# Stuart, McCrary, Rosso and Travis will stay

Kelly and Wagner will fill seats vacated by McGee and Wallace; Independence fire millage renewal and EMS service pass with flying colors

Independence Incumbents Township Supervisor Dale Stuart and Clerk Joan McCrary were returned to office for another four years Tuesday in a local election made up of only Republican candidates.

Stuart received 2087 votes to challenger and former supervisor Gary Stonerock's 1008 votes - almost a twoto-one margin.

McCrary beat challenger George White by about 600 votes - 1931 to 1331, in a race that heated up toward the end, due to a charge of a campaign violation against McCrary by White supporter Penny Shanks.

Newcomer Dan Kelly tallied the largest number of votes in the race for Independence Township trustee, with 1899. Longtime trustee Dan Travis followed with 1697. Larry Rosso, who just finished his first term, had 1668 votes. Dave Wagner, who was unsuccessful in his bid for trustee four years ago, won this time around with 1577 votes.

Mel Vaara had 1486 votes and Robert Aranosian had 1463 votes.

"I'm very happy with the results and humbled by the margin of victory," said Dale Stuart. "I'm happy with the rest of the election results. The fire millages passed decisively and that's important for the community. I give my best wishes to those who ran and didn't win, and congratulations to those who won. I look forward to working with them."

McCrary was moved that she beat White, acknowledging that four years ago she had won by a landslide. "I'm just so happy that the people have selected me again. I will go on doing what



I think is best for the community."



# Walls retained as supervisor; Hopper will join trustees

Springfield Township voters returned longtime Supervisor Collin Walls to service Tuesday night. He beat challenger Jeff Decker 665 to 463.

In the race for trustee, newcomer Dave Hopper received the most votes with 793. Incumbent Elaine Field-Smith followed with 734. Incumbent Dennis Vallad received 650 votes, and Margaret Bloom received 634. Incumbent Richard Miller, with the least number of votes at 608, was not reelected.

Hopper said he had one comment, "Hard work does pay off. I went door to door to 898 homes and I really felt that made a difference." He estimated he reached 1603 voters that way.

"I staked myself out at Prec behind township hall for 13 hours and gave out my literature, but most people already had it."

(Campaigning) was a lot of work - five weeks of not seeing family very much. But it was nice to get my message out. People were very receptive. They opened their doors and came out when I

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

"The way we got started was through the handicapped riding program," she said. "We use vaulting as a remedial form of therapy. We



# Clarkston Creek hearing set for next week

Two informational hearings on a proposal for the sale of Clarkston Creek Golf Course, whereby Independence Township will retain storm water management and development rights, have been set for August 17 and September 6.

The proposal will be put to a public vote on September 12, and township officials want the public to attend the meetings to learn more about the proposal.

Trustee Neil Wallace, who negotiated the deal with Supervisor Dale Stuart and developers Joe Locricchio, Manny Kniahynychy and Jim Albright, said "We are prepard to explain every aspect of this proposal."

A condominium neighborhood with about 165 units is slated for adjacent property plus 20 acres of the golf course. A 7.2-acre commercial center, and an apscale restaurant on another 1.8-acre parcel are also planned.

The developers are required to make significant improvements to the golf course and clubhouse, according to the deal.

Wallace offered his reasons for the importance of the proposal to township residents in a prepared statement this week.

"The core of this proposal for open space preservation and some regional storm water managment system facilities is simple," Wallace said.

"More than 120 acres of the golf course cannot ever be developed except as a golf course. It can't be developed as a residential subdivision or a shopping center or an apartment complex or any other use.

"In addition, the township will have the right to use portions of the golf course and certain adjacent properties to collect and hold storm water from the Sashabaw Road area.

"Although the township would pay for these property rights (\$1 million and the transfer of some

land), as Sashabaw Road develops we anticipate this money will be more than recuped by the sale of the rights to tap into this sytem.

"The details for the agreement are designed to address possible problems that are not likely to actually occur. Principally, they deal with the possibility that golf will completely fail as a viable business. Because of the significant required improvements to the course and clubhouse, golf can and will be a viable business at that location.

"We are not establishing a precedent. No other property in the community offers such significant open space preservation in a densely developed area and the benefit of a regional storm water management system." Wallace also said a representative from the developers will be there to answer questions about the project, including the condo and commercial development, and improvements to the clubhouse and golf course.

The first meeting is August 17 at 7 p.m. at the Clarkston Creek clubhouse, 6060 Maybee Road. The second meeting will be September 6 at the Independence Township Library.

