TCI Cable deal is scrutinized at public hearing

The future of TCI in Clarkston may be walking a cable line tightrope.

Last Thursday's public hearing for TCI Cablevision of Oakland County drew only a handful of local residents — who mainly voiced complaints over the franchise's current service.

The hearing, taped by employees of TCI's local cable access studio, was designed to be a two-fold. First, TCI officials presented a slide-show overview of various operations and costs, followed by a public forum in which city and township residents were invited to ask questions and comment.

"We want public input on performance and suggestions on improvements," township supervisor Dale Stuart told the audience.

Currently there are no other cable television providers competing for customers in Clarkston and Independence Township. Stuart said perhaps they feel Clarkston doesn't have the demographics.

"I'm not sure what the reason is for not approaching us," he said.

It's unlikely the township and city will enter into another 15-year contract. They may opt for a shorter-term agreement.

Two reasons are dissatisfaction with performance and the fact that TCI is not keeping pace with advances in technology. For example, according to TCI general manager John McNeel of the Royal Oak office, Clarkston will not receive cable Internet service for at least 18 to 20 months.

"There are too many things TCI should have done that haven't been done," Stuart said. "And changing technology makes it difficult to agree to a contract that only goes so far, when we know the future is changing so rapidly. It's been very obvious they have not gone out of their way for the highest improvements in their area."

The hearing was part of a performance review for renewal of the 15-year-old contract, which expired this spring and is currently being extended on a month-to-month basis.

During the presentation McNeel elaborated on the dips and increases subscribers have seen in recent years.

"Over the last three years we've been pretty stable, having minimal rate increases," he said, adding they've been partly due to "adding channels."

But some residents said they'd like to see channels that aren't part of the current lineup.

"Being a Godzilla fan, we don't have the Sci-Fi channel," said David Wagner, a Wellesley resident.

Others who voiced concerns before TCI and the local Cablecasting Board included Hawksmoor resident Cary Melone, who tried unsuccessfully to get TCI

'She was a very classy lady and had a lot of friends' Morning fire claims life of Clarkston resident

Longtime Clarkston resident Doris Gould, 85, lost her life in a fire at her Deer Lake Road home July 14.

She was found by firefighters shortly after 10 a.m. in her bedroom. The fire, which started in an electrical socket that shorted out in the kitchen, had been going on for almost 90 minutes before neighbors noticed smoke billowing from windows and called 9-1-1.

Independence Township Fire Chief Gar Wilson said the department received the call at 9:59 a.m. and immediately responded to the scene. By the time they arrived, the fire had caused significant structural damage to four rooms and had moved into the attic of the single-story home.

Around 20 firefighters fought the blaze for 45 minutes. Autopsy results were not known at press time, but Wilson said, "everything points to it being smoke inhalation."

Wilson said Gould's son spoke to her between 8:15 and 8:30 that morning to remind her of an appointment.

"Between that call and the one we received a 9:59 is when all the damage was done," Wilson said.

Wilson said he knew Gould from plowing her driveway free of snow a few years ago. He described the 30 to 40-year Clarkston resident as "always a very nice woman." She was the first area resident to die in a house fire in over 10 years, said Wilson.

Funeral services were Friday at St. Daniel Parish. Gould was a longtime member of St. Dan's and a member of the 50 And-Up Club, said Arline Moore, Christian Service Coordinator for St. Dan's.

"She was a very outgoing lady and fun to be with," said Moore. "She attended mass every day when she could."

Moore added she was very courageous; wanted to continue to do things on her own, and enjoyed being part of the regular activities of the 50 And-Up Club.

Gould painted a picture of the Blessed Virgin Mary and donated it to one of St. Dan's bazaars. It was purchased by the late Rose Kaltz, also a member of St. Dan's. Moore said Kaltz hung it in her bedroom so she could look at it everyday from her bed.

"She was a very classy lady and had a lot of friends. People will remember her for her deep faith, her love for her family and the good things she did," said Moore.

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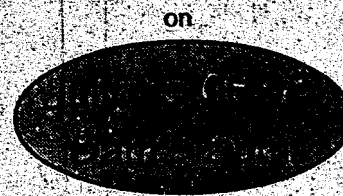

Writing a future for themselves

Young writers learn to perfect their craft

Six area students have decided at the young ages of nine through twelve, they want to be writers when they grow up.

Along with about 80 other Oakland County students who enjoy writing, they've spent the last two weeks at a writing camp learning how to improve their skills.

Oakland Schools Camp for Young Writers, in its sixth year, is open to students in grades three through eight. It's an offshoot of the Oakland Writing Project, a four-week intensive writing workshop for teachers.

The camp's director is Howard Wright, a fifth-grade teacher at Clarkston's Bailey Lake Elementary School.

The experience does two things for young writers, said Wright. "It gives kids who like to write a place to go and a chance to work with top notch language arts teachers."

Wright said increased importance in MEAP writing scores led to the need to focus on writing in schools at an earlier age. "Teachers knew it was important a long time ago. Now everyone else does too."

The camp combines classroom work and field trips. One group of fifth graders attended the McMath-Hulbert Observatory in Lake Angelus, while other students attended the Detroit Institute of Arts (DIA).

Stacie Lee, 12, an Oxford Middle School student, was one of the students who visited the DIA. She said after their trip the students wrote stories describing the paintings they saw at the museum.

"One of the things we've learned is to write better snapshots — to zoom in on an object and describe in detail what it is," she said. About the writer's camp in general, Stacie said, "I like being with a group of people

who like the same things I do."

