Clintonville/ I-75 exit eliminated

Study will focus on improvement of other exits, neighboring roads to absorb traffic

Local residents who opposed a proposed I-75 exit at Clintonville Road got their wish Thursday night. They found out plans for the exit have been scrapped.

Following 30 minutes of background and history for considering the exit, much of the surprised, standing room only crowd broke into applause when Joe Corradino told them the proposed exit was eliminated. Corradino heads The Corradino Group, a consulting firm hired to study ways to improve the I-75 corridor in Oakland County.

Funding for work on I-75 will come from the Federal Highway Association. Deputy Oakland County Executive Ken Rogers said on Friday, "the decision (to eliminate the exit) was not a leadership issue. There are restrictions on Michigan Department of Transpor-



Construction to move ahead on Walters Lake

Lakefront access was a point of contention at the July 13 Independence Township Planning Commission meeting. Petitioner P.E.G. Construction requested a wetland and natural feature approval in order to move ahead with phase two of Hilltop Estates, a development being built on Walters Lake.

The proposal, which specifically dealt with preserving wetland areas around eight home sites in the development, also included a adding a fifth access site to the lake.

This suggestion brought several residents of the surrounding developments to the meeting, many of whom were concerned about the increased lake traffic an additional launch site may cause.

Tom Gregory, who is the area's lake board representative, urged the commissioners not to build a permanent dock for these eight homes.

He also noted the lake, which is roughly 78 acres in size, was the subject of a Department of Natural Resources study in 1972. The study concluded a large number of boats would be detrimental to the future of the lake.

Gregory was concerned another launch would allow more people, other than homeowners, on the lake. "We need some way of policing it," he said.

However, both commissioners and community members felt new homeowners do deserve lake access. "(Walters Lake) is unique in the sense there are a number of different subs that front the water," said resident and township trustee Jeff McGee.

He noted there are four preexisting access sites on the lake. McGee suggested using current access sites for the new homeowners was a much better alternative than defacing lakefront lots.

Bob Simion, a resident of Lowmeadow Drive, gave commissioners an alternative, to which McGee

He offered to let the construction company use his easement for an access site, so construction on both sides of the lake could be avoided.

Jim Scharl, site engineer, said an access site on Lowmeadow Drive would be an overuse of the easement. Commissioners themselves were very concerned homeowners would not be guaranteed lake access if the development was allowed to continue.

"I would not like to see another ramp and road there," said commissioner David Lohmeier. "But, I don't have anything on paper that guarantees access

to these eight homeowners."

He added, however, he would be the last person to deny another access site if it was the only means of guaranteeing homeowners lake access.

Commission chairman Steve Board also said he was unhappy with the progress the petitioners have made in the three months since the original motion was tabled. "We asked for deed restrictions, how the boat launch and docks would be used, and I don't see any of that tonight," Board said. "I'm not convinced

Residents contest Pine Knob townhouses

At least 100 residents of Pine Knob developments crowded into the senior center at Clintonwood Park for the Independence Township Planning Commission's July 13 meeting, to protest conceptual site approval for Fairways at Pine Knob, a group of luxury townhouses to be built on the west side of Royal St. George.

The commission, which ultimately approved the conceptual site plan, also had several reservations concerning the site.

The two parcels proposed have yet to be developed because they are "difficultly shaped" said Township Planner Dick Carlisle.

Carlisle said the southernmost parcel is of minimal depth and the northern property is irregularly shaped.

He mentioned, in regards to resident concern, the site is significantly less dense than it could be.

However, he added, "We could do a lot more with this; we need a little more creativity here."

The south site is proposed to have six buildings, with two homes per building. The north side will have eight buildings.

The issue was opened for public comment and several residents informed the commission phase two of this development will be built on the other side of Royal St. George, which is a small private road, not one made to handle so much traffic and construction.

Commission chairman Steve Board noted the commissioners had yet to see those plans, and in fact, had no knowledge of them.

Resident Sandra Peterman urged the commission to look at the other development plan before approving this one.

"This is only half of the hamburger bun you can't look at this side without looking at the other side because there are an incredible number of homes going in here on this little, private road," she said.

Resident Bob Knox agreed with Peterman

Springfield board approves concept plan for center

The Springfield Township Board approved the concept plan for a proposed civic center at its July 13 meeting.

