National City robbed

Second local bank in six weeks loses money to gunman



The second local bank robbery in two months happened Wednesday, but police don't think it's the same person.

Police called to National City Bank, 6650 Dixie Highway at the corner of Maybee Road in Independence Township, at approximately 11:20 a.m. after a man described as tall and weighing 165-185 pounds approached a teller and produced an automatic weapon.

The man asked for an undetermined

amount of cash which she turned over. Witnesses said it was hard to get a description of the suspect as he was wearing "a dark baseball cap, black jacket, darkcolored scarf around his face and dark sunglasses," said Lt. Dale LaBair of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department Independence substation.

The suspect "escaped in an unknown direction," LaBair said. "We have no vehicle — virtually nothing - at this point." He said police got "unusually aggressive," bringing a tracking dog into the area, who was unsuccessful in picking up the suspect's or a possible vehicle's scent.


LaBair said the extra help was brought in partly because it took so long to alert police. The bank was equipped with an alarm system "that goes to Cleveland, then comes to us," he said, "It took a matter of minutes and we were on top of it."

The March 29 incident was the second bank robbery to occur in the township in the past two months. On Feb. 18 a suspect robbed the Great Lakes (now TCF) Bank on M-15, north of the City of Clarkston. Police have no suspects in either case.

LaBair said he doesn't see the two incidents as being related. "A bank robbery is such a speciality that usually I'm not surprised when it is the same person." he said. "But the characteristics are not that close. There are too many differences."

Clarkston Creek report says improvements costlier than expected

Golf course needs \$5 million

A recent report from a consultant has determined it will take over \$5 million in improvements to bring Clarkston Creek up to par as a golf course. But when that happens, it will be an amenity.

The report, prepared by Don Childs Associates, a Golf Course Design, Engineering & Consulting firm from Sylvan Lake, states "Acquisition of the Clarkston Creek Golf (Course) would give Independence Township an excellent opportunity for a municipal golf course property. Purchase of the golf facility would expand the public recreational services to the township residents, and it will provide a delightful piece of open space in an area that is currently seeing rapidly expanding residential development."

The board of trustees approved \$2,120 to hire

the consultant in February, following months of discussion on whether the township should take over the 144acre golf course on Maybee Road. A deal is being proposed by JLG Properties, headed by local developer Joe Loccrichio, where the township would buy the flagging course and have developers manage it.

Locricchio wants to build a 121-unit townhouse project on the northern portion of the property, which would mean relocating two of holes to the current driv-

The complicated proposal also involves a stormwater retention plan (identified in Vision 2020), a land swap of 14 acres owned by the township on Sashabaw Road and 19 acres on Sashabaw, known as the Marshall property, that would be purchased by the developers. As part of the deal, the developer would



Former Wolf races at Palace

Nicole Nicholas, a 1993 graduate of Clarkston High School doesn't look like the type of person who would put herself in danger on a regular basis. But she does and she loves every bit of it.

Nicholas loves to race snowmobiles. So much so that she's decided to put her plans to become a physical education teacher on hold for a while.

"I've only got one chance to do this and I'm going to do it as much as I can," she said.

Her love of snowmobiles began back when she was just four years old and snowmobiled up North with her father David. Her father now serves as her mechanic and teacher. The two travel together on the tour.

"He puts me in my place and builds me up at the same time," she said.

Nicholas has competed in both indoor and outdoor races across the country and in Canada. The current tour, which included a date at the Palace April 1, was part of the Super Snowcross Tour. About 200 trucks hauled snow in for the event. She raced against 10 other women, but she's not afraid to compete with men.

"Racing against men is harder than racing against women. The men are more physical, but the women are getting there," she said.

Getting there may be an understatement. Nicholas broke her collar bone while racing two years ago. The accident put her in a brace for 12 weeks afterwards. She's also broken her wrist and suffered endless bumps and bruises along the way.

"My mother (Mary Louise Susalla) was real uneasy about me doing this when I started, but she's accepted it now and watches when she can," Nicholas said.

Nicholas' mother isn't the only one watching. Snowmobile racing is gaining popularity every day. Nicholas

said she's competed in arenas with roughly 15,000 spectators. She's taken second place in two tour events this year which were held at the Metrodome in Minneapolis and the Fargodome in North Dakota.

So is it worth it? Financially speaking probably not for the former Wolf. While men take home roughly \$5,000 for a second place finish in the top men's class, Nicholas would only bring home \$600 for a top place finish in the top women's class.

"It's discriminatory just like all the other sports," Nicholas said. "It began as a male sport, but women are getting more involved in it. We've gotten more publicity lately, but we're not making nearly the money that the men are."