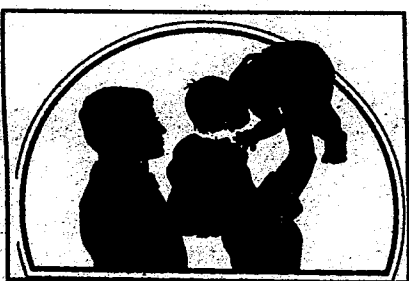

Jennifer Tucker is the new parks & rec director of Springfield Township.

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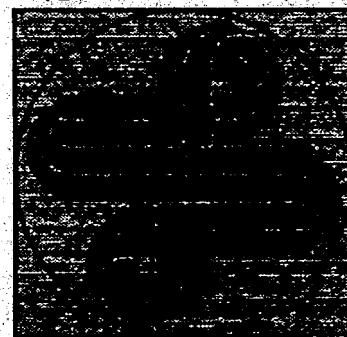

It all began in the spring of 1997, when Andersonville Elementary teacher Kay Robertson (who retired this year) incorporated a language arts

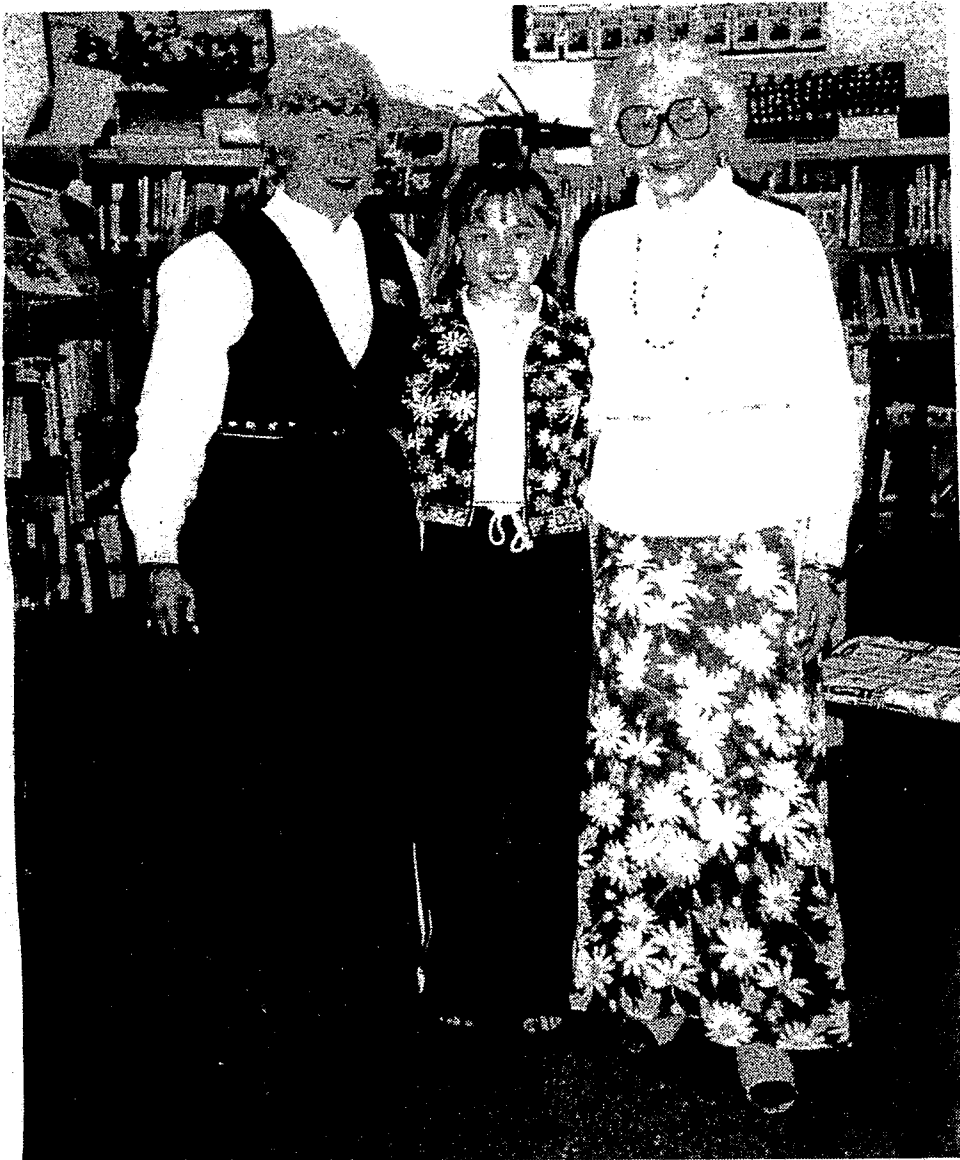
writing project for her students into get well letters for her friend Daisy, who had been ill.

The letters helped Daisy get well and she made a visit to the fourth grade students to thank them.

