Schools hike salaries

Even before the results of the school election were known, the Clarkston Board of Education voted Monday, June 9 to raise salaries for all employee

In all categories, employees will re-

ceive an increase of at least 2 percent in the 2003-2004 school year. Raises for the following deyear, pending on employee classification, will depend on whether there is an in-

crease in the state's per pupil foundation grant.

Most employee groups will have a new option for health coverage plans in either 2003 or 2004.

Cafeteria workers, managers and drivers have no salary increase slated for 2004-2005, but will receive an additional paid day off when school is not in

In ratifying the contracts, officials cited "financial constraints" as a challenge in negotiations, but they gave credit to union representatives for reaching the agreements.

"It has been a lot of work and cooperation with employee groups and administration," Board President Kurt Shanks said. "We all wish we could have a bottomless pit to be able to afford

Superintendent Al Roberts called the agreements, "fair, reasonable and competitive."

With the contracts ratified, the board must now include the new salary rates into the budget for the new fiscal year, which begins July 1.

Officials announced that the annual "truth-in-taxation" hearing will be at 6 p.m. Monday, July 23 at the district administration building.

The hearing, required by law when there is a possibility of tax revenues increasing past the rate of increase in local property values, will precede the regular board meeting, at which a proposed budget for 2003-2004 will be dis-

Clarkston budget discussed

The City of the Village of Clarkston council reviewed next year's proposed budget, which brought citizens to the meeting to voice concerns of a high millage

The council held a public hearing at their June 10 meeting regarding the 2004 proposed budget, which shows total funds available at \$700,672 and a millage rate of

The hearing lasted for approximately one hour, and two citizens were in attendance to voice con-

Carol Eberhardt, a 22-year Clarkston resident and real estate agent, told council members she felt the city's millage rate, at 13 mills, was having a negative effect on property sales. Resident Steve Wylie agreed the millage rate was too high, and said he hoped council members would consider lowering

In defense of the millage rate, City Attorney Thomas Ryan noted the largest portion of city taxes are for school and county taxes. Ryan, as well as council members, said factors like the state of the economy as well as the prestige of living in Clarkston, could account for slumping home sales.

In regards to the budget, Eberhardt did not have any suggestions on where the council could Wylie thought make cuts. outsourcing for lawn service of Depot Park could save the city money, and cutting portions of the police department budget which is the most expensive aspect of the city's budget proposed at \$228,450.

Councilman Dave Savage said, "We're really watching costs. There's not a lot of trimming we could do."

Councilman Scott Meyland said, "We don't just do what we did last year. We regularly look at the big scale things and will continue to do

The 2004 proposed budget will be up for action at the next meeting,

Stakoe supports election legislation

Secretary of State Terri Lynn Land and a bipartisan group of state legislators, including Rep. John Stakoe, unveiled a major election reform initiative to increase voter turnout and save taxpayers dollars by limiting the number of election days in Michigan.

"These common-sense reforms will improve voter participation, save taxpayer money and put all elections in the hands of trained election officials," Stakoe said. "The integrity of the voting process is of utmost importance to voters and the consistency created by the change will give voters a set of dates they can rely on.'

Stakoe's bill sets qualifications and other requirements for school board elections, such as: how vacancies are to be filled; how to file for candidacy; how canvassing, recounts or recalls of elections take place; and how to hold special elections on school board or ballot questions.

This bill also recognizes the "school board election coordinator" position to conduct school elections and allows candidates to pay a filing fee instead of submitting nominating petitions.

He was the only Michigan advertising executive with that distinction.

"I think it is outstanding that this event has reached its ninth year," event chair Chuck Fortinberry said. "My father would be proud that so many generous people show up in his honor to support a worthy cause like Children's Leukemia Foundation of Michigan."

A highlight of this year's event is a raffle for a Las Vegas golf getaway, which includes airfare for two, three days/two nights at Luxor Hotel and golf for two at a fantastic course.

