

Bank on verge of opening downtown

Local group signs deal with NBD

It's deja vu for the City of Clarkston. The vacant NBD building should become a bank again by the New Year.

On Saturday, Independence Township resident Dave Harrison, one of eight local incorporators, said his group signed a purchase agreement with NBD to buy the 15 S. Main Street building for \$395,000. They hope to close the deal in September.

Susan Cherry, public relations representative for NBD Bank's Michigan headquarters in Detroit, confirmed the July 10 agreement.

NBD pulled out of Clarkston months ago, after a corporate decision to merge branches. Lack of space for a drive-through was one of several reasons for clos-

In December Harrison's group announced they intended to open a state-chartered bank in the community - but had no location.

The group includes: Harrison, a retired First of America Bank president turned builder with Trophy Homes; Food Town president Ed Adler; Chuck Fortinberry, president of the Clarkston Chrysler-Plymouth dealership; Lou Beer, a lawyer; Bill Clark, a real estate broker for Coldwell Banker Professionals; former Oakland Press publisher til things get going," Harrison Harrison said. "NBD didn't do Bruce McIntire; Bob Olsen, an investment counselor who coowns Planned Financial services with his wife Deanna; and John Welker, owner of Numatic Corp. in Milford.

The group has applied for permission to organize the bank with the Michigan Financial Institutions Bureau. It was accepted for filing August 3.

In addition to checking and savings accounts, Olsen said the bank will offer a full spectrum of services, with lending and "high-tech electronic services," including a money machine. The bank will have three tellers, with Harrison acting as president "un-

Eventually, they hope to have as many as five branches in the Clarkston-Waterford area.

The reason to have an institution like this is, we all remember when it used to be that way," Olsen said, "We want to have a place where people know the directors, and the office people. There are locals running these things and they're interested in it."

Fortinberry agreed. "It'll provide the level of banking service the people in this community deserve."

The plan is to invest people's money in their own community,

that, First of America and Old Kent aren't doing that ... That's why we're all involved in this.

"If you don't find a way to develop business locally, you don't retain the earnings from the business in the community, good things in the town — economic and cultural, for example — are rarely accomplished because the money everybody spends goes somewhere else ...

"We are raising \$10 million to open the bank, \$1 million of which will be put up by the founders," Harrison said. He declined to say how the remaining \$9 million will be raised.

Fatal crashes lead to study on Dixie Hwy. speed limit

Fatal accidents and increased development have led to a conclusion by local road officials: the speed limit on Dixie Highway in Springfield Township needs to be lowered. Springfield Township begins just east of the I-75 interchange.

Echoing sentiments expressed by township officials for more than a decade, the Road Commission for Oakland County has recommended to the Michigan State Police that the limit be lowered from its current 55 miles per hour to 50.

The two-month study was sparked by two fatalities on the stretch in the spring. In addition to the lowering of the speed limit, the RCOC will seek federal funds to get the highway widened from four to five lanes to increase traffic safety.

Craig Bryson, public information officer for the road-commission, said 50 was the recommended speed limit because anything lower than that would be too slow for the speed people typically drive on the road.

"Our concern all along was that the state police would not support a speed limit that was outside of the 85th percentile," Bryson said. "That means 85 percent of the people who drive on the road travel at that speed. Anything lower than 50, and we would end up with enforcement problems. It's such an open stretch, people probably wouldn't drive much slower than that."

The state police will now take up to six months to decide if the speed limit should be lowered.

Girl spends summer in Clarkston, away from troubled Northern Ireland

In the name of the children

They were three innocents—neither Catholic or Protestant. Yet, Richard, Mark and Jason Quinn died last month in Northern Ireland, victims of a senseless tragedy when their home was fire bombed in Bailymoney, County Antrim. The mother of the three children was Catholic, her boyfriend a Protestant.

According to an August article in The Irish Connection, a newspaper based in the Detroit-Windsor area, it was an apparent sectarian attack which followed a week of mounting violence after a march by Protestants was protested as as it proceeded through a Catholic neighborhood.

The tragedy was a painful wake-up call to the fact that, even though a peace accord was reached a week earlier between members of both the Northern and Southern Ireland governments, the violence in Northern Ireland continues.

On a local level, one family is doing what it can to lessen the impact of violence on Irish children. David and Sherry Regiani of Clarkston welcomed a young Belfast girl into their home this summer, through a special organization called "Project Children."

