# Fatal crashes

# cause concerns

The debate is on about the safety of Dixie Hwy.

Two fatal accidents within several weeks of each other on the same stretch of highway in Springfield Township.

Conicidence or cataclysmic?

Many area people feel the latter, after car accidents claimed the lives of 7-year-old Rachelle Bouchard and a 17-year-old Oakland Technical Center student. The recent traffic-related deaths have jumpstarted a campaign to make the road safer in several ways.

One of those people looking to make a change is Laith Jarbo, owner of the Bridge Lake Market. Jarbo has started a petition drive to get a stoplight installed at the corner of Dixie and Bridge Lake Road to make the road around his business safer for customers.

"I had a friend help start the petition a while ago, but I didn't take it as seriously until that little girl got killed," Jarbo said. "I know that if I have to take room off my parking lot, I'll do that. I don't care. If it saves lives, then let's do it."

Craig Bryson, spokesman for the Road Commission for Oakland County, said once he receives the petition, it will get passed along to the RCOC Board for review. After going through the board, the issue gets referred to the RCOC's engineering department for a traffic study.

The results of that study, analyzed with other recent studies of the area, will reveal whether the volume of traffic warrants a stoplight.

"There probably won't be enough traffic volume in the area for the addition of a stoplight," he said.

Bryson added that if that is the department's decision, the road will go on a waiting list for available funds.

Springfield Township supervisor Collin Walls said a mistake people make is thinking accidents along Dixie are a new problem. Every couple years, an incident takes place that gets people talking about improving the road, and nothing happens, he said. "Several years ago, the township asked the road commission to look at possibly adding a center left-turn lane on Dixie," Walls said. "There just hasn't been the interest necessary to get anything done out there." One recent improvement was a turn lane in front of the Cedar Crest Academy. The academy laid out \$100,000 of its own money to complete the project to its fullest. "That woman (owner Dolores Imbrunone) worked feverishly to get that lane in there," Walls said. "They didn't get enough support from their neighbors, so they kicked in and got it done." Walls attributed some of the traffic problems along Dixie to changes not in the number of cars or the layout of the road, but a difference in the way people drive.

# Two vie for one seat on school board

Two Clarkston residents are seeking election to one four-year term on the Clarkston Community Schools Board of Education: incumbent Sheila Hughes and Charles Hensley. It is the only issue on the regular school election Monday, June 8.

**Charles Hensley** works as a senior project engineer for Saturn Corporation. He is a member of Lake Orion Masonic Lodge #46 and Pine Knob Missionary Church.

This is Hensley's second run for school board trustee -- he ran unsuccessfully last year. He said he is running for school board again this year because he thinks he can make a positive impact on Clarkston schools.

"I think I could represent each and every voter in Clarkston fairly and without bias," he added.

Hensley said he has 12 years of experience in the automotive industry which has honed his problem solving skills.

He supports a state mandated core curriculum. He says he does not believe new policies that incorporate racial and ethnic diversity training should be added to the schools curriculum until children are taught math, reading and writing effectively.

Hensley believes children should not be promoted to the next grade until they are ready, and he has expressed concerned about budget overruns in the **Continued on page 5A**

# Plans for day care center opposed

A proposed day care center nearly squeaked through the Independence Township Planning Commission Thursday, but was defeated by a 4-3 vote. On Monday, commission chair Steve Board said commissioners voted against the special land use that would have allowed developer Ozzie Jackson build a 6,000 square-foot building on six acres on the northwest corner of Clarkston and Pine Knob roads. In addition, several homeowners from surrounding neighborhoods were present to protest the request, which would have allowed commercial use in a rural

(R-1R) zoning area. Some commissioners shared that concern and others, Board said.

"One of the chief concerns was, in fact, if this

facility (moved) you might have an office building sitting here," he said.

Voting in favor of the land use were commissioners Richard Oppmann, Board and Cynthia Lohmeier Opposed members included Todd Moss, Joe Figa, Dan Travis and Jill Palulian.

Board said a day care center is a permitted special land use in residential zoning districts in the township. In his opinion, it makes sense to locate them there. "We want our kids to walk to church, to school - and we'd like them to walk to a day care center."

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

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

# New library board run by teens

More volunteers are still needed

Calling all teenagers! The Independence Township Library is looking for youthful volunteers to revamp its young adult section.

