Voters approve millage, fill school board seats

Clarkston voters approved a nonhomestead millage proposal and elected two members of the school board in the June 11 annual school election.

Incumbent board treasurer Ron Sullivan and 1997 Clarkston High School graduate Steve Hyer were each elected to four-year terms on the

Clarkston Board of Education. They will serve through June 2005.

Sullivan received 941 votes, while Hyer received 909. There are 29,427 registered voters in the district. The two candidates ran unopposed for the board positions.

Voters, by a 667-519 margin, also approved an operating millage proposal on non-homestead and non-qualified Continued on page 10A

Citing the "great progress" that has been made this year, the Clarkston Board of Education has extended the contract of Superintendent of Schools Dr. Al Roberts.

The extension, announced at the board's June 11 meeting, is for one year, meaning Roberts' contract now runs through July 1, 2006

A resident wants automatic doors at the post office because some handicapped customers have to wait for help to enter the post office.

For one local resident, the Clarkston Post Office has delivered a bit of a concern.

Beverly Ratt is worried entrance to the building on M-15 near Dixie is not suitable for handicapped individuals and senior citizens.

"There's no way a person in a walker or wheelchair can get in (the doors) easily." And Ratt, 38 and healthy, wants to know why there are no automatic opening doors.

"It's not like it's a mall, a store, or a dress shop where, if it was difficult to access the building, you could go somewhere else. It's the United States Post Office!'

Recently, Ratt was at the post office when a gentlemen in a wheelchair struggled to get in the door and was forced to wait until someone assisted him.

"At least three people walked by without helping him," she said, and expressed her concerns to employees that day. "This is a problem. It is not userfriendly for the public."

However, other Clarkston Post Office customers say the entrance is fine. Senior citizen Gloria Brown has had difficulties, specifically with the weight of doors, at other places of business, but said, "I haven't noticed any problems here." She added she has always been pleased with the quality of service at the post office as well and said the employees "are very nice here."

But Ratt said this isn't the first time this has concerned her. A year ago, she filled out comment cards stating her feelings and got nowhere. So she recently contacted The Clarkston News for help.

Since then, Inspector Jim Howard, of the Independence Township Building Department, checked out Ratt's complaint at the post office and said one of the doors was too tight and loosened it up.

Postmaster Gabe Viviano had maintenance personnel check the doors as well and fix similar problems this past week.

Viviano said he is actually surprised by the complaint and noted he's never received any complaints since the building was constructed approximately two years ago.

He said the building is handicap accessible according to ordinance requirements at the time it was built, such as having a ramp and lowered counters.

Viviano said it is not required for a federal facility to have automatic opening doors, but instead, must be able to be opened with not more than five pounds of effort.

In fact, handicap access regulations for government buildings vary. The post office, for example, falls under Michigan Barrier Free ordinances, because it is a leased federal building, said Leon Genre, assistant director of the Building Department. Other buildings may fall under the American Disabilities Act.

"Everything in the building is according to federal regulations," Viviano said. "We may not please everyone, but we've never had a complaint."

Ratt is still concerned. She said she doesn't see handicap individuals or seniors speaking out "because I think they don't want to draw attention to themselves.'

She added, "Clarkston is supposed to be this nice, family-oriented place, but we're forgetting the older residents. It's a government building ... that's why it's such an issue."

Viviano offered Ratt any other help he could possibly give.

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Coke and a smile Schools ink deal with soda giant

Pepsi may be the choice of a new generation, but Coke is the choice of Clarkston Community Schools.


The Clarkston Board of Education

authorized Superintendent Dr. Al Roberts to negotiate a three-year deal with the Coca Cola Bottling Company as the successful bidder for the district's soft drink products.

The change will

mark the end of Pepsi products at Clarkston High School. Beginning with the 2001-02 school year, the district will sell Coca Cola's soft drinks, bottled water, and juice products for the high school, including concession areas.

Coke's commission rate was 55 percent, while Pepsi's was 35 percent. According to figures provided by the district, the commission totals for the two companies, using the vending sales



The bid request included all dispensing and vending equipment, to be provided and maintained fee of charge, according to Linda Nester, the district's director of personnel and auxiliary services, in a June 6 memo to Roberts.

Nester was unable to be reached for comment as of press time.

Coke's sponsorship bid of \$82,250 included a \$50,000 cash sponsorship bid, to be spread out over the three years of the contract -- \$25,000 in the first year, \$15,000 in the second year, and \$10,000 in the third year.

