State Champion DeGain caps season with wrestling title

Clint DeGain has made it all the way back.

The Clarkston High School junior, who sat out last season due to injury, captured the Division I 160-pound title at the individual state wrestling finals March 7-9 at The Palace of Auburn Hills. DeGain defeated Davison's Chad Roush by a 7-4 decision to capture the crown.

It was the fifth time the two had wrestled each other this season, with DeGain winning the previous four times.

He said he knew that Roush, a senior, was going to fight a tough battle in his last high school match.

"It was pretty tough," DeGain said. "It was the fifth time I wrestled him. I knew he was going to be after me."

After he won the match, DeGain said he experienced a mixture of elation and disbelief. "It felt so great," he said. "I feel like it happened so fast. This big rush went through me. Afterward, me and my dad (Clarkston coach Mike DeGain) sat down, and I couldn't believe it."

He said returning from an injury to win the title was particularly significant.

"It was so awesome, especially when I missed last year. To come back from an injury to a state cham-

ampionship, it meant a lot to me," DeGain said.

Clarkston coach Mike DeGain shared in his son's excitement.


"I was pretty darn happy," he said. "It was kind of a special moment. I was really happy that he was able to get the win. He had a really tough opponent in the finals."

Clint DeGain was not the only success story for the Wolves at the finals. Three other Clarkston grapplers placed in the competition: Tony LaJoie took fifth in the 130-pound division; Joe Wood took fifth in the 275-pound division; and John Langdon placed seventh in the 145-pound division.

"We had a great tourney," said Coach DeGain. "The kids wrestled great. I'm real proud of the whole team."

Clint DeGain started his drive for the state title with a pinfall win in 4:38 against Jon Britton of Grand Rapids Forest Hills Northern. He then defeated Hassen Berri of Dearborn by a 10-1 decision, and battled Darrell Brault of Roseville to two overtimes before winning a 9-8 decision, setting up his finals match with Roush.

LaJoie opened by defeating Chaz Tillman of Howell by decision, 8-7, and then defeated James Erickson of Belleville by a 7-6 decision. LaJoie then lost to Monroe's Carson Poupard by an 8-4 decision, and then lost to J.R. Maldoon of Novi by an 8-0 decision, before capturing fifth place in the 130-

pound class when Troy's Nick Best forfeited.

Wood started out with a win against Angelo Plouffe of Fraser, pinning Plouffe in 2:15. He then lost an 11-2 decision to Spencer Nadolsky of Hol-

land West Ottawa before winning his next two matches, defeating Temperance Bedford's Rick Nieman by a 10-6 decision and pinning Holt's Adam

Independence mulling \$28 million in construction

Deerhill realignment also discussed at meeting

The Independence Township Board of Trustees have a lot of information regarding possible township construction, but there are still multiple obstacles before a decision is reached.

"Right now we are still getting information in," Township Supervisor Dale Stuart said at the March 5 township meeting. "I suggest we have the topic on the agenda in each of the next meetings and discuss any new information we get."

Up for discussion are construction projects that could total \$28 million. Among the items are a new township hall, a senior center, a community center and renovations to Bay Court Park.

In order to put the item on the August ballot, the board must have all ballot language finished by May

15. That has some on the board concerned.

"I am concerned we are running out of time for the August ballot," Township Treasurer James Wenger said. "I think we need an awful lot of answers before we approach any kind of ballot language."

Among the items still needing to be decided by the board is how many of the projects to put on the ballot and whether to lump them together or have them separate on the ballot. Specifics such as where to build the projects and whether to combine a township hall with a school administrative building also need to be decided.

Board Trustee Daniel Kelly voiced concern with the lack of people coming out to the public hearings and returning the community input sheets regarding the community center. There have been approximately 300 input sheets returned.

"I want to see this thing succeed but I need to hear support in the community to spend their money on this project," Kelly said. "I have not seen a ground swell of support for this project."

Resident Susette Hart raised the question of

whether the board has received a ground swell of support for the new township hall. Stuart said studies and comments in the past show support for the township hall.

