# Vote to come at September meeting Township nearing deal for golf course?

After months of negotiations and closed meetings, a tentative agreement between Independence Township and developers for ownership and operation of Clarkston Creek Golf Course on Maybee Rd. has been completed.

Trustee Neil Wallace, who negotiated the deal with Supervisor Dale Stuart, said the proposal will be presented to the public and formally to the board at their regular July 11 meeting.

Wallace said part of the recommendation will be a public vote on the proposal.

"The proposal is substantially different (than the original one presented to the board by developers last fall), but the goals stated at that time are still very much what we've aimed at for the community: Preserving open space and the concept of a regional stormwater management system," he said.

The Clarkston Creek proposal will be presented at the Independence Township Board meeting Tuesday, July 11 at 7:30 p.m. at the Township Library, 6495 Clarkston Rd.

The original proposal called for the township to buy the 144-acre golf course and the developers would manage it. The deal also involved 121 luxury townhomes, a stormwater retention plan, a land swap of township property on Sashabaw Road and 15 years of financing at no cost to taxpayers.

"We anticipate there will be a series of meetings during the next two months for residents to hear the

proposal and voice their comments. The vote will likely take place at a special meeting in September," Wallace said.

Wallace said he and Stuart met with developers Joe Locricchio and Manny Kniahynycky seven or eight times, "all of which were promptly detailed to the board in closed session at almost every board meeting."

Wallace said the public will vote on the "broad concept. People who care what's going on here will understand it and get behind it in a heartbeat."

Locricchio said he was excited about the proposal. "We've worked out a deal that works for everybody. It's an equitable solution that preserves Clarkston Creek."

Kniahynycky said the project first began close to a year ago, and after months of negotiations, "We feel we've reached a milestone. Going.on the as-PLEASE SEE CLARKSTON CREEK ON PAGE 18 A

Things are going to get worse in downtown Clarkston before they get better. But when they get better, they're going to be great.

That was the message for downtown business owners at a meeting Thursday morning at Clarkston State Bank



He said construction could disrupt access to businesses for months next spring and summer. He suggested businesses form a downtown business associa-

tion and start brainstorming on ideas to let people know they are still open as well as tackling issues like employee parking.

City Councilman Dave Savage and CSB Vice President Jack Shubitowski outlined improvements and work-related problems that will come with the installation of the water main and Michigan Department Of Transtportation (MDOT) Transportation Enhancement Act (TEA 21) grant project next year.

Shubitowski, administrator of the Clarkston Downtown Partnership (CDP), said three things will take place at the same time.

A water main will be installed, hooking up Main Street buildings to Independence Township water; Main Street will be repaved; MDOT will implement its streetscape plan.

Shubitowski said the plans will be ready for bid in December. He expected decisions on contractors by February with a work timeline figured out soon after. Shubitowski urged downtown business and propto be awfully quiet down here next year," he said.

Savage said part of the problem in determining the length of the project is that contractors don't know what they'll find when they tear up the street because the city's so old.

The city's engineers and planners are expected to present the streetscape plan and a construction overview at a meeting in August, Shubitowski said. He said when the date was finalized, business and property owners would be notified.

He added a list of streetscape construction materials would be available for property owners wishing to upgrade the area around their buildings to match the work taking place in the city's plan.

Property owners who would be interested in a business association or join a committee should call Shubitowski at CSB at 625-8585.

Frembes will close from July 5 to 10. The detour route is Walton to Sashabaw to Dixie Hwy.


Floradale will close July 10 to 15. The detour route is Walton to Frembes to Dixie Hwy.

# New programs, free classes: 'Our goal is to provide the seed of creativity.' Clarkston's Channel 65 is raring to go

Andy Reish wants you.

He's the new public access coordinator for AT&T Cable Services in Clarkston, and he has big plans for Channel 65, Clarkston's public access station.

Reish has been with Channel 65 since April, following five months of no public access service due to labor problems.

He's been bringing equipment and services up to speed and he's ready for more involvement from the community.

"Because no one was here for five months, interest in public access has dwindled," he said. Reish has already taught one production class that was wellattended, produced a telethon to spark viewer interest, and is preparing new programs as well.

Reish will offer another video production class this summer and also wants to start a kids club.

He said there's room for about 15 students in the free class. It's available to those 15 years and older. "They'll learn the ins and outs of studio production, editing, how to run a camera, how to produce their own TV show, how to get an interview, and how to get involved in what's being shown on cable," he said.

"This is their (the community's) cable channel, and they should have a say in it," Reish said. "Our main goal is to provide the seed of creativity and assist them. We like to have them be independent."

He is producing his own "edgy news topical show," which will be a viewer call-in show.

He's started a music video show called "Videoscope, the Basement Tapes." It offers music videos, interviews and concert footage from over 500 tapes he had stored in his basement which his wife told him to get rid of, he laughed.



Clarkston Downtown Partnership (CDP) committee members are also working on advancing some of the recommendations of the Downtown Action Agenda from the revitalization plan authored by national city planners Hyatt Palma, Inc. last year.

