Independence okays study for new. township hall

Residents protest possible site on Flemings Lake Rd.

Detect 105,000 in funds were OK d last Tuesday for a study on a new township hall. But the plot thickens concerning one of the possible sites — 20 acres on Flemings Lake Road which was once considered for a Lakeview "II" Cemetery:

The township is currently eyeing three sites on Flemings Lake, Sashabaw Road and in Clintonwood Park — but nothing has been chosen. The Sept. 21 Independence Township Board meeting addressed the first step, approving the Independence Township Town Hall/Civic Center Space Needs and Site Selection Study Proposal submitted by Township Planner Dick Carlisle, whose firm Carlisle/Wortman Associates, Inc. will manage the project.

An architectural firm will be part of the planning process, as well as a Project Advisory Committee composed of two Township Board members, three Planning Commissioners and three citizens. The committee will participate in the study, much like the Vision 2020

The proposal incudes background studies to determine function and space needs, site selection, project costs and an action plan.

Carlisle estimates the study to be completed in n months and build time at two to three years. Design work should fit the architectural "character" of Clarkston, he added:

"Another key point is to find the biggest bang for the buck for this community," Carlisle said, noting the site should include "creative opportunities" for expansions like a new senior center.

Though the board praised the plan, some were wary of putting money into layout before space constraints and costs. "It don't want to see us put money into character and appearance early on," said Trustee Neil Wallace. He stressed board input all along the way. "I just don't want to see littake on a life of its own."

Carlisle said the last thing to be considered would be the facade. But he encouraged the board to think of howit would impact the run oundings. It's like replacing Tiger Stadium? he said.

City toughens drunk driving laws with ordinance amendment

An updated ordinance with stricter penalties for drivers under the influence of alcohol or other drugs is one step closer to becoming law in Clarkston.

Ordinance 80-8, an amendment to the City of the Village of Clarkston Uniform Traffic Code, was first read by Tom Ryan, city attorney, at the city council meeting Monday, night. The amendment "provides for enhanced penalties" for drunk driving and other offenses, Ryan said.

Following the June 1997 limo accident in Birmingham which paralyzed Red Wing defenseman Vladimir Konstantinov, the state's ordinance has been amended to include increased sanctions for repeat offenders behind the wheel.

Such sanctions include removing the driver's li-cense plate and replacing it with a temporary issue, or ordering the vehicle be immobilized, according to the amendment.

mother change in the ordinance would increase the number of days spent in jaily or a misdemeanor offense from 90 to 93 days, to allow for fingerprinting, Ryan said. Continued on page 21/A:

A second reading of the amended ordinance will take place at the council's next meeting in October. Ryan said the ordinance would then become effective following that meeting.

In other business:

■ A motion to raise city sewer rates to comply with rates for the City of Detroit was tabled until the next meeting, pending further details from city manager Art Pappas, who is on vacation. When approved, the rate would be raised \$1.65 per unit.

On behalf of attorney Neil Wallace, Robyn Johnston requested the council approve design work to make the main level of his Main Street office handicapped accessible and barrier free. Currently, Wallace's business entrance is 12 inches from the last step from the sidewalk. The six-inch step needs to be eliminated to create the ramp, Johnston said.

Since the building is an existing building in the city, handicap ramps are not required. "He doesn't really have to do this. He wants to do this," Johnston said,

Mayor Sharon Catallo said the city engineer would look at the design. "I don't have a problem with it," Catallo said.

Group hopes to make "Nutcracker" a Clarkston tradition

For many, it's an annual event every year. Some even make the long drive to Detroit to see the production.

Now, a local ballet company hopes to make the beloved Nutcracker ballet a tradition in Clarkston at Christmas, too. Three entities have been working hard to make that a reality: Lakes Area Civic Ballet, Clarkston Foundation and Clarkston schools.

This is the company's eleventh year of performing the Nutcracker Suite by late Russian composer Peter Tchaikovsky. The beloved story concerns a little girl whose Nutcracker is transformed into a handsome prince who whisks her away to magical adventures.

