Another false bomb threat found in Clarkston Schools

Clarkston Community Schools had to deal with another bomb threat last week.

This threat, which was written on a toilet paper dispenser in the boy's bathroom, occurred at Sashabaw Middle School on Tuesday, Feb. 25 at approximately 1 p.m. The threat indicated a bomb was set to go off on Friday, Feb. 28. This was the third such threat in the last three weeks for the school district.

"This seems to be a copy cat prank," Clarkston Community Schools Superintendent Dr. Al Roberts said. A similar situation occurred at Clarkston High School on Feb. 6 when a note was found written in a bathroom stating a bomb would go off on Feb. 18. That same week a similar threat was discovered in a bathroom at North Sashabaw Elementary.

"That was a fifth grader who had a brother at the high school and he was found with about a half hour and has been punished," Clarkston Community Schools Public Relations coordinator Anita Banach said.

School was in session on Friday, Feb. 28.

Lt. Dale LaBair of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department in Independence Township said the bomb threat was "much ado about nothing."

The student, who wrote the note which stated a bomb would go off on Friday, is a mentally handicapped child, LaBair said.

Based upon the handwriting, school staff quickly determined who the letter writer was.

"(The school staff) are satisfied this was a copy cat occurrence and his parents have been extremely cooperative," LaBair said. The boy has been referred to Clarkston Area Youth Assistance.

In instances of bomb threats, authorities at the sheriff's department look closely at varying factors

to determine its seriousness.

"We try to rate them to determine their credibility," LaBair said. "We don't outright dismiss any of them. We weigh the factors."

Factors like the age of the lead perpetrator, the location of the threat, the time of year, and more help police determine the threat's significance.

"If (the threat) was scribbled on a piece of paper with a pencil, you can bet you're not dealing with a terrorist," LeBair said.

If concluded the threat is real, dogs are called in to sniff out a bomb. In this case, a bomb dog was scheduled to visit the school when the threat was first received, but was cancelled once police determined the threat was false.

LaBair also said the sheriff's department tries to avoid overpublicizing an event of this sort to steer individuals away from copy cat acts.

Roberts said the schools always have the safety of the children in mind.

"I don't want to spell out our security procedures but we don't take any chances," Roberts said. "Every day we do everything we can to ensure the safety of our students."

Although the threat is a student prank, it is still in direct violation of the schools Zero Tolerance Policy regarding student safety.

"Not only does this create unnecessary fear in the schools but it is also very costly by nature. Both the time of the school's staff and the police department is wasted on these types of pranks," Roberts said.

In the letter to the parents, Roberts asked parents to take an active role in making sure their children know the consequences of these actions.

The letter stated, "I am asking that parents reinforce the importance of this (Zero Tolerance) Policy at home, and that you encourage your children to report any threats, rumors or suspicious behavior to school officials immediately. It is critical for students to understand that they can personally contribute to the existence of an atmosphere that is kind, respectful and secure."

Clarkston resident dies in house fire

The early morning flames of a devastating fire took the life of Clarkston resident Jeanie Louise (Weir) Moon, Saturday, March 1, at the age of 60.

Fire Marshal Greg Olrich of the Independence Township Fire Department said the call for a fire at 6314 Church St., near the intersection of Pear, came in at 6:13 a.m., but many in the neighborhood noted they had smelled smoke for 30 to 45 minutes prior to call for 911.

"It burnt for a long time," Olrich said of the 1960-built home.

As flames shot out the roof, shortly after the Fire Department arrived, the floor in one of the bedrooms collapsed into the basement.

"This added to the difficulty of extinguishing the fire, because we were fighting structural collapse," Olrich said, adding the cause of the fire has not yet been determined, but the fire did originate in the base-

Clarkston sets date to hire police chief

The Clarkston City Council has set a timetable to hire a new police chief.

