Springfield civic center moves toward construction

All systems are go for the new civic center planned for Springfield Township, according to Supervisor Collin Walls.

The Springfield Township board took the next step towards its construction by approving a 2000 budget amendment for the center at its May 11 meeting.

According to Walls, the process originally started last summer.

"We put together budgets for all of our funds in July," he said. "They were adopted in October. Since that time, we've did a lot more architectural work. Since we initially estimated the cost of the building, it's gotten bigger."

However, Walls noted that the addition will come at minimal cost to the township.

"The space we added was relatively inexpensive basement space," he said. "We just expanded the office out."

According to Walls, the project should get underway later this year, if all goes well.

"We anticipate and hope that construction will start in mid-to-late summer," he said.

Walls added that the building will take approximately one year to complete.

Key features of the proposed civic center include a new library, a new municipal meeting room, and new offices for the parks and recreation department and the township.

"We're going to put everybody but the fire department in that building," Walls said.

The cost of the civic center, which is expected to take up approximately 30,000 square feet, is estimated at a little over \$6 million.

Township voters approved a bond issue in 1998 toward construction of the center. Currently, the Springfield Township library is located in what used to be a one-room school.

Walls said that both the township board and the library board have been contemplating relocating their current facilities.

"We've been working on this actively for 2-1/2 years," he said.

Before the construction can get underway on the project, Walls explained that the township has to go through a site plan approval process, which means that the proposal must first be taken to the planning commission, then back to the township board, and then back to the planning commission.

She brings 'stories to life'

Phyllis Ness had been driving practical vehicles (currently a van) for 20 years, but not anymore. Since Monday she's been tooling around town in a candy apple red Ford Mustang with four-on-the-floor.

The Pine Knob Elementary School first grade teacher was named "Teacher of the Year" by the Clarkston Foundation. And beginning this year the winner of the award receives a year lease of the car of his or her choice from Flannery Ford in Waterford.

Ness was nominated for Teacher of the Year by Julie Brookes, her instructional aide, with support from Elizabeth Gifford, who team teaches with Ness at Pine Knob.

Her selection was a well-kept secret until Monday. Even her students and family found out the previous Friday and didn't spill the beans.

When Ness brought her students from their portable classroom into the main building for what she thought was a school function, she was greeted with cheers and chants of "Mrs. Ness is the best!" from students, staff, family, friends and Clarkston Foundation members.

While a teacher since 1974, Ness has been teaching in Clarkston since 1992, and has also taught

third, fourth and fifth grades.

In her nomination form, Brookes said "Ness makes stories come to life . . . makes every child feel like a reader . . . that she has the ability to look at each child individually and evaluate where that child is emotionally and academically in terms of reading."

Brookes also said Ness allows students to choose which center they will explore in the afternoon, and that she "creates an environment that encourages creativity and stimulates her students to use their imagination."

Ness is "always evaluating herself and what worked well and what didn't at the end of each day. She will change the way she taught something if she feels there is a better way to reach that student. Phyllis is like the EverReady battery — she keeps on going and is always learning . . ."

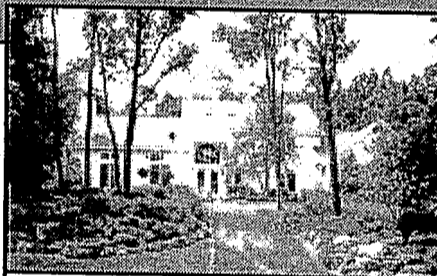

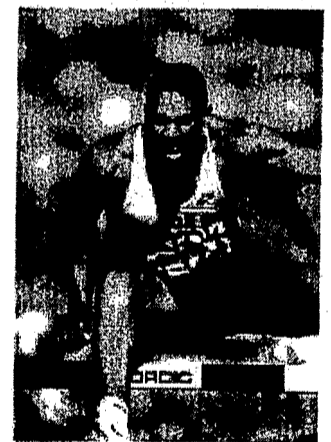

Wompole home paints a 'rosy' picture

Everything's comin' up roses for Tom and Lynne Swayne. This is apparent even before you walk through the door of their charming ranch home at the end of the cul-de-sac on Wompole Street.

Lynne has stenciled twining roses around the front pillars -- and there is a large rose wreath on the door as well. Their home is one of four -- the only homes on Wompole Street -- built by the Aaron Wompole family in the early 1900s.

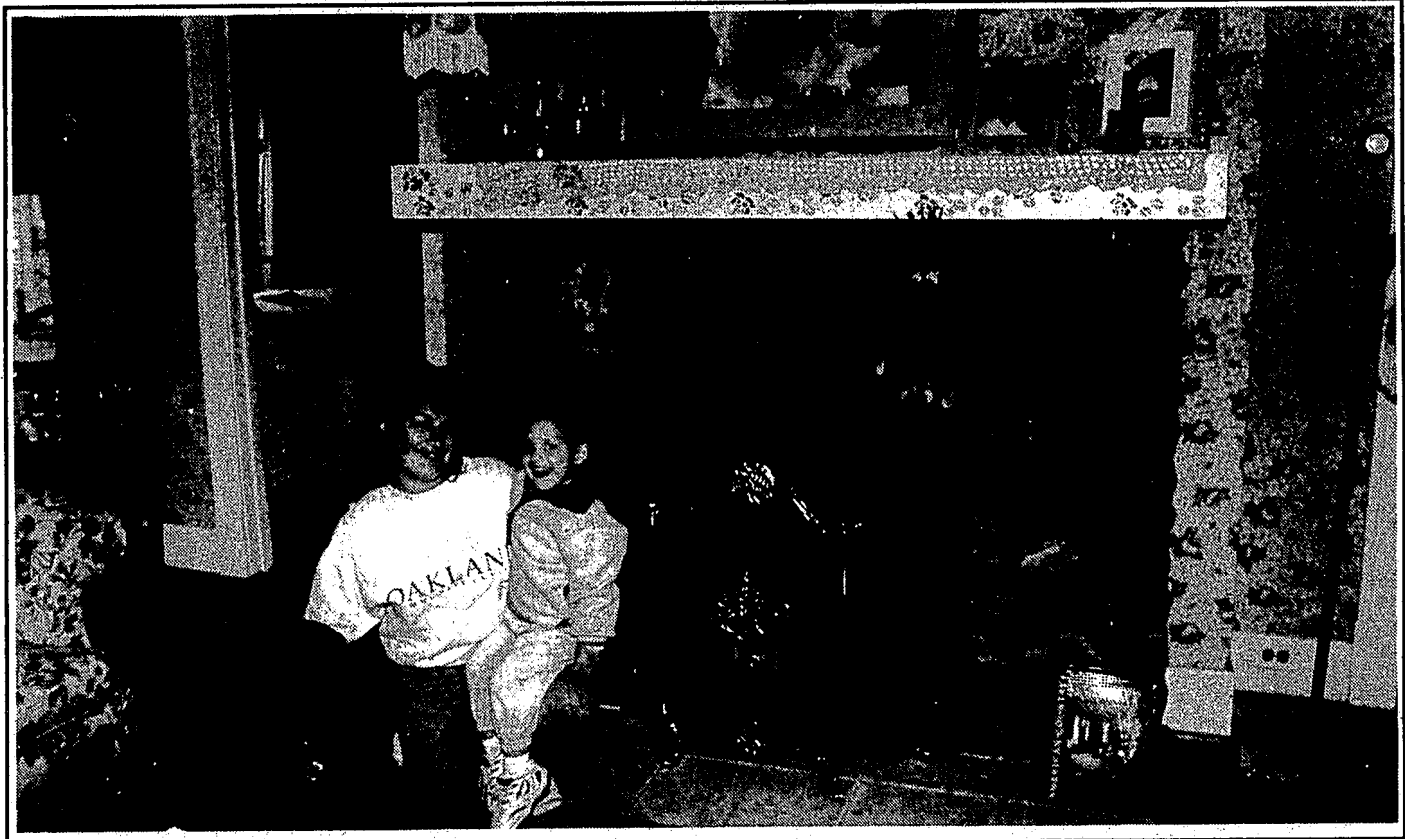
"We think our home was built in 1912," says Lynne, although the former owner, Gin Gordon, thinks it might have been around 1925. Lynne produces an old photo that shows rose-flocked wallpaper in the living room.

