

# Growth spurt continues

New residential development seems to be in the midst of its second dramatic growth spurt in the last dozen years, according to figures on file at the Independence Township Building Department.

There were 258 permits for new, single-family homes issued in Independence Township in 1993, building official Bev McElmeel said. In 1992 there were 197; in 1991, 137. That's a dramatic rise after five years of decline in the mid-1980s, McElmeel said. "I'm sure that this year we will exceed" the 1993 figure, she said.

The figures do not include remodeling projects. Other types of permits issued, including commercial, attached condominium and apartments, were very low. Only 16 attached condo permits were requested, none for apartments.

The value of the homes being built continues to rise. In 1986, when 318 new homes were built, their combined value was \$31 million. Seven years later, it only took 258 homes to come up with that combined value of \$31 million.

"The growth is occurring in high activity south of I-75," McElmeel said. She pointed out that most of that area is served by municipal water and sewer, while north of I-75, that's usually not true.

One example of the rapid growth is the Lake Waldon Village development off Waldon Rd. McElmeel said it sold out its first phase in 12 months and is now in its second phase.

Economic Development, said the growth is due to employers moving out to northern Oakland County.

"There has been a movement into the area because of the movement of Chrysler," he said.

In addition to Chrysler's move, there has been a continuing population migration to the northwest, he said. Between 1980 and 1990, Independence Township's population grew 15.3 percent. Surrounding townships grew at even greater rates.

"The employment pattern is still shifting," Kaczmarek said. "It used to be central city oriented. Independence Township is almost half way between Flint and Detroit and it attracts from both labor markets."

# New principal to be named soon

A new principal for Bailey Lake Elementary School should be named at the April 11 meeting of the Clarkston Board of Education.

The new principal is expected to be chosen from among three final candidates approved by a committee made up of parents, teachers and administrators. Current principal Doris Mousseau is retiring at the end of the school year.

Penny Shanks, a regional vice president on the Michigan PTA and Clarkston resident who served on the principal search committee, was pleased at the way the process went.

"The parent's perspective is not always the most important when they select a principal, and a principal can make or break your building," she said. "I was impressed. They had staff from Bailey Lake and other

buildings come in."

Shanks said there were about 60 applicants for the position. On March 9, eight semi-finalists were interviewed by the committee. The next day, finalists were selected to be interviewed by school superintendent Gary Haner. On-site visitations were continuing this week at the finalists' home districts.

However, because the district is opening a new elementary school, there is another opening. Dr. Sharon Devereaux, principal of Andersonville School, will fill the new position; Mousseau was scheduled to go to Andersonville, creating a vacancy at Bailey Lake. Now that she's retiring, there's another vacancy.

"I'm not sure frankly what I'll do with this," Haner said Monday. "We are evaluating whether to repost the position or select an additional candidate from the interviewing process... We're still dealing with three of those candidates."

# Court to decide fate of killer dogs

One calf dead, another injured by bull mastiffs on Dixie Highway

Some considered it an act of nature against nature when two bull mastiffs attacked two calves. One calf died hours later from its injuries.

The calves' owner worries that her family could be in danger. Now it's neighbor pitted against neighbor.

Jackie Speagle, owner of the calves, wants the dogs destroyed immediately. Larry Marlowe, owner of the dogs, wants the dogs to live.

"What's next, a person?" Speagle, a Springfield resident, said. "My son gets dropped off at the end of the drive, and I'm scared that he might not get to the house safe."

She called Oakland County Animal Control, yet officers could not remove the dogs because a Michigan law recognizes animals as private property.

"We cannot take private property away and dogs are private property," Sandra Gay, manager of Animal Control, said. "Even when livestock is killed, the person must go to court and file for a show cause."

Speagle filed the day after the March 22 attack and will have her day in 52-3 District Court before Judge Gerald McNally on Thursday, March 31 at 1:30 p.m.

A former employee of Marlowe's, Mary Torres, will be in court to support Speagle's plea to have the dogs destroyed.

She intends to testify that the dogs have killed

other animals.

"The dogs killed a cat. I know they gnashed to the bone one of the Sharpeis they (Marlowes) were breeding," Torres said. "I also heard that they tore a goose apart, killed a golden pheasant and from what I hear, they have killed deer."

Until the judge rules differently, the dogs remain with the Marlowes, who lives near the Speagles on Dixie Highway in Springfield Township.

