# **POH** receives preliminary nod

Proposed next door neighborhood could include four restaurants and a produce market.

The southwest corner of White Lake Rd. and Dixie Highway may soon explode with development, but in keeping with the standards set forth by Independence Township's Vision 2020 plan.

Last Thursday township planning commissioners eyed a 300-acre project that, according to reports from township planner Dick Carlisle, is a cooperative ven-

First, they approved conceptual plans for Pontiac Osteopathic Hospital's proposed Clarkston Medical Campus, a 50-acre campus-style development immediately on the southwest corner. Next, they scrutinized plans for a 260-acre planned unit development that includes four different neighborhoods, offices, a market and restaurants

Proposed as The Parks at Stonewood, the project wraps around the back of the POH site, with two planned entrances at Dixie and White Lake. Incorporated into the plan are 100 acres of open space with a park system and trails. A 12-acre fen or wetlands system will be publicly accessible from pathways.

However, commissioners tabled a decision, 4-0, on conceptual approval for the PUD, agreeing they needed more detail on landscaping and other matters. Todd Moss, Carolyn Place and Joe Figa were absent.

POH and Victor International Corp. which is proposing the PUD, have been working to coordinate their projects to gether and in the larger scope of Vision 2020

Carlisle said the impetus all goes back to the Vision 2020 effort, a plan developed by local officials. business people and residents, aimed as a guide in township planning as Independence moves into the next

The "spirit of cooperation" between POH and Victor International started a year ago, he said, when officials from both parties sat down and began talking.

POH has owned its parcel for 20 years. Developer Dave Johnson, head of Victor International, was eyeing the acreage next door. The meetings helped give "proper direction to the developers of what this community has. We're in a lot better position to get what we want than reacting to proposals set before us." Carlisle said.

The joint plans show how both developers are working to incorporate an integrated road system, common landscaping and other design treatments. For example, "One of POH's buildings will be accessed out of one of Dave's internal roads," he added.

At the meeting, commissioners also discussed the addition of a third lane on the west side of White Lake, from Clement to just south of White Lake Commons Continued on page 5A.

## Pilot still hospitalized

Ronald Ginahi, 60, the Indiana pilot who crashed his small Cessna 150 single-engine plane just north of Pine Knob last week remains in "serious, but stable" condition at Pontiac Osteopathic Hospital, according to Lt. Dale LaBair, commander of the Oakland County Sheriff's Independence substation.

LaBair confirmed Ginahi sustained head and neck injuries, lacerations and a fractured left ankle, which was deemed more serious than first determined, and required surgery.

Federal Aviation Agency officials have not yet determined the cause of the crash. "They say they will not do anything until they talk to the pilot or until he's off medication. When they publish their report, they will send us a copy," said LaBair, who added the investigation may "take months."

# SCAMP Home Tour June 6 and 7

The MacWilliams home shows off other things besides itself

Mickey MacWilliams thinks of houses as innies or outies, kind of like belly buttons. An innie house might be one you 'cocoon' in, she says. But not the MacWilliams' home.

'This is an outie house." she said. "This is my favorite kind of house. When you're in this house you want to go outside. It's meant to show off other things besides itself."

And, that's exactly what it does. Set on a hill above Dark Lake, it is surrounded by tall trees, wetlands and water. Sunlight and nature fill the corners of the living areas, thanks to skylights and spacious windows.

The home also serves as a frame for the family's mementos, art and antique collections.

It was designed by Birmingham architect Victor Saroki. Mickey said he designed the house long and narrow because most of the property's 1.7 acres are lowlands.

To give the house drama, Saroki suggested a 50foot gallery wall in the living room, just inside the front door. The gallery wall sparked a hobby of collecting large advertising posters.

"My husband (Steve), always liked advertising posters. We found a couple at an auction and picked up more as we went along." All of the posters are originals, and most are French. Mickey said they're hard to find in Michigan and the couple found most of their current

15 posters in Canada and Chicago.

"Most of the posters are are from the early 1900s, and are advertisements for shows, cigarettes or alcohol, -- vices," Mickey laughed. A reproduction of one of the posters is being used in a magazine ad for Tattinger's

"They really are art," she said. "They are what they are. They're just pretty, big and bold and kind of

The living room is also home to antique radios which Steve has collected and repaired. One radio belonged to his grandmother. Another, which also has a record player, was a gift from Mickey.

