



Despite loss, Richardson says players are winners

Physical size won out Nov. 4 as the Clarkston football team lost to Monroe 20-6 in the first round playoffs.

Taking advantage of a huge size difference, Monroe bruised its way to 280 yards, while its defense kept Clarkston's passing game in check.

And while physical size won the game, CHS football coach Kurt Richardson knows the size of his team's heart can't be matched. Returning only two starters, not many expected the Wolves to go 7-3 this season and make the state playoffs for the second

year in a row. But the team believed — worked hard in the off-season — and each week got better.

"It was a big success for us," said Richardson. "No one gave us a chance this season. People said, 'you'll only finish 4-5,' but these kids just ignored all that stuff and went out and played hard."

Another reason the Wolves were successful, and Richardson enjoyed this season as much as any in his nine years, was due to the players' conduct on and off the field.

"There's really something to be said for these

kids. I never once had a problem with them on or off the field. They never complained. They are just good, solid kids and to me that's equally as important as what they do on the field."

In fact, of the team's 23 starters only six players have grade point averages below 3.0, and 17 of those players had a GPA of 3.4 or higher.

Because of the effort his team gave every week, Richardson said he was most disappointed that so few fans came out to Monroe to support the players.

"These kids played their butts off against Monroe, and all season," he said. "I wasn't disappointed in them at all but I think the disappointing thing was that we had hardly any fans there. To not have that support wasn't fair to the kids. They deserved better."

Richardson said he understands it was a cold day and the players aren't supposed to notice how many people come to a game but, "you do notice those things."

Monroe ate up about five minutes of the first quarter on its first drive, but punted to the Wolves with 7:30 left in the first.

Clarkston then drove 65 yards for the first touchdown of the contest. With some pinpoint passing from sophomore quarterback Dane Fife and strong running from sophomores Jeff Long and Brad Phalen and senior Ryan Schapman, Long capped the drive with a two-yard TD run. CHS missed the extra point but led 6-0 with 3:30 left in the first.

From that point on, Monroe, 9-1 on the season,

Top squad Girls CC squad runs its best at the Class A finals and takes 4th place

The best, they say, rise to the occasion when needed most. Clarkston's girls cross country team did just that at the Class A team finals Nov. 4, held at Saskatoon Golf Course near Grand Rapids.

Behind several personal-record performances, the team finished fourth overall, the best finish in Clarkston history. Heading into the meet, the Wolves expected to do well. When it came down to it, they did even better by beating five teams they lost to in earlier meets this season.

Leading the Wolves was senior Stefanie Burklow. She was fourth in the race in a time of 19:01, nearly equaling her school record of 19:00 set weeks earlier on a much faster course. Her 4th-place finish was also the best state finals finish in school history.

But on this day when the team did so well, Burklow's teammates came through with solid performances as well. Sophomore Liz Cook (22nd), junior Kristin Maine (26th), senior Lisa Herron (75th) and senior Stacie Iezzi (107th) all ran personal record times.

Co-coach Mike Taylor said this team's focus in season was to get better each meet and not worry too much about early season finishes. The team's main goal was to qualify for the state meet and then see what would happen in the finals.

"Our program was geared to regionals and states and we were our best then," he said.

"We defeated all the teams we thought we could and beat several teams which had beaten us earlier in the year," said Taylor. "This is not a revenge factor but it is a way of judging your improvement as a team. I felt we did a good job of improving the entire season. We never got too discouraged, never became overconfident. Just a lot of working as hard and as smart as we could."

"The team peaked at just the right time."

Peaking at the right time isn't just a coincidence, however. Taylor and fellow co-coach Mike Kaul have always coached their teams so they would peak during the latter part of the season.

They do that by not burning the kids out by pushing them to their limits in early-season meets.

Winning the state meet was defending champion Troy Athens with 102 points. In second was Livonia Stevenson with 113 points, third was Utica Stevenson with 126 points, fourth was CHS with 230 and fifth was Farmington with 257.

After winning districts a week before, the Wolves had already surprised some people, but not themselves. They struggled through a tough Oakland Activities Association Division I schedule. But despite the losses, Fitzgerald said he never had a problem with the team's work ethic.

It was that work ethic which helped carry them to the team's first district title in three years.

Brighton began the game, played on a muddy, wet field at Walled Lake Central, like they owned the place, missing a few good shots on goal in the game's first five minutes.

But at the 34 minute mark, senior co-captain Derrick Spires took a good shot on goal that was saved by the Brighton keeper.

