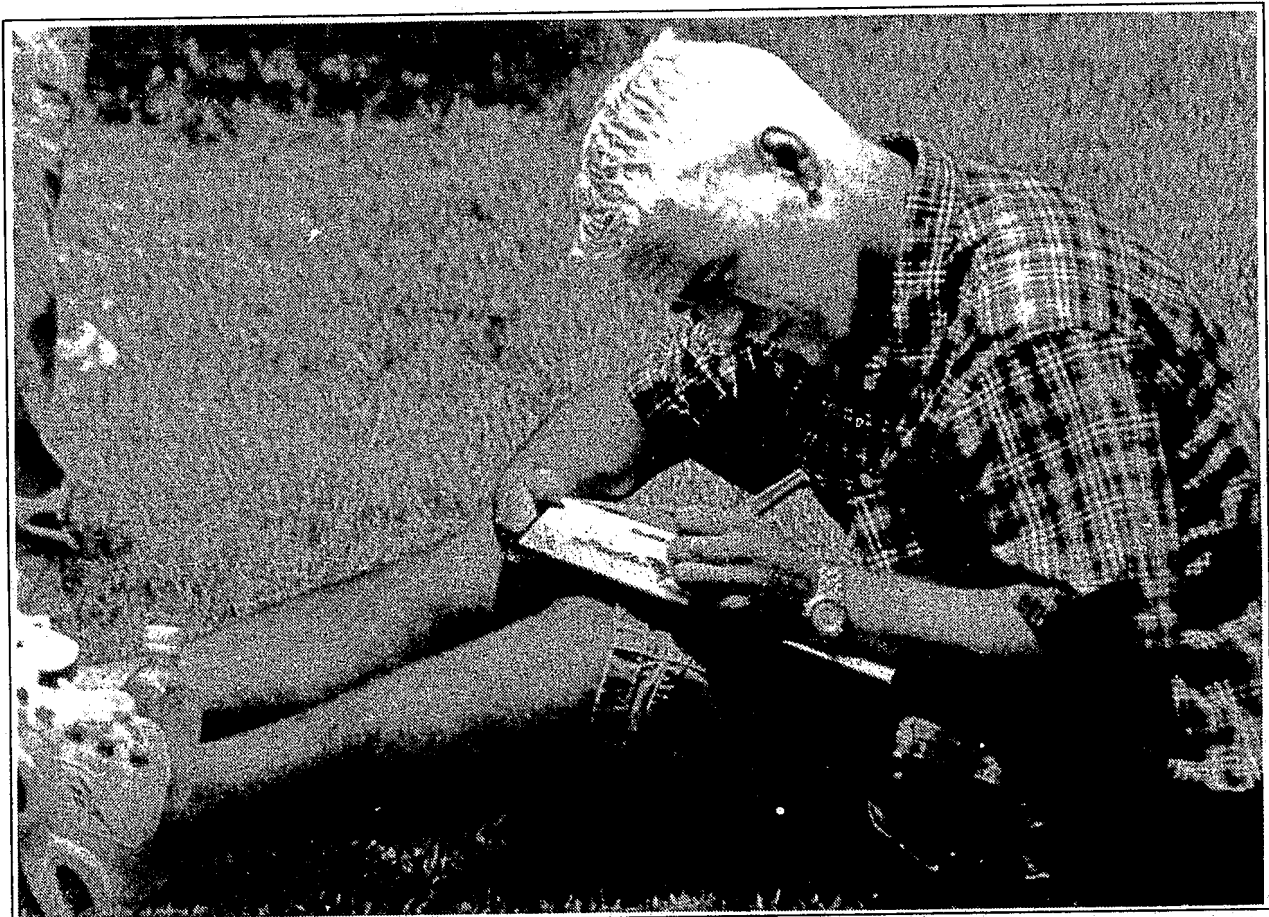
Over 500 students make up the class of 2000 and a vast majority made their way to the park to enjoy all the activities and fun to be had.

## Millage, school board candidates on Monday's election ballot

### The millage

Clarkston Community Schools residents will make several choices when they head to the ballot box for the June 12 annual school election.

The main issue facing voters that day will be whether or not to approve a three-mill increase, from 2000-02, on non-homestead properties in the Clarkston Community Schools district.

If the proposal is approved, the estimated revenue that will be collected by the district this year is about \$400,000, which will be designed to restore the Headlee reduction, according to the ballot language. Craig Kahler, director of business services for

### Johnson Food Code 2000 becomes law

Gov. John Engler has signed into law a new Michigan food code, sponsored by Rep. Ruth Johnson, to strengthen food safety requirements and protect the public.

The code will simplify the current mix of 12 separate state laws into one, integrated code that is concise and easy to understand. Highlights of the new law include: Minimizing employee hand contact with prepared foods; eliminating duplication of inspection responsibilities; cutting government waste; providing statewide education and training to consumers of food safety.

"I am pleased to have introduced legislation that plays such a vital role in protecting Michigan residents and reforming government," said Johnson, R-Holly. "This kind of sensible solution will help keep people safe and, at the same time, help business prosper."

The artwork included drawings, paintings, design, pottery, and sculpture, as well as a special senior exhibit.

