New trucks to roll into fire dept.

Independence Township will purchase seven fire trucks

Only months after ratifying a new contract for firefighters and increasing personnel, the township has taken additional strides toward improving the Independence Township Fire Department.

On Dec 1, the board of trustees authorized the purchase of seven brand-new vehicles. The township will buy three engines, two tankers, a rescue truck and ladder truck over the next 10 years, financed from the fire department's operating budget, estimated to be \$2,385,054 next year. The board unanimously approved a cost not to exceed \$1.930 million, with \$218,000 paid each year at a 4.79-percent interest rate. All the vehicles are 1999 models and all but one will be built by Pierce Manufacturing Inc. in Appleton, Wisconsin. First Star Bank of Milwaukee will finance the purchase. Both Pierce and the bank offered cost reductions. Zachary Bell, a local resident and broker who represents the bank, said the actual loan is around \$1.7 million, with the difference expected to come from the sale of the used fire trucks.-We have never had a ladder truck in this township," said fire department Cpt. Steve Ronk of the Quint" vehicle which boasts a 75-foot ladder. "This is probably the kingpin of the whole deal. Ronk said The second states of the second s

the medium-sized ladder truck will be easy to manuver in the township's residential areas.

Ronk, who detailed the list of items in a special presentation to the board, said the new fleet will also eliminate repairs and maintenance costs for the old rigs, many of which need to be replaced now and in the near future. The department typically keeps its vehicles 10-15 years, he added.

Ronk outlined other improvements with the stateof-the art equipment, including a second 3,000-gallon tanker. For years, Independence has had only one to fight fires. "It's just amazing what this will do for us," Ronk said.

It didn't take long. "A couple of contractions, and out came the baby." He estimates the child weighed six to seven pounds.

The mom, who has other children, was pretty relaxed. "When I assumed the position, she just asked, "Have you ever done this before?"

Obviously, he hadn't. "I couldn't believe how slipbabies are," White said.

"This standardizes all of our front-line equipment," said Ronk, summing up the new fleet. "It will improve training, operations, safety and maintenance."

Township Treasurer Jim Wenger was credited for finding the way to finance the project, after he attended a seminar on municipal financing. "The rates (now) were so good."

He said the deal would save the fire department an estimated \$800,000 in vehicle purchases, repairs and other costs.



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
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Angels will shine for local family

Fundraiser this weekend to help children with rare genetic disorder

Local angels are shining this holiday season, bringing with them a day of fun and hope for the Tudor family of White Lake.

Friends and neighbors of the Tudors have joined forces for a fund-raising effort this Saturday at the Fenton Cinema to benefit Michelle and Jason Tudor, who were born with ataxia-telangiectasia (A-T).

Both Jason, 11, and his sister Michelle, 7, were diagnosed with the rare disease early in their infancy. The genetic disorder affects the children in several ways, including loss of control of the limbs and head and also the ability to successfully fight off infections.

"It is a struggle for us daily," said their mon, Linda Tudor. "I have had to quit my job because these two require so much. They are unable to dress themselves, feed themselves. Everything most normal parents take for granted we cannot."

Her husband Bob agrees. "If you sit down to think about it, between everything Linda does for them even as far as just the day-to-day maintenance for the kids, it adds up to an eight-hour day. But Jason is on intravenous antibiotics administered through a catheter in his chest, and its Linda who gives him his medications. That and he requires several breathing treatments daily, at 45 minutes each. That would be enough for anybody, but make all of that times two and you start to know what Linda's day is like."

While the family does have medical insurance for the children, the expenses not covered by co-pays, deductibles and uninsured costs mount daily.

"It adds up really fast," said Bob.

pay, other things we have to find a way to fight. Jason was in physical therapy this summer, and our insurance has rejected it. There's \$5000 right there and if you don't pay it right away, it can affect your credit rating in the long run."

Linda notes the cost of Jason's new motorized wheelchair was over \$14,000 - more than the cost of some new cars.

"Michelle has to now be in a wheelchair, too," said Linda. "She's using one that Jason has outgrown for right now."

With all of the added expenses and loss of Linda's income, the family was quickly overwhelmed with health care costs for their children. That's when friends, neighbors and complete strangers stepped in to assist the Tudors.

"We are completely overwhelmed," said Linda of the fundraising effort. "Folks like Mary Monroe, the Kitchens, and the Wints have just picked up the ball and ran with it. Heck, we are happy with just a dollar, fifty cents even. But they have high hopes for the fundraiser, they've told us they hope to raise \$5000 or more."