In fact, there are roses everywhere -- including the dried roses that hang from the mantle of their historic fireplace. Lynne also keeps friends and neighbors supplied with bouquets cut from her 37 rose bushes. "I do have lots of rosebushes," she quips.

Aaron Wompole built the fireplace with rocks that came from California. "It's kind of neat to learn little things like this. All four homes feature a stone fireplace."

Two family pets enter the room -- Trapper, a Rottweiler and Saki, their sleek Siamese cat. The two are "best friends," Lynne says.

Lynne has copied the look of the past and added her own rose wallpaper to the living room. Today, it's brightened by the afternoon sun that splashes

home). We closed on my birthday and moved right in," she laughs.

Moving into the dining room, Lynne exhibits one example of her handyman husband's work -- a kerosene lamp converted to an electrical light now hangs over the dining room table. No, it doesn't contain the rose motif. The featured flowers are lilacs. Lynne said she loved the lamp so much she didn't mind.

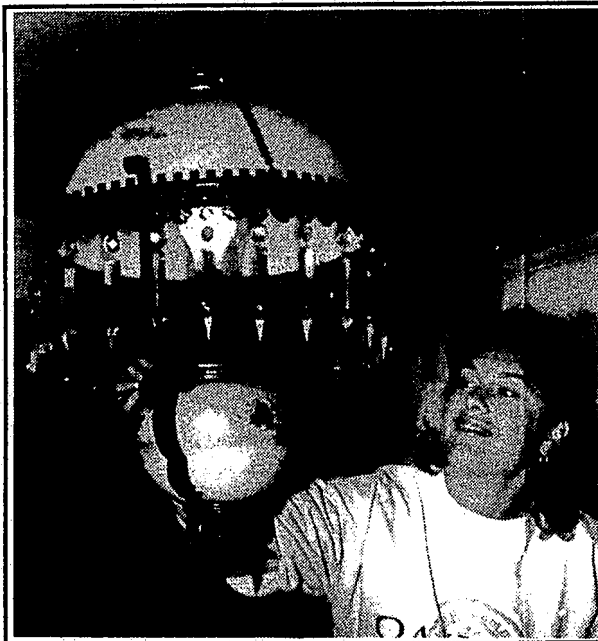
The lamp came from Sadow's Gallery, an antique store in the Clarkson Mills Mall, where Lynne works part-time. "I said, don't pay me. Just let me take this home."

Built-in shelves contain a variety of mementos, including a "Mammy" doll from the movie "Gone With the Wind." Lynne explains she is a GWTW buff. There are other Mammys in her collection, including a refrigerator magnet, and a giant poster of Rhett and Scarlet decorates a porch waiting to be remodeled.

Tom and Lynne have also converted the first floor privy into an historic room. A clawfoot tub is modernized with new fixtures -- of course there's a large, rose bath mat for bare feet.

Their bedroom features a beautiful carved oak bed. "We stripped down five layers of wallpaper. It was fun." They'd plan to replace the ceiling with tin tiles.

Through the window, one can see the back yard. The Swaynes own a large pond, and even though they have an in-ground pool, the kids prefer the ole' swimmin' hole. Lynne points to the little lighthouse her father-in-law crafted. There is a wonderful old cottonwood tree nearby and Lynne's prized rock garden

in through lace-curtained windows. The room's historic look is also helped by Victorian lamp shades. The couch is covered in roses also. Saki climbs up and finds a comfortable perch to take a cat nap.

The Swayne family -- which includes children Hampton, 2, Amy-Kaye, 9, and Chip, 12 -- lived in a modern home before they moved to Wompole. "I always wanted to live in an old house," says Lynne. Ironically, her parents moved to Clarkston four months before they did. They live in the historic Studebaker home on Holcomb Street.

Tom helped them to remodel. "He said, 'I'll never do that (move to an old

After 29 years . . .

Pastor Walters to step down at Calvary Lutheran

After 29 years serving the faithful at Calvary Lutheran Church in Clarkston, the Rev. Bob Walters will be stepping down as the church's pastor.

His last services at the church will be held June 25. Walters will preside at the 8:30 and 11 a.m. services, and a luncheon will be held in his honor at 1 p.m. that day.

Last week, Walters talked about some of the high points and changes at Calvary during his career.

Walters said that several young people who once attended church at Calvary are now serving the Lutheran Church themselves.

