# **City will hold** public hearing and vote on water issue

**Clarkston News Staff Writer** The city council announced March 28 that a public hearing and informational meeting will be set up regarding construction of a water main on Main Street.

A vote on a bond proposal to pay for the water main will be Tuesday, May 9.

The water subcommittee, which is made up of Chairman Scott Meyland, Steve Arkwright, Douglas Roeser and William Basinger have been working together for several months on the construction plan.


The public hearing/informational meeting will be April 19 at 7 p.m. at the Independence Township Fire Department Station No.1 on Citation Drive.

The plan, if approved by voters, would see the City of the Village of Clarkston connect to the Independence Township's community water well system.

The plan has three main parts. The first portion would see a water main installed on Main Street. The portion of the project which would be funded by general obligation bonds would be \$800,000, with assessment beginning in July of 2000. Another \$400,000 would be funded by special assessment districts. The city will borrow no more than \$3 million and issue its general obligation tax bonds.

The estimated millage to be levied in 2000 is 1.4 mills (\$1.4 per \$1,000 of taxable value). The estimated simple average annual millage rate required to retire the bonds is 3.87 mills (\$3.87 per \$1,000 of taxable value).

The remaining construction and general obligation bonds would be assessed at the time they are borrowed, in 2004 and 2007, which is the reason for the increase in mills. The city will borrow \$1.1 million each year.

Polidan said the OCSD has two major worries: "the lake could eventually be gone and a safety concern." The subdivision is located off Waldon Road, southwest of Sashabaw Road.

said. The average lake depth is "two feet or less" and it's "95 yards of muck to where the water starts. That muck could be deeper." he added. "Who knows how deep that muck is." Polidan said some longtime residents told him they remembered the lake as being six to eight feet deep.

## The bond proposal

Shall the city of the Village of Clarkston, Oakland County Michigan, borrow the sum of mot to exceed \$3 million and issue its general obligation tax bonds therefore in one or more series, payable in not to exceed 30 years from the date of issuance, for the purpose of paying all or part of the cost of acquiting and constructing water supply system improvements to service the City? The estimated millage to be levied in 2000 is 1.4 mills (\$1.40 per \$1,000 of taxable value) and the estimated simple average annual millage rate required to retire the bonds is 3.87 mills (\$3.87 per \$1,000 of taxable value.)

# Massage parlor shut down

Police do not expect to charge business or property owners with prostitution or any other offense in connection with the raid of a local massage parlour in Independence Township Feb. 28.

Sgt. Gary Miller, in charge of Special Investigations for the Oakland County Sheriff's Department, said he anticipates neither business owner Pok T. Hamlette nor property owner Tom Wilhelm, who owns a real estate business next to the parlour, PK's Salon on Dixie Highway, will be charged.

"The business has been closed since the raid. It has not reopened," Miller said. "The township is looking at some violations of building codes. The windows were boarded up."

**Township Building Director Bev McElmeel** said the township is consulting its attorney on that matter. "We are in the midst of an investigation as it relates to the (township's massage facility) ordinance," McElmeel said last week.

Insuk Kim Kang, 39, a Texas resident of Korean desent, was charged with two counts of accosting and soliciting, two 90-day misdemeanors, based on two incidents with an OCSD undercover officer at the massage facility. The OCSD planned the raid after Kang allegedly offered sex for extra cash, said Oakland County Sheriff Michael Bouchard prior to the raid of the one-year-old business.

Although there had been rumors of illegal sex operations occurring at the facility, an anonymous tip provided sufficient information to conduct a search, police said.

"I don't look for it to reopen," Miller said.



# AP classes offer jump start to college

It pays to think ahead.

Students across the nation are entering college with an extra boost that can get them through quicker, thanks to college-level courses offered in high school. Like many schools, a slew of AP, or advanced placement classes, are offered to students at Clarkston High School.