The two radios flank a hutch which displays a collection of Mickey's grandmother's teacups and her own selection of whimsical sommelier plates.

The family room and kitchen are set up greatroom style and are ringed with windows. The rooms overlook woods, wetlands, and a path leading down to Dark Lake.

The cupboards are a warm, rich oak with dark granite countertops. A large island is the centerpiece of the kitchen, and a favorite gathering place.

"When company comes, everybody stands or sits around the island. I like my kitchen because it's big enough to do that," said Mickey."

The family room has an equestrian theme. Above Mickey's favorite place to sit, "a comfy couch," are paintings of horses she owned in the past. The paintings were done by her mother, well-known equestrian artist Betty Asquini.

Mickey's father, Tino, crafted a trunk for her with paintings of riders on horseback done by her mother. An antique jelly cupboard holds books belonging to the couples' sons, Ryan, 9, and Reid, 7.

She said one of the boys' favorite activities is to hop from log to log in the wetlands.

She added that Reid, who didn't begin speaking until he was four years old, attended SCAMP for two years when he was younger. Mickey said by being part of the home tour, her family can make a contribution so others can enjoy the SCAMP experience.

The furniture in the room is mission oak, from the

arts and crafts style popular at the turn of the century, said Mickey. One of the mission oak pieces, a sideboard, was fitted with faucets and a copper sink and is in the family's spacious main floor powder room.

# Odette joins race for state senator

Another Clarkston resident has tossed his hat into the political ring. Attorney Michael Odette announced last week that he will run for state senator.

Odette said he filed to run as a Democrat April 29. "Although my preference would have been to run as an Independent, because of filing requirements, I opted to run with the party which sounds the most like the Democracy form of government I support," Odette said.


Odette said three reasons motivated his choice to run for the senate instead of the state house. He said he's always been interested in politics. Second, as yet, no other candidates have announced plans to run for the state senate and the race is "wide open." Third, Odette said his father ran (unsuccessfully) for the post 35 years ago.

In his written announcement, Odette added his Republican opponents, (incumbent State Sen. Mat Dunaskiss from Lake Orion and State Rep. Tom Middleton from Clarkston) "... are career politicians. Both have forgotten the meaning of and the reason for term limits. It was to get new blood in Lansing, not to simply shift it from one job to another."

Odette went on to say, "We are faced with many important issues, to name a few: crime, education, prisons, highways, casinos, gun rights and assisted suicide. Many of these issues have been around for years. Our current legislators have decided the voter is not smart enugh to decide certain issues yet they have failed to do it themselves."

Odette added he will set an example for campaign finance reform."We have all heard talk of campaign finance reform, but nothing has been done about it. I will not solicit nor will I accept any campaign funds.

"I will run a low budget campaign with an emphasis on word of mouth and door to door campaigning. I ask each of you to support campaign finance reform by

donating your vote. Let's show them it can be done."

Odette has worked as an attorney for the last 12 years. Before that he was a deputy sheriff. His current law office is on Dixie Highway in Davisburg, but he said he will soon be moving his office to a location on M-15.

Independence Township resident Jeff Gallant has announced he is running as a Republican for state representative. Holly resident and Clarkston business owner Ruth Johnson, an Oakland County Commissioner, has also announced she will run as a Republican for state representative.

Middleton who will lose his seat as representative because of term limits, announced earlier this year he will challenge Dunaskiss. Independence Township is in state senate district 16, which includes Springfield.

# Concept plan of new golf course in Springfield OK'd

The Springfield Township Board of Trustees decided not to take a mulligan when it came to voting on the new Shepherd's Hollow Golf Course.

The board approved the concept plan for the 27-hole course, planned for an area surrounding the Colombiere Center off Big Lake Road at its regular meeting Thursday.

The next step is for a detailed site plan to go before the township's planning commission before returning to the regular board for formal approval.

The course is slated to have 27 holes set on 408 acres. Golf courses require a minimum of 350 acres to be properly zoned.

Township clerk Nancy Strole said a golf course for the same site had been approved three years ago, but no construction ever took place.


The course will include a 6,500-square foot clubhouse and will require some paving of a portion of Big Lake Road. Local ordinances state that there must be paved roads with direct access to the course.

The parking area will have spaces for 225 cars, and a driving range is planned. The plan states that the clubhouse will not host weddings or conventions.