However, some residents on the Shiawassee Park site, where the center is supposed to be built, made their feelings known to the board that they would like to see the center moved elsewhere.

Karen Jones, one of the residents in the area, addressed the board with concerns from Shiawassee Park area residents, and reasons why she believes the center should move to another location.

She cited concerns pertaining to increased noise from the people gathering outside the area after the meeting, as well as the sound of cars leaving the area and the parking lot lights affecting the sleep of those people in the area.

"I feel we can have the library in a different location," she said.

According to Springfield Township Supervisor Collin Walls, the public hearing was reopened from the previous meeting because a property owner adjacent to the proposed civic center property did not receive notice of the previous meeting.

Springfield Township Clerk Nancy Strole said that

relocating the civic center site to another location is not feasible at this point.

"It's not viable to do that," she said. "For a variety of reasons, I don't think it's a viable option."

Strole said that the Planning Commission will review the site plans with the concerns of the Shiawassee Park reisdents in mind, and make every effort to minimize the effects and impact that the center may have on the area's residents.

The proposed civic center is slated to be the new home of the Springfield Township Library, as well as the site of the township offices as well as the meeting center for the township board meetings.

Canterbury Cove plan approved

The old saying "the third time's the charm" may prove to be true for the Canterbury Cove development in Springfield Township.

A site plan for Canterbury Cove was approved by the Springfield Township Board at its July 13 meeting.

The board had previously approved the plan on two different occasions, but the approval period expired both times without any further construction taking place.

The proposed development is a 13-unit clustered site condominium, taking up a total of 25.6 acres. The site is located south of Rattalee Lake Road, west of Ellis Road, and the northeast side of Waumegah Lake.

Residents enter the site through a proposed paved road with the entrance/exit located on Rattalee Lake Road. The east edge of the site abuts Independence Township.

The initial application for the project was received in October 1995. The Springfield Township Planning

Commission reviewed the concept in December 1995, and the township board did so in January 1996.

In April 1996, the Special Land Use was tabled by both the Planning Commission and Township Board with a request that the plan be revised. Planning Commission approval of the revised plan was received in July 1996 and Township Board approval granted in September 1996.

However, no construction began on the site, and approval for the project expired. In 1998, the applicant reapplied; the Planning Commission recommended approval in May 1998. The Township Board reapproved the plans and special land use in July 1998. That approval expired in July 1999.

The plans approved by the board at the July 13 meeting were essentially the same as the previous

"The plan itself has not changed," said Spring-field Township Clerk Nancy Strole.

Strole said the next step in the process is for the firm to submit their final construction plans for approval by the township.

It's too early for political signs

Political candidates who have already put up their signs in Independence Township for the August 8 Primary Election are in violation of a local ordinance.

David Poole, zoning ordinance officer for the township, said that political signs are permitted 14 days prior to an election. He wants candidates to remove their signs and to put them back up July 25.

Political signs can only be erected on private property, outside of the public right-of-way. They may be no less than 100 feet from any entrance to a building in which a polling place is located.

The signs may not exceed 16 square feet in area and four feet in height in all single family residential districts. In other districts they must conform to the requirements for ground signs in each district.

And for candidates planning to go away on vacation when the election is over, don't forget—they must be removed five days following election day—August 13.



Cooperate to improve Clintonville Rd.

Now that the dust is settling following last Thursday's noisy meeting about the Clintonville Road/I-75 exit, it's time to think about how residents and officials can cooperate to improve conditions on Clintonville Rd.

It's guaranteed that conditions will worsen. With the recent developments of Oakhurst, Gemini Landing and Fox Creek apartments, plus another development starting planned for Clintonville Rd., conditions warranting a 45MPH speed limit have changed.

There has been and will continue to be an increase in students attending nearby elementary and middle schools.

The Road Commission for Oakland County and Michigan State Police, responsible for enacting a change, should consider reducing the speed limit to 35MPH.

When the school was first proposed, recommendations were made to the schools by the Independence Township engineer and planner regarding stormwater detention and site grading to avoid these problems. The recommendations were not followed, according to township officials.

When the flooding began, the schools did implement some drainage solutions, and were supposed to monitor the wetlands and storm water retention. Too often the monitoring does not take place until Independence Township officials are notified and bring it to the schools attention, also according to township officials.

While the schools say they are restricted by the state on how they spend their money, funding for proper site preparation is part of a construction bond fund.