According to a brochure, the national program began over 20 years ago, when a handful of youngsters was flown from Belfast to New York "for a summer holiday away from the Irish 'troubles." Last year over 12,000 youngsters took part.

This summer has been a unique experience for both her daughter Angie, 12, a Clarkston Middle School seventh-grader, and Shelley Saunders, 11, who'll be entering her first high school year in Belfast this fall. Angie's mom Sherry says the girls have become fast friends, as close as sisters.

They've gone to the mall, vacationed at Virginia Beach and Mackinac Island and attended church together. Shelley has a growing collection of Beanie Babies (you can't buy the critters in Ireland) and Angie has borrowed Shelley's "button-ups" — a hot, new trend in preteen leggings.

When she first met Shelley, Angie was thrilled to find that she too "has curly hair. Woo hoo!"

Shelley had her first experience riding a rollercoaster and they've loved staying up late at slumber parties. Both wept over the Cinderella movie "Ever After" although, with Shelley, the youngster admits it was just "a wee bit."

Today, Angie and Shelley sit on the couch and admit they've had a glorious summer. It will be only a little over a week before Shelley returns home. They noted the differences and similarities of life on both sides of the Atlantic.

Like Angie, Shelley celebrates Christmas, Halloween and Easter and enjoys vacations. When she returns to Ireland, her family plans to visit Spain where, she jokes, she'll have to get used to yet another accent,

"Angie and her mum. I can understand them," says Shelley in a lilting brogue. But when others talk, "I have to ask them, 'What did they say?'" Sherry says they've gotten accustomed to Shelley's speech as well. "It's real melodic."

Shelley's especially liked going to the mall, Like Beanie Babies, they don't have them in Ireland either. There are more trees in Clarkston than Belfast and, although there are plenty of McDonald's, "they don't have Burger King or Taco Bell," notes Angie. "They don't have a Chili's or anything like that."

Besides going out to eat, Shelley's enjoyed the Regianis' home-cooked meals. She's had her first "Spaghetti Bolognese," cooked by Angie's father — a

change of pace from the fish and chips traditionally cooked by her own dad.

Music, TV and movies are pretty much the same. Like Angie, Shelley is smitten with The Backstreet Boys, but she says Irish T.V. features fewer commercials. Wouldn't that be nice, Angie and her mother note dryly.

Unlike Angie, she wears a layered uniform to school that includes a "jumper" (sweatshirt), skirt, jacket and knee socks. You're only allowed to take the jacket off in class, she explains.

"You must get pretty hot," notes Angie, while her mother points out that in Ireland, it's much cooler.

Her family, which includes four siblings, will take a second look when Shelley returns home. The fair-skinned colleen now has a tan — something she never experiences in Ireland.

When they picked Shelley up at the airport, the fact that it was Fourth of July — a celebration of freedom and independence—took on even more meaning, says Sherry. When they drove home "fireworks were popping off everywhere. Like, 'Welcome, Shelley!"

Sherry said the family had a "pow wow" and decided they wanted to be hosts after they heard about a Belfast girl spending her summer in Bloomfield. They were touched by the effort of Project Children. "It gives them some relief and it gives them a summer of just being a kid," Sherry said, noting that we Americans take much for granted, like being able to worship at the church of our choice.

A British Protestant, Shelley enjoyed worshiping with the Regianis at Clarkston United Methodist Church. She's true to her faith, and one of her favorite subjects at school is Mass, in addition to history and acting (They did "Grease" last year).

Americans should truly be thankful for the division between church and state, notes Sherry. In Ireland "Your religion is your political system. They are one and the same ... It's made it hard for the families over there to raise their kids, let them go on to education and be happy and productive."

become like sisters, says Angle's mom Sherry.

For now, she describes the situation in Northern Ireland as "a fragile peace."

Dan Armstrong, president of Detroit's Gaelic League, agrees. The peace accord is a positive step, "but there are still groups on both sides of the borders who are still not in agreement." Hopefully, the outcome will be men, women and children of both faiths living in a peaceful country.

"We're keeping our fingers crossed," says Irish Connection editor/publisher John Pollard.

Recently, the newspaper did its part to help Irish children as well. In conjunction with Wayne State University, it co-hosted a visit from a group of Irish teenagers, both Catholic and Protestant, from Northern Ireland. They went to a Tigers Game, feasted on frozen yogurt and did other things normal kids do.

