Storm takes local's life

Springfield Township woman's generator fumes blamed

As local residents battled power outages and winter storms this weekend, one longtime Springfield Township woman became victim to its effects.

Jeannie Marie Snyder, 75, was found dead in her enclosed garage at her Davisburg Road home Sunday, April 6 presumably from carbon monoxide poisoning from her generator, Sgt. Frank Schipani of the Oakland County Sheriff's Department in Springfield Township said.

A final report from the medical examiner has not yet been released. But at the time of the incident, the medical examiner felt the death occurred 14 to 18 hours prior to Snyder being found.

Snyder's daughter and son-in-law found her at approximately 4:15 p.m. Sunday, lying near her vehicle face up with a gas can cap still in her right hand. The couple last saw Snyder the night before after making sure her generator was filled with gas.

Police reports noted there was a strong odor of carbon monoxide exhaust in the air where Snyder's generator and three gas cans stood.

Schipani said when using a generator, kerosene or propane heater, make sure they are kept in a well-ventilated area.

"Watch the direction of the wind, so the fumes are not blowing into the house," he said. "Buy a carbon monoxide detector. And watch for signs of poisoning—redness, tired, and headaches. Seek medical treatment no matter how minor the symptoms."

Boredom leads to robberies?

Admitting to boredom and lack of activity in Clarkston, four men compensated by committing a string of robberies and now sit in jail because of top-notch police work, according to local authorities.

Mark Andrew Lyyski, 19, David Thomas McDade, 18, and Bradley Moore, 19, all of Clarkston, along with Justin Ross Spicer, 19, of Rochester were arraigned Monday, March 31 at the 52nd District Court in Clarkston on robberies which occurred in Independence and Springfield townships.

All four will appear before Judge Dana Fortinberry Monday, April 14 at 1 p.m. for a preliminary exam.

Lyyski, who received a \$400,000 bond, is being charged with four counts of breaking and entering with intent, four counts of larceny in building, one count of larceny from a person, one count armed robbery, one count malicious destruction of property and one count of no operator's license on his person.

McDade, who remains in jail on a \$375,000 bond, received the same charges, minus the no operator's license charge.

Spicer, given a \$50,000 bond, is charged with two counts of breaking and entering with intent, two counts



Artists leave their mark on school wall

They may be going on to life in high school next year, but 10 Sashabaw Middle School eighth graders are leaving behind a special gift students after them will enjoy for years to come.

David Clements, Ruth Wang, Chris Wagner, Austin Guzman, Valentin Bragan, Rachael Connolly, Kristin Jantz, Nicole Greene, Stephanie Gross and Chelsey Coburn are lending their artistic talents to the creation of a climbing wall in the school gymnasium.

Physical education teacher Joe Palace came up with the idea of installing a climbing wall, a new trend spreading through schools around the country.

Palace approached art teacher Sue Cassidy about having students design and paint the 60 feet long by 10 feet high backdrop.

"It's a neat idea," Cassidy said. "We're (SMS faculty) always talking about working together with other classes on projects. This was a good opportunity to do that."

Cassidy handpicked the students she wanted to work on the climbing wall. "I chose students who I thought were capable of doing this on a daily basis."

The students take fifth hour every day to work, and have only a few more weeks to complete the project before the climbing wall is debuted at Expo Night Wednesday, May 14 from 7-9 p.m.,

where students all throughout SMS can showcase their work for parents and the public to enjoy.

"They're doing a great job. I tried to impress on them to do a really good job," she said. "They're a good bunch of kids, I trust them."

Before beginning in the gym, the students took time in the classroom to brainstorm ideas. One of the students, Ruth Wang, put on the leadership hat and spearheaded the final look of the mural.

"She is a spectacular artist," Cassidy said. "She has been adding things like shading to make it look real. She's fantastic."

When the students were set on their design, they took to the gym to freehand the picturesque scene on the wall, and are currently busy painting trees, mountains, waterfalls, and, of course, a cougar, the school mascot.

None of the students have ever worked on a project of this magnitude before.

New ordinance revamps cable line fee collections

The "wired world" has led to a need for a new ordinance to standardize collection of fees from telephone, cable and broadband Internet companies.

The Independence Township Board last week approved first reading of an ordinance that will comply with the state's Metropolitan Extension Telecommunications Right-of-Way Oversight Act.

If approved on second reading, the new ordinance would have future cable installers pay a fee to what is being called the "Metro Authority," which will then distribute funds among participating cities, villages and townships.

The current system requires anyone wishing to install cable along a public right-of-way to seek per-

mission and pay fees to the individual municipality. Township attorney Steve Joppich said the increase in companies offering telecommunications services, combined with varying fee structures, have led to lawsuits against some local governments.

"From the municipalities' standpoint, we were looking for what we now refer to as 'safe harbor' from these types of lawsuits," Joppich said, "and the industry is looking for the 'level playing field.'"

Cable and telephone companies were required to seek township board approval, but the ordinance delegates that task to the township clerk. Joppich said that is because a 60-day approval window has been shortened to 45 days.

"There's nothing in the [state] act that says you cannot come to the township board," Joppich said, "but

with the 45-day requirement, that might not be practical."

