## Legislature reconsiders garbage law

Two bills were introduced in the state legislature last week which would reduce the current 20-year requirement for landfill space, a hot topic in Oakland County.

State Rep. Tom Middleton (R., Ortonville) and State Senator Mat Dunaskiss (R., Lake Orion) have each introduced a bill into their respective chambers. The bills would change the requirement for a 20-year plan with 20 years landfill capacity to a 10-year plan with a minimum of five years capacity available at all times.

Middleton said last week he expects quick approval for the change. "We have consensus," he said. "I'm optimistic."

Both the garbage industry and activists agree the change is necessary, he added. In fact there's so much agreement, he said, "It's scary."

However the change may not come fast enough for Oakland County, which is fighting a July 31 deadline to come up with a solid-waste plan acceptable to the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. A committee just completed its draft and submitted it to the Board of Commissioners Monday.

Right now, state law requires each county to have a plan on the books showing how it will dispose of its waste for the next 20 years. The plan must be ratified by a majority of the local municipalities.

"Everything would have to click for this to get done on time," said board chairman Larry Crake (R., Waterford). "And that doesn't usually happen."

The last plan written by Oakland County was turned down by the municipalities. In the interim several lawsuits have been settled which have impacted the county's position.

One, Holly Disposal vs. DNR, imposed a series of deadlines for completing a new county plan. If the deadlines are not met, the DNR takes over the process.

Another settlement, Leoni vs. DNR, requires that the county set up a siting mechanism, regardless of the amount of landfill space currently available.

To further complicate matters, in June, 1992 the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that states may not regulate the movement of trash from state to state. That means that local officials must site enough landfill space for their own waste, as well as that from Canada, New

York, or anywhere else. Inter-county flow must also be factored into space calculations.

"With lower tipping fees and more available dumping space, Michigan has become the Midwest's favorite trash collector," Middleton said.

"The 20-year condition is much too long considering the solid-waste hauling activities undertaken by Canada and surrounding states. Reducing it would help to lessen the flow of foreign garbage, making it more feasible to formulate an accurate and responsible waste-management plan."

Last month Republican county commissioners went directly to Governor John Engler with their concerns. In a letter to the governor signed by all the Republican commissioners, vice chairperson Ruth Johnson called the change to a 10-year plan "critical to Oakland County."

"If we do not get relief, there may be three to four new landfills sited by the state in Oakland County . . . without benefit of local or county input," she said. Hearings are currently being held in Lansing on amending the solid-waste law, Act 641. Middleton said he's been attending those hearings and doesn't

feel a clear consensus emerging on other changes, such as to intercounty flow of garbage.

Meanwhile, the county commission has authorized spending \$10,000 to hire a lobbyist to help ensure the change to a 10-year plan makes it through the legislative process. Crake said Monday he hadn't decided yet whether to actually hire a lobbyist or not.

### Independence considers 'natural features' law

A public hearing will be held May 12 to discuss regulations for natural feature setbacks.

Section 5.24, a proposed addition to the zoning ordinance, will be presented to the Independence Township Planning Commission and public for their questions and comments.

The intent of the new section is to require a minimum setback from natural features, such as wetlands, in order to prevent physical harm, impairment and/or destruction of the natural feature.

The meeting will begin at 7:30 p.m. at the Independence Township Board Room, 90 North Main Street, Clarkston.

# Final fund raisers for Bay Court

Make sure you circle May 15 on your calendar with a big red marker.

That is the day of a free car wash at Clarkston Auto Wash to help fund the Bay Court Park playscape.

The May 15 fund raiser will take place 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. rain or shine at the car wash located at 6791 Dixie Highway at M-15. Pledges are being collected for each car washed on that day. Ann Conklin, Independence Township Parks and Recreation Director, said they are hoping for 1,000 cars.

"This will be our major fund raiser. We hope to raise at least \$20,000," she said.

Pledge sheets are available at the Parks and Recreation Office, 90 North Main, and at Clarkston Auto Wash. Volunteers are needed to staff the Auto Wash that day and the community is encouraged to bring their cars for a free wash.

"Bottle for Bay Court" began in April and will continue through May. Residents are encouraged to donate their returnable bottle and cans to the project by taking them to the parks and recreation office.

The parks and recreation department has been hard at work for the past year to bring a community designed, built and funded playscape to Bay Court Park located on Andersonville Road — and they're getting close. A total of \$65,000 is needed to make the dream a reality.

The playscape design, which was created by area school children, is in Conklin's office. And almost a million pennies are stacked in bags in the township offices.

Clarkston school children donated pennies at their schools for the playscape. The final total wasn't available at press time, but Conklin estimated \$10,000 was raised by the children.

"The support has been great. We have contributions coming in daily," said Conklin. "The kids have made a difference."

Individuals and organizations can purchase playground equipment and will receive their logo and/or name on a patron board at the park. Some equipment that will be at the playscape includes a wheelchair access area, a tree fort and pirate ship, mirror maze, swings, various slides, tunnels and poles, and a spooky castle with a T-Rex twisty slide.