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Acting Clarkston police chief gets permanent job

Interim City of the Village of Clarkston Police Chief Ernest Combs was named the permanent chief at the June 10 City Council meeting.

"I'm elated, absolutely," Combs said, who replaces Chief Paul Ormiston, who retired to become a flight attendant and in-flight security instructor with Spirit Air-

"It's tough shoes to fill. He was wellliked and successful in the position as chief. I hope to do at least half as well as he did.'

Combs has been acting chief since January, after council members approved the decision Dec. 9.

Originally the June 10 meeting (the meeting was held on Tuesday due to the Monday school election), called for an extension of the appointment of acting

Council members approved the extension to Sept. 30, but Councilman Dave Savage suggested the board rescind the motion and appoint Combs to permanent

"He's proven himself in the position of chief and he's done a good job," Savage said. "We can't keep him hanging in limbo. We don't want to see him go on because he lost interest in waiting. It's in our best interest to retain him as chief."

The vote was unanimous. "I really appreciate the support of the council members," Combs said. "It means a lot to me to have each supporting me."

The council now enters into negotiations to establish an agreeable contract between the city and Combs, effective

Combs, who oversees 10 part-time police officers and four reserve (nonpaid) officers, hopes to continue to make improvements within the department.

"I've been putting some of my programs in place all along. I change as I see the need, as things come to light."

This has included expanding the reserve program to save money from overtime salaries to enhance drunk driving patrol once a month, and charging for preliminary breath tests and fingerprinting, as other departments do, to help in police

Trustees last week scaled back the Landscaping.

oject after 🛮 🗖 bids for Phase I came in higher than the estimated cost of the entire threephase project.

To bring plans more in line with the budget, the board voted to eliminate the purchase

of an oak tree, reduce the number of flagstone tiles on a planned walkway and replace topsoil and grass between the flagstones with sand and mulch.

"It would seem, with some adjustment, we should be able to reduce it to \$9,200," Supervisor Collin Walls said at

the Thursday, July 12 township board

Original bids ranged from \$9,995 to \$16,174. The board voted to grant a revised bid to the lowest bidder, Oakview

Walls said there is an existing oak tree on township property that could be relocated to the site.

"We are going to move forward with the project," Clerk Nancy Strole said later. "I think we're committed to the plan."

Phase I will still include a millstone fountain (with the millstone to be provided by the township government) and a planting bed with several shrubs and perennial plants

On the other hand, higher-than-expected costs "may affect the timetable."

The board began discussions on the garden concept in November 2002, and struggled with the budget for the project even before the June 12 meeting.

The garden will be located not too far away from the entrance to the township's parks and recreation and building department offices.

It can be "positive," however, to look at ways to improve things the next time around.

For example, while the number of voters appeared high, we attempted to determine the percentage of registered voters who came out June 9.

School officials did not have exact numbers, but estimated 30,000 registered voters. If that figure is accurate, it means only 15.8 percent made the decision for all the taxpayers (and that doesn't count the number of people qualified to vote, but not registered).

Concerning the candidates, one piece of constructive criticism would be to encourage school board hopefuls to learn more about issues such as teacher tenure and student rights.

Concerning elections, how many support the idea of rolling school votes with the regular state and national elections?

Supporters say it will save money and improve voter participation in school issues. Skeptics (this writer included) wonder if it will make the school board one more ignored race, along with judges and university regents.

Of course, too many people ignore school elections now, right?

Retiring principal Bill Potvin received another standing ovation at the June 9 school board meeting, and one trustee revealed another line of his extensive re-

Apparently Potvin once held the title, DOPE.

At his insistence (and with smiles all around), the board revealed the full title, "director of planning and evaluation."

Why are school elections on Monday?

I was disappointed to see the errant title in the News' lead article on June 4, "School election on Tuesday... Candidates attempt to show uniqueness." In fact, the election was scheduled for Monday, June 9.

The confusion in the headline exacerbates an already troublesome problem - the proliferation of misinformation about school elections.

