Car crash kills two area teens, injures a third

The Clarkston area was the scene of two auto accidents within the past week, one of which was fatal.

On Monday afternoon, two teenagers -- one of them from Clarkston -- were killed in an auto accident on White Lake Road in Independence Township.

Aaron Suddeth, 15, of Clarkston, was a passenger in a 1997 Honda Civic that was driven by Erikka Marie Stanisha, 17, of Lake Orion.

Both were pronounced dead at the scene.

Passenger Jared Kinkle, 18, also from Lake Orion, was taken Monday to POH Medical Center in Pontiac with serious injuries. He underwent surgery Monday evening and was reported to be in critical condition as of press time.

"Alcohol does not appear to be a factor," said Lt. Sal Petrulis of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department. "It appears that the two people (that were killed) in the accident) were not wearing seat belts."

The other driver in the incident, a 36-year old Madison Heights man, was driving a green Ford F-150 extended cab pickup. He was taken to POH Medical Center Monday evening and released.

Police did not release the name of the Madison Heights driver.

According to Petrulis, Stanisha was driving westbound on White Lake Road, just west of Dixie Highway, when the accident occurred about 2:57 p.m.

She crossed the center lane about a quarter mile west of Dixie Highway, and the Madison Heights man could not see her coming.

According to Ken Hiller of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department, the incident is still under investigation.

On Thursday, April 20, another accident took place, this time in Springfield Township. No one was seriously injured.

According to Hiller, the incident took place at approximately 10:38 a.m., when a 1997 Ford Expedition, driven by a 29-year old Flint male, was headed southbound on Dixie Highway.

The vehicle collided with a 2000 Chevrolet Impala that was driven by a 65-year old Davisburg female. The Flint male was attempting to turn left onto Big Lake Road; after the collision, the Expedition rolled over.

The driver of the Expedition was taken to Pontiac Osteopathic Hospital, and was reported to have suffered minor injuries.

The driver of the Impala was taken to Genesys Regional Health Center in Grand Blanc, where she was treated and released.

Suddeth's funeral is Friday, 12:30 p.m. at Wint Funeral Home.



The Second Front

Learning to 'see' in the dark Firefighters and officials get first hand experience with new equipment

Learning how to "see" inside a smoke-filled building was the focus of a training session by the Independence Township Fire Department recently.

About 15 paid on-call firefighters received firsthand knowledge about the department's CairnsIRIS Thermal Infrared Imaging System. The department recently purchased two of the special helmet-mounted units. Two units were previously purchased in 1997.

A sensor mounted on the helmet "sees" variations in thermal radiation from various objects and transmits those images to the fire fighter.

Working much like a camera, it distinguishes images by heat rather than light. Everything, from a table to a person has a different temperature, and thus

It can also help locate the source of a fire because it can look at a building and tell which end is the brightest.

The department held the training "burn" April 15-16 at the former clubhouse of Clarkston Golf Course on Eston Road. The golf course has been sold and is slated to become a subdivision.

The firefighters took turns wearing the special helmet with the imaging system, and being the eyes for fire fighters who were not wearing the equipment.

The training session was conducted by John Cetrino of the Boston Fire Department. Cetrino said he's part of a group of 15 fire fighters from around the country who train others to use the equipment. Each time a department makes a purchase it's eligible for training.

The session was held for paid on-call firefighters who have never used the equipment before. They learned navigation, how to interpret what they see and search and rescue operations. The focus is on safe practices more than rapid rescue, said Cetrino.

"We drive home the fact that you (fire fighters) don't change your course of action. From never having had vision, and now they have vision may get a fire fighter in trouble," Cetrino said. "Thermal imaging allows you to search a bigger area faster which saves time and can save damage.'

Assistant Fire Chief Steve Ronk said because of the smoke and the darkness, fire fighters work in zero visibility. "When we go in a building we crawl everywhere we go. We have no idea what we're getting into." IRIS senses heat, allowing fire fighters to see images in the dark in white and shades of gray. The hotter an object or fire is, the whiter it shows up.