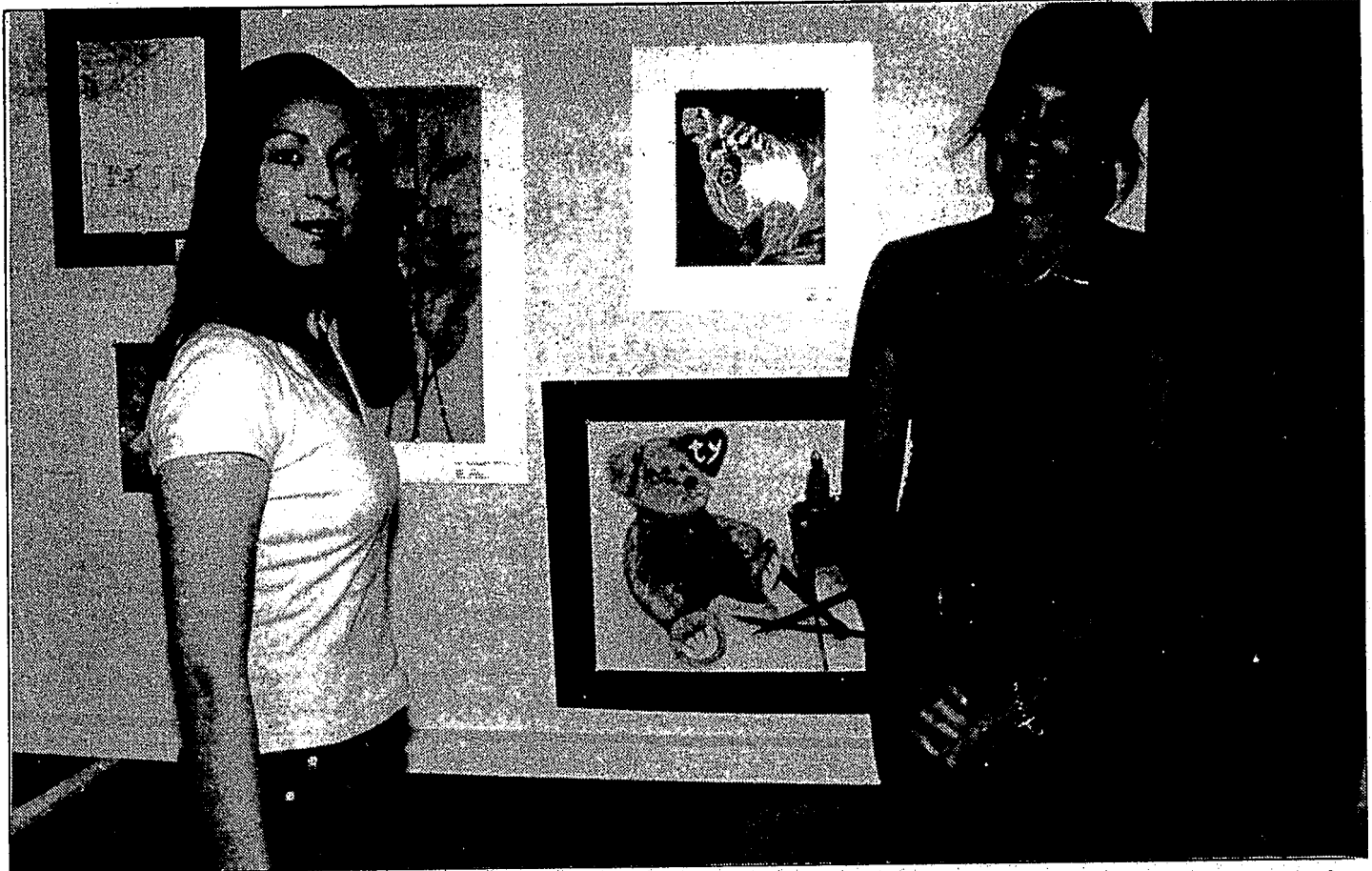
"This is the first time we've tried this," said Sandy Grider, chair of the art department at Clarkston High School. "We're going to try to make it an annual event."

# Pine Knob name may be changing soon

Clarkston's Pine Knob Music Theatre is getting close to a deal for the sale of its naming rights.

Dan Hauser, executive vice president for Palace Sports and Entertainment, the company that owns Pine Knob, said Monday they're "very close to working out a deal, but we're not at liberty to divulge any of the details. We expect that in about three weeks we'll have more direction of where we're heading."

In an earlier interview, Hauser said the company is looking for a \$10 million deal which would bring in \$1 million per year for 10 years.

He said before the deal is made public, he will be speaking to Independence Township officials to discuss the proposal.

Previously, officials and residents said the Pine Knob name was important because of the history and name recognition it brings to Clarkston. Some people suggested that the sale of naming rights would be more acceptable if part of the revenue came back to the township.

The name of an entertainment venue is also important to Michigan rocker Bob Seger, according to Ed Andrews, president of Punch Enterprises, Seger's management company.

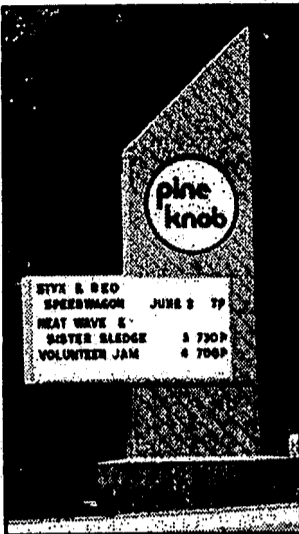
"If we go into a facility with Nike banners all over it, for instance, it looks like we're selling something for them," he said, adding he would have the banners removed. "They also may expect sweetheart deals (such as blocks of free

## Palace goes with planned improvements

The improvements to Pine Knob Music Theatre approved by Independence Township earlier this year are underway and expected to be finished by early summer.

Jeff Corey, director of public relations for Palace Sports and Entertainment, the Auburn Hills-based company which owns Pine Knob, said a new concessions deck at the top of the lawn and an expanded food court area highlight over \$1.5 million in improvements to Pine Knob for the summer of 2000.

The hill-top deck is located at the top of the lawn seating area between two sets of stairways which provide lawn access from the back of the

hill. At approximately 200 feet long and 40 feet deep, it will provide nearly 7,000 square feet of space, which is expected to comfortably accommodate several hundred guests.

An attached concessions building with 16 point of service will offer a full menu of food, drinks and snacks, manned by Volume Services America, PS&E's official concessionaire, said Corey.

A second major upgrade to Pine Knob will enlarge the stage left concessions area. Named the "Two Step," it will be nearly doubled

in size, creating 21 additional service points. This stand is the most convenient full-service concessions option for a majority of guests in the stage left pavilion and lawn seating area. The design of the new section of the food court incorporates a 35-foot tower.