Judy Medlin, AP coordinator and counselor at CHS, says the growth AP classes has seen since its beginnings in Clarkston is phenomenal. In 1994, there were only four AP classes, with 55 students enrolled. Last year, the number of classes doubled and the number of students grew to 245, she said.

Economics, U.S. history, psychology, biology, chemistry, physics, literature and language all are offered as advanced placement, Medlin said. In the fall, two new classes will join the list — AP studio art and AP environmental science.

A combination of mostly juniors and seniors are currently enrolled in AP classes, although sophomores are eligible to take U.S. history at the AP level. A few intensive classes for freshman and sophomores also are offered.

Medlin says it is not unusual to see students taking more than one AP class in a semester. But she does warn students from taking on too many advanced placement classes at once.

"They are at the college level, with college materials and textbooks. They are more demanding," she said. "It's up to the individual students."

Kathryn Zarzycki, a senior, took two AP classes her junior year, biology and composition, and is enrolled in two more this year. She says the experience has given her a better idea of a college major.

"I enjoyed AP biology. It shows you if you like it," Zarzycki said. "You move a lot faster. It's more on your own."

Jenni Salata, a senior, adds, "You read a lot more

- no more busywork."

Another AP student and senior, Tom Wisniewski said the AP classes are more comprehensive than other courses, and students must be prepared for more independent study.

"It's a lot more independent. If they're willing to do the work, and interested in the subject, then why not (take an AP class)?" Wisniewski said.

Tricia Greve, a junior enrolled in her third AP class, said it is important students are motivated when taking AP classes.

"If you want to be prepared for classes (in college), you should do it, but if you don't want to do the work, you shouldn't do it."

Medlin expects continued interest in taking AP courses. However, she emphasized a student does not have to be enrolled in an advanced placement class to take the final exam in May for placement at the AP literature students. AP literature was the first AP course taught at CHS in 1984.


college level. The exam cost is \$76 per subject and is timed; most exams last about three hours, she said.

A score of between one and five is received, with five being the best score. Medlin said scores of three to five are very often accepted by most colleges and universities, who will award credit or waive a class.

Eric Romein, a 1999 graduate of CHS, took eight advanced placement classes while in high school. He entered Michigan State University as a sophomore with 43 credits and is now at junior status.

Romein plans to graduate in 2002 with bachelor's degree and will pursue his doctorate in genetics. He said the challenge of AP is worth getting ahead in college.

"You have to be hardworking and motivated in the (AP) subject. For any student that's motivated enough, they should try," he said. "It's very beneficial."



New equipment for Clarkston High School's TV production studio and a new look for the CHS Marching Band highlighted the March 13 meeting of the Clarkston Community Schools board.

The board approved 6-0 to allocate \$59,152 for camera equipment, mixers, speakers and other studio equipment from Thalner Electronic Laboratories Inc. Board members also approved a \$46,536 band uniform bid from Demoulin Brothers & Company, for 200 new uniforms. Trustee Rick Crigger was absent.

Among items purchased for the CHS TV studio is a digital camera, which will be an upgrade to the current system, said Matt McCarty, director of technology for Clarkston Community Schools. An original bid for equipment failed when the company went out of business before completing the school's order, he said. Cliff Chapman, CHS band director, presented the new uniform with Craig Kahler, director of business services for the district. Chapman said the last time a purchase was made for new uniforms was 12 years ago and the new uniforms would not need replacing for another 10 years. The three-piece uniforms have adjustable straps In other business:

■ Board members approved 6-0 a resolution to call for a regular school election June 12, 2000. Petitions for school board positions were made available starting March 14.

Karen Foyteck, board president, and Mary Ellen McLean, board secretary, have terms expiring this year and both have announced intentions of running for re-election.