Township supervisor Collin Walls said the earliest formal approval could come from the board would be June or July.

(Farmer Jack) shopping center. A portion would be paid for by each developer, according to its respective frontage.

POH has already committed to the 800 feet in front of its center, but Johnson has not decided whether he will pay for the 3,000 feet of lane improvements on White Lake that affect his parcel.

Township building director Bev McElmeel said Johnson's portion is "costly" and perhaps not do-able as he is already sinking thousands of dollars to make road improvements on Clement, as part of his proposed project.

However, the concept would give the township a change to complete a three-land road widening project from Clement to Dixie, that could not be accomplished, due to a shortage of federal funding. A recent federal grant allocated only enough money for road-widening improvements from Clement to Andersonville.

Another attempt to complete the road-widening failed when the township's board of trustees voted not to extend the Downtown Development Authority, which would have captured tax revenues for the project.

Though the matter was tabled a number of commissioners called Johnson's proposed project quality work from a quality developer.

According to a brochure on Bay Harbor, a multimillion-dollar, award-winning residential/golf course development, nestled on the western shores of Lake Michigan, Victor International is responsible for 30 prestigious developments in the the state. Many of the residential lots are priced at \$1 million or higher.

Local examples include Heron Bay in Bloomfield, a luxury single-family home community, and Victor Corporate Park in Livonia, a residential development that includes an office park complex, restaurants and a hotel.

Johnson said his proposed project would emulate

that quality, and agreed the venture with POH has been cooperative.

"Dick Carlisle did a tremendous job of orchestrating that. It's great that two different projects of this size coordinated in harmony, especially when ours is 85 percent residential."

Part of the challenge for both developers has been working with the existing topography, which includes significant wetlands.

"What's amazing, when you go up in an airplane, is looking down. It's a tremendous piece of property that's green in a developed area. It's a development inside of where it's already grown for miles and miles," Johnson said.

The proposed commercial strip west of the residential property is designed to incorporate four family-style restaurants, "not fast-food types," Johnson said, adding they would be "Outback Steakhouse-like." He is looking for a produce market, similar to Vic's or Merchant of Vino.

Johnson said he has also been talking to the owners of Rudy's Quality Market in Clarkston, which previously announced it would move from its location on Main St. within the next year. Robert Esshaki, Rudy's co-owner, said he had no comment at this time.

Johnson said he would file additional information to the building department by Thursday. "If we do that, then we will have a public hearing on June 25," he said, adding that he hoped to have final approval by the end of next month.

Although preliminary plans are now approved, POH is still waiting for a resolution on its application for a certificate of need, required for new hospital construction. The certificate is needed before POH can move forward with its plans for construction of the emergency, out-patient surgery and birthing centers.

POH was previously granted a certificate of need

from the Michigan Court of Appeals, but the case has been appealed by the state attorney general's office and is waiting to be heard in the State Supreme Court.

Originally, POH applied for a 112-bed hospital, but the state appealed the decision after its community health department determined Oakland County doesn't need additional hospital beds.

POH has been trying to establish a medical facility in Clarkston for the last 15 years.

After the meeting, POH president and CEO Patrick Lamberti said there has been no resolution, but POH is "making progress" in the matter.

On the upswing, providing services in an outpatient setting will provide quality services at a lower cost, Lamberti said. "It's always been demonstrated costs are lower in an out-patient center because you don't have beds."

An in-patient center would have cost \$65 million, in comparison with the outpatient medical campus, which is estimated to cost \$20-25 million, he explained.

The fact that Clarkston Medical Campus is to be located just down the road from the new Mid-Oakland Medical Center, and other medical providers like William Beaumont and Genesys, doesn't worry him.

"We're here to enhance them, as opposed to compete with them," Lamberti said. "That's a promise we made to them 15 years ago."





## FOCUS ON THE FAMILY

QUESTION: Early this year, my husband of 11 years announced that he didn't love me anymore. Joe told me that he would be leaving, though my begging and pleading with him made him agree to stay for a while. Then one night he became so cruel and said many mean things before walking out.

Every time I see him I humiliate myself. I beg him to call the kids and me, but he only says, "I don't want to talk to you." I tell him how much I love him, and he'll reply, "I have no love for you! I don't hate you, but I don't love you either."