Other improvements planned for the summer include: adding an unobtrusive illumination system to the walkway between the rear of the pavilion and the bottom of the lawn seating area; replacing the wooden stairway on the stage left side of the lawn seating area with concrete stairs; enhancing the overall look of the venue with additional landscaping and painting throughout the grounds; resurfacing areas of the main parking lot, said Corey.

When the Planning Commission gave the ok for the improvements, they asked that the noise issue be given consideration.

seats). We don't want to be part of that. We do ask a lot of questions when we agree to play a theater.

"If the venue were to lower parking prices (after selling naming rights), that would be okay. But if ticket and parking prices still go up, we find that a little ridiculous."

Andrews also said the kind of company that purchases naming rights is

important, too. "We wouldn't play a venue with a name like (tobacco company) Phillip Morris. But until the deal is done, we don't know what it means - it can be positive for the public."

Hauser said he respects the opinion and concerns of entertainers like Seger. "Our past reputation would warrant that we would handle things in a proper and prudent manner," he said.

He added the company which purchased the naming rights would buy blocks of seats and not expect them for free. And the revenue from the naming rights sale will be used for improvements at the theater.

"Dollars going toward improvements of the facility is better for the customers. It's a win-win situation if Bob Seger's or whoever's attendees would have a more enjoyable night," he said.

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# Water expenses add up in new city budget

An increase in the general fund of 13 mills to cover expenses of a city water system will be proposed June 13.

The city's budget committee will present its budget at a public hearing starting at 7 p.m. The meeting is at city hall, at 375 Depot Road.

The budget committee is made up of councilman Mayor Sharron Catalo, councilmen Scott Meyland and Dan Columbo and city manager Art Pappas.

Among the items to be discussed on this year's budget are the city's general fund, the city's local roads and the city's major roads.

The budget won't be passed until the council's following meeting, which will be June 26 at 7 p.m. at city hall.

The general fund will see a 13 mill increase, 6.5 mills of which will be levied in July of this year and another 6.5 mills will be levied in December of 2000.

Millage increases regarding the city's water issue have yet to be finalized, but Pappas said he expects more to be known regarding those figures in the coming weeks. He did say he expects to see the

millage to be something over one mill and to take effect this July.

The proposed 2001 budget will see the city budget for \$618,130 in total revenues while the city will have a total of \$654,130 available.

Disbursements for the proposed 2001 budget total \$653,936 which will give the city a \$194 cash balance at the end of the year.

The vast majority of revenue for the city comes from property taxes which will total \$455,780 when approved. That's an increase of over \$9,000 from the 2000 budget.

Other high revenue generating sources for the city include state revenue sharing which will see the city budget for \$107,000. That number will stay the same for the 2001 budget. The alcohol and tobacco task force brought in \$50,000 last year, but doesn't appear on the 2001 budget.

Last Wednesday, Papa Joe's confirmed negotiations between the bowling alley and the Rochester-based market have come to a halt.

"We started negotiations a few months ago, but now everything is on hold," said Paul Vitale, general manager of Papa Joe's in Rochester.

He added it is "a matter of numbers." Vitale also said no form of agreement has been reached on either end.

The market, which offers produce, deli, seafood and specialty meats, is reportedly interested in expanding its store number to three.

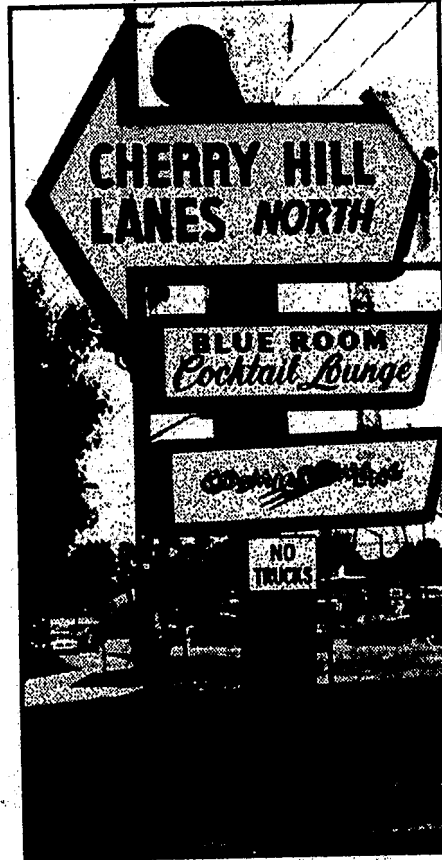
Cherry Hill Lanes North could soon be the chain's Clarkston home.

Kuhla said the bowling alley was upset with previous news reports concerning the agreement and stated nothing definite has been decided between the two companies.

### Schools have not 'lost' money because of Headlee

Open Letter to Dr. AJ Roberts  
Clarkston Community Schools

Twice now in recent weeks you have said that as a result of the so-called Headlee Amendment the school district has lost \$400,000.00 over the last two years. I disagree with that interpretation.

As you know, the Headlee Amendment was enacted to protect taxpayers from the ravages of inflation, particularly where property assessments are increasing faster than the rate of inflation and thus increasing our taxes.

Headlee does not reduce the amount of dollars so there is no money lost. Rather, it reduces the rate of taxation so that the dollars remain constant (adjusted up only at the rate of inflation).

So, in my judgment, it is inaccurate to say that as a community's property values rise the school district's financial loss will also increase. No one can lose what they do not already have. The school district continues

to receive more money each year, just a smaller percentage of the increase in assessments. That you cannot reap all the benefits of increases in assessments is not a loss. Moreover, your statement of "loss" ignores the increasing tax dollars the school district is receiving from all the new construction.

Whether it is the school district or the township that seeks to have the important protections of Headlee overridden, government has a responsibility to accurately describe what is going on and, more importantly, to make a case that additional tax money must be taken from the wallets and checkbooks of our citizens.

Unfortunately, there is nothing in your public pronouncements that indicate why these additional monies are needed. Presumably, it will be to improve our schools...but how? Aren't we, as taxpayers, entitled to make such decisions based on the facts?