The Action Agenda identified They are hoping to add

Agenda identified parking as a key issue, and City Councilman Dave Savage and Clarkston State Bank Vice President and CDP Administrator Jack Shubitowski said the committee has

been addressing that issue recently.

They are hoping to add a total of 15 parking spaces on Depot Rd. and E. Church Street, which should be complete in "a couple of weeks," said Savage.

Shubitowski said the Action Agenda recommended Depot Road be converted to a two-way street and its improvements added to the TEA-21 project. But currently there are no funds in the city budget for a formal engineering study, and there is no time to add anything else to the project, he added.

Additional parking in the future may be made available at the Depot Rd. lot near the DPW building. There is ac-

cess to Main Street alongside the office building at 39 S. Main next to Clarkston Conservatory.

Savage said the committee has discussed installing an arch with greenery at the Main Street entrance to the walkway. He added signage there alerting drivers to the Depot St. parking is also a possibility. Installing an archway would

need the okay of 39 S. Main St. and walkway owner Neil Wallace.

The city has an easement for a right of way for pedestrian access, but it doesn't allow for improvements,

Wallace said. He added he has had "very preliminary" talks with city Mayor Sharron Catallo about the arch.

He added he's in favor of cooperation with the city on parking needs. He makes his parking lot available for Clarkston Union Bar and Kitchen employees after hours and leaves outside building lights on for their safer access to their vehicles, he said.

Savage said the committee may also look into more parking on Depot Road behind Clarkston Mills Mall.

The Action Agenda had also recommended that there be more signs showing the locations of parking rather than just signs that say "no parking."





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

# Thomas flying high Air Force Academy beckons Clarkston grad

The term "no-win situation" is often used when people sometimes have to make thankless choices in life.

However, Ryan Thomas, a graduate of the Class of 2000 at Clarkston High School, recently encountered what he describes as a no-lose situation.

Thomas, the son of Dennis and Janet Thomas of Clarkston, received appointments from both the United States Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs, Colorado and the United States Naval Academy in Annapolis, Maryland.

He has officially accepted the appointment to the Air Force Academy. He said that his goal is to become a pilot and officer in the Air Force.

"I'd like to go to flight school and become a pilot," he said.

Thomas said that while deciding what to do after high school, he had a chance to visit both academies.

"Once I saw the academies, I decided that's where I wanted to be," he said. "I loved them so much, I decided to apply to both."

Thomas said the application process to the academies is quite extensive.

First of all, a prospective candidate has to apply for pre-candidate forms, then follow that up with an interview with a United States Congressman or Senator; a candidate must obtain their recommendation in order to apply.

Afterwards, a candidate must undergo a medical check and a physical fitness check. From there, the application goes before an academy review board, at which point a decision is made on whether a candidate is accepted.

Thomas said deciding between the two academies was not easy.

"It was a really tough decision," he said. "I al-

most had to flip a coin. I think the lifestyle in the Air Force will suit me better."

Thomas will leave for the Air Force on June 28, and will undergo what he describes as a "boot camp" type of training regimen before school starts in August.

He believes the atmosphere there will vary from that at other colleges.

"I think it will be different," he said. "They keep you going 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. There's challenges every day." Thomas earned

a 3.89 grade point average while at CHS.

However, his contributions to the community extend far beyond the classroom and into many different areas, including athletics, student leadership, and his church.

He was the starting strong safety for the Wolves' 1999 regional championship varsity football team, a member of the 2000 district championship basketball team, and completed in the 400 and 800 meters in track.

Among his other accomplishments were the following: serving as this year's president of the National Honor Society, and as a member of the Blue and Gold Executive Committee; receiving the Clarkston Optimist Award and the Chenille Letter for scholastic achievement; being selected as one of 100 students statewide to attend the 1999 Michigan Freedom Academy; and recognition in Who's Who Among American High School Students.

Thomas is also a member of the Clarkston United Methodist Church, and has been involved in numerous youth leadership activities. He has also worked as a youth baseball umpire for the Parks and Recreation department and as a McGrath youth basketball coach.

He said that getting involved in a wide variety of activities has helped him lead a more balanced life.

"That's one thing that helped me do so well," Thomas said. "I think if I had focused on one thing, it would have been tough. It helped me become more balanced and enjoy it. My parents have told me to be a well-rounded person."

Several members of the Clarkston community praised Thomas' contributions in various aspects of Clarkston life.


"He's a diligent member of our church community," said Don Kevern, pastor at


Clarkston United Methodist Church. "He's a marvelous young man, very people oriented. He's very willing to give of his time to anything the church asks him."


John Diliegghio, principal at Clarkston High School, said that Thomas was "actively involved" in school life, and set a positive example for the underclassmen in the school.

# Complain, it shows you care


I have heard two complaints from readers about a column written by staff writer Ed Davis in our June 21 issue.

As I was saying, unless some-



"We go through a lot to keep the prices down," he said.



years back playing euchre in each other's dorm room until 4 a.m.