Ronk said the department built one fire in the garage and three in the clubhouse, and the building was completely filled with smoke. While a firefighter wearing thermal imaging equipment can see up to 500 feet, it won't sense heat for that great a distance. He estimated the fire at the clubhouse to be between 400 and 500 degrees. Fires can get as hot as 1200 degrees before they flash over, he said.

The session was the first time two-year Independence Twp. fire fighter Scott Krakauer has used the equipment in a live fire. Krakauer lives on the border of Waterford and Independence Township, and has also been with Waterford's Fire Department for 10 years. Waterford does not have IRIS and Krakauer called it "an amazing tool."

"I think it will increase the speed of a search for victims as well as the seed of the fire to put it out. You can be in a fire like this and not see the flame. But you can see it with thermal imaging.'

"I feel more comfortable if I can see objects," he added. "Without the equipment you can't see your hand in front of your face." Krakauer compared using the equipment to looking through the round circle of a telescope. "It's a different sensation, but you get used to it about a minute into the drill. It's amazing how

much detail you can see."

Cetrino said New Jersey has funded thermal imaging systems for every fire department in the state. He added it was past due for fire fighting to become hi-tech. "There's a bill in the U.S. House to appropriate \$1 billion per year for five years for fire fighting, he said. He praised the Independence Township Fire Department for being "way ahead of the game" in terms of fire fighting technology.

Independence Township Supervisor Dale Stuart

and Trustee Jeff McGee also participated in the training. Stuart tried out the equipment April 15, and McGee on April 16.

Stuart said he found the experience very interesting and applauded the fire department for including board members and members of the public in the train-

"It's a very unnerving situation to be actually involved in the training," said Stuart. "The whole concept of being placed in that gear -- you really are dependent on that equipment. It renews my respect for fire fighters. It takes a special kind of person to be able to do it. I'm very please we've provided that equipment for our people."

McGee compared the experience and breathing the air pack to scuba diving, "except you were blind. When IRIS kicked in I understood the sense of getting your eyes back," he said.

McGee said he learned how fire fighters "sweep" a room to find victims, and like Stuart, found renewed appreciation for fire fighters and their potential exposure to risk.

McGee had voted against the two latest IRIS purchases, and after his experience, his point of view

has not changed.

"There is never too great a cost to pay for the potential saving of a life. But as an administrator, I have to be concerned about budgetary constraints." McGee added 99 percent of the uses for the equipment have been for location of hot spots after a building has burned which are not critical.

Stalemate means issue tabled until June 6 meeting

Spring Lake lighting debated

To light or not to light?

That was the question facing residents in the Spring Lake North area, as they debated whether or not to proceed with a project that would implement street lights in that area

Approximately 50 people showed up at a public hearing at the Independence Township board meeting April 18 to make their voices heard on the issue.

Residents and board members alike voiced their opinions both for and against the project.

The end result? The issue was tabled by a 4-2 margin. Trustee Larry Rosso was absent from the meeting.

In making their decision, the board determined that since the residents were split on the issue, it would be best to allow them to further discuss it among themselves.

A lack of consensus was evident when Independence Township Supervisor Dale Stuart surveyed the residents for their opinions, allowing one person per property to vote on the matter.

According to Stuart, 16 people voted in favor of the project, and 11 people voted against.

Stuart said that the board would have to conduct another public hearing once the issue is raised at a future meeting.

"We still have to hold the hearing and the rest of the whole process," he said.

Township resident Donald Cummings, in voicing his objection to the proposal, stated that the information presented on the project is incomplete.

"I believe that you have not been presented with adequate information," he said.

Brian Peers, another resident who is opposed to the project, said that cost concerns are a big factor in his objection to the project. He estimated that taxes would increase \$99 per year if the lights were implemented.

"I don't think it's appropriate that the township would now make the decision," he said. "Down the road, there will be maintenance on street lamps, and we'll be responsible for that."

On the other hand, resident Kim Brown, who favors the lighting of the area, said that safety is a chief concern.

"I am for them, for the safety of our children and for those who walk late at night," she said.

However, resident Joelle Chaney said that she is opposed to the cost of the project, and suggested that residents take matters into their own hands if they want to improve the lighting situation.