If the schools are not going to construct a site to the township's requirements, they can't pass back to the township the responsibility for fixing ensuing problems.

When the township and schools come together to look for a solution soon, we hope school board members will keep their responsibility in mind.

The township has bailed them out before and probably will again, but it shouldn't have to.

Rude residents badgered officials

"My kids were asking, 'Why is everybody yelling, mommy?' And I was thinking later, that we might have been in trouble if anyone at that meeting had had a gun."

That was the comment of one audience member following last Thursday's meeting about the now defunct proposal for an interchange at I-75 and Clintonville Road. I had similar thoughts.

Close to 200 people were packed into the meeting room at Independence Township Fire Station #1 on Citation Drive. Many were angry about the possibility of the I-75 exit, and it showed in the way they interrupted speakers and delivered their questions or comments with biting

Independence Township Supervisor Dale Stuart a remarkable job of keeping calm (and keeping the situation calm) in the face of so much rude behavior.

There have been several public meetings over the last couple years that have involved passionate causes for residents. But most people are well-behaved and respectful of the officials.

I must admit the format of the meeting was curious. In the beginning, the officials from Independence Township, MDOT, Oakland County, Traffic Improvement Agency, and the Road Commission for Oakland County each explained their agency's reasons for considering construction of the exit.

Audience members learned after the speeches -at least 30 minutes later -- that plans for the exit had been scrapped. There were a few seconds of silence, as if people weren't sure what they heard, before many broke into applause.

The decision not to construct the exit had been made prior to the meeting, according to officials, based on opposition voiced at earlier meetings. Oakland County Deputy Executive and Springfield Township resident Ken Rogers said when there's much opposition at all to a project like this by residents, the federal government won't support it. And since the money for I-75 projects comes from the feds (via you and me), they have the last word.

However, some audience members said they think the decision was made at the meeting after officials saw how upset residents were. That is a dangerous assumption, because it encourages bad behavior (think of your toddler).

When questioned about how to get speed limits reduced, RCOC Managing Director Brent Bair said that is the responsibility of the Michigan State Police. What he didn't say is that citizen requests must first be processed through their local government (Independence Township) and forwarded to RCOC before they are passed on to the MSP. I had visions of throng of people trying to contact MSP dispatchers Friday morning trying to find out which trooper makes the decision.

The meeting was the perfect opportunity for officials to inform the public of the correct procedure. By doing so they could have given residents some sense of control over the problem. A feeling of not having any say is often what makes people angry with government officials. So much more can be accomplished with thoughtfulness and cooperation.

There is now a large sign in a Clintonville Road resident's yard thanking everyone for their support, including Dale Stuart. That's all well and good, but the sign should also offer an apology for rudely badgering Stuart and the officials who made an effort to get together for the residents' benefit.

Michigan's high gas prices

Though the Legislature is in recess for the summer, the House Transportation Committee recently met to hear testimony from state and industry officials on Michigan's high gas prices.

From May 22 to June 19, national gasoline prices increased 16 cents to \$1.68, while prices in Michigan increased 53 cents to \$2.08 (Detroit saw 62-cent increases, to \$2.15 a gallon). The gap between gasoline prices in Michigan and other parts of the U.S. measured 40 cents per gallon for the third week of June. Other midwestern states have experienced prices similar to Michigan's according to a House Fiscal Agency report.

Formal investigations by the Federal Trade Commission are underway to determine why gasoline prices in the midwest are significantly higher than the rest of the U.S.

The Indiana governor has recently suspended the state sales tax on gas. That authority is not granted to our governor, and requires an act of the Legislature. As a member of the committee, I participated in the hearings to explore our best options for relief at the pump.

Governor to sign telecommunications bill

After several months of negotiations, the Legislature approved the telecommunications bill in June. The legislation, designed to give every person in Michigan more options for affordable local telephone service, is expected to be signed into law in the next few weeks.

I am particularly satisfied with an amendment to the bill requiring calls made to adjacent calling ar-

eas to be charged as local calls. For instance, residents in the 625, 627, 634, 698, and 887 prefixes will be able to call one another without receiving a long

distance charge on their telephone

Other provisions of the legislation include giving users more input on the creation of new area codes and prohibiting companies from discriminating between customers.