Add up the lousy paychecks, broken bones and endless travel and it doesn't sound like much fun, but it's the excitement that keeps Nicholas coming back for more.

"It's a contact sport and I love it. It's an adrenaline rush. It's a lot safer than recreational snowmobiling. For one thing, everyboydy's sober. Everybody's going the same way and it's a race," she said.

Nicholas has also competed in races which were part of the American Snow Cross Racing Association, where she's taken first in the points championship for the past two years.

From trail riding as a little girl with her father in Cadillac and Houghton Lake to competing at the Palace and across the country, Nicholas knows what fierce competition is all about. However it's the friendship between racers that puts a smile on Nicholas' face.

"Everybody's so nice on the tour. It's almost like an underground society. It's different once the race starts though."

"I've been racing for seven years and it's been a blur. Sometimes I have to step back and look at everything I've accomplished," she said.

Holiday Inn to be rescheduled

The Holiday Inn issue won't be checking in until at least May, according to Independence Township Building Director Bev McElmeel.

McElmeel confirmed last week an attorney for petitioners Eagle Investment of Mid Michigan requested the public hearing item be removed from the March 23 planning commission meeting agenda. McElmeel said the reason was an error in the application.

According to a letter from Susan K. Friedlander, attorney for Eagle Investments, the applicants intend to "file an amended application for special land use." A special land use needs to be approved under the current zoning, Office Service Two (OS-2). The township rezoned several pieces of property on M-15 from commercial to office service last year which, in addition to the proposed hotel, has generated much controversy. The issues include property owners' rights, increasing traffic congestion on M-15 and the impact of the proposed hotel on surrounding neighborhoods.

The first conceptual site plan, under the old commercial zoning was denied by the planning commission. Their decison was upheald by the zoning board of appeals. After the zoning was changed, the owners of the property sued the township, but the township prevailed in circuit court. However, the judge told petition-

ers one option would be to submit a new site plan under OS-2, which would require a special land use for the proposed hotel.

In her letter, Friedlander said she did not expect her clients to return to the planning commission for a new public hearing until May 11 (May meetings are scheduled for May 11 and 25). The new site plan proposes 80 rooms instead of 82.

"That is a change, but in my opinion, as far as issues that both the township engineer and I raised, I don't think there has been substantive change in their site plan," said Township Planner Dick Carlisle.

Carlisle said there are three major issues with the proposal: "the compatibility of the use on surrounding residential areas and two, the safety of the access onto M-15. A third issue is the impact of the project on the wetlands to the immediate south."

Green Haven resident Susan Balmas, who lives on Little Walters Lake and has been a spokesperson for her neighbors' concerns, said last week she is disappointed the item will have to wait a few more weeks.

"After reviewing the materials, the site plan and (engineer and planner) reviews, I was very interested in the outcome and now it's been delayed," Balmas said. "But I'm not surprised after reading both reviews. They hardly made any changes — and there have been so many problems with this plan."

Youth injured in crash on Dixie Highway

A three-car accident at White Lake Road and Dixie Highway sent three people to area hospitals Saturday. Reports said a 17-year-old youth driving a 1993 green Pontiac attempted to make a left turn on a yellow light off Dixie onto southbound White Lake just before noon. His car collided with two cars traveling east on Dixie at the intersection.

The youth and his 16-year-old female passenger were taken to POH. The female was released and the youth, more seriously injured, was hospitalized with a

minor head injury and released Monday, a POH spokesperson said.

The accident was "a mess," said Dep. Mark Darbe of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department Independence substation. "It was reported neither of them were wearing their seat belts."

A third person was transported to Genesys Medical Center and a fourth person was treated at the scene and released. Reports said all three drivers were cited.

Waterford man found guilty

A Waterford man has been found guilty of one crime and not guilty of another in two cases of armed robbery reported last April in Independence and Springfield townships.

Clifford Lemar Terry, 37, will spend 17 1/2 to 30 years behind bars for two counts of armed robbery in connection with the April 27, 1999 incident at Family Video, 5480 Sashabaw Road in Independence Township.

In that incident, two female employees said they were assaulted while leaving the video store with the night deposit. The younger woman, then 19, said she was pistol whipped by Terry with a large handgun, reports said.

Terry received his sentence two months ago before Oakland County Circuit Judge Steven Andrews after a jury found him guilty of the charge, said Sgt. Gary Miller, Special Investigations officer for the Oakland County Sheriff's Department.

However, on March 16 Terry was found not guilty before Andrews for another alleged armed robbery that occurred at the Frosty Boy in Springfield Township on April 9 last year.

