## SpringfieldTownship Board to consider rezoning Ellis family property

The rezoning of 79 acres of the Ellis family property at Dixie Highway near Davisburg Road is scheduled to be placed on the consent agenda for a first reading at the regular Springfield-Township Board meeting Thursday, April 8.

Springfield Township resident and developer Tim Birtsas wants to rezone 49 acres from R-1 (single family residential, one and one-half acre lots) to R-2, which would reduce the lot size to one acre. He has also requested 21 acres be rezoned from R-1 to C-2 (general business).

On March 15 the Planning Commission voted not to recommend the property be rezoned.

Springfield Township Clerk Nancy Strole said standard procedure is for the matter to be placed on the consent agenda for a first reading, with action taking place at the second reading, which should be at the board's regular May meeting.

She added anyone can request the item can be taken off the consent agenda and put up for discussion.

The meeting begins at 7:30 p.m. at the Springfield Township offices, 650 Broadway, Davisburg. For more information, call 625-4802.


# City office gets new face

Sometimes all it takes is a cold, wet nose.

That's what Clarkston resident Carolyn Place found out when she began taking Major, her sevenyear old black Labrador Retriever, to visit her mother at Lourdes Nursing Home in Waterford.

Now, Major has become top dog, cheering up the other senior citizens who live there. Their eyes shine and their fingers stretch out to caress Major's fur, as the lovable Lab makes the rounds.

He also does tricks for treats, and many seniors have been known to keep a steady supply of dog biscuits in their rooms. One of his best feats is a "(Smart) Pet Trick." Major stands patiently with a dog biscuit on his nose. When Place gives the word, he tosses the biscuit heavenward -- catching it with a big, happy gulp.

"His stomach is never growling," Place quips.

An Independence Township resident and former planning commission member, Place decided several years ago she wanted to share her beloved pet with others. Major did so much to cheer her own mother up, she explains.

As her mother's health deteriorated, she could no longer take care of her own pet, a toy fox terrier named Sam. When Sam died, "Major took over," Place says. Like Sam, "her eyes lit up when she saw Major."

Other seniors responded as well. "I saw the reaction of how people just lit up. I thought, that's what I want to do. I want this dog to be a therapy dog.'

Major also became Place's own therapy dog after she was stricken with breast cancer, helping her "heal" after a mastectomy.

One day she even experienced a sort of epiphany when she was walking in Independence Oaks County Park. Ironically, "the dogwood was in bloom. And I heard a voice say 'You will be healed.'" Place has been cancer-free ever since.

Now, "He's part of my ministry. I just think God gave him to me to teach me about unconditional love," says Place with a glowing smile, tears gathering at the corners of her eyes.

Major was registered as a therapy dog in 1994 with Therapy Dogs International, Inc., based in Flanders New Jersev.

According to information from TDI, the non-profit volunteer organization's main objective is "to provide qualified handlers and their Therapy Dogs for visitations to institutions, facilities, and any other place where Therapy Dogs are needed. This is done in a way that increases emotional well being, promotes healing, and improves the quality of life for the people being visited and the staff that cares for these people."

Funds come from associate memberships dues, donations and bequests. Founded by Elaine Smith in the late '70s, TDI exists in the U.S., Canada and several other counties.

According to TDI, studies have shown "four-

a few minutes," adds Landry. "It gets a big smile on their face. They're just so happy."

Landry likes the concept so much she'd eventually like to see a permanent pet on the grounds. "It would make the nursing community more like a real community with animals." She claims this has been established at other institutions, and has been working for 10 years to convince the administration to get a "resident dog" at Lourdes.

She believes it would even improve staff performance. "You'd have everyone working with more energy every day," she laughs. "And I don't think anyone would mind taking the dog out for a walk."

But dogs do more than putting a happy face on seniors and staff members. Landry enjoys sharing a story about one of her residents who was formerly comatose. "She would not respond to anybody -- but responded to her Schnauzer. She reached out to pet it ...

"(Dogs and cats) offer emotional awareness than cannot be matched by people," she adds.

Gary Kastner, a housekeeping employee, supports her. He also has a black Lab, "one like Major. He picks up telephones, opens doors and jumps up on counters," Kastner chuckles. But he does so much more. Kastner's wife is afflicted with multiple sclerosis. "It's



footed therapists" often go beyond medical science and drugs -- providing relief from stress, lowering of blood pressure and easing depression. "Each TDI volunteer as an individual has made a tremendous difference in the lives of so many, by sharing their canine companion with those who no longer are able to have a dog of their own." Therapy dogs have also been used to boost the spirits of the disabled and troubled children

Carol Landry, director of human services at Lourdes, couldn't agree with the concept more.