Animal Control's Deputy Sheriff Ray Plagens, who responded to Speagle's call, said he found traces of blood on the muzzles of the two dogs and the hole they dug to escape their pen. However, he found the dogs to be friendly.

"These dogs were friendly around people," Plagens said. "They wagged their tails. And in my 20-year experience I've never known these animals to attack humans. They are regarded as companions."

Bull mastiffs were bred in the 1800s by Englishlandowners to help their game keepers hunt large animals, such as deer, Marlowe said.

"It's their instinct to chase after large animals," he said. "But they would never, never attack humans attacked two calves, injuring one calf and killing the other.

— they are just big babies. My friend brings his little child here. He trusts those dogs."

Marlowe doesn't deny that he has a problem with his dogs escaping and attacking the Speagles' calves. He paid for the vet bills, not only this time but for one other attack also. He also said he will cover the cost of the dead calf.

"But I'm not going to destroy the dogs," Marlowe said. "It would be like getting rid of a family member."

He said he would like to keep the animals and would make sure the pen is escape proof. However, he promised the Speagles he would get rid of Duncan and Raven.

"I'm not denying responsibility and I will pay for their loss," he said. "I put an ad in the paper and will try to sell them."

But Speagle said she wants to stop Marlowe from selling the dogs to an unsuspecting buyer.

"This wasn't the first time these dogs attacked our cows," she said. "The first time, they chewed the ears off our 600- and 1,000-pound cows. We had to slaughter them because after the attack they would not grow anymore."

Speagle said the owners pleaded with her not to take any action, promising that it would not happen again. But the dogs attacked three times in six months.

"I felt sorry for them. They are \$1,000 dogs," she

Now she wants the dogs destroyed and doesn't understand why it could not be done without a court order.

"It's ridiculous that they (Animal Control) protect the dogs over humans," Speagle said. "How can they let the dogs remain when they have killed something? I want the dogs out of there."

She fears that if they are sold, the new owners will not know what they are buying into.

"Are they going to disclose that they attack large animals, that they attacked calves, that they killed one and hurt another?" she said. "Imagine those dogs in a subdivision. Imagine if a child was walking a pet and those dogs got loose — who will they attack? Even if they attack the dog, it's not right."

# nen's clinic forced to close doors

The doors of the Women's Health Center of Clarkston were forced shut Thursday night when the landlord, Clarmed Associates, got a ruling from federal bankruptcy court that he could go ahead with eviction proceedings.

Clarmed had attempted to serve an eviction the previous weekend, but the clinic filed for bankruptcy protection, delaying the action.

"They surprised us," said Michael Mosharo, the clinic's administrator, on Monday. "We are moving up the street. The building we are going to occupy will be a short-term fix for the new building (being built)."

The clinic expects to reopen later this week, perhaps by today or Thursday, at 6100 Dixie Highway, near the top of Waterford Hill, Mosharo said.

"Right now we expect to have phones in by Tuesday or Wednesday," Mosharo said. Patients showing up at the old location were being greeted by a clinic employee who was taking messages for the

The clinic's eventual permanent home will be at a site currently under construction and also on Dixie Highway, Mosharo said.

The eviction came as Mosharo and clinic medical director Dr. Susan Coleman thought they had everything under control.

In an interview Thursday afternoon, Coleman said she had been forced to file for bankruptcy when she learned she was about to be evicted in a dispute over rent.

"The Womens Health Center is bankrupt, but

I'm continuing to practice; I'm giving the same quality of care," said Coleman, who has practiced medicine in Clarkston for 12 years.

At the age of 43, Coleman finds herself forced to start over. The center will take on a new name-Womens Health and Internal Medicine Center of Oakland County. It will eventually move to new quarters. But the changes have come with a heavy financial cost.

"The support of doctors and patients has been excellent," she said. "Many said, 'I too have gone through this.' The patients just wanted to know we are continuing.

I have a patient base and reputation for quality care that's taken 12 years to build, and that doesn't go away with bankruptcy.'

"I've had a few very upset older ladies that I've been their doctor for 10 years. They asked, 'If you're going to close, how can you still see me?"

The clinic is mailing all patients a letter this week explaining the reorganization and introducing a new doctor, JoAnn McCall, who is joining Coleman in the new venture.

"This is a viable practice with an excellent patient base," McCall said. "Once cleared of these

enormous debts and reorganized, we can continue to offer viable services on terms our patients want.

"I think we have a rosy future, and it has been the cooperation of other physicians that has made that possible."