At its Feb. 24 meeting, the council agreed to extend the term of Interim Police Chief Ernest Combs for an additional 90 days, and set the end of the 90-day period, at the end of May, as the deadline date for hiring a permanent police chief. The council unanimously approved the motion 6-0. Mayor Sharron Catallo was absent from the meeting.

Combs was appointed as interim chief for a 60-day period at the beginning of the year after former chief Paul Ormiston retired. He has expressed interest in becoming chief on a permanent basis.

According to Meyland, the council is still putting together a list of job specifications for the chief's position. "We still owe it to the community to advertise

and interview various candidates for the position, as well as put together a list of requirements," he said. "We have a very good person in place right now."

Although Councilman Walt Gamble initially expressed hesitation about setting the 90-day deadline, Meyland believed setting the deadline would push the council toward getting the job search started in earnest.

"I think that's a reasonable target," Meyland said.

In other news, the council rescheduled its Monday, March 10 meeting for Tuesday, March 11 at 7 p.m. It also approved a resolution drafted by the Clinton River Watershed Council which amended the definition of U.S. waters subject to the Clean Water Act to include all non-navigable tributaries, intermittent and ephemeral streams, waters that pass through man-made conveyances, and all wetlands whether or not there is a visible connection to surface waters.

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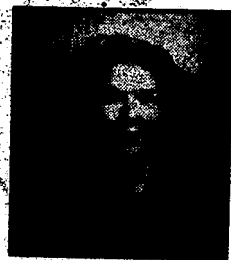

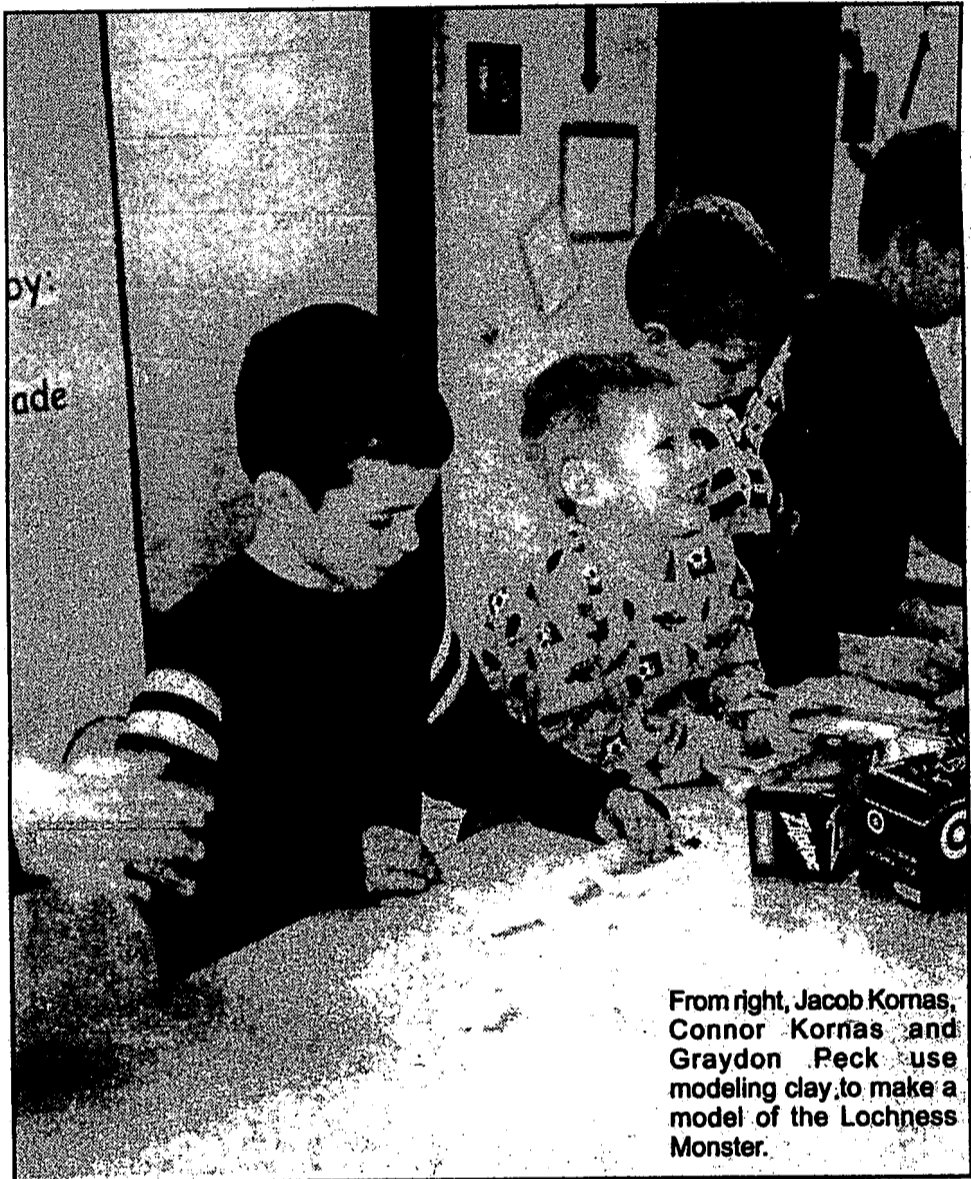
Clarkston Elementary students showcase detective skills