Until this year, the ballet has been performed at other schools. Clarkston High School's new performing arts theater presents a seating capacity and stage that is more conducive, said Clarkston resident Terry Newman, founding director of the company. Newman also runs her own dance school, The Dance Shoppe in Waterford.

Students from many dance schools and communities participate, Newman said. Two professional dancers from a Canadian company will dance the prime parts of the Nutcracker/Prince and

Sugar Plum Fairy.

Some principal parts will be danced by Clarkston students, including Karen Weil as Clara and Maggie Ness as the Rat King. Both are CHS tenth graders,

"We'd like to make it a tradition for the people in Clarkston to celebrate the start of their holidays with the Nutcracker ballet," Newman said. This is also one way area residents can be supportive of the arts, she added.

Two performances are scheduled: Friday, Dec. 17; and Saturday, Dec. 18. Tickets are \$8 per person, and group rates are also available. An additional two dates, Dec. 15 and 16; will be reserved for Clarkston school children. Morning field trips must be scheduled by individual teachers, who will receive information this week, Newman said. Tickets are \$5 per student. The first five schools that purchase over 100 seats will be visited by a costumed character who narrates the story.

The performances, scheduled the last week of school, "really get them excited about Christmas," Newman said.

Newman said there is also a special outreach program that will allow those less fortunate to see the ballet. Financially in-need organizations should contact the dance school at 620-1971.

Christine Bove, artistic director of

the ballet company who teaches at Newman's school, said the CHS theater will allow elaborate sets that formerly the ballet company didn't have room for. "The sets are gorgeous. This is a really professional-level ballet," Bove said. Falling snow will also be a part of the scenery.

A taped orchestral score will be used this year, but in the future Newman would like a live symphony. She'd also like to see Clarkston students involved, such as the Madrigal singers and the future string orchestra.

This is a group effort to promote the fine arts in Clarkston, Newman said. She especially praised the help of assistant superintendents Pat Brumback

and Dave Reschke. "The school district has been very generous in getting it worked out for us, as a way of showcasing the fine arts and exposing children to it. A lot of people have never seen a ballet."

Middle schoolers get the CCA.N.G.L.E after school

Dozens of middle schoolers have taken up sumo wrestling, sewing and playing air hockey after school—only it's not in their living rooms.

The Clarkston Christian Association's after school program for middle school-aged kids, CCA.N.G.L.E. (A New Generation of Learning and Entertainment) kicked off its second year this fall.

The program has a wide range of activities for kids as a source of alternative activities between the hours of 2:45 and 6 p.m.

Dan Niewoit, pastor at Mt. Zion Church on Maybee Road in Independence Township, serves as co-director for CCA.N.G.L.E. with his wife, Laura.

On average, 15 to 40 middle schoolers come to the CCA, located at 5529 Sashabaw Road, each school night, Niewoit said. The kids sign up at their school's main office each day. Transportation to the CCA is provided by the Independence Township Parks and Recreation Department.

For recreation, kids can inline skate, play billiards, table tennis, air hockey and interactive games such as sumo wrestling, oversized boxing and jousting, or human bowling, Niewoit said.

New this fall, educational activities include sewing, learning sign language, drama classes and tutoring.

"It's a lot of fun," he said. "It's just a neat opportunity to direct their energies in positive ways."

Each room in the building is supervised by an adult volunteer. Depending on the number of kids each afternoon, more volunteers are on call, Niewoit said.

Healthy snacks such as fruit and raisins also are provided to kids at no extra charge, he said.

Tutors are either adult volunteers or college students. Tutoring is available "for whatever the child needs," Niewoit said.

"It is absolutely tremendous. I have been there, and it's a healthy, wholesome, supervised environment. They are wonderful to work with," she said.

Niewoit said when the program began, the support from school officials was not strong.

"Our whole vision is to support the community. We've been blessed.

"Originally, they didn't know how to take us," he said. "We just wanted to serve, and they've really embraced it as of late."

Niewoit said plans are in the works to take Clarkston kids to the Waterford Christian Association

building, and vice versa, during afternoons for an even broader range of activities. The WCA, located at 1585 Crescent Lake Road, has basketball and wallyball courts.