I was recently told by my doctor that I must have surgery on my eyes next week and that I might possibly lose my vision. Out of fear and panic, I broke down and called my husband, but he responded with indifference to the news. I asked if he would take me to the hospital and stay in the waiting room while I had the surgery. Joe hesitated and then said, "Well, I guess so."

Why is Joe acting this way? Is there something I am doing wrong?

DR. DOBSON: I'm going to speak very directly to you, although I understand the pain that you're going through. There is no greater heartache in life than to be rejected by the one you love. But by courage and determination, you will survive the crisis that has beset your home.

With that, let me say that the compulsion that is driving you to plead for Joe's attention and love is wrecking your last glimmer of hope for reconciliation. By groveling before him, you are stripping yourself of all dignity and respect. Those two attitudes are critical ingredients in any stable and fulfilling relationship, and you are systematically destroying them.

This is the message you are conveying inadvertently: "Oh, Joe, I need you so badly. I can't make it without you. I spend my days waiting for you to call and am crushed when the phone doesn't ring. Won't you please, please let me talk to you occa-

sionally? I'll take you any way I can have you - even if you want to walk all over me. I am desperate without you."

This is a classic panic reaction, and it is leading you to appease your husband. Appeasement is virtually never successful in human relationships. In fact, it often leads directly to war, whether between husbands and wives or between antagonistic nations. Attempts by one side to "buy off" an aggressor or offender may seem like proposals of peace, but in most cases they merely precipitate further insult and conflict.

Nothing destroys a romantic relationship more quickly than for a person to throw himself or herself, weeping and clinging, on the back of the cool partner to beg for mercy. That makes the wayward spouse even more anxious to escape from the leech that threatens to suck his life's blood. He may pity the wounded partner and wish that things were different, but he can rarely bring himself to love again under those circumstances.

You need to understand that Joe's withdrawal from the relationship is directly linked to his quest for freedom. He is feeling suffocated and wants to escape from the marriage. By humiliating yourself and clinging to his ankles each time you meet, you increase his desire to get away. The more he struggles to gain his freedom, the more he feels your clutches around him. It becomes a vicious cycle.

QUESTION: Are all forms of child abuse il-

DR. DOBSON: Not in any practical sense. Within certain limits it is not illegal to ignore a child or raise him or her without love. Nor is it against the law to ridicule and humiliate a boy or girl. Those forms of rejection may be more harmful even than some forms of physical abuse, but they are tougher to prove and are usually not prosecutable.

# McCormick stresses choices, consequences to 8th-graders

Tim McCormick says it can and does, as he told an assembled group of eighth-grade students at Sashabaw Middle School Thursday afternoon.



McCormick touched on several themes through his 50-minute talk with the students. He used examples from his own life experiences to teach lessons.


"I went to a class reunion some time ago," he said.







# Going the distance

Swim team raises more than \$1,500 for leukemia patient

After a rigorous workout at the Deer Lake pool, a group of youngsters earned their Happy Meals and cookies. The goodies were appropriate when you consider these kids were 6 to 11 years old.

On May 14,21 members from Deer Lake Athletic Club's Golf and Swim Team took part in a Swim-athon, designed to raise money for Leukemia Society of America's Michigan Chapter.

Children took to the waters of Deer Lake's indoor pool at 4:30, splitting into three groups that each swam a total of 45 minutes — non-stop.

After the first period, Deer Lake swim instructor Jill Hancook, who coordinated the event, said the kids hoped to raise \$1,500. "They went out and got pledges to sponsor this."

On Monday, Deer Lake front desk receptionist Kelly Evans said the swim team went over and above their goal. The total amount of money raised through the Swim-a-thon was \$2,011.70.

Funds will go toward the Team In Training Program, a marathon program, held June 20 in Alaska. Hancook, who is taking part in the event, said her goal is to raise \$4,200; the \$2,011.70 is a part of that. In 10 years, the program has raised \$9 million dollars for LSA, she added.


In this case, the money will be donated to a specific individual, 2-year-old Matthew Goldi from Farmington. Matthew, who is afflicted with acute lymphatic leukemia, is the group's honor patient, Hancook explained, adding that the children hoped to meet the youngster at a Sunday ice cream social.



That's not surprising because Samantha, who attends Cedar Crest Academy with her 7-year-old brother Spencer, is the state's second place winner for the 50-yard breast stroke, 10-and-under division.


