Kostin runs for judge

She believes "our" community and "our" court deserves a judge who is from and is involved in "our" community.

And with her roots here, and her participation in various activities within the area, she feels it makes sense to support her, Kelley Kostin, for Clarkston's 52/ 2 District Court judge.

The Independence Township resident and Family Law attorney previously lived in White Lake, where husband Robert, fellow attorney, was a Township Board trustee for a number of years.

The two, who have been married six years and have a seven-year-old adopted son, Shay, have their law practice, Robert E. Kostin, P.C., in the beautifully restored Ritter historical home in downtown Clarkston.

The 40-year-old feels the court needs a judge who knows the practice of law and is respected by the legal community.

For Kostin this means past and present memberships in numerous professional organizations such as The State Bar of Michigan, Women Lawyers Association, Family Law Association, American Bar Association and The Oakland County Bar Association where she is a member of the District Court Committee and Legislative Liaison Committee.

In addition, Kostin was appointed by the Oakland County Board of Commissioners to develop and implement the Friend of the Court Advisory Committee; appointed by the Oakland County Circuit Court to serve as Mediator, Arbitrator and Receiver on numerous cases as well as represent children as Guardian (Ad Litem); and appointed by the Oakland County Bar Association to develop an instructional video -- "Freedom of Speech in High Schools" -- to be distributed to statewide high schools.

parish knows him, was one of 30 chaplains to work the Winter Games in Salt Lake City.

"It was bigger than anything I imagined," Humitz said. "It is truly Olympian in perspective. There were people from all over the world and it was a tremendous experience to be in the middle of all that."

Humitz traveled in van with Deacon Archie Noon to Salt Lake City for their assignment. Noon serves at St. Mary Our Lady of the Snow in Milford. They were the only volunteer chaplains from Michigan going to the games.

"We were there to help the athletes by holding Mass and also providing religious counseling if needed. However, most the athletes are professionals and had their support systems so they did not need much counseling," Humitz said.

The pastor arrived in Salt Lake City on Jan. 16. The date was moved up due to the events of Sept. 11. All the individuals had to take training in security as well as training for chaplain activities.

"The training allowed us to get on common ground with all the other denominations. That way we could be respectful of everybody's tradition, background and culture while working together," Humitz said. "It was an outstanding experience to work with different faiths."

The chaplains were right in the middle of everything while staying in the Olympic, Village. The dormitories and facilities of the University of Utah were used as the village. It served as the residency for the athletes and included items such as game rooms, coffee shops and laundry facilities.

Hitting the slopes -- Humitz hit the slopes in Salt Lake City.

There were Catholic Masses in the morning and afternoons. The Interfaith Center served as the chapel and was open all hours.

However, it was not all work and no play for the Clarkston native. Humitz saw some Olympic events including the opening ceremonies and the men's downhill skiing. He was in the village during the closing ceremonies, but had the fireworks going off all around him.

Humitz also took time to hit the slopes himself while he was there. He has been skiing in the city for 35 years. Humitz also attended award ceremonies at the plaza and numerous concerts.

"It is a gorgeous city," Humitz said.

Humitz greatly enjoyed his time in the Olympic Village.

Area pharmacies await results

Clarkston Medical Pharmacy and Pine Knob Pharmacies are awaiting next month's announcement of winners of a competition sponsored by Blue Cross Blue Shield of Michigan to help increase consumer awareness of the quality and value of generic prescription drugs.

Participating pharmacies recently employed in-store promotions and other strategies to increase consumer knowledge and interest in generics, which are equivalent to advertised, brand-name prescription drugs, but can help save consumers between 20 to 65 percent on the cost of the drug. In many cases, generics save consumers out-ofpocket costs on their health plan copays.

The pharmacy winners, one for independence stores and one for chain stores, will be determined by a comparison of fourth quarter 2000 and 2001 generic dispensing rates and will be announced next month. The formula combines the final generic dispensing rate, overall change in the GDR and the number of prescriptions. Winners will be featured in a one-million dollar advertising campaign that they will help design, which will run in the spring. The funds are part of the Blues' existing advertising budget and will cover print, radio, television and outdoor billboards.

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For one Clarkston young woman... Dancing brings rewarding challenge

Clarkston News Staff Writer It was a big step in her life of dancing.

Clarkston's Anne Underwood, a junior at Michigan State University, recently choreographed her first piece for the concert stage, unveiled before audience members at The Fairchild Theater, Feb. 14-17, during an MSU Repertory Dance Company performance.