Funds for both the CCA and WCA come from Outreach of Mt. Zion, although some recent funding has been provided by a grant from United Way of Oakland County, Niewoit said.

The cost for the program is \$2 per day or \$20 per month; a parent-signed waiver is required to participate in the program. Tours for parents also are available; call the CCA at (248) 620-4900.

Township responds to Hubbard tree removal

Independence Township Board members have sided with residents' concerns of some trees being removed at the site of the new elementary school on **Hubbard Road.**

Though the topic wasn't an agenda item at the Sept. 21 meeting, Trustee Neil Wallace brought up the subject, saying it's just one more example of poor communication between the schools and township. He pointed to the fact that two trees were removed on the residents' side and many more on the school's side along 700 feet of Hubbard.

"We had pledges by the school that they would minimize tree removal," Wallace said, noting this was confirmed at past meetings. "To a lot of people trees are not a big deal. But the big deal is these trees came down without notice to us."

Trustee Dan Travis echoed Wallace's sentiments, noting one of the trees was a four-foot-diameter oak. "These are charter trees," he said. "The neighbors were terribly dismayed."

Travis is also an Independence Township Planning Commissioner. "(The Planning Commission) was very specific about retention of the greenbelt," he said, pointing out Hubbard's designation as a natural beauty road.

George White, president of G.S.W. Clarkston Consulting Construction Coordination, was present at the meeting. He argued Road Commission of Oakland County had 10 revisions for the road, among them the tree removal plan.

Certain trees had to be cut down on the school's side of the road "to minimize the impact" on the residents' side, he said. A curb-and-gutter plan was elected that moved the original center of the road closer to the school.

"We are not in the business to decimate and take down trees," White said. "I cherish trees, I cherish a rural setting. It bothers me to see those trees taken down, but we had to fall within a certain width of road."

Wallace said his main argument was that the township hadn't been notified. "What the schools didn't do is contact us. "You say you had no choice. But we had no motive ... You should have called us. This is a horrible, horrible example the schools are setting for the children of our community."

On Monday, Wallace said the schools also didn't give the township the opportunity to come up with a better solution "so those trees would still be standing."

He argued the township and schools had agreed to be better communicators and work as partners when Independence Elementary School was planned. Although the schools submitted a conceptual site plan to the planning commission, they never followed through with the final site plan.

However, a landscape plan was presented this summer, which "identified these trees, saying these trees are staying," Wallace said.

Craig Bryson, public information officer with the RCOC, said Friday the original plan had to be altered. He said White's comments to the board were correct.

"The removal was necessary," Bryson said. "Our policy calls for there to be no trees within a certain distance of the edge of the road. We worked with the school district to reduce (the road width) to save some trees." A permit was issued June 16 to Nagle Paving Co. of Farmington Hills to remove the trees in question, he said.

"We understand their concerns," he said of the township. "But we also need to be concerned about safety and liability issues."

Township Supervisor Dale Stuart said, "It would have been good if they had communicated with us. The schools certainly should do something to make it right." When told the schools hope to replace the area with fast-growing trees, Stuart said they should be trees "of like maturity."

Board sets tax rates

All but two 1999 millage rates were approved by the Independence Township Board at the Sept. 21 meeting: Library Operation and Safety Path rates are subject to Truth in Taxation hearings this year. The hearings are set for Sept. 30 at 6 p.m. at the Independence Township Library. The board is expected to approve the additional rates at that time

Township Assessor Dave Kramer, who prepared the proposal with Finance Director Susan Hendricks, said the hearings are required because the two millages will generate more revenue this year. This is because taxable value has increased in the township, due to new construction and sales

Truth in Taxation says you cannot increase revenue from the prior year without notifying the public," Kramer said.

Millage rates approved Tuesday include

■General Fund: 0.9845 mills will generate a total tax levy of \$949,692

■Fire: 2.5379 mills will generate \$2,448,169. Library Construction: 0.2880 mills will gen-

erate \$277,817 for the payment of General Obligation Tax Library Bonds.