Teens from grade seven and up are encouraged to join a new Teen Advisory Team where they will focus on what they - not the library staff - want. It will provide the opportunity to create an inviting young adult area, select books and magazines, plan programs, publish a young adult newsletter and more.

The current young adult library is "pretty small," said Julie Meredith, coordinator of the venture who was recently hired as the new young adult librarian. Presently the section holds one row of shelving for hard covers and a "spinner" (display rack) for paperbacks.

With the new high school just down the road and the township growing by leaps and bounds, "We thought it would be a good idea to expand," Meredith said, adding that every year funds become available for library improvements.

Township library director Mollie Lynch said each year the staff takes a look at its budget and targets monies to one special area. This year, the young adult section received over \$15,000 for improvements, plus some donations, including a \$1,000 contribution from Friends of the Library to buy more books.

A decision was made to establish the young adult section because the teenage population is growing. Before Meredith was hired, the library offered adult services and youth services, but nothing for the middle group, who need their own special services as well.

"This year the young adult section is the selected funding area. But we want to get the teenagers involved. I want them to come in and know they have the power to say, 'We want these kinds of programs, these kinds of books," Meredith said.

The concept is different for younger children visiting the youth section "where parents speak for them," she added. But teenagers often slip through the cracks when it comes to having a say-so on their own programs.

Meredith would like to see the young adult library tripled by fall. Improvements would include doubling the selection of paperbacks, adding more shelving for hard-covered books, expanding audio, video and magazine collections, and adding computers, an Internet terminal and an on-line catalog system.

Plans also include converting a quiet study room at the back of the library into a new teen lounge. The

place for teens to "hang out," Meredith said. "That whole area will be theirs."

The advisory team would most likely hold meetings at least once a month. But teens are encouraged to come and add "their two-cents worth" even when they can only squeeze one or two dates into their hectic schedules, Meredith said.

Sign-up forms are available at the high school, middle school and public libraries, or teens may call Meredith at the library at 625-2212 for more information.

Developing new programs are an important part of the process toward expansion, she said. And they definitely go beyond the realm of burying yourself in a good book.

Already, she and approximately 10 teenagers have discussed ideas that include an after-school coffee house, an in-line skating program and a Friday night teen cafe where local bands might perform.

Plus, kids who get involved receive a few perks. "Helpers will get first crack to take those materials

Currently, three teenage girls have been helping Meredith get started. They include Baker College sophomore Sarah Phillps, 18, a CHS graduate and part-time library clerk; Adie Verla, 15, a CHS sophom and library page; and Leah Walsh, a home-schooled 14year-old whom Meredith kiddingly refers to as "a frequent library patron."

All three appeared excited last week, as they giggled and looked over the new book collection made possible by the Friends contribution.

"We've picked a variety of books that would appeal to many different interests," Sarah said. "We've got some guy books, some girl books, fantasy, historical, mysteries and biographies."

Both she and Adie especially like works by teenoriented authors Bodie Thoene and Robin Jones Gunn. 'We really enjoy contemporary teen fiction," she said.

On the other hand, Leah doesn't have a favorite author. "I read a little bit of everything," she said with

# City building inspection ordinance debated

City officials are still wrestling with a proposed ordinance that would order annual building inspections in Clarkston's downtown business district.

At May 26's public hearing on the matter, they heard complaints from building and business owners that ranged from ordinance language to a belief that yearly inspections aren't needed. Prior to the hearing, they were sent copies of the ordinance and letters, inviting them to present their input.

Independence Township trustee Neil Wallace, who rents office space in Clarkston and says he plans to buy a downtown building, called the ordinance with its proposed \$150-\$175 annual inspection fee, "an improper government intrusion" and "an inappropriate tax."

With high rents and other financial burdens, "People are struggling to make it as it is," he said. "I think you should think long and hard before you take that step. It's an unnecessary one."

Connie Morgan of Morgan's Service said, "I agree with Mr. Wallace that it's another government interference. We already pay big bucks for our insurance ... We don't want to pay another fee for something we're already taking care of."

City attorney Tom Ryan, who drafted the proposed ordinance, argued it would be a benefit. "It's not a tax because these people are getting a service," he said. Both "imminent" dangers, such as a boiler that looked like it was about to explode, and non-imminent situations would be evaluated.