A group of local horse vaulters are looking to fly to the moon — or at least to a good showing at an upcoming expo.

The Blue Moon Vaulters, consisting of competitors from the Clarkston and Davisburg area, will be traveling to East Lansing March 7-9 for the Michigan State University Stallion Expo. The local team will demonstrate their talents along with the Agape Team from the southwestern Michigan area and the Victory Team from the Rockwood area.

Local students participating in the event include Kat Metzger (a regional unrated trot champion), Chris Broughton, Emily Vandermeer, Liz Stroh, Kristin Binning, Theresa Gorecki and Laura Noveck. The team is coached by Karen Rach, who has been involved with vaulting as a participant and coach since 1979.

According to Rach, the appeal of vaulting is its blending of different disciplines. "It has so many elements that I love," she said. "It has dancing, and it has horses and gymnastics. It has all these elements in one sport. I enjoy it for that reason."

Metzger, a senior at Clarkston High School who will be attending Michigan State University next year and hopes to become a horse trainer, has been involved with vaulting for about three-four years. "I like being able to do gymnastics on horses," she said. "It's fun."

Another member of the Blue Moon Vaulters, Holly High School freshman Theresa Gorecki, has been vaulting for about three years. Her friend Metzger was a big influence in her getting involved with the sport.

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School officials to set voting matters at March 10 meeting

The Clarkston Community Schools Board of Education will set matters to be voted upon for the June 9 ballot at the upcoming meeting, Monday, March 10.

Anita Banach, director of communications and marketing, said this will most likely include:

- wording for the \$83 million bond proposal.

For the past two years, board members have planned ways to combat student overcrowding, particularly at the high school.

To accomplish this, there will be a new grade con-

figuration going in to place in 2005-06. Elementary students will shift to even out the populations at the seven schools; all sixth and seventh graders will be housed on the Sashabaw Middle School site; all district eighth and ninth graders will move to the Clarkston Middle School site; and 10th through 12th graders will be at the high school.

Voters can expect the proposal to include building additions, renovations and repairs within the district to accommodate.

- a non-homestead millage renewal.