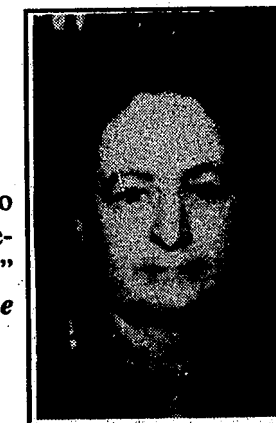

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# Business owners, school officials talk about the millage

the Clarkston school district, said that the millage is important, because under the Headlee Amendment, passed in 1978, the district has rolled back the millage for the past three years.

Under Proposition A, the district's taxing authority on non-homestead property is limited to 18 mills; however, the millage rate has dropped below that amount, according to Kahler.

Last year, the district took in about \$350,000 less as a result of the drop in the millage rate, he further stated.

"The problem we have is that property values continue to rise, while the millage continues to roll back," he said. "We're not realizing the full amount of the foundation allowance."

According to Kahler, the 18 mills approved by voters in 19966 has been reduced by 1.1625 mills, according to the Headlee calculation. A mill equals \$1 for every \$1,000 of a property's taxable value.

Kahler said that the district cannot legally levy more than 18 mills on non-homestead property.

He said that the millage, if approved, would help the district deal with such issues as increases in the cost of employee benefits and the completion of educational enhancements within the district.

"It will definitely restore money back in the school district," Kahler said. "That will help us as we consider our financial situation with continued rising costs."

Bob Olsen, a Clarkston area businessman, said that his primary concern was with the area businesses being the only one that is paying for the millage.

"I don't think it makes any sense to have the people who aren't paying the tax to have to vote on it," he said. "There'll be higher business rates. I'd rather see a direct tax that we all participate in across the board."

He said that, in his opinion, the Clarkston district

is doing very well for themselves.

"I think the Clarkston schools are doing an excellent job," Olsen said. "There's a nice arrangement between the chamber of commerce and the schools in trying to get businesses and schools to work together. I think there's a lot of mutual respect. I haven't heard much negative at this point."

Olsen cautioned that if the millage passes, the general population may believe they're not paying for it, when, in fact, the higher prices at area businesses

would reflect the millage increase.

"If you do it too much, you'll fool people into thinking they're not paying taxes," he said. "What goes around comes around."

Judy Livingston at Allstate Insurance said that the millage can only benefit the school system and the surrounding community.

"I feel that we have a good school system, and the area is growing so much," she said. "When it's something that's going to help the community, help our kids, and help our property values, I don't know why anyone

wouldn't vote for it."

Livingston, who moved to the Clarkston area with her husband in 1969, said that the district has provided a quality education for her children.

"I feel they had a good education," she said. "The teachers were great. We need a good school system to keep our good teachers. I feel we need to support our school system."

Independence Township trustee Neil Wallace takes a slightly different point of view; while he said he is not necessarily opposed to the millage, he feels that more information is needed before a decision should be made.

He believes the district has not presented their financial situation in an accurate light.

"There's a fundamental inaccuracy," Wallace said. "All the schools have said is that they lost \$400,000. They have put it in terms of how much they have the ability to tax us. That representation is inaccurate. We, as the taxpaying public, ought to be permitted to make a decision based on the facts and the actual needs of the schools, not an inaccurate description of the schools' ability to tax us."

Voters in the district will also choose from three candidates for the Clarkston Board of Education. The top two voters will each receive four-year terms to the board.

Two incumbent board members-president Karen Foyteck and secretary Mary Ellen McLean-are running for reelection. They will be joined on the ballot by Stephen Hyer, a Clarkston High School graduate who is currently attending the University of Michigan.

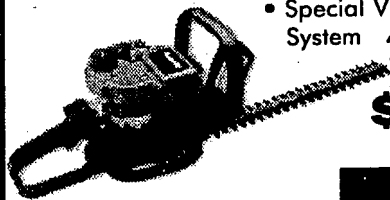
In addition, voters will choose two members of the Oakland Community College Board of Trustees, who will each serve six-year terms. Six candidates will appear on the ballot: Richard J. Akehurst, Carol L. Crew, Pamala Davis, Athena Dumas-Lawrence, Marjorie Nanian Mugerian, and John A. Wangler.

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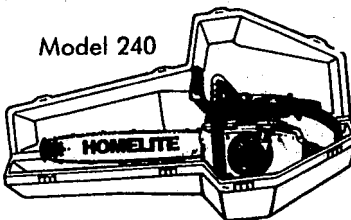


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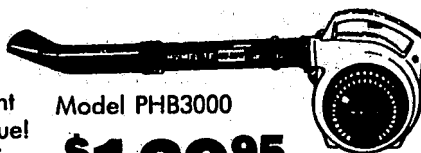


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# Police and Fire

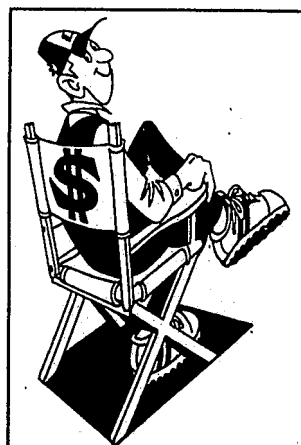

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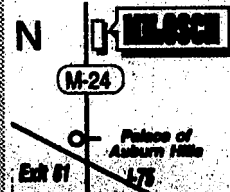

The questions we asked the candidates are:

1. During the next term, the contract to sell Pepsi products in vending machines in Clarkston High School students will come up for renewal. Are you in favor of continuing the deal? (Pepsi products are sold exclusively, in exchange for scholarships and funding for the schools).
2. In matters of school construction, should the district be subject to township site plan reviews?
3. What is your opinion of the impact of the Headlee Amendment on school financing? Is there a better way?
4. What is your opinion of the impact school violence is having on communities today?
5. Do MEAP tests need to be restructured?
6. What is your opinion of communication between the schools and the community?
7. How would you rate Superintendent Dr. Al Roberts performance?

