May 4 start date

Slow traffic on tap for M-15

Residents should be planning a few more minutes to their commute if it includes driving down Main Street.

Construction along M-15 may see a traffic shift and additional delays for area motorists by the end of the week.

According to Michigan Department of Transportation resident engineer Jim Natschke, traffic may shift to the east from just south of Waldon Road to just north of Washington beginning May 4. That is the tentative date for work to begin on the installation of the 12-inch water main on the west side of Washington. This portion of the downtown construction project known as Phase 1 is scheduled to be complete by the end of July.

Traffic will be shifted to the west side of the street for Phase Two, so an identical water line can be installed on the east side of the street.

However, Natschke said the traffic shift is dependent upon Consumers Energy.

Consumers Energy has been working to connect area businesses and homes to gas lines. But it is taking a little longer than expected said one Consumers En-

Gini Schultz's July 4 Alternative parade is growing bigger by the day — but she's not done yet.

The Clarkston resident has been working for several weeks to organize the parade, which has been a Clarkston tradition for over 60 years. The parade was cancelled by its usual sponsor, the Independence Township Fire Department for safety reasons during the city's construction.

WWII vets share memories, emotions

Memorial Day is nearing and those who have served and fought for this country are to be honored—including the 16 million men and women who gave of themselves in World War II.

Unfortunately, statistics show only four million World War II veterans are living today and 41 die hourly.


With nearly 1,000 expiring a day, their stories and experiences sadly will go with them.

Knowing the importance of passing this history to the younger generation, six local men shared their experiences with Clarkston High School sophomores on April 17.

Each gentleman had a different piece of the war to share with the History and Social Studies students. Each could probably write their own book, but excerpts might sound something like this:

George Thompson, a scout and jungle fighter in the Army's Special Forces, was sent to Japan 30 days after the dropping of the atomic bomb in Hiroshima. "It wasn't a pretty sight," he said. "We not only had to fight our enemies, we had to fight wild animals, insects and disease."

Thompson captivated the teenage audience the most with his horrific descriptions of torture. "The Japanese would take a pair of pliers and pull out a man's fingernails," he said. "They'd cut off a man's finger at the joint and dip it

in salt water. A couple days later they'd cut it off at the next joint."

He continued, "They would take a man, strip him of his clothing, and set him on mounds of cannibal ants. After six or seven hours, there'd be nothing left but bones." Thompson wouldn't comment on how he learned of these

pains.

In an emotional speech, Thompson said, "War is a terrible thing...to see your buddies next to you obliterated. Hate is the worst thing on this earth; and greed. And war is caused by hate and greed. There's nothing worse than war."

Ray DeFiore, on the other hand, was growing up in Utica, N.Y., when on December 7, 1941 the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor. The bombing ignited interest in the young man. "I wanted to be a pilot...but I was only 15, my time would come."

When his time did come, DeFiore was shipped to Heidelberg, Germany. "Germany was in bad shape," he said. "After the bombings, Berlin hardly had a building standing."

But to DeFiore, an Army bandsman, good things resulted from the world war, specifically, he said, the Manhattan Project and the GI Bill of Rights.

"My act in the army was only 12 months and there's a lot more to Ray DeFiore than that, but it did shape me."

John Thomas—who grew up in Clarkston, a town "known for one thing, an ice cream parlor where you could get a double scoop for 5 cents"—tried to join the service the day after Pearl Harbor. He was only 17. But after graduation, Thomas got his chance and joined the Navy where on a convoy in the Mediterranean, he crossed the ocean 18 times in a Destroyer Escort, "the smallest war ship the U.S. built."

Others like Frank Willard, in the Army's transportation division, spoke about being stationed on the island of Tarawa where he maintained various types of bomber and cargo planes; or stationed in Austria like Tom Lyman, who showed students slides of one of Hitler's retreats; and Bob Morse who was part of the Army's Special Services. His unit, which was frequently attacked, was

SCAMP found warm place in teen's heart

It's a time for you name it—arts and crafts, music, field trips, swimming, hiking, picnics and, of course, loads of fun.

Each year approximately 300 participants enjoy Clarkston SCAMP, a summer camp for special needs children and young adults.

And for one local family, it's hard to imagine a life without the organization.

"Anita has cerebral palsy. She's affected on one side," said mother Barbara Greenstone. When the family moved to Clarkston in 1986, when Anita was three, they learned of SCAMP.

"At that time, she didn't walk," Barbara said. "And we weren't sure if she would ever walk, what her cognitive abilities would be...she's come along way."