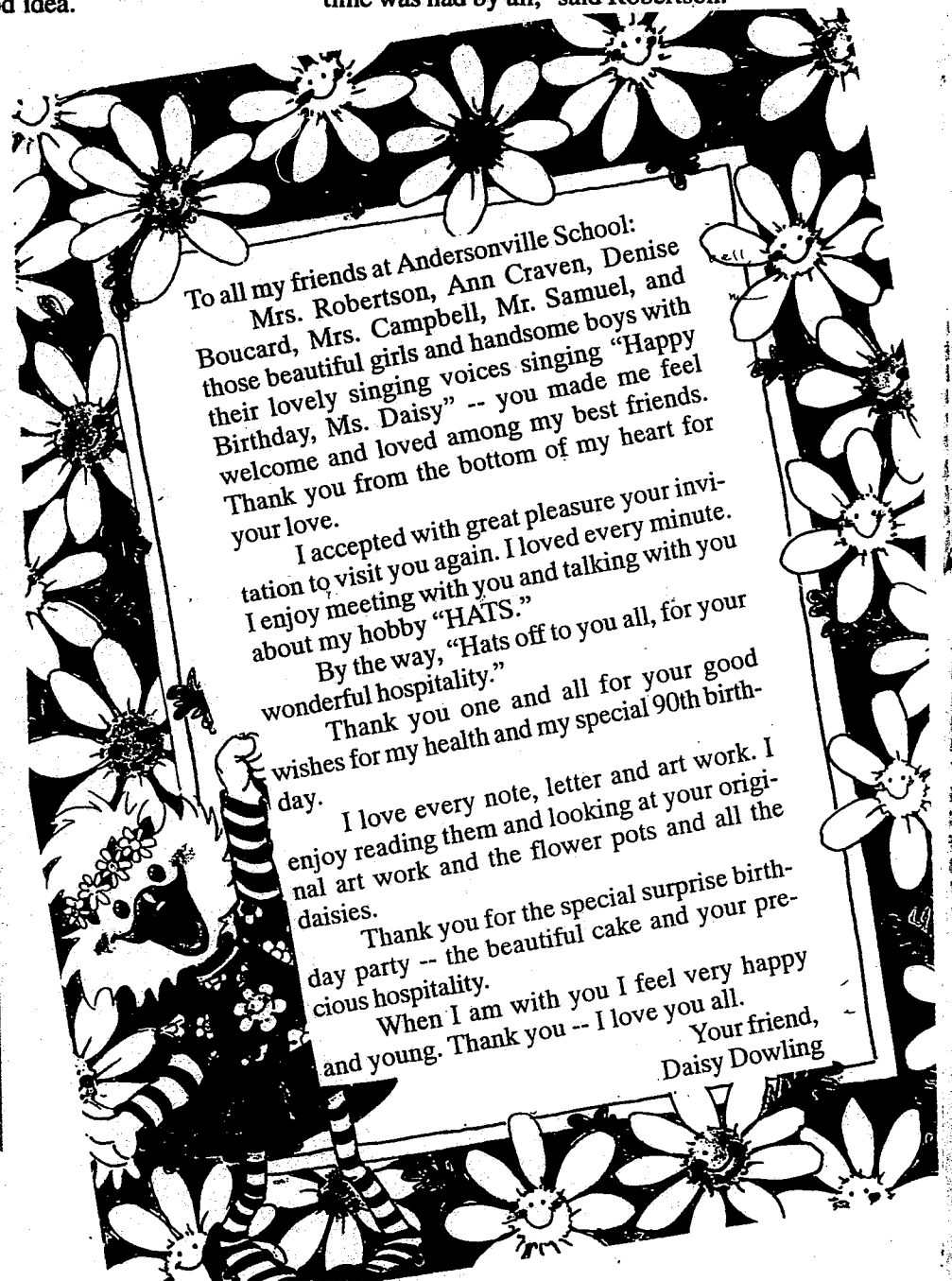

More Burma Shave signs of their times

Last week Jottings covered the beginning of Burma Shave signs, those 5 and 6 sign limericks that entertained U. S. motorists from 1926 to 1963.

Rod Charles loaned us this book, "The Verse By The Side of The Road," written by the grandson of the founder of Burma Shave.

HE HAD THE RING / HE HAD THE FLAT / BUT SHE FELT HIS CHIN / AND THAT WAS THAT.

The Odells who owned the Burma Shave company wouldn't use any off-color or scatological jingles. That's why this one didn't make the highway: LISTEN, BIRD / THESE SIGNS COST / MONEY / SO ROOST A WHILE / BUT DON'T GET FUNNY.

This one, too, was vetoed: MY MAN / WON'T SHAVE / SEZ HAZEL HUZ / BUT I SHOULD WORRY / DORA'S DOES.

Boy-girl jingles were near the core of the most memorable Burma Shave verses: SAID JULIET / TO ROMEO / IF YOU DON'T SHAVE / GO HOME.

And: WITH / A SLEEK CHEEK / PRESSED TO HERS / JEEPERS! CREEPERS! / HOW SHE PURRS.

A record of persistent failure with females might account for this: TO GET / AWAY FROM / HAIRY APES / LADIES JUMP / FROM FIRE ESCAPES.

The Odells devoted many signs to highway safety: DON'T TAKE / A CURVE / AT 60 PER / WE HATE TO LOSE / A CUSTOMER.

The first public safety signs came in 1935: KEEP WELL / TO THE RIGHT / OF THE ONCOMING CAR / GET YOUR CLOSE SHAVES / FROM THE

HALF-POUND JAR.

Clinton Odell was especially strong on the public safety messages. Of the 21 new jingles in 1939, six were for safety: PAST / SCHOOLHOUSES / TAKE IT SLOW / LET THE LITTLE / SHAVERS GROW.

AT CROSSROADS / DON'T JUST / TRUST TO LUCK / THE OTHER CAR / MAY BE A TRUCK.