The News' headline perfectly illustrates my point. Most people equate elections with Tuesdays. During the presidential primary season we have "Super Tuesday," Michigan's regular primary elections take place on a Tuesday in August, and general elections occur on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November. So, why are school elections held on Mondays in June? I believe the question is valid and appropriate considering recent circumstances.

The existence of two parallel election systems, one for schools and another for local, county and state elections, combined with a permissive approach to the scheduling of special elections contribute to low voter turnout, especially in school elections. It also is the cause of concern among some residents that school elections are designed and scheduled so as to produce a specific result.

Currently, local elections can be scheduled on almost any issue on any day. The process causes confusion among voters. Additionally, the elections, with some exceptions, are run by untrained school officials instead of trained locally elected clerks. The practice of scheduling elections on a whim brings the integrity of the election into question and violates the basic tenets of our democratic form of government.

We need a system that brings consistency to the election schedule and restores integrity to the voting process. Several government officials have suggested a plan to make this happen.

On Wednesday, June 11, Secretary of State Teri Lynn Land and a bipartisan group of state legislators introduced legislation to improve voter participation by consolidating elections, and requiring all elections to

I was disappointed to see the errant title in the be administered by elected clerks who are trained and experienced in election management.

These changes will save taxpayer dollars and free up much needed financial resources so that school districts can invest what would have been spent on ballots and maintaining voting equipment, in classrooms, where it can have the best impact. By approving changes to existing law that consolidate elections and create uniformity, the state Legislature can ensure the rights of all Michigan residents and the sacred principles of our democratic society are protected.

Now, as a professional involved in media relations, I understand the importance of getting facts straight. An errant title or misconstrued fact can cause serious problems. Like *The Clarkston News*, as a professional involved in relating news to the public, I consider the task of providing accurate information to readers my utmost job responsibility.

Unfortunately, we all make mistakes. In this instance, some Independence Township residents may have been confused about the actual date of the election. They may have gone to the polls on Tuesday, only to find that when they arrived, there was no one to register their voice.

As an Independence Township resident, I know from experience that *The Clarkston News* and Sherman Publications strive to accurately inform the residents they serve. I extend my appreciation for their efforts. However, it is the solemn duty of the electorate to make informed decisions. It is difficult to do so when the information available is inaccurate.

I encourage all residents to consider their responsibilities in this process. I submit that we have a right to accurate information regarding elections. I also submit that we have a responsibility to take an active role in keeping the media accountable for providing accurate information. By doing so, we will be better equipped to make informed decisions regarding our community.



A winter of miserey for local

This winter was the most miserable of my 79 years, and not just because of the weather.

It all began in the middle of January, with a very loud shrieking noise outside my bedroom window at 12:45 a.m. and continued with 20 shrieks.

First, I called a naturalist at a local park. I imitated the call (somewhat like a rooster) and the naturalist said it "sounds like a raccoon, and no doubt a human was involved because the animal was being frightened."

Next I called Animal Control and a man came and laid out a trap. But, because of the extreme cold, snow and ice, he was unable to come back to look for the animal. He did call me to say "the consistency of 12:45 a.m. everyday and 20 times in a row tells me the problem is not animal, but mechanical."

Under my bedroom window is the gas meter. I was concerned. My call brought them out at once and in severe cold they worked diligently to tear out the old rusted meter and replace it with a new one. This endeavor managed to break the copper tubing causing a gas leak. More concern on my part. Finally, it was fixed. Next morning promptly at 12:45 the shrieking started again, 20 times in a row.

By mid-February my health was deteriorating from lack of sleep. Everyone noticed my trembling hands and body, my bloodshot eves and inability to control my tears. The only advice I received was: call the police, come down harder on animal control and call the local television station.

I could tell by their sidelong glances they thought I was senile or just plain crazy. My mobile home park manager offered me a tape recorder to prove what I was hearing. When he heard the recording he exclaimed, "that's an Alarm Rooster."

