation to pay a fixed amount if the relationship were dissolved during the wife's pregnancy.

This title refers to the historic record survey of the Works Progress Administration begun in May 1939. The Federal Archives Imprint Inventory was conducted in all states except Delaware, Maine, Maryland, Ohio, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, Vermont and Virginia. The federal government put thousands of out of work people on jobs to preserve the important documentary records so precious





Adoption of Standard Codes (a) Pursuant to the provisions of Act 230 of the Public Acts of 1972, the Township does hereby adopt the Michigan State Building Code as promulgated by the State Construction Code Commission, and, pursuant to Section 9 of the Act, the Township designates the Building Department as the enforcing agency to

discharge the responsibilities of the Township under the Act.
(b) The 1990 edition of the Michigan State Building Code is hereby adopted and incorporated by reference as part of this ordi-

Section 2 of Ordinance
Chapter 7, Division 4, Section 7-61 and Section 7-62 are hereby amended to read as follows: Chapter

BUILDINGS AND BUILDING REGULATIONS DIVISION 5. ELECTRICAL CODE Subdivision I. In General

Section 7-61. Adoption.
The National Electrical Code, 1990 edition, is hereby adopted and incorporated by reference for application in the Township.

Section 7-62. Technical amendments. The technical amendments, 1990 edition of the National Electrical Code, as submitted and published by the Reciprocal Electrical Council, Inc., are hereby adopted by reference, as indicated below, with section numbers referring to the like numbered sections of the 1990 National Electrical Code:

Section 7-101. Adoption of Code. (a) Pursuant to the provisions of Act 230 of the Public Acts of 1972, the Township does hereby adopt the Michigan State Plumbing Code as promulgated by the State Construction Code Commission, and pursuant to Section 9 of such Act, the Township designates the Building Department as the enforcing agency to discharge the responsibilities of the Township under the Act.

(b) The 1990 edition of the Michigan State Plumbing Code is hereby adopted and incorporated by reference as part of this ordinance code.

Section 4 of Ordinance Chapter 7, Division 7, Section 7 read as follows:

Chapter 7

DIVISION 7. MECHANICAL CODE

Section 7-114. Adoption. (a) Pursuant to the provisions of Act 230 of the Public Acts of 1972, the Township does hereby adopt the Michigan State Mechanical Code as promulgated by the State Construction Code Commission, and pursuant to Section 9 of such Act, the Township does hereby designate the Building Department as the enforcing agency to discharge the responsibilities of the Township under the

(b) The 1990 edition of the Michigan State Mechanical Code is hereby adopted and incorporated by reference as part of this ordinance code.

Section 5 of Ordinance Chapter 9, Article 2, Section 9-16 (a) shall be amended to read as follows:

Chapter 9
FIRE PREVENTION AND PROTECTION

ARTICLE II. FIRE PREVENTION CODE Section 9-16. Adoption of BOCA Fire Prevention Code

(a) The 1990 edition of the BOCA Basic National Fire Prevention Code (hereinafter referred to as the "BOCA Fire Code"), is hereby adopted and incorporated by reference as part of this ordinance code.

(b) (No change) (c) The following supplements or amendments to the BOCÅ

Fire Code shall apply: F-106.1 - Restitution: When the fire department is called to respond to any emergency or incident which was the result of a violation of any federal, state or local regulation governing fire safety, or from gross negligence, the responsible person or firm shall reimburse the fire department for all costs incurred as a result of the emergency or incident.

F-11 - Street Number: In order to ensure that residential premises may be located and served in emergency circumstances, all residential (single-family), individual apartments or condominiums and commercial buildings shall have street numbers that are visible twenty (20) feet from the entrance to the

premises from the access road. F-12 - General: All habitable areas of buildings in all use groups shall be accessible by hose lines of a maximum of two hundred (200) feet in length unless the building is entirely covered by a suppression system installed in compliance with NFPA 13 as listed in Appendix A of the National Fire Code as promulgated by BOCA. If building is fully suppressed, hose line provisions as required in NFPA 13 and NFPA 14 as listed in Appendix A will be acceptable.

F-319.0 - Key Boxes.

F-319.1 - General: The fire official may require a key box to be installed in an accessible location where immediate access is necessary for life saving or to verify the existence of a fire or other

emergency in those buildings. F-500.9 - Fire Department Connections: In any building or structure required to be equipped with a fire department connection, the connection shall be located within one hundred (100) feet of a fire hydrant and within fifty (50) feet of a minimum twenty (20) feet wide paved driveway or street and in clear view of the fire

department F-500.10 - Certification Required: Any installation, testing, repair or maintenance of fire alarm or suppression systems required by this code or the building code shall be performed by a certified fire alarm or suppression firm.