And: HER CHARIOT / RACED AT 80 PER / THEY HAULED AWAY / WHAT HAD / BEN HUR.

From 1955: SLOW DOWN, PA / SAKES ALIVE / MA MISSES SIGNS FOUR / AND FIVE.

The sign numbers grew to 7,000 sets, 40,000 signs from Maine to Texas. 20 to 25 new jingles were installed regularly to replace others. Signs were not put in Arizona, New Mexico and Nevada because of sparse population, and Massachusetts because of too many winding roads.

Odells tried 1-liners - GOOD TO THE LAST STROOP - but not many.

They overcame objections from English teachers who didn't like: NO LADY LIKES / TO DANCE / OR DINE / ACCOMPANIED BY / A PORCUPINE.

February 7, 1963 the Burma-Vita Company was sold to Philip Morris, Inc. In 1964 a Burma Shave sign went up at the Smithsonian in Washington: WITHIN THIS VALE / OF TOIL / AND SIN / YOUR HEAD GROWS BALD / BUT NOT YOUR CHIN.

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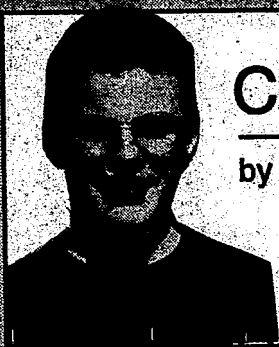

Investors are returning

Most people wouldn't tackle a car repair or home improvement project themselves. They know it's worth the money to leave those jobs to the professionals.

Now, more people are realizing the value of professional investing help, too.

A recent article in The Wall Street Journal revealed that a number of traditionally "no-load" mutual fund groups are adding load funds, or converting their no-load funds into load funds. Load funds are offered through financial professionals, who charge a commission or fee for their services. Investors can buy no-loads, however, directly from the fund companies and avoid paying an up-front fee.

Why the return to load funds? One reason may be that investors have larger sums to invest. According to the article, this money is coming from inheritances, the long bull market and distributions from 401(k) retirement plans. In addition, many of today's investors are older and have more complex financial problems. With more money and more complicated finances, investors are hesitant to make investment decisions completely on their own and are more willing to enlist professional help.

Such help not only puts investors at ease, it may even result in better returns, according to one study. Dalbar Financial Services conducted a comparison of load and no-load mutual funds and found that investors who bought funds through financial professionals often achieved better returns than do-it-yourselfers.

During the period studied (the beginning of 1984 through Sept. 30, 1993), Dalbar found that the average sales force-distributed mutual fund achieved an annual growth rate of 6.82 percent, compared to 5.61 percent for funds marketed directly to the public. This equates to total returns over the period of 90.21 percent for the load funds vs. 70.23 percent for the no-load funds.

Part of the reason for this difference appears to be that investors who use professional help are less likely to trade in and out of funds. The more an investor buys and sells, the lower the potential return.

Apparently, more people are discovering what successful investors have known all along. An investment professional not only can help you buy the right investment for your needs, he or she also can help you stick to your long-term objectives, hold on through short-term volatility and even achieve better returns.

CIVIL VS. CRIMINAL LAW

One of the things that differentiates civil wrongs from criminal actions is that the latter are considered to have been committed against society, as well as the victim. In such cases, either physical or emotional injury will be the cause for one party to sue another for compensation. The intended result is to return the injured party back to his or her original position. Therefore, while criminal law concerns itself with prevention, punishment, and rehabilitation, the law of torts intends to compensate an injured party (usually monetarily).

to respond to a new cable line, left unburied since January. By spring, he finally realized workers weren't coming. Fearing it might be severed by a lawnmower, "We did it ourselves."

Timber Cove resident George Bombyk said he has been waiting nearly 2 1/2 years to be hooked up to TCI. "I couldn't get the cable company to bring the cable across the street and hook it into my house."

When he called the company he was told it wasn't "in the budget and construction plan," even though a

neighbor down the road received installment right away. "I'd like cable but I'd like a reliable company to put it in for me," Bombyk complained.

Others had negative comments about customer service, which TCI officials agreed was not up to par—even though customer sales and service manager Janice Frelitz said TCI's goal is "to answer calls within 30 seconds, 90 percent of the time."

Pointing to a recent incident in which he tried to correct a billing problem, Wagner complained, "The shortest time I was on (hold) was 10 minutes. The longest amount of time I was on (hold) was 45 minutes."

Michael Gay, a Michigan State University student who previously worked as an intern at Clarkston's cable access studio, said he was worried what would happen to the studio if TCI were no longer the provider. Gay helped develop a local news program, still running on Channel 65.

"I definitely think public access needs to stay ... We don't want to lose that," he said, explaining that local residents have come to depend on and enjoy the news program and other studio-produced shows.

He received support from Melone. "I agree with the importance of what local access brings to the community. It does have a lot of value and it would be a shame to lose it," he said.

Frelitz said TCI is attempting to improve its customer service and other areas where there are problems. TCI employees, for example, recently received an increase in hourly wages, from \$7.88 to \$9.50 per hour.

During a phone interview Frelitz said Clarkston-

area subscribers, like all 90,000 customers from North Oakland County, pay \$10.55 per month for Basic Cable (21 channels) and \$26.51 for Cable Plus, which adds 28 more. That doesn't include converters, remotes, premium channels and a "variety package" that sells for \$2.58 and gives you the Disney, Weather, USA and American Movie Classics channels.