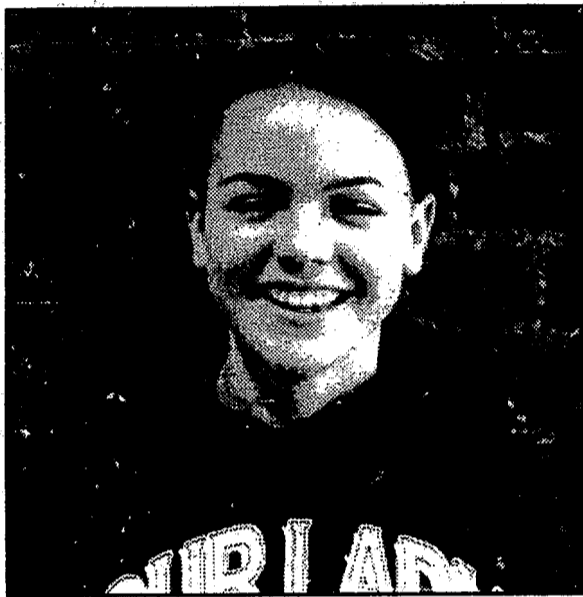
On Dec. 31, 2002, two millages -- one for 3 mills, another for 1.5 mills -- expired. A non-renewal of these millages would result in a loss of funds for the district.

At the Feb. 24 meeting, the board consensus was to go for a one-year renewal of 4.5 mills on an annual basis.

• two open seats for the Board of Education. The four-year terms are currently filled by Treasurer Janet Thomas and President Kurt Shanks.

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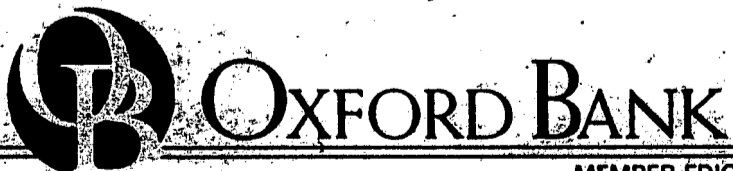

"Because Americans are not a particular people from a particular place. They are the embodiment of the human spirit of freedom. Everyone who holds to that spirit, everywhere, is an American."

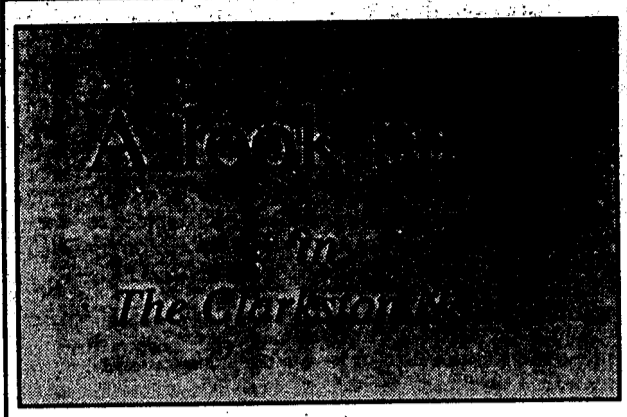

15 YEARS AGO (1988)

• The conflicts Monday night were man against fish, man against neighbor and man against the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR). More than 75 angry Lake Oakland residents voiced opposition Feb. 29 to plans to add fish spawning areas of stone, concrete and wood to the lake, replacing the spawning areas that were damaged last fall when stumps were removed to make boating safer.

• After approving \$1.7 million in cuts for the 1988-89 school year, the Clarkston board of education heard "Plan B," a report on what could happen if voters okay a 5.42 mill tax increase, on the June ballot, for operational purposes. Although board members asked several questions at Monday night's special meeting, no changes were made to "Plan A," the label given the proposed cuts by the administration when the plan was introduced in January. The board approved the cuts in a 5-0 vote.

• Notices were sent last Friday about assessed value changes, and by Monday afternoon, David Kramer had already received a few phone calls. The assessed valuations for most neighborhoods in Independence Township and the Village of Clarkston increased by less than 4.5 percent, or \$31,439,200 total, over last year, Kramer said.

25 YEARS AGO (1978)

• Until recently Geoffrey C. Bowman was an active builder in the Orion-Independence area. After Bowman disappeared from his Lake Orion business office - and later was traced to a northern Michigan town by police - as many as eight homeowners were left with partially completed homes while workmen on the sites and building suppliers were not paid for work completed.