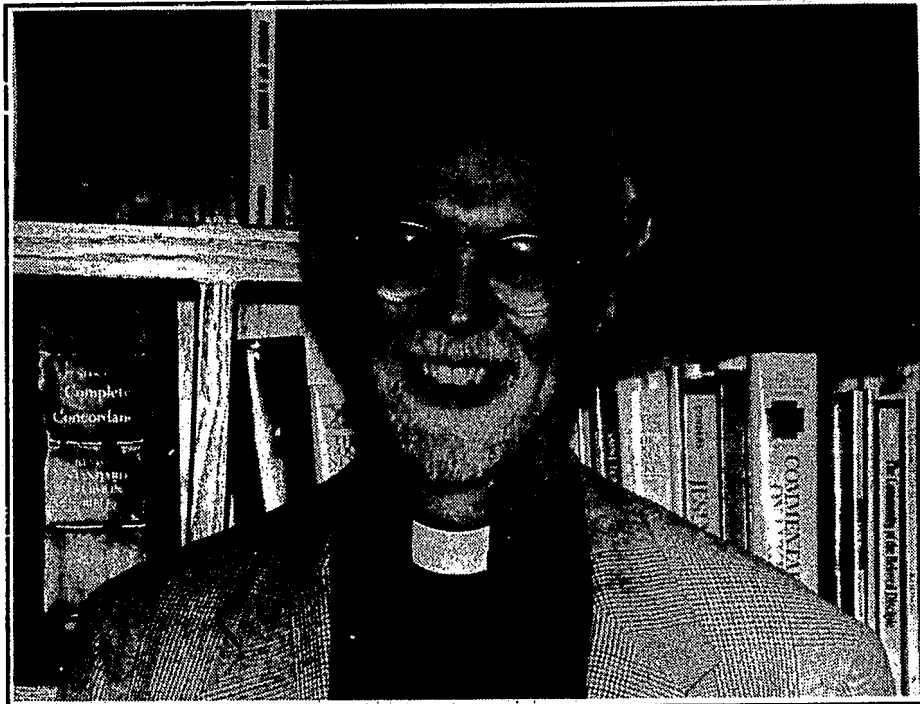
The list of Calvary "alumni" serving churches worldwide are: Terri Engel Peterson, who serves as a pastor at a parish in southern Ohio; Dean Smith, who is preparing for the ministry at Luther Seminary; Anke Edelbrock, a pastor and scholar in Germany; Inger Nelson, the church's director of music; and Shawn Smith, a full-time Christian musician and composer.

"That's been a real privilege, to be a part of their lives," he said.

According to Walters, the worship attendance at the church has "at least tripled" since he took over as pastor, while the active membership has quadrupled.

"The numbers are only important because they are people," he said.

Physically, the church has changed

as well, he said. A sanctuary was constructed in 1978, a fellowship room and offices were built in 1986, and a new sanctuary was built last year.

"We're still getting used to it," Walters said.

Before coming to Clarkston in the fall of 1971, Walters served a couple of churches in Illinois: Hope-Epiphany Church in Chicago from 1961-67, and then on to his home congregation at First Lutheran Church in Decatur from 1967-71.

He recalled that his calling to the ministry has its origins when he was 14 years old, and the church's youth group went to the Lincoln Log Cabin State Park, outside Decatur.

"My pastor said to me, 'Bob, I think you ought to consider the ministry,'" Walters said. "I was moved by his confidence. I think that's when the seed was planted."

He emphasized the importance of God as a forgiving God instead of one that is punishing and frightening."

"I went to a conservative congregation for Sunday school; they frightened me," Walters said. "God doesn't motivate us by frightening us. The punishment comes as a result of things that are sinful, unhealthy."

Walters earned a scholarship to Carthage College in Illinois, enabling him to attend college. Once there, "I had a lot of opportunities to learn a lot of different things" with regard to his faith, he said.

Along the way, he earned his Doctor of Ministry degree in 1981.

"It probably helped to stay fresh and not get stale," Walters said. "Out of that came some travel."

Upon his retirement, Walters said he intends to spend more time with his 91-year old father, as well as do some research on his family genealogy.

His wife, Beverly, is the director of clinical services at Clarkston Medical Group/Clarkston Ambulatory Care Services.


"She's been a tremendous support in the life of this congregation," Walters said.

The couple has two sons: Bob, who lives in Waterford, works as vice president for risk management for Quicken Loans, and earned his master's in business administration from the University of Michigan April 28; and Mike, a manufacturer's representative from Tuscon, AZ who is married to Jodi, a



Raise approved for assistant finance director

Susan Wagner has taken on many duties since becoming assistant finance director of Independence Township.

The Independence Township board voted May 2 to recognize her efforts by awarding Wagner a pay increase.

The board voted to increase Wagner's salary from \$33,475 to \$35,000, an increase of 4.5 percent.

Independence Township clerk Joan McCrary said that the added responsibilities that Wagner has taken on warranted a pay increase.

"She's a really nice, good employee," McCrary said. "She takes on any project we give her."

Independence Township trustee Neil Wallace said that these type of pay increases should become more commonplace in the township.

"I think this is something we should do for all our employees on a regular basis," Wallace said.

Wagner has worked for the township for 15 years, starting in the treasurer's office before moving on to the clerk's office in November 1998 as the assistant finance director.

In an April 27 memo to the board, McCrary stated that Wagner has made significant improvement to the township's payroll system, specifically with regard to two areas.

One is the recording of payroll expenses in the township's general ledger; the other is the direct deposit system, which allows township employees to have their checks deposited electronically into the bank of their choice.

McCrary noted that while both changes proved to be beneficial, they caused additional work for Wagner, both as the changes were taking place and on an ongoing basis.

In addition, McCrary stated that Wagner has

taken on several tasks and assignments from finance director Susan Hendricks and herself.

She said that the finance area has been working to establish better budgetary controls and improve the timeliness of reporting data.

As an example, McCrary cited the fact that Versys, the company that provides the software for Independence Township, recently informed the township that they would not be able to provide modifications to the software that the township requested to monitor the budget.

With that in mind, she said that Wagner will be taking a class in June to learn how to write reports in-

house

In her memo, McCrary shared some insights as to what other communities are paying individuals with similar job duties to Wagner:

-Waterford Township has a payroll and benefits manager, who is responsible for preparing payroll and managing all employee benefits. The salary for that position is \$43,862.

-Clinton Township has a person responsible for preparing their payroll, who is considered a bookkeeper. The annual salary is \$35,897.

-Delta Township has a union position responsible for preparing payroll. The pay range for that position is currently \$29,764-\$35,717.

City may add daytime officer

If Clarkston Police Chief Paul Ormiston gets his way, the Clarkston police force will have another officer on duty during the day.

At the May 8 City Council meeting Ormiston discussed the possibility of adding another officer to the force if funds are available Ormiston said.