And then there's digital service (another \$10 a month) that—with the added cost of a special converter—provides a whopping 88 channels, including Sci-Fi and History. The total package? At most, Clarkston subscribers can expect to pay nearly \$40 a month, Frelitz said.

Meanwhile, Stuart said another public hearing may be held before the city and township finalize a new contract with TCI. He wasn't happy with the low turnout July 16.

"I'm disappointed there weren't more people who wanted to be a part of the process," he said. In order to gather more input, Stuart is asking residents to address written comments, in care of the township, to P.O. Box 69, Clarkston, MI 48347. Surveys will also be sent out with cable bills this fall.

Stuart said negotiations are continuing. "It's a process that takes some time," he said, adding that the board expects to have a new contract by the end of the year.

The taped public hearing will be broadcast on local public access Channel 65, Tuesdays at 6:30 p.m. and Fridays at 8 p.m., over the next few weeks. Dates are July 24, 28 and 31 and August 4 and 7.

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

Clarkston groups reap benefits from United Way funding

The following programs will receive funding:

Clarkston Area Youth Assistance, \$2,000, to offer one on one tutoring assistance to disadvantaged and at risk Clarkston area youth.

Campfire Boys and Girls, \$469, for its Char-

acter Counts! At Day Care program. Beverly French, Campfire Community Outreach director explains that character education is currently not taught in day care situations. This program is a series of six activity based lessons in trustworthiness, respect, responsibility, fairness, caring and citizenship to help 100 kindergartners develop and strengthen personal character.

Clarkston Area Optimists, \$2,000, for Youth Assisting Youth, a one day event designed to prepare students making the transition from elementary school to middle school. *In a park setting, children will discuss peer pressure, drug and alcohol abuse prevention and will learn what it takes to be a strong, successful middle school student.* Junior Optimists from the high school

will lead the discussions and in turn will learn leadership skills.

Clarkston Community Schools, \$3,531, for its Conflict Resolution Program at Springfield Plains Elementary School. This program will train teachers and school staff in how to teach life-long conflict resolution skills to elementary school students. Teachers receive a newsletter, classroom materials such as posters and videotapes and handbooks.

Oakland Livingston Human Service Agency, \$2,000, for Senior Services. This project will provide safety devices such as bars in the bath tub, first aid kits, smoke detectors and other resource and safety

(NAPS)—Psychiatrists and other medical scientists have developed a new generation of medications that can help nearly 75 percent of people who suffer from schizophrenia, one of the most devastating and misunderstood mental illnesses.

"Research continues," said Steven M. Mirin, M.D., Medical Director of the American Psychiatric Association. "Still newer medicines are in the pipeline that promise to be even more effective while producing fewer of the negative side effects common to some of the older medications."

Schizophrenia is a brain disease that usually strikes between the ages of 18 and 25. Contrary to popular myth, schizophrenia does not cause "split" personalities. It is characterized by hallucinations, delusions, distorted thinking and dulled emotions.

In remembrance . . .

Local women raise suicide awareness at Washington rally

Denise Bullock wears a picture of the handsome young man on her T-shirt proudly. It's a reminder of her gentle 18-year-old son Billy, who loved both pets and people.

But it's a different picture than the one envisioned by those who don't understand suicide. Some picture suicide victims as "the back-alley drunk," Denise, 46, said. "They're surprised when they find the good-looking guy on my shirt is my son."

According to national statistics, over 31,000 people in the U.S. take their lives each year. Denise is one of hundreds who have lost loved ones to suicide. And she, like others, wants to do something about it. That's why she took part in a spring rally in Washington, designed to raise public awareness that suicide is indeed a national health concern.

On April 13, Denise and four other members of a local suicide survivors support group, run by aftercare coordinator Kathy Garwood of Donelson Johns and Evans Funeral Home, traveled to Washington D.C. for the one-day event.

There, on the steps of our nation's Capitol, they joined other groups representing nearly 28 states, who brought their own "Lifekeeper Memory Quilts" — a concept developed by fellow survivor Sandy Martin, a Clarkston, Georgia resident who lost her only child to suicide.

Like the picture on her shirt, Billy is immortalized in a quilt that commemorates the lives of men and women who were once vibrant members of society. The individual squares, sewed together free of charge by Clarkston resident Sue Learmont, are a way to keep the memory of loved ones alive.

Instead of focusing on their deaths, it celebrates life. But the quilt is also a reminder that they aren't here anymore — and that something should be done to reduce the tragic numbers.