Also at the board meeting:

■ The board heard more residents complaints about the possible Deerhill construction of a church and school near I-75. The board needs to decide whether to recommend a realignment of Deerhill Drive with Big Lake Road at Dixie Highway.

Area residents are concerned the addition of the church and school will lead to more high speed traffic which they believe is already a problem in their neighborhood.

Stuart stated the Planning Commission believed their would not be an increase of traffic through the subdivision, although many in attendance did not believe that could be possible. The church will consists of an estimated 1,900 members.

The board tabled the issue since they did not have the traffic study in front of them.

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Results are in...

Residents feel Clarkston schools doing okay

It seems area residents rather like their Clarkston schools.

Results from a community survey conducted by the district in December were presented to the Board of Education at their March 11 meeting.

"Good things come to mind when people think about the Clarkston Community School District," Anita Banach, public relations coordinator and survey director, told board members. "They think of quality schools which provide sound educational programming. Most think the district is doing a good job preparing students for the future."

The telephone survey, which was conducted during the evenings of December 3-6 by trained survey callers, sought opinions on district strengths and weaknesses, sources of school information, the curriculum, school financing and more.

Respondents, registered voters 18 years or older, were randomly selected, Banach assured.

Sixty six percent of the population surveyed was female, 51 percent were parents of school-aged children and 53 percent have lived in the district 10 or less years. Seventy-four percent were Independence Township residents, while 21 percent were from Springfield Township. (Percentages may not add to 100 due to multiple responses or rounding.)

Results were examined according to parents (with school-aged children) and non parents (without school-aged children). And results were averaged together to obtain a general picture of what residents think about the district.

Banach said results produce a confidence level of 90 percent. Meaning, if the survey was conducted again, results would look almost identical, within a plus or minus of five percent.

"Respondents overwhelmingly agreed that the Clark-

ston Community School District offers a high quality education," she said. "Respondents also said that the district offers a well disciplined learning environment where students know what is expected of them."

Seventy percent said the district has high academic standards. Fifty-six percent said the district has "a vision for the future, while 57 percent said the district is results oriented.

On a grade level (A, B, C, D or Fail), 76 percent gave the district above average marks of either A or B; five percent higher than the rating obtained in the district's last community survey in 1987.

"It should be noted that district residents rated their schools a full 25 percentage points higher than the national A and B rating public schools received in the latest survey conducted by the Gallup organization," Banach said.

Eighty-four percent of parents polled gave the schools either an A or B.

It seems what people like best about Clarkston Community Schools is the quality of teachers and staff (25 percent), quality of curriculum/programs (11 percent) and facilities (10 percent). Eighteen percent could not respond to the question, and 25 percent of nonparents did not respond.

Seventy-four percent of those polled said the teaching staff is well qualified and 72 percent said teachers are enthusiastic about helping students learn. Seventy-three percent said their most recent contact with the schools was a positive experience.

When responding to what challenges the school district faces, people said number one, facilities and overcrowding by 29 percent. "This says to me the community is listening," Banach said.

Lack of financial supports, drugs/substance abuse and lack of discipline were also listed and ranged from five to seven percent each.

"It should be noted that 29-percent of respondents were unable to name a single problem facing the school district during this survey."

And where do residents get their information about the schools? Local newspapers, the school newsletter and their children were listed as major sources.

But Banach said, there is some bad news to come out of the survey.

Nearly three out of four residents do not know that Clarkston is one of the lowest funded districts in Oakland County. "This tells me people are still confused," she said. And most (69 percent) were not aware that Proposal A requires each public school district to seek voter approval of an 18-mill non-homestead property tax in order to receive full funding from the state.

Banach hopes to get a clearer word out on funding through the school newsletter.

The survey also asked a series of questions on ways to handle space needs and other future issues like grade configuration and scheduling.

Forty-three percent felt it "very important" to keep all elementary buildings at kindergarten through fifth grade, middle schools at sixth through eighth grade and high schools ninth through 12th.

However, the School Board recently made a recommendation to reconfigure the district as K-5, 6-7, 8-9 and 10-12 buildings.