Then, at the 32 minute mark, senior Adam Gilreath came close to getting an easy goal as the Brighton keeper barely scooped up the ball before Gilreath got there. Next, sophomore Brian McGeogh took a good shot on goal that was stopped 28 minutes into the game.

From then on, Brighton knew they were in for a battle.

Turnovers lead to BB defeat

The magic number this time was 26. Turnovers, that is.

The Clarkston girls basketball team, 12-6 overall, lost 39-37 to 5-13 Troy Nov. 2, no thanks to an unusually high number of turnovers. Coach Larry Mahrle has said all season that when his team commits that many turnovers, winning becomes difficult.

In two other Wolves' losses this season, turnovers also did them in. In an Oct. 12 game against Waterford Kettering, Clarkston committed 26 turnovers and lost 49-33. In a 26-24 loss to Bloomfield Hills Lahser Sept. 19, CHS had 21 turnovers.

The Wolves average only 15 turnovers a game. Because the Wolves aren't an offensive powerhouse, each possession is crucial. And in close games, like the one with Troy, taking care of the ball is even more critical, according to Mahrle.

"We were up early 4-2 but then we had seven turnovers in the first quarter and that set the tone for the game," said Mahrle.

Despite struggling, Clarkston was down only two points at halftime and five points after the third quarter. Continued mistakes and missed fast break opportunities kept CHS behind and gave Troy hope.

"When you play a team like that and you give them the opportunity to win, they really come at you," he said. "But we just didn't play well."

Senior Nickie Winn led CHS with 13 points and eight rebounds, and sophomore Jennifer Bauer hit two crucial three-pointers in the fourth quarter to keep Clarkston in the game.

Troy made a shot with six seconds left in the game to seal the victory.

Despite the loss, Mahrle said his team knows

what they did wrong and will be ready to battle Royal Oak Kimball and Waterford Kettering this week.

"These kids are always able to bounce back," he said.

Clarkston is 3-5 in the Oakland Activities Association Division I.

Ready for districts

The Wolves girls hoops team begins district tournament play Nov. 15 at Holly High School.

CHS drew a bye in the first round and plays the winner of the Nov. 13 Lapeer West/Holly game at 7:30 p.m., Nov. 15. The winner of that game plays for the championship game Nov. 17, 7 p.m.

The other district matchups are Lapeer East vs. Lake Orion, Nov. 13 at 6 p.m. The winner of that game plays Romeo Nov. 15 at 6 p.m.

The Holly District winner plays in regionals at Lapeer East Nov. 20-22, against the Rochester Adams District winner.

While Clarkston's district draw is a good one, some teams in the tournament could be tough opponents. Lapeer East, 18-1, was rated in the top 10 in Class A for most of the season, until a late-season loss to Oxford.

Lapeer West is 10-8 overall, Lake Orion is 10-8 overall and Holly is 6-11 overall.

The Wolves, 12-6, do have one advantage. They play in the tough OAA Division I, where no game is an easy one. That's unlike the competition the other teams face, especially East's, West's and Holly's Flint Metro League.

Last year, the Wolves beat West 36-32 in the first round of districts but lost to East 55-45 in the second round.



controlled the game with its strong running attack and huge offensive line, led by 240-pound fullback Jovan Johnson and University of Michigan-bound lineman Eric Wilson at 6-foot-4, 265 pounds.

The Monroe line has five players over 220 pounds. Clarkston's biggest lineman weighs 225 pounds while the smallest weighs 155.

Monroe scored in the second quarter and then scored two more touchdowns in the fourth, wearing out the Wolves defense and keeping the offense off the field.

Although senior receiver Tim Wasilk ended up with six catches for 75 yards, he wasn't able to get the ball deep because Fife was pressured the entire game. Fife ended up 8-of-23 and threw three interceptions.

"We just had trouble blocking them and the few times Dane did get a pass off, he never saw the pass because he was knocked on his butt," said Richardson.

Richardson said he's looking forward to next year already and is grateful for the solid group of 18 seniors he had this season.

"They knew what the seniors did last year and they wanted to continue that," he said. "They weren't real vocal but led by example. When they were freshmen they didn't win a game at Clarkston Middle School and Sashabaw won only three, so when you look at what they've gone through, it's quite an accomplishment."

He said the leadership and dedication to the team shown by players like Rich Warchuck, Tim Wisser, Wasilk, Schapman, Jeff Bemis, Joe DeGain, Bill Goforth, Joe Roy, etc. will only strengthen a budding tradition at CHS.