Such a long way, Anita actually outgrew SCAMP because of her advanced physical abilities.

"I did SCAMP until I was ten or 11," said Anita, who recently celebrated her 18th birthday. "Then I started volunteering. I like to volunteer and I did that for four years."

"The first year (as a volunteer), I worked with younger kids, but that didn't work for me. They're too

hyper, I can't chase them," Anita laughed. Currently, Anita is a student aid for high school SCAMPers and "now I get paid!"

Barbara, a Clarkston High School teacher for students with cognitive disabilities, is also lead teacher for the SCAMP group in which Anita assists.

"SCAMP is a good experience for kids," Barbara said. "We stress age appropriate activities and we try to provide all the necessary parts of getting ready for the big transition into the real world."

SCAMPers in the Greenstones' group might enjoy activities like a day at Independence-Oaks County Park, shopping, miniature golf, or a movie. And Barbara and Anita like to add a health component to their activities like running around a track.

After 15 years of SCAMP, involved in one aspect or another, Anita said, "I'll probably do this for awhile." But Anita has plans to go to Western Michigan University to pursue a career in social work and credits SCAMP for her career decision. "If I wouldn't have done SCAMP, I wouldn't know what I would want to do as an adult."

"SCAMP has been such a big part of our lives," said Barbara. "It's been part of our summers for a long time."

Overby heads up officers' group

Oakland County Sheriff's Department Deputy Keith Overby has been chosen head of a group of officers dedicated to heading off the storm of drunk driving.

Overby, a Davisburg resident, was elected president of STORM (Sobriety Trained Officers Representing Michigan), a network of 200 law enforcement officers in the state.

The group is trained to use Standard Field Sobriety Training (SFST) tactics with drunk drivers. The officers use the SFST to detect, arrest, and convict drunk drivers at the new .08 alcohol levels.

Overby said the STORM network is essential in maintaining a uniform standard of dealing with drunk driving.

"There needs to be a standardized testing with drunk drivers, because it adds validity and reliability," Overby said. "We're trying to standardize all tests, professionalizing what we do for a living."

The group produces a quarter newsletter, Storm Front, designed to provide officers with up-to-date information on new developments in drunk driving.

Overby said the STORM acronym is

appropriate for the group, because its efforts are aimed at educating their officers and the general public about the "storm" of drunk driving.

"That's the message we're trying to get across," he said.

According to Overby, drunk driving statistics for 1999 list Oakland County with a total of 6,800 drunk driving arrests during that year, second only to Wayne County. In 1998, a total of 6,900 drunk driving arrests were made in Oakland County. Overby said there were approximately 745 drunk driving incidents per county in Michigan during that year.

Over the past five years, law enforcement officers in Michigan have made over 300,000 arrests for drunk driving, according to a pamphlet issued by STORM.

In addition to his duties with the OCSO, Overby teaches at the Oakland Community College Basic Marine Officers Academy, and teaches in an alcohol awareness program called SCOPE, a program which targets all 40 public high schools within Oakland County. Since 1996, the program has addressed over 70,000 high school students.

Fifth graders bring state championship home

Six Independence Elementary students have brought home a state title for their school.

Fifth graders Dan Ullrich, Adam Drews, Christopher Hipsher, Chris Kirsch, Robert Julian, and Jeremy Baetz won first place in the "Dnamic Improv" category at the Destination Imagination state competition, held April 28 at Central Michigan University in Mt. Pleasant.

The team of Independence Elementary students are now qualified to compete at the Destination Imagination Global Finals at the University of Tennessee in Knoxville, from May 23-27.

"The best teams from around the world will come to compete," said Diane Ullrich, sponsor of the Independence Elementary team.

Destination Imagination (formerly known as Odyssey of the Mind), is a national program that fosters creative problem solving through competitions at the elementary and middle school levels. The "Dnamic Improv" category involves months of research, and culminates with an improvisational performance at the competition.

"At the beginning of the year, students pick one of five problems to work on," Ullrich said. "What they do is research 12 cultural performances, 12 fa-

mous innovators, and 12 cultural landmarks."

At the April 28 competition at CMU, judges randomly selected one item from each category, and then the students were given 30 minutes to create a five-minute play that combined these elements.

Just prior to their performance, the fifth graders were also given a "character action" to add to the skit. The Independence Elementary team created a skit involving Rachel Carlson, the Eiffel Tower, and reggae dancing.

Ullrich said everyone was excited when the fifth graders found out they had won the state competition.

"I think we were all so ecstatic and surprised," she said. "They did such a beautiful job. They worked hard all year. It's just a great program."