Mary Monroe of Clarkston has organized a "Day at the Movies" at Fenton Cinema to help defray the mounting medical expenses for the two children. Dean and Diane Kitchen, owners of the movie house, agreed to donate the proceeds from all of their 10a.m. shows on Saturday to the Tudors by offering a special movie package of any movie of your choice, a small popcorn and drink for \$10.

But that's not all. A silent auction filled with dozens of items donated from throughout the community will wait for bids at the cinema on Saturday. Law enforcement in Oakland County and the Clarkston area will be heading into the 21st century, a little over a year ahead of time.

The Oakland County Sheriff's Department, and the city of Clarkston police department were part of a law enforcement consortium that received more than \$17 million in federal grant money last week to upgrade computer systems and make law enforcement agencies more time efficient.

Among the upgrades are laptop computers in patrol cars, new fingerprint scanners and state and federal computer links that will cut down on booking duplication and allow faster and more efficient onsite identification.

"We should cut our time spent doing those things by 70 percent," said Lt. Dale LaBair of the OCSD Independence substation. "We will be more linked with the in-car terminals, and it will really reduce redundant work done by more than one department."

As an example, LaBair said that if a suspect was

picked up by the Troy Police Department, that suspect would have to be fingerprinted and booked in Troy, and at the Oakland County Jail in Pontiac. With the new system that will be in place, the suspect will only have to be booked in Pontiac, because the information will automatically be stored in Pontiac and Troy.

The grant comes as a result of an application put in by nearly every Oakland County police municipality. LaBair credited the cosortium with getting the grant, because all the agencies worked together to get

"This will be available as a universal way for all of us to communicate," LaBair said. "And that's cool. The uniqueness of this grant is that the sheriff's department got support from all the other county municipalities. That's the reason we got his grant."

Paul Ormiston, Clarkston city police chief, agreed, saying the computer upgrades will allow for less paperwork and more efficient time use for his. officers.

"We will be able to do reports right there in the car." Ormiston said. "If we're at an accident and fill

out an accident report, we can copy the same information into a citation if we need to, where before we would have to do that twice.

"It will make our work a lot easier and it saves time."

Ormiston said 44 different police agencies applied for the grant. The city requested \$48,453 in technology upgrades, including new laptop computers for cars and printers to go with them. He said he doesn't know when the city will be informed if it will receive these upgrades as requested.

The grant will upgrade some existing law enforcement computer systems, including CLEMIS - the Court and Law Enforcement Management Information System. The system was the first that enabled different law enforcement agencies to communicate with each other.

But with the grant money, the system will have a much larger capacity, and will have the ability to download mug shots, crime scene photos and other key identification to officers even as they are en route to a crime scene.



ing one new vehicle at a time. A truck was last replaced in 1992.

Another advantage to the purchase is "We will have virtually all of our equipment in state-of-the-art at one time," he added.

The purchase option drew discussion before the board finally voted.

"The first question is, can we afford it," said Trustee Dan Travis. "And, can we afford not to." Travis said the undertaking reflects "the growth of the community as well" and said the township shouldn't have to "put Band-Aids on our trucks and use them till they're 10 or 15 years old."

Trustee Neil Wallace asked Ronk if the purchase 'well-received" by the firefighters. was

"There are issues that still need to be dealt with. And for some of them, that is their focus," said Ronk, noting the concerns over manpower. But, he added," They understand this is an equipment issue. They are ecstatic of the ability to renew the fleet in one fell swoop and not have to piecemeal it."

The township recently approved hiring three new full-time firefighters, while some firefighters say they need at least three more.

Ronk said the items are part of the department's "grocery list." Other items include Fire Station #3 on Maybee, which is sorely in need of remodeling, and staffing the department with its own emergency transport service.

The township has budgeted \$400,000 for station. #3's remodeling costs, but firefighters say a whole new station is needed, and could be built on township property next door. The 30-year-old building is so outdated "The bays are to small for some of the trucks," Ronk said, adding a local architect is doing a feasibility study.

A staff member has already created a proposal to establish an Advanced Life Support (ALS) system that would provide personnel (on-staff paramedics) and upgraded medical supplies and equipment.

Supporters say ALS -- which has been committed to by neighboring communities like Commerce

Township and eyed by others like Brandon -- would offer quicker response time and may be cost-effective for residents who now pay a bundle for ambulance transport.