"I don't believe it's a matter of safety," she said. "If people want lights, they can put individual lights in their houses."

Resident Sheila Bennett, voicing her support of the project, brought up the issue of vandalism.

"There's been a lot of vandalism in our neighborhood," she said. "We think that would stop some of that."

Ultimately, the board determined that it had insufficient information at this time to make a decision either way.

"I would be in favor of tabling it until I have more information," said Treasuer James Wenger.

Township trustee Jeff McGee, who said that he was inclined to vote against the project, said that the board would have to be presented with a solid argument in favor of the project before it issues the goahead.

"Ultimately, our decision will be based on whether there is enough compelling evidence to pursue this," McGee said.

According to Township Clerk Joan McCrary, the matter will be brought up during the board's first meeting in June, which is scheduled for June 6.



Park Place: Is there one?

Two area businesses differ about parking situation at Prudential

Clarkston Union Bar and Kitchen owner Curt Catallo and Prudential Chamberlain-Stiehl and Associates Realtors manager Beverly Bartus have their share of differences. But they agree on one thing — the sign posted in the parking lot of Prudential is working like a charm.

A sign was posted in the center of Prudential's parking lot, located at 32 S. Main St. March 24, one week after St. Patrick's Day. The sign warned people that the lot was to be used by Prudential customers, employees and building tennants only, 24 hours a day.

"I couldn't even get my own car out of the lot on

St. Patrick's Day," Bartus said.

Catallo said 50 tickets have been issued to people between March 17-24. He then brought the parking issue to the attention of the Clarkston City Council at its meeting April 24.

"One of the reasons. I brought it to their attention was to see if I can get those tickets revoked, but I also wanted to bring the parking situation at the Prudential lot to their attention," Catallo said. "We put up the sign one day after they (Prudential) told us they couldn't come up with a solution to the problem.

Whether or not the tickets which were issued will be revoked remains to be seen, but City councilman

Dave Savage thinks they should be.

"I'm in favor of getting the tickets waived. Prudential needs to recognize they need to be cooperative with other business owners. If you live in Clarkston you need to be supportive of downtown Clarkston,"

However, mayor Sharron Catallo warned that Clarkston police chief Paul Ormiston said revoking the tickets would set a dangerous precedent.

The issue was tabled by Savage and will be discussed further at the next city council meeting May 8. Bartus said her business uses the lot late into the evening, sometimes as late as 11 p.m. due to agents working late. Training classes are also taught there she

Since the sign was posted the parking situation has settled down, but it wasn't that way before.

According to Catallo, customers of his restaurant, and visitors of the Clarkston Union have been parking in the Prudential lot since his business opened in January of 1996. But it hasn't been until recently that an overflow of parking within the Prudential lot has become a legal problem.

"People remember coming here and getting a ticket, but they won't remember the meal they got at my restaurant," Catallo said.

Bartus sees the matter differently. She said a \$10 ticket doesn't damage people's attitude towards coming to downtown Clarkston.

"By getting a ticket, I don't think it'll stop people from coming back again. They're just going to learn where they can and can't park. People have to park and walk in Birmingham and Detroit. People will do that here too," she said.

Catallo said the tickets came as a surprise to both him and his customers. He said Bartus never approached him about the parking situation at Prudential before tickets were issued.

"The sign I put up should have been posted before any of the tickets were issued. But they've (Prudential) been very happy since the sign has been posted. It's done a great job of keeping people out of downtown Clarkston at night. Prudential told me they couldn't see any possible solution to the problem," Catallo said.

Bartus said both she and the former owner of Prudential Chamberlain had been in contact with Catallo regarding the overflow of night parking in the lot. She said she met with Catallo and his wife before any tickets were issued.

"There's no question there's not adequate park-

Council votes 'yes' on water

Election is May 9 -- questions answered at May 8 meeting

After holding informational hearings for both Clarkston business owners and residents, the answer to the question of will Clarkston hook up to the water supply of Independence Township lies in the hands of voters.