Independence Township fire chief Gar Wilson said non-imminent examples are newspapers stacked too close to a water heater, wiring not properly covered, etc. "We'd give them so many hours or days to get that fixed." The "genesis" for the ordinance came about because of the age of the buildings and their proximity to each other, Ryan said. Two readings would be required

before adoption.

According to several officials, including city building inspector Sy Stone, city engineer Gary Tressel and Wilson, the city's zoning and building codes aren't adequate to protect aging conditions. Wilson said he wanted to "bring attention to the problems and have them resolved."

Additionally, some of the earlier structures feature "balloon construction," with no fire stops between the wall-to-wall buildings. "If a fire gets going in one of them, we have a problem," Wilson said.

Though Tressel agreed some owners might be well-meaning, they might not spot every hazard. "You may be an informed owner and you may not be an informed owner," he added, explaining that's why professionals are needed.

The new ordinance would require structural, electrical, plumbing and heating inspections in addition to annual fire inspections, currently provided free of charge by the township's fire department.

Inspections would be conducted in areas that are visible, officials said, not behind walls. They argue the measures would further ensure the public health, safety and welfare of the community.

According to the proposed ordinance, it would be

up to each building owner to schedule an inspection before August 1 each year. If an inspection was not scheduled by that date, the city manager would send a 14-day notice in which to comply. Violations could result in jail time, fines or both.

Several owners took issue with those proposed penalties and argued the ordinance, as currently written, isn't business-friendly.

"I was shocked when I got to the end of this ... Somebody could go to jail to do 90 days?" Wallace said. Noting the downtown revitalization issue was also on the agenda (it was later tabled), he continued, "It seems ironic to be discussing this on the same night as revitalization. I think it's the kind of thing that pushes businesses away."


Max Broock Realtors owner Bowen Broock agreed the tone was "a little ominous ... it seemed punitive, rather than a way that encourages you to be proactive." But, in general, he said he favored the idea of routine inspections, "the imminent issue particularly."

Building department officials in two other historic districts, the villages of Milford and Holly, were contacted and said they have no such ordinance in place. However, some city council members, who seemed sympathetic to concerns, said they feel the ordinance is nevertheless needed in Clarkston.

"I know what you say about government intrusion. But it wasn't initiated by the government, but by people like Gar and Sy," councilman Walt Gamble said.

"I see it as supporting the downtown revitalization. I agree the tone of this does not convey our intent," said council member Ann Clifton. "But I think the whole point is to support revitalization, that we want to improve and maintain our downtown area — for it not to go like that."

Wilson said it has been tough to gain access to Continued on page 12A

athletic department.

Hensley said he is in agreement with most of the policies put in place by the school board. He added he has attended between three and five school board meetings this year but keeps up on what the board has been doing.

# Amon resigns as Independence senior center coordinator

Lannette Amon is sad to be leaving, just when the new senior center's master plan is getting underway. But Independence Township's senior center coordinator says a new job in Waterford is a great career move.

Amon announced her resignation as the center's coordinator May 29, a position she has held for the past five-and-a-half years. She said her new post at the Waterford Senior Center is an even bigger responsibil-

"I'm just tickled to death," said Amon Friday. "It's more administrative and there are twice as many people to do it for in Waterford ... But I will miss every person here."

Amon's departure comes in the midst of developing the center's new master plan. Called Senior Center 2005, the question is, "Where do we want to be as a senior center by the year 2005?" Amon said.

For the past several weeks there have been meetings between township officials, business people, residents, seniors who use the center and "non-users,"

those who are of senior age but haven't used it at this point.

A \$5,000 study headed by Learning Quest Resources, a Royal Oak-based consulting firm hired by the township, will determine through focus groups, strategies and other methods, where the center should be by the year 2005.


The next step will be to compile the results of the recent meetings and "take the major points that came out," Amon said.





Now the good news: A bicycle team for the Tour de France was sponsored by our Postal Service to the tune of five million dollars.

#### WHAT?

That's what the Coalition to Make Our First Class Mail FIRST CLASS, a non-profit consumer organization, says.

It also says the Postal Service set aside \$150 million last year, for a feel-good advertising campaign, then went \$80 million over budget, for a grand total of more than \$230 million spent on advertising in just one year.

I've wanted to believe the Postal Service commercials we've been exposed to on TV were public service announcements. The government licensed radio and TV stations have to give so many minutes to charitable, non-profit groups and I figured the Postal Service was one of them.