Three other teams from Clarkston participated in the state competition by qualifying at the regional competition held at Holly High School. Two teams were from Clarkston Middle School and one was from Springfield Plains Elementary.

All students and their team sponsors are being invited to the May 14 Clarkston Board of Education meeting, which is being held at Clarkston High School beginning at 7 p.m., to be recognized for their achievements.

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
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
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

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Michigan Education Savings Program

About 16 years from now, if we are lucky, my husband Don and I will wave goodbye as our daughter Emily heads to college. At this point in our lives, it is an exciting and challenging thought. The cost of attending college continues to rise, and some reports indicate by the time Emily chooses a school, the cost for four years of education may exceed \$200,000.

This is where the Michigan Education Savings Program comes in. The MESP, now in its first full year, allows parents, grandparents and friends confronted with the spiraling costs of education to invest in the future of a child they know and love.

While some states restrict their programs to cover costs for in-state schools only, the MESP helps with education-related expenses at any private or public college or university in the country, including trade and graduate schools. Withdrawals not used for higher education purposes are subject to a 10-percent penalty.

Accounts can be opened for as little as \$25, making the program accessible to people at all income levels. Contributions per beneficiary can be made until the total balance for the account reaches \$125,000.

Many parents may wonder what happens if their son or daughter chooses not to attend college. One of the great parts about this program is you can transfer the account to another family member, close an account or dip into it if you need cash.

The beneficiary needn't be a child either; adults can open an account if they plan to pursue their education down the road.

The program provides several tax incentives. State income tax does not apply to distributions used to pay qualified higher education expenses including tuition, room and board, books and other college-related costs, and an annual income tax deduction of as much as \$5,000 per individual and \$10,000 for joint filers is allowed.

Also, federal tax is deferred on account earnings, with eventual taxes paid upon distribution at the students' generally lower income tax rate.

Furthermore, last year the Legislature passed, and the governor signed into law, legislation creating matching grants of \$1 for every \$3 contributed, up to \$200, for eligible recipients.

This program makes it possible for parents, grandparents or friends to begin investing in a child's education and in their future, from a very early age. By consistently setting aside a portion of your income, the burden of college expenses can be diminished considerably.

Perhaps they are just watching adults instead

As a society, have we become blasé about risky behaviors? The health hazards associated with smoking, for example, are well documented, yet people continue to "light up." Studies demonstrate that getting the proper amount of sleep is necessary to function well and to ensure our well being, but how many of us get enough rest? Health professionals tell us that eating properly and exercising are activities that make a positive difference in our lives, yet far too many of us fail to do so.

We know that our actions, or lack of action for that matter, impact our lives for better or worse. As adults, I guess we have the right, within legal limits, to ignore the risk factors and engage in risky behavior. But to rephrase Emerson, what we do speaks so loudly that our kids can't hear what we say. Sometimes it may appear as though our young people aren't listening, but perhaps they are just watching us adults instead.

I have often wondered about the meaning of the phrase "good old days." Certainly people are not referring to the days before washing machines or indoor plumbing! Nonetheless, there are some things that our grandparents taught us that do stand the test of time, and they are strikingly pertinent to the needs we have in this new millennium. Like previous gen-

erations:

■ Eating a balanced diet is advantageous. Food is the fuel that helps our mind and body function. The simple truth is students who come to school well nourished are more ready to learn than those who don't!

■ Getting enough sleep energizes us and keeps our minds sharp. This too places us at an advantage. Students who come to school rested are likely to be distracted and more able to stay on task. Those who do not are clearly at a disadvantage!

■ Family members, neighbors, friends and other grown-ups play an important role in raising a child. There was a time when more adults were paying attention to what the children of the community were doing and more willing to set kids straight when they strayed off course. Students who feel the support of the adults in their lives are at an advantage. Those who feel isolated, unwanted and undervalued are at a disadvantage.

Now, schools surely have a major role to play in assisting children to reach their potential; but none of the items listed above require special training or the wisdom that a teacher develops over time. While there are a variety of factors that interfere with school success (student health, parental attitude and support, etc.), such conditions can be overcome when adults take charge, listen to one another and work closely together.

Today, too many boys and girls make poor decisions because we allow them to do so. My guess is that almost every

Why I'm staying away from trees

Last Saturday night, I got a call from one of my friends, Becky, to go for a late-night stroll in the woods with her and Beth, another friend. After confirming this was in fact a walk and not a run -- she'd been trying to convince me to start running, but I'd been consistently avoided this (and all) exercise -- I agreed to go and left to meet them.