As Coleman tells it, her problems began three or four years ago, when St. Joseph Mercy Hospital called in a promissory note. Mercy said the clinic owed \$225,000.

Coleman originally hoped to open her clinic as a joint venture with the hospital, but said the business climate changed and after the promissory note was signed, Mercy backed out. An administrator for Mercy could not be reached for comment.

When Mercy demanded the money, Coleman took it to arbitration and had the award reduced by \$100,000, a "moral victory," in her words. But it wasn't much of a financial victory since legal fees totaled \$75,000. Coleman had to take out a loan to pay off the award. She's still paying the legal bills.

"We never recovered but we were functioning," she said. "And then we had a dispute with the landlord."

That dispute with Clarmed is now the subject of suits in district and circuit courts. It centers on the cost of utilities, expenses and some repair and remodeling work done on the building.

"We tried to do everything we can to accommodate them," said Genevieve Mazur, attorney for Clarmed. When they were unable to reach agreement, they received permission from the bankruptcy court to execute a writ of restitution, locking the clinic out of its quarters. But even before that, changes were being made.



# Residents question Stonehedge developer

Residents seem to like the idea of Stonehedge (formerly Country Club of the North), but there are some problems they want ironed out.

About 60 residents packed the regular planning commission meeting to voice concerns with setbacks, dirt roads and unanswered question about the 825 acre development planned for Independence and Orion townships.

"I came to this area because it was rural," said one Ranch Estates resident. "I'm not against you. I'd like to see some protection for all of us around there. This is a major impact on our lives. I'd like more definite plans."

The private gated community, with a southern boundary at Waldon Road and western line at Clintonville Road, had originally been planned with 450 dwellings and two golf courses. A golf course has been dropped and 45 units have been added.

Residents were concerned the new homes will be too close to their property. Many citizens said they were originally told their homes would face a golf

Official reports by the township planner to the board asked an additional 30 feet be added to regular setbacks to protect current residents.

The public hearing was the first of many involving Stonehedge. This meeting established a master plan for the community sent to the township board without specific information needed to begin various

Each phase of the development will come before residents and township boards before it is approved.

At future public hearings, specific information about setbacks, lot sizes and kinds of dwellings will be offered, according to the planner. The public and

board members can then voice their concerns and ask developers to make adjustments.

"This master plan is a beginning and that is all it is," said township planner Richard Carlisle.

Cecilia Yarber also tried to quell the fear of the citizens. "I want to assure you, this (development) will be heavily monitored.'

About 500 of the over 800 acres will remain open space and there will be less than one unit per acre. Most of the development will be concentrated in one area close to other residents who live on three-to five-acre parcels. Perimeter lots are planned for 15,000 square feet and interior lots are planeed at 12,000

As part of the agreement with the developer, Clintonville Road from Waldon to Clarkston road will be pave and public water will be extended to the development as the developer's expense.

The current recommendation is to pave the road after the 125th sale of a home. In the interim chloriding and maintaining dirt roads was requested by the township.

Steven Board said if a golf course is opened on the property than the road should be paved.

In his motion to recommend the concept plan to the township board, Board said Clintonville must be paved prior to the 125th bill of sale or before the golf course or club house opens.

"Before you play your first round of golf you must pave the road."

Upon urging from other board members and the developer, the original motion was amended to omit the permanence of Board's paving request. Instead, a study will be conducted and recommendations will be given to the township board on whether or not the impact of the golf course should require paving.

"Quite frankly, it sounds like we're passing the buck," said Board.

The amended motion was passed 5-0.

### In other action:

 A 311-acre development on Holcomb Road was given preliminary plat approval. The property owned by Dr. James O'Neill is planned as a "country estate setting" with lots ranging from 1.5 to 2.7 or more acres.

'It's nice to see lots proportionate to the homes that will go there," Trustee Joseph Figa told develop-

Included in the approval is a request to have developers and the township meet with the Oakland County Road Commission to decide how to go about paving Holcomb Road which is lined with large trees.

# City considers adding police car

Clarkston City Council gave the nod of approval Monday night for Police Chief Robert DeVore to negotiate for a used police vehicle from the city of Frazier.

In his report to the council Monday night, DeVore said he was concerned about the department's 1990 police car. Its odometer reads 90,000plus miles and while it is sound mechanically, he does not want to have it on 24-hour, all-week rotations.

By buying a third patrol car, DeVore said he could prolong the life of not only the 1990 vehicle but also the 1992 car, which the department bought new.