But results also showed only 21 percent felt it "very important" to have ninth-graders located at the current high school. And 25 percent felt it "not very important," on a scale of one to five.

With results in, school officials now plan to compare what the community had to say with what their long-range planning and goals are.

Results will be shared with staff and it will later be determined if follow-up surveys are needed with specific groups like parents, students or others.

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Independence Library celebrates tenth birthday

Has it been a decade already? It sure has as the Independence Township Library is celebrating its 10th birthday the week of March 11-15.

The library has grown immensely in the last 10 years. They have gone from some empty shelves to bursting at the seams with items. When they first opened on March 15, 1992, the library was the home to 30,000 items. Library director Mollie Lynch now estimates the number has grown to between 70,000 to 75,000. Despite the growth, the library has added only two full time employees in the last 10 years, although their part-time help has increased.

"We have really grown and added some popular items to the library," Lynch said.

Among the collection that were not around when the library opened are DVDs and CDs. The collections of audio books and young adult fiction have expanded.

The library is also putting the finishing touches on a new computer lab which has 12 computers that will have Internet access.

"We are just ironing out the kinks and the room should be opening shortly," Lynch said.

The room was made possible with grants and the Friends of the Library. The Friends of the Library is an organization which supports the library with fundraising efforts. The group will be hosting a used book sale April 25-27 to help

The homepage also includes information on events and programs planned by the library as well as access to databases and the reference desk.

As one with some Irishness about me (there are Murphys and McDonalds on mom's side and great granddad John Joseph Jeremiah dropped the O in front of Rush when he landed in America, then he married a Ryan) I thought I had a pretty good grasp on Irish-Americanism. As my father and his father before, individually we've gone to great lengths to prove our Irishness by learning as much lore, mythology and trivia as our paddy brains will hold.

And wouldn't you know it, my wife of Polish descent one-upped me. "Did you know that on Beaver Island," she baited, "That on St. Patrick's Day the Irish get together and have a contest to see who can throw a frozen fish the farthest?"

My eyeglasses slipped down my nose a wee bit and I spied her over top them. "No dear, I wasn't aware of this. Where pray-tell, did you hear of such a thing?" "I read it in a newspaper," she said with self assurance.

"Then it must be true," I concluded aloud, but secretly I plotted and stewed. How could she know something about the Irish, I, Himself, did not? What was the world coming to? What had happened to my once razor sharp mind? Silently I began to plan. There had to be a way to ferret out the true meaning of Beaver Island's St. Patrick's Day, because I was damn sure they were not throwing frozen fishes. Come on, the Scots throw boulders and telephone poles and the Irish are just as manly as their tartan wearing cousins to the north.

So, faster than most folks can sing the first two verses to Danny Boy, I plopped down in front of the computer and punched in BEAVER ISLAND IRISH on an Internet search engine. I found some names and phone numbers and I called the little, six mile wide by 13 mile long island frozen in Lake Michigan.

I talked to Kathy Maudrie, "Yes, it is true," she said. "About 15 years ago some friends and I were sitting around and wanted to make St. Patrick's Day something more than just another day to sit in the bar."

Jesus, Joseph and Mary!
It's true!
"We came up with silly games," she continued. "We

used to frozen chicken bowl, but we don't do that anymore."

"But they still line up to see who can toss the whole frozen whitefish the farthest (men's and women's divisions, don't you know). Yep, and according to Liam Racine, owner, publisher, editor, and head bottle washer at the *Beaver Beacon*, there are two distinct groups of islanders who divide up for the tug-of-war competition in front of the Shamrock Bar.

"We divide by township. There's the Fish Chokers and the Hay Seeders," Liam said. The Fish Chokers represent town and those with ties to the fishing Irish and the Hay Seeders are those with ties to the farming Irish.

He also said something about *fish stomping*, but, I had already heard too much. I didn't want to know what the Beaver Island Irish were doing to fish with their feet. It's just a bad visual and I was starting to have a hankerin' for a tumbler of Irish Mist.