F-501.0 - Definition: "Certified": A firm certified by the state fire marshal to install and maintain fire alarm and suppression equipment pursuant to Act 144 of the Public Acts of 1982. Upon request, firms shall present evidence of certification to the fire

F-503.3 - Standpipes: All standpipe fire lines in all buildings and structures shall be tested at least every five (5) years. In buildings and structures having floors used for human occupancy located more than forty (40) feet (12192mm) above the lowest level of fire department vehicle access, tests shall be made at intervals of not more than two (2) years. Wet and dry pipe systems shall meet the flow demands required at the time of installation or as required by section F-504.2.1 of this code and dry systems shall meet the pressure demands of section F-504.2. At the time of the test all control valves, including those inside hose cabinets, shall be operated and then rest in their proper position to ensure the workability of these valves. Wet and dry systems unable to meet the flow requirements at the time of installation or as required by section F-504.2.1 shall be required to install automatic fire pumps or tanks if deemed necessary by the official for occupancy of the

building. F-508.2.3 - Residential Buildings: In all hotels, dormitories, lodging houses and apartment buildings at least one (1) fire extinguisher shall be provided on each floor at the stairway landing and in the corridor at each elevator or bank of elevators or near the exit doors from the corridor. Individual apartment units are required to have one (1) extinguisher accessible for their use in the individual unit or within travel guidelines of NFPA 10 if only accessible to unit. F-510.0 - Supervision of Fire Protection Systems and

Control Valves. F-510.1 - Supervision of Suppression Systems: All required fire protection or suppression systems shall be super-

vised by one (1) of the following methods: 1. Approved central station alarm in accordance with

2. Approved proprietary alarm system in accordance with NFPA 72D.

Exceptions:

1. Standpipe systems.

2. Single station smoke detectors.

3. Limited area suppression systems in buildings not required to be completely suppressed.

F-510.2 - Valves: Valves controlling fire suppression systems shall be supervised by one of the following methods: 1. Approved central station alarm.

2. Approved proprietary alarm.

3. Approved chains and locks. F-510.3 - Fire Alarm Systems: All fire alarm systems that are not connected to an approved central station alarm system or proprietary alarm shall display a durable sign at each manual initiating device which reads "This alarm does not notify the Fire Department. To report a fire, call 9-1-1, or 625-3311.

F-510.4 - Water Supply: Domestic and fire water supply will be separate or gated in such a manner that if domestic water would be shut off for any reason, this would not interrupt the fire suppression system.

F-604.4 - Elevator Warning Signs: All elevator lobby call stations on all floor levels in all buildings shall be marked with approved signs reading as follows: "Use stairways in c do not use elevators." The requirements of this section shall apply to existing as well as new buildings. F-1904.10 - Self-service Stations: The owner or lessee of a

self-service gasoline station shall conspicuously post at all times at the approved emergency controls the current state or local fire code regulations governing self-service stations, as prescribed by the fire official. All gas pump attendants and persons in charge of the premises shall be familiar with all provisions of the regulations.

F-2800.1 - Scope: This article shall apply to the transporta-

tion, storage, handling and processing of flammable and combustible liquids as defined in section F-201.1 of this code. The rules for the storage of flammable and combustible liquids edition, as promulgated by the state fire safety board, are hereby adopted by

reference. F-2800.2 - Permit required: A permit shall be obtained from the fire official for the following:

1. To install, repair or alter in any way a stationary tank for the storage of flammable or combustible liquids.

F-2801.3 - Stationary Tank Information: The application to install, repair or alter any stationary tank for the storage of flammable or combustible liquids shall contain a general description of the proposed work and shall include two (2) copies of a drawing indicating the location, use, capacity and piping arrangement of all existing and proposed tanks located, or which are to be located, upon the premises and all adjacent buildings and property lines. Information which confirms that the tank meets the design requirements of section F-2801.2 shall be attached to or made a part of the application.

F-2900.2 - Approval required: Approval shall be obtained from the fire official for the storage or handling of more than fiftyfive (55) gallons (0.208 M) of corrosive liquids or more than one hundred (100) pounds (4.54 Kg) of organic peroxides, or more than five hundred (500) pounds (454 Kg) or more of ammonium nitrate, ammonium nitrate fertilizer and fertilizer mixtures covered in section F-2905.6 or any amount of highly toxic material or poisonous gas.

Approval shall be obtained for the storage or handling of any installation of more than one microcurie of radium not contained in a sealed source, or more than one millicurie of radium or other radioactive material in a sealed source or sources, or any amount of radioactive material for which a special license from the United States Energy Commission (AEC) is required in accordance with nationally recognized good practice.