Steve Arkwright, city council member and police liaison, said he was concerned about becoming a "three-car department." He questioned the merits of

The final decision will be made at the April 11 city council meeting.

However we're a lot more reluctant to invest in areas where there is already an infrastructure, already a population base, but some remedial work is needed, such as Detroit

It's reminiscent of the mythical "Mega Mall" which was supposed to be built off Baldwin Rd. and I-75. Tax dollars, as I recall, were being promised to bring in water, utilities and roads to what is no more than a grassy field, all in the name of new development.

Funny — I hear a lot of people in northern Oakland County saying they want to preserve their open spaces. But apparently the voices of developers speak louder.

Personally, I'm not sure we should be spending public dollars on private enterprise, but if we're going to, let's put it where it's really needed.

Does Oakland County need jobs? Sure, but not nearly as bad as Detroit does. How's this for an idea: offer Mike Ilitch the money he wants to build in Detroit, but make it mandatory that he hire people off welfare for any job they're capable of doing. Training must be included. That way, the money becomes an investment in people who need it most, not just developers.

Personally, though I have long, happy memories of "Briggs" Stadium, I can't help but get excited about Ilitch's vision. If he builds it, I will probably go. But let's make it an investment in our people, not just the Tigers.

This past week I discovered my grandfather's sister was still alive. Since Papa died in 1976, I thought all of his brothers and sisters were gone too.

Boy howdy was I wrong. Aunt Grace is still alive, alert and kicking. I wasn't too sure what to expect when I drove up to her home in Saginaw on Sunday

I was greeted at the door by a red-headed 77-year-old. I was nervous about staying with her the afternoon; although we're related we don't know

She told me she didn't even know that my grandparents had had children. I guess when their mother died (the year before my grandparents were married) Grace was only 12 and she was sent away to

live with a childless aunt.

Because my grandfather died when I was six and my grandmother wasn't close to his family, I never knew about them.

For four hours Grace told me stories about her parents and grandparents and my grandfather.

When they were children the nine kids got an apple, an orange and peanuts for Christmas. Before they got their stockings down someone got a piece of

paper, then marked the amount of peanuts each kid got. This was so no one got more peanuts than another.

She told me that my grandfather — never a rich man — sent her money for clothes and books while she was growing up.

I found out my great-great grandmother was a stubborn German woman who refused to learn English. She chased Grace a half mile one day after Grace sassed her. Then she brought her home and dunked her in the horse trough.

The other great-great grandmother was an aristocratic, ritzy woman who had come from Canada as one of the early pioneers of Saginaw. She was wealthy and prissy and thought Grace's family's life on the farm was beneath her.

As she told me her stories throughout the afternoon, people who had moments before been only a name came to life.

I saw my grandfather as an old man in his father's face. I noticed features of myself, my sister, brother and cousins in the old photos from the late 1800s.

I love old things. They tell stories that end up shaping who you are.

A breaking and entering charge out of Waterford came after Case allegedly took a key to an office from his girlfriend, entered the business and took money from the cash register.







# New fishing rules available

The 1994 Michigan Fishing Guide will be available April 1 from all Department of Natural Resources license agents and at DNR district offices statewide.

Rules for the 1994 Guide apply from April 1, 1994 to March 31 1995.

There are a number of new rule changes for the 1994-95 fishing season. Several of the more important changes include the following:

\*It is now illegal to "snag" any fish, including salmon, statewide: all fish taken must be hooked

inside the mouth.

\*Drowned river-mouth lakes (listed at the bottom of page 23 of the Guide) will be closed to lake-trout fishing from the day after Labor Day through April 30.

\*Significant changes in the regulation of ice shanties are detailed in the Guide.

An important corrections sheet containing corrections to the fishing guide will also be available where fishing licenses are distributed, and should be used along with the 1994 Michigan Fishing Guide.

# Athletes need to cover their bases to play

Anyone can play sports . . . but before Clarkston School athletes take that first swing at bat, run around a track, or kick a ball, they must fulfill certain requirements.

All schools require athletes to be examined by a physician and fill out a medical history form.

An athletic contract must also be filled out which asks for insurance and doctor information. And "in case of emergency" numbers are needed. Parents will be asked sign a consent form to allow medical emergency treatment, either by a doctor or hospital, in case parents cannot be reached.

The Michigan High School Athletic Association requires all students to be covered by insurance.

Most students are covered by their parents' policies. However, students without coverage can buy short term coverage from the school, Paul Tungate, Clarkston's athletic director, said.