Conklin said that she has been happy with the support from the residents.

"It's a great thing just to have a (playscape) for the kids to play on and to develop a spirit of community," she said.

The playscape will be built June 15-19 by community volunteers.

"We need lots of help that weekend," said Conklin. "We're encouraging businesses to bring groups. Child care will be provided, donations are tax deductible and appropriate receipts will be given."

People are encouraged to sign up for four hour shifts beginning at 8 a.m. You don't have to be a professional to participate; even if you've never held a hammer you're needed. Food and tools are needed to make the days productive.



## New food label separates fact from fiction

Ever wonder what the words "reduced fat" really mean?

Well, under a new national food labeling law set to go into effect May 8, that and other such dietary claims will have to meet strict guidelines.

Not only will claims have to be proven, but consumers won't have to take a calculator to the store to figure out the nutritional value of foods they buy.

The new law is backed wholeheartedly by the American Dietetic Association and the American Heart Association. Now consumers "can trust what they read," said Cinde Rutkowski, registered dietitian, of the AHA.

Ironically, for many Americans, diet problems have shifted during the 20th century from undernourishment to overnourishment. It was the poor nutrition discovered in draftees during World War II that prompted the government to establish recommended dietary allowances.

Today it's a different story. Consumers purchase a lot of prepared foods, but it hasn't been easy to figure out whether those foods met dietary guidelines.


The AHA and other health organizations recommend that consumers limit fat intake to 30 percent of their overall diets. The new label will make that easier to determine.

The new label is required to show a "Nutrition Facts" panel which includes calories, total fat, sodium, total carbohydrate and protein. It also shows a "percent daily value" that gives you a rough idea of the nutrients one average serving of food contributes

### Definitions

Until now, food makers could make claims of "lite" or "diet" on a package without specific rules for doing so. All that changes with the new law which goes into effect next week. Here are some of the new, government-defined definitions:

- Low cholesterol: 20 milligrams or less of cholesterol and two grams or less of saturated fat per serving.
- High fiber: Contains five or more grams of fiber per serving.
- Fat free: less than one-half gram of fat per serving.
- Good source: provides 10 percent or more of the daily value for the vitamin or mineral claimed.
- Reduced fat: at least 25 percent less fat than regular product.
- Reduced calorie: at least 25 percent fewer calories than regular product.
- Light or lite: one-third fewer calories or 50 percent less fat than regular product. If more than half the calorie are from fat, fat content must be reduced by 50 percent or more.

to the recommended amount for a whole day.

The "percent daily value" is based on a 2,000-calorie-a-day diet. Those eating fewer calories must factor that into the equation.

"Labels shouldn't be used to decide whether you can or can't eat a certain food," said Sara Parks, registered dietitian and president of the ADA. "Instead, the label can be used to determine how any food can fit into a healthful diet."

Several recent studies have shown that although Americans are increasingly diet conscious, they don't always practice what they know to be true.

Some cite confusion over conflicting health claims, others their own time limitations in preparing meals and figuring calories, fat, etc. Others are afraid foods that are good for them just won't taste good.

A 1993 Yankelovich poll found 76 percent said it's too confusing to know what to eat. A poll conducted last fall by the ADA and Kraft General Foods found that while 82 percent recognize the importance of nutrition, only 39 percent said they're doing all they can.

"We need to dispel the myth of 'good' and 'bad' foods," Parks said. "People need to understand that good nutrition doesn't have to be difficult. Eating a variety of foods in moderate amounts is the best way to create a balanced, healthful diet."

The new food label has been phased in by some packaged-food manufacturers over time. But some appear to be waiting for the deadline.

For example, three dry soup brands purchased over the last few months show three different kinds of labels. Campbell's Noodle Soup already shows the "Nutrition Facts" label. Lipton Single Serve Noodle Soup has the old label, which hadn't changed much since the early 1970s, according to the ADA. And Mrs. Grass Soup Mix has no nutritional labeling whatsoever, only a listing of ingredients.

The new label, on the Campbell's box, is bright and easy to read. It lists calories from fat, total fat and

saturated fat, and the "percent daily value" for each. The user knows, then, that one serving (three tablespoons of the dry mix), based on a 2,000 calorie-per-day diet, provides two percent of the daily value of fat. If you're shooting for 1,000 calories a day, double that to four percent.

For those watching their sodium, one serving is shown at 30 percent of the daily sodium intake recommended (again on a 2,000 calorie diet; for 1,000 calories, one serving provides a whopping 60 percent of your sodium limit).

By contrast, on the older label found on the Lipton box, fat is listed only in terms of grams, sodium in terms of milligrams. There's no indication of what that translates to in terms of recommended intake.

"The new food label is one of the most important educational tools we have," Parks said. "The 'Nutrition Facts' panel gives us the information we need to make wise choices when selecting foods. Eating should be healthful, as well as enjoyable."

# Parent volunteer organization to undergo changes

More than a name change will be evident when the Clarkston High School Parent Volunteer Organization becomes the Parent Teacher Student Association.