• The Clarkston Village Council is appealing to the Oakland County Road Commission for financial aid in altering the corner of White Lake Road, Holcomb and Depot. In a letter to Oakland County Road Commissioner John Gnau, Village President Keith Hallman said traffic engineers have assessed the job of widening and marking the area in the amount of \$33,000.

• Village President Keith Hallman has announced he will become marketing consultant for the Marc Alan development firm, the owners of the Clarkston Mills shopping project.

50 YEARS AGO (1953)

• The Student Council of the Clarkston Community Schools believes that the Clarkston Athletic Field should be lighted for night games and has decided to start some action to secure them. As it is now and has been for some time high school football games and baseball games are mostly played at night. Because Clarkston does not have a lighted field most of the games are played away from home.

• On Wednesday evening of last week the Cedar Lodge, No. 60-F & A.M. held its annual Past Master's Banquet in the Masonic Temple. This very lovely occasion honored the lodge's youngest Past Master, Lloyd L. Anderson. Following the invocation by the Reverent Robert M. Atkins, a delicious dinner was served.

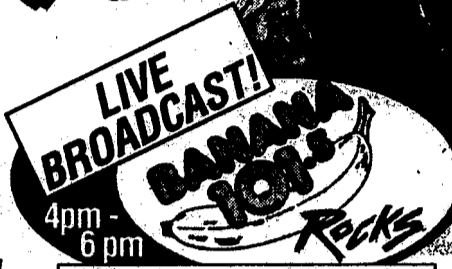

The Clarkston volleyball team let the district title get away from them last year — but they made sure history didn't repeat itself this year.

nated the Wolves from the state playoffs the past three seasons.