As for Shelley, she says things are pretty quiet in her own neighborhood. She's more afraid of the tornadoes they have in the U.S. "We only have storms."

The threesome realize it will be only a week before she flies home. Shelley will be glad to see her family, but she admits she'll miss the Regianis.

"I want my family to come over here," she says, then adds, with the impish kind of smile the Irish are known for, "It's like you can get a good tan over here."

"I won't have anybody to say good-night to," wails Angie.

Sherry looks at her "second daughter" with a warm smile. "The house is for sale next door." For now, "We're trying to save all our frequent flier miles."

nship approves first of three liquor licenses

It's one down and two to go.

At its August 5 meeting, the Independence Township Board of Trustees approved one of three available Class Cliquor licenses for Nino Cutraro, an established restaurateur who hopes to open an upscale Italian eatery in the Independence Town Square (Food Town) shopping center.

Cutraro was the first of three applicants to receive one of the coveted licenses currently held by the township, which allow restaurant owners to serve beer,

wine and liquor at their establishments.

Two became available, based on a population increase from the mid-decade census. The third was discovered when the township realized a former applicant never pursued his restaurant plans.

Cutraro, who has appeared at every board meeting concerning the issue, owns two established restaurants: Intermezzo Ristorante in Detroit and Baci Abbracci in Pontiac. He has been eyeing the rapidly growing Clarkston area as another site.

According to Cutraro, he plans to be open 60 to 90 days from now, the same time frame in which he expects his application to be processed by the Liquor Control Commission, which grants final approval. His 130-140 seat "white-tablecloth" eatery will be "modern-style" with draperies and special lighting?

One unique feature is shuttle service for his customers, to and from Pine Knob. "No one has ever, done this before," he said. Cutraroplans to include only a very small service bar with two or three stools inside

the 5,000-square-foot facility.

He is assuming the remainder of a 15-year lease, which has been held by Mike Alberkat, owner of Mike's Oasis. "Nino is buying out Mike's Oasis," said

Independence Town Square co-owner Jim Esshaki.

Esshaki said diners will be very pleased with the new restaurant, to be named Bella Mia: "I've known Nino for over 20 years and I have full confidence Nino will do a good job. I've dealt with him before and he's a man of his word," Esshaki said.

Approval of the first license followed weeks of discussion on how the licenses should be meted. The matter recently culminated in the development of a new liquor license policy designed to establish the best criteria for granting them.

The policy states a variety of procedures, including strict background checks. It also asks applicants to demonstrate commitment in following through with

their restaurant plans.

The board agreed Cutraro is an excellent candidate, with two established restaurants and a good track record, and voted 6-1 to grant the license. Supervisor Dale Stuart, who voted no, wanted to wait until the two other applicants were present.

Both Bill Grannis, owner of Opa Restaurant Coney Island, and partners for the proposed Independence Superior Sportsplex, were unavailable. They are expected to be present at the next meeting Aug. 18.

Other board members argued that Cutraro had been delayed long enough, and applicants fall or stand on their own merits. Trustee Jeff McGee said they should be treated on "a case-to-case basis."

Trustee Neil Wallace agreed, saying all three applicants made previous presentations. "This has been handled enough publicly and now we're ready to go. Each one of these applicants has to be measured against this criteria separately, and I think it would be inappropriate for us to measure them against each other."

Trustee Dan Travis, who voted along with the others, nevertheless cautioned that several new eateries will be coming to the township within the next two

years. Four are planned for the Victor International site at White Lake Road and Dixie Highway, and two are planned for Waldon Village Towne Center, a mixeduse development behind Food Town.

Many years ago, when he first moved into the township, there weren't many choices, Travis said, noting "only two restaurants to eat at - excluding McDonald's. Now it seems we're restaurant central."

In other board action:

 The board joined other county communities in approving a new five-year contract with Oakland County Sheriff's Department for police services, 7-0.

 The board unanimously approved an amount not to exceed \$5,000 for a master plan study of the McCord property at Stickney and Pine Knob roads. The 34-acre parcel, which includes an historic farmhouse, was deeded to the township and is being eyed for several possible uses. The property is to be included in the Parks and Recreation Department's updated master plan.

City candidates run unopposed

It looks like this year's Clarkston City Cour il race won't be a hotly contested one. According to city manager Art Pappas, only four city residents are vying for that same number of seats. All carry two-year terms.