A grant through the federal government would cover up to 75 percent of the officer's salary and benefits for the first three years of employment. However, the City of Clarkston, would have to pay the officer's entire salary and benefit package for the fourth year. Ormiston said that would cost \$31,700.

"I need the officer on during the daytime. The first three years wouldn't be a financial prob-

lem. The problem would come during the fourth year," Ormiston said.

City councilman Daniel Colombo said the budget committee would evaluate its numbers and report back to the city council at its next meeting, which is May 22 at 7 p.m.

Colombo said some of the departments, including engineering and planning departments are overspending, while other departments are under budget.

"We didn't discuss adding the officer, but it's our intention to find room in the budget for that officer. We want to probe the grant situation," Colombo said.

The next budget committee meeting will be May 16. The city council plans to decide whether or not to add the officer at its next city council meeting.

How many readers out there think that if the person who perpetrated the incidents that Knight was reported to have done was an English lit professor at Indiana instead of the head basketball coach, that the professor would get off with a slap on the wrist like Knight did?

Face it, if anyone else out in the working world pulled the kind of stunts that Knight has pulled during his 29 years at Indiana, they'd be handed their pink slip and told not to let the door hit them on the way out.

To his supporters' point of view, Knight is an "old-school" coach who instills discipline in young adults and prepares them for life out in the "real world."

He has indeed contributed much of his time to charitable causes and to helping out his former players, none of which received as much attention as his outbursts. I will give him that much.

However, it's hard, at least from my point of view, to reconcile that side of the man with the frequent temper tantrums, such as throwing a chair across the court, choking a former player, and threatening an athletic department secretary.

It's hard to see how those kind of incidents provide

a sound basis for his players to learn about the "real world."

His defenders always point out that Knight wins games, he runs a clean program, and his players have a high graduation rate.

Funny, but I seem to recall that Dean Smith, the recently retired coaching legend at North Carolina, who holds the record for all-time coaching wins, did the same things. The same goes for John Wooden, who won 10 NCAA championships while coaching UCLA.

Neither of these gentlemen had to resort to Knight's boorish tactics to win games; they managed to conduct themselves with dignity and class while remaining at the top of the heap each year.

Among current coaches, Duke's Mike Krzyzewski comes to mind as someone whose teams are legitimate championship contenders nearly every year, whose players have a high graduation rate, and who has managed to abide by high ethical standards while reaching the top of his craft.

Locally, Michigan State's Tom Izzo seems to have followed the same guidelines in building a top-notch program in East Lansing. He'll certainly get in a player's face if he has to, but not to the degree that Knight has repeatedly done.

Obviously, Izzo must be doing something right; the Spartans took home the top prize in college basketball this year, the NCAA championship, and Izzo recently received an offer to coach the NBA's Atlanta Hawks, which he wisely turned down in order to continue on at MSU.

These gentlemen, as well as others, have proven that you can succeed as a big-time college basketball coach and handle yourself with class.

No question, Knight will go down as one of the great coaches of all time in college basketball. His record on the court speaks for itself-three national championships, and several Big Ten championships.

However, none of that seems to matter right now. Like it or not, from now on, people will judge the man by how he controls his temper.

If he's up to the task, if he shows that he truly is a changed man, then more power to him, and my hat's off to him.

If he's not, then show him the door.

Lures are made for we who fish

Men who fish are not always fishermen, and should not be so classified.

Take the publisher of this newspaper for instance. Usually a couple men-folks take their sons trout fishing about a week after opening day.

This year things got a little complicated. Only son Jim (the publisher) and son-in-law Tim Speed could clear their calendars.

We fish at the Hiawatha Sportsman's Club, a 36,000-acre plot near Engadine and Naubinway. It's a cozy club of 1,500 members, most of whom complain about the lack of fish, lack of deer, lack of ducks, lack of partridge, lack of walking trails . . . you know, a lot like everyone who are not members of HSC.

Anyway, the Club stocks its ponds with trout. None of us assume the stocking assures a catch, but at least we know some trout are present, or were present before the otter and various other thieves fill their creels.

All three of us have at least two kinds of everything ever made that we think will attract fish. Lure makers know the prettier the lure the more they will sell to people who fish. Real fishermen like Tom Bates won't buy these things.

The reason we always buy two of a kind is because if one catches a fish, then gets lost on a tree branch during a cast, we'll have another one that we can use

and lose.

So, all of us who go fishing have double spinners in all 2,000 sizes and color combinations made by a couple hundred manufacturers. Same for floating lures, diving lures, wobblers, poppers, rattlers, plastic worms, power bait and pork rind.

We have to have four casting rods. It's the law, we tell our wives, though the law says we can fish with only two. And with these different rods we have to have four reels, on which there are different weight lines.

My tackle box is 20x10x15. It weighs too much to put in a boat or to carry to the water's edge. Thus, we who fish have tackle boxes in our tackle boxes. And that's a fact.

In the smaller cases we have some of the same stuff as the bigger box . . . split shot and other weights; leaders, swivels, hooks and, of course, some lures for whatever we're after that day. You non-fishing people probably think we who fish already have enough of everything in those carrying cases. But, you'd be wrong.

My fishing jacket (you don't think we'd fish in a common denim or poplin jacket do you?) has sixteen pockets. Where else would we carry our assortment of bobbers, stringers, fly nets for our faces, map, towel, blow-up syringe for inflating angle worms and toilet paper. Oh, yeah, there's a pouch in the back for carrying our catch.

Heck, here I am to the bottom of my allotted space and I haven't told you about the publisher's fishing abilities.

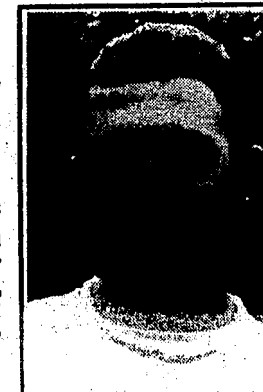

1 cup chopped onion	1 (2½-ounce) can chopped black olives, drained
2 Tbsp. minced garlic	1 (16-ounce) package linguine pasta
Salt and pepper to taste	¼ C. grated Parmesan cheese
1 Tbsp. dried basil	1/2 C. finely minced parsley
1 Teas. dried thyme	
1 (10-ounce) can diced green chilies and tomatoes	
1 (8-ounce) can no-salt-added tomato sauce	
4 skinless, boneless chicken breast halves	