In addition, their proposal included

\$750 worth of free product each year of the contract, marketing programs worth \$10,000 per year (each documented), fountain dispensing equipment installed and maintained free of charge, and vending machine fronts/sides that ad-

here to the district's commercial sponsorship policy guidelines.

By contrast, Pepsi's sponsorship bid of \$15,450 came without a cash sponsorship proposal, and included \$1,500 for tuition funding software, \$1,000 for vending game promotions, \$750 for a recycling program, \$1,000 for the athletic sideline program, \$500 worth of free product for the high school's all night graduation party, and \$400 for a Pepsi print-out CD-ROM.

Excessive delays at White Lake Road

Drivers who frequent the Dixie Highway and White Lake Road intersection in Independence Township, take heart. A left-turn phase is being added to the traffic signal for drivers turning onto White Lake Road from Dixie. It should be operational soon.

Ross Bremer, metro area traffic signal specialist for Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT), said the contractor was given 60 days from mid-May to complete the work.


Construction for the new phase began at the intersection last week and will cost about \$35,000. Bremer said to his knowledge, a controller must still be installed and inspections conducted before the project will be finished.

In late 1999, a left-turn phase for drivers on White Lake Road turning left onto Dixie was added to the traffic signal, said Bremer.

While area drivers are aware of frequent accidents at the busy corner, they had no bearing in adding the left turn phase, said Bremer.

"We based the need for a new left turn phase on a study conducted in late 2000 that showed excessive delay for left turn traffic from Dixie," said Bremer. "Accident statistics were looked at, but they weren't a factor in the decision."

There were 83 accidents recorded at




Construction workers prepare the intersection of Dixie Highway and White Lake Road for installation of a left-turn phase at the traffic signal. Photo by Maralee Cook

that corner from January 1, 1997 to December 31, 1999 (the most recent statistics available), according to Tim Heideman of the Traffic Improvement Association of Oakland County.

Bremer added that decisions of this kind are based on current statistics, not future projections. Exceptions are made if a traffic generator like a major mall is going to be built in an area.

There are no other stoplight projects planned in the near future for either Springfield or Independence townships, but Bremer said a left-turn phase is being added to the stop light at Dixie and Sashabaw Roads. It is expected to be completed during the same time frame.



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
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

Clarkston News Staff Writer Warm weather and sunshine have finally arrived, and it's hardly a time to start thinking about Halloween. But DTE Energy Music Theatre is conjuring up tons of spooky fun for the haunt-

ing season. For 19 days in October, Hauntfest—a joint effort between Palace Sports and Entertainment and Great Lakes Promotions LLC—hopes to scare, thrill and entertain.

Since the event would extend beyond the typical concert season and activities are planned for the parking area of the venue, Palace Sports and Entertainment officials met before the Township Board June 5 to request an outdoor gathering permit. The request was passed subject to approval from other township departments such as police and fire.

Hauntfest will feature three haunted houses: Lizzie Borden's House of Terror, the Dungeon of Darkness and 3D Nightmare plus seven carnival attractions like the Scrambler, Tilt-a-Whirl, Swinger, Fun House and more.

There'll be food concessions (no alcohol will be served); a games area; musical, theatrical and magical shows; and special guest appearances from those in the horror film industry like make-up artist Tom Savini and sci-fi comic book stars like Vampira. There will also be celebrity look-a-like autograph sessions and live music by Destroyer, a local tribute band to Kiss.

Tickets, which will be offered through Ticketmaster or at the East Box Office at DTE, will be \$15 and include unlimited access to all haunted houses and carnival rides. Parking will be \$3.

Hauntfest is scheduled to start October 4 and run Thursday through Sundays throughout the month.

It is proposed the event will be open to the public weekdays from 6 to 11 p.m. and Saturday and Sundays, noon to 6 p.m. (for a more family-oriented time) and 7 to 11 p.m.

However Dale Stuart, township supervisor, wants the event to end at 10 p.m. for the sake of neighboring residents too often accustomed to late-night noise. Stuart is to discuss this matter later with Palace Sports and Entertainment officials since Senior Vice President Hugh Lombardi said this was a matter of economics.

Also at the meeting it was noted Pine Knob Road will not be used during the event so not to disturb residents, and rides will be positioned as to avoid disturbance as well. The maximum permitted attendance per night will be 5,000.