"Dogs and cats are just total unconditional love -- no matter how you look or feel," purrs Landry "They make wonderful companions. It just brings (residents) back to their childhood memories of when they had their pets."

When Major visits, "everybody shares him for just

getting worse instead of better. So the dog helps he lot."

In order to be a Therapy Dog, TDI requires animals -- purebreds and mongrels -- to pass 10 basic criteria to become certified. In Place's estimation the two big tests are "discipline and a kind, loving disposition."

She prides herself on the fact that Major has never jumped up on anyone, which can be frightening, especially for older people.

She'd like to see more people and their pets involved, claiming it's a rewarding experience for both. "I was hoping to emphasize the work that Major does. the pleasure that he brings, the ability to allow me to connect to people."

That's just what Major is doing today. Residents call out to the pet as he passes by -- tail wagging constantly. Alice Smith ruffles his fur, pauses to watch a

trick, and rewards Major with a dog biscuit.

Linda Duddles is visiting with her mother, Virginia Harrison, and both say Major evokes memories of the past. "We had a cocker (spaniel) and a collie," says Harrison, a dreamy smile playing across her face. "I think it's a nice thing to do."

The two say other dogs are also frequent visitors at the nursing center. Some are former pets residents can no longer care for. "They always take this one lady's pet to her room," says Duddles. "It gives her a warm fuzzy for the day -- just to see her dog."

Police are looking for a suspect who allegedly used a Clarkston woman's credit card to withdraw \$400 from her bank account via an ATM early Friday morning.

The man, described as in his late teens with light hair by Oakland County Sheriff's Det. Perry Dare, was captured on video surveillance tape at the automated teller machine inside Farmer Jack, 7121 Dixie Highway. The time shown on the tape is approximately 5:30 a.m. on March 19. According to reports, the woman said the VISA card and the card's pin number were in her purse, in her car. The car was parked inside her garage, which she believes she locked Thursday night, but was found open the next day. She reported the missing purse at 9:43 a.m.

Dare alluded to a lesson from the incident, saying people should never keep their ATM credit cards — and matching pin numbers — in the same place. Anyone with information is asked to call Dare

# Grass fire destroys 20 acres - conditions are dry, dusty

A grass fire, that burned nearly 20 acres in a vacant field on Pine Knob Road, was extinguished Sunday afternoon by two local fire departments.

Independence Township Fire Cpt. Mike Fahrner said the blaze began when a Greenview Road resident burned some trash without a permit, which spread to next-door property on Pine Knob. Brandon Township firefighters had to be called in for assistance, Fahrner said, adding it took two hours to extinguish the blaze which produced flames nearly six feet high.

An Independence fire department spokesperson said the man would probably not be cited, but added Fire Marshal Greg Olrich would meet with him to go over rules and regulations for burning in the township. The resident told Fahrner he and his family were burning brush they had raked up from their yard and didn't realize the "dry and dusty" grass conditions that day.

Fahrner said the blaze could have been much more significant, "But it was contained and didn't spread to any of the houses." He added the fire burned mostly brush and field grass, not trees.

## **Rules for burning in Independence Township**

Open burning is allowed by permit only, issued by the Independence Township Fire Department.

You may burn between the hours of 7 a.m. and 8 p.m., but all fires must be extinguished by 8 p.m. including smoldering.

All materials being burned must be from the site — no materials may be brought to the site for the purpose of disposal. The size of the pile to be burned can be no larger than six feet in diameter.

No burning is permitted within 50 feet of any structure, or along roadways. Provisions must be

made to prevent the fire from spreading.

No flammable liquids such as gasoline, kerosene, starter fluid or others may be used to ignite the fire.

A fire must be attended at all times by someone 14 years of age or older with capabilities of extinguishing the fire.

No burning is allowed on construction sites.


Burning is a privilege that may be revoked at any time. It is the option of the fire official who dictates the right to burn.

Burning violations may be subject to fines in accordance with Civil Infraction Penalty. First offenses may be \$75; the second offense \$150 and privileges revoked.