The festivities used to be at Holy Cross Catholic Church, but have since been moved to the afore mentioned Shamrock drinking establishment. It has grown from a gathering of island friends and family to something of a major tourist happening with folks coming from all over for the annual tossing of the fish.

The Irish have been the island's big cheeses since the 1800s. They colonized the island for fishing and lumbering, then were forced out by the Mormons. As the Mormon leader acquired more land and wives he decided to make himself King. His kingdom fell apart when he was shot and killed. The Mormons left the island and the Irish moved back and reigned supreme since.

Beaver Island, called America's Emerald Isle, has a twin — the isle of Arainn Mhor, off the coast of Donegal, Ireland. Many of the descendants of Beaver Island founders, the O'Donnells, McDonoughs, Gillespies and Gallaghers emigrated from Arainn Mhor. According to Steve West of the chamber of commerce (and the island's other news publication *The Norther Islander*), there are 550 year round residents, and 1,500 seasonal residents -- but no Beaver Island Fudge makers.


The more I heard, the more I realized -- *faith and begora* -- I want to go to Beaver Island with my family to camp in the summer and sans family next St. Patrick's Day!

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
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Springfield Planning Commission approves master plan

After taking into consideration the concerns of a couple property owners on Dixie Highway, the Springfield Township Planning Commission approved a new township master plan at its March 7 meeting.

At a public hearing in February, two concerns were raised that were addressed by the Planning Commission March 7.

One was regarding a property north of Davisburg Road in which the owner wanted the property used for intensive commercial use. The other instance was regarding Bordine's Nursery on Dixie Highway. Representatives from that business expressed their concerns about the front property being considered only residential.

In the first case, the Planning Commission ruled that the owners could not zone the property commer-

cial; instead, the property will remain planned residential. In the case of Bordine's Nursery, the commission ruled that the front portion of the property be zoned mixed use, while the rear portion would remain residential.

The master plan is the first one adopted by the township since 1992, according to Springfield Township Clerk Nancy Strole. She said the process of revising the plan began in November 1999 when the township held a visioning fair attended by approximately 150 residents. The fair addressed the issues of natural resources, recreation, business and commercial use, and amenities.

"It led to a series of focus groups and a series of meetings," she said. "We tried to frame goals and policies for the master plan."

She said the new master plan is essentially an extension of the one adopted ten years ago.

"The changes are not dramatic," Strole said. "The goals and policies build upon the goals that were incorporated in the 1992 master plan."

In February, the Planning Commission held a public hearing at the Hart Community Center on Davisburg Road. Approximately 45 people were on hand at that meeting, according to Strole. Dick Carlisle and Sally Elminger, representatives from the township's planning firm, Carlisle-Wortman Associates, were on hand to provide analysis to the commission and answer questions from residents.

At the March 7 meeting, the Planning Commission also approved a motion to recommend the township board approve the master plan at a future meeting, according to Strole. After board approval, Strole said the township will send the plan to the Oakland County Zoning Commission for advisory purposes.


Fundraiser rescheduled

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
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Cagers claim district title with win against Grand Blanc

Clarkston coach Dan Fife said Grand Blanc came ready to play, and also said the 15-point margin of victory wasn't a true indication of how the game went.



REGARDING

WATER SYSTEM REGULATIONS

At its meeting of February 19, 2002, the Township Board adopted an amendment to the Charter Township of Independence Ordinance Code, Chapter 20, Article II, to prohibit cross connections with the public water supply system, and, to create a Cross Connection Control Program. The following is a summary of the Ordinance Code amendments:

- Chapter 20, Article II, Section 20-16, is amended to add definitions of terms.
- Chapter 20, Article II, Section 20-21 is amended to delete the existing subsection (g) and re-letter the balance of the Section.
- Chapter 20, Article II, Section 20-24 is amended to add, a new subsection 20-24(d)(1) through (9) which prohibits cross connections, creates a Cross Connection Control Program to provide for inspection and re-inspection for unlawful cross connections, adopts the State Cross Connection Rules, gives Township inspectors the right to inspect water systems for unlawful cross connections, requires testing of back flow devices, and allows water service to be discontinued following notice for violations.