"All the seniors had the attitude that they'd do anything to help," said Richardson.


"I think we're getting that consistency in our program now with coaches and with the freshman and eighth-grade teams. You're going to start seeing a tradition of making the playoffs."





* **Sophomore Emily Hogan:** She wasn't sharp at regionals but ran well in the state meet, finishing 130th in 21:28.

The Clarkston girls team came in second and placed four runners in the top 20, while the boys team

placed 6th, placing two runners in the top 20.

Sophomore Liz Cook won her first race with a time of 20:32. Freshman Lissa Lukens was 9th in 21:37, sophomore Emily Hogan was 13th in 21:56 and freshman Jennifer Gifford was 17th in 22:12.

For the boys, sophomore Curt Brewer was 16th in 18:29 and sophomore Aaron Sailor was 18th in 18:31.

The girls team scored 80 points while winner Novi had 72. The boys team winner was Lakeland with 22 points, followed by Novi with 102, Rochester with 118, Farmington with 119, Ann Arbor Huron with 120 and Clarkston with 129.

The top 25 individuals received medals and the top three teams earned medals and a trophy.



Freshman Football

The freshman football team closed out their season last week, finishing with an impressive 6-3 record. They played excellent football all season long, and only lost three tough league games.

They started out the year against Troy, and were defeated 14-6. However, they came back to win five games in a row, by an average of 25 points. They defeated Birmingham Groves 48-6, West Bloomfield 35-8, Troy Athens 12-0, Rochester 29-24, and St. Clair Shores-South Lake 47-8.

The Wolves came out flat in their next game, losing to Rochester Adams 10-0. But they came storming back against Birmingham Seaholm with a commanding 20-0 shutout victory. Then, in the last game of the season with Lake Orion, they lost 6-0, when Lake Orion scored on the final play of the game.

Offensively, the Wolves could score, averaging 22 points a game. Eric Jenks completed 46 percent of his passes, and threw for 717 yards and six touchdowns. Tim Loveless rushed for 755 yards, and eight touchdowns. Ronnie Wells, Nate Jerdon, Andy Stutzman and Brent Deuel all rushed for over 100 yards. Loveless was voted the Offensive MVP for the year. Offensive guard Dave Smith was voted the team's most valuable lineman.

Mark Whiteman was the leading receiver for the Wolves, catching 17 passes for 312 yards and two touchdowns. Loveless and Steve Bradford both had over 100 yards receiving.

Defensively, the Wolves were tough all season. They only allowed an average of eight points a game, and recorded two shutouts. Linebacker Bradford, who was voted the defensive MVP, was the leading tackler with 55 solo tackles, and 41 assists. Safety Matt Baker also played outstanding defense, making 39 solo tackles. Smith, Loveless, and Whiteman all had over 30 solo tackles.

Jenks consistently came up with big plays for the defense. He recovered three fumbles and returned two interceptions for touchdowns. Loveless picked off three passes, returning two of them for scores. He and Jeff Oliver both had three sacks.

Punter Nick Holland punted 14 times for a 28.2 yard average, and kicker Adam Myers kicked off 35 times for a 29.7 yard average. He also converted nine extra point attempts. Deuel returned three kicks for a 40.3 yard average, including a touchdown Deuel was

voted the team's most improved player.

"We really had a good season," said Jenks. "I wish the season wasn't over," added Deuel.

Although Coach Dave Whitehead was very pleased with the season, he still thought they could have won a few more games. "We were better than 6-3, but we kind of beat ourselves in a few of the games," he said. "All three of our losses were really close to tough league opponents. But the team will use this year as a learning experience for the future. There have been times when I was glad that the season was over, but not this year. The team had a great attitude, and this was the most fun season I have ever coached."

When asked about the role of the freshman football team as a part of Clarkston football, Whitehead described it as one of the beginning steps. "It is the first time that the kids get to see what Clarkston football is all about," he said. "We run the same playbook as the varsity, and the kids develop good football habits, so that they can be successful as juniors and seniors on the varsity."

The freshman football team had an outstanding season. Whether they were winning or losing, they always played hard, and gave it all they had. Hopefully, they will continue to experience as much success as members of the JV and varsity squads in the future.

The return of the spirit

For those who have lost loved ones, Holiday Help brings the joy of Christmas back

For most of us, the holidays are happy and looked forward to with great anticipation.