You might say Samantha's skills originated from a "stroke" of luck that began several years ago when her parents enrolled her in swimming lessons at Deer Lake's pool.

"This is a kid who will probably get a college swim scholarship, all because we didn't have any place to drop her off when we worked," said Samantha's mom, Lisa Baylis Ashby. She had high praise for Hancook. "This is the woman who taught my children to swim."



# Legendary rocker kicks off concert season

After three generations in the music business, Eddie Money is still "\$hakin'."

But these days, you're more likely to find the veteran performer shakin' with laughter over the antics of his five children. Or the guys who coach his sons' soccer games, the man who paints his house, the clerk at the corner gas station.

"I hang around with normal people. Not the kind of guy who goes out to clubs and hangs out with Leonardo DiCaprio," chuckles Money, with the trademark husky voice that's still heavily New Yaukish.

"I think the reason I've been a big hit with people is because I reflect everyday situations.'

On Monday Money talked with The Clarkston News from his car phone, or rather from the modest Volvo station wagon which, he explains, is functional because "the kids (who range from baby Julian, 2, to Zachary, 12) can eat their French fries in here. "I've got my daughter's ballet shoes, my son's soccer ball. It's just a mess. But I love the Volvo. It's a very safe car, safe for me and the kids."

Family life is a big part of the Money scene nowadays. His wife Laurie and the children often accompany him on the road and sometimes on stage. In fact, it's little Desmond's voice you hear first on Money's latest live CD, "Shakin' With the Money Man," released last year.

"He says 'Are you weddy to wock 'n' woll?" he laughs.

Once Money has ended the daily routine of carting the children to karate, tap and ballet, he's ready to wock 'n' woll himself.

Spirited as ever, the 49-year-old performer is ready to kick off Pine Knob's 1998 concert season, a regular tradition for the past few years. Though he refers to himself as the singer-spokesperson for the ordinary man, Money will be decked out in a tux.

Though a native New Yorker, Money has staked himself firmly in the Motor City, with his passionate, no-nonsense rock that often cuts to the heart. And this time of year he finds himself in a Detroit state of mind.

"I think it's so great," he says about his Pine Knob opener. "My guitar player's from Detroit. We really do love Pine Knob and people treat us so well. I feel like I was born inDetroit, I really do.

"Bob's (Seger) a good friend of mine. I know Ted Nugent really well ... All of my friends are on the lawn. There's the white-collar crowd, the blue-collar crowd and then there's the Eddie Money tank-top crowd. I'm the poor man's Rod Stewart, but I love it."

This year, fans can expect to hear old chartbusters like "Two Tickets to Paradise" but some newer

songs as well, including the single "If We Ever Get Out of This Place," from "Shakin' With the Money Man." Money co-wrote the song with Kiss's Paul Stanley.

The lyrics reflect the plight of many middle-class Americans in the '90s. "I can relate to middle-class America with the taxes and bills. I mean, how many rock stars do you know who shop with double coupons?"

The raspy chuckle again. Money explains it comes from the smoker's habit he's trying to quit. In fact, one track from the Smokin' CD is "Smokin' another cigarette, kill ourself a little bit," he says, warbling a few lines, still over the car phone.

Money admits he's been there, done that himself. "You know, I had a bad divorce, a drug overdose. God has been good to me. I gotta tell ya, life's pretty good."

Before that, there were other rough roads, starting with his life as a tough, street kid in Queens. Born to a working-class family, he knows what it's like to dream.

Success didn't come easy. He eeked out a meager living as a bell bottom salesman while working at another job at Penney's ("So I know what the white sale was like. What a horror show"). "discovered" after forming his own band, after a brief stint with Big Brother and the Holding Company, after the untimely death of Janis Joplin — in which he did not get the coveted role as the new lead singer.

His favorite oldie is reminiscent of those hard

"I still love 'Two Tickets to Paradise.' Everybody would love to have two tickets to paradise," he muses. Money now spends a lot of time helping others.

"The wonderful part of my career is not the royalty checks. Not the yada, yada, yada. I do a lot of work with charities, drug intervention hotlines, the schools ..." Today, he's excited about a new deal with Disney Studios.

Money sings the theme song for the "Quack Pack," a show where Huey, Dewey and Louie come back as teenagers. It isn't just the people lip-synching the lyrics to "Think I'm In Love" who have him marveling about the loyalty of his fans.