Filing petitions by the August 4 deadline were Mayor Sharron Catallo and incumbent council members Anne Clifton and Karen Sanderson. Newcomer Mike Kelley, a member of the city's planning commission, is seeking a seat presently held by councilman Doug Roeser, who is not seeking re-election.

Write-ins are also eligible, but they must declare their intent by Oct. 30, one week before the Nov. 3 election, Pappas said. Forms are available at City Hall,

After two years serving as Independence Township's acting Fire Marshal, Greg Olrich has a new job.

The Independence Board of Trustees unanimously approved the promotion of Olrich to full-fledged Fire Marshal at the Aug. 4 meeting.

Olrich has been acting fire marshal since 1996, filling in for former marshal Neil Ashley who left on medical leave and has since resigned.

In a written statement to the board, fire chief Gar Wilson said Olrich has added fire marshal duties to his role as township fire inspector since August 1996. He heartily recommended Olrich for the new post.


"Mr. Olrich has stepped up to every challenge presented his way, and then some. He not only handles his job in a professional manner, but he has also developed a good and positive relationship with commercial businesses and the general public," Wilson said.

During an interview the next day, Olrich admitted, "It's nice to finally have the position." He's been working for the township's fire department since 1981. A long-time Ortonville resident, Olrich is married to Judy and has three children: Angie, 19, Brian, 16, and Kevin, 13.

In addition to his many duties, one of his functions is conducting annual inspections for all existing commercial buildings in the city and the township. He inspects new construction as well, from start to finish.

"There's been a lot to do because of all the growth right now," he said.

He especially enjoys conducting a fire prevention program for Clarkston schools. Kids learn the basics, "basically anything to do with fire safety," like escape

routes, home evacuation, "stop, drop and roll" and, of course, don't play with matches.

He also cautions folks to check their smoke detectors, and points to two recent house fire fatalities. "In both, smoke detectors were not adequate or functioning properly."

On Thursday, Wilson said Olrich was hired at the current annual salary of \$42,616.35. He added a footnote: "Greg has been very supportive during the time he's been the acting fire marshal. He's come in and done the job, stepped up to all the problems and he's got good rapport with everyone. So he's fitting in very well."

Walters Lake to get relief from silt problem

Another Independence Township lake will get help from sediment buildup - although it's a much smaller project.

At the Aug., 4 Independence Township Board meeting, members gave the go-ahead for a 50/50 Drainage Split betweem the township and Road Commission for Oakland County. The township and the RCOC will each kick in \$5,000 to alleviate a silt problem that's plagued Walters Lake for years.

The \$10,000 project was proposed by trustee Jeff McGee, a Walters Lake resident and member of its lake. board. According to McGee, the drainage problem stems from the Sunny Beach Subdivision, south of Clarkston Road. "This neighborhood has no storm water retention and is all unimproved gravel roads," he said. Temporary dredging measures have only been "Band-Aids" for the problem, he said.

RCOC engineers have proposed a large catch basin with clean-outs, that will allow the RCOC to remove silt. "It's an attempt to stop dirt from washing upstream to the lake," McGee explained.

The project follows a similar situation on Simler Road, where residents hope to correct their own runoff problems, affecting Deer Lake.

The township, RCOC, Michigan Department of Transportation and Simler residents are sharing funding for the \$147,000 project.

The work on Walters will start "immediately," McGee said.

Every year about this time I start making mental notes of the things I love about summer. I'll call up my favorite summer memories from my memory bank during the gray days of late winter.

In spite of the recent hot, humid weather there have been a few cool days, signaling the onset of fall.

And there are several trees in the area with at least a few leaves turning orange or red -- another sign of colder days to come.

But more than anything, I love the sounds of summer. Talkative birds, crickets, tree frogs, grasshoppers, dogs and children are all sorely missed when we close up our windows in mid-to-late fall.

We used to have a large population of blue jays on our street, who spent the better part of each day harassing other birds. Their fussing made for some very noisy days. And comical ones too, if you weren't a smaller bird.

Then about six years ago we began to hear crows off in the distance. Every year since their calls became a little louder, until last year, when they finally moved in for good. Most of the blue jays left after the crows moved in.

In the fall and spring we are awakened early by flocks of ducks and geese. And during the summer a great blue heron squawks each morning at 5:45 as it flies by.