The developers have agreed to pay \$5,000 toward the cost of the special election. Earlier, Independence Township Clerk Joan McCrary said she felt the public referendum was "necessary to gauge the commitment of our residents to preserving open space."

# Independence gets revised Holiday Inn plan

A revised plan for a Holiday Inn Express at M-15 and I-75 has been submitted to the Independence Township Building Department. But another revision may still be in the works before the controversial issue returns to the Planning Commission.

Eagle Investments is currently requesting special land use and conceptual site plan approval for a 70-room hotel — downsizing from the previous submittal of 81 rooms.

Building Department Director Bev McElmeel said it's her understanding that another revision may be coming. She added the applicant will also be discussing the plan with the planning department

prior to its placement on the agenda. No date has been set for the issue to return to the Planning Commission, she said.

A proposal for a Holiday Inn was first submitted to the township last year, to substantial opposition from homeowners in the area.

The six-acre vacant property is located on the east side of M-15 north of the interchange, overlooking Little Walters Lake and wetlands.

The property was rezoned from C-3, Highway Commercial to OS-2, Office Service-2. Motels and residence hotels are permitted as a special land use in the OS-2 zoning district.



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# Some changes are in store for middle schoolers

The upcoming school year in the Clarkston Community Schools district will feature some new concepts at the middle school level.

However, for Sashabaw Middle School students, the 2000-01 school year will mean a return to their roots; namely, a return to their old building.

Last year, students at that school attended the old Clarkston Middle School while renovations at Sashabaw were taking place. A bond issue for renovations to both middle schools, along with a new K-5 elementary school, was passed in 1997.

According to David Reschke, assistant superintendent for K-8 operations, the building was upgraded and classrooms were added in order to make the school more modern and up to date.

Now that the renovations are complete, Reschke said he hopes to upgrade the quality of technology in the middle schools.

We're just excited to get the kids back to the original building," he said. "We're moving forward with our plans for technology. We'll have better access to technology in the classrooms."

Although there will be several new concepts implemented at the middle school this year, there will be some familiar faces to help implement those

According to Reschke, a plus at the middle school level is that the administrative teams at the schools are in place for the second consecutive year.

"They know the district now," he said. "They know our kids and parents better. We're real happy we have our teams together from the get-go."

One of the key concepts at the middle school level this year will be interdisciplinary teaching and learning, which involves students understanding the

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"At that age, the kids remember better on the issues when they see the connections," Reschke said.

As an example of this concept, Reschke brought up the subject of water contamination. He said that with the implementation of interdisciplinary teaching,

students will be able to learn about that subject from both a science perspective and a social studies perspective.

Another concept that will be implemented at the middle schools this year is advisor/advisee groups. An agreement was reached in 1998 between the Clarkston Board of Education and the Clarkston Education Association to implement this program for the 2000-01 school

Reschke explained that

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at the middle school level, students need guidance as they move toward their adolescent years. Under the advisor/advisee program, teachers help students understand their everyday experiences, and help them develop problem-solving skills.

The teachers take the time to ask the kids how their lives are going," Reschke said.

Teacher team planning was another program agreed upon in 1998 between the school board and the CEA for the upcoming school year. Reschke said that teachers need to work in partnership with one another in order to create an effective learning envi-

With that in mind, the teaching teams work together to help plan each day's lesson plans; more time may be spent on one subject than another, depending upon that day's plan.

For instance, a particular day may call for a science experiment that takes longer than usual. With that in mind, the teachers budget an appropriate amount of time for that experiment, and spend a lesser amount of time on another subject, such as math.

"It allows them to have more hands-on teaching," Reschke said.

Before becoming assistant superintendent, Reschke was principal at Sashabaw Junior High (now known as Sashabaw Middle School). While Reschke was principal, the school earned a national exemplary school award in 1989 from the United States Department of Education.

Sashabaw was only one of three other junior high schools to earn such an honor that year.

According to Reschke, the criteria involved in schools receiving the award are a high amount of instructional time spent on learning, a high percentage of parent involvement in the schools, a high percentage of students achieving above expectations, and a clear sense of mission and vision.

"It was a year-long process," Reschke recalled. At that time, students in the ninth grade attended the middle school. Beginning with the 1993-94 school year, those students moved on to Clarkston High School.

In 1994-95, the middle school philosophy for the district was adopted, and action plans for advisory programs, interdisciplinary team teaching, and team planning were established.