Bon-fire permits must be issued by contacting the Independene Township Fire Daprtment at 625-1924 on the day of the fire.

You can burn: Dry leaves, brush, papers, wood scraps.

You can't burn: Plastic, rubber, petroleum products, shingles, tires, treated lumber, furniture, carpeting, garbage, manufactured building products/ OSB structure board, wet green grass, wet leaves, fiberglass, anything that causes black smoke or an offensive odor.

Eileen Gatton is blessed. Just ask her.

The Springfield Township resident has a strong faith in God which helped her raise nine wonderful children and, following the death of her husband, gave her a reason to go on.

On this sunny and warm Palm Sunday afternoon she is painting greeting cards with her own watercolor designs to send to friends and neighbors to cheer them up. Inside she'll write scripture or verse, "to try to say something helpful."

"God loves all of us the same," said Eileen. "He gives everyone talents. If we all use them, we can make a better world by sharing."

"When my husband died (in 1988) I cried for six months. But God kept tapping me on my shoulder. He said, 'Eileen, you had nine children, you know how to sew, why don't you start sewing with other ladies for the needy?"

Eileen found nine friends from her congregation at St. Daniel Church who get together regularly to sew layettes for infants. Every two months they complete five layettes for Lighthouse Clarkston, adding extras if necessary for premature babies.

It's an activity that has been very rewarding for Eileen. "God had spoken to me about doing this before, but it took the death of my husband to motivate me. I knew I had to do something. I couldn't go on crying all the time."

Two other hobbies Eileen has developed over the years are painting and writing poetry. "When you paint, you go

into a different world. All your problems are gone," she said. Her poetry reflects the wonder she sees in God's gifts. "In my poetry, I always try to give glory to God.'

Gardening, another of her hobbies, also crops up in her paintings and poetry. Eileen has about 2,000 square feet of garden in her front and back yards with a small part used for vegetables.

She grows everything from Asian lilies to marigolds, and starts many of her annuals, perennials and herbs from seed in her home, including Shasta daisies and delphinium.

Ivy, gerbera daisies, marigolds, African daisies, other colorful plants and even garlic have a spot in front of windows to add spring color to Eileen's home or in preparation to be transplanted in warmer weather.

Her paintings decorate her home and watercolor paints and paper pepper her living room. "This is my work room."


One of Eileen's sons has taken up painting and she has two of his paintings on display in her living room as well. "He's very talented," she said proudly.



# M-15 better suited for office than Holiday Inn

#### Dear Editor,

Your recent editorials have certainly sparked interest in the proposed Holiday Inn. I read with interest the person who asked his comments not be published and I happened to agree with what you quoted his letter as saying regarding the unique character of our township.

I would like to further comment on your position as it applies to property owner's rights. Property owners own land, not zoning. Local governments in accordance with a Master Plan decide zoning. Our township has an excellent Master Plan and Vision 2020 Plan for our community.

I, too, think that somewhere in this proposal there could be a compromise worked out regarding the parcel's development. What would be wrong with a nice office building? Our community has a lack of quality office space at this time. This type of use would limit peak periods when homeowners are at home on

nights and weekends and it would be less invasive to the adjacent residents. It would also eliminate the transient population that a motel/hotel attracts. Back on April 4, 1995 when the M-15 corridor (including the proposed site) had its first reading for rezoning, Mr. Carlisle expressed "property is viable in the OS-1 category."

However, having attended meetings in 1988 and again another in 1995 when the property owner declared desires for a motel/hotel on that spot, I believe the problem is not on the issue of viable office space or compromise, but rather a desire for a motel/hotel on this site.

Schools were also ordered closed Tuesday as back roads continued to be dug out.

Mail delivery was cancelled Monday, according to Ray Klien, Clarkston postmaster. Klein said a truck out from Royal Oak with the Sunday afternoon delivery of mail had taken from 4 p.m. Sunday to S a.m. Monday to get back to the home office. There was no delivery Monday.

Power was first a low voltage and then absent entirely for 50-80 homes in the Goodrich Farms area Monday morning. Mrs. Janice Nicholson reported lights cast only a warm glow until about 11:30 a.m. and then disappeared entirely.