### Pepsi Contract

We were extremely careful when we negotiated our contract with Pepsi to insure that our specifications were met. In addition to making sure that we did not have large commercial signs and that we were able to offer the variety of products requested in locations that we specified, a \$1,000 scholarship is granted by Pepsi each year to a graduating senior. I am in favor of extending this contract provided that we are able to continue with the contract provisions that are appropriate for our students and buildings.

### School Site Plan Review

We have worked very hard to maintain open communication with our local governing boards, and have discussed possible school sites and construction issues with the local governments within our school district.

Information from the townships regarding proposed development benefits our planning for school population. We have voluntarily submitted our plans for their input and review, and we have taken their suggestions seriously. Our architects inspect our schools on a regular basis throughout construction, and are required by state law to conduct inspections to a safe standard that meets stringent state mandates. Cooperation in community planning should be our focus.

### Headlee Amendment

The Headlee Amendment (passed before Proposal A) applies to non-homestead property tax for school funding. This is especially crucial in districts that are experiencing fast growth. While the state law specifies that non-homestead property can be taxed at 18 mills and Clarkston voters have approved that tax rate, the Headlee Amendment rolls back that 18 mills in areas of accelerated growth. Consequently, the school district and other local government services are unable to collect the full 18 mills approved by the voters. We are asking the voters to reinstate the full millage for non-homestead property.

### School Violence

Violence in our society is a primary concern for everyone. Clarkston Community Schools has worked

closely with our local officials to plan emergency procedures. Our School Liaison Officer Program with the Oakland County Sheriffs Department is working very well. We have instituted appropriate safety measures with "smart cards" and building security. Unfortunately, there is not a foolproof method of insuring that an incident could not occur. The penalties mandated by state law and zero tolerance policies are severe. An aware community and parental involvement are key components in maintaining a safe environment for our students and staff.

### MEAP Tests

The MEAP tests are one of the measures used for measuring achievement. Clarkston's MEAP scores are well above the average scores for Oakland County and the State of Michigan. This year's scores were just released, and while I am concerned about some of the raw data that I have seen, we will have a better idea of what action needs to be taken when the data has been analyzed.

Once we have the specifics of this year's testing, appropriate measures will be implemented to address concerns. Traditionally, our staff has used information from the MEAP to help determine appropriate curriculum/classroom planning. An accurate assessment of achievement involves the analysis of many indicators of student success.

### Communicating with the public

The Clarkston Board of Education and the administration of Clarkston Schools is doing a good job of communicating with our public. Recent examples of the open-communication environment were the public hearings on redistricting and transportation issues. In addition to public hearings, our citizens communicate via phone calls and E-mail. We continue to publish

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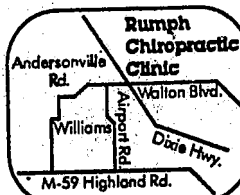
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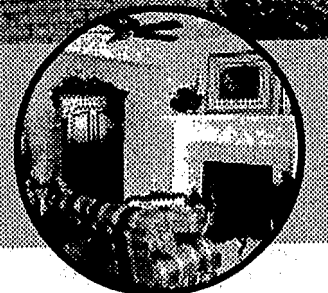
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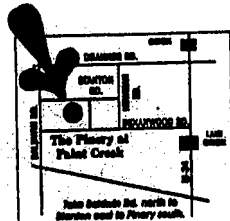

building and community newsletters at regular intervals, and hold press conferences when appropriate. The superintendent's regular newspaper columns address current educational issues and concerns. We do take comments and suggestions seriously, and try to respond as quickly as possible.

### Personal Assessment of Supt. Dr. Roberts

The Board of Education does an annual review of the superintendent. We have started the process this year, but it is not yet complete. When the annual evaluation is complete, it will be presented at a regular board meeting. My personal assessment is that Dr. Roberts is an extraordinary educational leader, an excellent communicator, and is focused on what's best for all of our students. Dr. Roberts has made a positive impact on teaching and learning in our schools.

### STEVE HYER

I graduated from Clarkston High School in 1997. As a student, and for some time after graduation, I worked with Clarkston Community Schools to improve the overall technology experience in the classroom.

I also worked on getting the technology in the new high school up and running. I have been involved with the Parent Teacher Student Associations as well as other student-directed, administration-initiated leadership workshops. I have also been invited to conduct training sessions for the staff at Clarkston High School.

I currently have two jobs. I direct Internet operations at The Center for Highly Interactive Computing in Education at The University of Michigan in Ann Arbor. I work to integrate technology into core K-12 curriculum areas. I am also the President and Founder of Internet Global Data Solutions Corporation, a company based in Clarkston. IGD Solutions Corporation works to maintain several online K-12 curriculum resources for students and teachers to enrich the traditional teaching and learning process. I am also a student at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor. I will graduate in

December with a degree in Biology.

### Pepsi Contract

Clarkston Community Schools has a difficult decision to balance between effectively providing a service and bombarding students with advertising. As the Pepsi contract is again up for review the issue should be carefully examined. A simple renewal without further investigation is most certainly not the way to proceed.

It is obvious soft drinks are unhealthy for students but we have to be realistic and realize that keeping students from drinking soft drinks is not going to happen whether they are provided or not. If the decision is made to proceed with the contract to offer soft drinks the district should allow any company the opportunity to provide the students with soft drinks. Perhaps having food services provide soft drinks more affordably could be a pliable solution. Further investigation into the issue should be the way to proceed.

### Site plan review

There should be no reason to mandate that Clarkston Community Schools work with the township planning board when constructing new buildings. Clarkston Community Schools should voluntarily consult with the township keeping this channel of communication open.

Working together with the township instead of

against it will benefit all involved and will ultimately lead to better teaching and learning. Forcing the schools to deal with the township through red tape is not the answer. The communication channels between the school district and the township should be kept constantly open and constantly flowing both ways with information making a powerful partnership between the district and the township.

### MEAP tests

The Clarkston Community School District has consistently performed well on MEAP tests, staying within the top third in the county. The curriculum currently taught in core areas does an excellent job of adequately preparing students for the MEAP test, but that doesn't mean we should not strive to improve our performance.