Fire engineer Phil Williams puts ALS high on the

list. Independence has stretched its Basic Life Support (BLS) system -- which includes CPR and airway circulation -- to include other techniques like defibrillation and intubation, which allows for a tube to be placed into a person's lungs.

"We're not far behind ALS," Williams said, explaining on-staff paramedics could provide additional life-saving treatments like IVs, medication and other services.

But Williams feels the manpower and remodeling issues need to be dealt with first.

"They're all right up there," says Williams of the wish list. "Station #3 needs a lot of work We need manpower ... We need to get caught up on what goes on around here -- and then add ALS and transport."

Firefighters and board members also expressed concern that, once the seven trucks reach their 10year limit, they'll all need to be replaced at once.

"They better plan for that because it's gonna happen," said Ronk. "You've got a fleet with the same birthday."

Stuart confirmed Tuesday a feasibility study is underway for a new fire station. Currently, he added, the township is comparing the cost of remodeling the existing Station #3 and building a new one.

As far as the men's concerns about more manpower and future ALS, Stuart said he had "no response."


Nevertheless, Ronk said, the department is grateful for the trucks. "We had no idea this would happen. This came right out of left field, driven by financiallycheap money." He repeated, "We're ecstatic about it."

Township fire Cpt. Mike Fahrner called the trucks "capital improvments" and said the \$218,000 a year shouldn't jeopardize other programs.

"The guys should realize we're not going to stop buying equipment just because we need the manpower yet," he said.

Editorial Continue with improvements to fire department

We're glad to see the recent improvements at the Independence Township Fire Department, and hope they will continue.

In the past few months township board members have settled a two-year contract battle with firefighters and made provisions to hire more staff.

A feasibility study is underway to compare remodeling Fire Station #3 on Maybee Road or building a new station, and on December 1 the board OK'd the purchase of seven new vehicles for the department.

It's no surprise to anyone living here that the township is growing rapidly. According to a recent study by the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments (SEMCOG), the population in Independence Township grew 31 percent since the 1990 census - from 23,717 to 31,109 by July of this year, making Independence Township the eighth fastest-growing community in Oakland County.

The strain on infrastructure is tough on a community that is growing so fast, and also services three commuter routes - I-75, M-15 and Dixie Hwy. But we believe it's more difficult and sometimes dangerous to play catch-up when it comes to public services, than to plan in advance and be prepared for the inevitable influx of residents and industry.

While the board has made strides to bring the fire department up to speed, we hope it will seriously consider the request of its department to add three more full-time firefighters. This would enable each of the three stations to be staffed with two fire fighters per shift.

We hope the township board will continue to stay on top of the needs of a department that is not only entrusted with the safety of its own population, but services commuters and residents from other communities as well. MKC

Unpaid summer tax bill copies on their way

Dear Editor,

As a courtesy, the Independence Township Treasurer's Office is sending out a copy of any unpaid 1998 summer tax bills (real and personal) that have not been paid as of December 4th. Hopefully, this reminder will allow property owners an opportunity to take care of their outstanding taxes.

The amounts shown due are good until the end of December. By paying in December the property owner can declare the taxes on their 1998 federal income taxes and avoid the additional interest penalty that would be added in January.

1998 winter taxes are currently due and can be paid without penalty through Tuesday, February 16. A 3 percent late penalty is added on winter taxes from Wednesday, Feb. 17 to Monday, Feb. 28. After Feb. 28 all uncollected 1998 summer and winter real and personal property taxes are sent to Oakland County as delinquent. Our offices can no longer collect taxes starting March 1, which is the same throughout Oakland County.

Property owners wishing to pay both the summer and winter taxes should be aware that two separate checks would be needed.

It appears that local banks may no longer in the future allow for property taxes to be paid at their banks. I am told that internal studies indicate that the service is not time-effective for their employees.

The township offices are open Monday through Friday 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Township offices are closed for the holiday season on Thursday, Dec. 24 and Friday, Dec. 25. Offices will be open Monday, Dec. 28 through Friday, Dec. 31. Please be aware that service on Dec. 31 could be slower due to traditionally high volume of residents coming to the treasurer's office.

'Just a great gathering place' The Clarkston Union Bar and Kitchen . . .

When Clarkston Union Kitchen and Bar opened nearly three years ago, owner Curt Catallo wanted to keep things simple.

'We just wanted to build a restaurant that would serve as a great gathering place for Clarkston and provide something people can't find nearby," said Catallo recently. Housed in an old Baptist church, "the building is something you can't find anywhere else." he added.