If this is a successful attraction, said Building Department Director Bev McElmeel in a memo to board members, Great Lakes Promotions will be back.

Independence Elementary's team placed 17th out of 51 teams competing in their event.


The Clarkston team competed in

Amateur ham radio aficionados in Oakland County and elsewhere will be gathering later this month to spread the word about their craft.

Amateur Radio Week is June 18-25, and members of OCARS (Oakland County Amateur Radio Society) will take part in numerous activities to raise awareness about the subject, according to Rick McKibben, a Clarkston resident and member of OCARS.

He said ham radio is a valuable tool to have around to communicate with others and in the event of an emergency.

"We're communicating with other ham operators," he said. "We're using all modes available, without using

normal power. Most people don't realize that phone towers and cell phones do not have emergency power."

McKibben added when concerns over Y2K were prevalent, the ham radio operators were summoned to hospitals and different police departments.

McKibben said radio waves between 10-160 meters can be picked up

> all over the world, depending on weather conditions. "The longer the wave, the more it bounces around the world," he said.

> He said while the cost of operating a ham radio varies, depending on what the operator wants to do, if you know where to shop to find the necessary equipment, then the costs will be reduced.

"It can be real expensive or real cheap," McKibben said. "If you're knowledgable about radio, you can get in cheaply, through trading."






would like to donate or allow the society to copy for archival or future exhibit purposes.

agricultural property tax.

The millage enables the district to levy the statutory rate of 18 mills against non-homestead and non-qualified agricultural property required for the school district to receive its revenue per pupil foundation guarantee.

In addition, local voters, by a 661-519 margin, approved an Oakland Community College millage renewal of 0.8 mills, or \$.80 per \$1,000 taxable value of all taxable property in Oakland County. The county-wide proposal passed.

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Wagner, Rosso push to change hiring practices at Independence Township

Stuart's office after the positions are advertised to the public, Rosso explained.

Stuart, after conducting his own interviews, decides which three or four applicants are most qualified for the position. The candidates are then brought to an open meeting for interviews and the supervisor makes a recommendation that the board either confirms or denies, Rosso said.

In the township's most recent hiring of Mike Turk as director for Parks and Recreation, board members requested the vote be by written ballot. They were denied when Stuart said the vote needed to be done in the open.

Rosso was concerned not only with this, but also that there were only three people to interview and Stuart would not divulge how many applicants there had been. Plus, Wagner said it took nine months to fill the position.

"We all have the authority to hire by the law of Michigan," said Rosso. "We all have one vote as the seven on this board and that's the bottom line. What we would like is to have access to all the applicants. We the board have a right to decide who to interview."

While the township is seeking applicants for the position of DPW director, Wagner and Rosso suggested two recommendations for a new policy.

The first included developing a three-person board made up of the supervisor, clerk or treasurer, and one trustee. They would pick the top three candidates for the job from the submitted resumes, while also allowing the supervisor to add a fourth candidate should he feel one be needed.

The second recommendation suggested all resumes submitted for open positions be mailed to the clerk's office and remain sealed until a date after the submittal deadline. At that time, the three-person committee would open and prepare them for the Township Board interview committee. The full Township Board would interview three or four candidates in a special meet-

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Rosso said the two choices, a hybrid or other ideas from fellow members would be accepted and considered.

Clerk Joan McCrary said Tuesday she would support a change. Treasurer Jim Wenger said he supports discussion of the issue and is open minded to a change.

However, Stuart said he thinks what has unfolded is "a bunch of baloney" and is insulted by the matter.

"It's very interesting to me no one said anything earlier," he said. Because of the discussion; Stuart had to cancel nine interviews he had scheduled with DPW applicants.

Stuart said resumes and applications are always kept on file in his office and no one ever stopped to read

any. But Rosso said that was never brought to their attention.

"If the board wants to change the procedure, do it," Stuart said to members at the meeting, "I think we have a system that works accurately.

The discussion was tabled to the next meeting.

"Nobody works harder in this township than Dale. We're not against him," said Wagner. "We're not taking anything away from him, hopefully (a new policy) will relieve his load."

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15 YEARS AGO (1986)

The Michigan State Police department has offered free services to six townships in Oakland County, including Independence and Springfield, in exchange for the cost of six dispatchers. The proposal calls for the state police post to be located from Telegraph Road in Waterford Township to a location in the northern end of Oakland County.