"We rarely are asked for these polices," he said. A 24-hour coverage or school-time-only cover-

age is offered by the school and each offers comprehensive, standard or an economy option, Tungate

My husband, who admits he knows nothing of computers - not even how to turn them onpatiently says to me, "Lets see what you did."


So I turned everything back on and repeated the steps I had taken a million times earlier. IT WORKED!

# Township to mail wetlands notices

Residents of Independence Township will soon be receiving a letter in the mail telling them there is a new wetlands inventory map available.

Just why is that important? Because the township has on its books an ordinance regulating wetlands over two acres in size. That means if you want to do anything with wetlands on your property, you must get permission from the township.

The township has had a wetlands ordinance since the mid-1970s, according to Bev McElmeel, the township's building administrator. State law now requires that if such an ordinance is in force, an inventory map must be available.

McElmeel said the inventory has been completed since 1983 but residents may not have known about it.

"It's just educating the people," she said. "We will mail a notice to every property owner in the township and then they can offer any comments to us. They may or may not agree."

Comments from the public are due by April 15. At the same time, the township is working on amending its wetlands ordinance, McElmeel said.

The current ordinance calls for a permitting process for anything that would alter wetlands. No permits are required for fishing, swimming, boating and hiking, or for seasonal docks, rafts, etc.

"The thing you have to look at is the integrity of the wetlands," McElmeel said. "Some of the soils are not appropriate for construction . . .

State law defines a wetland as 'land characterized by the presence of water at a frequency and duration sufficient to support . . . wetland vegetation or aquatic life.'

"We're not saying that you cannot do this. What we're saying is there is a permitting process that needs to be followed."

State law defines a wetland as "land characterized by the presence of water at a frequency and duration sufficient to support, and that under normal circumstances does support, wetland vegetation or aquatic life."

State law regulates wetlands five acres in size or greater under the Goemaere-Anderson Wetland Protection Act, which was enacted in 1980. State law also requires a permit, issued by the Department of Natural Resources, for dredging, draining, filling or building on a wetland five acres or larger.

Some north Oakland County townships are still wrestling with the idea of enacting their own wetlands protection ordinances. But not Independence.

"We've always been conscientious," McElmeel said. "They've had an awareness for preservation in our township . . .

"The codes and regulations are there for everyone's benefit. They've been put there by people like

you and I. They are answers to concerns and problems we may have . . .

"Those kinds of things put the quality in areas."

# Hearing on land use draws few comments

A few questions were raised during the public hearing at Monday's Clarkston City Council meeting over the city's quest to keep a piece of land undeveloped.

The meeting was held as part of an application process to qualify for grant money which would be used toward buying the land at the corner of Main Street and Waldon from Independence Township.

The Independence Township Land Conservancy approached the city council two weeks ago in hopes the city would apply to the state's Kerry Kammer Land Trust for 75 percent of the purchase price. The Conservancy would raise the other 25 percent through fund-raising efforts and private donations.

If the city is able to purchase the land, it would grant the Conservancy a scenic easement, which would ensure that the land stays in its natural state forever.

A Middle Lake Road resident questioned the land's current natural state.

"It's not very much to look at and it seems not to be worth much," Laura Aulgur said.

Conservancy members assured Aulgur that the condition could be altered.

"We know there are junk trees in there and maybe those can be replaced with oaks and maples we can enhance it with hardwoods," Tom Stone said.



# Discovering Washington



Coleman sees herself as part of the community and wanted to avoid bankruptcy if at all possible. "It would have been financially better to file then (two years ago)," she said. "We wouldn't have had to use up so much of our savings."

When asked how someone starts over after all of that, Coleman didn't hesitate. "With some help from friends," she said. She's gotten a loan from Critten-

ton Hospital to pay off Mercy, and other doctors have helped too.

disagreed. "The location is probably the main key," she said. "You've got the freeway and you can go north or south and make your place of employment in a reasonable time . . . So I think access is the answer ... And I think the quality of life."

Apparently many others agree. As the southern part of the township fills up, developers are beginning to propose new projects north of I-75 and in the far eastern part of the township, McElmeel said.

All that growth is not without impact. The Clarkston school district, which sends out materials on the district to all new homeowners, reports 170 packets have been sent out since January.



# Racing into the record books at 200 mph

Studebaker cars and wagons have been involved in some famous incidents.