Detroit Edison crews were reportedly working to solve the problem - a line down at Maybee and Pine Knob roads. There were no babies reported born during the storm and the Fire Department had no emergency calls regarding heart attacks or food shortages, but Dr. James O'Neill reported an unlikely accident on Seymour Lake Road. A child was reported injured by an anchor and the family was unable to get out to seek medical attention. Neighbors were called for help, O'Neill reported, he intending to go out in a four-wheel drive vehicle if they were unable to make it.



Joint board meeting set for M-15 rezoning issues

A joint board meeting between Independence Township's Board of Trustees and Planning Commission was announced by Supervisor Dale Stuart at the March 16 board meeting.

The public meeting takes place April 15 at 7:30 p.m. at Clarkston High School, 6093 Flemings Lake Road. Residents are encouraged to attend and share their input.

Stuart said the purpose of the meeting is to review recommendations made by Township Planner Dick Carlisle for rezoning properties on the M-15 corridor, north of I-75. The issue has generated recent contro-

The board will hold a public hearing on the amendment before it becomes effective, but Springfield Township Clerk Nancy Strole said a timetable had not yet been set.





the Holiday Inn concept but also due to the overwhelming public opposition to it. Over 150 concerned citizens attended the standing room only Planning Commission meeting and one by one many residents rose to explain in very precise detail why they opposed the Holiday Inn.

For someone like myself unaccustomed to politics and these types of meetings, I must say that I was impressed and humbled by the universal support for saving our township from this development. Even after this victory, the immediate neighborhoods as well as many residents throughout the township are banding together to not only keep this type of unwelcome development from happening but also to correct the zoning of this property to OS-2. This designation would bring it in line with the township's Master Plan adopted years ago and allow the Planning Commission to control the type of development this property will see.

Reasons for opposition:

- 1. The Holiday Inn would be adjacent to eight residential homes and its 2-story frame sitting on higher land would create a 50-foot obstruction to the residents in those homes.
- 2. Environmental concerns surrounding the adjacent wetlands and concerns about pollutants running off from the hotel and parking lot into the wetlands and Little Walter's Lake.
- 3. Traffic congestion already on M-15 would become even worse. Patrons of the proposed hotel would not have access to I-75 due to the location of the on-ramps and the double yellow line on M-15. These people would have to go north, somehow



make a U-turn and then continue south to Clarkston

- or I-75. 4. The developers say families and businessmenwould be their main customers, but we have concerns that large trucks and Pine Knob Theater-goers would also stay there, which would mean a lot of noisy traffic at all hours.
- 5. Safety for the neighborhood children is a great concern with the possibility of hotel patrons so close by and additional traffic.
- 6. Property values would go down since neighboring homes would no longer be as desirable due to the hotel and other related and inevitable development.
- 7. Concerns about what will happen 5 to 10 years down the road when the hotel fails and something else even less desirable moves in.
- 8. Hotel lighting would be an unwelcome distraction to the tranquility of the neighborhood.
- 9. Who wants an unsightly hotel sign at the entrance

#### to a neighborhood?

- 10. This project does not comply with the Master
- Plan for the M-15 corridor that stipulates office use for much of the property leading north out of Clarkston.
- 11. The M-15/I-75 area is the gateway to Independence Township and Clarkston and we need to be very careful to ensure that whatever is built there sets a positive tone for what residents and visitors will find in our community.

As I mentioned earlier, I am just one of a growing number of concerned residents working to preserve our township. We want development to be controlled and responsible so that our community can be proud of its progress and pleased with what we have created.







ment, making cosmetic changes, as well as others.

Ryan said the new ordinance is available at city hall anytime for public inspection. He added the ordinance will be officially adopted 20-30 days after the summary is published.

"This is the culmination of a lot of hard work," Ryan said.

The ordinance sets aside five sections for future use. The other 20 sections deal with the following issues: the intent, definitions and terms, a zoning map, a breakdown of districts, residential districts, multiple family districts, residential planned development - a new district for the city, village commercial district, light industrial district, a schedule of regulations, open provisions for non-conforming uses, open exceptions, enforcement and administration, procedure for the Zoning Board of Appeals, procedures for making amendments to the ordinance, off-street parking for loading and unloading merchandise, landscaping standards, an updated signs ordinance section, flood hazard areas, and special land use section.

Ryan said the enforcement section contains provisions for the hiring of a zoning officer to check and enforce the new ordinance.

"We are going along with the recent state law," he said. "It's just updating and modernizing this ordinance."