Heat the olive oil in a saucepan over medium heat. Sauté the onion and garlic over medium heat until transparent, about 4 minutes. 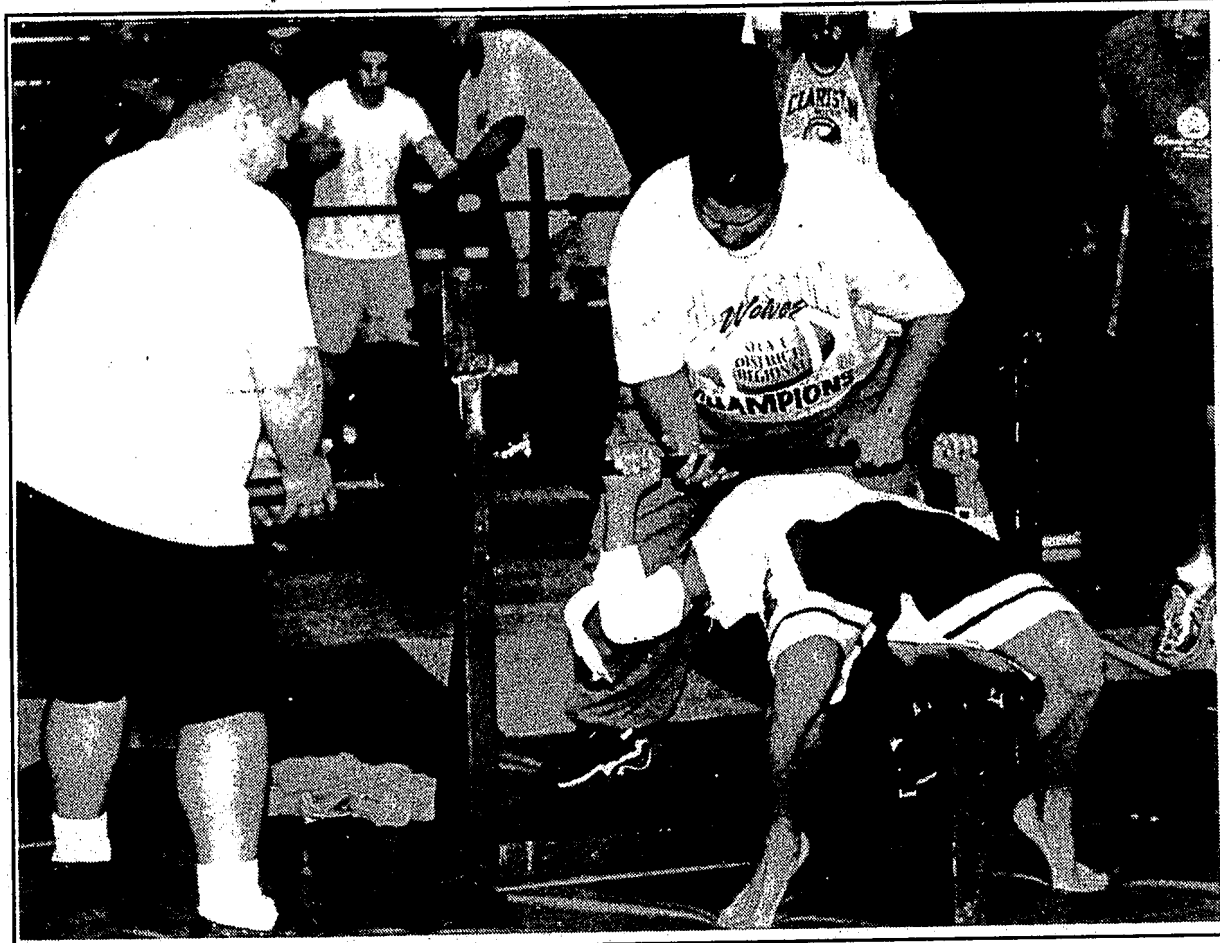

Updates from Rep. Johnson on recent state legislation

I am pleased to report that two bills I recently sponsored are now headed to Gov. John Engler to be signed into law. The first bill strengthens food safety requirements and protects the health of Michigan residents.

This new system simplifies the current mix of laws into one, integrated code. Business owners will find it concise and easy to understand. It also trims government waste by eliminating duplication of inspection responsibilities.

The second bill increases the reimbursement rate of travel expenses for citizens performing their civic duty by testifying in civil court cases. The measure will not increase taxes or costs to the state. It was brought to my attention by a concerned citizen that the reimbursement rate for witnesses had not increased since 1963.

This legislation raises the current mileage reimbursement rate from 10 cents per mile to the same per-mile rate paid to state employees as specified by the Department of Management and Budget (currently 32.5 cents per mile).

Prohibit Sale of Children

I have supported two bills that prevent the selling and buying of any person in the state. The bills prohibit the sale of any individual, regardless of age, to another person. The measures will punish both the buyer and seller with up to 20 years in prison and/or a fine of \$100,000.

The legislation was inspired by a recent incident in Clinton Township where a man was arrested for trying to sell his 10-month-old daughter. During a preliminary hearing, the presiding judge ruled that selling a child did not violate any existing state law.

Family Independence Agency Budget

The Family Independence Agency budget has cleared the House. The \$3.6 billion budget responsibly invests money into day care, foster care, homeless shelters and other important social programs.

The spending plan for 2000-2001 includes \$16.7 million to increase the pay for those providing child care to youngsters 30 months or younger. It also expands the income eligibility scale to 200 percent of the poverty level so more families can receive child-care assistance.

One exciting new program provides educational

scholarships for teachers, directors or home care providers working in a licensed child-care center or registered family home earning \$12 an hour or less.

Consumer Task Force Report

Having traveled the state last summer conducting public hearings, the House Republican Task Force on Consumer Issues recently released its findings. The panel took the most testimony from consumers fed up with illegal phone slamming practices. Other topics included credit reporting, medical billing, nursing home care and various other utility problems.

The report listed the task force's findings and made recommendations, which can turn into future legislation. It was the 32nd report issued by the House GOP since 1987. Past GOP reports have generated many state laws, including the graduated licensing system for teen drivers, reforms to Michigan's unemployment insurance system and a taxpayer bill of rights.

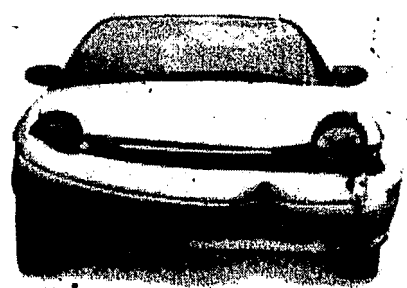

Johnson to run for reelection

State Representative Ruth Johnson (R-Holly) announced today that she is running for reelection in Michigan's 46th House District. Johnson, who was first elected to the position in 1998, said she's running to build on the accomplishments of her first term.