During a meeting of the Clarkston school board this summer, the issue of grade realignment was brought to the forefront. Under a proposal discussed at the meeting, ninth grade students would return to the middle school level.

However, Reschke noted that with regard to

# Clerk Nancy Strole's vision of Springfield Township

Editor's note: The question and answer portion from Springfield Township Clerk Nancy Strole's information in last week's Voter's Guide was accidently omitted. Her information is printed in its entirety below.

The future of Springfield will be determined by the Township's Master Plan (now being revised), which will reflect the input of a diverse array of residents and interests. However, my personal vision or wish for Springfield is as follows:

In 2020 Springfield will still be a low-density residential community. The Dixie Highway corridor will be an attractive safe-to-drive commercial gateway to Springfield. The historic hamlet of Davisburg will be the focal oint of a village center area. The Township will be keeping for its scenic beauty, outstanding parks, open space corridors and pristine resources; and township residents and businesses will be protected by firstrate fire and police services.

1. Springfield Township's current population is about 14,000. What should the maxiumum be? How would you control it?

A population of about 20,000 at build out in 2020 is feasible. Keeping within this limit will require building on current Master Plan goals and policies (now being revised) that base land use planning on the capability of the land to support development, recognizing developmental limitations due to severe topographic conditions and limited infrastructure, and commiting to protecting exceptional and rare natural ecosystems that exist in Springfield.

2. If you feel open space and Springfield Township's rural character should be preserved, how would you accomplish that goal?

Preservation of open space is very important and can be maximized by implementing the findings of the recently completed Shiawasee and Huron Headwaters Resource Preservation Project, a sixcommunity effort initiated by Springfield Township. The project provides a roadmap for preserving open space corridors and pristine natural resources and contains a cookbook of innovative planning tools and techniques (such as natural resource overlay districts) by which Springfield can partner with others to achieve

3. Are police and fire services adequate? If not, how should they be expanded?

Fire: Department personnel consistently receive

very high ratings from those who need their services. To keep pace with growth, we need to expand Fire Station #2, plan for water supply sources, continue our equipment acquisition/replacement program, plan for

a third station by 2020, and anticipate new staffing needs that may be required due to changing demographics. Police: We need to initiate short and long-term assessment of police (Oakland County Sheriff's Dept.) staffing needs to assure sufficient response times and continued low crime rates.

4. H o w should the Dixie Highway corridor be developed?

**Nancy Strole** Springfield Twp. Clerk

Dixie Highway will be the main commercial corridor and most visible gateway to Springfield. Current traffic hazards will soon be addressed by construction of a center turn lane between I-75 and Davisburg. The corridor should also be designed for limited curb cuts. The revised Master Plan should call for unified architectural design for corridor and limit strip-mall development. We need to more aggressively address junk and blight violations where they exist and explore brownfield redevelopment opportunities. We need immediate completion and release to the Board of the Dixie Highway Corridor Study, now overdue.

5. What should the mix of commercial, residential and industrial zoning be, and where? Would you like to see the retail/commercial district in downtown Davisburg increased?

Severe restrictions caused by typography, soils and high water tables limit expansion of the historic Davisburg retail district. The historic buildings are very important to Springfield's identity, however, and should become the centerpiece of a larger village-type plan that ties together by bike/pedestrian paths the historic

center with the nearby Mill Pond Park and community center, Shiawassee Basin Preserve, new Township Civic Center, elementary school, Fountain Square, Karl Shultz Park and surrounding historic homes. We also need to address the issue of deteriorating buildings that may be dangerous and negatively impact the future viability of "downtown Davisburg."

6. Should Springfield Township's parks and recreation department be expanded? If so, how? Does Springfield Township need more parks? If so, where?

The parks department is overseen by an independently-elected Parks Commission. The Commission now manages a diverse system ranging from a neighborhood pocket park to the 470-acre Shiawassee Basin Preserve. The current Parks master plan, which focuses on improvements to existing parks, key additional acquisitions where warranted. and encouragement of open space planning should serve the Township well in the future.


7. How do you think Ingomar Farms at Dixie and Davisburg Road should be developed?

I voted against rezoning the front of Ingomar Farms to straight C-2 (general business) so I'm the wrong one to ask! A conceptual plan for residential development for the rear of the property, which proposes to move the centennial farmhouse to the site, has been approved. The future of the large historic barn is highly uncertain, however. Commercial development should attempt to incorporate the barn in any proposed plans, which should focus on development of a village-type retail center with interior layout.