All district programs and subjects currently offered through Oakland Technical Center-Northwest Campus were transferred to Oakland Schools, following a roll call vote 6-0. The transfer is the result of an agreement between Clarkston schools and the land Intermediate School District. By roll call vote, board members approved 6-O reinstating a CHS student who had been expelled for violating Section C-29, Physical Assault, of the Student Code of Conduct. The student shall be readmitted March 14. Board members approved 6-0 a second reading of recommended administrative guidelines for the district, with two exceptions. Kurt Shanks, trustee, requested the word "tenth grade" be omitted from language about post enrollment options. He said the options also should be available to students in grades 11 and 12. In addition, a new policy on school safety information will be discussed further, following a request by McLean to remove the item. McLean said confusion over language stating the district was responsible for a student "while enroute to or from school" A CARLEN AND A CARLENDER AND A

made it necessary to study the item further.

■ Pat Brumback, assistant superintendent, presented studies on costs to the district for special education and fees for facilities use to the board.

Brumback said rising costs in special education are a concern to the district. "This is an underfunded mandate in our state. . . so local effort is needed to keep the costs down," she said. As an example, \$33,000 per student is estimated for 2000-01 tuition costs.

However, Brumback said efforts to keep the students within the Clarkston school district is an excellent benefit for parents. Currently, 34 students are being served in the district in grades K-12. In Michigan, school districts must provide special education from preschool age through age 26, she said.

Another top official of Independence Township has vowed to run in the

2000 election. Treasurer Jim Wenger made his announcement to fellow board members and the audience at the March 21 meeting.

"I will be seeking a second term to run as treasurer in Independence Township;" Wenger said.

Wenger, a retired Clarkston High School teacher who taught for 30 years, was first elected in 1996.

He has been enjoying his role as treasurer and said his duties include collecting all monies from the town-

ship, including summer and winter taxes; maintaining all investments, and working with township financial consultants to oversee the "whole financial picture of the township."

Wenger said his accomplishments in office have included providing quarterly financial reports to the township board. "I think we're a lot more accountable now with regular reporting," he said. He said he has also "grown" with the township's new computer software system, which has made communication with other officials and the public more effective — making more available online.

Wenger also noted improvement in the township's general financial picture, which he attributed partially to its hired consultants from Aileron Ltd., the man-

> ager, and Munder Capital, the investor for fixed income. Although there has been controversy on the board as to whether the consultants should stay on, Wenger feels "it's good to have the outside input."

> Aileron's expertise was recently reduced from a set salary to a "by-project" basis. "For three years now, we've had a good track record with Munder," Wenger said. Many other Michigan townships now have professional money managers on board, he said. "We're in good

hands. I know that our financial strides were not because of me, but I think I've been a part of that."

He said his strengths include "a strong work ethic," plus "an open mind on policy decisions. I'm objective. I want to do what's best for the township," he said. He doesn't see himself as "a polititian. I just try to do the best job I can.

"Hopefully, I've tried to keep the residents informed, by cable or by letter to (newspaper) editors. I probably wouldn't have liked the job when the kids were young, with all the night meetings," he joked. His family includes wife Sharon, a Clarkston Elementary School teacher, and two grown-up sons, Jason and Matt. Jason's family includes wife Jeanette and Wenger's first grandchild, Drew:

Wenger serves on the board of directors for both the Clarkston Optimists and Clarkston Area Youth Assistance. He also serves on the Auditor's Team for the North Oakland Headwaters Land Conservancy.

Wenger predicts 2000 will be a definitive race because of "all the divisiveness on the board." He expects many people to run.

Wenger is the third full-time elected official who has announced his candidacy. Supervisor Dale Stuart said in February he will seek a third term, and although she has made no formal announcement, Clerk Joan McCrary is seeking her third term.

Newcomer George White, a retired Clarkston schools educator, announced in February he will run against McCrary in the 2000 race. Dave Wagner, who ran in the last election, will also run as trustee (see related story). White and Wagner are the only two candidates thus far who have filed petitions, although several have been pulled, according to the clerk's office. Both filed as Republicans.

Dan Travis has also announced he will seek a sixth term as trustee. Fellow trustees Jeff McGee, Larry Rosso and Neil Wallace have yet to announce whether they will run again.