"Now I have all these little kids asking me to sing the quack song."

The Money Man, who's recorded 12 albums and sold over 12 million records, has no intention of trading his rock for a rocking chair. He still loves performing on stage ("my forte," he says) and a new CD is in the works.

"I'm back in the studio again. But, you know, when you have five kids, you'll do anything to get out of the house," he says with a laugh.

# Three-part Fountain project approved for Davisburg

After nearly 90 minutes of discussion and deliberation, the Springfield Township Board of Trustees approved Thursday what supervisor Collin Walls called "the largest, most complex project in the history of this township."

By a 5-2 vote, the board approved the planned unit development known as Fountain at its regular meeting Thursday night. Walls and trustee Elaine Field-Smith voted against approving the project.

Tim Birtsas, a partner of RBI Development, the group behind the project, was ecstatic at the approval. "This is my dream project. I'll be proud to have

my name by it," he said with a big grin on his face. "This is a project that makes sense and fits in with the area here. It fills a need in the community, and we hope to get started as quickly as possible."

The Fountain PUD is split into three projects and phases. Phase I is Fountain Hills, with 10 single-family home sites. Phase II, Fountain Village Square, will consist of three projects to be located in the downtown Davisburg area. One is a new post office, which Birtsas said would start construction first. The second is a family-style restaurant that will seat 112 indoors and outdoors. The third is a retail center, but Birtsas said he's not sure what kind of retail will be going in there yet. With the retail center, there will be two 2,400-square foot office buildings constructed as well. Phase III is Fountain Village, a site with 40 detached condo-

Phase II of the project. The entire Fountain PUD project is estimated to take five years before all will be up and running.

"I've had a lot of interest in the restaurant and the retail center," Birtsas said. "I'm not sure what will go in the retail center yet, but things like a hair salon, a small-town grocery store and a pizza chain make sense to me."

Board members discussed some of the details during the meeting, such as escrow amounts for the project, phasing schedule and other administrative details. The project cannot begin construction until those details are hammered out between attorneys, and the approval has been published for seven days.

With the approval of the project, the property will be rezoned for each appropriate project.

Birtsas said the 10 condos in Phase III were moved to Phase II to show a more enhanced benefit to the community sooner in the project.





# Superior Sportsplex gets preliminary approval

A 200,000-square-footmulti-sports complex proposed for a 20-acre site off Sashabaw received conceptual site plan approval from Independence Township planning commissioners last Thursday.

Independence Superior Sportsplex, proposed by Global Sports Management as a \$12-16 million project, is designed to house two ice arenas, a 50,000-square foot fieldhouse, an in-line skating rink, a full-service restaurant, a pro shop, a fitness and/or rehabilitation center, arcade, day care center and more.

The big draw is the two ice arenas, one an Olympic-sized rink with seating for 2,000, the other an NHL-sized rink with seating for 900.

Two entrances, a main entrance off Bow Pointe Rd. and the other, a "collective driveway" off Sashabaw that would also access a proposed coffee house and veterinarian's office, are planned.

The facility would also include walkways, making the facility easily accessed by pedestrians, including students from Pine Knob Elementary next door.

GSM will need to return to the planning commission for final site plan approval, after some revisions on parking, drainage and landscaping are made.

GSM co-owner Kelly W. Kammer said time is of the essence to get as much done as possible by hockey season. With the new North Oakland Hockey Association up and running, steps are being taken to complete at least one rink before the fall league dates.

GSM plans to return to the commission for final approval May 28. "If they approve us that night, we'll be breaking ground in the first half of June and just fly," Kammer said.





All Clarkston boys track coach Walt Wyniemko was looking for Friday was for his team to give its best at the regional meet at Holly.

That's excactly what he got, as several Clarkston runners qualified for the May 30 Class A State Track Meet at Bay City Western.

Making a big splash was the 4x800 relay team of Jon Burklow, Brett Quantz, Matt Baker and Kevin Breen, who set a new meet record with a time of 8:07.7.

"It was a whole team effort," Wyniemko said. "It was great that we have a lot of guys going to states, and most everyone placed well for us."

The team entered the day's final event, the 4x400 relay, tied for first place overall. Clarkston placed seventh in the event, giving it third place for the meet, behind Flint Southwestern Academy and Lapeer West.