8. Should public school construction be subject to township site plan review?

State law exempts school construction from local site plan or building department review. However, establishment of some type of mutually-acceptable voluntary local review process might benefit all interests: by helping to catch potentially costly site design, safety or traffic problems before they arise, and by providing a positive opportunity for school systems and the township to pull together for the general benefit of the community.

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

## NURSING HOME NEGLECT

Friends and relatives of nursing home patients may understandably be wary of abuses by which nursing home patients are kept "under control". This is a euphemistic reference to the physical and chemical restraints used to keep institutionalized patients subdued and passive. Nursing home patients may also be transferred or discharged against their will. There may be cases of neglect in which the patient does not receive adequate care. If neglect, abuse, or serious injury has occurred, the patient may have a private the circumstances, a lawsuit found abusive. "may be brought on the basis of

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
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
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






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# Pine Knob opens hill-top concession and seating area

When completed, the deck will offer a full

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

Assoc. said, "The general area is zoned for office service use. While we have previously indicated a hotel may be appropriate for an interchange, measures need to be incorporated to ensure compatibility with surrounding uses, specifically the transition of the site to the residential uses to the rear, and the impact of the project on the wetlands and Little Walters Lake."

Carlisle expressed concerns about the plan, including setback requirements; landscaping; traffic; stormwater management; wetlands protection; water quality of Little Walters Lake.

Eagle Investments' first plans to build a hotel were nixed by comissioners. The Shelby M. Baylis Profit-Sharing Trust, Robert A. Barron and Ann Rita Barron, are the property titleholders.

Nearby residents voiced opposition to having the hotel in their back yards. They also cited increased traffic problems, and the possibility of more crime like drugs and prostitution.

Several plaintiffs, including Eagle Investments and the titleholders, sued the township after the property was rezoned from commercial to office, but the township's position was upheld in Oakland County Circuit Court.

The plaintiffs were told they could submit a new or revised site plan.

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


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

He said the department would begin working to get EMS and paramedic service up and running, with a target date of being fully operational by this time next





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

"I had fun. That car I race only





(Above and below) Depot Park was home to dozens of historic European sports cars Aug. 4


about once a year. I actively drive it on the road. I just go out for fun and show people old cars," Fowler said.

# Team Reptile seeks to learn more about wildlife and educate the area

When Independence Township Parks and Recreation aquatics instructor Rich Ashley came up with his idea people, thought he was crazy.

But his love of catching and learning about area wildlife has caught on like a wildfire. So much so that out of his staff of about 45 lifeguards and swim instructors, over half have given up their summer nights in hopes of finding a particular animal.

Ashley's club, known as "Team Reptile" began as a group of less than 10 lifeguards, but last year grew to a group of about 25. Members are 16-32 years old. All are lifeguards or camp directors. The groups activities and actions are sanctioned by the DNR.

The group will unleash its findings when this year's Independence Township Parks and Recreation swim lesson participants are invited to Parent's Night Party. The event will take place at Deer Lake Beach Aug. 18 from 4-8:30 p.m. will also feature a cookout, water and beach games, sand castle building contest and more. The event is free and all parking will be at Depot Park with shuttle busses providing transportation to the beach.

The group goes out between one and four times per week to area lakes

and parks in hopes of finding certain species of animals, primarily amphibians and reptiles.

"We go out to Deer Lake, Greens Lake and other lakes throughout the county. We call ourselves Team Reptile, but we catch frogs, snakes, fish and amphibians," Ashley said.

The groups usually head out around 10 p.m. and have stayed out on lakes

until well after midnight. Once the animals are found, they are brought into the boat and transported back to Ashley's house where he has a concrete pond. So far this summer Team Reptile has caught about a dozen animals.

"We've only caught about 12 animals so far, but we've been trying to catch hard to catch, rare species. We've caught soft shelled turtles and big snap-

ping turtles," he said.

The animals will stay at Ashley's until Aug. 18 at the Parent's Night Party. Ashley said all the animals are released back into the wild at exactly the same point which at they were caught.

Ashley said he has been careful to keep the amount of animals held at his house to a minimum.

"We don't want to keep too many. We keep them well fed and they're better off in captivity because they can't get hit by boat motors and things like that. It's not fair to keep them in captivity for that long, even if it is a large pen," Ashley said

Ashley said Team Reptile educates its members about reptiles and also educates the community as a whole.


Team Reptile has a local cable access show which airs on channels 2 or 65 on Tuesdays at 6 p.m.

"We feel that what we're doing helps better educate the public about the animals that they're living with and swimming with. We're affecting them and they're affecting us," he said.