Petitions must be submitted to the clerk's office by 4 p.m. May 16. The general primary is August 8; the general election is Nov. 7.

## Genessee man charged in car-jacking



A Genessee Township man has been charged with car-jacking in connection with an incident in Independence Township March 14. Roy Depottey, 30, of Genessee Township was arraigned before 52-2 District Court Magistrate Kelly Kostin at 1:30 p.m. March 21 and charged with the offense, a felony, which is punishable by up to life in prison. Det. Dave Hendrick of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department Independence substation said. His preliminary exam is set for March 31 at 10 a.m. before District Judge Gerald McNally.

Depottey was returned to Oakland County Jail with bond set at \$100,000 cash surety.

According to reports, Depottey allegedly car-jacked a township woman's 1998 Ford Taurus while she was filling it with gas at the Roy Brothers Amoco Station . 6840 Sashabaw Road. The car was unlocked with the keys in the ignition,

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
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# Former candidate returns in 2000 race

**Clarkston News Staff Writer** Township resident Dave Wagner is the newest

candidate to file a petition in the Independence Township 2000 race.

According to the clerk's office, Wagner filed his petition to run for township trustee last Wednesday, March 22. He ran unsuccessfully as trustee in the last election in 1996.

So far, one other newcomer, retired Clarkston schools educator George White, has been the only candidate to file a petition, although several incumbents have also announced they plan to seek re-election this year (see related story).

Wagner sat down with The Clarkston News last week and talked about his reasons for running, and some of the key issues he thinks need to be addressed in the township.

Personal: Married to Janice, an accountant, with four children: Lisa, 28, Julie, 25, Mike, 19, and Laura, 13. Wagner retired from Avis Ford (a car dealership) 12 years ago and "dabbles" in real estate now. He was a precinct delegate for the Republican party from 1996-1998. Wagner currently serves as chairman of the township's Safety Path Committee. He is a frequent audience member at township meetings. Wagner has lived in Independence Township for about 14 years and in Oakland County (formerly Waterford and Springfield Township) all his life.

Issues he's the most concerned about: Wagner's main concern is a restoration of harmony to the board. He agrees with Treasurer Jim Wenger that the board is currently divisive in many areas. He's concerned that currently there is no cable broadcasting of township board meetings, due to the recent change from TCI to AT&T. "It really gives people the chance to see the board inaction," Wagner said. "I think we

## need to look hard at the cable contract."

Growth is another concern of his. "I'd like to see this area stay a bedroom community. Development is going to happen," but he thinks it should be planned carefully. He hopes the township will develop more

like Springfield Township, with cluster options that are less intrusive to the rural character and "friendly to neighborhoods." Vision 2020 is "good, but are they going to follow it?" he questions. He's also concerned about fire and police services keeping up with the growing population. "I really feel strongly about the fire and police," Wagner said.

Wagner says, about the controversial Clarkston Creek Golf Course issue, "there's too much not known. The township needs a lot more information (before they enter into any deal) ... I love Parks and Recreation and I think Ann (Conklin, director) does a great job, but the thing has lost money for so long, what's telling them they're going to make money?"

Why he wants to run: "Because I'm really con-

cerned about the township and the direction it's heading. I think the board needs people who've been here, know the area, and have the time to spend on issues --- which I have. Because I'm retired, I can put the time in where others are unable to."

Another reason for running,: "It's corny, but just the relationship the board has with itself. That's really big. If they don't get along, you don't have anything. Look at the city of Warren, it's unbelievable. I saw it on the news and thought it was Taiwan," he quipped. "Everyone yelling and screaming."

In Independence "there doesn't have to be confrontation at every meeting," he stressed. "For example, the compensation package. Why did it drag on so long? It wasn't that much of an issue. Teamwork - that's the biggest thing."

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## Independence planning commissioner approved

A planning commission member is leaving and her brother was "reappointed" by the Independence Township Board last week.