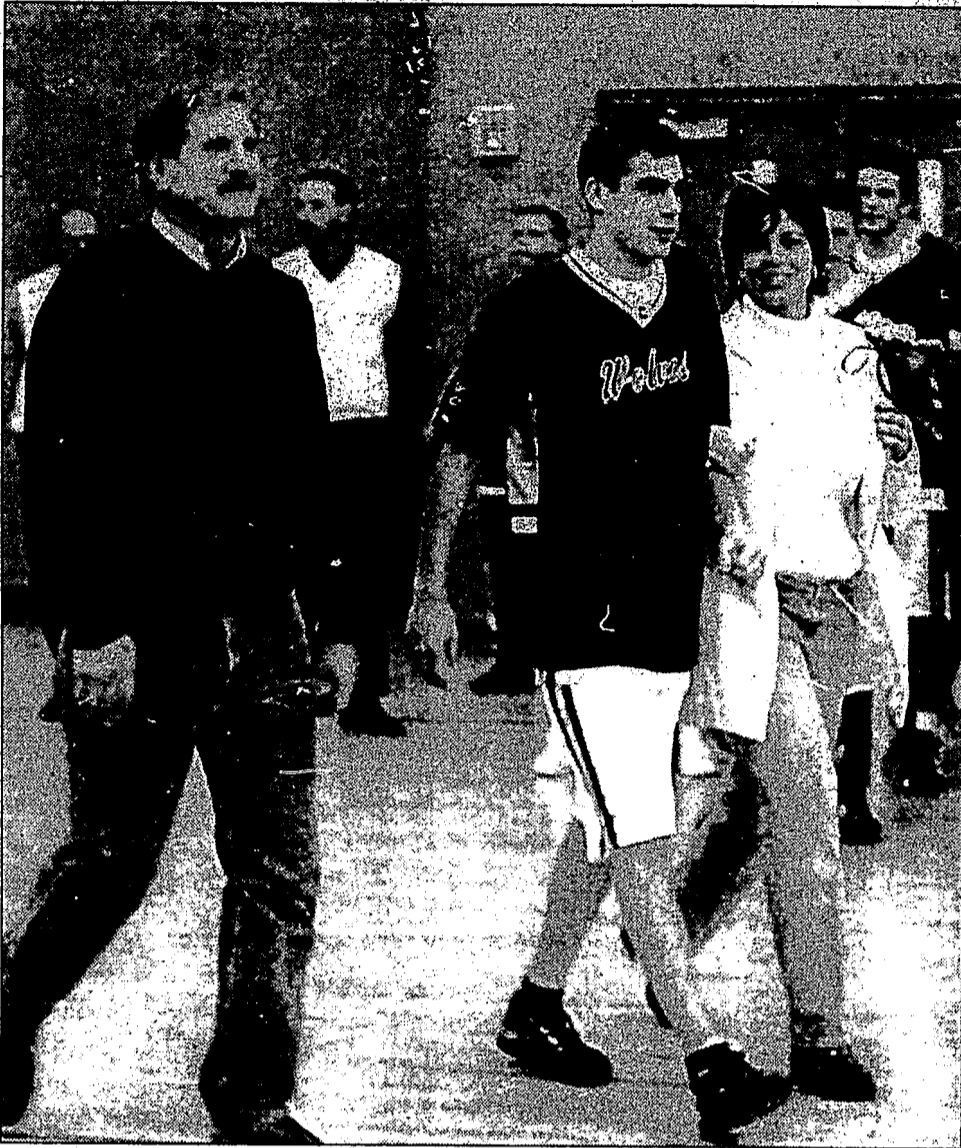

Wolves get past Lapeer East 59-48, will face Kettering in semis

Clarkston's basketball team had a tall task Monday, but they were up to the challenge.

The Wolves clamped down on Lapeer East's Jake Long, who stands 6-7 and weighs 305 pounds, and held off the Eagles 59-48 in their district opener at Oxford.

Clarkston (13-8) advances to take on Waterford Kettering in the district semifinals at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday. The winner of that game will take on the winner of the Waterford Mott-Brandon district semifinal for the district title at 7 p.m. Friday. Lapeer East finished their season at 15-6.

The Wolves started off hot, outscoring the Eagles 19-6 in the first quarter. Clarkston continued their torrid pace at the beginning of the second quarter, but Coach Dan Fife said the team started hurrying things a little too much toward the end of the half, although Clarkston still took a 34-16 lead at the half.

"We played very well for about 14 minutes, but toward the end of the second quarter, we started rushing things," Fife said. "The game started to get a little physical."

The teams battled to a virtual standstill in the third quarter, as the Eagles outscored the Wolves 11-10 in the period, with Clarkston maintaining a 44-27 lead at the end of the period.

The Eagles started nibbling at the Wolves' lead in the fourth quarter, narrowing Clarkston's lead to seven points with about two minutes to go. However, the Wolves made 15-of-20 free throws in the fourth period to seal the win.

According to Fife, the Wolves need to learn to keep their composure a little better when dealing with a physical team like the Eagles.

"We have to learn to separate ourselves from all those outside forces," he said.

Junior Mark Thornberry buried three three-pointers on his way to leading the Wolves with 18 points. Sophomore Robbie Clark added 10 for Clarkston.

Reed caps off CHS swimming career in style

Clarkston High School senior Dan Reed gave the Wolves' boys swimming fans one more sterling performance before riding into the sunset.

At the Oakland Activities Association Division I meet Feb. 19-21 in Lake Orion, Reed made the all-league team, set three individual school records and was part of the 200 yard freestyle relay team and 200 yard medley relay team which set two more school records.

The Wolves finished fifth overall at the meet with a total of 253 points. West Bloomfield took first place with a total of 344 points, followed by Birmingham Seaholm with 333 points and Lake Orion with 291.5 points.

Clarkston coach Kenwyn Chock noted the team's finish indicates the program, which just concluded its fourth year, still has room for improvement. "It just shows we have a good dual meet team, but when it came to the championship meet, we didn't do very well," she said.