In January the Union will celebrate its third anniversary and its menu, bar and entertainment are continually evolving. "The opening chef helped with the original menu and it's now a constant collaboration between the whole kitchen staff and myself. It has American and European roots at the same time."

Catallo called it "hearty, rustic, provincial and big-shouldered. We just serve great course food." Getting ready for a seasonal menu change, Catallo said "We're rolling out a few hot dishes -- comfort food for Michgian winters."

Some of the restaurtant's more popular specials will become regulars, like the Portobello mushrooms gratin, chicken and

dumplings and a daily meatloaf special.

The restaurant's regular patrons are familiar with the Union's extensive beer selection. "We've tried every beer out there and pick them one barrel at a time. We look for beer with interesting character, but also not necessarily available in this area.

We have 45 beer taps, including American micro brews and European macro brews. The major domestics we serve in bottles, but we have no rules," said Catallo.



In terms of entertainment Catallo thinks jazz suits the Union best although blues musicians make an occasional appearance, and polka was served up for the Oktoberfest.

"I am a jazz fan, but jazz fits our building best of the the musical options. It sounds the best, feels at home with our food, and three or four musicians fit in well."

The Kid Brother jazz trio has performed at the Union off and on during the last

year and is currently playing Thursday nights for the next two weeks. Fronted by Detroitarea bassist Rich Kowalewski, the trio mixes contemporary jazz with Latin/Brazilian and electronic fusion, and has just released its first CD, "Kid Brother."

The Union also sports a billiards room in the basement. Open for about a year, the room is designed to feel just like home. It's outfitted with a juke box, two pool tables, a foosball game, darts, TVs and its own bar.

During hockey season the Union patrons using the billiards room receive a raffle ticket for the chance to win two tickets for lower bowl seats at a Detroit Red Wings game.

"It's like watching a Red Wings game in your own living room down there," Catallo said of the billiards room. "We built it to have that feel."

During the holiday season Catallo said he's most aware of the Union's specialness.


"We see a lot of families bringing in out of town friends because they know they won't find a Union in Scottsdale. We're one of a kind."

A home away from home

• New center provides loving care for sick children, respite for their parents

It's the time of year for shining faces. But those attending the " Children are Precious" Christmas party Sunday had special reason for that holiday glow.

Families with children who have life-altering illnesses enjoyed a visit from Santa, gifts, music, refreshments, a brightly lit house and Christmas tree -- and a preview of the new Children are Precious Respite Care Center in Springfield Township.

Run by Barbara Lubinski, a former nun turned nurse, the center will offer parents respite care while providing a cheerful, 24-hour setting for their children -- surrounded by murals, stuffed animals and a whole lot of love.

Lubinski, who started the project a year ago, is on the last lap, awaiting state licensing so she can hire her staff which includes registered nurses for roundthe-clock care. Currently, she's caring for children herself on weekends.

Parents at the party said CAP is a dream come true because Lubinski and her staff will not only be experts, but compassionate care-givers.

Chris Kleimola is a single parent who adopted two children with special needs. David, 2 1/2, has an overgrowth syndrome which causes kidney abnormalities and "a higher chance for cancer."

A curly topped moppet with a heart-tugging smile, David was as rowdy as any toddler, bouncing around the room with new trucks from Santa Claus. However his sister Rachael, 9 1/2, who has Wolf-Hirschhorn Sydrome, is severely impaired, with multiple medical problems. She requires total care.

"I work part-time. That's all I can do," said the Ypsilanti mother, a special education teacher for preschool. The respite center will give her a well-needed break -- and she can rest easy, knowing her children will receive expert care.

Royal Oak mom Robyn Swing also knows her precious daughter Amber will be well-cared for. "As a parent, you do need time away. But you want your child to be in a sterile environment, a home-type environment. And that's what Barbara's trying to create here. There have been times I've had to leave (Amber), but I was uncomfortable because I had no knowledge of the place."

Amber, 20, has cerebral palsy, compounded with a seizure disorder, "which makes it hard to find persons who are comfortable with her," Swing explained.

"Barbara is so very good with children. They see what kind of heart she has and they adjust right to her. Some children don't adapt to change very well. But Barbara makes it such a non-change. It's like going from home to home."

"Barbara is our Mother Theresa," agreed Mary Ann Sitale, whose daughter Andie is severely retarded with multiple problems. "She's been doing babysitting in our home. You just don't meet people like Barbara. She's amazing."

Lubinski sold her former condo and bought the

charming ranch home with the help of local Realtor Louise Bizzoni of Coldwell Banker Professionals, who also serves on her board of directors.