The measure also increases consumer protections by increasing the penalties for cramming and slamming, as well as applying the Michigan Consumers Protection Act to all providers of telephone services

Privacy Bill signed into

law

Legislation protecting the privacy of Michigan boat and recreational vehicle owners was recently signed into law.

Under Public Act 194 of 2000, the Secretary of State is prohibited from selling personal information contained in watercraft titles and registrations. The state sold the information to businesses for marketing, surveys and solicitations.

While on the topic of boats, I want to remind everyone that recreational boating is fun and enjoyable, but sometimes our waterways can be come a place of chaos and confusion.







we've researched it properly." Board added he felt three months was more than enough time for the developers to talk to residents of the subdivisions around the lake to try and figure out an acceptable alternative to building another access site.

Sharl told commissioners if the approval was granted, the developer would not pursue construction of an access site until the title work is finished and he feels there are no other available alternatives. "All we want is access to the lake and it appears to us the facilities are not producing," Sharl said.

Commissioner Joe Figa motioned to grant the approval, but not construction of an access site until something is resolved or decided amongst the residents. This motion failed, with no support.

Lohmeier then motioned to once again table the proposal for thirty days, on the grounds it would give the petitioners and homeowners a chance to come to an agreement for off-site boat access. This motion, again, failed. At this time, Figa remade his motion, which carried, with Lohmeier the only dissenting vote.

and suggested the developer find another means of entry to the property than Royal St. George. He mentioned the amount of excess noise, traffic and dirt that construction equipment would create.

Resident Don Posniak agreed increased traffic would create a larger noise pollution problem in the area and also mentioned the importance of conserving natural features in that specific area. "There are rare trees, specifically on the south end," he said.

He said the southern parcel is home to the native Michigan pecan tree as well as 150-year-old oaks. Posniak also said the bittersweet vine grows in the area and it is a protected species, and to remove it would be illegal. "We need to try to conserve the integrity of the area," he added.

The most pressing concern, however, seemed to be the possibility of the area's property values decreasing with the development of these parcels.

Currently, the homes in the developments range from an estimated \$500-800,000. The townhouses would sell for only \$350,000, which angered residents.

Several said they would not have bought homes in the development had they known the townhouses would be added. "We bought our home with certain concepts in our minds. This is going to cheapen our whole area," Peterman said.

Patrick Martin, who is a resident as well as a real-estate broker, summarized resident sentiment. "We're concerned about price and market value," he said. "Our big concern is we don't want to say 'Pine Knob was an exclusive address — until this'.'

He added if residents saw property values going up as a result of the development, the petitioners would see much less opposition.

Planning commissioners were wary of the initial concept themselves. "My first reaction was this is not consistent with the rest of the Pine Knob development," Board said. "I think you have a little homework to do," he told developers.

Commissioner Dan Travis agreed and mentioned the homogeneity of the homes on the site. "The similar architecture is unappealing to me," he said.

In the end, the conceptual site plan was still approved, subject to comments from the commission-

He said work on the exit would not have begun for about 10 years.

At the meeting, Corradino said without the exit more burden will be placed on local roads and the task now will be to study other options—possibly paving Waldon to the east, paving Maybee Road, and upgrading the I-75 exits at Sashabaw and M-15.

But that did not bring residents any relief. For over an hour officials listened to impassioned complaints about traffic concerns on Clintonville and Maybee roads: speeding; residents who can't get out of their driveways during rush hour; drivers passing on the shoulder; the safety of students walking to North Sashabaw Elementary School who live too close to qualify for busing.

Clintonville Road resident Kathy Anstandig, who spearheaded the citizen opposition, said in spite of the possible added stress on local roads, she's still glad the exit has been eliminated.

"This is more than I had hoped for," she said Friday. "If Waldon and Maybee roads are improved, those people will be introduced to what we have been through. It will help Clintonville."

Independence Township Supervisor Dale Stuart and steering committee members decided to hold the meeting even though the exit was cancelled so residents could be heard.

The residents were accusatory toward officials at the meeting, particularly Stuart, and Anstandig made a point of praising his efforts to organize the meeting. "He's not the enemy here. He obviously did listen to us."

She added Independence Township

needs to seek help from Orion and Auburn Hills officials because their residents travel Clintonville and would benefit most from the exit.

"We follow these people," Anstandig said. "They're going to Lake Orion. If nothing is done over there we're going to be taking on their traffic. That's really scary."