Supervisor Dale Stuart's recommendation to appoint David Lohmeier to a seat which will be vacated by Cynthia Lohmeier was approved 6-1. Trustee Neil Wallace objected.

Stuart said Lohmeier, who is leaving in the middle of her three-year term, is no longer eligible since she's moving to the City of Clarkston. She was appointed to fill her brother David Lohmeier's seat when he moved out of town. However, she recently informed the township he's moving back.

Stuart quipped, while "this is not the Lohmeier seat," there was a need to appoint someone immediately who is "up to speed" on township issues.

Before voting, Clerk Joan McCrary agreed David Lohmeier is a good choice. But she said she is "disappointed" the supervisor is not bringing more "new people" on board. "Especially a female now and then.'

"I think it's good to have a broad range ... and having (women's) input is a healthy thing," agreed Trustee Neil Wallace.

Stuart said Thursday he has a "good track record" of appointing women to various boards and committees. "It's been my goal all along to have the planning commission and other committees well balanced, from different walks of life and genders," Stuart said. He explained he didn't have much notice when he heard Cynthia was leaving and knew the township would be stuck with "a six-person board, I thought I should consider him," Stuart said, The appointment means current commissioner Jill Palulian will be the only female member.

"This is an election year," Stuart added. He said he thought it was "pretty self-serving" for McCrary and Wallace to make those comments.

# Pope and Catholics don't need to apologize

## Dear Editor,

I must protest the distorted and erroneous coverage accorded the message of Pope John Paul II while in Israel. Journalists, without exception, repeated the old cabal that Pius XII was silent during WWII.

Please note information printed in *The Wanderer*, a weekly paper in St. Paul Minn.: After the Nazis invaded Poland in September 1939, Hitler imposed a news blackout on Poland. This blackout was pierced when Pope Pius XII revealed horrible Nazi atrocities against Jews and Catholics. A *New York Times* editorial (January 24, 1940) confirmed the Vatican's public condemnation of the Nazi atrocities.

These Vatican condemnations told the world in detail that what is now called a Holocaust had begun! New York Times articles reporting the January 1940 denunciations by Pius XII on Nazi atrocities were carried on January 23, 1940 ("Vatican Reveals Terrors in Poland"), on January 25, 1940 ("Vatican Continues Atrocity Charges"), on January 26, 1940 ("Atrocities on Poles Denied in Germany"), on January 29, 1940 ("Mass Shootings in Poland Laid to Nazis by Cardinal, Memorandum Presented to the Pope"), on January 30, 1940, ("The Text of Cardinal Hlond's Report to the Vatican on Persecution by the Nazis") and an editorial on January 30, 1940, ("In German Poland"), saying the atrocity reports "were presented to Pope Pius and published with his authority."

Protests by Pius XII of Nazi persecution of the Jews were published by *The New York Times* throughout the Holocaust years. 

# Substitute teaching is not an easy task!

Last week I had the opportunity to do some substitute teaching at Sashabaw Middle School. My schedule included sixth grade language arts and social studies and seventh grade math. It was quite an experience!

My first task (according to a lesson plan provided by the teacher) was to administer a spelling test. I found it ironic that the list began with the word "anxiety." Despite years of experience as a teacher, principal, and central office administrator, I was a little anxious. Teaching three subjects at two different grade levels is a challenge, and I wanted my lessons to be productive for the students.

Since most middle school youngsters become accustomed to the habits and rituals established by their teacher, the first trial that I faced was to learn the established routine in each of the classrooms. Next I had to review the concepts and skills to be taught and make certain the instructional materials were ready for use. Lastly, I needed to remind myself that sixth and seventh graders like to "test the waters" and they don't necessarily care about rank. After the routines were examined, the instructional strategies were reviewed, and my state of mind was prepared, I headed to my first class.