"We've made major strides in cutting taxes, strengthening schools and protecting families," said Johnson. "But we can - we must - do more. We need to continually reform and streamline state government. And we must focus like a laser on meaningful school improvement so that all students have the opportunity for a bright future."

Johnson cited her votes to reduce personal income tax rate from 4.4 percent to 3.9 percent and phase out the single business tax as the type of tax cuts she supports.

"We're going to put \$3 billion back in the pockets of Michigan families. We can deliver more tax cuts more by using technology and eliminating wasteful duplication of government services," she said.

She pointed out that Governor Engler recently signed into law legislation she introduced to eliminate redundant food service inspection services, freeing up inspectors to focus on clean-

ing up the worst food code offenders. Previously, restaurants were subject to dual county and state licensing requirements and inspections.

"This law is a win-win because restaurant owners no longer have to wade through a complicating maze of government regulations, and consumers get a safer product because inspectors will have more time to focus on cleaning up unsafe establishments," said Johnson.

Johnson said legislation she supported to expel violent students from the classroom will make schools safer and allow teachers to dedicate more time to teaching. She recently introduced legislation to allow public school districts to contract with an outside agency to help them deal with a shortage of qualified substitute teachers.

"We need qualified teachers with our students every day of the school year. By contracting with an outside agency or certified substitutes, school administrators will be able to focus on the needs of students rather than trying to track down substitutes every day."

Johnson, 45, a former teacher and small business owner, lives in Groveland Township with her husband, Dr. Donald K. Nanney, and their daughter, Emily.

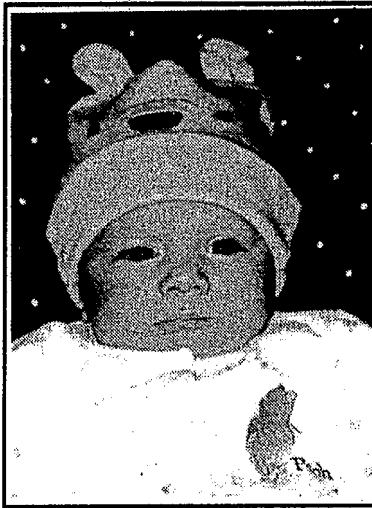

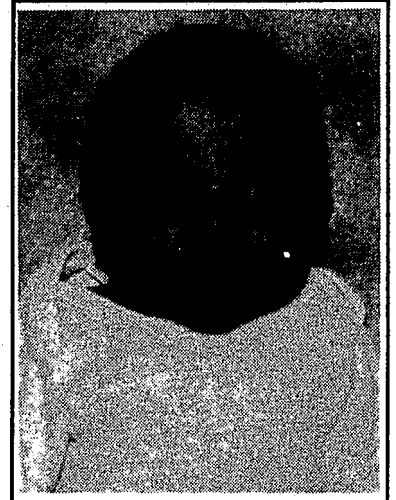

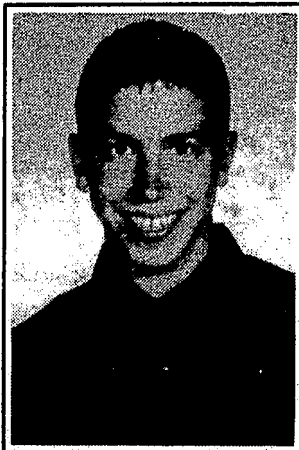

. Her passion for learning is contagious. I am in awe of her everyday as she works her magic in room 30."

Ness has served as a member of the Literacy Study Team in Clarkston, has co-authored the district's Writing Standards for the primary grades, co-authored an article about writing in the first grade classroom for the *Michigan Council of Teachers of English* professional journal, and was a co-presenter at a workshop titled "Teaching Young Children Writer's Craft." Ness also serves as a Writing Program trainer for the district's elementary teachers.

After Ness and her students marched into the media center amid cheers and congratulations, Ness was presented with flowers from Clarkston Foundation members.

Ness, who knew she had been nominated said, "All along, since the process started, I said I felt honored just to be nominated in incredible company. This is an unbelievable moment for me. I will serve as a representative of the wonderful people who do this job everyday."

Pine Knob Principal K.C. Leh called Ness an "outstanding individual, because she cares about all aspects of each child — academically, socially, intellectually and emotionally. She instills in the kids the ability to be risk takers in learning."

Dave Harrison, Clarkston Foundation's Teacher of the Year committee chair, said the choice for Ness was unanimous among the nine-member committee, but a difficult decision at best.

"All of the nominees were wonderful. It could have been any one of them," he said.

Karen Yakmailian, Ph.D., of Clarkston Elementary School, was nominated by the Regiani family. In the nomination form the family said, "(she) . . . made learning enjoyable . . . tolerates nothing but the best from her students, helps them accomplish feats they never believe possible . . . she has given the gift of life-long learning."

Nominee Maureen Moss, a fifth-grade reading teacher at North Sashabaw Elementary School "sparks discussion and creativity from all children," said Kathryn McMurtrey, who nominated her with support from Kathy Calcaterra, the parent of a former student.

"During student-led conferences students identify their own goals and how to reach them," added McMurtrey.

Jodee Blaskowski, a first grade teacher at Independence Elementary School "captures the students'

curiosity by her enthusiasm for the material and her gift of being able to tie in many activities," said Katie Dabrowski, who nominated her.

"Jodee is very aware of the latest research . . . regarding the brain and how people learn. She communicates this knowledge very openly to parents and colleagues."

Blaskowski has been a teacher in the district since 1987.

"They are all really great people. It was hard to pick one," said Harrison.

The eligibility requirements for the award include: an ability to create a love of learning in students of all abilities and backgrounds; high expectations of all students; a strong sense of values, integrity and professional ethics; the ability to learn and experiment with new ideas in order to expand their professional knowledge base; knowledge of subject and curriculum con-

tent . . . of child growth and development . . . of instruction and assessment; energy, enthusiasm and a positive attitude, among others.

Each year the Teacher of the Year award will alternate from elementary to secondary teachers.

Ness will also receive a \$250 grant from the Foundation to be used in her classroom.

Ness will only have to buy gas for her new Mustang, said Flannery Ford sales manager Steve Hazzard. Flannery will pick up the taxes, insurance and all maintenance costs.