Reed's three individual school records were in the 200 yard individual medley (2:08.9, good for fifth place overall), 50 yard freestyle and 100 yard freestyle (50.27, second). In addition, the 200 yard freestyle relay team of Reed, senior Derek LaHousse, junior Nick Riegel and senior Louis Seaman set a new school record (1:34.34, third) and the 200 yard medley relay team of senior Troy Quantz, senior Jeff Driscoll, Derek LaHousse and Reed also set a school mark.

Other Clarkston swimmers placing in the top ten in their events at the meet were junior Greyson LaHousse (fifth in diving with 270.15 points), junior Bobby Johnson (sixth, diving, 269.7), Nick Riegel (fifth, 100 yard butterfly, 59.14), Derek LaHousse (sixth, 100 yard butterfly, 59.25), senior Troy Quantz (fourth, 100 yard backstroke, 1:00.06); senior Nick Curdy (sixth, 100

yard breaststroke, 1:06.98) and the 400 yard freestyle relay team of Nick Riegel, freshman Ryan Kurrle, Quantz and Seaman (seventh, 3:38.29).

Chock hopes next year will be the year the Wolves qualify a swimmer for the state meet. The Wolves can expect to see several new faces on the team when the

2003-04 season hits.

"We're definitely reloading," she said. "We lost six seniors, but we're definitely looking for some good freshmen. I'm hoping we can get a swimmer in states next year."

Gaines is the daughter of Janet and Glen Gaines of Clarkston, and has one brother, Jake, 19.

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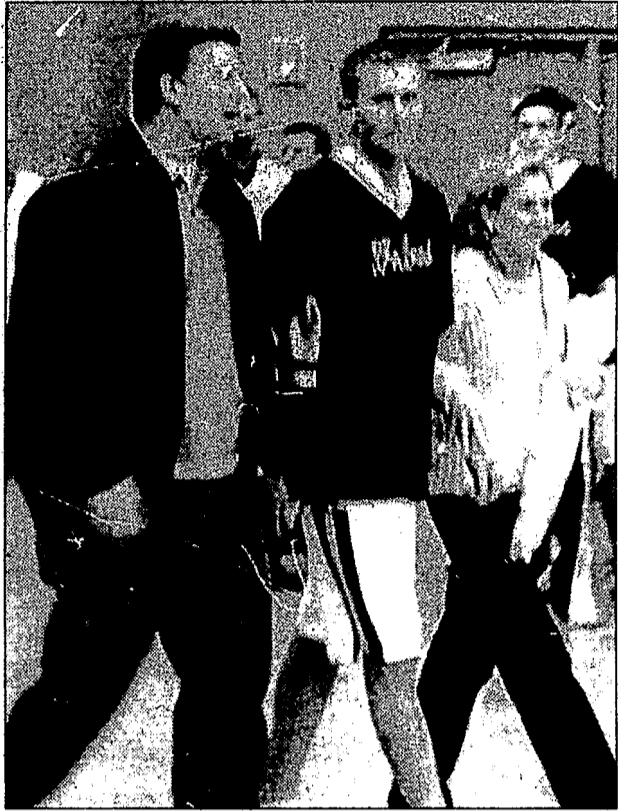

A group of Parke Lake residents may soon be officially joining forces to address lake concerns.

An informational meeting to discuss the possibility of lake residents forming a lake board will be held Thursday, March 20 at Independence Township Fire Station #1.

"We're looking to see if people who live in Parke Lake and those who live around Parke Lake are interested in forming a lake association," Parke Lake resident Dave McCarty said. "It's just an informational meeting. If we do have interest, we'll see what financial resources are out there."

The March 20 meeting is the second in as many months for lake residents. On Feb. 3, about 40 lake residents voiced their concern to a pipe being built across their property that would result in untreated storm water being filtered from Clarkston Road directly into Parke Lake.