When the boys and girls entered the classroom, they immediately asked me if I was going to be the "sub." They then went about their daily routine without much direction from me. As they waited for the bell, they placed their homework on the desk and entered into conversations that could be understood only by someone who had spent time with youngsters of this age. For example, I watched as several students talked to each other, all at the same time! Once the class began, the real story of our Clarkston Kids unfolded before my eyes! The boys and girls realized that the "substitute" was feeling his way through the normal routines, so they offered help. They told me how their teacher takes attendance, collects homework, and sets up the day's work.


The youngsters did test the resolve of this substitute ٠ to maintain an orderly, productive atmosphere, but once they knew that I was serious about helping them to learn, they did everything I asked of them and more!

The pupils displayed a genuine interest in learning, and they seemed to appreciate the time spent explaining the purpose of the lessons.

Nowadays it is easy to expect less of young people. After all, the national media seems bent on bringing their failures to our attention. The truth is that middle school students are in the midst of the maturation process, and life's lessons aren't always pleasant. You may have read how some schools have lowered standards by "dumbing down" the curriculum. My direct experience with our youngsters confirms my thoughts about most

middle school students: They are usually ready, willing and able to assist adults as we work to help them learn. If we provide them

with appropriate opportunities they will make us proud. They know that their capabilties are often underrated,



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

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# Local officials urge residents to mail in census forms

The amount of money the state returns to local communities each year in revenue sharing is based on the community's population, and the formula changes each year. That's why local officials, especially those in fast-growing communities like Independence and Springfield townships are concerned that residents fill out and return their census forms this year.

Independence and Springfield townships made the Southeast Michigan Council of Governement's list of top ten fastest growing communities in Oakland County last year.

In 1990 the population in Independence Township was 23,717. By 1996 it had grown to 27,939. Clerk Joan McCrary said officials expect the count to top 32,000 — a figure SEMCOG estimates Independence Township has already reached.


Based on unaudited 1999 revenue figures, Independence Township received \$1,355,930 from revenue sharing - 28 percent of its General Fund, she said.

Springfield Township's population in 1990 was 9,927. After the 2000 census, local officials expect the population to be 14,200 — a 40 percent increase.

said Springfield Township Clerk Nancy Strole.

Strole said this year Springfield Township expects to receive about \$770,000 in revenue sharing funds. "I don't know if most people realize we receive far more in revenue sharing funds than we do in property taxes. The funding comes from sales tax, basically."

Strole said her concern that all residents be counted is two-fold. "First, be-'c a u s e Spring-



field, like Independence is a growing community with new streets and developments, I'm concerned that some of those new people will be missed. I've been working with the census people to make sure they have the latest information."

Strole said her second concern is that residents don't understand how many programs are funded from revenue sharing.

"It's actually money in residents' pockets,"

Strole listed spring clean-up, graveling eight to 10 miles of roads, putting chloride on roads in the summer for dust control, and parks funding as some of the most important programs funded by revenue sharing.

"The risk is that in growing communities every resident will not be counted, or that a new resident may not feel a sense of identity with a new community, and not understand the need to fill out a census form," she said.

McCrary said another problem is that prior to the 1990 census, the amount of money returned to local communities was determined by a formula set in the state constitution.

McCrary said during an economic downturn in the early nineties, the legislature changed the system. Revenue sharing is now part of Governor Engler's annual budget and the formula changes each year.

Because the economy has been good during the last few years the township is receiving more money from the state than in prior years. But the amount is still less than it would have been under the old sys-

# Oxford man sentenced

An Oxford man was sentenced in Oakland County Circuit Court Monday in connection with a fatal car accident that occurred last summer. tem. "We definitely would be getting more money," McCrary said.

McCrary said Michigan Townships Association has been lobbying for a return to the old system.

"Because the whole formula is based on the census, it's another reason we went to the expense and effort of doing a mid-decade census (in 1996) - so the state would use the figures in . determining revenue sharing,"McCrary said.

The City of Clarkston recorded a population of 1,005 in its 1990 census. SEMCOG estimated its population was 1,029 in 1999. City Manager Art Pappas said he's pretty sure most city residents will return their census forms.