"It's a similar type organization, and yet a better organization," said Marsha Coombs, one of the organizers of the changeover. "We're adding, not eliminating."

With a PTSA installed, it gives its members more contact with other school districts and state and national organizations.

"We will have access to all types of resources such as special speakers and legislative updates from Lansing," Coombs said.

CHS Principal Brent Cooley, who also has been part of the changeover process and now is a card-carrying member of the new organization, said the PTSA is another way to further "enhance and complement" the school.

He sees the transition as a natural progression that reflects the changes in the schools.

"We outgrew the PVO and it will be absorbed into the PTA. We will be using resources that would not be available to a PVO," Cooley said. "Clarkston is one of the largest school districts in Oakland County and we must pay attention to our kids. We're always getting better. Our kids are getting smarter every year."

Whereas the PVO was more of a volunteering type organization, the PTSA will keep that part going but add even more parent involvement with teachers, administrators and students coming into the organization as well.

But what the organization stresses are the ways to benefit the children.

"PTA's are academic boosters," Combs said. To those wanting the changeover, it makes sense to get more people involved in the new organization and become part of a larger system.

"Every kid in this school system ends up here at the high school," said Blair Schweitzer, co-chair of the current PVO.

A kickoff general membership meeting is scheduled for August 11. By that time, an executive board will be appointed. The group needs to find volunteers to select for the following positions: president, vice president, bulk mailing and special activities. Also teacher and student representatives are needed.

Once officers are installed, bylaws will need to be drawn up. Many of the PTSA's bylaws will be taken from the national organization and changed to reflect Clarkston.

"The national's are in a prototype language, and we will change them to reflect the personality of our community — the uniqueness of Clarkston," Combs said.

## Community forum completes work

By the time next Monday's school-board meeting comes around, the board will have a pretty good idea of what priorities the community has for its schools.

At that meeting, the results of two weeks of work by about 60 members of the public, administration, teachers and board members will be presented. The work emerged from a "Focus on the Future" community forum held the last two Monday nights at Clarkston High School.

At this week's meeting, the participants were presented with a list of 67 concerns raised at the first meeting, April 25. The job of the second meeting was to prioritize the list.

Board president Tom Howard asked each person to pick their top 10 concerns from the list, then prioritize them. The results will be tabulated this week by Oakland Schools. The prioritized list will be presented at next week's board meeting, scheduled

for 7 p.m. at the board office.

Howard said the board is considering holding a separate meeting to discuss what existing expenditures can be deleted to make way for the new items.

One item on the list was a suggestion to seek a three-mill, three-year enhancement millage as allowed under Proposal A.

"We can't do anything on this list without that," said parent Cheryl McGinnis.






DR. SHARON DEVEREAUX greets visitors to the new school, where she will be principal.

## In Focus

### The match-up— Kammer vs. O'Neill

As a newcomer to the Clarkston area, I have no idea how voters will decide between two natives—Kerry Kammer and Megan O'Neill—for the Republican nomination for the 9th Congressional District.

Will voters look to the relative newcomer, O'Neill, because she's not a career politician, or Kammer, because of his state senate record of accomplishments?

Will women choose O'Neill on the premise that more women are needed in government? Or will they feel her inexperience is a hindrance, the better to choose Kammer, who has already learned to go toe-to-toe with the big guys?

Will Republicans say they're sure O'Neill is the genuine article, unlike Kammer, who switched parties? Or will they accept his statement that he always espoused a Republican philosophy?

The race should make for an interesting summer. The deadline for submitting nominating petitions isn't until May 10, but over lunch last week at The Clarkston Cafe, both sides said they thought there would be no latecomers to the race.

And why would anyone else bother? O'Neill beat out four men two years ago to win the Republican primary. She points out that she was outspent in that campaign but still made a strong showing and was encouraged by Republicans to give it another shot. Now, with two years of experience in campaigning behind her, she's off to an early, fast start.

In the other corner we have Kammer, whose name is known in part because it's on a law establishing a state land trust fund paid for out of revenues on gas and oil leases.

Kammer's name is also attached to a bill called the Rainy Day Fund, which has been used by Governor Engler as recently as last year to stash extra state revenues for the proverbial "rainy day."

Of course, the fate of Kammer vs. O'Neill will not be decided by Clarkston voters alone. The district they want to represent extends from Flint in the north to Pontiac in the south. It was redrawn two years ago but still voted Democratic, returning the incumbent, Dale Kildee, to office.

However, it became apparent that Kildee, of Flint, sat up and took notice of Oakland County during that race. He began visiting northern suburbs for the first time in anyone's memory. Many chalked that up to O'Neill's challenge.

Before they get to go up against Kildee, however, O'Neill and Kammer must slug it out themselves. O'Neill appears to be focusing on the primary. Kammer is targeting Kildee in his campaign material.

Ex-Wolverines help kids become victors

It was depressing. Last week, on Detroit's scruffy lower east side, I shook hands with some troubled boys who will soon become criminals... unless.