In that case, owners of the business and their young daughter were allegedly held hostage briefly while Terry asked them to turn over some cash. A 16-year-old female employee was also allegedly forced into the office with a rifle, reports said.

Miller said the reason for the verdict was insufficient evidence. "We had one witness," Miller said. Other witnesses were unable to identify the suspect, he added.

Miller said he doubts there will be an appeal for the second case, based on the fact that Terry is "not eligible for parole for at least 15 years."

Office puts an end to evening parking by restaurant patrons

Patrons of downtown Clarkston restaurants often use the parking lots of local businesses after hours, but that won't be possible any more at one business.

The Prudential Chamberlain-Stiehl Real Estate office at 32 S. Main St. at the corner of E. Church has taken extra steps to curb parking by non-employees.

There have been two signs in the Prudential lot for over a year alerting drivers to the fact that parking is for employees, tenants and their customers only, as well as signs on the building. But some drivers either ignored or didn't notice the signs.

Union owner Curt Catallo said "We've had parking problems since we opened because we draw so many people to downtown Clarkston." Catallo said he has parking agreements with some of his neighbors, and thought things were OK with Prudential.

Prudential manager, Beverly Bartus, said Catallo had been notified that employees and patrons would have to park elsewhere. She said her business has been growing and the lot is needed in the evening as well.

Before asking the Clarkston police to ticket cars parked in her lot, she put fliers on car windows, warning drivers not to park there.

"I've got (real estate) agents coming back here


as late as 11 p.m. with out-of-town clients. We also teach classes here. If our lot is filled, what are we suppose to do?" Bartus asked. "Our office in Birmingham had to put up an electric gate. I don't want to do that here for safety reasons."

Catallo said when he found patrons and employees had been ticketed he removed and paid for the tickets — about 34 to date.

Cemetery Fund can be reduced or discontinued

After months of digging up the history of the Cemetery Trust Fund, Independence Township Attorney Gerry Fisher has concluded the fund may be reduced - or even eliminated.

A conclusion to Fisher's report - prepared for the township several weeks ago - states: "It is my opinion that the township board has the authority to reduce the Trust Fund, or even discontinue the Trust Fund if it determines that, as a matter of policy, it would be in the best interest of the township to do so."

Fisher's opinion further states ... "that there is no obligation on the part of the Township General Fund to reimburse the Cemetery Trust Fund for monies utilized to purchase property now utilized for the DPW (Department of Works) com-

The issue of whether the trust fund would be paid back resurfaced when residents who live around Clarkston High School appeared at a Septemeber 1999 meeting at which possible sites for a new township hall were discussed. They objected to the fact that the township was looking at property in their neighborhood on Flemings Lake

The property, which houses the DPW, also includes 20 vacant acres which was once considered for a Lakeview "II" Cemetery. Residents took the township to task on two subjects: why the cemetery was never built across from the new high

Make the right choice for our children

Dear Editor,

Did you know there was a parental outcry over the bus situation this school year and the Clarkston School District heard and responded by taking a very serious look at your concerns and comments?

A proposal is now being recommended addressing these transportation safety issues and bus concerns about overcrowding, long bus rides, middle school and high school students riding the same bus, and shortage of bus drivers.

In addition the proposal addressed results from multiple studies concerning optimal learning time of all students, research about sleep patterns and brain function, and high risk behavior associated with the unsupervised hours after school when students are home alone.

We have listened and read many of the comments being made about the proposal and have a few thoughts we hope the community will consider. Set aside your personal needs for a moment, putting kids first and consider the following:

1. Should 11- to 14-year-old children be considered

the primary caregivers of younger children everyday after school?

2. How much time on a daily basis do 11- to 14-year-old-children need to be engaged in school sports on a daily basis? Is one to one-half hour sufficient? Certainly each individual is welcome to spend as much personal free time to improve their skills at home and among friends.

3. Children 11 to 14 years old need adults available to dialog, model, support and encourage them. If more adults were available after school when children got home, the major concerns about high-risk behavior that we need to look at would not be a factor, but the fact is too many youngsters are home alone.

4. When research points out peak times of learning and how sleep deprivation can affect academic performance for this age group, we would be wise to apply that information. Creating a healthy learning environment should always include what works best for the students.

We have a long weeding season ahead

Let the weeding begin!

Do you ever remember getting such an early start on serious yard work?

Two weeks ago my husband rototilled our little vegetable garden and I planted the first crop of snow peas. Last weekend he enlarged and rototilled (bless his aching back) another garden.

When he was digging up the grass he found a healthy crop of grubs. They quickly became food for the fish in our lake.