A Studebaker carriage carried Abraham Lincoln to Ford's Theater and General Custer to Little Big Hom. A Studebaker also carried an area resident into

the record books for racing cars.

On Sept. 22, 1993 at the Bonneville Salt Flats Ron Hall became the first person to drive a Studebaker engine-powered car over 200 mph. He also set a world class speed record averaging 195.640 mph in two runs.

Hall, of Independence Township, is a technician for Gabriel Ride Control and he loves cars.

"I didn't get involved in cars until I was seven," he said with a laugh.

As a child he was fascinated with a 1953 Studebaker owned by a man in his church and he used to cut car ads out of the paper.

Hall bought his first Studebaker on Aug. 1, 1966 at 16 for \$50 and has had the cars around since.

His first race at Bonneville was in 1988. He and his friends had a car that held oil and ran. "We had no idea what we were doing," he admitted.

In order to sponsor the first race Hall had a "Buy a T-shirt, sign the hood" promotion at the Studebaker National Meet. He said two weeks before his first race the engine and car weren't ready. The roll bar hadn't even been bolted in.

"Think of all the time we saved there. We only

used up one week instead of a month," he laughed.
Hall did well in his first attempt, averaging 172.746 mph.

Bonneville is a 28-square-mile piece of land in Wendover, Utah that is completely flat.

"It's a safe place. It is only volatile when it comes to weather."

Of the four races scheduled at the salt flats last year, only Hall's September race was run. It did rain before Hall's race, and it affected the race's second run

"I tell people I didn't care how slippery it was, I wanted (the record) to be dramatic."

Hall races a 1963 Avanti with a 304 cubic-inch Paxton blown Studebaker V-8 engine in the Production Super Charge Class. That means his car is the same basic engine it was produced with.

Hall is quick to spread the praise for his success around.

"I'm not a race car driver. I'm just a guy who loves Studebakers. It's more a team, a group effort. Over the years I've had the support of 19 guys from nine different states."

"The key to our success is the Studebaker's Driver's Club," said Hall who, joined in 1969.

Hall wrote an article for Turning Wheels, the club paper and mentioned he'd like to race a Studebaker at the salt flats and volunteers came out of the wood work.

"Its just developed as a sort of vicarious thing for people."

Hall has decided to take the 1994 season off and will return "when I gain some sanity," probably in

Now that he has reached his goal of 200 mph, the next goal is an average speed of 200 mph, which isn't an obsession for Hall.




doing just fine."

# Principals remember SMS as it turns 25

Sashabaw Middle School will be celebrating its 25th anniversary this year and its four principals — past and present — took a tour of the school to reminisce about the past 25 years.

"It's amazing to have the four of us still around in the area," Jean Lang, current principal of SMS since 1991, said.

Mel Vaara opened the school in 1969 as Sashabaw Junior High School principal. He was chairman of the committee that helped design the facilities which initially held 1000 students. It was the second junior high to be built. in Clarkston.

"It's one of our best-designed schools," Vaara said. "It was a two-year planning process. We had a lot of teacher input into the design, making the whole school functional."

Gus Birtsas, who served as assistant principal until 1972 and principal until 1987, echoed Vaara's sentiments about SMS, as it's called today.

"It was the showcase school of Oakland County," Birtsas said.

Much of the school's greatness came from the students, their parents and staff, the four principals agreed.

Dave Reschke, now an associate superintendent, was principal from 1987 to 1991. Twelve of the original staff are still working at SMS and 14 worked

there for over 20 years.

"This shows dedication," Birtsas said. "We have always had great staff, great parents and excellent and outstanding support staff."

Not much has changed physically since the doors opened in October 1969.

"With the recent bond issue, we replaced window walls, put in new bathrooms that are handicap accessible, a new computer lab and a new entrance to the building," Lang said.

And the students haven't changed much either in 25 years.

"Kids are kids," Vaara said. "They are eager to be here. We need to provide them will skills and a future for employment — saleable skills."

Reschk agreed. "We want every kid to pick something and work toward it," he said.

There are challenges to be faced, however.

"There are kids with all different needs," Lang said. "To educate them, we cannot afford to change the curriculum constantly. What we're trying to do is help our teachers to change and adapt to the changing needs of the students."

The principals agree that the students and staff are prepared to meet the challenges.

"Sashabaw gets higher standards for perfection for their kids,"Reschke said. "Kids need to be challenged and because they are, their test scores go up. With higher standards come high expectations, and the kids at Sashabaw are meeting these."