But I also shook hands with two former University of Michigan football players, Jerry Meter and Michael Wilson, who are part of that crucial unless.

Most encouraging, I shook hands with - and listened to - Robert Wollack, who, in quest of unless, gives splendid new meaning to that inspirational urging forever bellowing out of Ann Arbor: "Hail to the Victors."

Concerning inner-city boys most likely to go wrong, the statistics and expert opinions are as sadly familiar as they are persuasive. Ninety-eight percent of them have a mother only. Dad dropped his seed and moved on. Mother, who may have several fatherless children before she's 19, is on dead-end welfare for sure, and maybe drugs.

"Dysfunctional family" is the usual official description. It means the kids don't have a chance, and neither will their kids.

But wait. Whenever a boy's hopeless environment is blamed for his criminal behavior, many of us retort: "That's no excuse." We cite rare, well-worn examples of youngsters who, despite deplorable backgrounds, grew up to become bank presidents.

Such critics should welcome the philosophy of Wolverine Human Services, a private, nonprofit corporation whose founder and president is Robert Wollack. Listen:

"Wolverine takes the view that while deprivation can be a legitimate cause of antisocial behavior, it does not necessarily excuse it... To simply excuse behavior based on the past is, to us, the equivalent of hand-wringing and has clearly proven ineffective.

"Wolverine has proven children from virtually any background can become healthy, self-sufficient and compassionate adults if their antisocial behavior is confronted with a strong, systematic and caring response."

I certainly didn't see any hand-wringing while touring several Wolverine facilities, mostly in former church buildings, that provide varied residential, recreational and educational services as needed by more than 400 boys ages 8 to 17.

What I found was exceptionally clean living quarters, kept that way by the boys, and a strict system that rewards boys who abide by Wolverine's "Seven Principles to Live By" and penalizes boys who don't. Those principles, lettered on signs on almost every wall, are: Reality, Communication, Responsibility, Negotiation, Education, Love and Respect.

There is no official connection between Wolverine Human Services and U-M. But the university is where Wollack earned his master's degree and where he met such gridiron athletes as Jerry Meter, an All-Big 10 line-backer in the late '70s, and Michael Wilson, who said he was a tight end "60 pounds ago" in the early '80s.

Both Meter and Wilson, now businessmen and Wolverine trustees (along with other noted M names as Rick Leach and Harlan Huckleby), cite Wollack's talent and passion as responsible for the organization's rapid growth. In its first year, 1987, the budget was \$800,000. It's now \$13 million. Not incidentally, the National Association of Social Workers will honor Wollack at a Westin Hotel banquet May 13 for his exemplary work on behalf of youngsters.

Wolverine is mostly government-funded and, of course, there are never enough funds. Currently, Wollack is remodeling an old church into a recreation center so "the kids will have some place to go instead of the streets."

The project is \$250,000 short and a fund-raising cocktail reception is May 26 at the Grosse Pointe War Memorial. If you want to mingle with maize and blue celebrities while helping a good cause, phone 824-4400 for ticket information anytime.

The Wolverine Human Services slogan is "Helping Children to be Victors." I say hail to the valiant people, like Wollack, Meter and Wilson, who successfully provide the unless that prevents some children, not as lucky as yours and mine, from becoming what they were born to be.

Dear Mr Garwood:

I know an elderly woman who lives alone. Though she's in chronic pain, she manages with the help of her daughter, who runs a lot of errands for her (they live close to each other). However, the daughter seems overbearing, going way beyond what is necessary as if the mother can't do anything, even think for herself. (There are other relatives around who are willing and able to help and visit frequently.) The daughter is also unkind to this very kind woman. Is there anything anyone can do?

Dear Lady,

What do you mean when you say "the daughter seems overbearing?" Based on your letter, my understanding of this is that the daughter does for this

woman what she could do for herself. In other words, you believe she is eroding her self-reliance and independence. And since you believe this elderly woman to be quite capable of handling her own affairs, you are chagrined at someone attempting to inhibit an otherwise productive lifestyle.

If this is true, you should encourage the elderly woman to communicate this to her daughter. She should determine what and how much she can do and cannot do as well as what affect her chronic pain has on her mobility. Her doctor should be consulted for his/her input into these decisions.

Hopefully, the daughter will take the time to listen and respect the "elderly woman's" wishes. She may also request to "sit in" when the physician makes his/her recommendations. This woman may ask for the help of the "other relatives," thus removing her daughter from total responsibility for her

affairs and at the same time creating some distance from someone who appears too intrusive.

Regarding the unkind verbal remarks, this elderly woman needs to let her know how she feels about it with the expected outcome to be one of discontinuation. If she prevails in these remarks, you or someone close should have a talk with her, anticipating she will respond favorably to the overt pressure.

# Sheriff's station chief hangs up badge

Lt. John Taylor's ear will forever perk up when he hears the wail of a siren. But after May 13 he won't have to wonder if he should respond.

After 25 years as part of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department, Taylor has decided to take an early retirement offered by the county.