F-3000.1 - Scope: The equipment, process and operations for storage handling of liquefied petroleum gas shall comply with the applicable requirements of this code and the provisions of the article. The Liqueified Petroleum Gas Rules, 1984 Edition, as promulgated by the state fire safety board are hereby adopted by

reference. F-3000.2 - Permit Required: A permit shall be obtained from the Fire Official for each installation of liquefied petroleum gas utilizing storage containers over 300 gallons individual water capacity. Prior to making such an installation an installer shall submit plans to the Fire Official and if compliance with the requirements of this code is shown by said plans, a permit shall be issued.

Delete F-100.1 from the BOCA Fire Code.

Delete F-112.1 from the BOCA Fire Code and insert the

following in its place:

Appeals: Appeals to the board may be taken by any person aggrieved by any decision or interpretation of the fire official made under the provisions of this code. The board of appeals for this code shall be the bureau of fire prevention.

F-305.1 - General: The storage of tires, combustible or flammable materials shall be confined to approved storage areas and shall be in compliance with all applicable township

ordinances. F-305.2 - Permit Required: A prsons shall not store in any building or upon any premises in excess of two thousand five hundred (2,500) cubic feet (70M3) gross volume of combustible empty packing cases, boxes, barrels or similar containers; or rubber tires, baled cotton, rubber, cork or other similarly combustible material without having obtained a permit from the code official.
F-305.13 - Inside Tire Storage: Inside tire storage shall be

arranged so as not to obstruct egress from the building and with aisles between areas of storage a minimum of ten (10) feet wide so as to subdivide the storage into units with no horizontal dimension of more than twenty-five (25) feet wide so as to subdivide the storage into units, with no horizontal dimension of more than twenty-

five (25) feet and a maximum height of twenty (20) feet.

F-305.14 - Outside Tire Storage: The outside storage of tires, combustible or flammable material shall not be more than twenty (20) feet in height and with no horizontal dimension of more than twenty-five (25) feet in any direction. Storage shall not be within twenty (20) feet of the perimeter of the property or within sixty (60) feet of any building or structure. There shall be a minimum separation of twenty (20) feet between all storage piles. This open space shall at all times be free of rubbish, equipment and other materials. Storage shall be accessible to fire fighting equipment on all sides.

F-305.15 - Fire Protection for Outside Tire Storage: When a tire storage yard is located within one thousand (1,000) feet of an operating water main, a fire hydrant shall be installed on such water main for fire fighting purposes. Portable fire fighting appliances shall be within fifteen (15) feet of any mechanism which operates to produce shavings or rubber dust in all tire storage yards. Smoking is prohibited within fifty (50) feet of a mechanism which is operating to produce shavings or rubber dust in a tire stor-

age yard. F-305.16 - Residual Cleanup Following a Fire: If any dangerous, hazardous or extremely hazardous wastes occur or are stored on the site of a tire storage yard due to the results of a fire in such yard or due to any other occurrence, such waste shall be disposed of and cleaned up in accordance with all applicable federal, state and local waste disposal regulations. No further tire storage may occur until the appropriate agency has certified that

proper removal and disposal has taken place. F-305.17 - Enclose of Tire Storage Areas: The area in which tires are accumulated shall be completely enclosed with a woven wire fence that is at least six (6) feet tall and has lockable gates. The tire storage area shall be mowed regularly or kept free

of weeds, vegetation and other growth at all times.

Delete BOCA Fire Code F-313.1, and insert the following amended F-313.1 (Designation), F-313.4 (Posting), and F-313.5

(Authority to remove obstruction), as follows:
F-313.1 - Designation: The fire official shall require and designate public or private fire lanes as deemed necessary for the efficient and effective use of fire apparatus. Fire lanes shall have a minimum width of twenty (20) feet and be constructed of a concrete or asphalt surface.

F-313.4 - Posting: All fire lanes shall be conspicuously posted with uniform fire lane signs in keeping with the standard established in the Michigan Manual of Uniform Traffic Control Devices, as revised, and as prescribed by the code official and erected on both sides of the fire lanes. Signs shall be erected no further than one hundred (100) feet apart in all areas designated as fire lanes

F-313.5 - Authority to Remove Obstructions: At any time, if any vehicle, trailer or other object is so located within a fire lane, the governing police agency or Independence Township Fire Department may, after reasonable attempts to notify the owner or other person having control, move or cause same to be moved by any reasonable means.

Section 6 of Ordinance Except as expressly specified above, the Independence Township Ordinance Code shall remain in full force and effect as amended prior to the date of this ordinance.

Section 7 of Ordinance The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby ordered to take effect immediately upon publication.