An anxious crowd of approximately 25 kept the questions going for over an hour as developers proposed a 300-unit apartment complex for Dixie Highway. The planned apartments, to be called Lancaster on the Lakes, are to be situated behind the new Randy Hosler Pontiac dealership on Dixie and run adjacent to single-family residences on Waterford Hill.

Paul Tungate is back at the athletic director's job full-time after a unanimous vote by the Clarkston school board. Tungate had previously held the job on a full-time basis until the school system cut back on the sports program several years ago. Tungate will be in charge of interscholastic athletics at the high school and two junior high schools in Clarkston.

A Look Back

25 YEARS AGO (1976)

Just under 900 people, or about 9 percent of the eligible voters in the Clarkston School District, have elected two new members of the Clarkston Board of Education. Incumbent Charles Smalley was defeated in his bid for reelection. He garnered 340 votes, compared to 549 for Eric Reickel and 496 for Vincent Luzi, who were both elected to the board.

Dom Mauti, assistant principal at Clarkston High School from 1966 to 1969, will become principal there as of July 1. He replaces William Dennis, who becomes transportation director for the district. Mauti has spent the last seven years as assistant principal at Rochester Adams High School, while remaining a resident of Clarkston.

In a 4-3 vote, the Clarkston Board of Education ratified a new one-year teaching contract calling for an average 10 percent salary increase, including increments. Board President David Leak, who was joined by Trustees Fernando Sanchez and Charles Smalley in opposing the contract, said the raises were outdistancing cost of living hikes.

50 YEARS AGO (1951)

A policy of discontinuing the enrollment of tuition students at Clarkston Community Schools was approved by the Board of Education at a special meeting. Effective at once, tuition students will be enrolled at Clarkston in grades ten, eleven and twelve only: Beginning one year later, eleven and twelve only will be admitted. Two years later, tuition students in the twelfth grade will be permitted to graduate, and no other students will be enrolled.

On June 18, there will be a District Assembly of the 222nd District of Rotary International held at the Township Community Center in Clarkston. The host club will be the Rotary Club of Clarkston. The incoming presidents and secretaries of the clubs in the district will hear many fine talks and discussions at this assembly.

The Clarkston 4-H Club had its first meeting last week, with 12 members present. The following officers were elected: president, Ann Spohn; vice president, Vaun Walton; secretary-treasurer, George Mann. The next meeting will be at the Independence Township Community Center June 20.

Rotary awards scholarships

The Clarkston Rotary Club made its annual scholarship awards to Clarkston High School students. Presentations were made at the school's awards ceremonies.

Rotary Scholarship Chairman Dick Miller and his committee selected two winners from this year's senior student applicants and awarded scholarships of \$1,000 each to Tabree Lloyd and Jennifer Kruk, both of Clarkston.

The selections were made using several criteria including grade point, citizenship, work involvement and written responses to specific topic questions chosen by the applicants.

The Rotary Club also awarded scholarships to three winners of its Challenge Scholarship program. Participating students entered the program in the fall of 1999 with a commitment to doing their best work in the last half of their junior and first half of their senior years. The winners were the top three most improved in the areas of grade point average and school attendance.


Clarkston Rotary President Bob Vandermark said "The Rotary Club is a

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



Sommers at top of her class

Dorothy Sommers doesn't give pop quizzes or tests. Instead, she gives loads of her time and a listening ear to children in the Clarkston school district who are going through some tough times.

Sommers was recently named School Social Worker of the Year for Oakland County through the Michigan Association of School Social Workers.

Sommers said she was nominated by her colleagues and received the award May 8.

"I was very surprised and very honored," Sommers said. "I used to be the one giving the awards. I just try to work as hard as I can for the kids. I didn't expect a formal award. All the social workers in the Clarkston School District work so hard."

Sommers has been employed by the district for the last 11 years. Before her time in Clarkston, she worked as a teacher in the Pontiac school system. She then earned her Master's Degree at Wayne State University and has been helping elementary students ever since.

Sommers currently splits her duties between Andersonville and Pine Knob Elementaries. But she has spent a lot of her time at Springfield Plains Elementary and has also worked at Bailey Lake Elementary.

But no matter what school she's working at, it's listening and helping kids that she finds so gratifying.

"I see students are more confident, competent and happier and more successful in school because of the work we've done as a team, and I can see. that I've had an impact," she said.

Sommers works with general and special education students who suffer from a variety of problems. Those problems range from difficult family situations including divorce, domestic violence or family loss, to friendship issues and also some behavioral issues. But she is quick to point out by no means does she work alone.