"I've been wearing a uniform all my adult life. It will be unusual to get up and not put one on," he said.

He plans on working three months a year as a park ranger for Oakland County and then relaxing for the other nine months.

"I'm going to take it easy, work part-time and spend the winter where it's warm — that's one of my main goals," he said with a laugh.

Taylor has been in charge of the Independence Township sub station since August 1993. When he began working for the OCSD Taylor tried to get assigned to District 1 (which included Independence Township) as often as possible.


"I've come full circle. I started in Independence Township many years ago and ended here. The people are nice and the officials have been pleasant to work with," he said.

Taylor's career with the OCSD has been diverse. He has served in or supervised every division in the department. The bulk of his years were spent in investigations.

One of his more memorable cases included three days and nights of living in a car while doing surveillance for a cocaine arrest. Double and triple homicides are things he remembers about his job too.

Though many would find the job of a police officer depressing, Taylor said investigations are exciting.

"The things that create a sense of depression and frustration are when little kids get hurt," he said. "Going into hundreds of thousands of family fights and seeing the kids crying. Those are the cases I hated."

Taylor has had a distinguished career, receiving 11 citations. He was named Officer of the Year in 1978.

He has special training in areas from narcotics to internal investigations. He is a 1989 graduate of the F.B.I. Academy, has been trained in Washington D.C. in dignitary protection, and has had training in criminal and homicide investigations.

"It's 25 years of feeling you've contributed. I think I contributed to Oakland County. I've made it a little better place to live," he said.

The veteran had some advice for novice police officers and those thinking about going into the field.

"As long as they give 100 percent and do their best, they'll succeed in this job," he said. "Our job is

When his retirement begins May 14 Taylor said he will miss the people he works with the most.


"I've worked with some of the finest people I ever met in my life. But I guess when they're out in rush hour trying to get to work I won't miss this too much."

# Training Leader Dog puppy fun for area couple

When Hans and Karen Brueggeman saw a notice at their church for families to raise Leader Dog puppies, they knew the program was for them.

"It's something we've elected to do and Hans feels strongly about it because his dad did too," said Karen.

Hans' father was a member of the Lion's Club which helps to sponsor the Leader Dogs for the Blind program out of Rochester. Karen said the memorials from Mr. Brueggeman's funeral five years ago went to provide a blind person with a leader dog.

Leader Dogs for the Blind is a nonprofit organization that was begun in 1939 by the Lions Club. It has grown into the largest dog guide training facility in the world with over 8,000 graduates.

Up to 32 blind students come to the facility at a time to train with their new dogs. The cost for the training in 1990 was \$9,500 with no cost to the blind student since all funding is from donations.

About a month ago the Brueggemans brought Wyatt, a Labrador Retriever, into their Independence Township home. They've adopted the puppy for one year to train him and socialize him before he goes to formal training school.

Part of socialization is going out in public. "He can't think everyone is there to see him," Karen said with a laugh.

Wyatt has gone along to various stores and restaurants and is adapting well.

"He's calm. He doesn't think J&J (Food Store) is a big buffet yet," said Karen. "I want to thank all the businesses who have cooperated. Overall everybody has been really good about (Wyatt's presence)."

Wyatt goes to obedience school once a week where he is learning basic commands. Karen works with him at home throughout the week. As a part-time

worker at the Clarkston Animal Center, most of the training responsibility has been turned over to her. "I didn't know what to expect, but it's turned into a neat hobby," she said.

She does realize that at the end of one year Wyatt may leave their home for another master. "It's a good cause. I'll accept it (if he is chosen). If he's rejected we get another dog."

Karen said Hans, a mechanical engineer in Flint, may have a harder time letting the dog go.

"I've gone into it at a distance knowing he'll go. It will be harder on Hans. I'm the one who works with him. Hans comes home and plays with him," she said.

Wyatt is learning to sit, stay and heel along with being calm in public and in the car. He will be tested when he is 15 months old and then the school will determine if he can become a Leader Dog.

His life isn't all work though. The Brueggemans have another dog and two cats for Wyatt to play with.

"At home they play non-stop, but whenever we put on the training collar, he is working," said Karen.

If you see Karen, Hans and Wyatt out around town remember he is working. Ask permission before you pet him, and don't feed him. Wyatt is learning to eat only from his dish so he won't embarrass his new master at a restaurant.



Someone told me that I've become the worst kind of ex-smoker. I've been told I'm now a reformer.

I want the whole world to stop smoking now. Nobody can give me a good reason why they can't stop this instant. If they don't know how, I can give them all sorts of helpful hints.

Now I know I used many excuses myself over the years not to quit.

Not today, I'm too stressed. Not today, it's raining outside. Not today, I still have three packs left in the carton.

But before you know it, everyday becomes a reason to smoke. The smallest thing can become a reason to light up first thing in the morning with that cup of java.

I've heard many of the Clarkston Chillers are considering quitting May 1 — the day the price of a pack will go up because of the increase of state and federal taxes.

One Chiller already joined my husband and I in kicking the habit. He started on the patch a week after we did.