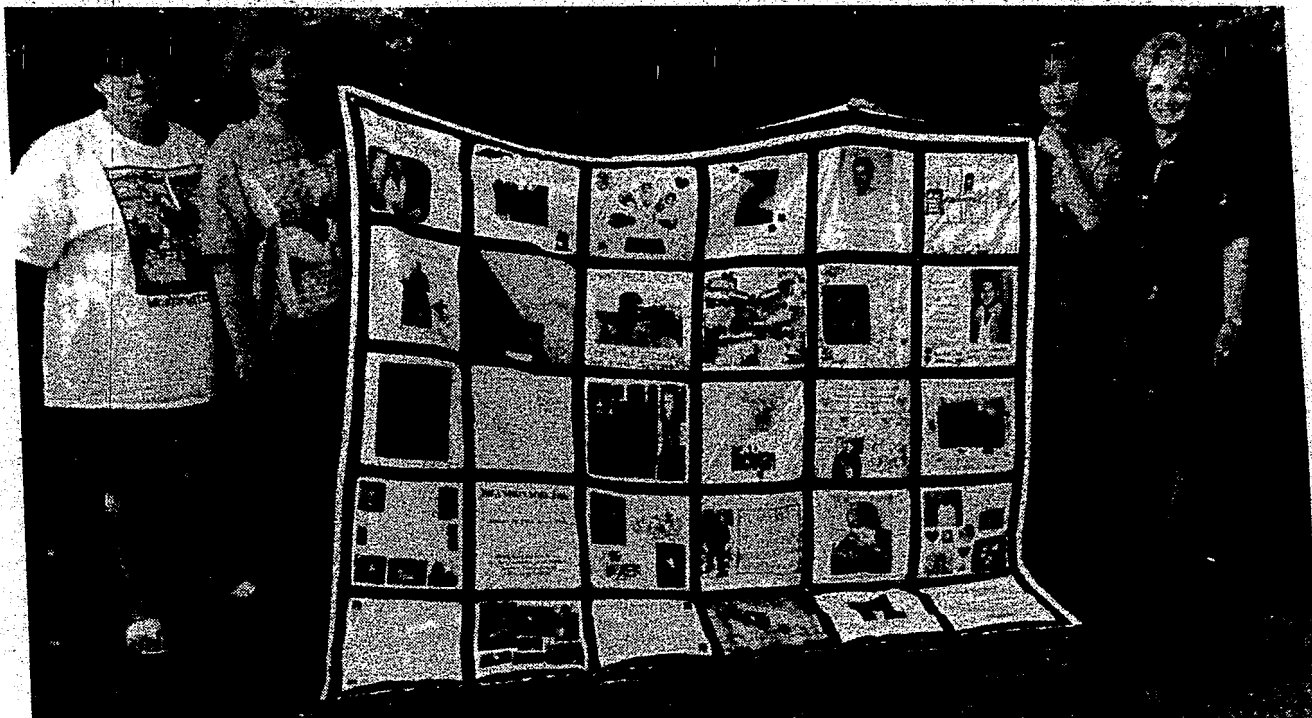
Other local residents who attended (loved ones they lost are in parentheses) include Glenna Buehler (son Justin Gschwender), Christine Eluskie (boyfriend Dave), Kellie Hett (brother Jim Rock) and Kathy Gage (sister Judy O'Brien).

Some of the women took part in a panel discussion on suicide hosted by Garwood in January. The event was broadcast on Clarkston's local cable channel.

The Washington event was held in conjunction with Suicide Prevention Advocacy Network's (SPAN) Third Annual National Awareness Day, spearheaded by U.S. Sen. Harry Reid (D-Nevada), who has taken the lead in the Senate when it comes to raising national awareness.

"It is disturbing to think that 31,000 people take their own lives every year," Reid, who lost his own father to suicide, said in a press release. "And that does not include the 200,000 family members and friends who are affected by suicide. These numbers alone are cause for action."

Reid is trying to establish a suicide prevention research center within the nation's Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, which would deal with preven-

tion and research.

"The Senate has already passed a resolution (#84), proclaiming suicide as a national health problem," Garwood said. "What we're trying to do is get another resolution passed by the House (#212)."

Many of the men and women who attended the event delivered personal letters to House and Senate officials, urging them to develop a bill, she said.

A press conference scheduled by Dr. David Satcher, U.S. Surgeon General, preceded the display on the steps. "We feel he's really going to push for this. He's not going to let it die," Garwood said.

In his speech, Satcher remarked that much is being done to curb the suicide rates, for example, treating people who experience mental illness. Various treatments include psychiatric drugs, psychotherapy and emotional support. "But we can and must do more," Satcher said.

"We believe that by establishing an effective national prevention program, we can save the lives of thousands of persons at risk for suicidal behavior,"

Satcher said. "We can spread the word that there is hope for those who have lost hope, and it may just save the life of someone we know and love."

Garwood said, "I think people have to be aware it can happen to you. There has to be recognition, prevention, awareness. We have to bring it to the public's attention that it is a national tragedy... that we can't keep our heads in the sand and deny that it is."

"The more you talk about it, the more publicity you get," agreed Kellie Hett, 33, who lost her brother Jim. "The more you keep talking about it, the more people will want to listen."

Denise said sharing in the support group, and with those who attended the Washington event, helps her deal with her grief over the loss of her son, who suffered from manic depression. "Though the pain of

losing him will never go away, it's comforting to talk to others. And it's important for them to know suicide can happen even in the best families, even when on the outside everything seems bright and rosy.

"It's one of the main reasons to get suicide out of the closet. On top of it's so much to bear, you have the stigma," Denise said. "Like cancer, AIDS, they see it happens to nice, normal people."

Christine Eluskie, 31, said the awareness has helped her as well. She lost her former boyfriend to suicide and still feels guilty, even though she couldn't have done anything to prevent it. She recently broke up with another boyfriend. Her reaction was almost involuntary — a fear that something might happen to him too, even though there's no comparison. "I can't begin to tell you all the support I'm getting from my family."

The Washington group participated in a variety of events, including a candle-lighting ceremony in memory of loved ones. The dreary weather seemed fitting and significant. "The candles never went out in the pouring rain," Garwood said.

Several members said their families witnessed the event on C-SPAN, The Today Show and other TV news broadcasts. The national FOX channel taped the Clarkston group and sent the video home.