Ashely said that through his reptile hunts as the leader of Team Reptile he and his team members have learned that just by observing the life of amphibians and reptiles in local areas one can learn

The Spray Masters, part of Michigan State Show Tournament, recently took first place in its state competition.


This year the Spray Masters took first in both the regional and state titles.

about the local wildlife.

"You can tell a lot about the environment when you see the amphibians die. It's basically telling you that the place you're at is dying. It doesn't mean it's an unsafe place to swim, but something around there is killing off the wildlife," he said.

He added that two main sources of death for wildlife around Clarkston are fertilizers and pesticides, but that Team Reptile has taken small steps to help certain species of animals. "The numbers are coming back which is good to see. One species we've helped is leopard frogs. We haven't seen those in this area since I was a kid and now we've tried to reintroduce them ourselves. Not like we can make that big of a difference, but suddenly they're back down in this area a little bit which

is great," Ashley said.

Team Reptile is a nonprofit organization and members don't get paid, nor do they pay a membership fee to take part.

Ashely said the response from par-

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# Summer school brings new challenges, opportunites to students, teachers

Teaching summer school brings new challenges and opportunities for students and teachers alike.

Shawn Ryan, science teacher at Clarkston High School, just finished his third summer of teaching summer school at CHS. The three hour blocks, which run from 8 to 11 a.m. and from 11 a.m. until 2 p.m. give Ryan, and the other summer school teachers a unique set of challenges.

"I try to make the summer school sessions more hands-on than the regular school classes. You have to use the bigger blocks of time to your advantage. You really need to grab the students' interest. If it's a three hour class you need to move at different paces. You need to have activities so if the faster kids get done they're not just sitting there wasting time, but you're not losing kids at the same time. It's a challenge that way," he said.

Currently at CHS, the summer school program is used as a form of remediation, which gives students the opportunity to get caught up in a variety of subjects including English, science and mathematics. Classes can vary in size from 10-12 students up to around 26 students, Ryan said.

"The idea of summer school, atleast in Clarkston, is remediation. If you're going to keep high standards

within the district you have to have a way, if you're going to fail students, so they can catch up. You don't want to put pressure on students that they're not going to graduate or on teachers saying, if they don't get through my class there's no hope for them," Ryan said.

Some of the major differences between summer school and the regular classes is the variety of teaching techniques used by teachers.

"You use a variety of things between lecture, group work and student projects. You try to open it up as much as you can in all different directions," Ryan said.

Some of the projects students took part in this summer were a 9th grade science class led by Ryan and Darlene Roche, who was the other summer school science teacher, who brought science down to a local level. Their class studied erosion around Clarkston High School.


"The kids came up with a plan to find out what they could do about it by contacting different government agencies. We had students on the phone calling Washington D.C. trying to see if there was any help available. They got the idea in a lot of areas of government there isn't a lot of support for local issues. In groups, they made a final report on it, made a map of the area," he said.

In Ryan's 10th grade class, the students took a field trip to see the movie "The Perfect Storm" to see how accurately Hollywood portrayed the actual weather conditions of the time. Students researched old newspaper clippings and had a thorough discussion after seeing the movie.

The other teachers who were involved in the summer school program were math teacher Shawn Shepard, Carrie Vitani, who taught economics and Kim Tayon who taught Math. Stephen Marsden, an assistant principal at Sashabaw Middle School, was in charge of summer school, but received some additional help from Ryan.

Ryan assisted the administration in finding the right teachers to teach summer school. A task, he said, that wasn't

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

Rory Roberts, is a 1991 Clarkston graduate who taught English. One project her students worked on during the course saw them use a lot of multimedia and focused on the Holocaust.

"Instead of teaching raw English and teaching it point by point, they took a theme and based things around it and used all kinds of technology," Ryan said.

Ryan said in the future the summer school program may be used as a way for students to get ahead in their studies rather than just remediation. But the response from students has been positive for a number of reasons.

"First off, the kids are paying to take it. If you're paying for it, you're really interested in doing a pretty decent job. Generally, the kids are really concerned about their grades," he said.

"There are kids who don't care and aren't in summer school. They could be, or need to be, but aren't. So it leaves you with a select population of students. A lot of students may be struggling, but they want your help. That's kind of exciting for a teacher," Ryan said.

And being excited about being a teacher is what makes Ryan's job so gratifying.

"Seeing a kid's face light up when they see something for the first time is exciting. I wanted to do something that felt like it was calling me. And since I've been doing it I love it," he said.