It's my hope that these other Chillers will really do it — really put on a patch, get hypnotized or quit cold turkey. Do whatever it takes and quit puffing.

One Chiller said to me last week, "Wouldn't it be great that we could all be together and not one of us smoked."

Yes, it would be wonderful.

I've found it hard sometimes to be the same person I was when I smoked.

Socially I don't feel quite the same without the

cigarette in hand. It was the time when I smoked the most.

Being in those situations triggers, not an uncontrollable urge to rip off the patch and light one up, but an urge none the less that has to be dealt with.

Hopefully I've taken care of how to deal with the urge. I've changed the amount I would drink and what I drink. Now I go to coffee much sooner and we leave much earlier.

I work out three days a week at a gym. I've started to run. The exercise helps me with those psychological urges I still have despite the nicotine dripping through me by way of the patch I have on my arm.

It will not be easy for the Clarkston Chillers. Despite the tobacco companies saying that we are not addicts and we could all quit since the feeling we get from smoking is like drinking a cup of coffee in the morning or eating an after-dinner dessert.

Ha, I say. Those cigarette companies don't know squat about addiction. They should try and listen to the people who want to quit, but can't get beyond the reasons.

What they should hear are addicts not able to give up their daily fix and that smoking no longer is a choice but a desperate physical and psychological need. Plain and simple.

What's not plain and simple is the ability to quit.

No matter what you have going in your life, you can always find a reason not to quit.

The stress . . . you can learn how to deal with it other than lighting up.

The weight . . . you can learn not to pig out when the urge to smoke overwhelms you. You can start an exercise program. You can walk everyday. That's what my sister-in-law did. She quit five years ago and has never started back up again. I admire her and she has become a hero of mine. She did it. She walked. She crunched carrots, celery. She chewed gum.

What she never did is go back.

So you Clarkston Chillers out there and anybody else thinking about quitting — just do it.

Save some money and save your life.

Get ready for a battle but do it.


# Solar eclipse will darken skies May 10

The Detroit area is near the center of the path of an annular solar eclipse which will occur on Tuesday, May 10.

According to the Detroit Science Center, area residents can expect to see about 95 percent of the sun disappear. The result will be a thin, fiery ring surrounding the moon, suspended eerily in the darkened sky.

An annular eclipse is different from a total eclipse. In a total eclipse, the moon totally hides the sun. In an annular eclipse, the moon is farther away

and will appear slightly smaller than the sun. As a result, like a penny peaking out from under a dime, a thin ring, or annulus, along the sun's outer edge will show around the dark silhouette of the moon.

The sun will be eclipsed for over five minutes, with the maximum eclipse occurring at 1:12 p.m. The path of the eclipse is about 150 miles wide and will stretch diagonally across North America, starting in Baja, California and including El Paso, St. Louis and Toronto. The rest of North America will see it as a partial solar eclipse.

A solar eclipse occurs when the moon passes between the sun and earth, casting its shadow on the earth while the three bodies are in a nearly straight line.

The moon's distance from the earth varies. When it is closest to earth, its shadow appears larger than the sun and eclipse is total. When it is farthest away, the shadow appears smaller than the sun and the eclipse is called annular, or ring-shaped.

The Detroit Science Center will offer a program on solar eclipses at noon on May 10, followed by observation of the real thing.

However, if you plan to view the eclipse on your own, remember to protect your eyes.

The American Academy of Ophthalmology warns that if you view the eclipse directly you risk losing your vision.

"Many people use sunglasses or other filtering devices to view the eclipse and think they're protected," said Wayne Fung, M.D. of the AAO.

"Commercial sunglasses are not safe for looking at the sun, even if they claim to filter out all the ultraviolet light. People forget about the infrared light." Infrared is the cause of potentially blinding eye damage.

The AAO advises against directly viewing the eclipse—period. Welders goggles, smoke-colored glasses, neutral density filters—all are considered unsafe.

To view the eclipse indirectly, the AAO has two suggestions. Check with local TV stations to see if the eclipse will be broadcast. Or check with local science centers to see if they plan safe viewing with special equipment.

The next such eclipse visible in the U.S. won't be until the year 2017.



## 12th SCAMP home tour June 4-5

A neoclassical mansion, two Greek Revival homes and two new houses that look old will highlight the 12th annual SCAMP Clarkston home tour June 4-5.

The popular tour benefits Clarkston SCAMP, a five-week summer program for children with special needs.

Tickets are \$50 for the Saturday preview, which includes a champagne reception at an old church on Main St. and an auction. Sunday tickets are \$20, and include lunch at the Clarkston Cafe for the first 400 guests.

SCAMP has worked hard to find new and interesting homes and gardens for this year's tour, said Bunny Newmarch, executive coordinator.

"We just try to get every year a variety; a couple historic homes and things that are architecturally interesting," she said. "The last couple of years we did a lot of groundwork in selecting homes . . . This year everything fell into place quite quickly."