Not so says the CTMOFCMFC, whose stated purpose is to make on-time delivery of First Class mail the Postal Service's top priority.

This California based group has two more gripes in their recent mailing: The new postmaster in Atlanta spent almost a quarter million dollars on her swearingin ceremony and new offices for herself--all with the approval of top management at the Postal Service.




I'm heading home for lunch on Monday, hopefully the power will be restored and the well pump will be working -- and for my fellow employees I hope the shower water will be spraying.

# School personnel help classmates say good-bye

When Springfield Plains Elementary principal Dr. Sharon Devereaux learned second grader Rachelle Bouchard had been seriously injured in a car accident Sunday May 24, her first thought was how to gently inform fellow staff members, parents and students.

On Tuesday, she drafted a letter with Springfield Plains social worker Dorothy Sommers, and sent it home to parents. It let the closely-knit school community of know of Rachelle's injuries, and that her mother, Christine, had also been injured and lost her unborn child.

Unfortunately, Rachelle succumbed to her injuries late Tuesday afternoon, May 26. Her teacher, Kristine Simek, called the parents of her students that evening and invited them to come to school the next morning to speak to the school district's crisis team.

Devereaux sent another letter home Wednesday to let the rest of the parents know Rachelle died. She also let parents know Sommers, Clarkston High School social worker Jim Butzine and grief specialist Kathy Garwood would be available to parents and students for further counseling.

When Rachelle's classmates entered their room Wednesday morning, Simek gathered them together and talked about the loss of their little friend.

Sommers said the students shared their happy memories of Rachelle and comforted each other. The children then drew pictures of their happy memories and made cards for Rachelle's family, which includes her father Kevin, and a sister Danielle who will start kindergarten in the fall.

"It was a very peaceful scene," said Devereaux. Sommers and the crisis team had spoken to the staff about how to discuss the loss with students before school school began Wednesday morning.

Sommers told teachers to be factual about the information and to tell them it was okay to share their feelings and cry.

"If kids don't have the facts, what they imagine may be more scary," Sommers said. "Making the cards for the family is good for the children. By doing something for the family it helps them not to feel helpless. They feel like they're doing something helpful instead."

Devereaux said, "We want to do the right thing. They were so helpful in telling us what would be best for the children."

Taking such care in helping the school communities deal with tragedies has been ongoing since 1985. Butzine said the first draft of a crisis team plan was written at that time and is set up for any kind of emergency situation, serious injury or threat.

Since then the crisis team has helped students, parents and staff deal with the deaths of students, staff and family members.

Butzine said the team met with parents of classmates of Rachelle Wednesday morning, and almost every student had at least one parent in attendance.

Parents asked team members how they should handle the news of the loss of their child's classmate and whether or not to attend funeral services.


"Be real open," Butzine suggested. "If a child seems interested in going to the funeral, then go. If not, it's important to find out what the child's fears are, and to help him or her experience the grieving process."

"There's no hard and fast rule," he continued. "Some children or parents may not be able to handle the tragedy. And some parents want their children to remember the person as they were when they were alive."

Sommers said last Tuesday, before Rachelle died, her classmates had painted three large paintings that were to be sent to the hospital to cheer her up.

Sommers said the paintings were beautiful and would be sent to the family. "It's so special to be available to the kids and have them share their feelings," she added.



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



Springfield Plains Elementary School lost its second young student in three years to a traffic accident on Dixie Highway in Springfield Township last week.

Seven year old Rachelle Bouchard, a second grader at the school died Tuesday, May 26, from injuries she sustained in a multi-car accident the previous Sunday.

Rachelle's mother, 37-year old Catherine Bouchard, was seriously injured with multiple fractures. The unborn child Mrs. Bouchard was carrying also died.

# Helping children deal with death

According to literature provided by Sommers, children under the age of five, have no concept of final. At six years old, children often think of death as a ghostly person to be outsmarted. By 10 years of age, children begin to understand the concept and even consider afterlife.

Children may ask the same question again and again. It expresses a child's need for reassurance with the confusion and fear.

Children are often greatly helped to accept death by saying good bye. It should be emphasized that people who are loved and cared about are kept in memories. Encourage ways in which this can be done.

Children grieve as adults do, but frequently act out feelings rather than expressing them verbally.