Principal Leh said Ness brought the car back to show fellow staff members and students Monday afternoon. "She was so excited," said Leh. "Her students came out and they were all hugging the car, and then they all climbed in it. All 26 of them were squished in the car like little sardines."

blooms. There are small rose doorknobs on the cupboards and a built-in nook holds a set of "Desert Rose" china. It was also her Grandmother Hampton's pattern. "We took the microwave out," she explains. Someday they would like to add a wood floor and "put in a bigger kitchen."

A Look Back

15 YEARS AGO (1985)

Independence Township moved closer as a potential prison site when the Regional Prison Site Selection Committee narrowed nine previously conditioned sites to four. The 39-acre parcel on Maybee Road is located between Sashabaw Road and Dixie Highway, west of Spring Lake Country Club.

The push is on to stop drinking and driving by Clarkston High School students. 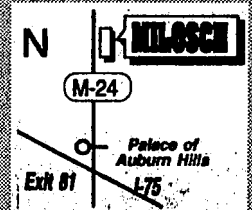

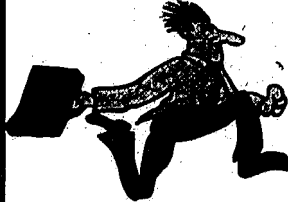
REPORTED DIFFICULTIES

Even if it seems inconsequential at the time it happened, an auto accident should be reported to the police. Those involved in seemingly minor fender benders should never agree to keep the incident secret by mutual agreement with the other party. Doing so leaves one open to the possibility that the other party may file a late report that contends he or she suffered an injury. Without a police report documenting each party's version of events, those duped by the other party into thinking the accident was of little consequence could find themselves with little to back up their claims. Remember, too, that it sometimes happens that injuries and damages are discovered after the fact by those with honorable intentions.

It is very important to obtain evidence at the time of the car accident and not a few days later when memories may be hazy or people difficult to track down. The sooner we reconstruct the events at the scene, the better chance you have to be compensated for your injuries. If you've been injured in a motor vehicle accident, call our law office at 11 North Main Street (620-1030).

NOTE: If you are physically able to do so, write down the details of your accident for future reference before time clouds your perception.

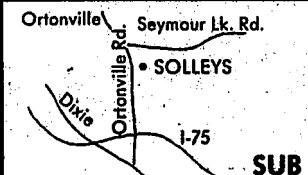

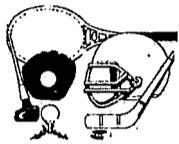

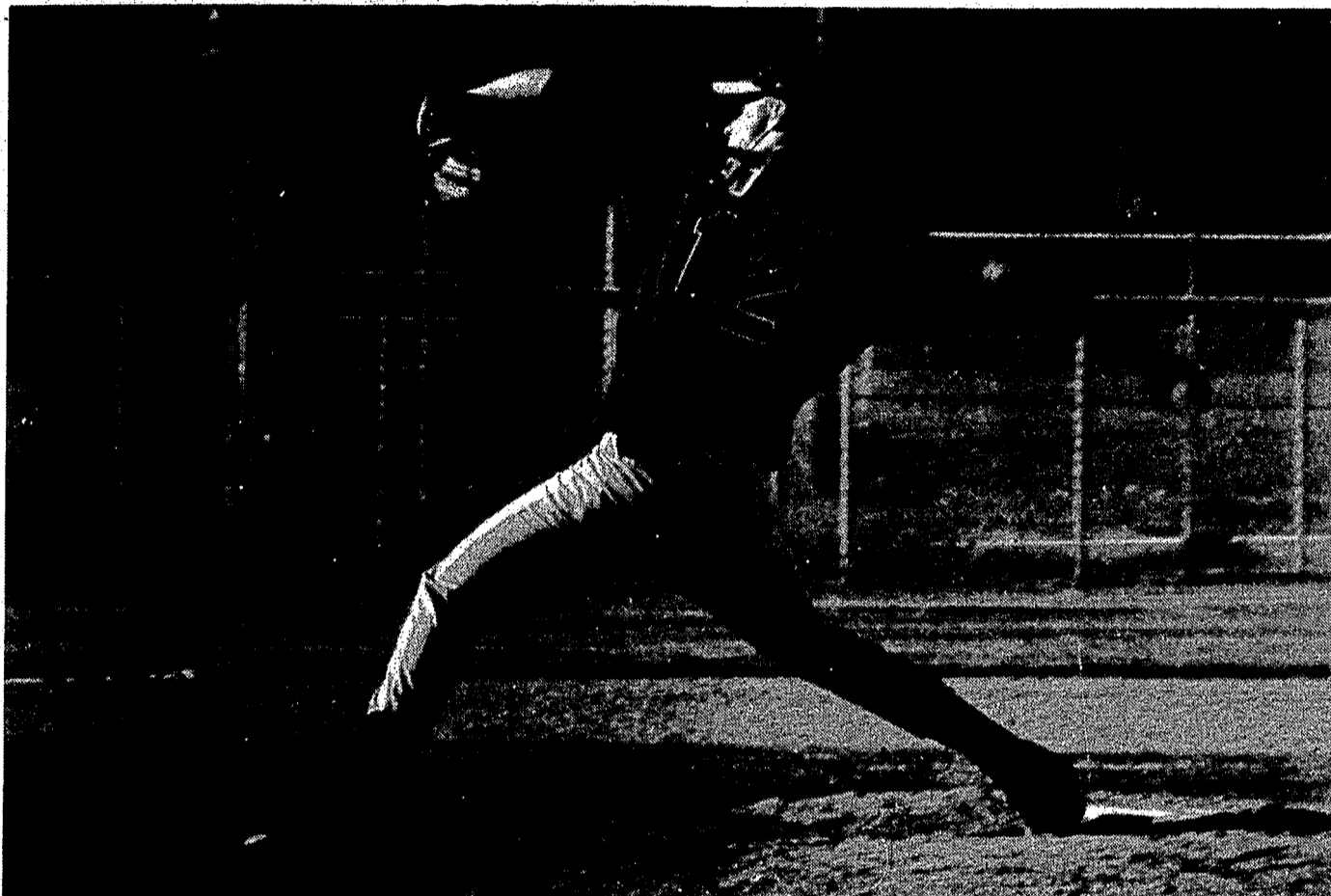

"The course has got tough greens and Rochester is a very tough team," Sherrill said.

Clarkston will compete in regionals in Saginaw May 22. The top three teams qualify for the state meet in Lansing as well as the top three or four individuals Sherrill said.

Fisher also won the 1,600 with a time of 5:25.5. While Brittani Brewer finished second and fourth in the 100 and 300 hurdles, with times of 16.45 and 51.18. She also finished third in the high jump with five feet being her best effort.