A member of the company in 2000, Underwood has danced in several performances throughout college, and has studied various dance styles since kindergarten.

Needless to say, she isn't unfamiliar with the dance stage. However, her recent undertaking she found to be quite a challenge.

One that, at first, even scared her.

"I was very excited when I was asked to do this," Underwood said, "but I thought I wouldn't be able do it. It was so scary. It's not like handing in a paper to a professor, and having it returned with a grade and comments on it, that stays between you and the professor. What I do here everyone sees."

Even more nerve-wracking, Underwood was one of eight choreographers, and only one of two student choreographers. Among the rest were seasoned professionals, some who travelled from Washington D.C and New York City for the event.

But, the elementary education major said she found confidence from Dr. Dixie Durr, the concert's artistic director who approached Underwood in the summer about choreographing.

"I don't know why she chose me, but Dr. Durr knows how to give people confidence and makes you do good."

A lot of preparation went into the choreography, Underwood said.



In September, she auditioned dancers, then held practices twice a week, approximately four hours a week up until the concert. Prior to showtime, practice was held a week straight.

"Every Stone A Story," Underwood's choreographed piece, featured five dancers. "It's a modern piece with a touch of jazz," she said. "It's a comment on life, and the struggle to find peace."

The nearly five minute performance narrates a division between the dancers. Two of the characters strive to find the happiness they witness in the other three, which later creates a bond. "It shows that ups and downs happen to everyone."

"I wanted something people would enjoy," said Underwood, who receives her dance specialization certificate at the end of this semester and has been certified in elementary labanotation, the ability to notate dance. "I'm glad I took the challenge."

Her mother is glad too. Mom Carol said, "It was so exciting. You couldn't tell who the rookie was. I'm very proud of her."

And Underwood hopes to choreograph another piece before graduating. If the opportunity doesn't present itself again, though, she said as an elementary school teacher she plans to incorporate dancing and movement into her classes.

Dancing, she said, will always have a part in her life, though she isn't pursuing it professionally.

"Dancing has been a hobby for me. It was something I didn't want to let go of when I got to college. And I plan to be old and still take a dance lesson here and there."

Local student wins Dance Masters title

Michelle Marmon, a student at Clarkston Middle School, was recently crowned Junior Miss Dance of Michigan 2002, outscoring 29 dancers from throughout the Detroit Metropolitan area.

She'll represent the state at Dance Masters of America's national championship in Orlando this July.

The 12-year-old honor roll student studies dance at Terri Newman's Dance Shoppe in Waterford Township. During competition, Michelle performed a lyrical piece entitled "Pure Imagination," which was choreographed by Terri Newman, also of Clarkston.

Newman said, "Michelle is a perfectionist in class, but allows herself to enjoy the pleasure of performance. This mix has her headed toward a fabulous future."

Michelle was crowned by 2001 title holder, 13-year-old Ashley Shaw, an eighthgrader at Clarkston Middle School. Newman, who has been a Dance Masters member since 1981, noted how rare it is for two students from the same studio to win back to back titles. More unusual, she said, is the coincidence that both dancers attend the same community school. "I believe that the Clarkston area encourages its young people to strive for excel-

lence."

Entrants must compete in at least two of four audition classes offered in ballet, jazz, tap and acrobatics. They are also required to submit to an interview by

"Student ambassadors are carefully interviewed and evaluated before their acceptance," Danielle said, "and I am excited to share my experience with school and civic clubs when I return."

As a student ambassador with People to People, which was founded by President Dwight Eisenhower in 1956 to bring countries together in peace and friendship, Danielle can also earn high school and college credit.

"Personally, I would like to become a student ambassador because I think that this year the world needs a lot of healing after the tragic events of September 11 and because of the current efforts in the war in Afghanistan," Danielle said. "Countries from around the world need to band together now more than ever to make this world not only safer for children and people but to make it a better place."

This will actually be Danielle's second trip as a student ambassador. Previously, through People to People, she visited Australia and New Zealand. "I enjoyed the trip very much and got many incredible things out of it. I hope that this one will be just as much fun. It means so much to me."

Danielle--who has a 3.8 GPA, participates in choir, assists in the school district's Autism program and works everyday after school in the elementary program and high school program during the day--is currently seeking financial sponsors to help her with her goal.