It is alright for parents and teachers to cry with children, and to express how difficult dealing with the loss is.

Children should be encouraged to talk about what happened, whether it be an illness, accident, suicide or other tragedy.

Support the children as they grieve. Sadness and anger will be the most obvious feelings expressed.

Young children are often boisterous or mischievious. Adolescents may be antisocial or truant. Grief is expressed differently by each paerson. While this behavior may seem inappropriate, it is normal.

It is easier for children to survive a loss when they receive prompt and accurate information about what has happened and are allowed to ask questions. The questions should be answered honestly and the children should be able to participate in family grieving. They also need the comforting presence of an adult they can rely on.



Mrs. Bouchard was driving southbound on Dixie Highway in a Ford Escort. The vehicle she hit had been rear-ended while it was stopped in the northbound lane to make a left hand turn, and was then pushed into her path.

Rachelle was transported to Pontiac Osetopathic Hospital and later transferred to the University of Michigan Hospital in Ann Arbor.

Her mother was taken to St. Joseph's Mercy Hospital in Pontiac.

Springfield Plains Elementary School principal Sharon Devereaux said in 1995 kindergartner Jesse Burch was killed in an automobile accident about a half-mile from the location of the Bouchards' accident.


The children planted a tree on school property in his honor, and Devereaux said it was a healing experience.

She said Rachelle's classmates have asked to plant a tree in her honor as well, and one child would also like each child to plant a tulip around the tree. Devereaux said the tree would be planted before school ends this spring.

Brownie Troop #729, of which Rachelle was a member, will plant a garden in memory of Rachelle, said troop leader Cathy Noble. She said the troop picked a garden because the girls wanted to be able to return regularly to maintain it.

Noble added Tuesday's funeral services at St. Daniel's Church were heart wrenching, but the outpouring of love and support from the community was very uplifting.

A spokesperson from St. Joseph's Mercy Hospital said a college trust fund for Catherine and Kevin Bouchards' daughter, Danielle, has been started. Danielle will enter kindergarten at Springfield Plains in the fall. "It's been a change in human nature," he said. "Ten years ago, not every other person was shaving and talking on the phone while they were driving. There appears to be far less awareness driving now than there was before."

Jarbo said he's had many customers talk to him in the store since the latest accident, wondering if anything was going to happen or what needs to be done to make the road more driveable.

"A lot of people that live north of here won't come to this store because you have to turn left to get out, and there's nowhere to go," he said. "They don't have the space to turn left, but a light here would really help out also."

Jarbo said he has support of other businesses along Dixie in the drive to get a light at the corner.

"They didn't want to get it started, but they said if I got the ball rolling, they would support me," he said.

some buildings in the past. The new ordinance would require tenants, like upstairs apartment dwellers above Clarkston Cafe, to leave their doors open when the landlord announced an inspection date.

Both he and Stone reported "horror stories," like newspapers and gasoline next to a faulty furnace.

Bad floor joists are just one example of what could go wrong, Wilson said. "Do you realize what would happen if the cafe was full of people and it decided to fall into the basement?" he said.

Former building owner Laurie Stern, who agreed with Wallace, said she felt landlords would be aware of their building problems. Stern, who owned 25 S. Main, saw a fire destroy the business of one of her tenants, The Chocolate Cabbage, several years ago. The cause of the blaze was never determined, she said.



# Late-inning heroics lead to district title

The busiest people in Clarkston Sunday may have been the cardiologists, checking many varsity softball parents and fans after a pair of dramatic district games Saturday at Lapeer West.

The varsity softball team won twice in its last atbat, 4-2 over Lake Orion and 6-4 over Lapeer West, to earn its first district championship since 1987, and the first under coach Al Land.

A familiar foe awaits the Wolves in regionals, as Waterford Kettering advanced in its own district, defeating Rochester Adams 5-4. Clarkston went 1-2 against the Captains this season, winning 5-4 on the road, and losing 10-6 and 13-3 in two losses that can be seen as aberrations in an otherwise outstanding season for Clarkston.

The Wolves and Captains square off at 10 a.m. at Port Huron High School. The winner takes on the winner of the New Baltimore Anchor Bay-Romeo game in the regional finals at 1 p.m.

"Nothing can stop us now," declared four-year veteran Tiffany Honey. "We were in a slump to end the season, but we knew we were a better team than that, and it showed today."