We should seek constant year-to-year improvements in our teaching and learning processes that will be reflected by constant improvement in MEAP scores. Advanced Placement scores are a valuable indicator of student competencies in core curriculum areas, but MEAP scores are certainly not the only indicator. Resources should not be solely allocated toward preparing students for the MEAP test. Resources should also be allocated toward making student connections, developing social skills, developing skills for use in the marketplace of the new economy and developing skills to make our students informed, effective citizens. Although it is harder to measure performance in these areas, it is imperative that we spend time developing them.

### Dr. Roberts

Superintendent Dr. Al Roberts has done an impressive job keeping teaching and learning at the forefront of his agenda. While many times his decisions are not popular among the community or staff members they almost always have the driving force of improving the teaching and learning process. As with everyone, Dr. Roberts should continue to strive to improve Clarkston Community Schools.

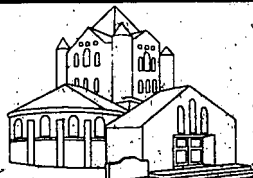

their local schools, and a voter-approved millage level, Headlee will keep rolling back and eating away at that rate.

Therefore, as we must this year, we have to go back and seek approval for a millage that the community has said "yes" to previously. Given Proposal A, Headlee is unnecessary. Proposal A caps homestead taxable SEV rates as tied within the rate of inflation. Proposal A is working for long term homeowners by providing tax relief, but limits the revenue collected for education.

Headlee undermines revenue gained from all property, but particularly impacts collecting revenue from new construction and recently purchased homes and businesses. When parents ask why funding for certain programs is so difficult, the answer lies in how we receive our funding.

### School Violence

This is an issue that every parent, student and educator is facing. The bizarre events that have taken place are a reflection of how a very small portion of our kids react to situations. Analysis of reasoning has been bantered by every possible source.

I'm not convinced that any district can guarantee that an irrational act won't occur. In Clarkston we have taken a proactive approach in attempting to identify personalities that may generate violent behavior. Prevention, communication and taking a zero tolerance to violence, or threat of violence has to this date been successful.

The bigger question is what is the source? More activities for all of our kids are necessary. Every child needs to feel welcome and comfortable to be a

part of their school. Reality .... we can't reach every child. Parents are the best connectors. I think we have abandoned our kids to video games and television, and the messages they are receiving, if not combined with parental input, can be very disturbing. We constantly have to provide positive influences while they are in our care, and with partnership with parents and the community, Clarkston is less likely to have a bizarre incident within our school halls.

### MEAP Tests

It's not perfect, but it does allow some benchmark as to whether our kids are learning any basic information. My concern over the MEAP test is that we tend to teach to the test.

The public and state legislatures seem to believe that these tests properly evaluate not only a student's performance, but a school district as well. Society is very mobile. High growth districts such as Clarkston have many transfers from various states and other school districts, yet we're held accountable for the base at which a student arrives.

I also have some concerns whether actual practitioners are developing these tests. As a parent, and a board member, I want some measure of accountability that our students learn those topics that contribute to their success, but if we "cookie cutter" every district, we lose creative programs and opportunities for kids while we prepare for a test that may or may not be a good evaluation of children learning.

### Communicating with the public

This is a constant challenge with any large entity. Clarkston Community Schools is the largest service provided in our community. This creates a

very large task to keep everyone informed. We have improved in the past four years, primarily as a result of commitment by the board and Superintendent Dr. Al Roberts. All that said, communication is a two-way process. Giving information out, without reaction or information in return is not communication. Parents need to feel welcome in our schools, Kids need confidence that their opinion matters. We

have made some strides in communicating with our partners, but there is always that desire to improve.

I have always made myself accessible to the public. Often I will ask opinions on issues that you may not hear unless it is asked. An extremely small amount of our community come to the board meetings, so we need to meet

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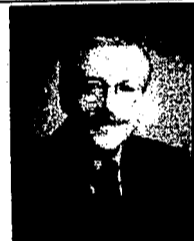

She is also survived by six grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.