One of the most lovely sights on our lake is the Vshaped trail following the muskrats as they leave the shore in the moonlight.

We don't see much of them during the day in the summer. But in the beginning and end of winter when the ice is forming or melting, they sit on the edge of it eating water plants. They're safe from barking dogs a couple of months each year.

Ducks and seagulls will join the muskrats on the ice; and after the ice is about three inches thick, they'll be replaced by fishermen, and kids on skates.

Hmmmm. In a few months, I may be making a list of things I enjoy about winter. But I think it will be shorter.

New bank group sets good example

Hats off to area residents and businessmen Dave Harrison, Bill Clark, Bob Olsen, John Welker, Lou Beer, Ed Adler, Bruce McIntire and Chuck Fortinberry for investing their time, effort and money in the community.

They recently signed a purchase agreement for the former NBD bank on Main Street in Clarkston and intend to open a neighborhood bank by the first of next year.

The group will rename the institution Clarkston State Bank, which was originally chartered in 1913. Harrison, a retired First of America Bank president will act as the new Clarkston State Bank president "until things get going."

Harrison said a portion of the profits will be reinvested in the community, something larger banks

don't always do. Examples of community support could range from sponsoring concerts, investing in industrial parks or participating in the funding of a revitalization study of the city. "It's kind of like reinvesting in yourself," he said.

In our story in this week's issue about the intended purchase, Harrison said, "If you don't find a way to develop business locally, you don't retain the earnings from the business in the community, good things in the town—economic and cultural, for example—are rarely accomplished because the money everyone spends goes somewhere else."

We applaud the group's commitment, and hope their leadership makes it easier for the rest of us to follow. MKC



In Detroit, couples are banned from making love in an automobile unless the act takes place while the vehicle is parked on the couple's own property.


In Nicholas County, West Virginia, no member of the clergy is allowed to tell jokes or humorous stories from the pulpit during a church service.

You got to know when to fold 'em

I should have learned from Kenny Rogers' song, "The Gambler," only I shouldn't have anything to fold.

I'm not a gambler, but I like glitz. That's why I decided to join six other guys at the grand opening of "Casino Windsor."

And, glitzy it is. The bright white casino is highlighted, riverside (facing Michigan), with 10- or 12foot colorful neon signs: CASINO WINDSOR.

Opening day might not have been the best day, crowd-wise, to go to this new money magnet, but with five of we seven being knowledgeable gamblers (if there is such a thing) the drawing force could not be

The entrance is impressive. A circular walk, not unlike the Silverdome, leads people to the hotel, restaurants and gambling if you turn left, and gambling only if you turn right.

Inside the circle walk is 50-60 foot waterfall with greenery and rocks, above which is a cloud painted ceiling. At the bottom is a fountain, when, on the halfhour the waterfall is stopped and music and light come on for a synchronized display of spouting water.

The casino is very Vegas-like. Flashing inviting

dollar signs blinking everywhere, bells jingling too-loudly and the sound of coins dropping into trays.

There is no sound when coins are dropped into slots in the one-armed bandit machines.

chines along with poker machines. There are minist quitplaying. baccarat tables, roulette wheels, a couple kinds of poker tables and several black jack tables.

What impressed us reversely were the lines. It took 20 minutes to go through a cafeteria line at 3 p.m. It took about that much time in the line to convert our U.S. dollars to Canadian.

Then you have to find a person with a red vest to exchange the paper money for tokens for the slots. The tables convert the paper money to chips. I found the slots and tables eliminate having to stand in line to retrieve our U.S. dollars.

Exchanging money in Canada is interesting. My \$50 got me \$74 Canadian. One "gambler" in our party figures the casino makes 4 percent just on the exchange rate. He calculated that to be \$70,000 a day profit to them.


The only part of the gambler's language I understand is "Oh, shucks," which comes right after "hit me, I'll stand, let it ride, etc."

Thus, I expect to lose when gambling, and I do. All of us were not unlucky. I hung around with John Patrell, our driver and wit (that's half right) to make sure I didn't get lost and got back to Michigan.

We both got \$50 in tokens for the slots. Mine was gone within 20 minutes. I wasn't disappointed. Is expected to lose and I did.

The majority of you readers have probably driven on the road at least a few times and know how irritating and often comical it is to see fellow drivers demonstrate their lack of skill behind the wheel. There are people turning when they shouldn't, not paying attention to traffic lights, weaving in their lane, and narrowly escaping collisions.