In the off-street parking section, Ryan said a parking fund will be established to help maintain current parking, and possibly add more in the future. "It will fund future parking development," he said.

Ryan also noted that a light-industrial district was included in the ordinance, even though no piece of property in the city currently has that zoning, it was better to have it on the books than not.

This is an issue the council mulled over, and even joked about, before allowing it to be included in the new ordinance.

A new zoning designation in this ordinance, residential planned development, is included to have a more tailor-made zoning that can be agreeable to both the developer and the city.



The team will be led by a group of junior distance runners who rank up there with the best in the state.







Severe Thunderstorm Warning: Severe thunderstorms are occuring in or will shortly occur in the region. Take shelter indoors immediately.

**Tornado Watch:** Atmospheric conditions are ripe for the development of tornados. Remain alert for approaching storms, and continue to monitor broadcasts for further weather statements.

**Tornado Warning:** A tornado has been sighted or is indicated by weather radar. Move to a pre-designated place of safety.

## WHAT TO DO NOW ....


• In a home or building, go to a pre-designated shelter, such as a basement. If an underground shelter is not available, move to an interior room or hallway on the lowest floor and get under a sturdy peice of furniture.

• Stay away from windows! It is a myth that opening windows will prevent damage. In fact, opening windows increases the chance for damage and injury during a severe storm or tornado.

• Get out of automobiles - don't try to outrun a tornado. Their movements and speeds are variable and unpredictable, and it is often difficult to accurately predict which direction the storm is actually moving.

• If caught outside or in a vehicle, lie flat in a nearby ditch or depression.

• Mobile homes, even if tied down, offer little protection from tornados. Abandon them immediately and proceed to a pre-determined safe place of shelter.



E DO DE SS

Tornados can develop in areas where a severe thunderstorm watch or warning has been is sued. Keep an eye to the sky, and do not hesitate to seek safe shelter if conditions appear to deteriorate rapidly.

## WHAT TO DO BEFORE ...

Develop a plan for you and your family for home, work, school and when outdoors.

Have a NOAA weather radio with a warning alarm and a FRESH battery backup to recieve warnings. Listen to the radio for information.

If planning a trip outdoors when there is a potential for severe weather to develop, make arrangements for an plan to allow access to a pre-designated shelter nearby.

## STAY INFORMED

The National Weather Service continuously broad casts updated weather warnings and forecasts that car be recieved by NOAA weather radios sold in many stores. The NWS recommends purchasing a radio tha has both a battery backup and a tone-alert feature wich automatically alerts you when a watch or warning is issued. New technology in weather radios makes these broadcasts even more accurate for your area, see story below.

# EL NINO AND LA NINA

What about these Spanish sounding weather patterns, El Nino and La Nina? Well, they give forecasters an idea of what might come. "They tend to make weather act in certain ways," National Weather Service Meteorologist Jeff Zoltowski says, but are not 100 percent predictable, "There are still wild swings in the weather tossed our way."

For example, La Nina has a tendency for strongest weather impact in late winter and early spring, "making the weather colder and wetter than normal. So far it's been colder than normal, but it's been quite dry. So that hasn't panned out."

La Nina, while having a less dramatic effect on weather in general, does has a tendency to produce more tomados.

"In our area (during La Nina) there


# TRACKING THE WEATHER Weather Service predictions better than ever

It's safe to say most folks in Michigan have heard about our predictably unpredictable weather, to which the saying goes, "If you don't like the weather stick around 15 minutes, it'll change."

Listening to National Weather Service Meteorologist Jeff Zoltowski, it's also safe to say he doesn't buy it. As a matter of fact, with improved computers, satellite technology, sophisticated radar systems and a good knowledge weather tendencies, the folks at the NWS know the score a few days before it happens.

"I'm not bragging. And, we don't claim to be perfect, but far more often we get it right," Zoltowski said.

Peak tornado season in Michlgan is June through August, and are most likely to occur from 3 to 9 p.m., but have been known to occur at all house gittle day or notif. With spring thunderstorms and tornados looming in the not too distant future, that's good to know.

"Our most important function -- our mission -- is the protection of life and property as it results with weather events," he said. "We're always looking ahead several days, so we usually have a good handle on things a day before." Teams of two forecasters and one technician work eight-hour shifts, 24 hours a week, 365 days a year tracking weather conditions. If severe weather is on the horizon that three-member team can jump to 10.

"It can get pretty frantic around here," he said