Garwood said "you could just feel the energy" of everyone standing with their quilts on the Capitol steps.

Kellie said that's when she was struck by the impact — She was taking part in a real demonstration.

"It really didn't hit me until I was standing at the top of the steps and they were reading the names (of the victims) from our states ... I was standing up for something I believe in and it was really powerful. It was emotional but it was just so positive."

Denise agreed. "There was such a great feeling of fellowship. You looked in each other's eyes and you knew each other because you'd been through the same hell."

She also felt uplifted. "The whole idea for the service (and quilt) was to not have them see Billy as a darkly depressed person, but one who loved life. He tried to do everything to make it work. Those are the things I try to think about now."

When people see the quilt, "It makes it real," she said.

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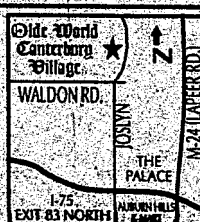

Super Bowl pick: Jacksonville 38, Tampa Bay 17.

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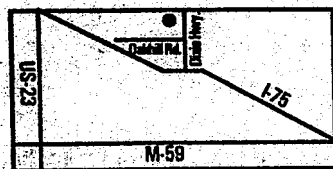
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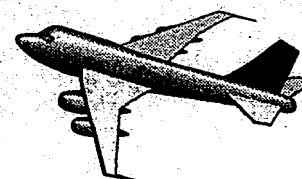
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A whole new world

Sheila Hill will be spending her summer vacation on the other side of the globe.

The bubbly Clarkston High School student is looking forward to a six-week stay in New Zealand, made possible through the Youth For Understanding International Exchange program, which allows students to live in other countries.

Sheila said the opportunity to visit a foreign country sounded like something she'd really like to do. "Cause I went to England with our marching band and I just adored it ... It just kind of opens your small-town eyes to see how other people live."

Although her parents are paying most of the expenses, which are costly, Sheila decided to try and raise some of the money herself. She stapled notes to grocery bags and left them on people's doorsteps,

asking for bottle donations. On the deadline day for pickup, she found many people had contributed.

She feels very lucky and thankful to have raised \$350, which will come in handy for spending money.

Already, the 16-year-old is excited about the family she'll stay with, the Rasmussen's, who live in the capital city, Wellington. They have three daughters; the youngest, Jennah, is her own age. They've been writing and sending faxes.

"They're going to take me skiing on a volcano and whale watching ... I got stuck with the nicest family, I think."

Ever since she found out she was selected for the program, Sheila has been scanning the Internet and reading, hoping to learn more about the country she'll visit. She decided upon New Zealand because YFU told her it's very different.

This time of year it's winter, although the average 60 degree temperatures sound pretty good to Sheila,

who loves the snow and winter sports. "They told me to bring my woolies," she laughs. "It's warm 'cause they're near the equator, but it gets cold because they're around Antarctica."

Sheila also learned New Zealanders rarely eat packaged food (most items are fresh) and kids go to school all year round.

"I'll be getting out of school just in time to go to school," she quips.

In some ways life in New Zealand is very similar. In a letter, Jennah sounds just as effervescent as American girls. Her sentences are punctuated with exclamation points when she talks about Fiona Apple, South Park, McDonald's, pizza and chocolate.

"She's very perky," Sheila admits. "They don't have much candy, so Jennah says make sure to bring

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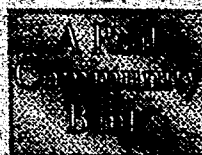

Geoff Denstaedt has already had a taste of Japan as a language student at Clarkston High School.

But the CHS junior is expanding that knowledge into the real world with a trip to the overseas country this summer.

The Clarkston resident was a 1998 recipient of the prestigious Japan-America Friendship Scholars Program, administered by the Youth For Understanding International Exchange program. He was chosen from over 220 applicants nationwide, selected on the

basis of written essays, teacher recommendations and personal interviews.

Geoff has participated in a variety of activities in and out of school, including track, marching band, Youth In Government, and Boy Scouts. He feels the YFU experience will help him plan his future, said his mother Linda Denstaedt.

"It's a great program and it gives kids a great opportunity," Linda said. "He's going into international business or international law. When he decided to go to Japan, it really was with an eye to a future career."

Since his arrival, Geoff has participated in an orientation course at the Olympic Memorial Center in Tokyo. As part of that group, he also visited with top officials in the Japanese government before leaving to join his volunteer host family.

He's happy with the choice, remarked Linda. "They have a dog. He's always wanted one, so he gets to have a dog for the summer."

Geoff phones his parents to keep in touch, and to find out what's happening on the home front. "His first call was to find out if the Wings had won," she said with a laugh.

YFU was established in 1951 as a non-profit educational organization devoted to broadening high school students' horizons through foreign exchange programs. Today, it operates programs in 62 countries.

Judy Abraham of the regional YFU office in Bridgeport said the summer sojourns really stretch kids' personal experiences.

"While they're staying in these other cultures and learning about them, they're also out of their normal support system so they have to really look within themselves. It's a real personal growth experience they don't get in any other way."

It can also be a starting point for new challenges, she added, "for helping a person decide, 'Hey, I really want to study a foreign language, international business or law.' And this is their first taste."