"What's wrong with that?" Wynienko said regarding the third place finish. "We went out, gave it our best shot and had a chance to win in the end. That's all I ask of the guys. We had nothing to be ashamed of."

Burklow did double duty for Clarkston, also qualifying in the 800 run, who took second place with a time of 2:00.9.

Although he finished out of the top two, he still qualified for states by nearly four seconds over the minimum time.

Senior Marc Venegoni is Clarkston's lone field event representative at states. His long jump of 20 feet, 5 inches was good for second place at the meet.

The top two regional finishers automatically go on to states. There can be additional qualifiers if they beat times or distances set by regional qualifiers from the past four years.

# Ladies qualify 9 for state meet

After its performance at Friday's regional meet, Clarkston girls track coach Gordie Richardson probably needs to think about some major transportation to the Class A State Track Meet May 30.

That's because nine different Clarkston girls qualified for states in six different events in regionals, held on a hot and sunny day at Holly High School.

The highlight of the day came when the 4x800 relay team of Jennifer Rooding, Nicole Fischer, Lissa Lukens and Megan Plante set a new regional record with a time of 9:46.1, beating second-place Port Huron Northern by more than 14 seconds.

"In the 1980s, I had a team with 12 state qualifiers, but this is the most I've had since then," Richardson said. "I was real pleased with the kids'efforts. I'm happy for the seniors that qualified, and for the younger ones, because they can go back to the others and talk about how much fun it was."

Two of those younger runners include sophomore Brittani Brewer and freshman Amanda Chicalas, who won regional championships in the 100 hurdles and 300 hurdles respectively. Brewer ran 16.5 in the 100s, clearly beating the best competition present. Chicalas ran a 48.3, keeping up her consistently fast times in this tough event.

"Brittani has improved tremendously," Richardson said. "She now feels confident in running her event, and that's made a big difference. She knows it's not hard, and she can just concentrate on lowering her times.

"Amanda just loves to compete. She listens well and has great physical ability. The 300 hurdles is more of a test of your speed than technical skill, and she does well in that event because she can use her speed."

Three Clarkston athletes beat the odds and were able to qualify despite finishing out of the top two spots. Plante and Rooding finished 3-4 in the 800 run, but beat the state-qualifying time of 2:24.6 by running 2:22 and 2:22.8 respectively. Senior Erica Holman beat the elusive one-minute mark in the 400 at the best possible time, running a 59.3, good enough for third at the regional and good enough to qualify for states.


Apparently, Holman was so pleased with her sub-60 second time in the 400, she went out and did it again in her split of the 4x400 relay team that won the regional. She ran a 59.4 in the split to help the team, inleuding Plante, Rooding and Rachel Uchman, qualify for states for the second year in a row.

Richardson said with the state and county meet qualifying out of the way, now is the time he can sit back and enjoy this juggernaut of a team he has.

"The qualifying is done, now you just let them go out and run," he said.




Catcher Derek Casper bailed Clarkston out in the bottom of the seventh by sniffing out an attempted suicide squeeze by Adams.

# Defense deserts Wolves in loss to Brandon

The defense played by the Clarkston varsity softball team Monday was as uncharacteristic as a political candidate keeping his promises.

The normally airtight defense of Clarkston committed 11 errors in the team's frustrating 11-7 loss to Brandon at Clintonwood Park.

The loss drops the Wolves to 21-10 overall and 9-4 in the OAA Division I. The loss also eliminated the team from hopes of winning the league title.

After playing near error-free defense the past three weeks, Clarkston coach Al Land was at a loss to explain the errors that cost the team the win.

"I guess we were due for a bad game," he said. "Even in our losses lately, we have played really well, and weren't committing errors. We scored enough runs to win the ballgame, but our overthrows just killed us."

The low point of the game came in the top of the seventh inning. Clarkston had just scored four straight runs to knot the game 6-6. But the team committed four errors in the inning, all leading to five Blackhawk runs.

Clarkston showed some fight in the bottom of the seventh, getting three hits in its first four at bats to close the gap to 11-7. But the team stranded runners on second and third and lost to Brandon for the sixth straight time, dating back to last season.

"I like the fact that we didn't quit after that seventh inning," Land said. "If we get that first out in the seventh, it might be a different ballgame. But this was our poorest game of the year."

The positive side of this game was that Clarkston was able to connect at the plate against a strong pitching and defending team. Senior shortstop Tiffany Honey