When the tour was created 12 years ago, organizers hoped they might get five years out of it without running out of interesting houses. The boom in Clarkston real estate may have helped, if this year's tour is any indication. There are more new homes than old on the tour.

"We're into our 12th year so we're looking for it to keep on going," Newmarch said. The tour is SCAMP's largest fund raiser, annually drawing 400-500 visitors.

"It has really worked very well. We reached a point where the crowds got larger than the limit of the cafe," Newmarch said. That's why lunches are now limited.

Tour-goers should meet at Washington and Main streets in downtown Clarkston to begin the tour. Some of the homes are close enough for walking. Shuttle buses will be available to each location on the tour.

"We're excited; it really has worked," Newmarch said. "Over 12 years we really have learned a lot."

Here's a preview of this year's homes:

### **The Berg home**

Cindy and Mel Berg had their previous home on the SCAMP tour. Their new location, on Hillside, should knock tour-goers out.

The Bergs purchased a one-acre lot on Deer Lake and tore down an old cottage. In its place they've designed and built a three-story, 7,800-square-foot neoclassical mansion.

With lots of windows, the home has entrances onto the lake on each level. All three floors are





decorated in off-white and have huge columns. A free-standing central staircase fills the entryway.

The home includes eight fireplaces, most surrounded by antique mantles.

### **The Basingers**

The East Washington Street home of Sue and Bill Basinger, known as the Yeager house, was built in 1842 but has been added on to over the years.

Its dining room features one of only five domed ceilings known to exist in Clarkston.

The Yeager for whom the house is named was a blacksmith, and the Basingers have found remnants of that past around the site.

The Basingers have extensively remodeled the home, taking care to retain its roots whenever possible. Sue Basinger is an interior designer and a member of the Historical District Committee. 
The exact date of the home's construction is unknown, but is estimated to be between 1832 and 1872. The property once belonged to Clarkston's founders, the Clarks.



# Bagels are hot at new shop

A steaming hot cauldron of water is the first thing you notice when you enter the kitchen of California Bagel, a new business which opened last week in the Waterfall Plaza.

## What's new in business

The water bath is an integral part of what makes a bagel a bagel, according to owner Robert Zucker. Without boiling before baking, they'd be just—well—bread.

Zucker, who spent 12 years working for New York Bagel, decided to branch out on his own.

The process for making a bagel is this: batches of dough equivalent to 200 dozen bagels are mixed up on huge mixers. Then the soft dough is forced through a form which shapes it, and allowed to rise.

When ready for cooking, the bagels are first dunked in the boiling water for two minutes. "It gives it a shiny coat and makes it rise," Zucker said.

Then they're removed from the water and placed on boards to drain. Next, boards and bagels go into the huge oven for two minutes to dry.

The bagels are then flipped off the boards onto special stones inside the 500-degree oven, where they will finish baking in about 15 minutes. Then they're taken, still hot, directly into the sales area.

In addition to the bagels, Zucker offers flavored cream cheeses he makes up himself, as well as coffee in a variety of flavors.

California Bagel is the first of what Zucker hopes will be a chain of stores. Hours are 6 a.m.-6 p.m., seven days a week.

# Area Marine saves lives during training

A Clarkston native who is now in the U.S. Marines has been recommended for the highest peacetime honor the service awards.

Sgt. Ronald Olsen has been recommended for the Navy and Marine Corps Medal, a lifesaving medal, for his actions in saving his fellow Marines from a fire.

A corporal at the time, Olsen was at a drill weekend conducting cold weather training in Worcester, Mass., where he is stationed. The company had set up 10-man arctic tents and lit stoves because the temperature was below zero and dropping.

According to a summary of the day's events, Olsen was inside his tent when he heard someone cry "fire." He emerged to find another tent in flames.

"Corporal Olsen grabbed a machete from another Marine and without regard to his personal safety moved to the tent and sliced an emergency exit," the summary says. "Smoke and Marines spilled from the tent. Due to strong winds, the tent continued to burn out of control. Corporal Olsen aided a severely burned Marine."

When everyone was safe, Olsen and two others extinguished the fire.

"Due to the heroic actions of Corporal Olsen, loss of life was prevented," the summary continues.

Olsen, visiting Clarkston last week, said the incident was basically "business as usual" and he wasn't recommended for the award until recently, two years after it happened. That was when a new adjutant came on board, heard about it, and made the recommendation.

Right now the recommendation is at the regimental level. It must work its way up the chain of command to the Secretary of the Navy, which could take up to a year.

Though he's hoping to receive the honor, Olsen said, "It was no big deal. To me it was something that had to be done."

A 1985 Clarkston High School graduate, Olsen first entered the Air Force in 1985, then switched to the Marines in 1986. He recently re-enlisted for another four years, and hopes to make a career of it.

He is the son of Rosemary Grable and Dale Grable, both of Clarkston. He and his wife Lisa have a son, Kameron, 2. Lisa is the daughter of Cliff and Linda Irwin, also of Clarkston.

Olsen is stationed with the 25th Marine regiment in Worcester as an administrator and cold-weather infantry instructor. He hopes to eventually be selected to attend drill instructor school.