On April 24 the city council passed a resolution saying it was in favor of the water proposal, which will be voted on May 9

The water subcommittee, made up of Scott Meyland, Bill Basinger, Doug Roeser and Steve Arkwright, have been working on a plan for months which would see Clarkston begin a three phase project that would hook Clarkston up to the water supply of Independence Township.

The business informational meeting was held at City Hall April 13 and the public hearing was held at the Independence Township Fire Hall April 19. About 20 people attended the business owners meeting while roughly 50 people were in attendance at the public hearing.

Mayor Sharron Catallo praised the subcommittee for its efforts.

"Lots of work went into this and I think everybody left those meetings satisfied," Catallo

City coucilman, Dave Savage has been in contact with area businesses regarding the issue and said the response has been positive.

"I think they've been in favor of it for the



Professional introspection is timely

Whenever I hear people in the news industry reevaluating the profession my ears perk up.

I find it energizing to listen to other journalists criticize how we do our job, or the state of journalism today.

Once a well-respected profession, journalism has taken some well-deserved hits over the last several years.

Articles in journalism trade magazines frequently challenge us to re-evaluate how we do our job. Often, topics of conversation between myself and other reporters or editors include sessions of "This is how I handled such and such situation, what would you have done?"

Further evidence that the industry recognizes its need to restore credibility with the public is the frequency with which columnists and radio and TV commentators make the issue a topic for columns and TV or radio shows. CNN even broadcasts a regular weekend show called *Reliable Sources*, dedicated to dissecting how the media covers current events.

On Monday, WJR radio host Mitch Albom spent most of his afternoon show discussing with listeners how the media handled the government's snatching of Elian Gonzalez and returning him to his family.

Albom's focus, which I thought was particularly interesting, was how much impact one photograph, that of the U.S. federal agent pointing the gun seemingly toward Elian and Donato Dalrymple (the fisherman who rescued Elian from the ocean) may have on public opinion of the issue.

MSNBC talk show pundit Chris Matthews also interviewed news bigwigs on their opinion of the news coverage of the event on Monday.

In general, I think TV coverage of national events has been nauseating lately. We are saturated with one issue for weeks at a time and left to wonder what's happening elsewhere on earth. Coverage of Elian Gonzalez over the last month is the perfect example. The news has been all Elian, all the time.

Newspaper coverage of the issue has been much more balanced. And heaven knows it's better than those talking head shows where people shout at and over each other. Can you imagine seeing in print what some of the

people say? And how would you adequately convey sneers and major 'tudes in words. If the words could be found surely readers would think they were reading satire.

In the April 24 issue of U.S. News and World Report, columnist John Leo takes up the issue of the public distrusting what they read in newspapers and makes some interesting points. He suggests that the personal values of journalists help determine what they cover.

As evidence, he cites a study that says "journalism students are more likely... to come from affluent families and private schools... And (journalists) approve of abortion, express disdainful attitudes toward suburbs and rural areas and identify strongly with people who see themsleves as victims of society."

He says these traits are common among journalists in medium sized cities

He goes on to say, "... Journalists are more likely to live in upscale neighborhoods, have maids, own

Mercedeses, and trade stocks, and they're less likely to go to church, do volunteer work, or put down roots in a community. (they) are overrepresented in ZIP codes where residents are twice as likely as other American to rent foreign movies, drink Chablis, own an espresso maker and read magazines like Architectural Digest and Food & Wine.

I don't see these traits in myself, or any of my colleagues, but perhaps community news journalists are in a different category.

Whatever the reason, I am glad to see the professional introspection. I figure even at our very local level, we have something to learn from our colleagues who deal with national issues. In the long run, the profession and all of us will be better for it.





Look for Moscovic family at SCAMP walk and roll

When hundreds of walkers, bikers, and "rollers" take to the sidewalks May 7 to raise funds for SCAMP, Clarkston's Moscovic family will be among them.

The Moscovic family has been involved with SCAMP almost since its beginning in 1976 -- long before they knew one of their children would attend

SCAMP is a five-week summer camp experience for mentally and physically impaired children and young adults. The program is based at Sashabaw Middle School, with field trips to other locations. Funding for the camp is completely through donations.