■ Police: 2.6121 mills will generate \$2,519,746.

Rates to be approved include:


■Library Operation: The proposed 0.7238 mills will generate \$698,209.

■Safety Path: The proposed 0.4867 mills will generate \$469,492.

If approved, a total tax levy of 7.6331 mills will bring in \$7,363,221.06 to the township.

An average township resident with a home worth \$193,000 can expect to pay a total of \$736.59 in township taxes this year, Kramer said.

The township must submit the rates to Oakland County by Oct. 1. Township taxes are due Dec. 1, with a grace period until Feb. 14 without penalty.

After the storm, 'Rainbows' brighten broken lives

Several community members are helping kids and their families see "a bright Rainbow after their family's storm."

Rainbows for All God's Children is a peer support group program for kids ages four to 18 and adults seeking support after the loss of a loved one, divorce or for other reasons.

The program began more than eight years ago with five families (and about a dozen children) in need of support, said Helen Vardon, coordinator for Rainbows. Numbers have since grown to 54 kids, she said.

Vardon said facilitators are used instead of licensed counselors for a specific reason: "To have a professional would be taking away from what the whole program is -- a community outreach." Facilitators must pledge to help "give them hope for a bright Rainbow after their family's storm."

No more than six to eight adults or children are placed in a group. Vardon deals with adults who have suffered great loss, including issues of suicide.

A Clarkston couple, Matt and Laura Sanders, meet with children, and Barb Sights, another local resident, facilitates a divorced group. Matt deals with teenagers and Laura talks with younger kids.

Vardon receives referrals to the program from the court system, teachers in the district and local attorneys.

"It's a healing that the whole family needs," Vardon said.

Rainbows originated in the Archdiocese of Detroit, and is a nationwide program for dealing with loss. The Clarkston program, held at St. Daniel Catholic Church, 7010 Valley Park in Clarkston, is open to all faiths, Vardon said.

Currently, Andersonville and Springfield Plains elementary schools are the only schools in the district involved in the program. However, Vardon said she hopes word will spread and other schools will want to become involved.

"We want to open it up and need trained facilitators," Vardon said. Facilitators use written material, "helping them get in tune with their environment.

"If we can let ourselves down, it helps the kids,"

Facilitators need no counseling background and are trained by current facilitators, she said. Confidentiality must be maintained.

Discussions are age-appropriate and deal with types of loss. In addition, various activites including making crafts, drawings, playing music and "feelings" games take place.

"Children don't know where to put their feelings. They withdraw because they have a lot of pain," Laura Sanders said. "You're there to help them get their feelings out."

Matt Sanders said his involvement with Rainbows began following a divorce, when his son was placed into a children's Rainbows group.

"My son did a drawing. It gives you a chance to talk about things," he said. "I've been getting more involved since.'

The first semester of the program begins Oct. 7 at 7 p.m. in the Cushing Center at St. Daniel Catholic Church. Meetings take place on several Thursdays through December.

A meeting will take place for facilitators, parents and children at 7 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 30 in the social hall of St. Daniel Parish.

Pine Knob Investment Co. and Independence Township are facing each other in court again - but this time on a new issue.

Pine Knob contends it does not have to appear before the township's planning commission for site plan approval for a proposed ski run, and instead can immediately apply for a building

Timothy Palulian, head of the township's building department, says that while the proposed ski run is a structure, its proposed use constitutes it as a new principal use which requires planning commission review.

Section 5.12 of the township's zoning ordinance is the focal point of debate between both parties.

It reads, "..., site plan review and approval is required for all

new principal uses, accessory buildings and additions to existing structures."

"The ski run would not be a new use," said Thomas Raguso, attorney for Pine Knob. "The land is already being used for skiing so the ski run is not a new

"We're asking for a building permit and we're saying we don't have to go before the planning commission for approval. The

ski run is already allowed as a structure and does not require planning commission approval," he said.

Palulian disagrees. "I equate this ski run as a new principal structure added to the site. And I consider it as a new, additional structure onto the existing ski set up." he said.