The ground is much drier this year than in the past. Clarkston Farm and Garden Club Horticulture Committee chair Linda Meadors compares the ground to a moon-scape.

She said we are in the third year of a drought in Michigan and recommends serious watering.

The leaves are out on the bushes and some of our perennials are coming up too. The butterfly bushes and hydrangeas are sprouting leaves, as are my coneflowers and delphinium. This early sprouting and greening of the grass is a little worrisome. It seems to be even earlier than during the Big Heat Wave and Drought of 1988.

The birds and waterfowl which migrate are still on schedule however. Each spring and December we get a small flock of ducks that stop by our lake for a couple of weeks.

American Mergansers, buffleheads, grebes, canvas backs and coots usually make an appearance this time of year. During a late winter they'll come in as late as mid-April.

I know this because we have been marking their visits in an old, beat-up copy of Peterson's "A Field Guide

to the Birds."

Why we keep using this little paperback escapes

me. It's missing thirty pages — what
happened to them I have no idea.

A few years ago I bought my husband a new bird identification book with color photographs, but it just wasn't the same. In fact, I think we've

lost it.

Because we're out in the nice weather we're getting a better look at our migratory buddies, especially with my Christmas 1998 telescope. It's very powerful. We can see the ducks halfway out into the bay, about one-

eighth of a mile.







School administration should have used common sense in decision

We are writing this letter out of total dissatisfaction with the principal and administration of Clarkston Middle School.

In recently moving to Michigan in November, we were very concerned with the various school systems. We carefully reviewed the mission statement of the Clarkston schools.

This states:

"The mission of Clarkston Community Schools is to ensure learning while challenging all individuals to exceed their own expectations.

"A strategic initiative is to address individual students' needs to ensure learning."

What happened to our daughter after enrolling in Clarkston Middle School was totally contrary to these

Our daughter was placed on one of the four sixthgrade teams. At the time of placement we were unaware that the team she was being placed on had already attended the 6th grade camp. Two of the teams attend camp in the fall and the other two teams attend in the spring (next week).

In January she said her friends asked her if she could attend the camp with them. These students were part of the team that was attending the camp in the spring.

Our daughter had an elective course on this team.

When we made the request to Mrs. Armstrong, the principal, we received a quick "no" it would not be allowed and as principal, she needed to set a policy in this regard "not to allow a student to attend camp with another team." (Doesn't the school board make policy)?

Mrs. Armstrong stated that she must set this policy with the entire student population in mind and that Clarkston was a small town and "parents talk." If one exception was made she would have to make other exceptions.

There was no research into the matter at the time, and she stated a student would not be able to attend the camp "just to have fun" and miss three days of traditional classroom curriculum if they were not on that team. The camp activity was a team building ac-

This "no" answer was not acceptable to us, as our daughter's strongest advocates, our daughter stated that she had many friends on the other team that would be attending the camp and she "really wanted to go." She just wanted to have the same experience as all 400 other 6th graders, including other new students which were enrolled at the same time as our daughter.

She is the only sixth grade child being denied the prvilege of going to camp. How sad.

We then took the matter to the next level and spoke with Ms. Brumback, the assistant superintendent, who at that time was the administrator in charge. Superintendent Dr. Al Roberts was on vacation as was Asst. Supt. Dave Reschke. Ms. Brumback was of no assistance.

Next we met with Dr. Roberts. He offered three reasons why it was in our daughter's so-called "best interest" not to attend the camp. We felt these reasons were weak and irrational.

- 1. It would negatively affect her performance in school.
 - 2. Camp is outside her present scope of studies.
- 3. Going to camp would be detrimental to her friendships. These reasons sounded more like excuses. Our

daughter is an honor roll student and the camp experience would offer a very positive educational experience.

How could going to camp be a detriment to her friendships? When we questioned why we would not want our daughter to attend camp and take hikes and look for ferns with her friends, Dr. Roberts stated that we should take our daughter for a hike and look for ferns with her.

When we suggested going to the school board, Dr. Roberts said it would do us no good. He was right.

We mailed each board member a four-page letter asking for someone to please interject some common sense into a simple request to have our daughter attend the 6th grade camp with her friends and peers. In front of parents, school principals and the entire board, Dr. Roberts again said it would not be in the best interest of our daughter to attend the camp and he had spent too much time on this issue already. The board members could not comment on the issue.

The next day, the president of the school board recommended our daughter switch teams and become a part of the team going to camp this spring.