"Each building has a crisis team, which is made up of social workers, counselors, administrators and teachers," she said. "We can call in other social workers from other buildings if those needs arise. When there's a crisis, a crisis team comes together to work with each building."

Sommers said she has seen an increase in students requiring her services in the last few years, but she attributes most of the increase to the growth of the district as a whole.

"I think we're recognizing and addressing the needs more," she said. "The district is growing, so therefore there are more needs."

Sommers has been part of an organizational team which has helped to set up support groups for students going through a divorce in their family, or suffering from other social problems. The support groups have been part of the Clarkston School District all 11 years Sommers has been an employee.

"The big thing we see in the divorce group is that kids go in and see that they're not alone, they're not the only one going through that. It gives kids a special time

to talk about their thoughts and feelings."

Sommers said connecting with students is one of the most important parts about her job.

"We try to connect the students and their families to other counseling services within the community — like Clarkston Youth Assistance," she said.

Sommers has also coordinated the Rainbows For All Children group which is a grief and loss support group for students going through a family divorce or death. The program is available for students in Pine Knob, Andersonville and Springfield Plains elementaries. -

Sommers may receive another high honor this fall. In October the state board will choose the state school social worker of the year.

"When we have students who are sad or upset about a school situation, just sitting down and listening to them can sometimes make the kids feel better. Just being available and listening can be a big part of it," she said.

Mr. Manojlovich retired from Ameritech as Director of Sales.




Caricature artist — I had one of these done when I was in middle school, so this was long overdue. I think he did a pretty good job all things considered.



At a regular meeting of the Independence Township Board held an June 5, 2001 the Township Board authorized a First Reading of an Amendment to Zoning Ordinance, Independence Township Construction Code Ordinance as follows:

ORDINANCE AMENDING INDEPENDENCE TOWNSHIP CONSTRUCTION CODE ORDINANCE

An Ordinance providing for: the assumption of responsibility for administration and enforcement of the State Construction Code Act, being Act No. 230 of the Public Acts of 1972, as amended, and the State Construction Code promulgated thereunder; the designation of an enforcing agency; and the repeal of Township electrical registration, licensing and examination.

THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF INDEPENDENCE ORDAINS: Section 1 of Ordinance

Section 7-17 in Chapter 7, Article II, Division 1 of the Independence Township Ordinance Code is amended to repeal the definitions of the terms "building official," "construc-tion," "construction regulation," "inspector," "municipality," "owner" "premanufactured unit," and "work," and to add the definitions of "Commission" and "State Construction Code," so as to cause Section 7-17 to read in its entirety as follows: **DIVISION 1. GENERALLY**

Sec. 7-16. Short title. [Unchanged]

Sec. 7-17. Definitions.

As the following terms are used in this Article, the following definitions shall be applicable:

Board of Appeals means the Construction Board of Appeals created pursuant to, and governed by, this Article.

Commission means the State Construction Code Commission created by the Single State Construction Code Act, being Act No. 230 of the Public Acts of 1972, as amended.

State Construction Code means and includes the Single State Construction Code Act, being Act No. 230 of the Public Acts of 1972, as amended, and the State Construction Code prepared and promulgated as provided in that Act.

Secs. 7-18 - 7-25. Reserved.

Section 2 of Ordinance Sections 7-28, 7-29 and 7-30 in Chapter 7, Article II, Division 2 of the Independence Township Ordinance Code are hereby repealed, and Sections 7-26 and 7-27 in Chapter 7, Article II, Division 2 of the Township Ordinance Code are amended to read as follows:

DIVISION 2. ADMINISTRATION AND ENFORCEMENT Sec. 7-26. Administration and Enforcement of the State Constriction Code.

The Township assumes and shall be responsible for administering and enforcing the State Construction Code within the boundaries of the Township.

Sec. 7-27. Enforcing Agency.

The Township Building Department, its officials, inspectors, administrative, plan review and inspection personnel and consultants, and personnel and consultants of the Township that perform acts or provide services in the administration and enforcement of the State Construction Code, are hereby designated as the enforcing agency to discharge the responsibility of the Township to administer and enforce the State Construction Code.


It was a beautiful ceremony in an ideal facility -- one that the Class of 2001, and its many supporters, will never forget.

The speakers talked about a common theme: not being sure if they would make it, and gratitude that they did.


"So much has happened, I never thought I'd graduate," Dendy said.