"For that reason, in my opinion, they must go before the planning commission for review.

Co-owners of Pine Knob Investment, Joseph Locricchio and Gary Francell, are charging that the township illegally and improperly denied a building permit for the construction of a proposed ski run and have taken their argument to court.







unce a civil case is completely over (including appeal), successful plaintiffs have the right to execute on the defendant's assets if he or she does not pay. This means that an officer of the law can take whatever of the defendant's assets that can be found, and sell them to satisfy the judgement. If this search proves to be insufficient to satisfy the judgement, the plaintiff can subpoena the defendant's records and take his or her deposition in an effort to discover assets. Plaintiffs who follow this course of action are entitled to take everything of the defendant's that is needed to get the money owed, sub-

ject to exemptions that allow the defendent to keep some property.







'The bell rang and they were still asking questions'

CHS senior takes life experiences to the classroom

Although they're half his age, fifth graders at Springfield Plains Elementary School felt at ease listening to 17-year-old Kenny Leonard speak on the sensitive subject of acceptance.

Leonard, a senior at Clarkston High School, spoke to a group of about 150 kids at Springfield Plains Friday afternoon about the importance of accepting others. During his talk, Leonard used props such as M&M's and a \$20 bill to grab the kids' attention.

As a hands-on example, he separated the M&M candies into different color groups, then asked three children to pick their favorite bag. He explained that even though there were differences in color, the inside remained the same.

"It's what's on the inside that counts," Leonard said.

By crumpling up and stepping on a \$20 bill, Leonard also showed the children how a person's value doesn't change.

"People start out brand new, like this \$20 bill.," he said. "You get stomped on, but does that mean you lose that value?"

In another example, Leonard asked a teacher to come forward, and explained to the kids how even though they see her as their teacher, others see her in different roles, such as mother, sister, et cetera.

"Every person plays a certain part in someone's life," he said.

Leonard also told the group of how he was caught embezzling close to \$4,000 from The Gap last year, when he worked there as a part-time cashier.

Aside from a night spent in jail, he was forced to pay about \$3,000 in court costs and has a permanent felony on his record. He said the incident had a marked effect on his life.

"I'm gonna carry that with me for the rest of my life. It was a bad choice," he said. "But it had one of the greatest impacts on me."

Sharon Devereaux, principal at Springfield Plains, said the response from the kids was tremendous.

"The body language showed they were right with him. And at 3 p.m. on a Friday afternoon, that really says something," Devereaux said. "The staff was very

enthusiastic about it, too."

Leonard said he also was impressed by the children's reactions.


"It was great. Actually, the bell rang and they were still asking questions," he said. "Being in school, I know what it's like (for kids)."

Leonard is in the process of writing a book called "Life's Potpourri," in which he describes the pressures of adolescence and the importance of responsible actions and decisions.

Springfield Plains was Leonard's first public speaking event. He said he hopes to continue speaking at other schools, both within and outside of the school district, in coming months. To schedule a talk at your school, call (248) 245-1686.

to address items like square footage and accessibility. "This is a blueprint for how we're going to proceed," he said, noting the study would be conducted "one step at a time."

The unresolved cemetery matter

Carlisle also addressed the importance of public input. "This is the type of process there should be a lot or participation in. The results will be held accountable by the public who will use it."

That process started Tuesday night. Residents of Flemings Lake Road are already opposing the idea of a new township hall intheir neighborhood. About 25 residents turned out to protest the possibility.

"We don't want to see another public building on our road," said Vivian Bowden, a retired school teacher.

Others expressed dismay after the meeting. Traffic problems have gone from "bad to worse" with the placement of the DPW, then the new Clarkston High School on their road, said Mari Ann Staley.

"As far as I'm concerned, they messed over us enough, "said Gail Hess. With the recent repaying of Walters Road, "They go faster. They do not stop. Buses don't stop. They just round the corner." If a new township hall is added, "You're talking a lot more people (and) a lot more traffic," Hess said.