Great, now I know what it is. In March the weather finally broke, temperatures went up to 60 degrees. I called on a dozen neighbors to alert them of this "alarm rooster." I left notes on doors of those not home. Absolutely no response. After another visit to the mobile home park Office and in threatening them with calling the media I got a gentlemen who volunteered to be at my bedroom window at 12:45 the next morning. I was to turn on my back porch light as soon as I heard the noise. I did. He didn't.

The next night, this gentleman angel and I sat together in the darkened bedroom chatting quietly until 12:45 a.m. The screeching began, he jumped to his feet, flipped in his flashlight and shone it around the area. I saw nothing unusual. As he searched under and over the countertop located under my window he yelled, "I've got it."

We ran to a lighted room and in his hand was a black plastic wristwatch screeching like a rooster. It was a gift item that I did not like and had just laid it on the counter under the window. My gentlemen angel pushed a button on the watch and a voice announced the time of the day. At the bottom of the tiny instructions sheet it read, "Your watch is also an alarm, it will crow like a rooster for 20 seconds.

A Clarkston tradition continues Friday, June 20 when Concerts in the Park begins another summer.

This is the 24th year the concerts have been taking place in Clarkston and the 15th year being sponsored by the Clarkston Area Chamber of Com-

"Before we came along the downtown business association took this on. Basically it was Joan and Buck Kopietz who kept this going because the people wanted it," Chamber Secretary Penny Shanks said.

The concerts take place in Depot Park and usually average around 800-900 individuals. Non-profit groups sell concessions at the concerts which begin at 7 p.m.

"The first concert is usually the smallest crowd because people don't know about it. But after that we can get up to 1,200 people at some of the shows. There is a real tradition to it," Shanks said.

The summer schedule for the concerts includes:

- Kearsley Creek on June 20. The six member band plays bluegrass and pop country.
- Ceyx on June 27. The group plays a mixture of hits from the 1950's to 90's. Since 1971, Ceyx (pronounced cease) has performed more than 2,000 events, entertaining thousands with their authentic renditions of the most recognized songs of all time. They utilize four keyboards, drums, saxophone, guitar and three vocalists.
- Rich Eddy Band on July 4. This classic rock and pop hits band is a polished and exciting high-energy duo, using advanced musical technology to

produce instrumental sound of a much larger group.

 Guy Louis & Chautauqua Express on July 11. A fantastic family event. As a specialist with stringed instruments such as the mandolin and many different guitars, Guy's shows are highly entertaining and very interactive. Throughout the performance there will be audience members coming up on stage in every direction.

 The Delivery Boys on July 18. The Delivery Boys is a five-man band that plays a wide assortment of acoustic music, including bluegrass, Celtic, old time fiddle dance tunes, folk as well as original songs. Their instrumentation includes banjo, six and 12 string guitars, fiddle, mandolin, viola, Irish bouzouki, bass guitar, harmonica, tin whistle, concertina, button accordion, cuatro and assorted kitchen implements.

• Trilogy on July 25. Trilogy plays music from a variety of musical eras and styles including great hits of the 1950s to 90s.

The Chamber spends all year planning and looking for bands to perform. They solidify their schedule by February and make sure they have diverse music throughout the summer.

"Although the little kids dance in front of the gazebo no matter what music is being played. Seeing them dance out there is so Clarkston. I guess you have to be under 4-years-old to be able to dance like nobody is watching you," Shanks said. "There is definitely a real following at the concerts and we get great sponsorship support. This is the event we get the most personal contributions for because people want the concerts to continue. They really appreciate it."

The event starts at Faith Baptist Church in Waterford, where the bikers meet and ride together to Davisburg. The event begins at 1 p.m.


"To register all you need to do is show up on your motorcycle," Hogs-in-Ministry member Connie Glen said. "The event is entirely free."

• Erin Brow and Lauren Bendes received the Octagon scholarship based on their participation in leadership roles in the Octagon club as well as a high level of other community service.


• Brianna O'Donnell received a Henry E. Richardson "Friends of Youth" scholarship because of her outstanding community service.