Like a lot of school children in Clarkston, Toni and Dick Moscovics' oldest boys, Derek and Dean, had participated in SCAMP walks with their elementary schools to raise funds for the program. And Tina worked briefly for SCAMP one year.

But not too long after Drew, their third son was born, Toni and Dick knew something was wrong. By the age of 18 months he still couldn't walk and was not even able to stand up.

Drew was diagnosed with developmental delays and physical impairments due to cerebral palsy. When he turned three he joined the SPICE program, and then went to a center program for impaired children in Waterford.

In 1992 Drew was one of the first such students to return to a regular classroom setting. He attended fifth and sixth grade at Clarkston Elementary School, followed by Clarkston Middle School and graduated from Clarkston High School

Being a part of the regular classroom was good for him, the other students and their parents, say Dick and Toni. "Dick always called Drew and educator," said Toni. Bailey Lake teacher Sherrill Bailey thought about Drew when she was recovering from a stroke, and CHS state wrestling champs Dean and Derek found inspiration in their little brother, said Dick.

Drew joined the SCAMP program when he was five, and loved going from

the beginning, said Toni.

"He was able to have some friends and it kept him involved in the community. And, he came home tired, joked Toni.

Dick said it was important for him

to have something to look forward to in the summer, after being in school the rest of the year.







the opportunity to be part of a group, and Dick and Toni appreciate that they don't have to be there to supervise his activities.

They also like the fact that SCAMP is a day camp. "They always stay in communication. We're given a weekly newsletter and notes about his specific activities," Toni added, which she reads to him each time it arrives.

"That never could have happened without the dedication of the teachers and the young people who volunteer," she said.

Impaired students are entitled to an education until they're 26, and Drew is now part of a post-high school program through Clarkston schools which is a combination of classwork and community-based service work.

He also receives physical therapy in the form of swimming, which helps his scoliosis and muscle tone, said Dick.

At SCAMP, Drew's favorite activities are music, picnic lunches and visits to Independence Oaks County Park, she said. "He's limited in his activities, but he enjoys being with people and just being part of the group. He always seems to come home happy and tired," Dick said.

Toni said she had a friend who brought her nephew down to SCAMP from Flint for several years.

Dick and Toni, who are originally from Pittsburgh feel lucky to have moved to Clarkston, because of the quality of the special education programs and SCAMP, as well as the friends they have

"Any parent (in this situation) will tell you their social life is changed, not that it's a big deal, but we've been blessed. Most of the friends we've had include Drew in the activities we're invited to. And Drew's sisters-in-law are wonderful with him," said Dick.

Join the Sashabaw Plains playground project

Walkway Pavers - Each child, family, group or business that purchases a walkway paver (\$50 donation) will get the chance to have their name forever etched in stone. The pavers will be used to create a path leading to the new playground equipment at Sashabaw Plains Park. The pavers will be inscribed with a name and may contain colorful tiles and/or the handprint of a child.

"It has a lot of play opportunities for kids," she added, referring to the six swings, four slides, bridge, tower and numerous crawling and/or hiding

On-site child care is available for children 12 and under (must be potty-trained). Children can play games, play with other kids and be treated to free ice cream with sprinkles. Local businesses and organizations have donated food; a well-fed worker is a happy worker! Students who need service credit are welcome to join the project. (Children 12 and up can help build if accompanied by an adult).







ing, but I can't turn people away from my business. I'm happy Mr. Catallo's restaurant is doing so well, but our lot is no public lot," Bartus said.

Since the sign has been posted both parties agree that the parking problem at Prudential's lot is no longer a prob-

Bartus suggested valet parking be used for Catallo's business, but Catallo said that's impractical.

"I'd have to have a much bigger staff to have valet parking. Plus, you can't ask a valet driver to drive a mile. They could drop the car off easily, but bringing it back, that's the problem," Catallo said.

Catallo said he's maintained about the same about of business he had before the sign was posted, except on Sundays. He said many of his older customers don't want to walk the extra dis-

"Every third customer has complained about the parking situation here,"

Since the sign has been posted, Catallo said his customers have been parking on Depot Street and have used the lot Kinetic Systems lot, located at 60 S. Main Street.