At the Feb. 10 City Council meeting, Gary Tressel of Hubbell, Roth and Clark, the city's engineering firm, announced HRC would modify its plan for the water pipe east of Main Street on Clarkston Road, eliminating a piece of the pipe lying underground on Clarkston Road.

ment.

Unfortunately, the Fire Department was unable to find any working smoke detectors in the home. In fact, Olrich said one did not have a battery installed and an unopened package of smoke detectors was found as well.

Using this tragedy as an example, he stresses the importance of having an adequate number of working smoke detectors in a home.

Born May 25, 1943, Moon was the daughter of the late Rev. Dr. Samuel Carson Weir and the late Louise Helen (Beach) Weir. Her father was, for many years, pastor of the Littlefield Presbyterian Church in Dearborn. Her mother taught school.

After graduation from Fordson High School in 1960, Moon attended Muskingum College where she earned a B.A. in Home Economics. She later earned her Masters Degree from Eastern Michigan University.

Like her mother, Moon was a teacher. She began her career in the Dearborn Public Schools and, following her marriage in 1966, moved to Clarkston and began her long association with the Waterford Public Schools.

At the time of her death she taught a variety of subjects at Waterford Kettering High School where she also ran the child care program and worked with young mothers and teens at risk.

Moon served as the director of worship at White Lake Presbyterian Church where she chaired the worship committee and was an Elder. She had for-

merly been an active member of the Lakeland Presbyterian Church.

In addition to her professional and religious life, Moon was an avid amateur breeder and exhibitor of show dogs and was a member of the Michigan Humane Society. She would often pick up stray dogs, nurse them back to health and find good homes for them.

Two of Moon's dogs as well as two cats were found dead from the fire, Olrich said. Another of Moon's cats has not yet been found.

She loved plants and flowers, antiques, and golf and played at the Clarkston Golf Club, Highland Hills, Heather Highlands and elsewhere. She loved to read and had a broad range of interests and was, in the words of a dear friend, "a very wise woman."

Moon is survived by her son, Jonathon Arthur Moon of Waterford; her former spouse, Richard Moon; a sister Ms. Janet Beth Weir of Detroit; her maternal uncle and aunt, Dr. Eugene H. and Ruby B. Beach of Silver Spring, MD; many cousins and loving friends who join her family in mourning her passing.

Funeral Services are Thursday, March 6, at 2 p.m. at White Lake Presbyterian Church, 4805 E. Highland Road, White Lake. The Rev. Deborah Kerr will officiate. Burial will follow in Highland Cemetery.

Pappas was instructed to obtain costs estimates from the Township D.P.W. who uses a lift to hang the banners and take them down. This would give the Council an idea on permit costs, if any.

Scott Meyland will fill in on the evening Board of Review meetings as there is a vacancy to be filled.

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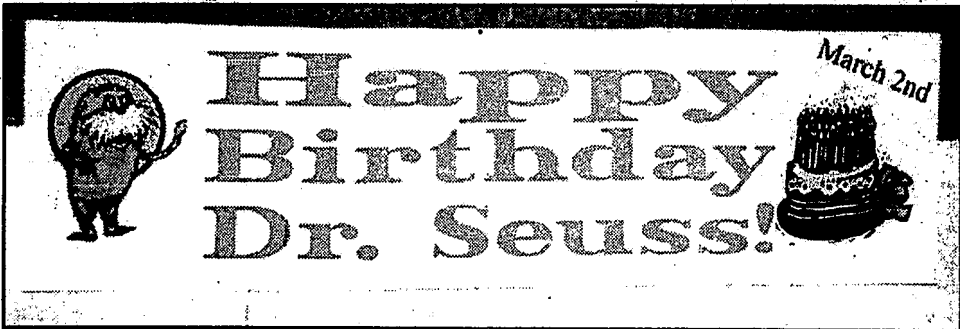