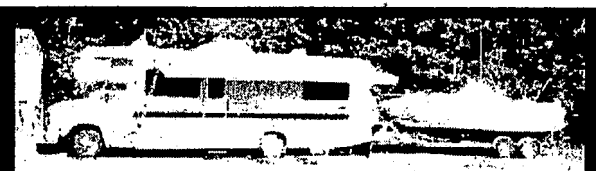

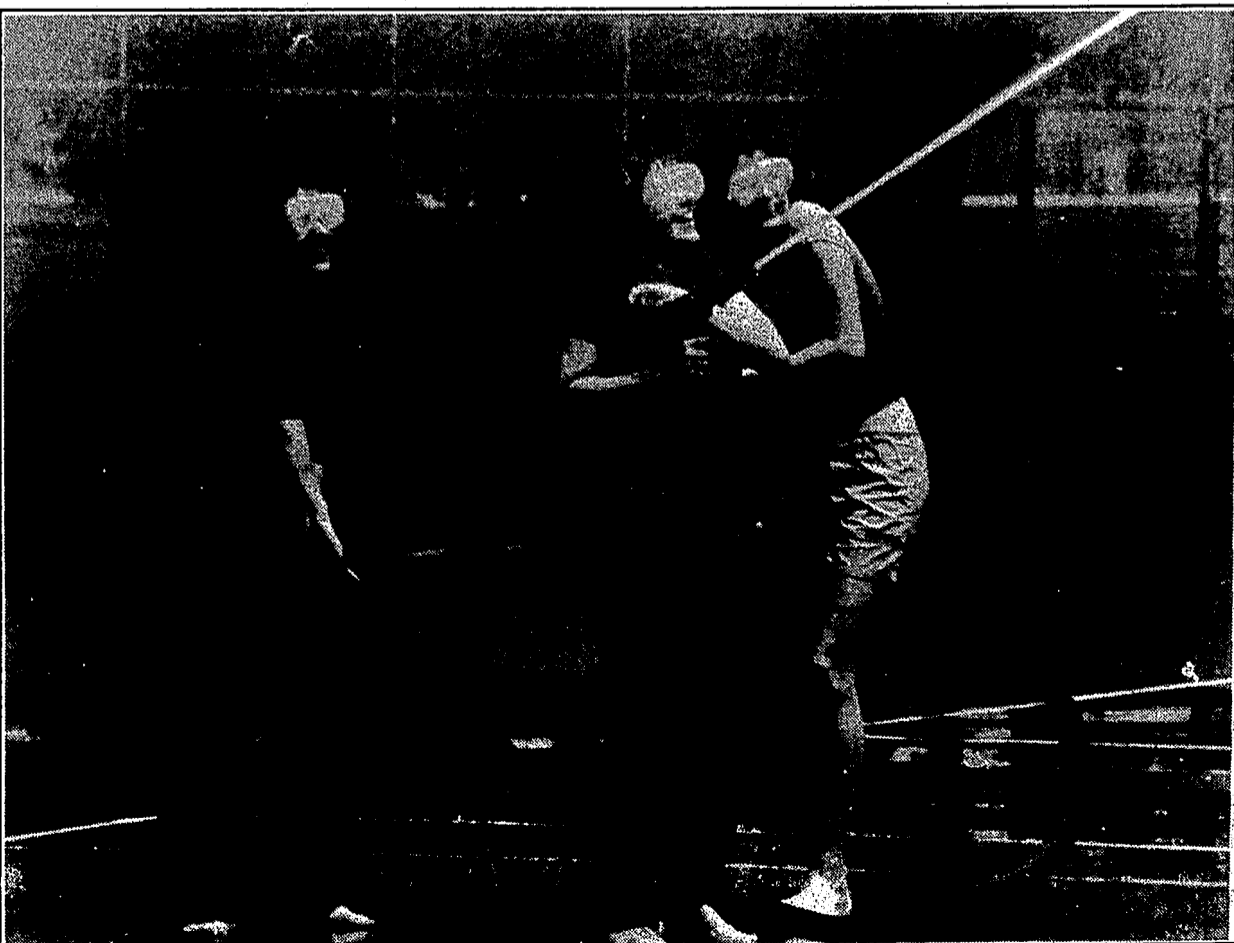

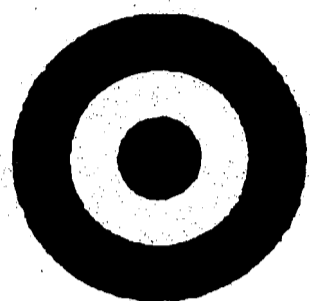
Land said Morgan's performance was key to the victory, especially con-

In the last four years the Wolves have won three championships, two in the Oakland Activities Association Division II and one in Division I. In addition, they've lost only one dual meet in four years.

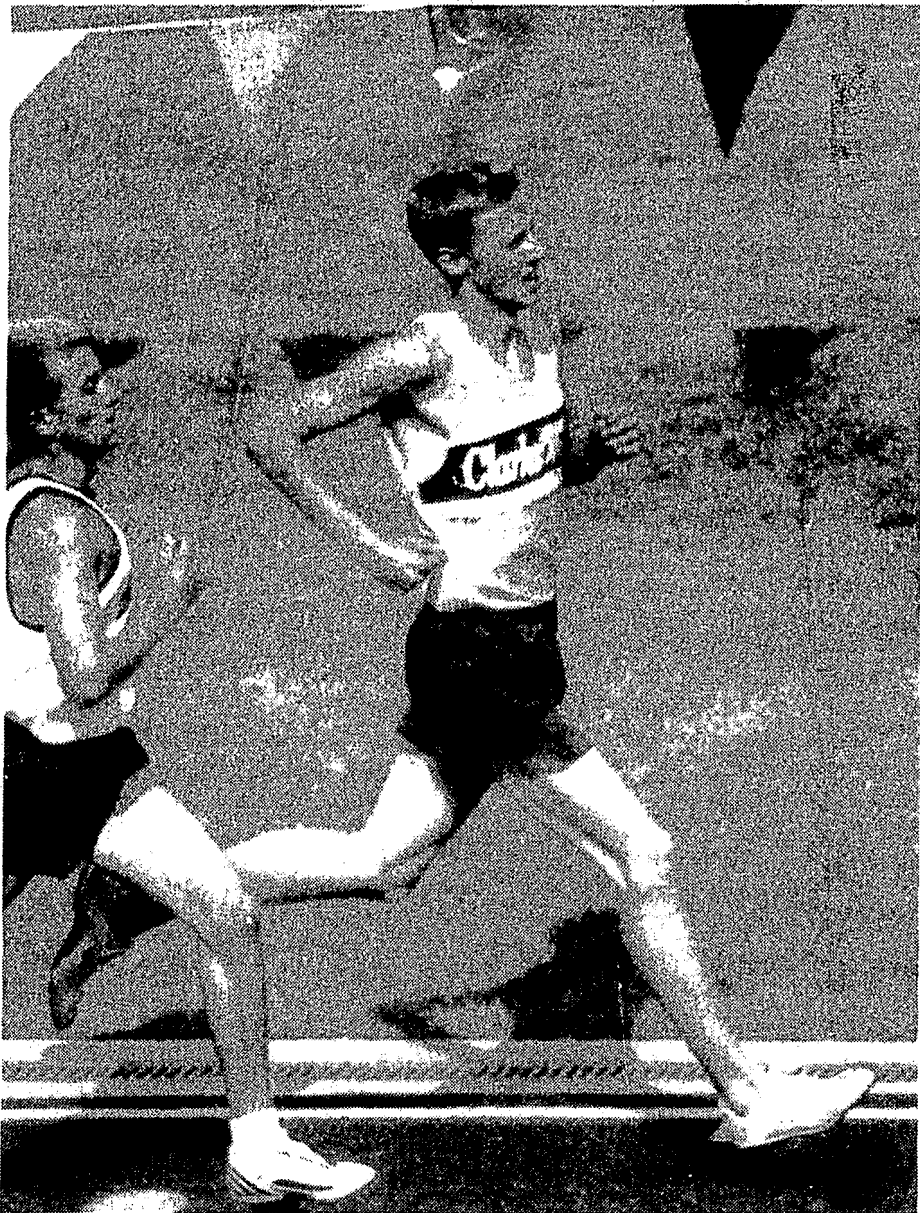

"It'll be a big hole to fill. He was a great leader for our team and really had a great off season for us. He worked on cutting down his strikeouts and his leadership was great," Price said.