"It's unfair to them. They've been very friendly neighbors, but I'm looking at putting a sign up in their lot too,' Catallo said.

Catallo is concerned with the situation setting a precedent in downtown Clarkston.

"I'm still going to work to get people downtown, but it's a shame it's gotten to this point. It's a business issue, not a political issue. I wish they would've came to me before the tickets were issued. It's not it's tough to find me. I live on the property," Catallo said.

Meanwhile, Bartus said the sign has done everything she hoped it would do in helping her business.

"Mr. Catallo has been very cooperative since the sign's been posted. If myself, or one of my employees, gets a ticket in our lot we pay the ticket too. The police have done an excellent job of helping us with the situation," she said.

Catallo has also insured Prudential's lot in the event someone should park there illegally.

"Their building is covered the same as ours is, but they still don't have permission to park there," Catallo said.

most part. I want to thank Scott, Bill Basinger, Steve Arkwright and Doug Roeser. You guys all did a great job on this," Savage said.

People who still have questions regarding the issue can get their last-second questions answered at the next city council meeting, which is May 8, the day before the vote takes place.

Meyland, who is the chairman of the subcommittee, felt both meetings regarding the issue were responded to positively.

"I think the people that were there got a better understanding of just how complicated the issue is, both in terms of construction and in cost. You always hope for a better turnout, but the people that were there had the opportunity to learn more about the issue. It's positive to see that both meetings ended with people wanting to know how let more people know about the issue and how to promote and sell it," Meyland said.

Promoting the issue has been somewhat of a problem for the water subcommittee, but it has gotten help from Clarkston State Bank, who has helped by copying and distributing an informational overview of the issue. Meyland said area business owners have also discussed promoting the issue.

"I haven't personally seen much negative feedback from people on the issue. They seem to be in favor of the idea," Meyland said.

The vote will be held May 9 from 7 a.m. until 8 p.m. at City Hall, 375 Depot Road.

If the proposal doesn't pass the question then rises what will happen next. Meyland said there are three choices, which have all been carefully evaluated and researched.

The first option is to do nothing.

The second option would be to install sleeves to primary intersections within the downtown business district. If, in the future, Clarkston decided to hook up to city water, then the sleeves would allow such action to be taken and would help minimize the disruption to Main Street. There would still be some disruption to Main Street, but Meyland said the sleeves would serve as "insurance" while improvements were being made to the downtown district. The cost of the project is estimated at \$100,000.

The third option would be to go ahead an install a 12 inch pipe down Main Street, but that project would be funded strictly through special assessment districts, which are not tax deductible.

Meyland said the city council has evaluated all three options, but hasn't made a decision which step it would take should the vote on May 9 not pass.

"We know the details of all three and at the following city council meeting we'd either narrow it down or make a decision," Meyland said.

"Hats off to Steve Ronk and what they do. I have nothing but nice things to say. But I still stand by my original point of view," McGee said.

The fire department has reached its goal of one IRIS in each station and one for the command vehicle, Ronk said. There have been two fatal fires in the township in the last two years and IRIS "expedited the search" for the victims. Although fire fighters were not able to save any lives with the equipment, Ronk said, "we're definitely aided by their use. We can see fire extension -- if it gets in a wall -- it helps us track where a fire is going in a building."

The systems purchased in 1997 cost about \$25,000 each, and this year's purchases were \$17,500 each plus the upgrades to the 1997 models, Ronk said. Upgrades included a lighter battery pack, and improved screen technology.

Ronk said the department also borrowed receiving equipment for the training session which acts like a TV to allow fire fighters outside the building to see what those wearing the thermal imaging equipment can see. He said the department had no plans at this time to buy receiving equipment because of the \$9,000



Track — Gordie Richardson and Walt Wyniemko told me at the beginning of the season that the strength of



How Clarkston responds over the break remains to be seen.


"Our kids may lose a step on their hitting over the break," Land said.


Solid hitting and the continued contributions of everyone in the lineup are the two main ingredients needed for more success after spring break.