Maybee Road resident Laura LeClair, whose children walk to North Sashabaw Elementary School, is concerned about traffic and the safety of children. With two elementary schools (North Sashabaw, and Jayno Adams on Clintonville Road in Waterford), Le Clair said there is a lot of pedestrian traffic. Students in Clarkston schools who live within one and one-half miles of a school don't qualify for busing.

LeClair said the interchange would not have alleviated that much traffic, and believes Clintonville would have been widened to five lanes.

She also said the interchange idea will resurface if no other solutions can be found. "We are so far behind (in terms of traffic congestion) that it's too late for a quick fix. If the interchange comes back, if no good alternates are found, I would have to trust (the officals' judgement)."

Most township officials have been in favor of the exit, as were steering group members, who warned that conditions may worsen without it.

Brent Bair agreed. "Do we need it? Yes. And it wouldn't function the same as (the exit at) Sashabaw. Would it help? Yes. Am I sympathetic to Clintonville Road residents? Yes. My

wife and I travel that road every day. (Bair and his wife live off Maybee Road.) The Road Commission position all along has been that the spacing between Sashabaw and Baldwin was too far and an exit at Clintonville would help."

Rogers, a former Independence Township resident for 27 years who now lives in Springfield Township, said the steering committee will be forced to find other solutions and said the decisions were "a tough call. Planning these roads and meeting the needs is not easy. There are no simple solutions. Somebody's going to be unhappy sometime, somewhere."

How do you reduce the speed limit on your street?

Residents at the I-75 Clintonville Road interchange meeting July 20 complained about the 45MPH speed limit on Clintonvilled Road. In Waterford, just south of the township line, the speed limit drops down to 35MPH.

Many residents voiced concern about students who walk to North Sashabaw Elementary or Sashabaw Middle School. Clarkston schools do not bus students who live within one and one-half miles from the school they attend.

On Monday, Independence Township Supervisor Dale Stuart said the correct procedure to attempt to lower a speed limit is to send letters or petitions to the township.

Those are forwarded to the Road Commission for Oakland County, which works in conjunction with the Michigan State Police to decide if a change is appropriate.

Craig Bryson, public information officer for RCOC, said traffic engineers have a "rule of thumb" for determining speed limits: a speed limit should reflect the speed driven by 85


percent of drivers on a particular road.

This means that drivers who are comfortable driving 45MPH will do so in spite of a posted speed limit of 35MPH, creating a situation that is hard to enforce. "So, a posted speed limit should reflect what 85 percent of the people will drive. That is the argument," said Bryson.

Bryson said support from the schools or township "wouldn't hurt." On Monday, Clarkston schools Superintendent Dr. Al Roberts said if residents were interested, the schools would look at supporting them in their effort as long as it did not create a problem in some other way.

Township resident Dave Wagner, who heads the safety path committee, said construction of a safety path on Clintonville Road is on the priority list. Stuart confirmed Monday that since two other safety path projects have been cancelled, constructing one on Clintontonville could take a higher priority.

As far as lowering speed limits, Stuart said it has been his experience that it is very difficult to do.





### Making waves

# Local water ski team takes first in regional competition

For over a decade Oakland County's only water ski show team has come up just short. But finally, after 14 years of hard work and endless hours of practice, The Spray Masters Water Ski Club and Show Team of Big Lake in Davisburg has taken top honors. It won the National Show Ski Associations 2000 Midwest Central Regional Competition held July 8 and 9 in Rockford, Ill.

Under the direction of show director Shawn McLouth, the group has finally reached the championship level.


The group's performance, known as 'The Olympic Highlights' features 24 skiers, most of which are from the Clarkston area. The team is made up of boys, and girls, men and women ranging in age from 5 to 36 years of age.

The performance given by the group is a little less than an hour in length. Highlights of the show feature a pyramid formed by 15 skiers, jump acts with three to five skiers jumping off a ramp simultaneously, a ballet line of 10 to 12 female skiers and six skiers in a pre-built pyramid


The shows are all choreographed to pop music which is pumped out of a PA system. In addition to the audio crew which sets up the speakers and electronic equipment, the skiers are supported by a number of other team members. Boat drivers, two announcers, who describe the performance from shore, dock personnel, costume makers and the safety crew all work together to make sure the show is a success. About 35 people make up the total team.