"Last winter I worked on my feet movement and attended a few camps. I think I'm playing more relaxed now," he said.

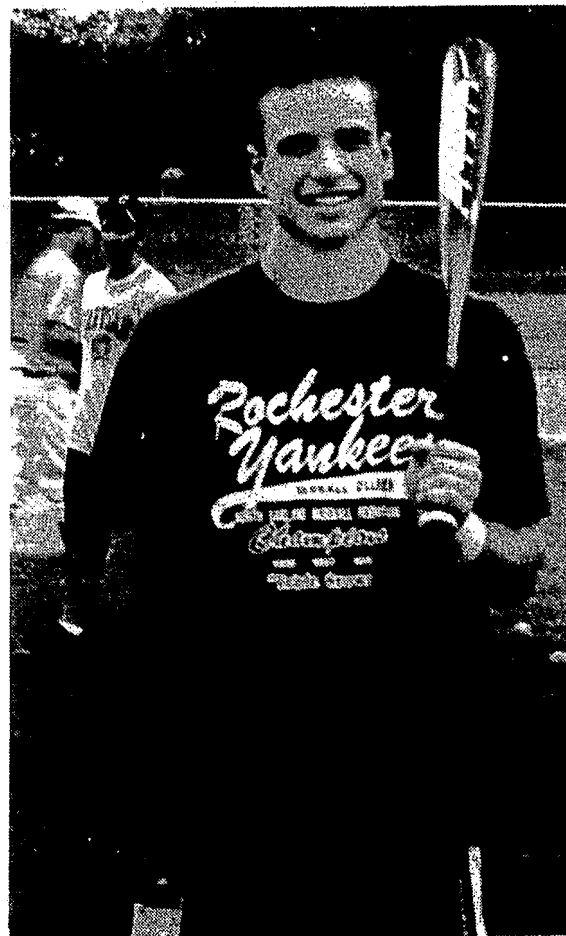

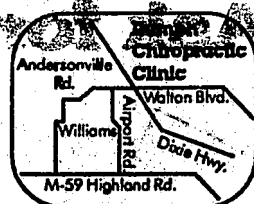

Nature of the Work

The legal system affects nearly every aspect of our society, from buying a home to crossing the street. Lawyers and judicial workers form the backbone of this vital system, linking the legal system and society in myriad ways. For this reason, they hold positions of great responsibility and are obligated to adhere to a strict code of ethics.

Lawyers, also called attorneys, act both as advocates and advisors in our society. As advocates, they represent one of the parties in criminal and civil trials by presenting evidence and arguing in court to support their client. As advisors, lawyers counsel their clients concerning their legal rights and obligations and suggest particular courses of action in business and personal matters. Whether acting as advocate or advisor, all attorneys research the intent of laws and judicial decisions and apply the law to the specific circumstances faced by their client.

Lawyers may specialize in a number of different areas, such as bankruptcy, probate, international, or elder law. Some lawyers concentrate in the growing field of intellectual property. These lawyers help protect clients' claims to copyrights, art work under contract, product designs and computer programs. Other lawyers advise insurance companies about the legality of insurance transactions. The majority of lawyers are found in private practice, where they concentrate on criminal or civil law.

Working Conditions

Lawyers and judicial workers do most of their work in offices, law libraries, and courtrooms. Lawyers sometimes meet in clients' homes or places of business and, when necessary, in hospitals or prisons. They may travel to attend meetings, gather evidence, and appear before courts, legislative bodies, and other authorities.

Hours

Salaried lawyers usually have structured work schedules. Lawyers in private practice may work irregular hours while conducting research conferring

with clients, or preparing briefs during non-office hours. Lawyers often work long hours, and about half regularly work 50 hours or more per week. They may face particularly heavy pressure, especially when a case is being tried.

Job Trends

Individuals interested in pursuing careers as lawyers or judicial workers should encounter stiff competition through 2008. The number of law school graduates is expected to continue to strain the economy's capacity to absorb them. As for judges, the prestige associated with serving on the bench should insure continued competition for openings.

Skills Needed

Prospective lawyers should develop proficiency in writing and speaking, reading, researching, analyzing and thinking logically—skills needed to succeed both in law school and in the profession.

Students interested in a particular aspect of law may find related courses helpful. Patent lawyers need a strong background in engineering or science and future tax lawyers must have extensive knowledge of accounting.

Suggested Courses

English, foreign languages, public speaking, government, philosophy, history, economics, mathematics and computer science, are useful.

“MY ASTONISHING TRUE STORY...”

“How I Lost 64 Lbs. and Gained My Self-Confidence!”

My name is Tania Olsson. I am a single mother. My son, Chaz, is eight years old. I am a customer service representative. I dropped 64 lbs. of fat in 11 short months. My story is so remarkable. I would like to share it with you.

My cheeks burned with embarrassment as I stared at the television screen. We were watching a recent family video. “I’m huge!” I gasped.

I used food as comfort. I told myself it was just baby fat. It would go away. But it didn’t go away. I was getting fatter every week.

With fat came anxiety and depression. My self-esteem was nil. I could see folks turning sideways to squeeze past me. I’d cringe inside.

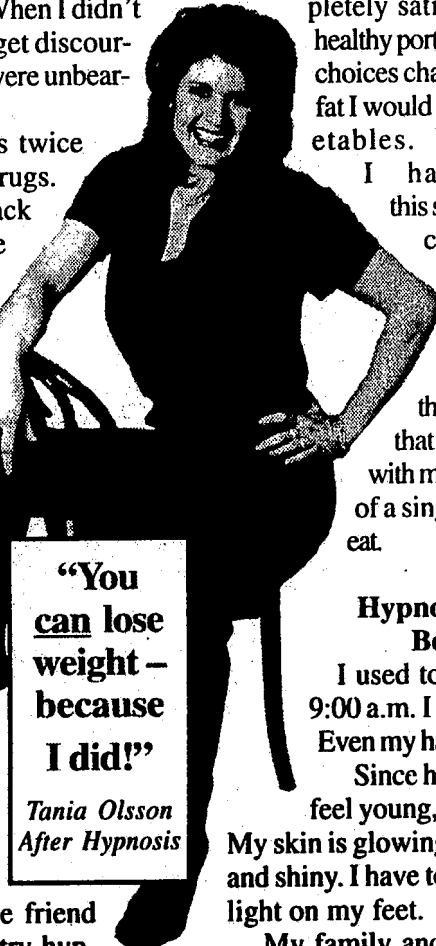