"We're looking forward to getting our revenge on Kettering," said junior catcher Corinne McIntyre.

The Wolves, 24-13 overall, became the latest version of the cardiac kids in the district tournament. In the finals against Lapeer West, the team played a backand-forth game before McIntyre became the hero.

With Clarkston in a 4-4 tie in the bottom of the sixth, McIntyre slammed a double to left field, driving in freshman Mary Warchuck and senior Carmen Lund to provide the district-winning runs for the Wolves.


"That's just what I expect from Corinne," Land said. "She has so much power, and she's struggled to get that back since her (hand) injury. But getting a hit like that at that time really helped the team and will help her as well."

"I had been working on my swing all week, and it finally paid off for me," McIntyre said. "My swing just wasn't coming around in the beginning (of the season), but I just kept working at it."

Although the win over Lapeer West gave the team the wooden state-of-Michigan-shaped trophy, it was the 10-inning win over Lake Orion that was the most dramatic of the day.

The Dragons entered districts with a No. 3 state ranking and a pitcher - Mary Connor - headed to the University of Michigan on a softball scholarship next year. Orion held a 7-0 decision over the Wolves earlier in the season, but this was a different Clarkston team on the field this day.

Land said speed and skill of the players were the reasons for the substitutions.



#### Baseball

I was impressed with the way this team went about winning its first district title since 1993. The guys were pumped up, but they didn't get too high. They went about their business and dispatched a pair of overwhelmed teams.

Watching this team all season, you can see the growth in many ways. The offense has become more consistent, and not only are players like Eric Jenks, Spencer Hynes, Jared Thomas and Chris Mitchell consistently contributing, but other players like Mike Little, Derek Casper and John Drallos have stepped up to deliver key base hits.

Little doesn't always start, but he keeps the team pumped up from the bench, and always seems to come through with a hit when he gets up to the plate. He even called his shot, homering against Troy Athens earlier this season. Casper has always been a solid defensive catcher, but Saturday, he was hitting the ball all over the place. He went 2-for-3 with two runs batted in in the district finals against Lapeer West. Both of his hits

that brought the team the trophy.

I just hope CHS assistant principal and former Kettering coach Jan Meagher knows who to cheer for. "My only comment is, I can't lose,"she said with a smile.



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

# 'The sky is the limit for this team'

Drallos confident for regionals after baseball wins first district title since 1993

Retiring varsity baseball coach Roy Warner received a fine farewell performance from his team Saturday, but don't pull them off the stage just yet.

The Wolves captured their first district championship in five years thanks to a 7-3 win over Lapeer West at Lapeer West High School. Up next in the regional semifinals is top-ranked Rochester. The game is set for 12:30 p.m. at Port Huron High School. The other semifinal pits New Baltimore Anchor Bay and Utica Ford II. The regional finals are set for 3 p.m.

Warner, who's been at the helm of Clarkston baseball for 29 years, said it felt good that the team is taking some hardware home in his final season.

"This is a good way to end it," he said. "I'm happy for this team, because they've worked hard for this all year long."

Junior infielder John Drallos personified the team's confidence level heading into regionals.

"We're going to shock the world," he said. "The sky is the limit for this team. We came here knowing we were the best team and that we should win the district. It just feels so good."

Senior pitcher Josh Clark, who won a 12-2 decision over Lake Orion in the day's first game and tossed two innings in the finals, said the team wanted to win the district for the man they affectionately refer to as "Pops."

"It means more to me and the team that we can win

it for him," he said, referring to Warner. "We want to do it for him, but you know what? We're not done yet."

Rochester is certianly a major roadblock in anyone's path through the state playoffs. The Falcons feature five future Division I college players, and have the deepest pitching staff and deepest hitting lineup in the state. The Falcons were ranked as high as No. 2 in the nation during the season, and are the defending Division I state champions. The last time the two teams

played, Clarkston hung right with the Falcons, losing 6-2 and 13-5 in a pair of very competitive games at Clintonwood Park.

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"We're just taking it one game at a time," Warner said about regionals. "There are only good teams left at this point in the tournament. If we play with no mistakes, we should be able to feel good about ourselves."

The team had every reason to feel good about itself after its dominating games in districts. Clarkston used a four-run second-inning explosion against the Panthers to provide all the offense it needed. Sophomore catcher Derek Casper capped his best day at the plate of the season with a two-run single with the bases loaded that broke the game open in the second inning.