During the meeting, residents unearthed another concern. Why didn't the township ever build a new "Lakeview II Cemetery" on the other side of Flemings

Lake Road.

Records from the township clerk's office show the township purchased 25.7 acres fronting on Flemings Lake in 1962. The township borrowed \$20,000 from Lakeview Cemetery's trust fund — but never paid it back. The acreage was never developed into the intended cemetery. Instead, the Department of Public Works was built on five acres, leaving the remaining 20 acres vacant. Now that acreage is one of the sites being considered for the new township hall.

Neighbors want to know two things: will the cemetery be built, and will the township reimburse the trust

Township Clerk Joan McCrary doesn't know why the cemetery wasn't built. "I think that we just didn't need it, and we still don't need it," she said, noting "there is little information about it in our office." However, she confirmed the 1962 purchase.

She explained the cemetery trust fund includes payments for grave plots and fees the cemetery uses for upkeep. What isn't spent stays in a "perpetual fund"

used for improvements.

DPW Director George Anderson estimated the original cost of \$20,000 for the Flemings Lake site has grown to over \$200,000, due to accumulated penalties and interest. He said approximately 2,000 lots are left in Lakeview Cemetery for gravesites. At 100 burials a year, that would be space for another 20 years.

The question is, should it again be considered for a cemetery. Anderson says no. "Cemeteries are better

left to private business" is his opinion.

However, "The neighbors feel we should keep it for future cemetery needs, not for a new township hall," McCrary said. The township's general fund has subsidized some of the maintenance costs and should also be reimbursed, she said. It would have to be "an equitable amount," McCrary added. "We would have to determine how much that would be."

Staley calls conditions at Lakeview Cemetery, 6150 White Lake Road, "deplorable." She says individuals have to take care of their loved ones' lots, even

planting grass seed.

Anderson said there was a substantial loss of ground cover, due to a grub problem. The DPW has corrected that, sowing new grass seed, he said.

Residents are also upset that the Walters Road safety path stops short of the high school's access drive, south of Flemings Lake. Stuart said the rest of the safety path is the school district's responsibility.

The township paid for construction up to the school's property line. Its obligation stops there. "It's the school's reponsibility to put in the rest of it if they want to," Stuart said.

 The board unanimously approved a resolution from Oakland County's Board of Commissioners, supporting the E-9-1-1 Service Plan. The plan will improve communication between police, fire and emergency medical service personnel.

■ During Mayor's Comments, Catallo said she met recently with Dale Stuart, Independence Township supervisor, regarding the township's possible involvement in installing a water main through downtown Clarkston. "Now is the time and we need to do it," she said.

Catallo said Stuart will discuss the matter with George Anderson, director of the township department of public works.

■ The council recognized an extension letter received by the Michigan Department of Transportation regarding the decision of whether or not to install a water main through downtown. Catallo said the council has told MDOT it will have a decision by January 2000, although the extension is until June.

Results from a phone survey about revitalization of downtown were positive, said Dan Colombo, city councilman. The survey centered around shopping habits and the overall condition of the downtown busi-

ness area, he said.

"It went very well. The responses were very interesting. People had a lot of opinions," Colombo said.

About 80 were surveyed; the results will be available Wednesday, Colombo said.







This year's boys cross country team understands its true goals can't be achieved until the postseason.







Clarkston golf coach Tim Kaul was a bit miffed at his team's preseason ranking. The Wolves were not ranked anywhere in the top 10 in the county despite finishing eighth in the county meet and returning all but one starter from last year's team.

Consider Kaul and the Wolves vindicated.

Led by county champion Mark Churay, the Wolves finished third at Monday's Oakland County Meet, held at the Pontiac Country Club. The Wolves finished with a team score of 308, just four strokes away from first place. Walled Lake Central, who Kaul pinned as a darkhorse going into the meet, won with a score of 304. "He fits the mold of the kind of backs they've always had," Richardson said of Sofer.


Clarkston won its fifth game of the season by methodically defeating Pontiac Northern 17-12 at the CHS football stadium.


Candace Morgan led the Wolves with 12 points.




Athlete of the Week: Jon Robinson