The upstairs child-care facility includes three bedrooms and two bathrooms, all designed for the disabled, and a large living room and kitchen. The bedrooms feature two cribs, two twin beds and two hospital beds, one with a Hoyer lift. CAP will be licensed to care for six children at a time, from ages 0-12.

The primary criteria for admission is medical fragility, for example, children with cerebral palsy, chromosomal anomalies, neurological and muscular disorders and various other chronic illnesses.

Furniture, medical equipment and remodeling costs were furnished by a number of individuals, groups and corporations, including Henry Ford Hospital and the North Oakland County Board of Realtors. "One man paid \$675 for one month's house payment," said Lubinski, obviously moved.

Lubinski remodeled the downstairs into her cozy apartment, which also features a prayer room for familics.

After the party - which closed with parents and children joining hands and asking for blessings and healing -- she provided a tour of the new center. She pointed to the ceilings, showing how those areas were made cheery because many children are bedridden. Her sensitivity is also evident in the many different nativity scenes present in the children's rooms.

They include Native American and African-American, because, as she says, Jesus loves all the

little children of this world.

During the evening, one mother quietly walked into one of the bedrooms and put her child down for a nap. Lubinski was touched.

"You know you're doing good when parents come in and put their baby in a crib - without even asking you," she said with a smile. "That's when you know you made it."

It's time to 'privatize' state playoffs

What do Waterford Kettering, New Lothrop and Decker all have in common?

Their high school girls basketball teams had terrific regular seasons and advanced all the way to the state quarterfinals in Class A, D and B respectively.

All three teams lost by an average of 19 points to private schools Birmingham Marian, Oakland Christian and Detroit Country Day.

In the past three years, the MHSAA has crowned 12 state girls basketball champions. Nine of those titles went to private schools.

The Detroit Catholic Central football program recently became the first to ever repeat as Class AA state champs with a victory over Rockford.

See a trend here? In high-profile, high-revenue sports like football and basketball, private high schools seem to win more than their share of state titles, often trouncing overmatched opponents through most rounds of the state playoffs.

This is a system that does not lend itself to competitive balance, something the MHSAA seems to place a high priority on with their recent changing from four classes to three or four equal divisions among its member schools in some sports.

Here's a comparison. Let's say Michigan State made it to the NCAA men's basketball championship game against Kentucky. The Spartans entered the season restricted to using players only from the state of Michigan, played in a tough conference and defeated some high-quality opponents in the tournament. Everything came together for **Tom Izzo's** bunch, and now they sit at the sport's summit.

But along comes Kentucky, a storied program filled with great conches and players. But in this contest, Kentucky has the luxury of using players from all over the country, and can use players it "acquires"

from the state of Michigan.

Now who do you think has the better chance of winning? The team that draws its roster from all 50 states, or the team that draws its roster from one? You don't have to be **Dick Vitale** to figure this one out.

This is the same scenario that high school teams in Michigan face every year. A hard-working group of local kids makes their hometown proud by advancing in the state tournament, only to be blown away by a private school that has the resources to get the best talent regardless of their geographic location.

It is not a fair game, and a poor lesson to teach high school student-athletes. Public schools, since the advent of Proposal A a few years ago, are on more equal footing with each other, but have fallen behind the less-restricted private schools on the playing field.

Now before those with children at private schools start to beat down my door, let me say this: private schools are a very good thing to have. They provide good educations and opportunities to deserving kids who might not have a chance to do otherwise. Those opportunities should include playing for good coaches and good programs.

My feeling is this: let private schools play for their own state championship. Nothing needs to be changed with their conference affiliations or their regular-season schedules. It's just when postseason play starts, let Country Day compete against teams like Birmingham Brother Rice, Marian, Oakland Christian and Detroit Catholic Central for state titles. Those schools are all competing on equal levels with each other, and the competition between them would be equitable.

That is not the case when a powerful private school runs up against a powerful public school, most of the time. Public schools in this state shouldn't have to face collections of all-stars when gunning for a oncein-a-lifetime chance at a state crown.

The playing field has become tilted enough. It's time to separate public and private schools for just one tournament. To adjust a famous phrase, let's keep things equal and separate.

"Kara has grown into the responsibility of being a senior and a leader," he said. "Jenny is very steady as always, and Ingrid is really playing with a purpose so far this year."





center, and the experience I got last year playing defense has helped me a lot. Our system is only going to help us as the season goes along. We just can't let down when we play good teams."

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


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
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
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
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