Clerk Joan McCrary assured trustees that all legal requirements will be met.

"These will go through the normal channels," McCrary said. "We just won't have to wait for a board meeting when everything's already been examined."

Joppich said the new authority will pay the township a maintenance fee of 2 cents per lineal foot in the first five months under the new system, then 5 cents per lineal foot in the future.

Treasurer James Wenger questioned the formula that pays 75 percent of authority-collected fees to cities and villages and 25 percent to townships.

"We have more lineal feet in townships in the state of Michigan, yet it looks like disbursement might be more saturated to cities and villages," Wenger said.

"It is skewed toward a larger segment of the populace," Joppich said, speculating that it could be because state officials believe there are fewer streets and roads in township areas.

Other concerns included possible federal legislation that could undermine the intent of the state act. Joppich included suggested letters to be used by township officials to lobby federal legislators against interference.

There will be some additional accounting work required if the ordinance is adopted. The state act requires municipalities to refund — to the new authority — maintenance fees paid by cable line installers after Nov. 1, 2002. Joppich suggested the township government send letters to all telecommunications companies on record in the state just to ensure that all have a chance to make a claim against such fees.

"In implementing this, there are a number of things that have to be done," Joppich said. "It's better to be in compliance because we don't know what's going to happen in the future."

Township briefs

In other news from the Tuesday, April 1 meeting of the Independence Township Board of Trustees:

- The board began using a "consent agenda" as part of their regular proceedings. The consent agenda will contain minutes of previous meetings, simple resolutions and second reading of ordinances previously adopted unanimously on first reading.

The board will vote to approve all items on the consent agenda with one motion, but any trustee may move a specific item to the regular agenda if he believes discussion is needed.

Supervisor Dale Stuart said other local governments have used the consent agenda as a way to streamline their meetings.

- The board approved spending \$4,100 annually for the next five years to allow the Independence

Township Fire Department to join the Oakland County Fire Records Management System.

The money will be used to connect all three fire stations to the county's central records system via a T-1 computer line. Fire Chief Steve Ronk said this will allow for standardized reports and first-time data-collection for emergency medical services.

- The board approved a \$29,700 contract (over three years) with Bloomfield Hills-based Hyrdo Designs Inc. The firm will conduct inspections of township businesses to ensure adequate controls to prevent backflow of sanitary sewers into storm sewers.

- The board approved Supervisor Dale Stuart's recommendation to appoint Kathryn M. Caruso to the Independence Township Planning Commission, filling a vacancy created by the resignation of Lisa Frazier.



Trustees disagree on proposed DPW car wash

Independence Township will pay DesRosiers Architects \$5,700 to design an addition to the Department of Public Works complex, but officials do not agree on how much will actually be built.

DPW Director Linda Richardson proposed an estimated \$810,700 worth of additions and renovations, but the

Township Board on Tuesday, April 1 voted for drawings for a scaled back proposal with an estimated cost of \$442,000, plus design for vehicle washing equipment that could cost an additional \$150,000.

The latter line item led to disagreement among trustees — and a split vote. Treasurer James Wenger and Trustee David Wagner voted no on the motion to hire the architect.

"I'm the one who pushed the car wash a couple months ago," Wagner said, "but looking at \$150,000, I don't know."

"I'm not sure I understand all of the needs yet," Wenger said.

Richardson attempted to explain those needs, noting that Facilities and Maintenance Director Dave Belcher had proposed a new building for his department's vehicles and equipment.

"We kicked around a few ideas on a separate building," Richardson said in a memo to the board, "but to get the most bang for the buck, the joint consensus was to merge the two departments into one building."

Facilities and management equipment is currently stored at Clintonwood Park, and Richardson said current vehicle storage at the DPW garage is tight, with one parking space designated as a wash area.

The proposal approved for drawings includes a 110-by-64-foot garage, a 20-by-60-foot wash bay, septic system improvements and new paving.

"We have tried to be very frugal with our needs," Richardson said, "with the only possible frill being a car wash to service the main fleet of vehicles owned by the township."

Richardson's presentation included that DPW employees (whose wages with benefits average \$30 an hour) currently spend an average of 30 minutes hand-washing each of the township's 35 vehicles, with an annual cost of \$28,000. Supervisor Dale Stuart said the wash area and equipment would be a good investment, saving time and money when compared with either hand-washing or driving township vehicles to a commer-

cial car wash.

"We're going to pay the \$150,000 for the car wash one way or the other," Stuart said.

Trustees also debated the procedure used to determine what proposal to approve. Richardson and Belcher made their best guess as to cost estimates, but until architects produce technical drawings, it is impossible to secure cost estimates from building contractors.

"We have to make some determination of what we're willing to do and what we're not willing to do," Stuart said.

"That's the problem, the chicken or the egg," Wenger said.

Clerk Joan McCrary, who made the motion to secure drawings, said the move does not mean everything proposed will become reality.

"I don't think that, because of this motion, we're approving the building right now," she said. "We are approving having the drawings done and a cost estimate that goes along with the drawing."

Design options requested but not approved include an expansion of the main office area (including an enlarged break-training-lunch room, men's toilet and locker and water-sewer department shop area).