Clarkston Chief of Police Paul Ormiston will have some help in running the city's police department. On Feb. 14, Ormiston appointed Clarkston police officer Ernest Combs to fill the newly created position. The move became official when the Clarkston City Council, at its Feb. 25 meeting, passed a resolution creating the position of deputy chief for the department.

According to City Manager Art Pappas, the deputy chief's salary would make no difference in the city's budget, as the deputy's salary would be taken from the chief of police's allocated salary with no increase in the budget. Ormiston and Combs would split the allocated salary.

City Councilman Scott Meyland said Ormiston is cutting back on his hours, and therefore the city wanted someone that could step in and run the department in his absence.

"The position was created because there will be periods of time where the chief is not available," he said. "It affords us to have someone in a position of authority."

Meyland said the move will also benefit the public because it will give citizens and fellow officers someone else they can speak with about their concerns. He also said he believes the position will be around on a long-term basis. "I don't see any disadvantages to it," he said.

Combs has already had some experience running the Clarkston police department, as he filled in for approximately a month when Ormiston took a leave of absence in January. The duties in his new position will be along those same lines.

"In the absence of the chief, I will be running the ing served as the police chief in Capac for approxidepartment," he said. "Basically, I'll run the department on a day-to-day basis."

Janet Thomas and Elaine Schultz, the current office holders, said they are running for reelection. Also on the ballot will be a 3.79 millage renewal request. For property owners, the figure represents \$3.79 in taxes for each \$1,000 of assessed property valuation.

Independence Valley received tentative preliminary approval from the township board March 3. Owned by Dr. John Ylvisaker, the subdivision's first phase is to have 13 1.5-acre lots, with 51 lots in the total project, and eventually access to Round Lake.

25 YEARS AGO (1977)

On March 14, Clarkston village voters go to the polls to select Village Council Trustees, A full slate of six candidates are running for the three vacancies. Three are Democrats and three are Republicans. Two of the Republicans are incumbents James Schults and James Weber. Incumbent Mike Thayer is not seeking reelection to the council.

The Springfield Township Board last week took the first step in their attempt to force reconsideration by the State Highway Commission of the M-275 Freeway cancellation. The board March 2 directed its attorney to demand the state commission reopen hearings on the proposed freeway contending the commission acted improperly in cancelling the highway at its Jan. 26 meeting. Springfield Township became the seventh North Oakland community to return the proposed 1977-78 sheriff's contract with only a five percent increase per deputy, half of what the county has demanded. Area resident helps stray dogs find loving homes

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Independence Township's Linda Meadors has always had a love of dogs. The former journalist has taken in dogs on her own since 1980 and is now part of the K-9 Stray Rescue League.

"I watched them march in the Fourth of July parade for about 10 years or so and always thought I wanted to get involved," Meadors said.

Finally a few months age,. Meadors decided to do something. Her first thought was to make a financial donation to the organization, but instead she decided to volunteer her time after finding out what an outstanding job the K-9 Stray Rescue League does for the animals.

The rescue league is a state and federally licensed non-profit group formed in 1990 to save dogs on the euthanasia list at the Oakland County Animal Shelter. The group checks the shelter on a daily bases for any deserving dog they might be able to save.

Because they always find more deserving dogs at the shelter than they can house, the group limit the number of "give-ups" that they take.

"They are a very dedicated group of people who want to place dogs who don't have a home," Meadors said. "I was overwhelmed with the amount of effort they put into it." The group transports dogs from the kennel to Petco every Saturday from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. in order to find the animals good homes.

K-9 Stray Rescue makes sure all of their dogs are spayed or neutered. They try to bring the rescued dogs upto-date on all medical needs. If there are still remaining medical needs for a dog at the time of adoption, they give the adopter a "vet authorization" to take the animal to one of their vets to make sure everything is current.

"It makes you feel real good to volunteer and make a difference. As a kid I always had dogs and cats. Dogs are definitely my first love," Meadors said.

Meadors is a former employee of The Detroit News. She moved to Independence Township from Birmingham in 1975 and is active in area organizations such as the Clarkston Garden Club.

In addition to helping, "dogs in need," the group also works with organizations that use dogs to help people in need. K-9 Rescue has given dogs to U.S. Customs, Leader Dogs for the Blind and PAWS with a cause.

"They are operating by donation only," Meadors said. "They really do an amazing job. I couldn't believe it when I saw all the work they did hauling the dogs from the kennel. I am proud to help in any way I can."