In his next at-bat, after West had closed to within 4-3, he slammed a ground-rule double that brought Clark home to give the team an important two-run lead. Jared Thomas and Nick Upchurch also drove in runs in the title-winning game for the Wolves (18-10-1 overall).

Clark came in the game as a relief pitcher and worked his way out of a bases loaded, one-out jam in the fourth. He struck out five of the eight batters he faced in his 2 1/3 innings pitched. Sophomore Chris Mitchell closed the door in the seventh for Clarkston.

In game one, Clarkston ran away from Lake Orion and was never challenged. The Wolves blew up for six runs in the third inning, sending 10 batters to the plate in the process. Mitchell had the big hit in the inning, socking a double to left with the bases loaded to give Clarkston a 4-0 lead before the dew dried up on the outfield grass. Casper and Clark also drive in runs in the inning.

Clark pitched all seven innings in the win, while the Dragons used five pitchers in trying to slow down Clarkston's offense. It was futile.



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

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

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

#### **OF MOLES AND MELANOMA**

While dermatologists have long suspected a link between moles and melanoma, new research has established a relationship be-tween the number of moles and melanoma risk. The study, conducted by the Na-tional Cancer Institute and Harvard Medical School, involved more than 1,700 patients, nearly half\_of whom had melanoma. Researchers found that those with one abnormal mole had a twofold risk for melanoma, while those with ten or more moles had 12 times the risk. Moles were la-beled "abnormal" if they were larger than 6 millimeters in size (a standard pencil eraser is 6mm), flat, partly flat, and had two or more of the following characteristics: variable pigmentation, asymmetrical outline, and indistinct borders.



# Storm knocks out power, downs lines through area

Many Clarkston-area residents woke up Sunday morning to screaming winds and horizontal rain.

The storm lasted just a couple of hours, but the damage was done. Many trees were uprooted and several power lines were torn down, closing some heavily used roads in the area.

The Independence Township Fire Department recieved nearly two dozen calls regarding downed power lines, mostly in the northeastern part of the township. Roads that had downed power lines were: Maybee at Sashabaw, Ellis, Clarkston, Sashabaw, Shelley, Sunnyside, E. Washington, Marysue, Oak Park, West Circle, Pelton, Eastlawn, Pine Knob, Shappie, Sun Valley, Dvorak, Cramline, Iroquois, Tuscorora, Horseshoe Circle, and White Lake.

Gar Wilson, Independence Township Fire Chief, said the biggest problem his personnel had to deal with were the number of downed lines and transformers that caught fire.

"We had three crews out just to clear trees off the roads," he said. "We had to shut three roads down because primary lines were hot."

Primary lines are those that could have power running through them and are open on one end. Wilson explained that some people were trapped in their homes because downed primary lines surrounded the house.

Wilson said Clarkston Road, part of Maybee Road, and Waldon were all shut down for periods of time Sunday morning because of the lines. The fire department's main responsibility was to keep the area clear so Detroit Edison workers could come out, shut

off the power and remove the lines from the roads.

"The best thing to do is to just stay away from them," Wilson said. "Some of our guys could even feel their feet tingling when they walked near the hot lines. You just can't trust those hot lines."

Edison said there were still around 19,000 customers in Oakland County without power Monday, but most of that was to be restored within 12-24 hours.

The National Weather Service stated that wind gusts in the Clarkston area reached as high as 86 miles per hour Sunday morning. The wind, rain and lightning caused at least one person to change their plans for the day

"I was supposed to go golfing up in Goodrich with some of the other chiefs," Wilson said. "But when I woke up, saw the rain going sideays and the lightning, I knew I wouldn't be doing that."







Clarkston Road resident Bulah Anderson watched this willow tree fall across the road from her home, just west of Sashabaw. The tree fell about 7:10 a.m., said Anderson, and left her without power until later that afternoon.



Sunday morning's storm brought down a 100-foot tree behind the home of Dan and D'ann Colombo on E. Washington in the city. The tree fell on electrical wires, and the Colombos called the Independence Township Fire Department. D'ann said firefighters arrived within 10 minutes and disconnected their power. "Edison cut the tree in half last night (Monday) to release the wires and restored our power." The Colombos' chimney was also damaged when the tree fell.