Favorite cookies are baked, stockings are hung and cherished decorations come out of the attic. Faces are aglow, bright with love and cheer, as old tales are told again of Christmases past and enhanced by the warm, soft glow of the fireplace and eggnog. The same music is put on — even the recording with all the skips in it — as the tree, which was chopped down only hours ago is raised and decked with the school pictures framed in rickrack and other homemade ornaments that say "I love you."

But, when a loved one dies, all that changes. The holiday season can become a time of dread, not joy, says Clarkston resident Kathy Garwood, aftercare coordinator for Donelson, Johns and Evans Funeral Home in Waterford.

"People remember what a joyful time this has been in the past," Garwood says. "They experience other people around them, the music, the wrapping of packages, addressing the Christmas cards." Because the loved one is gone, a person finds it hard to celebrate and may even resent those who are able to, she adds.

"Some tell me, 'I wish I could go to bed and wake up January 2.'"

For the past two years, the funeral home has offered an evening of "Holiday Help" to assist those who have experienced the death of a family member or close friend. A two-hour seminar will be held Nov. 19 from 7 to 9 p.m. at Central United Methodist Church in Waterford. The seminar will include a slide presentation and speaker Dr. Lee Drake from Accord Aftercare Services, the national grief counseling and information organization that developed Holiday Help. The evening will conclude with a candlelighting ceremony to memorialize the loved one.

Waterford resident Lester Highlen was one of those who benefited from Holiday Help last year. After losing his wife suddenly two years ago, he knew his

first Christmas without her would be rough, but somehow he managed to get through it.

"She laid for for a nap — that's all. I guess you don't ever expect it even if it's imminent," said Highlen, 77. "In the evenings you hate to come home. I think probably I did stay away a little more. I stayed overnight sometimes with my daughter ... just lonesome."

Though spending time in one of Garwood's grief support groups helped, the second Christmas he anticipated spending without his wife was even more difficult. That's when Holiday Help came into the picture.

Garwood says Highlen's feelings are experienced by most people who are nearing the second holiday season without their loved one. Usually the first year is easier because the shock hasn't worn off.

"You prepare yourself for that," Garwood says. "Especially if you've had it (the loss) happen within a month or two. The body's numb. It's protecting you until the reality of the death is made clear to you. Shock is a wonderful thing. Without it we couldn't survive."

But, usually by the beginning of the next holiday season, reality hits. The loved one will never return and sometimes that realization occurs with a jolt and overwhelming sadness.

"You plan. But even going to the grocery store you can come across some food they liked. Or you hear a song on the radio ... I use any analogy — like someone hitting you on the back of your knees,"

Comments from those who attended last year's Holiday Help:

"This holiday is difficult for me. My mother died Sept. 1993. The last holiday was a blur. This one is real and painful. I appreciate the program. It helps me to accept the way my life is right now."

"I think this was a wonderful program. It helped to know you are not alone. Please put many of these programs on through the years to come."

"I didn't know I was still grieving, but being here tonight let me see I am. You helped me to realize that I need to deal with it. Thank you."

"Most helpful to understand how deep grief can be and the manner to deal with the process, to finally achieve change and understanding."

"This program created much peace within me."

Garwood says.

It's important to deal with that grief, which has sometimes not yet been resolved, and to allow yourself to move forward, Garwood says.

"This program gives them permission not to do only the things they have done. You can change the traditions. You don't have to bake all the cookies ... You shouldn't be expected to. You can do something different this year."

Going through the double processes of grieving — and renewing oneself — can bring the spirit of the holidays back, Garwood says. Then you will not feel you have to "pull into a cocoon" to escape "the music or see the Salvation Army people ringing bells."

For Highlen, it's a time to be joyful again. He and his new wife Ruth, whom he met at Garwood's support group, are starting their own traditions. He says he never could have done it without Garwood and Holiday Help.

"The old saying, 'Time heals all wounds' just isn't true," Garwood says. "If you don't go through the grieving process you internalize those feelings and they can manifest themselves physically and emotionally."

"It (Holiday Help) really impressed me," Highlen says. "At the end they turn down the lights for the candlelighting ceremony. There was music in the background ... In a way it was sad and in a way it was comforting."

"You learn you're not alone."

Highlen stops to reflect — perhaps on the memories of past Christmases — and a small smile plays upon his lips.

"It still hurts a little bit — but you will survive."

North Sash principal endures 'sweet' success

After topping their Morley candy sales from last year, North Sashabaw students "topped" their principal too.