Board member of the Spray Masters Water Ski Club and Show Team, and past president, Skip Wendt said of the first place finish, "Winning that competition is a culmination of 14 years of hard work. We usually placed second or third in scoring. But to pull this off meant a lot. Especially to some of the people who have been on the team for so long."

"It's a complete theatrical performance on the water with narration and

music," Wendt said.

McLouth said the team has formal practices for over three hours a day three days a week, but preparation for the routine goes far beyond that.

"We ski from March until November. I can remember times when we had to pour buckets of hot water on the skiers to warm them up after practices. Some of our skiers also take part in private lessons in Orlando. We've also had skiers in our club ski at Sea World and at Cypress Gardens," McLouth said.

The team will host shows at Big Lake on July 20 and 27 at 7 p.m. Both shows are free to the public and spectators are asked to park at 5919 Morning Drive.

The group will also be in action July 29 and 30 at the State Show Tournament at Stoney Creek, which is sponsored by the Michigan Water Ski Association. There, the group will compete against seven other teams from throughout the Midwest.

The group will also offer a learn to ski clinic Aug. 8 at Big Lake sponsored by Springfield Township Parks and Recreation. The clinic costs \$25.

"It's really a great opportunity to learn how to water ski. The clinic gives people the opportunity to learn from some of the best skiers around," Wendt said.

Crowds vary depending on the show, but Wendt said over 2,000 spectators came out to see their July 4 show in Beaverton, MI. Over 3,000 people were in attendance for their performance in Rockford. He said usually around 100 to 150 come out to see the shows at Big Lake.

Wendt encouraged people not only to check out upcoming shows, but to think about joining the group itself.

"It's not that hard to learn to water ski. We'll teach you. Come

Head coach Jeanne Pierce said the team is a close knit unit and has shown improvement throughout the season.





While driving home the other day I tuned into a local sports radio talk show that was discussing that very topic. How will the Pistons get people inside the Palace to see a team without Grant Hill?



### Summer league gives Mitchell exposure, new experiences

It's no secret Chris Mitchell had a stellar senior baseball season for Clarkston this past spring. But to better prepare him for his next baseball step, playing outfield at South Georgia, he's been playing for the Michigan Lake Area Rams.

The Rams are a team made up of college base-ball players which are part of the Livonia College Base-ball League. The league is made up of two divisions, the CanAm Division, which has six teams, four from Canada and two from the United States. The other division is the Livonia Adray Collegiate League, which has five teams in it. All players on the Rams are under 21 years old.

Head coach of the Rams, Rick Berryman, who accompanied Mitchell to his High School All-Star game at Comerica Park earlier this summer described the

"All the players are recruited by the coaches themselves. Our team has players from colleges all over the Midwest. Most of the players are from Michigan, but we've got some from other states," he said.

Berryman said the league is a way for college players to stay focused and continue to play baseball when their school seasons are over. It also helps the players gain exposure to professional scouts.

"The teams are mainly made up of freshman and sophomore ball players. The hope is that the teams will make it to the Great Lakes League, which is sponsored by the NCAA," Berryman said.

The top team in the LCBA will continue playing in the Triple ABA, the All-American Amateur Baseball Association. The second place team goes to the

NABF, or National Amateur Baseball Federation. Each team is awarded two points per win. Currently the Rams are in third place with 20 points. However, Berryman said due to the competitiveness within the league, the Rams could easily find their way to first place before the season ends.

"It's been a close season all summer long. One loss by a team changes the standings dramatically,"

Berryman said.

Mitchell has had a solid season for the Rams so far. He is batting .355 and has 10 RBI as the team's leadoff hitter. He's hit four doubles and has five stolen bases. His outstanding season comes as no surprise to Berryman.

One of the changes between high school ball and the summer league is the type of bat used. In high school baseball aluminum bats are used. However, only wood bats are used in the summer league Mitchell is participating in.

"Chris has a lot of ability and is adjusting very well to the wooden bat. I knew he would hold his own in this league. He does an excellent job for us making contact with the ball and starting in center field," Berryman said.

The season started at the end of May and will end at the end of July. The Rams usually play between five and six games per week including double headers which can be played on Sundays, Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. Games are played at three different fields including Ford Field in Livonia, Frasier High School and Mic-Mac Field in Windsor.


"It's a competitive growing league and an excellent place to see quality college baseball in the summer," Berryman said.