15 YEARS AGO (1988)

- On the June 13 ballot, Clarkston school district voters will be asked to approve 5.5 mills for operational purposes and a \$5.2 million bond for repairs to existing buildings. The board of education unanimously approved the ballot questions at Monday night's meeting. The 5.5 mills are a bit higher than the 5.42 mills originally proposed for the restoration plan if voters approve the millage request.

- Developers of Lancaster Lakes Apartments filed a lawsuit last week seeking permission to begin construction of the second phase of the project on Dixie Highway in Independence Township. In July, the planning commission granted conditional approval, with the stipulation that building could not begin until construction starts on the Maybee Road extension or the Dixie Highway widening in front of the apartment, whichever came first.

- For the first time since 1986, the girls soccer team at Clarkston High School will play on the football field. The team played all of its home games on the rocky field at Sashabaw Junior High School last season while the track was repaired at CHS. When informed the team would once again have to call Sashabaw its home, the coach and players balked.

25 YEARS AGO (1978)

- Independence Township voters will elect two more trustees along with other township officers this fall, as far as Township Attorney Richard Campbell is concerned. A unanimous 28-person vote at the April 1 annual township meeting changed the number of trustees on the township board to four, increasing the board's size to seven members.

- Five people have filed to run for the spot David K. Leak is vacating on the Clarkston Board of Education. Those who filed are Michael Barron, Rockwood Bullard III, Mary Jane Chaustowich, Marc Cooper and Floyd Smith. Monday was the deadline of filing nomination petitions for the seven-member board. The election will be June 12.

- Clarkston Village President Keith Hallman has received approval and a pledge of \$11,000 from the Oakland County Road Commission to improve the White Lake Road-Holcomb Street-Depot Road intersection. In a letter to Hallman, Managing Director John Gruba said the road commission approves of the road improvement plan by Reid, Cool and Mischalski.



One deputy parked and waited, and quickly found the Monte Carlo as it drove past. The car, with Lyyski and McDade inside, was stopped on Ranch Estates. Both men did not have their driver's licenses with them.

A search of the vehicle revealed two backpacks with various tools inside. In the bags and inside the car were wire cutters, pliers, a box cutter, crowbars, a drill, black clothing such as sweatpants, sweatshirts, ski masks and gloves as well as alcohol and cigarettes, matching that which was stolen from Lakeview.

During an interview, Lyyski said he, McDade and Spicer took turns breaking into the power box outside the store. Then he and McDade used crowbars to Lakeview. They unplugged the ATM machine, but it was bolted down and too heavy to get out of the store, he said, adding they grabbed cigarettes and liquor and left in a car Spicer drove.

Spicer was picked up later that night, since McDade and Lyyski had driven him to his girlfriend's house in Rochester.

While in custody, Lyyski, McDade and Spicer admitted to several other robberies including:

•Kim's Convenience Store in Springfield Township on March 11. Lyyski, McDade, and Moore entered the store, where two employees were present, carrying weapons. Lyyski carried a broken hockey stick, McDade a crowbar, and Moore a smaller crowbar. They took a cashbox which contained only \$50 in cash and coins.

•a Family Video employee while she made a midnight deposit in the Clarkston State Bank drop box at Farmer Jack on Sashabaw on March 8. Only Lyyski and McDade were involved. McDade said they threw the money bag out the car window and the checks were either thrown out the window as well or burned.

•Pro Pizza in Springfield Township on March 2. Lyyski, Spicer and McDade, a former employee of Pro Pizza, pried open the back door to gain entry and pried open a safe to steal \$2,500.

•Rage Sports Store on Pelton and Metro Trends in Waterford Township on Dec. 4. Lyyski and McDade used rocks to break the glass front doors to gain entry at both stores. Two snowboards were stolen from Rage, and 15 snowboards from Metro Trends. The snowboards were

Wed., April 9, 2003 The Clarkston (MI) News 9 A found in the attic at Lyyski's parents' home.

•Town and Country Bike in Waterford Township in August where three bicycles were stolen. McDade, Spicer and another man, whose name is not being released by police, were involved. This case is still pending.

In a written statement McDade apologized for his actions. "I am sorry...It is clear that I have done these things and should pay. I come from a well raised church family and I just want to let you people know that I will do what is in my power to make up what was lost or in this case stolen. There is not much I can say, but please forgive me if possible. I am an 18-year-old kid who has made very bad decisions in my life. I regret it."

Spicer also apologized in his statement and said he "would take it back in a heart beat." Lyyski refused a written statement. DeRosia declined to comment on the sincerity of the apologies.

Lt. Dale LaBair of OCSID Independence Township sub-station said the deputies and detectives involved in the capture of these men did outstanding work.

"This is nothing but first class police work. There was nothing lucky about it. It wasn't a fluke (they found them). Just top notch police work."

Team Michigan will participate in a showcase April 16-20 in Chicago. There will be teams from all over the country including California, Florida and New York. This is a great place for players to get discovered.


"A lot of college and junior teams will be watch-

Yes. Just let your advisor know what other work you would like done so that he or she can make the necessary arrangement.