Take this chaos and shrink it all down to the size of the high school parking lot, add a bellowing man with an attitude, and get rid of all the experience of all the drivers.

Now you've got what we call the range during drivers' training.

You see, when we sit down in a classroom and open the Drive Right textbook, we are not told exactly how to drive, since it is assumed that we already know. And we think we do: everyone knows how to turn a steering wheel and push a couple pedals.

But some extra assurance would be nice when, ten minutes later, we are put in a car and expected to start driving. I was lucky and didn't have to go on the road the first day-I was merely on the range and whipping around curves at the tremendous maximum speed of fifteen miles per hour.

It wasn't difficult, of course, just driving around in circles or going back and forth in a straight line. So for the first few days, we had no problems during range driving-except the occasional person driving on the wrong side of the road.

Then came something that none of us had expected: Backing Maneuvers. Surely, we thought, there was much more to learn about driving forward before we could start backing up, wasn't there?

Too bad. We started parallel parking and backing out of driveways formed out of orange cones and barely-organized turmoil broke loose.

The occasional wrong-side-of-the-road mishap became frequent enough to drive our instructor into screaming rages. Stop signs placed on the range were ignored or run over-yes, the wheels of the car ran straight over a stop sign or two. And as for those "indestructible" orange cones? Completely mauled. Our aim when backing up was even worse than going forward.

We survived driving on the range and the even scarier road, where cones became cars and small children. My road instructor, a biker that dressed the part, shared colorful stories about his childhood in Detroit between moments of giving navigational help, slamming on the brakes, and grabbing the steering wheel. There was also the classroom portion, which included tests, the other thing that caused students trouble. Personally, I didn't think they were too bad--I had more trouble staying awake during the endless hours of video tapes.

So now we're out on the real road with no cones and no instructor yelling directions at us. We apologize for the inconveniences that I'm sure we'll cause you; we'll do our best to avoid them. And every now and then, you'll be reminded of us as you come to a stop sign that's been flattened to the ground.

Gearing up for the Labor Day Parade

As the dog days of August wind down, preparations for the Clarkston Labor Day parade are gearing up. Fun and safety are high on the agenda.

The Labor Day parade, organized by Clarkston Rotary for over 50 years, promises to be an hour long celebration filled with entertainment and suprises. This year's theme is "Follow Your Dreams," with festivities starting promptly at 10 a.m. Monday, September

The parade begins at Clarkston Middle School, where parade entrants are asked to gather between 8 and 9:30 a.m. to take their places. The parade route winds down Buffalo Street to Main, then on to Miller Street to end at St. Daniel's Catholic Church on Valley Park Street.

Floats, bands, pompon squads, clowns, fire trucks and more highlight the day. A fly over by the Air National Guard out of Selfridge Air National Guard Base is also scheduled:

The parade committee encourages any member of the community with a special talent or inspiration to get involved.

"We're trying to discourage the 'commercial' floats," said Tom McCoskey, parade committee chairman. "This isn't an advertising campaign, it's Labor Day. We'd like the parade to reflect a hometown spirit of hard work and following the American Dream. We know there are lots of folks out there who can make a real contribution - show Clarkston what following your dream really means."

Preparations have been underway since last October for the big event. "There's such a tremendous number of things to do," said McCoskey. "But our number one challenge this year is one of safety, as well as fun."

felt the day was plagued with many problems, including safety concerns regarding the practice of throwing candy to youngsters in the crowd. "The kids are running out into the street to pick up penny candy, and getting underfoot of the floats, horses and cars in the parade;" McCoskey said. "The things people like to see in the parade are being put in jeopardy because of the liability factor - we hope we can reduce or eliminate that problem for the Labor Day parade."

McCoskey suggests parade members walk along side of their floats and hand candy to children, instead of tossing it randomly into the streets and crowds. "We can't forbid it (candy tossing), he said, "we're just asking the folks to use a little common sense here."

All entrants in the Labor Day parade must preregister this year with the Rotary by phoning or faxing McCoskey at 625-6636 with a short note of their group's name and intended parade program. "That way we know who's coming, where to put them and how to plan," he said. "(Pre-registering) will eliminate congestion and confusion at the start of the parade. Everyone will have a spot, get rid of the suprises."