His major concern is that the census bureau will not have the correct borders for the city. "Sometimes the mapping on computers doesn't work out

right," he said, adding he will have to monitor the situation through completion of the census.

Another concern is that many Independence Township residents think they live in the city. "Ninety-nine percent of our calls are from people who want information about the library or the (Independence Township) building department," said Pappas. He added other calls come from people who say they are moving to Clarkston, but are actually moving to Independence Township and don't realize there is a township government.

"And then we get calls misdirected from directory assistance from people who want to reach the city of Clawson. We have a good time here," Pappas joked.

the Hovercraft down to the lake because of limited access, but on Thursday he said the OCSD was working on improving methods to get there.

Several residents have wondered if the problem is related to drainage problems with construction of the two-year-old Clarkston High School — or the year's dry weather. Until a study is done, no one will know what the cause is, Hamann, a five-year resident of the subdivision, said. Other residents wondered if perhaps the lake might be "dying" a natural death and revert to a wetland.

Those attending the meeting also listened to horror stories about how residents and even their pets had been out on the lake and found themselves sinking into beds of a substance like quicksand. One resident, for instance, recounted his own experience a year ago while trying to retrieve a boat. "I sank to my chest in muck," he said. Residents also worried about liability problems if someone is hurt.

Residents said they have had their worries shared by several township officials, including Oakland County Commissioner Frank Millard, Township Supervisor Dale Stuart and Township Trustee Neil Wallace, who recently drafted a letter to township engineers, describing the lake as having "a spongy feel to the soil."

Hamann estimated a study — which would determine the source of the problem — would cost from \$10,000 to \$16,000. An augmentation well, which would be dug to provide a source of water to rehydrate the lake, would be costly — \$30,000 to \$40,000. Hamann said the well might make the lake "swimmable." Currently, you also cannot fish or boat, Hamann said.

Township Engineer Randy Ford of Hubbell, Roth & Clark said township engineers "have not been requested to do anything at this point." However, he remembers a homeowners' meeting last fall where the idea of an augmentation well was discussed. Residents also mentioned possible help might come from the state's Department of Natural Resources and/or Department of Environmental Quality. Both the DEQ and DNR have been out to the site, Hamann said.

Residents also worried about having to fund the entire study and possible augmentation well out of their own lake association budget. Hamann said, at the fall meeting, Stuart thought the township would be able to contribute about 10 percent to the study. Stuart said Thursday he thought the township might be able to contribute to both the study and the augmentation well, if needed.

"I would recommend that to the board," Stuart said, noting the lake is in "terrible condition. It's got to be devastating for those poor people.

"I'm suggesting they do some studies — what is the cause and what are the solutions. If not, everything is a guess." However, he added, there could be problems with the augmentation well, which would be used to help pump water back into Gulick Lake. "The difficulty is, if they hit an aquifer, it could dry up (area) wells."

Deputy Clerk Cari Polidan, Dep. Jim Polidan's wife, represented the township and took notes for the event. In response to whether monies from the Oakland County Infrastructure Fund could be used to supplement the costs, Cari Polidan said the next day, those monies have already been earmarked for other projects.

Sara Bonnette, aquatic biologist with the DEQ, said the Great Lakes and many inland lakes are low right now. "Water levels now in lakes and streams are low, due to the small level of precipitation we've gotten — meaning it hasn't rained very much and we haven't gotten a lot of snow this winter," Bonnette said. "I don't think we got much snow last year either." Mary Vanderlaan, from the DEQ's land and water management division, said Monday residents need a hydrogeologic study, but the DEQ doesn't have "the funding, equipment or expertise" to do studies for local communities. Vanderlaan said groundwater wells would have to be installed to "look at groundwater elevations, flow directions and quantity of water to the lake."





Junior Sarah Morgan will be playing goalie this season. Morgan is in her third varsity season and is a big strength on this year's team Mitchell said.


"She's very solid. She's a great goalie," Mitchell said.

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


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# A final congrats to winner sports and hello to spring