The three of us, along with Becky's dog, made a trek of decent length before sitting down under a big tree to talk for a while. Now, when I say big, I mean that this thing had a diameter that was probably close to three feet. A ways up the trunk, it had a bunch of thick, twisted limbs that would have been tempting to climb if there had been some way to get up to them. I was always disappointed by tree climbing as a younger child; I never seemed to be able to get anywhere worthwhile in a tree. Though I would hardly consider myself to be a currently active tree climber, I do occasionally indulge in the juvenile activity when I see a tree that presents an opportunity for me to prove I can climb a tree and reach great heights. In truth, I still have yet to prove that.

Becky and I both attempted to hoist ourselves into the tree; Beth was the smartest of the three of us and kept

herself planted on the ground. Becky, also displaying a degree of intelligence, gave up after having nowhere else to go once she hoisted herself onto a stumpy growth of the tree.

I was still determined. I had less success with Becky's method than she did, so I went around to the back of the tree and tried another. A smaller tree was growing a few feet away from the big one. The smaller tree's trunk was no more than three inches across, but its branches were growing towards the three-foot tree, and it was strong enough to support me as I shimmed up it. From there, I was able to swing my right foot up onto the stump Becky and I had tried before, and I could get my left foot onto a similar growth on the other side of the tree. With my left hand, I grabbed a shard remaining from a fallen branch, higher up on the tree than my footholds. My right hand remained on the smaller tree.

I remained there for a while, suspended between the two trees. I knew that if I could grab the shard with both hands, I'd be able to pull myself up and, from there, onto some of the real limbs that were my goal. But could I trust the dead piece of wood?

I tried, but I don't know if I ever actually had both hands on the shard. It broke off somewhere in the course of me shifting my weight, and I was sent crashing to the ground. I landed on my rear with my legs up in the air. I thought it had been about a four-foot fall, but I remember having to reach

we are powerless to intervene. That task will not be easy unless parents form coalitions with one another, with school personnel, and with neighbors, friends and

relatives!

like a "mobile sales store," following the armies of Patton and Bradley and servicing the troops with ammunition, gas, medical supplies and food.

Each gentlemen had a different message to convey to the students.

Thomas said, "just a few short years ago our country decided we were awful people for dropping the bomb on Hiroshima and Nagasaki. Let me tell ya, we were absolutely right in doing it. Many of you would not be sitting here if we hadn't dropped that bomb. Without a doubt, some of you would've lost your grandparents and would not be sitting here today."

Thompson spoke earnestly to the students. "You have a chance to get a good education. It won't be easy, but no one said life would be easy. You are the future of this country. Next time you go home and prepare to go to bed, stand in front of the mirror and ask yourself what would you do if you were in a conflict like that. Would you take the easy way out? I'm begging you to understand what life is all about."

Margaret Bartos, Clarkston Senior Center Coordinator who helped bring this program to the students, said most men will only hint to what they did during the

war, shying away from detail. "Only now are some starting to open up."

"We are privileged to hear from them firsthand," she said, "It is generous of them to share their experiences and their feelings about those experiences."

Bartos, a former history teacher, is always looking for the best way to bring history alive.

"The kids today are so over stimulated with pictures of World War II in texts and films," she said. "Because it was so long ago, they don't understand the reality of the war. Kids need to know how important this war was. It's best to see and hear experiences from real people."

Bartos added an experience like this helps young people to not discriminate against senior citizens. "It gives them a chance to see older people in a different light—to know they have lived an interesting life, they have things to share, and to gain an appreciation for the older generation."

One sophomore, Kelly Morefield, thought the unique class period was interesting, "It was nothing I'd heard before." She is saddened kids, someday, won't be able to learn about World War II, as she did this day.

INJURIES ON YOUR PROPERTY

If someone were to become injured while in your home or on your property, your liability would largely depend on why that person was on your land. If the person were a customer, or "business invitee," you may be held liable if you did not act reasonably to protect him or her—even if you did not know about the danger. If the person were a social guest or a door-to-door salesperson (a "licensee"), you would probably be liable only if you did not protect that person from a danger you knew existed. If the person were on your property without permission, you would probably not be liable because a duty of care is generally not owed a trespasser.


ment Project. A limited number of free copies of the CD will be available to attendees, on a first-come-first-serve basis.

Telling community of God's Word

"Study to show thyself approved unto God," the Bible reminds us in 2 Timothy 2:15, "a workman that needeth not be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth."

BSF International, standing for Bible Study Fellowship, is an interdenominational, not-for-profit organization offering men and women a chance to do just that—study His Word as well as praise Him and gather together as believers.