The Rotary will then fax back a short informational sheet about the ins and outs of this year's celebration. "If people know the rules ahead of time, we can make sure everyone has a good time," said McCoskey. "Our goal is a safe parade." 

The music has never been about my hair or clothes, but to some it was. I've always wanted to be respected as a singer, songwriter and entertainer. So I have to live my motto of 'some gave all' to achieve that.

"You know, under the hood, I'm still the same Billy Ray Cyrus. I've just got new upholstery and a new paint job. Hopefully the music will speak for itself. That's what matters most."

William White, chair of Lawrence Tech's engineering technology department, will lead both the Clarkston and Southfield campus programs.



The group has also applied to FDIC (Federal Deposit Insurance Corp.). "That insures all checking and savings funds for up to \$100,000," he said.

The group has chosen to rename the institution "Clarkston State Bank," which harks back to the old days. According to the local book "Heritage," the first Clarkston State Bank was chartered in 1913, responding to a similar scenario when a former bank moved out of the stone building on Main Street.

State regulators have 100 days to approve the charter application. It could take another 30 days for the Federal Reserve to grant approval. "We can't do anything till that happens," Harrison said.

At the latest, they hope to open by Jan. 1. "If (both) took the maximum time, we wouldn't open till the first of the year," he added. They plan to remodel the 3,890-



The proposed widening project will be submitted to the Funding Committee of the Oakland County Federal Aid Task Force by next spring. Even if after the review process, the road scores high enough to get the funds for the widening, the project wouldn't begin until 2001 at the earliest.

Gerald M. Holmberg, the RCOC deputy managing director and county highway engineer, stated that a

study showed Dixie Highway was not a "high accident location, and may not justify the federal funding for a widening project at this time."

"We need less smoke and mirrors and less P.R. from the road commission, and more of a focus on what needs to be done on that stretch of Dixie,"-Strole said. "We need to bite the bullet and say something needs to be done. We need action, not news releases?"





Reviewing the football playoff point system

cause here is a refresher on how the MHSAA determines football playoff points and rankings.

Clarkston is a Class AA school, the highest class in terms of school enrollment. Points are awarded based on the team's wins, and the success its opponents have. The point system runs as follows:

80 points for a win over a Class AA or Class A team

64 points for a win over a Class BB or Class B team

48 points for a win over a Class CC or Class C

32 points for a win over a Class DD or Class D team

Bonus points: eight points for every game a defeated opponent wins, and one point for every game an opponent Clarkston lost to wins a game. For example: if Clarkston beats Waterford Kettering, it gets 80 points for beating a Class AA team. If Kettering wins five games in its season, Clarkston gets 40 more bonus points, eight for every game Kettering wins. Conversely, if Clarkston loses to Rochester, and the

Time to get out those graphing calculators, be- Falcons go 7-2, Clarkston gets seven bonus points, one for every game Rochester wins in the season.

The playoff points are decided by adding the total number of playoff points earned and dividing it by the number of games played. Bonus points are determined by adding bonus points and dividing it by the number of games the opponents played.

Tiebreakers: The top four teams in each region qualify for the playoffs. If two teams are tied, and they played each other during the season, the winning team in that game wins the tiebreaker. If a tie occurrs between more than two teams, the following system is applied: opponents' winning percentage; then which team led at the end of the third quarter of the most games through the season; then second and first quarters if a tie still exists; and last, the sure-fire flip of the coin.

None of this may matter a year from now, because the MHSAA and its member schools seem heavily in favor of expanding the playoffs to one degree or another for the 1999 season, Proposal 16, which would have quadrupled the number of teams qualifying for the playoffs, has been shot down by the MHSAA.

MHSAA changes rules to curb lopsided games

The Michigan High School Athletic Association has tinkered with the rules in football and girls basketball for the upcoming season in terms of one-sided games.

Last year, the MHSAA used a running clock whenever the margin of a football game reached 35 points, with stoppages coming only with called timeouts, player injury, between quarters and penalty enforce-

This year, the rule will apply to all regular season and playoff games. The only time a Clarkston game was affected by this rule last year was the Wolves' 58-24 win over Troy Athens. Clarkston took a 44-8 lead in the third quarter, and the running clock took effect.

In girls basketball, a running clock rule has also been implemented. If the margin in a game reaches 40 points, the clock runs except for timeouts and between quarters. Should the margin be reduced to less than 30 points, regular clock use will resume. This rule will apply to regular season and playoff games.