For now, however, he has been reassigned to Okinawa for one year. Lisa and Kameron will be returning to Clarkston during that tour of duty, since they are not allowed to go with him.





## Gypsy moths are back

It's that time of year to destroy the buff-colored gypsy moth egg masses before they hatch in May.

Each egg mass contains from 50 to 1,500 eggs and may be carefully scraped off into a can. The masses must then be soaked in soapy water, burned or buried.

Protected areas are very susceptible to the masses. Look in places like loose flaps of bark, boards nailed to trees, woodpiles, the undersides of branches, decks, the outside of your home and garage and in light fixtures.

Spraying the area with cold water may kill caterpillars up to an inch long. Sticky bands can be bought and used once the caterpillars are over one inch long.





April 25, 1994

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Catalo at 7:40 p.m. followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

Roll: Present: Arkwright, Basinger, Catalo, Roeser, Sanderson, Schultz, Secatch.

Moved by Arkwright, supported by Schultz, "That the minutes of the meeting held April 11, 1994 be accepted with the following corrections: the date should be 1994 not 1992 and the water survey was discussed with Lois Graham of MDPH not sent to her." Motion carried.

Moved by Sanderson, supported by Secatch, "That the agenda be approved with the following changes: remove Manager's concerns and add Liquor License Transfer and Independence Township Sewer bill." Motion carried.

Arkwright indicated that the costs of the police dispatch service is a maximum of \$2,500 annually.

Pappas indicated that we still owe the Tri Party Fund \$4,320 for work done in 1986. The decision was made not to pay this bill until we are certain that the drainage problem on West Washington, that was created as a result of the work done on Holcomb, has been adequately corrected. This issue will be readdressed at the next meeting.

Arkwright will contact Chief DeVore about where he wants the Truck Ordinance signs posted. Bob Pursley will get the signs posted.

Roeser and Ryan are working on the Wet Lands Ordinance. The ordinance will be reviewed by Huble, Roth and Clark to see if any adjustments are needed. Roeser indicated that the Wet Lands Review Board will be reconvened to discuss the issue on Middle Lake.

Pappas will check with the Historic District Commission to see if the Historic District Ordinance needs to be referred to Attorney Ryan.

Pappas presented the proposed water survey and the council suggested a few changes in the language and one additional question. The survey will be sent out next month with the sewer bill.

Resolved by Arkwright, supported by Roeser, "That the Radio contract with Oakland County be accepted and that Chief DeVore sign the contract on behalf of the City. This is an annual contract." Roll: Yeas-7, Nays-0. Resolution passed.

Moved by Schultz, supported by Secatch, "That the American Legion Post 63 and the American Legion Auxiliary Unit 63 be granted permission to sell the red paper poppy in the Village of Clarkston on May 13, 14, and 15. The contributions benefit war veterans and their families." Motion carried.

The decision was made not to participate in the Township's Clean-up Day. The Township had proposed that the Village pay \$1,000 to participate plus a fee for dumping for each resident that choose to participate.

The Council decided not to join the Clarkston Chamber of Commerce.

A joint meeting with the Township has been scheduled for May 10, 1994 at 5:30 p.m. at the Township Hall to again discuss the division of assets. Arkwright indicated that this has already been negotiated and an agreement reached prior to Mr. Stuart's becoming the supervisor. He does not feel there should be a renegotiation. There was concurrence among other members of the Council.

A budget meeting will be held on Monday, May 2, 1994 at 6:30 p.m. at the Basinger home. The finance committee, Basinger, Roeser and Catalo will attend.

Pappas provided the Council with an explanation of the Street Budget.

Arkwright indicated that since we had already allocated funding, from previous years CDBG funds, for sidewalk cuts at the corner of Washington and Holcomb that this should be done. Pappas will check into this.

Pappas will contact the Liquor Control Commission to determine what a local municipality should look into prior to granting a Liquor License Transfer.

Moved by Sanderson, supported by Secatch, "That the Liquor License Transfer be tabled until the next meeting." Yeas-6, Nays-0, Abstain-Catalo. Motion carried.

Pappas indicated that he had received a sewer maintenance bill from Independence Township for \$2,391.92. It indicated the reason for the bill was that behind the downtown restaurants the sewer line was clogged with grease. Pappas will look into having the Plumbing Inspector address this issue with the businesses involved.

Resolved by Roeser, supported by Basinger, "That the sewer bill for \$2,391.92 be paid to Independence Township from the sewer maintenance fund." Roll: Yeas-7, Nays-0. Resolution passed.

Resolved by Sanderson, supported by Secatch, "That the meeting be closed to discuss pending litigation." Roll: Yeas-7, Nays-0. Resolution passed.

The Council went into closed session at 9:15 p.m. Moved by Roeser, supported by Arkwright, "That the Council go back into open session." Motion carried.

The Council went back into open session at 9:30 p.m. Moved by Roeser, supported by Basinger, "That the meeting be adjourned." Motion carried.