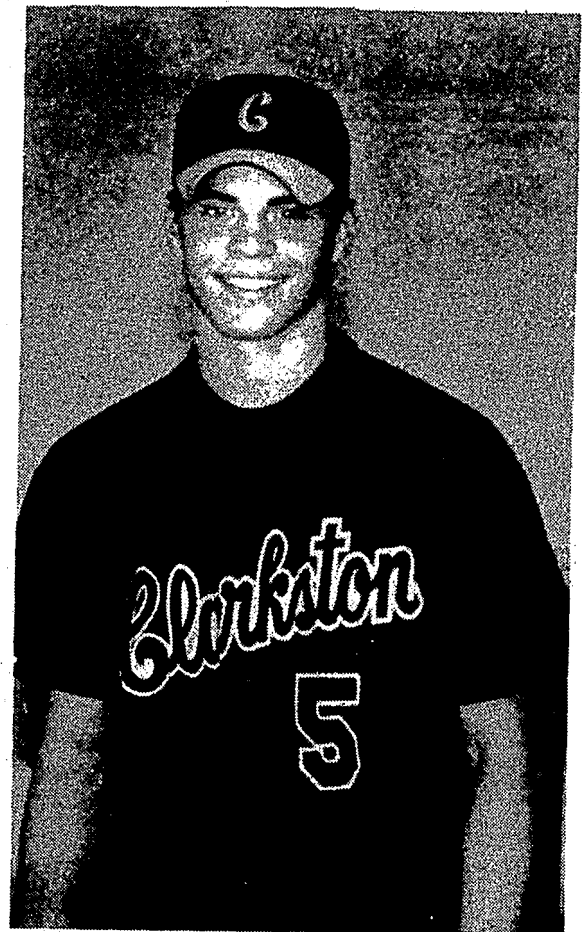
Gove agrees that his leadership is his best quality on the field.

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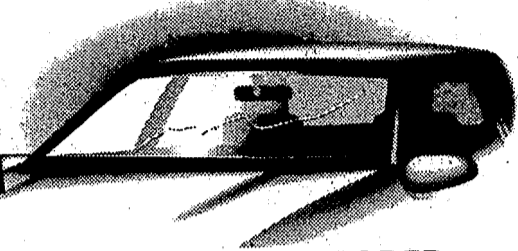

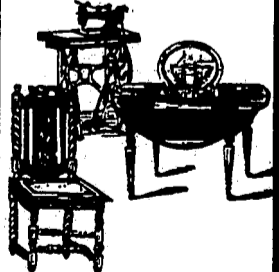

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# Girls excel at state track meet

## Fischer sets school record in 800 meter, relay teams set personal bests

It was an afternoon marked by great efforts, personal bests and school records. That's how the girls varsity track team ended its 2000 season at the state meet held June 3 at Rockford High School.

Clarkston qualified several athletes for the event, and totaled seven points as a team.

The meet was highlighted by performances from the 4x800 relay team, Nicole Fischer in the 800 meter and the 4x400 relay team.

The 3200 relay team, made up of Fischer, Rachel Uchman, Nina Zamora and Karyn Erkfritz set a personal best by finishing with a time of 9:28.75, which was good enough for seventh place. Richardson said that time was 10 seconds better than the relay team's previous best race of the season.

Clarkston's 1600 relay team of Brittani Brewer, Lindsay Brandt, Fischer and Uchman didn't finish within the top eight spots, but did set another personal best finishing with a time of 4:08.00, about four seconds better than their previous best.

She'll be competing in Delaware, Ohio at the Midwest Meet of Champions June 10th, where she'll compete in either the 800 or be a member of a 4x800 relay team with other Michigan high school seniors. Only the top graduating seniors compete in the event Richardson said.

"This was one of our better distance and middle distance years," Richardson said. "We had a great core of kids and we'll miss our seniors. They did a great job for us this year."

The Wolves went 4-1-1 in dual meets this year and took second place in the tough Oakland Activities Association Division I.

"With Adams (league champions), Southfield, Rochester and Northern this is a tough league. We had a very good season," Richardson said.

The Wolves do have a fair amount of talent returning next spring. Both Brandt and Erkfritz will be seniors next spring and Carla DelVecchio will be in her junior year.

Richardson said he needs those athletes to continue to perform well and expects big things from Andrea O'Dea and hurdlers Amanda Sawyer and Kim Wilson.

"Andrea's a great competitor. She'll give you everything she's got. Amanda and Kim both finished strong for us this season," Richardson said.

"We'll need Katie Jerge and Lindsay Hawley to step up and have good years for us throwing next year," he said.

Richardson went on to say next year will be similar to this year in the sense that Clarkston will need to continue to show solid team efforts all the way around.

"We don't have six or seven star athletes like some schools do. We'll need all our kids to step up and do well. This year's freshmen class was small, but the incoming group has some good athletes. We don't know who all is going to run from that group, but we can always use good kids. It takes hard work and perseverance in track. You have to rely on yourself. Nobody can do it for you," Richardson said.

Approximately 450 students then received their diplomas from members of the Clarkston Community Schools Board of Education.

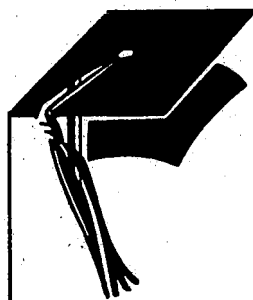
Before the start of the ceremonies, the Clarkston