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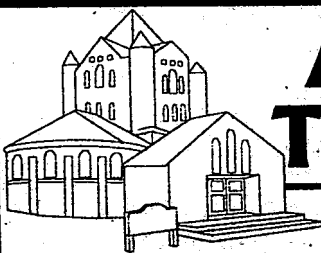

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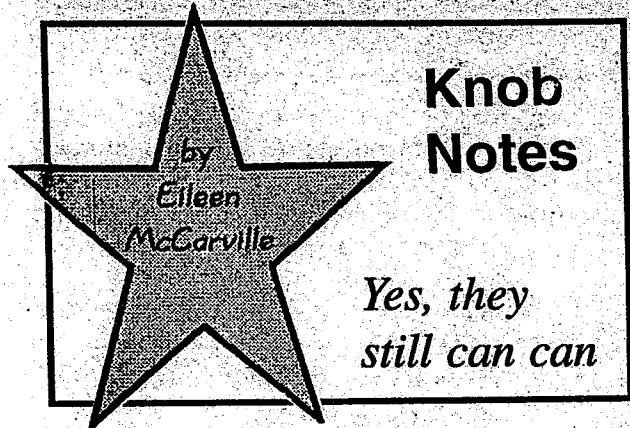
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Yes, they
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For 20 years the Pointer Sisters have defied categorization. Starting out as four gospel singers (Ruth, Anita, June and former member Bonnie) at their father's church in Oakland, California, they merged their burn-the-house-down style with rhythm and blues, jazz — even a little bit country.

Last week eldest Sister Ruth spoke to *The Clarkston News* from her home in Hopedale, Massachusetts. She talked about the Pointers' past, what they're doing now and their Friday night concert at Pine Knob Music Theatre — all the while balancing 5-year-old twins Ali and Conor on her knee.

Q: How many children do you have?

A: Three other children: a daughter, 20, a son, 33, and a daughter, 34. I'm a little crazy but that's my family.

Q: Who's the oldest Pointer Sister?

A: I am, at 52. I'm a couple of years older than Anita and about three years older than June, the youngest.

Q: How old were you and your sisters when you started performing? You sang gospel in your father's church, right?

A: Yes. We were just little tots, probably only 5 or 6 years old. (At this point, Ruth has to gently tell her twins, "No, you can't talk to the reporter.") We were the pastor's kids, so there weren't a whole lot of choices.

Q: Tell me a little about your history.

A: We started singing more in the late '60s, for neighborhood socials ... In the late '60s, in the San Francisco area, Bonnie, June and Anita sang with a folk group, and then backup for groups like Taj Mahal, Grace (Jefferson Airplane) Slick, Dave Mason ... And they even went on to do a single for Atlantic Records. But they were trying to write their own songs and Atlantic was trying to clone them like all the other girl groups at that time ...

During those years we became good friends with (the late) Bill Graham, a big concert promoter, and David Rubinson, our first record producer and manager. We released our first hit "Yes We Can Can."

Q: What was your style?

A: We were doing a lot of songs from people we loved like John Lee Hooker and all those bluesy people. At that time we were doing jazz-based music and big band but we couldn't sell any records. Disco was in and everybody wanted to dance.

Q: How did things change?

A: We wanted to get into the night club plan and have our records played. We stayed with Dave for five years. Then we wanted to get more mainstream and get more commercial, and we wanted to experience that popularity. So we started to take charge of our careers.

Q: What happened?

A: Bonnie left around 1976 and decided to go solo. Anita, June and myself decided to continue the group. That's when we hooked up with Richard Perry, who was launching a new record label. We did all those songs like "Fire," "Slow Hand" and "Jump." We started to make a lot of money ... During that time we did a lot of TV shows, Carol Burnett, Flip Wilson, Merv Griffin ... Flip became a very good friend.

Q: You're really a variety of many styles — pop, rhythm and blues, jazz, even country.

A: Yes. Our first Grammy, you know, was for a country song, "Fairytale." That was one of the things so different about us. They always wanted to put us into a category. We weren't categorized. We were rock, jazz, country, blues and gospel. We wanted to be that versatile. We didn't want to be in only one vein of music ... We were the first black female group to sing at the Grand Old Opry, you know.

Q: Did you write all those great hits like "Slow Hand" and "Jump?"

A: No, I wish we had.

Q: But you have written some of your own material.

A: Yes, we wrote as much as possible. I just don't know why a lot of our work wasn't acceptable. We still continue to write. "I'm So Excited" — that was a song we wrote.

Q: What did Bruce Springsteen think when you recorded his song "Fire?"

A: He loved it. I think he was sorry HE didn't record it (laughs). The only time he ever sang it was live.

Q: What are the Pointer Sisters doing today?

A: Today we're just doing concert tours. We don't have a record deal. We just do concerts, a lot of conventions, corporate parties ...

Q: You've had some exciting milestones, including a special performance for President and Mrs. Clinton. What was that like?

A: It was wonderful. We always enjoy performing for the higher-ups. It's nice to know they like your music.

Q: You were also awarded a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame.

A: We were very proud of that. It's a wonderful honor for us, to be part of history.

Q: What will you be singing at Pine Knob this Friday?

A: Basically, all of our old hits that everybody knows.

Q: What's your most requested song?

A: I guess "I'm So Excited" seems to be the favorite. It's still a very enjoyable song to perform. It's definitely our show-stopper and we want people on their feet (laughs). It just gives us more energy.

And let me say something here about Pine Knob. It has been around for awhile and we've always loved performing there ... We've seen Tina Turner there, Lionel (Ritchie) there. It's really a great venue. We just hope everyone comes out this Friday and boogies down.

The Pointer Sisters perform Friday at 7:30 p.m. Tickets are still available.