Though not affiliated with any church or group of individuals, nearly a thousand groups worldwide meet weekly at churches which invite BSF to use their facilities for community outreach.

BSF classes are held September through May. And though this season is wrapping up, John Merz, a BSF attendee, suggests signing up now for fall classes due to a participatory cap and waiting list.

Merz, a Clarkston resident for 27 years, attends a men's class, led by former WDIV reporter Mike Wendland, Monday nights at Troy Baptist Church. His group stops at 500 members.

Merz is in his fifth year of BSF, and explained classes are scheduled in seven-year intervals.

Right now, the curriculum is set through 2007. On the agenda, currently, is the Gospel of Matthew. But future studies include the life of Moses, the Gospel of John, the History of Israel and the minor prophets, Acts of the Apostles, Romans and Genesis.

BSF encourages members maintain 80 percent attendance or allow someone else to take their place due to the great demand.

Because it is "a fairly rigorous schedule," Merz said, "there is some turnover." He assured there are openings for those interested in joining.

"A typical two hour class," Merz said, "starts with praise in song. Then we break into our study groups—about 15 guys. A leader facilitates discussion over daily questions we have worked on during the previous week."

"Most of us in the group," he said, "have busy schedules, but the daily study does help with self discipline, organization of one's day, and setting priorities. Daily lessons can take up to 45 minutes or more, but there are rewards."



John Merz said BSF International "has given me a better understanding of what's important in life, how awesome God is, and how Christ died for me; and everyone else."

He continued, "After sharing our take on those passages we return for a lecture on the same material. The lecture includes insights on the Scripture as well as principles that can be drawn from them."

An example, Merz gave, was in Matthew 18:21-35 concerning a gathering of disciples at Peter's home. Peter asks Jesus "How many times shall I forgive my brother? Up to seven times?" Jesus answered, "I tell you not seven, but 77 times."

Merz said, "Peter wants to know when it's okay to hold a grudge. Jesus said never. If you can't forgive someone for a small debt, how can you expect God to forgive a large one? When you think about all that God has done for you the debt is huge."

Merz explained another illustration of forgiveness

Wendland once used in a lecture. "It involves Leonardo DaVinci when he was painting The Last Supper. He painted the face of an acquaintance in the place of Judas Iscariot's face because this man had offended him. When he got to Christ's face, he couldn't get it right. After several attempts and failures, DaVinci repainted Judas' face as it actually appeared. Only then could he get Christ's face the way he wanted it."

"Grudges do get in the way," Merz concluded. "A principle to be drawn from this could be a man's character is most clearly revealed in the way he describes the character of another."

With BSF, he said, the general idea is to take what you've learned and "do something in your church. It's a tool for the church and community." And Merz has gained a lot from his involvement with the group.

"Personally, the study has given me a better understanding of what's important in life, how awesome God is, and how Christ died for me; and everyone else. It's brought my focus around to that point. That's something a lot of people don't necessarily think about today."

To extend what he has learned, Merz teaches fifth grade Sunday School at his church, Clarkston United Methodist Church.

Meetings, which Merz described as fundamental and fairly conservative, are open to people of all faiths or those without a faith.

"There are men in their 20s through 80s," he noted. "The class takes in a fairly large geographical area. There are people driving over from Windsor and down from Romeo. I can think of at least five other men driving down from Clarkston. Another neat thing about his organization is that everyone everywhere in the world is on the same week's lesson, so if you're traveling in Japan you can hit a BSF class and be on the same page with everyone else."

For those interested in joining a BSF class, day and evening classes are offered to men and women. 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

ergy worker.


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


Clarkston finished behind first place Grand Blanc, second place Gross Ile and third place Rochester in the tournament April 28.

"The best part of my game is my driving, but I think I've improved my short game lately," she said.


Benner has been playing golf since she was 7 years old and became interested in the sport through her father, Michael.

Clarkston Middle School sixth grader compiles 35-1 record on the mats





Benner, who shot a 91. Anna Trim was next best with a 94, followed by Kelly Haggard's 96 and Lisa Lesko's 105.


"Lauren played real well for us that day," Sherrill said. "She's a leader on our team and doesn't let things get to her on the course."

Clarkston's lone win in the league this year came against Troy Athens, but Sherrill has his eyes on some future league contests which he feels pretty confident in.



Also last week, the Wolves defeated Rochester 3-1 April 27 at Clarkston High School.


Pitcher Ben Munce, a transfer from Springfield Christian got his first win of the season, allowing only five hits in seven innings.