She stated that she could convince Dr. Roberts to allow this switching of teams. This was a total contradiction to Dr. Roberts' earlier statements of his concerns of curriculum continuity. We were later informed that Dr. Roberts did not need to be convinced, and that he was in agreement with the team change following the board meeting. It was even more obvious that the administration was totally immersed in a cover-up of a poor decision made initially by Mrs. Armstrong and that no one would claim ownership for this wrong decision. It was evident that the administration was more concerned with maintaining a positive image for themselves and our request under the rug. All this supporting of each other for this poor decision was at the expense of our daughter.

A final conference took place with Mrs. Armstrong to request that she re-visit her initial decision. At this meeting she stated that she could not reverse her decision. When she finally conducted the research, which should have been done initially, she stated that the team change was not recommended. This was a direct contradiction of the suggestion of the school board president.

Ms. Armstrong stated that there was a large difference in the stages of the curriculum of the new team. We could not understand why this was not done before we were advised that we could have our daughter change teams in order for her to attend camp. She


also stated that she could not make this decision as an individual situation. But that consideration must be given to the entire student population. She had concern with student fall-out. What's wrong with regarding the needs of an individual student? Mrs. Armstrong stated, "It's just camp," and could not understand our adamancy. It's not just camp to an eleven-year-old child, it's memories and friendships that will last a lifetime.

This simple request should have been granted because the mistake was made by the school to begin with regarding team placement. The administration should have created unity not division and alienationof both student and parents.

We are sorry that some common sense was not inserted along the way and someone out of the entire administration could not have seen the positive side of this situation and stood up on our daughter's behalf.



be allowed to develop office and retail space, including a restaurant, on part of the acreage off Sashabaw.

Township Supervisor Dale Stuart has said the township would borrow money to pay for the project, with revenues from the operation of the course going to the township to pay off the debt. He has said all this would be at no cost to taxpayers.

Some of the report's suggestions for necessary improvements include a new irrigation system and maintenance facility, renovation and enhancements to golf holes #17 and #18 to create quality finishing holes and a potential signature hole, and the addition of restroom and rain shelter areas.

The report analyzed some "intended improvements" like enhancement of views of Spring Lake from the clubhouse, tying into the sanitary sewer and water systems, and improving the parking lot and traffic patterns of pedestrian, vehicular and golf cart paths.

"I think the Childs firm did a very good analysis of the course," said Stuart, who favors the proposal. "They brought it to our attention that potential improvements should be made. I think it will be a good tool in dealing with future negotiations with the developer."

However, he added, "certain portions are opinions and we still have the right to take them and other data and decide what makes the most sense for that facility. And that's what I hope the board will do."

Stuart said, while JLG Properties disagrees with the high cost estimate, all parties agree with "the scope of the work."

"The scope of the work is where we have concurrence on," agreed Locricchio Tuesday. JLG's original estimate for improvements was about \$1 million, but now it is more, he added. However, it is not as high as \$5 million. "We feel we can do it certainly for much less cost than what Childs estimated.'

Loccrichio said he has had heating, cooling and architectural contractors look and the course and clubhouse and produce "accurate estimates. Childs didn't have that benefit when they put together their estimates," he said. "We feel we can get it done more efficiently."

The township and JLG Properties are still negotiating, he added. "We feel very confident based on Don Childs' report. We feel that the issues they raised and the gaps in costs are not insurmountable. We firmly believe (the course) is underperforming right now and it has great potential," Locricchio said.



Stand in the shadow of the Lord

When I thought about what I was going to write for this article, I wanted it to be so good. This is the first time I have ever had the privilege of writing something for the newspa-

I wanted it to inspire you and help you look to the future and what God is doing. So I prayed for direction. What God showed me was that inspiration could come from the past as well as the future.

At this time of year, when I think about Christ, my thoughts go back to Calvary. I think of the steps He took and the cross He had to bear -- not only the cross but also the shadow it cast, the same shadow that stretched down through the generations until it reached me.

The thankful tears give way to another emotion found in the shadow of that blood-soaked wood. As I lift my eyes to the cross, pride begins to surge throughout my body. What commitment! What an act of extreme love! MY SAV-IOR DID THAT! He is MY LORD and MY GOD! In the words of that wonderful old hymn,


"To the rugged cross I will ever be true, it's

In addition to the team getting used to Mitchell and the team getting smaller, another key to the success has been goalie Sarah Morgan.


"Sarah is awesome in net. We're lucky to have her," Plante said.



"I wouldn't mind playing at either the University of Michigan or Michigan State, but I'm not sure right now," Badger said.





"I get tired just watching them," Upcott said.






IN THE FACE OF DENIAL

Those who have suffered injury due to the negligence of another should not be surprised if the negligent party's insurance company rebuffs their damage claims. 