Principal George White agreed to become a "human sundae" if 75 percent of the school's students participated in the annual Morley Candy sales fundraiser this year.

Last year's sales totaled a little over \$30,000. Splitting the profit with Morley's, North Sash made \$15,000, but all the candy was spoiled because the refrigeration system in the delivery truck broke down. Morley's insurance covered the damage and awarded the school another \$15,000, so they actually received double the profit.

The earnings were used to repair damaged playground equipment, fund the DARE program, pay for student assemblies, buy computers for classrooms — and purchase a spectacular blue-and-white playscape that now sits in North Sashabaw's playground.

"(Morley Candy) paid for the playscape, literally. They're standing behind their project," said Cheryl McGinnis, member of North Sash's PTO (Parent-Teacher Organization) which sponsors the sales project each year.

This year's candy sale tripled last year's — a staggering \$43,000 was made with 78 percent of the students involved. PTO president Terri Bendes said Morley's gave them the human sundae idea as a sales incentive and White agreed to get involved if only 75 percent of the school participated.

"We all said, 'Go for it,'" Bendes said.

Last Friday was "S" day for White. The event took place in the school's cafeteria/gym where White sat good-naturedly on stage in a kiddie swimming pool with a plastic rain parka covering his head and clothes. Several of the top-selling students poured gallons of sundae toppings, marshmallow creme and maraschino cherries over him — all Morley products, of course. The kids were led in an Arsenio Hall cheer by McGinnis who hosed White down afterwards.

A kindergartener spoke for those witnessing White's ordeal.

"He was AWESOME!" the wide-eyed youngster exclaimed.

Several days ago White said he figured he could shower at Sashabaw Middle School after being covered with the sweet, sticky mess. But he changed his mind after Clarkston was hit with cold weather and snow flurries Friday.

"I was planning on it but I thought of ways of layering so I could peel off, as cold as it was," said White who returned minutes later in casual clothes.

He remarked how pleased he was with this year's sales — and the new playscape.

"That's the fruit of all this," White said.

Not to mention the topping.

She's in the Navy now

Daughter-in-law of Clarkston couple is Navy success story

Collecting, analyzing and disseminating vital military information is the job of Navy intelligence specialist Wendy Driver, daughter-in-law of Kenneth and Margaret Leach of Clarkston. She also coordinates and develops intelligence training programs for area intelligence officers and specialists in her current assignment at the Navy's Strike-Fighter Weapons School in Jacksonville, Fla.

"With the information I obtain or the analysis that has been derived from it, I provide the basis for many strategic decisions in both peacetime and war. Without this information, sailors could go into a situation blind and the possible loss of life could be devastating. Our command supports the Jacksonville area aircraft squadrons and provides training to their personnel."

The mission calls for expert analyses of photographs, chart preparation and reading and writing reports that provide detailed descriptions of strategic situations all over the world. Driver's duties have taken her to Norway and Italy, but her most exciting time in the Navy occurred on a ship.

"I believe the most exciting thing I've done is going to the aircraft carrier USS George Washington for training and qualifying as an EA-3 'Whale' Skywarrior plane captain. The sweat and tension of being quali-

fied coupled with the excitement during and prior to the launch ranks right up there." Plane captains ensure the aircraft are safe for flight and ready for launch.

She joined the Navy in 1988, and said she is glad she made the decision. "I was phoned by a Navy recruiter, we discussed the Navy in great length, and I joined. I think the Navy has been beneficial because it is so versatile. I don't think I would have had the opportunity to travel and work in such diverse areas if I hadn't joined."

Driver's parents instilled in her the importance of academics and she is furthering her career and personal knowledge by pursuing her bachelor's degree.

"I am currently going to school full time and hope to finish my bachelor's in business administration in May."

In between her military duties and homework assignments, the 27-year-old spends her spare time with her husband, Keith Leach, who's also in the Navy. She said she has learned a lot from the Navy about teamwork and responsibility.

"The team is most important. Without the knowledge and experience of others, the team would just spin their wheels. There is so much we can learn from one another that makes getting the task done easier."

"The most important thing I have learned is to be responsible for your actions. Do your job, take responsibility for your actions and do so with integrity. A person has to become a mature adult and be responsible for all facets of their life, including financial responsibility. The Navy has taught me to do this and plan ahead."

The seven-year veteran plans to continue her service to her country, and would like to make Florida home after retirement. She said, "The Navy provided me the opportunity to take the challenge!"
